Smoke Filled Wreck Kills Youth

7 Minor Injuries In Four Vehicles

Senate Approves \$55,000 Limitation

A freakish chain-reaction series which left four vehicles wrecked on a smoke-filled highway resulted in the death of a local youngster Wednesday afternoon.

Shaun Allen Haley, four years of age, was pronounced dead on arrival at West Plains Memorial Hospital at 2:45 Wednesday afternoon following the accident. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Don Haley of Muleshoe.

The series of accidents began when a pickup driven by Antonio Hernandez of Plainview collided head-on with an automobile driven by Joaquin Salazar of Friona. According to these two men, they collided when the smoke from a burning stubblefield to the west side of Highway 214 obscured their vision. Hernandez was going north on Highway 214 and Salazar was traveling south.

The Hernandez vehicle came to rest in a bar ditch on the side of the highway approximately 8.5 miles north of Muleshoe on Highway 214 and the Salazar automobile was disabled on the highway.

According to investigating officer Robert Shedd of Farwell, the pickup driven by Haley, father of the dead youth, then entered the dense smoke and struck the Salazar car from the rear.

Shedd said that Bill Jim St. Clair, also of Muleshoe, was pulling two trailer loads of cotton with a pickup and ran into the smoke. He apparently saw the wrecked vehicles and braked his pickup jacking the two loaded trailers. He also struck the Haley vehicle.

As soon as local officers arrived at the scene, they called for the Bailey County Volunteer Fire Department. Fire Cont'd. on Page 3, Col. 3

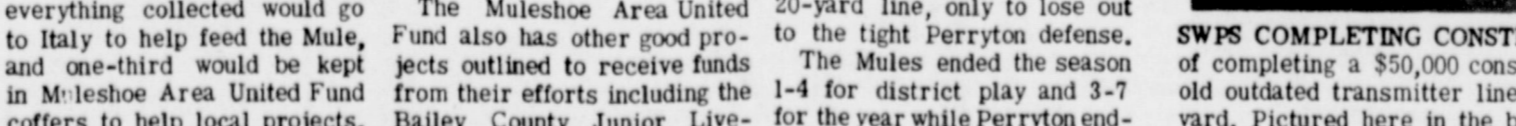

Phil Slack, big ground gainer for the Rangers scampered into the end zone in the first quarter and saw a 47 yard dash pay off. He scored again in the second on a 20 yard run. David Flowers scored for Perryton from the three and from the one yard line, while Dennis Hargrove added the last Ranger TD on a 72 yard punt return.

Several times, the Mules found themselves within scoring range, inside the Rangers' 20-yard line, only to lose out to the tight Perryton defense.

The Mules ended the season 1-4 for district play and 3-7 for the year while Perryton ended the season 2-3 in district play.

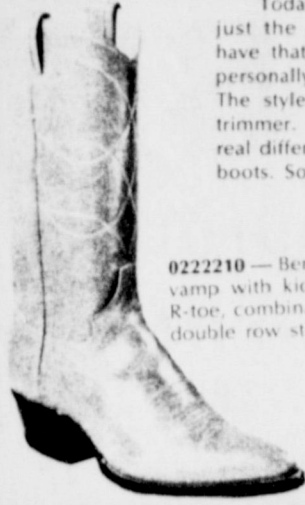

Young Escapee From Farwell Jailed Here

A long walk late Tuesday by 19 year old Romero Gonzalez of Muleshoe resulted in his being jailed at Muleshoe. Following his successful escape from the Farmer County jail at Farwell at approximately 3:40 p.m. Tuesday afternoon, the youth said he walked the 22 miles to Muleshoe where he was taken to the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center by a brother, who also lives in Muleshoe.

Farmer County Deputy Sheriff Tom Atkins said he was placing another prisoner in a cell at the jail when he was jumped by Gonzalez and locked in the cell. Gonzalez fled the Farmer County jail alone when other prisoners in the jail declined the offer to go along with him. Atkins spent some time before he managed to release himself from his jail cell to give the alarm that Gonzalez had escaped.

Good Handling Of Deer Can Save The Venison

AUSTIN -- So the fun part is over. You've shot your buck deer.

What now? Proper handling of a deer carcass can mean the difference between an assortment of tasty chops in the freezer or a total loss of valuable meat.

So with the deer season's opening day -- which is in mid-November in most Texas counties -- coming up soon, prospective deerlayers should bone up on deer skinning and processing procedures.

Two Texas Parks and Wildlife Department publications

are available to help deer hunters. The 1970-71 Hunting Guide will tell what the seasons and bag limits are in all 254 counties, and the illustrated "Now That You've Killed It" leaflet written by Game Management Officer Grover Simpson tells how to go about the field dressing job.

Simpson says the first thing the successful hunter should do after shooting a deer and making sure it's dead is to tag the animal. Then, without delay, the deer should be field-dressed.

One important note: Contrary to popular belief, their's no need to cut the deer's throat to bleed it. The bleeding will be accomplished during the field dressing process.

The deer is propped on its back and an incision is made from its pelvic bone clear through the rib cage and as

far up the neck as possible, with care taken not to puncture the entrails. The windpipe is cut as high up the neck as possible and is pulled downward.

The carcass is then rolled onto its side, and the layer of meat which is holding the entrails to the ribs is cut all the way down to the backbone. The deer is rolled over and the process is repeated on the other side. The entrails then can be pulled from the body cavity.

Then the deer is lifted by the hind legs and propped up on its back with rocks or some other suitable object, so a knife can be used to separate the bones of the pelvis. Then the carcass should be hung by the antlers or head for about 20 minutes to allow blood drainage. If no tree is handy, turn the deer with the chest cavity down in a clean place and allow it to drain.

The skinning can begin at once. (If the deer is to be mounted, it should be hung by its hind legs) The skin comes off more easily while the deer is still warm, so the animal should be skinned within two hours.

To remove the skin, cut it down the inside of each leg to the middle of the body. Then the skin is cut around the neck as close to the head as possible.

Then the skin is pulled away from the neck. A knife must be used to separate the skin from the legs and other places the skin sticks tightly to the meat.

The deer should then be taken to camp and hung in a tree by the hind legs for four or five hours. This allows the tiny blood vessels to drain back and out toward the heart region.

The carcass should be wrapped in a sheet or cheesecloth and kept hanging until cool. It may then be cut up as desired.



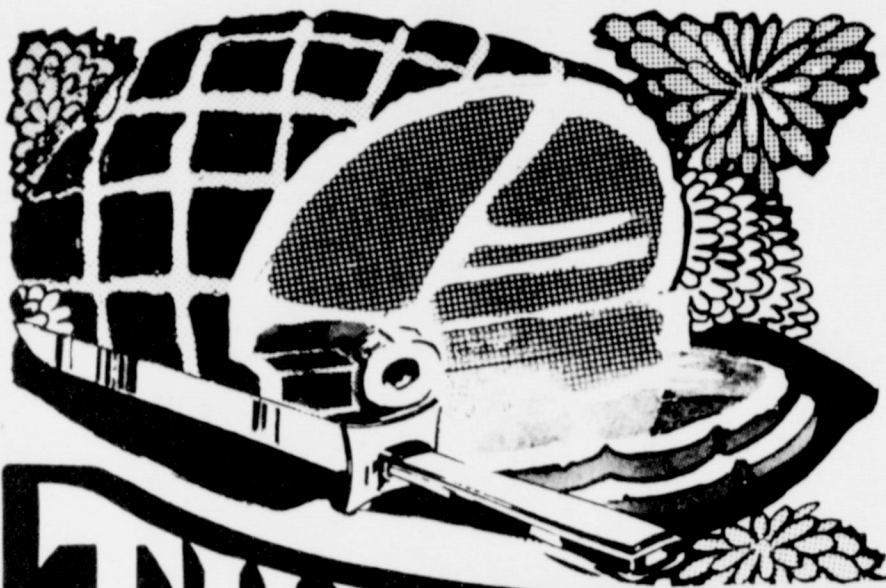

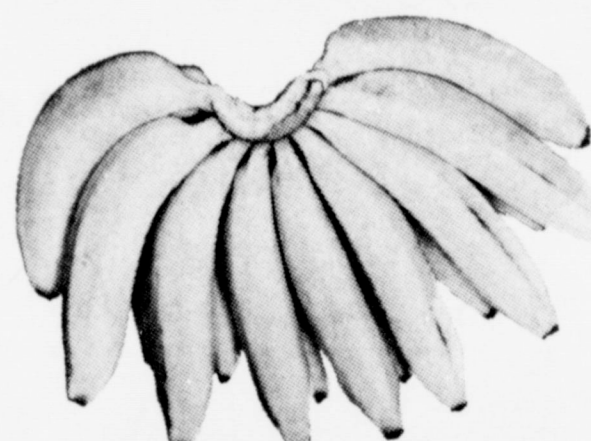
