WILL BUILD PUBLIC HIWAY

Deaf Smith County Commissioners Let Contract For Fourteen Miles Road Building.

WILL BE PART OF OZARK TRAIL

First Section of Great Highway in This Country-Other Part to Be Built Later.

At a session of the Deaf Smith County Commissioners last Tuesday, an order was issued awarding the contract for the first section of a public highway through the county and will fically be a part of the Ozark Trail. This contract will cover the road leading from the City to the east county line, a distance of 14.3 miles; that is from work as secretary of the Chamber of the City limits to the Green Valley

There were three bidders for the tivity if the plans of the organization dirt work; that is, for the gralling. After due consideration, the court awarded the contract to Dyar & Teifel, the price to be paid being based upon the county surveyor's figured estimates of the number of cubic yards moved and the grading done. The total estimated cost will not exceed \$2000.00. This does not include the building of culverts. This work will be done under a separate contract and the commissioners have practically acreed that all culverts shall be constructed of concrete, thus making them permanent.

The road as will be built does not include surfacing, but will be graded so as to leave a fine smooth top ready for surfacing at any time. The road bed will be 34 feet wide from center to center of side ditches, leaving about 24 feet for traffic and whi be 14 inches high in the center, The kond surface will be "rounded" and not left sharp in the center as many roads are so raded. Only the material along the right of way will be used.

As a matter of security to the county, the contractors will make a bond in the sum of \$3500.00, to cover the details of the contract as well as the machinery of the county, which they will use. The contractors agree to retarn all machinery in as good condition as found, allowing for reasonable use

The Commissioners in letting this contract, contemplated the future derelopment or improvement of this road. It will be so constructed as will leave no additional grading to be done or work of any kind, if it should ever appear necessary to place a harder surface upon the road. Their lectsion in this as well as in all other details of contract was unanimous.

The road leading from the City to the west county line will be considered



Never was living for self and selfish ends, as ignoble as at the present This is true, not only because our civilization has become very complex. but because our country is engaged in a conflict that will require that each do his duty if the burdens are to be bearable.

One of the most serious phases of the war is the imminent danger of a food shortage leading to exorbitant prices.

In this hour of need this fertile plains country has a duty to her own list as well as those physically unfitted for enlistment. people as well as to the country at large.

This section can easily handle its acreage planted to the hardy feed crops and by better cultivation largely increase the yield per acre. This hould not only be done as a patriotic duty but because it promises great

With all the sorghum grains selling much higher than wheat ever sold until a year ago, and higher than Indian corn now, the raising of these crops will be highly remunerative. Kafir is now selling on the city markets as high as \$1.45 per bushel and will go higher if the war continues and the prediction at a short wheat crop is realized. Such prices means that every acre of land in the Panhandle that grows a good crop of this grain will not only pay for raising the crop but pay for the cost of the land at present prices with a

There are millions of acres in the panhandle that with a fair seaso and good cultivation will yield from thirty to forty bushels of this grain Such land in many places can be bought for fifteen dollars per acre. Ten dollars will raise the crop even with present high prices of labor. Thirty bushels of this grain will certainly be worth thirty dollars. This pays for raising the crop, and the land on which it grew, with five dollars and the stover crop for a margin.

Of course such results are contingent upon a fair season but we have been promised seed time and harvest and we are more likely to get these than to fail to get them.

Let the Panhandle arise to her full duty and at least make an effort to raise such crops as will eclipse all previous efforts, not only for the sake of her own people but, for those in the cities and other less favored places that will be called upon to bear hardships and privations such as have never been known in this land of plenty before. He who decks his plow with the stars and stripes and goes out to raise a great food crop for man and beast is no less patriotic than he who follows the flag on seas or into the trenches.




