Foster Fertilizer, three miles east of Lazbuddie received .8.

Don Bryant who lives 15 miles northeast of Muleshoe said he estimated .50 inch and a little hail.

Lewis Embry of West Camp reported the largest amount of rainfall in our area which was 1.6 inches of rain.

Mrs. Hubert Elliott, one east and two miles south of Clay's Corner received .50 inch.

Byron Gwyn, seven miles northwest of Muleshoe said he received .8.

Claunch Gin at Bula reported only a sprinkle.

State Line Butane at Maple received only a shower.

Sudan Elevator said rainfall was very light, only .4 in town.

Vegetable Production Boosted For This Area

I'm The Same Old Flag--Remember?

Hello, remember me? Some people call me 'Old Glory,' others call me the 'Stars and Stripes,' still others the 'Star Spangled Banner.' Whatever the title, I am your Flag or as I proudly state, the Flag of the United States of America. However, there is something bothering me that I want to talk over with you--because it's about you and me.

I remember some time ago on Memorial Day, people lined both sides of the street to watch the parade. The town's high school band was behind me as I led the parade. When your dad saw me coming along, waving along in the breeze, he immediately removed his hat and placed it against his shoulder directly over his heart. Remember?

I remember you -- standing straight as a soldier. You didn't have a hat on, but you were giving the correct salute. They taught you in school to place your hand over your heart. Slow Planting Now With Moisture Lack

Muleshoe and this area has been boosted as a principal production area for vegetables according to Dr. Same, E. Curl, associate dean of the College of Agricultural Sciences at Texas Tech University.

Texas leads all the states in the nation in harvested acreages of cabbages, carrots, onions and watermelons. It ranks third in the fresh market

produce and fourth in the acreage of all vegetables, said Dr. Curl.

The High Plains contributes to the record with an annual vegetable production of \$23 million -- principally in potatoes, onions, carrots, cucumbers, lettuce, green beans, tomatoes, watermelons and cantaloupes.

The prospects for greater production is 'indeed bright' said Dr. Curl. "West Texas has soils and climate well suited to vegetable production, and the area's intensively cultivated vegetable crops generate a large percentage of the state income derived from vegetables."

The principal production areas, he said, are the Plainview - Hereford - Muleshoe triangle, the Munday-Knox City area, Gaines County, the Pecos-Fort Stockton area and the upper Rio Grande Valley near El Paso.

Vegetable acreage in Bailey County should be approximately the same as last year, say vegetable producers. The only vegetable which is expected to be cut out of local production this year is cabbage. Bailey County should be producing car-

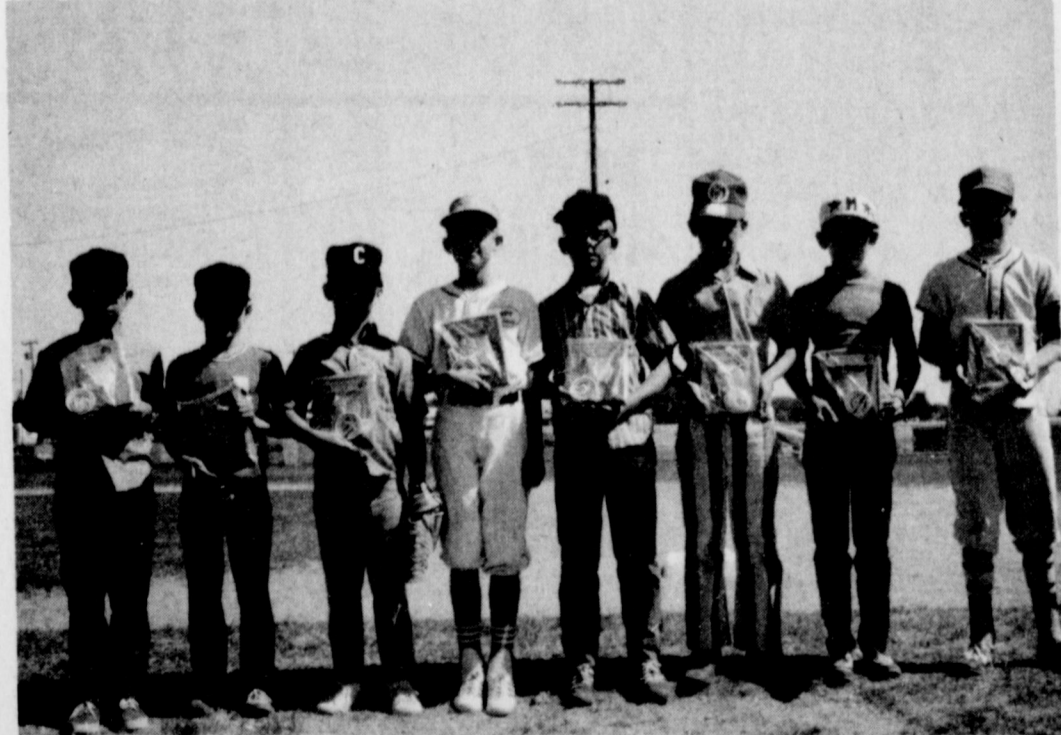

rots, onions, potatoes, peppers, tomatoes, watermelons, corn, cantaloupe, cucumbers and other vegetables.

"As with any other farm crop," he pointed out, "vegetables provide a significant multiplier effect which stretches their economic value far beyond the direct sale of the products."

Large numbers of people are involved in the production. They deal with chemicals, fertilizers and machinery. Production itself requires a large labor force, and harvesting, packing, shipping and marketing involves an even larger segment of the population.

It is in each of these areas, Curl said, that Texas Tech University is supplying continuous and progressive research leadership.

"The Texas Tech research," he said, "supports the prediction that vegetables have a strong future in the West Texas economy."
