## DEMONSTRATION FARM

**Committee Makes Favorable Report—Association to be Formed to Further Work—Contract Made.**

Some weeks ago the Directors of the Commercial Club received a proposition from Judge L. Gough to open a demonstration farm. After investigation a committee was appointed composed of Eli Dunlap, and others.

This committee has made a favorable report the text of which is in the form of a contract with Mr. Gough is herewith given. Mr. Dunlap has circulated the contract and has secured a number of subscribers.

Whereas, at a meeting of the Directors of the Hereford Commercial Club held June 14, 1909, the following report of the committee on Scientific Farming was approved and accepted:

We, your committee on Scientific Farming, recommend that the proposition for a demonstration farm, for the year commencing June 1st, 1909, and ending when the crop is harvested in the year 1910. Said

land is to be leased upon the following terms, to wit:

First.—The total amount to be paid to L. Gough for care of land, personal services and for all labor, tools, seeds, and expenses necessary for conducting this farm according to the Campbell System of Scientific Farming, is to be \$3,000, which shall include marketing the crop in Hereford.

Second.—The only expense to be borne by the association shall be for threshing and sacks.

Third.—Payments to be as follows: \$125 cash upon the first day of each month until \$1,500 shall have been paid, beginning June 1st, 1909; the remaining \$1500 to be paid when the crop has been marketed. After the first \$1,500 has been paid the said L. Gough will, if desired by the association, accept the crop in lieu of the balance due him.

L. Gough shall have entire charge of the demonstration farm, and shall conduct same according to the Campbell System of scientific farming, and at all reasonable times explain and instruct subscribers to this \$3,000 fund in the methods of farming. The subscribers to this fund shall form themselves into an association known as the Hereford Demonstration Farm Company. Every subscriber shall have one vote for each \$10 subscribed by him.

The subscribers or stock holders shall elect a board of five directors, who shall have entire charge of all

the busings of this association, except that part herein especially delegated to L. Gough. The directors shall organize by electing proper officials from their own number.

The aim and object of this association is declared to be to advance the cause of scientific farming, to instruct our people in such methods, and to encourage immigration to this section of the country. To accomplish this aim and object the directors shall from time to time establish rules governing visitors to this farm.

After L. Gough shall have been paid as above set forth, and expenses of sacks and threshing paid, if there should remain a balance to the credit of this association it shall be prorated among the stockholders or subscribers in proportion to the amount paid in by them, and this association shall then be dissolved.

Therefore, in consideration of all the above, we, the undersigned citizens of Deaf Smith, Castro, Parmer and Oldham counties, Texas, do hereby subscribe the amount of money set opposite our names toward the organization of the association described above:

Provided, that this contract shall not be binding unless the full amount of \$3,000 shall be subscribed.

## SCHOOL BONDS

**Hereford District Votes Twenty Five Thousand for New Building.—Work to Begin at Once.**

Last Saturday was celebrated throughout the South as Emancipation day, but at Hereford a somewhat different step was taken. There being none of the darker race in the town, but instead a fast growing population of the white race, the people saw that it would be good to vote bonds for a new high school building and such they did by an overwhelming majority vote.

There were really two questions voted upon: the bond issue and the maintenance tax. The first carried by a vote of 111 to 33, the second by a vote of 105 to 28. It appears that a few did not read the ballots very carefully and scratched out both "for and against the bonds," but voted both for and against the tax. This kind of a vote meant nothing and could not be counted on either side.

The vote as it stands shows that Hereford is pushing forward with long strides, that her citizens know what is needed for the best welfare of the growing generation. While \$25,000 will scarcely put up the building needed, the funds will erect

such a part as must be had at once. It has been "talked" that such plans would be adopted that additional rooms could be added without destroying the architectural beauty of the building. Plans will be submitted by architects at once and the trustees will soon be ready to advertise bids.

### Senator Veale To Lecture.

Arrangements have been made by friends to invite Senator John W. Veale of Amarillo to deliver a lecture on the subject of "Christian Citizenship." He has accepted the invitation and will be at the opera house Tuesday, June 28, 8:30 P. M. There will be no charges for admission. **Railroad Matters.**

Monday night the Commercial Club met at the Courthouse to discuss the railroad situation. Judge L. Gough, vice-president, occupied the chair. Several short talks were made. It was voted to recommend that an additional bonus be offered the construction company upon provision that they make contract to extend the line to the T. & P at once. Adjournment was made until Wednesday, 4 P. M., and a general call was issued to meet at the opera house. At that hour about 175 citizens assembled, president Knight in the chair. T. E. Shirley stated the object of the meeting, which was to offer \$70,000 in the aggregate for the construction of the road from the Rock Island to the Texas & Pacific, none of the bonus being payable until the road was in actual operation from the Rock Island to Hereford. A number of questions were propounded. The chair made a few remarks as to the necessity of concerted action. G. A. F. Parker offered a resolution covering the points under discussion. The resolution was passed without a dissenting vote. It was expected that Dr. Barton, president of the company, and Mr. Robinson, secretary, would be present but they were detained on a trip up the line to the Rock Island and did not get back in time. A part of the additional bonus was raised before adjournment.

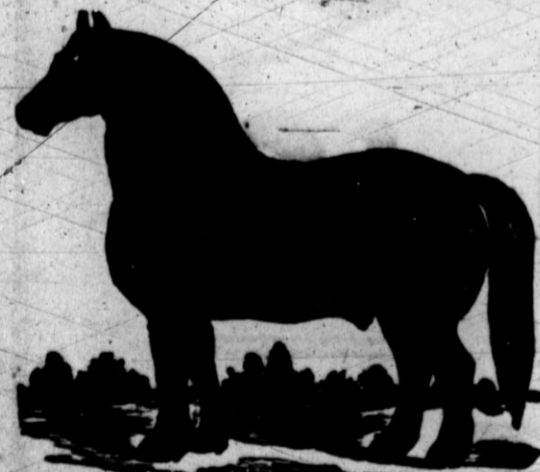

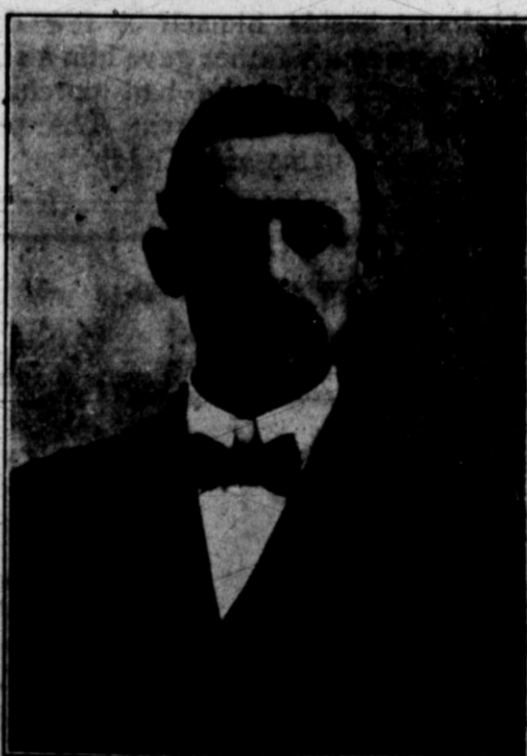

the one complained of appears in the Denver City Post and both together make some good reading for those who still think that the Panhandle is not a good place to live.

**THE LETTER.**

I notice in The Daily Post of the 28th of last month near the top of the front page that the circulation of the post for the day before was 56,719, and I guess on the 28th it was not less and probably some more. This would mean that about twice that number read it. Then if there is something good or something bad in your paper about anything, there will be about 100,000

people know it.

Under the heading "Patterson Gets Stinging Rebuke at Monte Vista" there is a letter from Monte Vista to the Rocky Mountain News signed by three reputable citizens of Monte Vista.

In their sixth complaint they say "Now we will ask the readers to compare five acres of irrigated land in the San Luis valley, where good artesian wells can be had and reasonably fair water rights guaranteed, with the great section of land in the Panhandle of Texas, now selling at from \$10 to \$25 per acre, with no show of irrigation and drinking water 500 feet below the surface,

with five acres here at \$41 per acre. Which would be the best place to take a family? We make this statement in behalf of all concerned.

**SLAM AT TEXAS.**

Now, why as prominent men as they are should go out of their way to cast a reflection on the Panhandle of Texas when they say "With no show of irrigation and drinking water 500 feet below the surface," when, as a matter of fact, the government report of annual rainfall for the last thirteen years located at Amarillo, shows a little less than twenty four inches, and the greater part of that during the growing season.

They have tried to leave the impression with your readers that to make anything in the Panhandle we had to have irrigation, and that there was no show for that. The Panhandle proper embraces about 25000 square miles, and there is not 1,000 acres of this land that is not smooth, level, rich agricultural land.

On this land we have been, are now and are going to keep on raising from fifteen to thirty bushels of wheat, corn thirty to fifty bushels per acre, oats, rye, sorghum, millet, milo maize, kaffir, cane, broom corn and alfalfa in proportion to the wheat and corn. All fruits such as apples, peaches, plums, cherries, grapes, blackberries, raspberries, strawberries, dewberries, Irish and sweet potatoes and every kind of vegetable adapted to this climate, all these things do well here.

If we wanted to irrigate, we could do so. This country is underlaid with a sheet of water. I have never heard of a well over 300 feet deep. Here at Hereford it is about forty-five feet to water.

**WELLS AND WINDMILLS.**

The town is only about nine years old with a population of 5,000, there are at least 500 wells and windmills; in other places the water is not as deep as it is here. There is fully in the Panhandle 10,000 wells, you could honeycomb every bit of the Panhandle with wells and everyone be as inexhaustible of water as the one here on the Santa Fe railroad. They have an eight-inch bored well, it is 106 feet deep, stands 60 feet in water. There is a tank that holds 55,000 gallons of water. There is at least seventeen engines that water here or at the reservoir every twenty four hours. Each of these boilers hold from 3,000 to 6,000 gallons. There never has been the least indication of a scarcity of water in the nine or ten years. The ten horse power engine runs day in and day out pumping water into this tank. And every well here will furnish as much water as this one. Then if we wanted to irrigate we could bore us a few wells on this \$10 and \$25 acre land and hitch gasoline engines to them and do all the irrigation we want to. But we don't need to irrigate.

**PLOWS AT WORK.**

The water is almost soft and so cool that you do not need ice in it the hottest day in the year. We have wheat farms that run up into the hundreds of acres and in a few years will have them in the thous-

and. For as fast as steam plows that are turning the sod from thirty to fifty acres a day can turn it, it will be sown to wheat and alfalfa. These are all facts that can be verified any day. Which would be the best place to take a family?

We make this statement on behalf of all concerned:

Colorado is a great state and has done great things, but nothing to compare with its possibilities of its future. But Texas doesn't propose to play second fiddle to anything. And we of the Panhandle think that if there is a best to Texas, the Panhandle is the best.

Will you be so kind as to publish this?

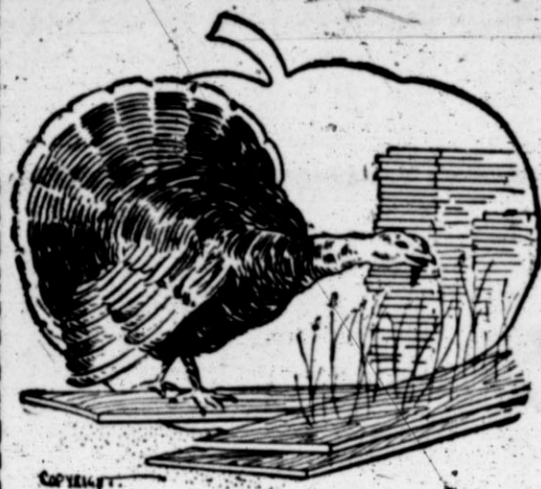

How's your wheat? is the question most often heard now. Indications point to a much better yield as the heads push out and ripen. In spite of the almost total lack of moisture since wheat was sown and the late frost which so greatly damaged the best fields, good returns are looked for from every field which was properly prepared and taken care of. Try a guess at what your field will yield. There should

be 950,000 kernels to a bushel. There are 43,560 square feet in an acre. Divide the number of grains in a bushel by the number of feet in

an acre and you get the number of grains per square foot required for a yield of a bushel per acre, a little more than 21 kernels. Make a

frame of any convenient size, say a yard square, count the heads of wheat, average the grains on a few heads, apply a little arithmetic and

you get quite closely the yield per acre. Some of our fields by this method of computation will yield 20 to 25 bushels per acre. Fully 30 per cent of these fields was destroyed by the late freeze.
