The Public Schools.

The scholastic census for Deaf Smith and Parmer counties for the school year of 1905-1906 shows the following number of children within the scholastic age enrolled:

For Deaf Smith county: Hereford school 328, against 281 for 1904-1905, an increase of 47; Union school, 9; Buttram school, 13; Day school, 21; Files school, 17; Coker school 4; Wyche school, 8; Walcott school, 9; Summerfield school, 12; County Line school, 9/; Dawn school, 5; Ward school A; a total for the county of 439 against 369 for 1904-1905, a total increase in the county of 70.

Parmer county shows an enrollment of 24, a slight increase overlast year.
