### BANK CHANGE.

Judge Ferguson Tenders His Resignation as President of the Hereford National Bank.

The friends of Judge Jno. E. Ferguson will be grieved to learn that he has tendered his resignation to the directors of the Hereford National Bank as its president.

Judge Ferguson has been at the head of the above named institution since its organization and has had the pleasure of watching its growth, under his management, from a mere infant in the banking world to one of the strongest banking concerns, according to its capital stock, anywhere in the West.

Judge Ferguson has always been loyal to his friends and has been a very potent factor in making Hereford the beautiful little city she is and we sincerely regret his retirement.

However, he will retain his stock in the bank and will continue to make Hereford his home and be closely identified with the business interests of the town.

His successor, Jno. L. Fuqua, of Amarillo is a man of broad experience in the banking business, having been associated with the First National Bank of Amarillo for several years. Mr. Fuqua will assume the duties of office July 1st.

With the exception of the above, there will be no other changes, and the bank stock will remain practically the same as before.

### Governor Lubbock Dead.

Ex-Governor Frank R. Lubbock died at Austin Thursday night shortly after nine o'clock. Deceased was born in 1815 at Beaufort, S. C., and came to Texas in 1836. His political career began in 1837 when he was elected assistant clerk of the house of representatives. He has also been comptroller of the treasury of Texas when a republic, district clerk of Harris county, lieutenant governor. He was elected governor of Texas in 1861. During the civil war he took an ac-

tive part in the war. For a time he served on the staff of Colonel Tom Green, for whom this county was named. During the closing days of the war he was on the staff of Jefferson Davis and was captured with him. In 1878 he was elected state treasurer. Governor Hogg appointed him a member of the penitentiary board.

As is true with most of the Texas heroes, the state named one of its Counties for him. The Panhandle is proud of the fact that Lubbock County lies within her bounds.

#### Land Trouble in Mexico.

The following dispatch, which is self-explanatory, went out from Roswell on the 24th inst:  
 Roswell, N. M., June 24.—What is declared to be a parallel to the land fraud prosecutions in Oregon and Montana has been started here by the arrest of Benjamin H. Tallmadge, of Chicago, of the C. L. Tallmadge Southwestern Land Company, upon the charge of subornation of perjury. Tallmadge was taken before the United States Land Commissioner, Karl Snyder, and gave \$5,000 bond for his appearance. The warrant was issued upon complaint of Grosvenor Clarkson, special agent for the government, who has been working in this district several months. It is reliably reported that this is merely the first of many prosecutions that are to be brought for alleged fraud in land entries and deals in this part of New Mexico. It is further stated that thousands of acres of land in the rich artesian belt of New Mexico, the most valuable land in the territory, have been secured through fraudulent desert entries.

#### The Public Schools.

The scholastic census for Deaf Smith and Parmer counties for the school year of 1905-1906 shows the following number of children within the scholastic age enrolled:

For Deaf Smith county: Hereford school 328, against 281 for 1904-1905, an increase of 47; Union school, 9; Buttram school, 13; Day school, 21; Files school, 17; Coker school 4; Wyche school, 8; Walcott school, 9; Summerfield school, 12; County Line school, 9; Dawn school, 5; Ward school 4; a total for the county of 439 against 369 for 1904-1905, a total increase in the county of 70.

Parmer county shows an enrollment of 24, a slight increase over last year.

I wish to thank the teachers, trustees, the school board and the patrons for their hearty co-operation and untiring efforts in building up our efficient school system, for without this co-operation no school can be a success, and the citizens of Deaf Smith county have every reason to be proud of our schools, for they stand par-excellence above any schools the writer has ever seen in so sparsely a settled community.

There are two rural schools, now being taught, the Files school and the Buttram school, and after these schools are out there will be something like \$1,500 in the school fund to the credit of all schools from last year's apportionments.

The writer had the pleasure of visiting the Day school on the 23rd of this month and was, indeed, agreeably surprised at the advancement made by the pupils in the short three months which this school has been running. Miss Vida Orr has been teaching this school for the past two sessions, and the school is fortunate in securing a teacher of Miss Orr's qualifications and ability. The school closed on the 24th inst.

I wish to invite the public's closest inspection into the management and affairs of this office in reference to any and all school matters; and I am always ready to give any information and assistance in my power for the better advancement of the schools.

## SHOULD ORGANIZE.

That the time will soon arrive when it will be necessary to begin shipping this year's onion crop and other farm truck to market, our association should stand thoroughly organized in order that they may obtain what their produce is actually worth in the market centers. It is a well-known fact that the majority of the commission houses in our cities cannot be relied upon to measure justice to the producers, hence it is not at all safe to ship the produce to them and depend upon their getting its worth. We should either have a buyer to come and purchase the crop delivered at the depot in Hereford or there should be a man sent with every car sent out.

The experience which the truck growers in the Laredo country are having this year ought to be a life-long lesson to us and teach us not to depend upon the northern commission houses to handle our produce.

The following dispatch, recently sent out from Laredo, shows how the truck growers of that country are being imposed upon:

"The complaint has been almost general among the onion growers of Webb county over the manner in which their car-load shipments to different cities have been handled by the commission houses to whom they were consigned. Many car loads, after deducting freight, only brought 30 cents for fifty-pound crates. In one instance a car load of 487 crates consigned to Pittsburg, Pa., after deducting the cost of the crates and freight and commission, only left \$3 to the shipper. Next season the onion men will employ an agent to go to the principal markets and handle the crops."

ELSEWHERE in this issue, will be found an article, written by Judge W. H. Russell, concerning the public schools of this county, and which we trust all will read. Judge Russell, as Ex-Officio Superintendent of the public schools, is keeping vigilant watch over their welfare and asks for the hearty co-operation of all parents in his efforts to improve their condition. We already have splendid school facilities, both in Hereford and the country, but we should not be satisfied to let them come to a standstill. We must look to our public schools for good American citizenship and hence cannot raise the standard of education too high. From the article referred to, it will be seen that we have nearly fifty more pupils this year than last for the Hereford school. This will no doubt necessitate the employment of one additional teacher, and a course would call for the providing of another room. These matters should all be looked after in time for the opening of school in September.

To indicate the popularity of William Jennings Bryan with the American people, he is receiving requests from all quarters of the United States for permission to use his name in connection with the democratic clubs which are being organized everywhere. To all these requests, Mr. Bryan answers, no! His reason is that he does not wish the people to mistake his zeal and earnestness, in advocating what he conceives to be sound political principles, for his own personal gain. Mr. Bryan is nearer the common people today than any other man in the country and the thousands of pledges which he is receiving is a pretty good indication that he will figure prominently in reorganizing the political affairs of our government in 1906.

By means of the connectional funds and special donations of the Woman's Home Mission Society, there are maintained four night schools for the Chinese and Japanese in California in San Francisco, Los Angeles, Oakland and Alameda.

In Florida at Key West, Ybor City and West Tampa, there are four Cuban and Italian Schools.

For the mountaineers of the east, there are industrial schools at London, Ky., Greenville, Tenn., and Brevard, N. C.

In Augusta, Georgia, a school for negro girls is maintained by the society.

In our own state at Dallas, a great good is done in a rescue home and school for fallen girls.

The reports from all these schools at the annual conference held in April were exceedingly favorable.

One half of each member's assessment of ten cents each month goes for the maintenance of this educational work that must needs greatly improve the citizenship of our home country.
