Farmers Meet.

Questions of Importance Discussed With Earnestness and Enthusiasm. Cotton and Wheat the Pricipal Subjects to Receive - Their Consideration.

On Saturday afternoon, according to previous announcement, the farmers of Deaf Smith and Castro counties met at the court house to discuss the farming interests of this section, with W. H. Rayzor in the chair.

The reports of the various committees were had in their order, after which, interesting and enthusiastic talks were made by many of the leading citizens of both counties as well as different ones of Hereford. Among those who addressed the convention were, J. M. Atcheson, S. T. Howard, C. R. Moreman, Postmaster Roberson of Arney, J. M. Sypert, G. C. Majors, B. H. Bounds, W. H. Rayzor, G. A. Hughes, W. S. Dixon, E. B. Orr, O. M. Daniel, Randolph Clark and J B. Storm.

J. A. Hughes, B. F. Stanley and R. J. Kibbe were appointed to act in conjunction with the old committee in perfecting definite arrangements whereby cotton seed and spring wheat can be secured, so that the farmers may place their orders at the next meeting.

In response to a call from the chairman as to those interested in the sowing of spring wheat, a number indicated their intention of giving this product a trial.

The committe on permanent organization had not completed its work, hence it was decided to carry that feature of the program over until the next meeting. The convention asked S. T. Howard to use his influence in securing and from the A: & M. Chiege at some subsequent meeting.

All and all the meeting was a most excellent one. Between eighty and one hundred men were present and all seemed to be fully convinced that the only things necessary to . d to grow cotton on the plains are planting and cultivation.

INTERESTING MEETING.

Local Option Club of Hereford Trans- P. church. acts Important Business.

On Tuesday evening a meeting of the Hereford branch of the Local Option Association met at the Cumberland Presbyterian church, announcement of which had been made at the different churches on Sunday. The meeting opened with a song by the choir, followed by a prayer by Rev. Kilbourn, President Lee Clark presiding, and who stated the object, purposes and character of the meeting. Rev. Kilbourn then stated what was wished to be accomplished through these organizations and that the first point to be gained was the passage of the Hepburn-Doliver Bill, now pending in the National Congress, and by what means this was to be done, i. e. sending telegrams at Washington.... After securing the passage of this bill, which forbids the shipping of intoxicants from a licensed state into a prohibition state, the next step to be taken was the laws prohibiting the shipping of intoxicating liquors into prohibition counties. To do this the citizens of each legislative district should see that only men who will favor such a law be elected to our state legislature. Bro. Kilbourn then moved and signed and sent to our represenunanimously carried:

A point was then raised as to the inefficiency of any movement calculated to drive from our borders such eel range institutions unless a counteracting influence was created in the form of a Y. M. C. A. hall or other similar institution.

EXEMPTION CERTIFICATE.

The following opinion from the Attorney General to Associate Justice Brown of the Supreme Court is of importance to all citizens over sixty years of age who expect to vote in the coming elections:

Constitutional Amendments.

At the ensuing November election the voters of Texas will be given an opportunity to vote on three amendments to the State constitution.

The one in which the most interest will likely be taken is that which authorizes the appropriation for pensions to ex-Confederate soldiers and sailors and the establishment of a home for the maintenance of old, crippled and indigent ex-Confederate soldiers not to exceed five hundred thousand dollars. This amendment was passed by the last legislature by a vote of yeas 142, nays 3.

Another amendment provides for the incorporation of state banks with banking and discounting privileges. This amendment was passed by a vote of 95 yeas, 6 nays.

The remaining amendment authorizes legislation, now prohibited by the constitution, in aid of certain internal improvements, to-wit: The improvement of rivers, creeks and streams to prevent overflow; the construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, rivers, dams, canals and waterways; construction of turnpikes, roads, and providing for the issuance of bonds by raunicipalities and counties to make such improvements. This amendment was passed by a vote of 93 yeas, 2 nays.
