ADVISORY BOARD FOR PUBLIC SCHOOL.

SINCE the time is rapidly approaching when the election for school trustees will be held, it might not be amiss for every patron of our public school to stop and think for a moment and then ask himself this Also Collin County propquestion: "Is there anything that could be done that would better subserve the interests of our schools?" To this question the BRAND answers in the affirmative. For instance the board of trustees for the Hereford school only has one member, which of course is all right as long as nothing goes wrong; but when trouble does come (which must be the case sooner or later) there are not many men who alone wish to shoulder the responsibilities which attend the trusteeship.

We do not wish it to be understood that the BRAND is attempting to dictate how this matter should be adjusted but at the request of others and because we believe it to be for the best interests of the school, we would suggest for public consider-ation an advisiory board, composed

of something like four members, whose duty would be to meet with the trustee in power from time to time and advise as to the needs and demands of the school. Onr present trustee and county superintendent are heartily in favor of this plan and it should receive the careful consideration of every patron.

The plan as sugguested to us is to place four other names on the ticket with the trustee to be elected and let these four constitute the advisory board. It is simply a question of the school's getting the benefit of the deliberation of five men instead of one in addition to dividing the responsibility among several instead of one's carrying it. This move is now on foot and, if anyone is opposed to it, our columns are open for such a one to state his objections or, if anyone wishes to say something in its defense, the same privilege is extended.

Hereford is justly proud of her public school and especially of the efficient manner in which it has been conducted during the past year, both on the part of the teachers and trustee, but she should avail herself of every opportunity to make advancement and this we believe she


