ELECTION ORDERED.

Friday November 2nd Is the Time Set To Vote on Incorporation of Hereford.

A Petition, asking the county judge to order an election to ascertain whether or not the city of Hereford shall be incorporated, was circulated among our citizens this week, receiving numerous signatures. In fact only a few to whom the petition was presented hesitated to sign it. Responsive to this call from the people, Judge Russell has fixed Friday, November 2nd, as the day on which the desired election will be held.

For the information of the public we submit below the petition, which describes the territory to be included in the proposed corporation:

STATE OF TEXAS
County of Deaf Smith
To, the Hon. W. H. Russell,
County Judge of Deaf Smith
County Texas.

We, the undersigned, being qualified voters and resident citizens of Hereford in said county and state respectfully represent to your honor that the city of Hereford contains more than two thousand inhabitants.

Wherefore we respectfully petition and request your honor to order an election for the purpose of incorporating said city as provided under article 385 of revised Statutes of Texas. The name of which city if it be incorporated shall be Hereford and shall contain the following territory described by metes and bounds as follows to-wit:

Being parts of sections No. 61, 62, 79 and 80 in block K-3 in Deaf Smith County, Texas. Beginning at a point where the west line of section 61 is intersected by the Tierra Blanco creek; thence in an easterly direction with the meanderings of said creek to where it intersects the east line of section No. 61; thence north with the east line of sections No. 61 and 62 which is opposite the north

line of the Panhandle Christian College property, which is, 2177 feet, more or less, from the S. E. Corner of said section No. 62 and which is the N. E. corner of Evans addition to Hereford; thence west crossing the west line of section 62 to a point 1070 feet from the east line of section No. 79; thence south to Norton's lane in section 80 Blk. K-3; thence east to west line of section No. 61; thence south to place of beginning.

First Bale Ginned.

The gin at this place turned out its first bale of cotton this week, same being the property of J. F. Dollars whose farm is located six miles south of town. This bale had been ready for several days but the gin was not opened for business till this week. Mr. Dollars placed his product on the local market where he was offered 10 cents per pound, which was within 3-8 cents of the Galveston market, allowing one cent per pound for placing same on the Houston or Galveston market. Mr. Dollars refused to sell at this price and took his cotton back home to hold for an advance. A purse of \$12.50 was raised among the business men which Mr. Dollars refused on account of not selling.

In this connection, we wish to state that local buyers cannot pay Galveston prices as it requires at least a cent a pound to market cotton from this point and besides it requires so much time for shipment that one can lose from \$5 to \$10 on a bale before it can be disposed of. The BRAND editor had such an experience on a single bale last year, his loss aggregating a little more than \$10.00. However, our merchants should pay every cent the leading markets will justify.

RAILROAD WORK TO BEGIN.

Committee Urged to Raise Bonus, Secure Right of Way and Have Everything in Readiness.

Communications were received from J. R. Ransom this week stating that the company which he represents is now ready to begin work on the "Panhandle Short Line Road" and that actual operations will commence as soon as our citizens comply with their part of the contract in the way of cash bonus and right-of-way. The terms on which we are to secure the road, round houses, general offices for Texas and other accessories are extremely easy and the committee ought to be able to arrange this part of the program in two or three days. Only \$15,000 cash and the right-of-way through the town are asked, and a community with as much enterprise and push as this one will never halt for a moment in raising this small amount.

In view of the demand for quick action the railroad committee met at law office of Judge Slaton at an early hour Monday morning to lay definite plans for systematic work. At this meeting Judge Witherspoon was instructed to communicate with the promoters, assuring them that our people stand ready to meet his requirements in detail and that they could safely make their arrangements accordingly. It was then decided to call a mass meeting of citizens at the court house tomorrow afternoon from 3 to 4 o'clock to ascertain what the people are willing to do in the matter. In order that a full attendance may be had at this meeting, large cards have been hung on the front door of all the business houses stating that that house will be closed from 3 to 4 o'clock. The committee confidently believes that every able bodied man in Hereford will attend the meeting and do what would be called his part in enabling them to meet the requirements of the company. Remember the time, tomorrow from 3 to 4 p. m., and be on hand.

Democracy of Deaf Smith County in Harmony with Actions of Gainesville Senator.

Responsive to a call from the chairman, the democrats of this county met at the court house in this city on last Saturday afternoon to either approve or disapprove of the action of Senator Joseph W. Baker, who soon returned, with a lengthy instrument replete with good things about the Texas orator. These resolutions, being read, were adopted, a copy being sent to both the Dallas News and Ft. Worth Record for publication. The meeting then adjourned.

A meeting of the committee appointed to confer with the promoters of The Panhandle Short Line Railway was held last Monday in the office of Judge J. P. Slaton.

All of the committee were present. A letter from J. H. Ransom to Judge Slaton was read. In this letter Mr. Ransom stated his surveys were now complete and he was ready to go to work as soon as the bonus, right of way, depot grounds and grounds for shops and cattle pens were secured.

The committee were all of one opinion that we should get to work and raise the necessary money.

A bonus of \$15,000 is required, besides right of way and grounds. Part of this ground will be donated, but we will have to buy part. This will cost not less than \$5,000. Therefore we must ask for subscriptions for at least \$20,000. Less than half the amount has been subscribed. If we want the road we must act promptly. No property owner can afford to miss it. The bonus asked is very light for the large benefit that will come to this country if this road is built.

It is selfish to let some one else pay the bonus, and you pay nothing, when you get a share in the benefit. Some, of course, will do this. We appeal to all who are willing to pay for the benefits they will receive, to at once hunt up some member of the committee and hand in your subscriptions. The following is the membership of the committee: C. G. Witherspoon, President, J. Ray, Secretary, J. D. Thompson, J. S. Jones, J. P. Slaton, G. A. F. Parker, C. W. Dodson.

Remember that nothing will have to be paid unless the road is built.

support it. From now till election
day our columns will be open to all
alike for a free and friendly discus-
sion of the question.

DORMITORY CHANGES HANDS.

Papers were signed this week
transferring the Girl's Home to the
Texas Christian College to be used
in connection with the college at this
place. All told, nearly \$10,000 has
been raised by the citizens of Here-
ford, alone, for this purpose, which
cannot fail to arouse the admiration
of other communities. In the first
place the college building proper
was erected by local capital at a
cost of \$22,000 or \$30,000 and now
these same people come forward and
join their neighbors in raising ten
thousand dollars with which to de-
dicate the dormitory to the cause of
education. We believe everyone
will agree with us that this is a
record which cannot be broken. In
this connection it should be stated
that Hereford still stands ready to
give of her wealth to secure the lo-
cation of so valuable enterprises as
Panhandle Christian College.

THE CAMPBELL SYSTEM.

Sod Lands on Model Farm Near Bovina Makes Thirty Three bushels of wheat.

From the time Prof. H. W. Campbell first set his foot on Panhandle soil there has been a constant revolution in process in the minds of the farmers as to the methods to be practiced in the treatment of our soil. Prof. Campbell came here with the doctrine of cultivation and not irrigation and so successful have his methods proven that there is at present hardly a farmer in West Texas who has not put the famous system into practice, some to a greater extent than others. Especially have those in Deaf Smith and Castro Counties instituted these cultural methods, which, we believe, accounts largely for the indisputable fact that the Hereford Country has surpassed all other sections in the production of fine crops.

We have an instance brought to our notice this week which serves to bring complete conviction to the mind of the writer that the Campbell System of farming is the one and the only one agency which will eventually render the Panhandle the most desirable agricultural section of the entire United States. We have reference to the thrashing of the wheat crop on the Model Farm near Bovina which was reported by C. P. Arthur this week. Mr. Arthur assisted his brother, who is manager of the farm, in thrashing and took special notice of the measurements, etc., that he could give an accurate account of the yield. The wheat in question was harvested from a tract of 23 acres which measured out 756 bushels or about 33 bushels per acre. This wheat had been in the stack since harvest time and those who were present testified to the fact that enough was destroyed by wet weather and otherwise to place the total average at 35 bushels. Another important fact which should be taken into account is that this is the first crop which was ever grown on this land. In other words the Panhandle country is able to cite an instance in which from 33 to 35 bushels of wheat per acre has been grown on sod land. If there be those who don't understand this and wish explanation on the question, we can only say "The Campbell System of soil culture did the work."

We are told the management of the Farm is sowing 75 acres again this season.
