Railroad Bonus Nears \$20,000 Mark Gough L. and Others yet to be Seen.

We give below a corrected list of subscriptions to the railroad bonus for the Panhandle Short Line. Through mistake last week, \$25 was placed opposite W. J. Walter's name when it should have been \$100. This now makes a cash subscription of ahout \$18,450, with about \$6,000. yet to be raised. In addition to the above amount, L. R. Bradly has proposed giving the right-of-way through his two tracts of land just east of town and also suitable grounds for stock pens etc. which is quite an item in the reduction of the total amount of cash required.

On another page of this issue will be found an item under the caption "Three Classes in Missouri" which was sent the BRAND for publication from Kansas City this week and which is well worth the careful perusal of every citizen of this town. We are not personally acquainted with the writer, but we feel free to say that he is a valuable adjunct to the communty in which he dwells. While what he says fits many communities admirably, we don't believe that it is at all applicable to Hereford. Though it appears that we have not been as enterprising as we should when we glace about at our. streets, sidewalks, etc., yet it must be considered that the name of every citizen in Hereford is found on subscription lists to build school houses, colleges, churches, railroads, etc., etc. These things have all had to be done in the brief space of eight years and the BRAND, is forced to come to the defense of its people and say that they have, unitedly, done their part nobly. Rome was not built in a day; it took time. As we stand today in our present unpolished condition, we can but expect to be commented upon adversely; but give us eight years more of this existence and we will compell our visitors to say nice and balmy things about us. Obituary.

George F. Pierce was born in Franklin county, Missouri, August 26th, 1856. Died at the family residence in Hereford, October 27th, 1906. He was the son of George W. and Sarah (Smith) Pierce. His father was a soldier in the war with Mexico and also in the Confederate

At the age of twenty George F. Pierce moved to Dallas county, Texas, soon afterwards moving to Ellis county, where he lived until he moved to Hereford, five years ago. While in Ellis county, he was one of the most successful farmers and cattle raisers in the entire country. March the 28th, 1875, he was again married to Mrs. Rebecca France. This union was blessed with one daughter, May.

Mr. Pierce joined the Methodist-Church in his twentieth year, and for thirty years was a faithful and consistent member. Since moving to Hereford he has served his church continuously as trustee.

During his brief illness, he spoke often of dying and left no uncertain evidence of his future. He had committed his life to Christ in his youth and trusted in Him to the end.
