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## Christie, Schlabs grab lamb show honors

### Josh Hicks named first goat champion

The seven young men and women walked slowly into the ring, leading their entries to the first-ever judging of goats at the Hereford Young Farmers Junior Livestock Show.

As a first-year event, the goat show was limited to entrants from Hereford FFA or Deaf Smith County 4-H.

When all was said and done, 14 goats had been shown in two classes, one for lightweight entries and one for heavyweight goats.

Josh Hicks, a member of Deaf Smith County 4-H, claimed the very first Grand Championship in the goat show.

Hicks showed his goat in the heavyweight class, which contained seven entries.

Reserve Champion honors went to Ty Nall, the only entrant representing Hereford FFA. Nall, who showed three goats, won Reserve Champion with his second-place heavyweight class entry.

Erin Auckerman won first place in the first group of goats, which was the lightweight class.

No showmanship honors were

given for goat entrants.

The new event was judged by Dave Cleavinger, ag instructor and livestock judging coach at South Plains College in Levelland. Cleavinger also judged the lamb show Friday night.

In examining the goats, Cleavinger moved slowly from animal to animal, checking each one carefully and comparing with the others.

"I think we really have a good class to start off here," he noted when announcing the results of the first class of goats.

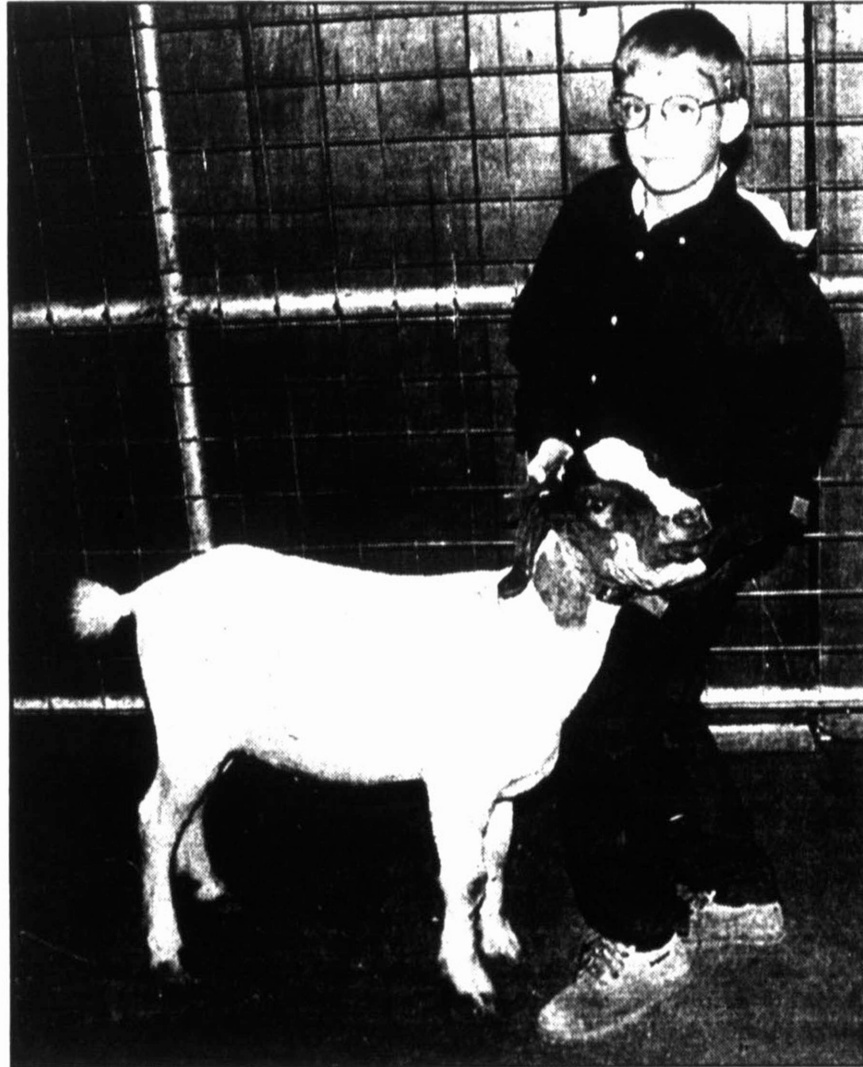

From classes as small as three animals to groups of more than a score, the lambs came on Friday night -- more than 200 in all -- as the 1996 Hereford Young Farmers Junior Livestock Show drew to a close.

When the dust had cleared and Friday itself ended, Chad Christie of Hereford FFA had climbed to the top, claiming Five-County and County Grand Champion honors.

Christie drove his 109-pound Medium Wool entry to the title before judge Dave Cleavinger, who appeared for the second year to handle the sheep duty.

Janae Schlabs, who also came out of the Medium Wool division, came on to snag Five-County and County Reserve Champion honors with her 124-pound entry.

The two claimed champion and reserve champion honors for the Medium Wool division in the same order.

In remarks to the audience, Cleavinger had high praise for the annual show and its participants.

"You've definitely grown in numbers and in quality and I think you should be commended for that," Cleavinger said.

"You've got an outstanding group of young people here," he said, noting that the entrants he dealt with during the nearly six-hour show were very polite and courteous to him.

Lamb judging began more than 30 minutes late, as spectators arriving early were able to watch the first goat show ever and the annual PeeWee Showmanship judging.

Cleavinger settled down to work immediately after the PeeWee Showmanship, however, working his way from Southdowns through Fine Wool and Fine Wool Cross to Medium Wool.

With only seven entries total,

Southdown was the smallest division in the show, with two classes. Medium Wool, on the other hand, boasted six classes, each of which had more than 20 entries.

Amanda Smith of Deaf Smith 4-H was named Five-County and County champion of the Southdown division, with Sterling Via of Parmer County 4-H getting Five-County reserve honors and Brian Taylor of Deaf Smith 4-H claiming the County reserve title.

In the Fine Wool division, Truett Schlabs of Deaf Smith 4-H rose to the top, claiming Five-County and County champion honors. Krysta Cockerham of Bovina FFA was named Five-County breed champion, and Joshua Hicks nabbing the County reserve breed champion title.

Erin Auckerman of Deaf Smith 4-H claimed the Fine Wool Cross Five-County and County champion title, with Alyssa Hill of Deaf Smith 4-H getting the nod for County reserve champion in that breed.

Following the championship drive, Cleavinger took on the Showmanship drive, evaluating youth in two age groupings to find which showed his or her animal the best.

Cleavinger told the entrants and fans that, when judging a showmanship competition, he looks for "the young man or the young lady who presents that sheep to me to its utmost ability."

In the Senior Showmanship event, that nod went to Timberly Mercer of Randall County 4-H, with second place claimed by Asia Kirby of Dimmitt FFA.

In the Junior Showmanship event, Sterling Via of Lazbuddie FFA claimed first place, while Krysta Cockerham of Bovina FFA was second.

## Bill and Hillary experience ups, downs as political 'odd couple'

AP White House Correspondent WASHINGTON (AP) - Suddenly, they are America's political odd couple, Bill and Hillary Clinton.

He's on a roll. She's on the hot seat.

He made Republicans squirm with a strong State of the Union address well received by the public. His poll numbers are up, the Republicans' are down. His string of vetoes on welfare, tax cuts and a balanced budget the last few months threw the GOP agenda into a skid. Republicans, taking heat for two government shutdowns, backed down and hastily approved a temporary spending bill last week.

She, on the other hand, was

ordered under subpoena before a grand jury - an embarrassing first for a first lady. Her credibility is in doubt, her poll ratings are plunging and her high-visibility role as White House policy maker is history.

For the first time, he is more popular than she is. Significantly so.

This isn't how it usually works. First ladies traditionally float near the top of America's most-admired lists while their husbands soar and sink in the public's eye.

The Clintons have never fit the traditional mold of first couples, of course, but their political turnabouts have been dramatic by any standard.

"There are a lot of allegations about Hillary Clinton, and a majority of Americans think it's politically

driven but nevertheless it's affected their attitudes," said pollster Andrew Kohut of the Pew Research Center. "Some of this is sticking. In fact, a fair amount of it is sticking, at least for now."

An activist, Mrs. Clinton often has been a lightning rod for criticism. Many people think the president made a mistake by giving her such a big role, thus exposing her to attacks. After getting knocked around in the bruising fight over health care, she retreated to a more traditional first lady role following the Republican election sweep in 1994. It helped her, temporarily.

"Her high point in public approval was at her low point in public visibility in late October of last year,

when she was quietly writing her book," Kohut said. At the time, 58 percent of Americans approved of what she was doing.

Since then, with questions swirling about her role in the White House travel office firings and the Whitewater controversy, Mrs. Clinton's approval rating has dropped precipitously to 42 percent.

Campaigning last week in New Hampshire, she spoke of her life as first lady. "Some days it feels good and other days it is kind of hard," Mrs. Clinton said. "The political climate in our country today is kind of difficult."

## Challenger commander's son set to lead Super Bowl flyover on disaster anniversary

AP Aerospace Writer CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - Air Force Capt. Rich Scobee can't think of anywhere he'd rather be Sunday - the 10th anniversary of the day his father died in the Challenger disaster - than up among the clouds.

The 31-year-old fighter pilot will lead a formation of F-16s over Sun Devil Stadium in Tempe, Ariz., just before Super Bowl kickoff.

It's a fitting tribute, he says, to his father: space shuttle commander, test pilot, combat pilot, patriot and football fan.

"He was, and I am, too, a more private person. Things done in front of a large crowd aren't necessarily our style. But in this circumstance... he'd think it was a good act. I think he'd be happy with it," Scobee said in a telephone interview Friday before flying to Arizona.

Francis "Dick" Scobee and his crew of six, including school-teacher Christa McAuliffe, were killed when Challenger exploded

8.9 miles above the Atlantic Ocean shortly after liftoff Jan. 28, 1986.

Rich Scobee, then a 21-year-old Air Force Academy cadet, watched in horror from the roof of the launch control center, his arms around his mother and older sister.

Dick Scobee was 46 and on his second space shuttle flight.

"It was a hard time to get through," his son said. "I couldn't quantify it, how long it took. I'm still not over it. It's something you can never be over," he added, sniffing softly.

"I'm bitter about it, no doubt about it," he added. "It's hard to be without my dad. I miss him a lot. But it has been 10 good years. I'm married. I have two wonderful kids. The sad part of it is, my father wasn't there to see his grandchildren, my children. That's really hard for me. However, the main reason I agreed to do anything, the flyover, is so people could see what good could come of it.

"Look at how my dad lived his

life. He was an average American. He did some extraordinary things, but he was just a great guy and there are great guys everywhere. Sometimes, something tragic has to happen to get people to sit up and take notice of what one man can accomplish, and everybody is capable of that."

With the 30th Super Bowl falling on the 10th Challenger anniversary, the National Football League wanted to pay tribute to the seven fallen heroes. So the NFL asked Scobee - a combat pilot like his Vietnam War veteran father, having patrolled the Persian Gulf - to join a flyover at the conclusion of the national anthem.

Scobee tries to spend every Jan. 28 in the air - he says he feels closest to his father up there - and readily agreed. He will be accompanied by three other members of the 78th Fighter Squadron at Shaw Air Force Base in South Carolina; they will fly the so-called missing man formation.

"The Super Bowl is traditionally a celebration of life more than it is a remembrance of death,"

Scobee said. "But it is very appropriate, I think."

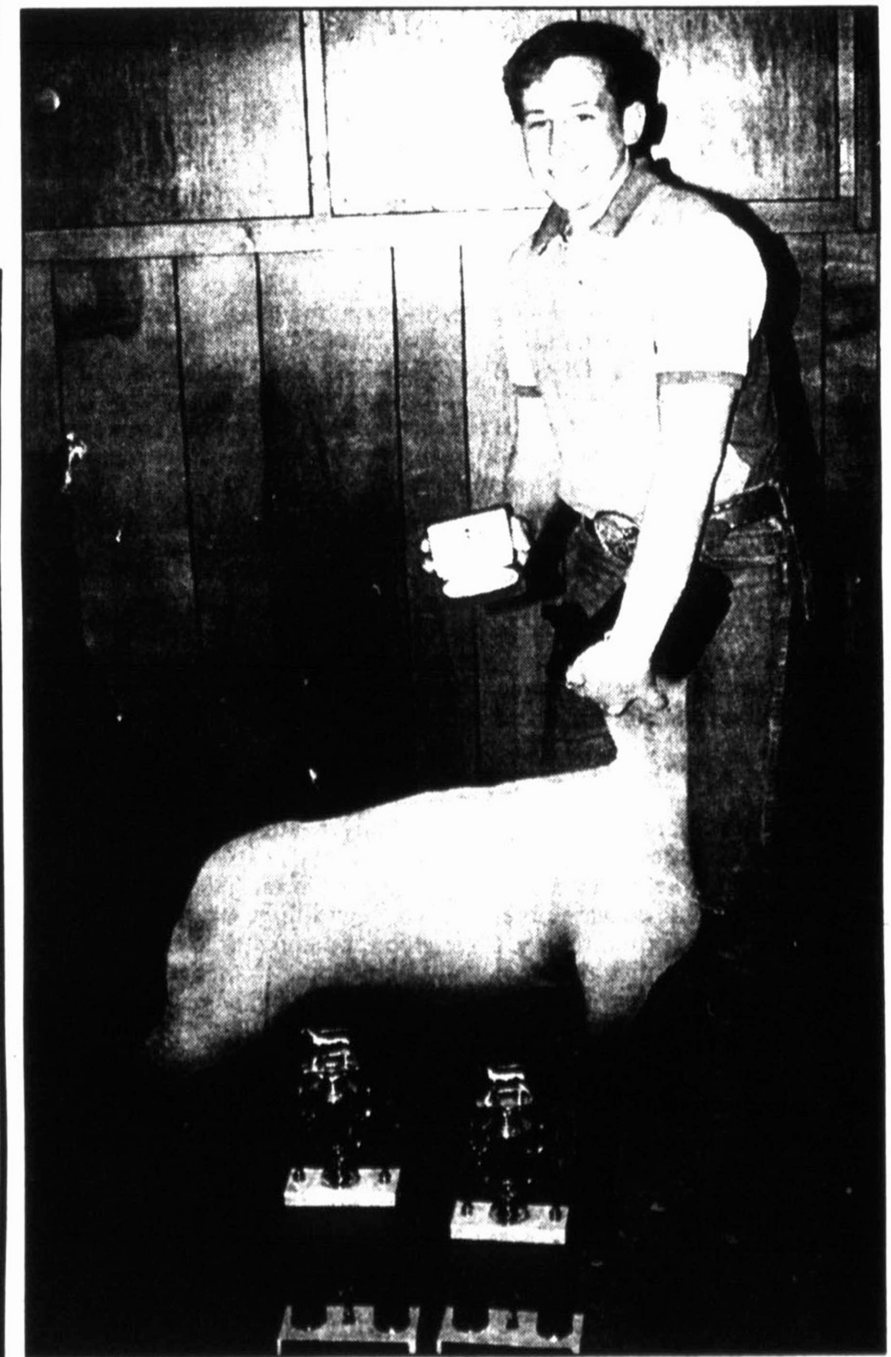
Scobee's fondest memories of his father involve football. As often as they could, father and son played football in the back yard of the family's Houston home. The elder Scobee had played end for Auburn High School in Washington state.

"Watching football with my dad was some of the best things we did, the best parts of my life."

Those good times - not the tragedy - will be on Scobee's mind and in his heart when he takes off Sunday from Luke Air Force Base near Phoenix for Sun Devil Stadium and when he returns to the stadium to join his mother and sister in the stands. He won't say whether he'll be cheering for the Pittsburgh Steelers or the Dallas Cowboys.

As he does every time he flies, Scobee will take along a long-ago present from his father. He won't say what it is, except that "it's smaller than a large stuffed elephant" - and that it's a bond between two pilots, between a loving father and son.

## Financial aid workshop Tuesday

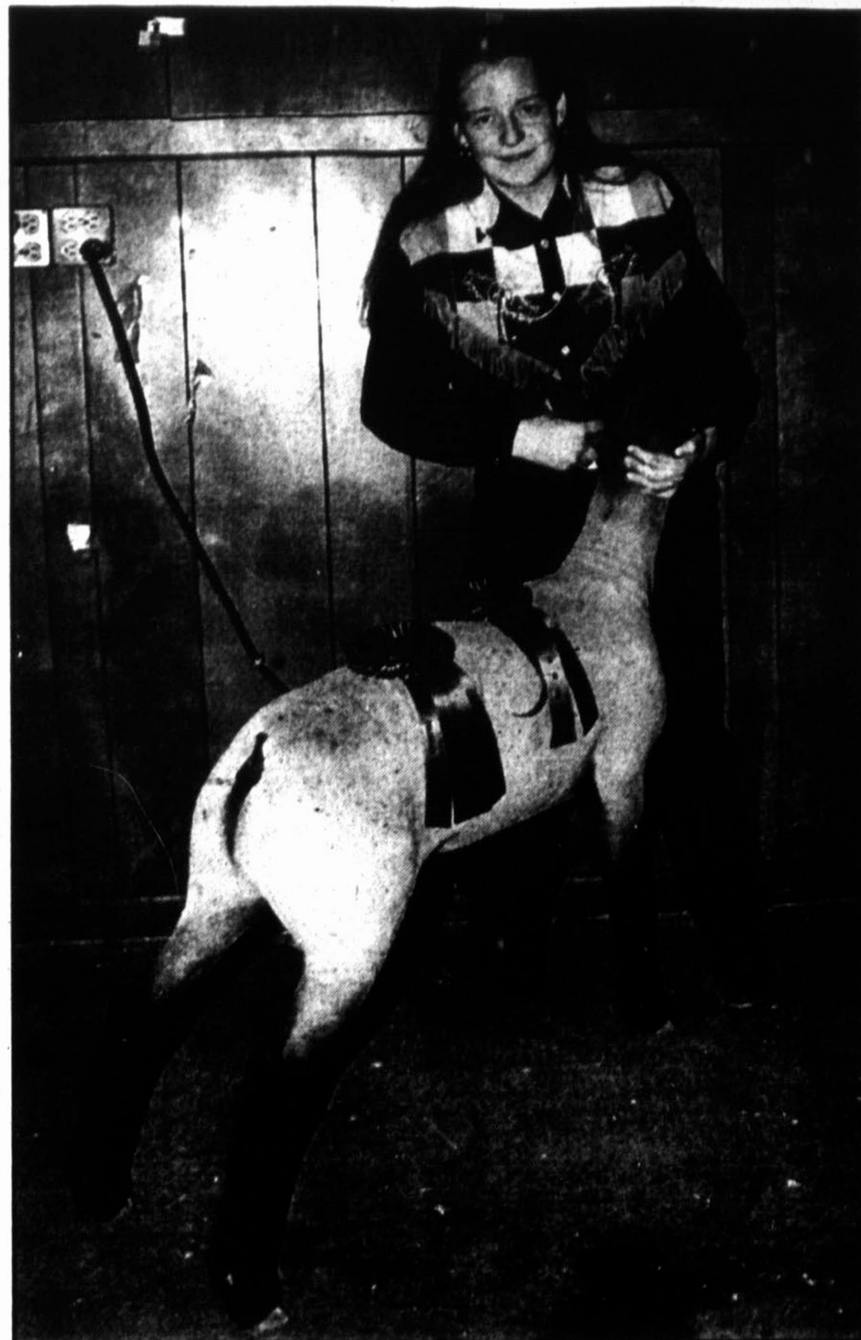

# Spending battle changes seen in new interim bill

WASHINGTON (AP) - Easy enactment of a bill averting a third federal shutdown underlines how the budget battle is evolving from a legislative fight into a chief theme of the 1996 political campaign.

The Senate sent the legislation, effective through March 15, to the White House by a 82-8 vote late Friday. President Clinton signed it three hours before the midnight expiration of another stopgap spending bill, known as a continuing resolution.

Clinton said he appreciated Congress' "bipartisan approach toward this bill" and urged the House and Senate to quickly pass several pending money bills so that the prospect of a shutdown does not arise again this year.

"Governing by continuing resolution is not the appropriate way for the Congress to perform its work," he said.

Today, in his weekly radio address, the president renewed that request and coupled it with an appeal to Congress to quickly pass legislation raising the federal debt ceiling, a step needed if the government is to continue to pay its bills and the interest on its loans.

He accused the Republican majority on Capitol Hill of using the spectre of default as a weapon to force him to yield his principles in budget negotiations.

If Congress fails to act, "our unbroken record of keeping our word could end," Clinton said, adding that interest rates could go up and that Social Security checks would fail to reach the retired people who need them.

"So Congress should act responsibly and stop playing politics with America's good name," he said.

But Republicans continued a long barrage of criticism of the president's style and policies, casting doubt on his sincerity in seeking a balanced budget.

"What he says today is not what he said yesterday or will probably say tomorrow," said Sen. Judd Gregg, R-N.H., in the Republican radio response.

"It is hard to know what he really means, what direction he is really going in," Gregg said.

"His sincerity about working together to fulfill our goals is too often fleeting with no action to back up his words," he said.

The Senate vote capped a week that saw Republicans back off from their year-long effort to wrest a seven-year balanced-budget deal out of Clinton, using one showdown after another.

The legislation, which the House had approved Thursday, 371-42, finances a wide assortment of government agencies for the next nine weeks. Without it, only pieces of agencies ranging from the Labor Department to NASA would have been working beginning today.

Neither side was eager for headlines announcing a new round of furloughed workers and shuttered offices. But Republicans were particularly happy to avoid another shutdown - they were widely blamed for the first two, which beginning in November ran a total of 27 days and saw hundreds of thousands of civil servants idled.

"You're flirting with real danger," Senate Majority Whip Trent Lott, R-Miss., warned Democrats trying to alter the legislation, thus delaying its passage.

But Republicans are still embracing the goal of a balanced budget in seven years and plan to make it a top plank in their election campaign this year.

House Majority Leader Dick Armey, R-Texas, gave a hint of that Friday in Baltimore, where he was attending a meeting of House Republican freshmen.

Armey said that after the November elections, "we will have more of us in the House, more of us in the Senate and one of us in the White House, and you're going to see this done."

Since autumn, Republicans had refused to keep government's most basic services running without concessions from the president toward a budget-balancing plan. But this week, they abandoned that strategy on bills financing federal agencies and extending the government's \$4.9 trillion borrowing limit, which has been frozen since November.

Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., sought to assure financial markets Friday that Republicans would reach agreement with Clinton over extending the government's debt limit and avoiding a first-ever federal default. "We believe we can resolve this," Dole said.

Disagreements on timing remain. GOP leaders want to work on the debt ceiling legislation in late February, shortly before the March 1 date on which Treasury Secretary Robert Rubin says a default will otherwise occur.

The measure averting a shutdown keeps nine departments - including Commerce, Justice and Health and Human Services - and about three dozen other agencies functioning through March 15, though with less than most programs received in 1995.

# Police respond to shooting at du Pont estate

NEWTOWN SQUARE, Pa. (AP) - Police sharpshooters on Saturday kept a wary distance from a gun-loving heir to the du Pont fortune, believing he is heavily armed in his mansion after the fatal shooting of an Olympic wrestling champion.

John E. du Pont barricaded himself in his second-floor bedroom and broke off negotiations with police soon after Friday's shooting. Police spoke to him by telephone this morning and later took an unidentified man, possibly a wrestling coach, to the house in hopes of coaxing du Pont to surrender.

"We do not know what motivated Mr. du Pont to do what he did," said

Newtown Township Police Chief Michael Mallon. "We intend to take as long as it takes to resolve this problem without any other people being injured."

"John du Pont is a marksman and he has an arsenal," added police Sgt. Brian McNeill. "We don't know how many guns or how much ammunition he has."

David Schultz, 36, a wrestler who won an Olympic gold medal in 1984 and was training on du Pont's property for the Atlanta Games, died at a hospital after being shot in the chest and arm with a .38-caliber revolver.

Mallon said the shooting took

place in the driveway of the home on the estate where Schultz lived with his wife, Nancy, and two children. Du Pont then drove back to his mansion, about a mile away, and barricaded himself inside.

One of three du Pont employees in the mansion acted as an intermediary at first, talking with police by cellular phone, but they left a few hours later and du Pont refused to take any further calls.

Communications were further stymied by the fact that du Pont did not have phone lines on his property repaired after they were destroyed by two separate fires on his estate in October.

\$200-billion deficits as far as the eye could see, Clinton signed on to the Republican idea of a balanced budget and eventually agreed to a seven-year timetable, with the savings measured by the GOP-preferred Congressional Budget Office.

At the same time, Clinton scored points against Republicans by painting them as threats to Medicare and Medicaid, education and the environment.

"It seems to be working," political scientist Hargrove said of Clinton's strategy.

"Strong liberals may feel that he's caved too much," Hargrove said. "That would be a misperception of the task, which is that he's got to appeal to the center if he's going to outflank the Republicans. A winner has to hit the middle. I think he's doing it."

Phone company workers had wired makeshift phone lines to the mansion by midnight, and McNeill said police established phone contact with du Pont early this morning.

About 40 police marksmen had the mansion surrounded and a command center was set up a mile away. It was familiar territory for some; officers had once used a shooting range at the estate for target practice, and du Pont had been an honorary police force member in the 1970s.

Du Pont, 57, is a great-great grandson of E.I. du Pont, the French-born industrialist who founded the chemical company. He is one of hundreds of heirs to the family fortune.

Neighbors around his 800-acre estate in this Philadelphia suburb said he had a history of behaving erratically, once driving two new Lincoln Continentals into a pond on his property, one after the other.

"He has a bad reputation for being off the wall," said Carla White, 36, who lives a half-mile away.

"He's an interesting fella," said Michael Piroff, whose house is across the street. "He'd stroll around in his bathrobe. I wasn't surprised (by the shooting). He just seemed very eccentric."

A former wrestler who also trained on the estate, Dan Chaid, told The Philadelphia Daily News he saw evidence of du Pont's erratic behavior in October. Chaid said du Pont was often addled on alcohol and cocaine and had taken to walking around his estate armed with a machine gun.

scientist Erwin Hargrove mused about the uncertainties facing Mrs. Clinton. "If she were indicted by a grand jury, that would be incredible. It would be bizarre, extraordinary. I don't know how the political system would cope with that."

Moreover, after a roller-coaster series of victories and defeats throughout his presidency, Clinton raised \$26 million last year for his re-election campaign and scared off any Democratic challenge.

Now, with the start of the presidential election year, the president holds a double-digit lead over the front-runner for the GOP nomination, Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole.

After back-to-back speeches by Clinton and Dole on State of the Union night Tuesday, Republican strategists fretted that Dole looked old and weak in comparison.

Over the last year, Clinton has undergone a huge political transformation, retreating under Republican pressure time and time again.

The young showmen were assisted in the ring by show volunteers and older exhibitors.

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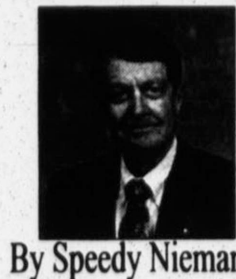
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# Hereford Bull

That feller on Tierra Blanca Creek says if you find a person who takes responsibility on his shoulders, you're not likely to find a chip there.

It's hard to believe there was a time when clothing and music were handed down to the next generation.

Congratulations to the Hereford Young Farmers on another successful Junior Livestock Show! A lot of work and time goes into staging such an event. Many young farmers and parents are working behind the scenes to make it happen. Congratulations also go to all the youngsters who participate in the 4-H and FFA projects.

One of the major topics of conversation around the community this week was whether or not the HISD school board wanted Supt. Charles Greenawalt to resign his post. The controversy caught us by surprise, since there had been no discussion about the issue in open meetings.

We first heard something might be developing last week when teachers and supporters of the superintendent started passing the word that the board might not extend Greenawalt's contract. Those backing the superintendent then started urging people to attend this week's school board meeting and express their opinions.

As reported at Tuesday's board session, Jim Marsh, board president, said the trustees had not taken action on Greenawalt's contract. However, Greenawalt's attorney said the response was a matter of "playing semantics" with the public. He said Marsh--indicating he represented a majority of the board--had asked for Greenawalt's resignation.

As we've stated before, we may not agree with all they do but we respect anyone who serves on a non-paying local governmental board or commission. It's usually a thankless task which requires a lot of volunteer hours--if you do the job right.

In our many years of reporting on board meetings, we've learned that some candidates believe in the state's open meeting laws until they take

office, then take it upon themselves to decide what is best for the public to know about certain issues.

And our experience has shown that people will usually support a board's decision--on most issues--when the board presents all the facts and justifies the action. But when a board tries to rush something through or "not lay all the cards on the table"--even with honest intent--it arouses voters' suspicions and erodes the board's credibility.

At this point, it seems to me that patrons of the school district have not been presented sufficient facts to determine how they feel about this controversial issue.

While on the subject of education, there's a story making the rounds about a guy who decided teachers are making too much money for what he considers a babysitting job. Here's how he thought out the plan to change the system:

"What we need here is a little perspective. If I had my way, I'd pay them babysitting wages. That's right, instead of paying these outrageous taxes, each parent could give them \$3 out of their own pocket.

"And I'm only going to pay them for five hours, no coffee breaks. That would be \$15 a day for each parent to pay teachers to babysit their child. Even if they have more than one child, that's still a lot cheaper than private daycare.

"Now, how many children do they teach a day, maybe 20? That's \$15x20=\$300 a day. But remember, they only work 180 days a year, so \$300x180=\$54,000. (Just a minute, I think my calculator needs batteries!)

"I know, now, you teachers will ask about those who have 10 years experience and a master's degree? Well, maybe to be fair, they could get the minimum wage, or round it off to \$5 a hour. Let's see, \$5 times five hours, times 20 children. That's \$500 a day times 180 days, equals \$90,000...Huh??

"Wait a minute, let's get a little perspective here. Babysitting wages are too good for these teachers. Anyone seen a salary guide around here?"

## Cockleburrs and Devil's Claws

Computer literacy has swept across the country, indeed the world, leaving behind those of us who resist change at every opportunity.

It's not that we want to be illiterate. It's that we simply don't have the mental faculties to absorb the intricacies of computers and, especially, the changes in the language they have wrought.

Now, you may wonder, how am I writing this? On a computer, of course.

But, it's so basic that I only have to know a few things and if I forget, the young man sitting at the adjoining desk is very forgiving of my forgetfulness.

There are a couple other computers in the office that I toil on frequently. I know how to do simple things. That's all.

Don't think I glory in my computer illiteracy. I don't. I just have a problem remembering all the little nuances. When I'm told what to do, the instructor often gives directions at such a speed that I can't write down what I need.

Or, in some cases, the teacher simply performs the function and with such haste I couldn't catch on.

This is in no way a reflection on the instructional habits of my co-workers. Rather, it speaks to the clogged computer corridors in my brain.

Oh, I know that men and women of more advanced years than I have mastered the electronic demon, but so far it has eluded me. There's every chance, of course, that I've established a mental block.

Since my childhood years in the Depression, the developments in the electronic era are mind-boggling.

A few examples: Listening to the radio was a far cry from today's color television picture that comes into a home by cable or satellite.

Or, what about the old-fashioned calculator that required strong finger action and a steady grip pulling the handle after every set of numbers was entered? Now, nearly everyone carries a small calculator in a purse or shirt pocket. Sometimes, the sun provides the power, but it could be a battery.

Then there was the phonograph on

which we stacked half a dozen records (first a speed of 78 rpm, then 45 rpm and, finally, 33 rpm) and sat back for a few minutes of easy listening. The audio tape came along, and now the compact disc offers a sound that once could have been heard only in a concert hall.

The first telephone I remember hung on the wall of my grandparents' home. To get the operator, a quick crank produced, "Number, please." These days, women carry cellular phones in their purses and men hook them onto their belts.

But, the most pervasive electronic gear in our society is the computer.

Think about it. Something goes wrong with a car. The service technician goes into some mumbo-jumbo about the computer. A payment is not credited to the proper account. The computer took a nosedive and some information was lost, claims the company.

That old "the check is in the mail" excuse can't hold a candle to "the computer was down."

When all this computer business started, we were told that the new wizardry would save companies money because fewer employees would be needed. Maybe that happened, but the savings went into more equipment, I'll wager.

On the plus side, the government saves money by making electronic transfers of payments such as Social Security benefits and income tax refunds. We're told this modern technology is safer and surer than the old methods.

None of these accomplishments can make me feel good, though, when I see my five-year-old grandsons or seven-year-old granddaughter sitting at the computer with a sophistication I simply can't muster.

At present, only my two-year-old granddaughter is in my league. I expect that to change any day.

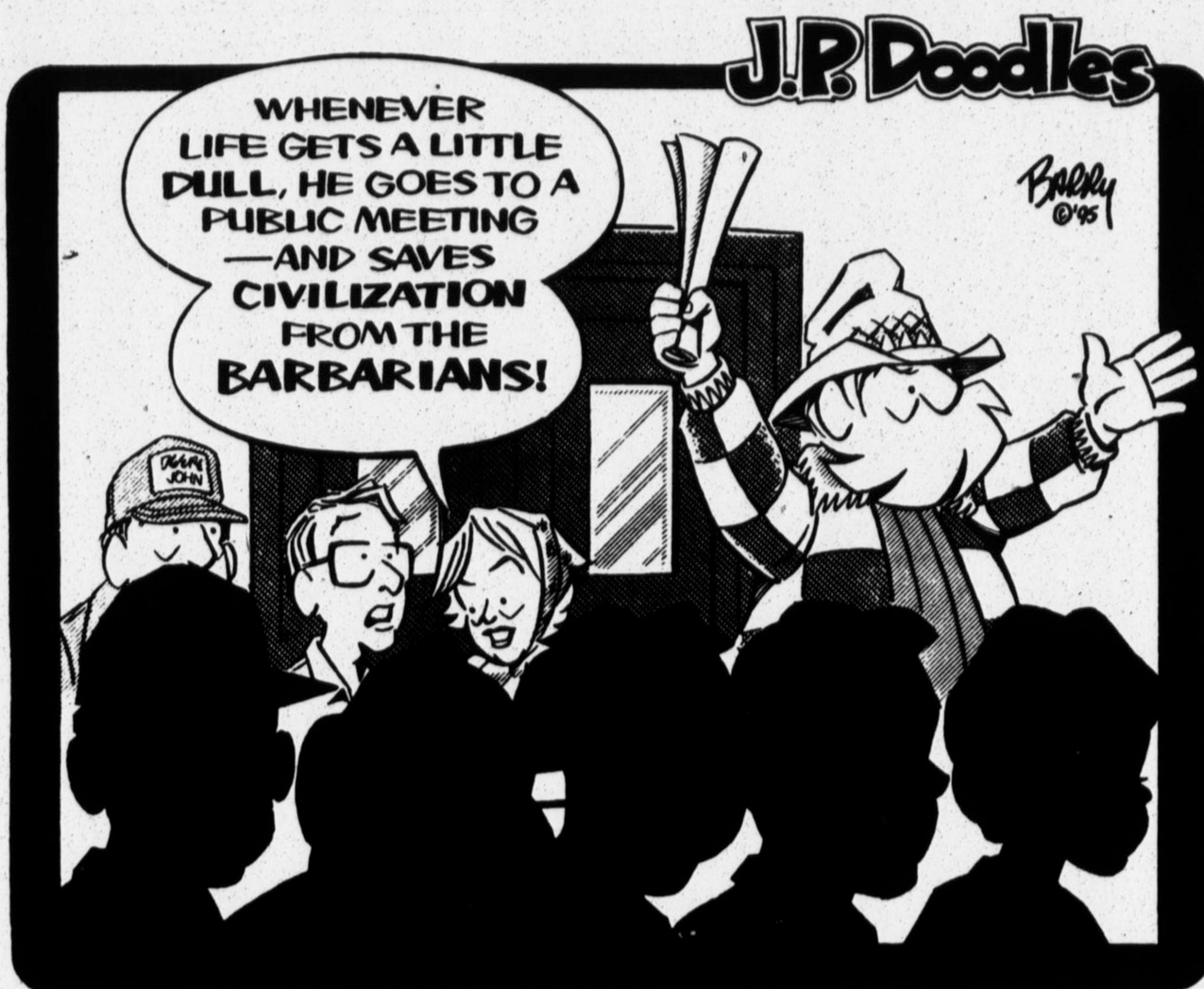

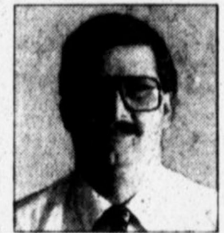

## Just what the heck IS a 'dollar'?

While reading news accounts the other day about the continuing (and probably never-ending) budget tussle on Capitol Hill, a thought crossed my mind.

If the country doesn't have a budget (much less a balanced one) and we are umpteen trillion dollars in debt, then what good is our money?

And at the same time, what good is the federal "guarantee" on our banks and financial institutions.

At least then there was a physical commodity on hand to back up your

"dollar" in case you needed to.

But now, all that we have to count on is the promise of a government that has allowed itself to go billions and billions of dollars in the red.

And all that leads to one more question.

What the heck is the "full faith and credit" of the United States government?

I mean, after all, if my personal debt is out of whack with the perceived level I can afford, my bank doesn't have faith in me and doesn't extend me any credit.

But the government is more than a TRILLION dollars in the red and

they expect us to have faith in their credit!

And what's more, the level of debt continues to increase every day, so that credit is getting worse and worse and worse.

Do you know what a trillion dollars looks like? Written out, it's like this -- \$1,000,000,000,000. That's a whole HECK of a lot of money!

(Think of it this way. If you spent \$1,000 a day, it would take you 1,000 days to spend a million dollars. At the same rate, it would take 1,000,000 days, or just over 2,739 years, to spend a billion dollars. Thus, it would take one billion days to spend a trillion dollars!)

One last thought. The government says we are in debt. But to whom do we owe the money? Ourselves? Our children and grandchildren? A bank somewhere in England (you know, the one that financed the Pilgrims)?

I don't know about you, but all this talk about money makes my head hurt. I think I'll change a dollar bill and go buy something to drink!

**The Monitor (McAllen) on changing faces in Washington:** America's political world has been set on its ear by what some say is an unprecedented exodus of longtime lawmakers from Congress.

Some of Washington's biggest names have announced their political retirements in recent months. In the Senate, such notable figures as Bill Bradley of New Jersey, Alan Simpson of Wyoming, Nancy Kassebaum and Maine's William Cohen have chosen not to run for re-election.

In the House, the Rio Grande Valley's own political institution - Kika de la Garza - has announced his plans to leave Congress after three decades in office. In all, 34 House members have announced their retirement plans. In the Senate, 13 senators have chosen not to run for re-election. ...

The Great Congressional Pullout of 1996 has some political pundits stopping just short of predicting doom and gloom for our government. They contend that we need experienced legislators to get things done. New member of Congress, they say, spend their first few years learning the system and making key contacts.

But should we fret so much over fewer than 50 departures? Think about it. The Senate has 100 members; only 13 incumbents are leaving, and that's the highest number of vacancies in U.S. history. ...

Besides, our government is supposed to be a representative democracy. Members of Congress are presumed to be chosen from the population as simply a peer of those he or she represents. Therefore, service shouldn't change a person so much that we would presume that an incumbent would be significantly different from a new member.

That is the very argument term limit proponents make. Limiting the time of service, they say, would lessen the influence lobbyists have on long-term members. Changing 10 percent to 15 percent of a congressional body might not bring significant change. But it could give us a preview of the kind of effect term limits could bring.

Under restricted terms, up to a third of the membership could change in a given election year. This year's turnover, which is less than half that, could help concerned voters see that changing the body probably won't adversely change our government.

But many cuts which require sacrifice will not come until after the year 2000.

The Blue Dog budget's fiscal honesty stands out elsewhere, too. For instance, it boldly deals with Medicare. If left unchecked, that entitlement program's growth rates could imperil future generations.

Specifically, the Blue Dog budget reduces Medicare's growth by nearly \$170 billion over seven years. The president's budget proposes far less reduction in Medicare's growth. "I don't consider the president's budget real," Tsongas says. "It does nothing substantial about entitlements."

The Blue Dog budget also does not pander to voters with offers of new tax cuts. True, middle-class families need economic relief. But they know their children are first owed a reduced deficit. Then tax cuts become a legitimate reward.

The Concord-Tsongas point is well taken. Republicans may not like abandoning tax cuts. Democrats may not like greater entitlement reductions. But the budget debate must get off center. Speaker Gingrich should call a House vote on the Blue Dog budget. Let's see who's willing, or not willing, to embrace a reasonable plan.

**The Dallas Morning News on blue dogs:**

Listen to Concord Coalition leader Paul Tsongas. He's correct in saying that House moderate-conservative Democrats, who operate under the clever "Blue Dogs" title, have put an honest budget on the table. So why not schedule a vote on it, Tsongas asks. Why not see who's willing to oppose a plan that balances the budget in seven years and starts controlling entitlement spending?

The former Democratic senator elaborated upon the conservative Democratic budget in an interview the other day with The Dallas Morning News editorial page.

What's striking about the Blue Dog budget, he notes, is that it "front-loads" most budget cuts. Real reductions in spending growth actually occur at the beginning, not the end, of the seven-year plan.

By contrast, budgets offered by both President Clinton and congressional Republicans postpone most budget cuts until the sixth or seventh year. Tsongas chuckles in noting that each of those plans puts "the goodies" in at their beginning.

For instance, tax credits that both the president and congressional Republicans offer families with children would be received immediately.

The article from Missouri said some residents of the state are working for repeal of the proposal there, and indicated that some of the Missouri state senators and representatives did not realize the potential seriousness of their vote.

Has this proposal been introduced in our Texas state legislature? How many states in addition to Missouri have approved the plan?

## Man leaves fortune to pay on national debt

HOLLYWOOD, Fla. (AP) - Wallace Magnani lived so frugally he refused to fix the plumbing in his majestic 70-year-old home and wore tattered, grubby clothes.

But he was magnanimous in death, leaving \$500,000 - the bulk of his estate - to help reduce the federal debt.

"He felt the federal government saved his life during the Depression when he was in need," said Robert J. Owen, Magnani's executor. "He wanted to give something back."

With the national debt already around \$4.9 trillion, Magnani's gift won't go far. But it's nice anyway, said Pete Hollenbach, spokesman for the federal Bureau of Public Debt.

"It isn't the size of the gift that matters," he said.

Living Americans have donated \$53 million to help reduce the national debt since 1961, Hollenbach said. Fewer than a dozen have put Uncle Sam in their will.

Many, like Magnani, are Depression survivors or immigrants who want to repay their country, Hollenbach said.

Magnani, who died in October at age 88, was the son of an Italian-American violinist and grew up in New York. He was the valedictorian of the 1926 graduating class at Flushing High School.

By the time he graduated in 1930 with a piano degree from what is now The Juilliard School, Magnani was so broke he couldn't pay his final \$40 tuition bill, the school said. He repaid the debt in 1977 - \$290 plus interest, he calculated - and sent the school a thank-you note.

## Sharp tells of gambling deacon

SULPHUR SPRINGS, Texas (AP) - State Comptroller John Sharp has a hard-luck story to tell about the state lottery.

He knows it's a bit hard to believe, so in telling it to the 70th annual Hopkins County Chamber of Commerce membership banquet, Sharp repeatedly swore that it's a true story.

The saga dates back to the first few months of the state lottery, a time when Sharp's office was in charge of the games.

One day, a close friend came sneaking in the back door of Sharp's office. He brought with him a winning scratch-off ticket worth \$2,500.

All the friend wanted was his money. He figured he could get it quietly with not much made of his profit.

"I took great pride in telling him we couldn't do that, because, first of all, it wasn't every day that a deacon of a church came in with a \$2,500 ticket," Sharp said as he opened up his keynote address Thursday.

Sharp also warned his pal that any winner of more than \$600 would become part of the public record. And he informed him that a noted religious official in the Austin area had asked for a list of the people who'd won money in the lottery every 30 days.

So Sharp proposed that his friend, who was an Austin attorney as well as a deacon, could legally find someone else to cash the ticket.

If his friend paid a surrogate around \$100, he could keep the rest as long as he told the Internal Revenue Service of his good fortune, Sharp said.

Happy to have a way to get his money, the lawyer convinced a fresh-out-of-college law clerk from his office to do the deed.

Then the lawyer, the clerk and Sharp drove together to the claim center to cash in the ticket.

"We hid behind the bushes while she went in," Sharp said.

And they waited. Forty-two minutes later, the young clerk came back. Her hair was disheveled, her face had turned red

and she was "mad as a wet hen," Sharp said.

"She said, 'They took our money,'" Sharp said.

How could they do that? they

asked.

"Well, it seems I had a bad student loan from my last year at the university ...," Sharp quoted the clerk as saying.

And with that, Sharp's deacon-lawyer friend had learned a lesson.

"He took that as a sign," a grinning Sharp said, "and doesn't play the lottery any more."

## Herd holds off Canyon, moves back into 2nd Top-ranked Lady Eagles prove too much for Lady Whitefaces

The Hereford boys' basketball team held off the persistent Canyon boys for a 56-44 win Friday in Whiteface Gym.

The win, combined with Pampa's 85-58 win over Randall, vaulted the Herd back into a second-place tie with Randall in District 1-4A. Both are 5-2, while Pampa is 7-0. Hereford improved to 16-9 overall.

Canyon fell to 11-12, 3-4 in district.

In the first game of Friday's district doubleheader, Canyon's No. 1-ranked and undefeated Lady Eagles showed why they are that way. They put on a 68-32 clinic against Hereford.

Unlike in the boys' first meeting - a 60-43 win for Hereford on Jan. 2 - the boys' game was close nearly all the way.

Hereford took a small lead in the

first quarter and led 15-10 at the end of the period. Canyon tied it at 15-15 midway through the second, but Hereford pushed the lead back to 29-23 at halftime.

"We were just a little off defensively all night," Herd coach Randy Dean said. "In the first half, we were off-balance because we were lunging at the ball and not following our rules for playing screens. It seemed like Canyon capitalized every time."

Hereford opened the second half with seven straight points on layups by Isaac Walker and Michael High and a three-point shot by Johnathan Keenan. Canyon didn't go away, scoring back-to-back baskets twice, then completing a three-point play to close to within 41-34 at the end of the quarter.

"We had a chance to put them away in the third quarter, but we didn't get it done - again because of little breakdowns," Dean said. "Little breakdowns on defense gave them the opportunity to get back in the game."

Canyon threatened twice in the fourth quarter, but Hereford was able to respond. The Eagles opened the final period with a 7-3 spurt to pull within 44-41, but Hereford's High got the ball low, and went up strong for a layup. Moments later, he tipped in a Walker miss for a 48-41 Herd lead.

"That was a play we'd been trying to run for quite some time," Dean said

of the first of High's back-to-back baskets. "It had come open two or three other times, but we didn't get him the ball. We finally got it to him, and he got the layup and the foul." (High missed the foul shot).

"It was a big basket to stop the momentum and get us back on track," Dean said.

Canyon had a three-point possession - a free throw, then a putback basket when the second free throw was missed - to pull within 48-44 with less than two minutes left.

Again Hereford responded. High hit a layup, then Walker went 4-for-4 at the free throw line to ice the game.

"Our experienced guys played real well down the stretch, and that would be referring to Isaac and Michael," Dean said. "All of them hung together real well. When the game got close we had a chance to lose our mental focus, but we showed a lot of composure. We did the right things down the stretch to win the game."

In the girls' game Canyon put together two 6-0 runs in the first quarter and led 15-5 at the end of the quarter. Canyon stretched the lead to 34-16 at halftime, then a 12-0 run in the third quarter made the rout official.

The 24-0 Lady Eagles that crushed their competition all year long.

"This is more than one coach's opinion: that this is the best basketball team a lot of coaches have ever

seen," Hereford coach Eddie Fortenberry said. "I talked to a lot of coaches and they feel the same way. Many of them say this is the best basketball team they've ever played."

Hereford would have needed a perfect game to beat Canyon, but it wasn't to be. Turnovers hurt Hereford, and Canyon didn't leave any room for error.

"They frustrate you so much because they don't make mistakes," Fortenberry said. "They execute extremely well on offense and there's no breakdowns on defense. And it doesn't help you when you put Canyon in the one-and-one (free throws) as early as we did."

Actually, Canyon didn't shoot free throws very well, but they shot a lot of them, hitting 23-35 in the game. Hereford hit 9-of-20.

The Hereford girls were playing without Mindi Davis, a first-team all-district selection last season. Davis broke her hand in warmups before the Randall game Tuesday, then played Tuesday without knowing it was broken. The senior will miss the remaining three games in the season.

The Hereford girls' basketball program was seeking its first playoff appearance, but two perennial powers - Canyon and Randall - in the same district proved too much to overcome. Friday's loss officially eliminated Hereford from playoff contention.

Hereford's non-district record is 14-1. The one loss came against Nazareth, the No. 1 ranked team in Class A.

(The rankings given in this story are those released by the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches. The Hereford girls were reportedly ranked 18th in Class 4A recently, but the weekly polls the Brand receives through the Associated Press include only the top 10 in each class.)

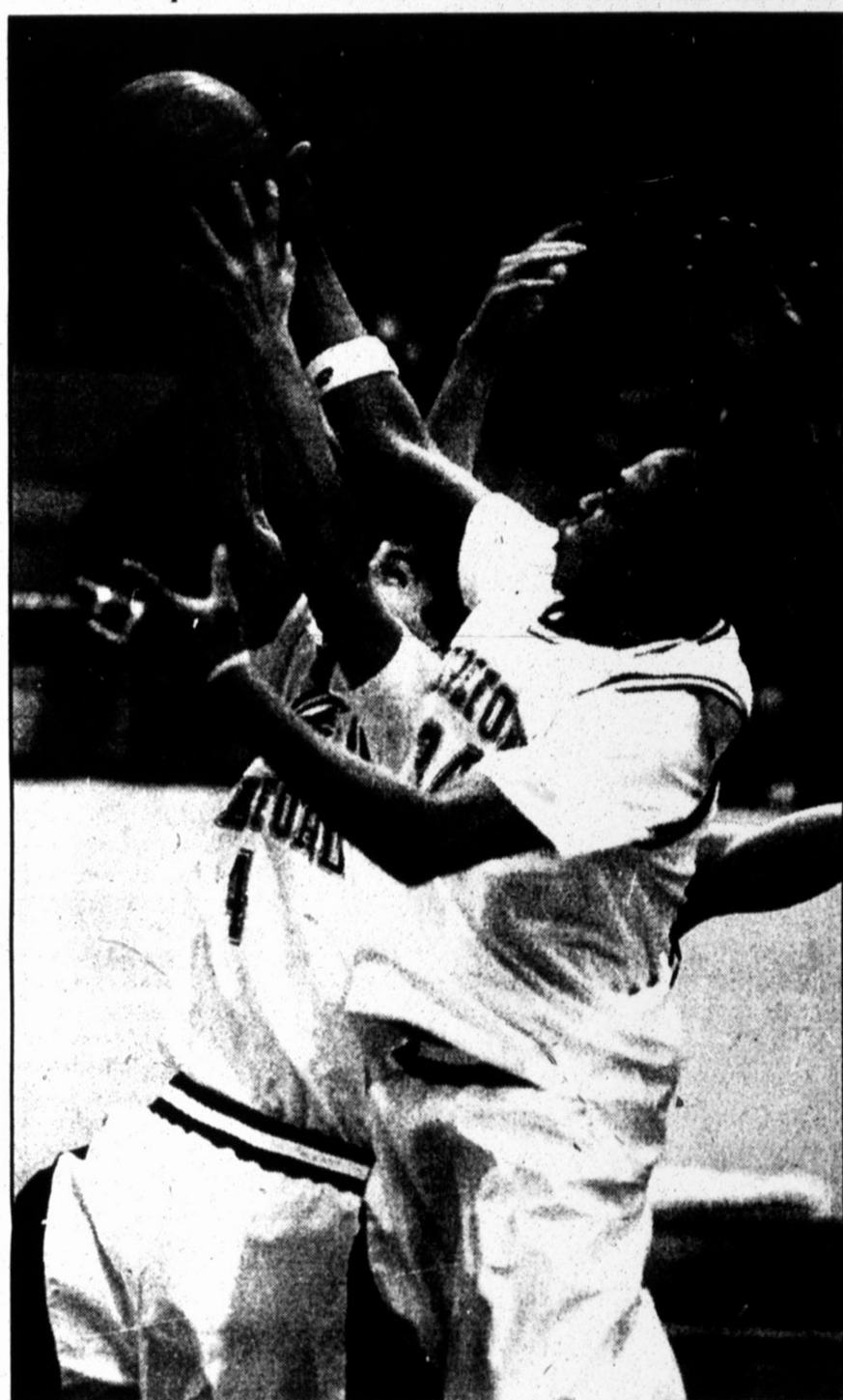

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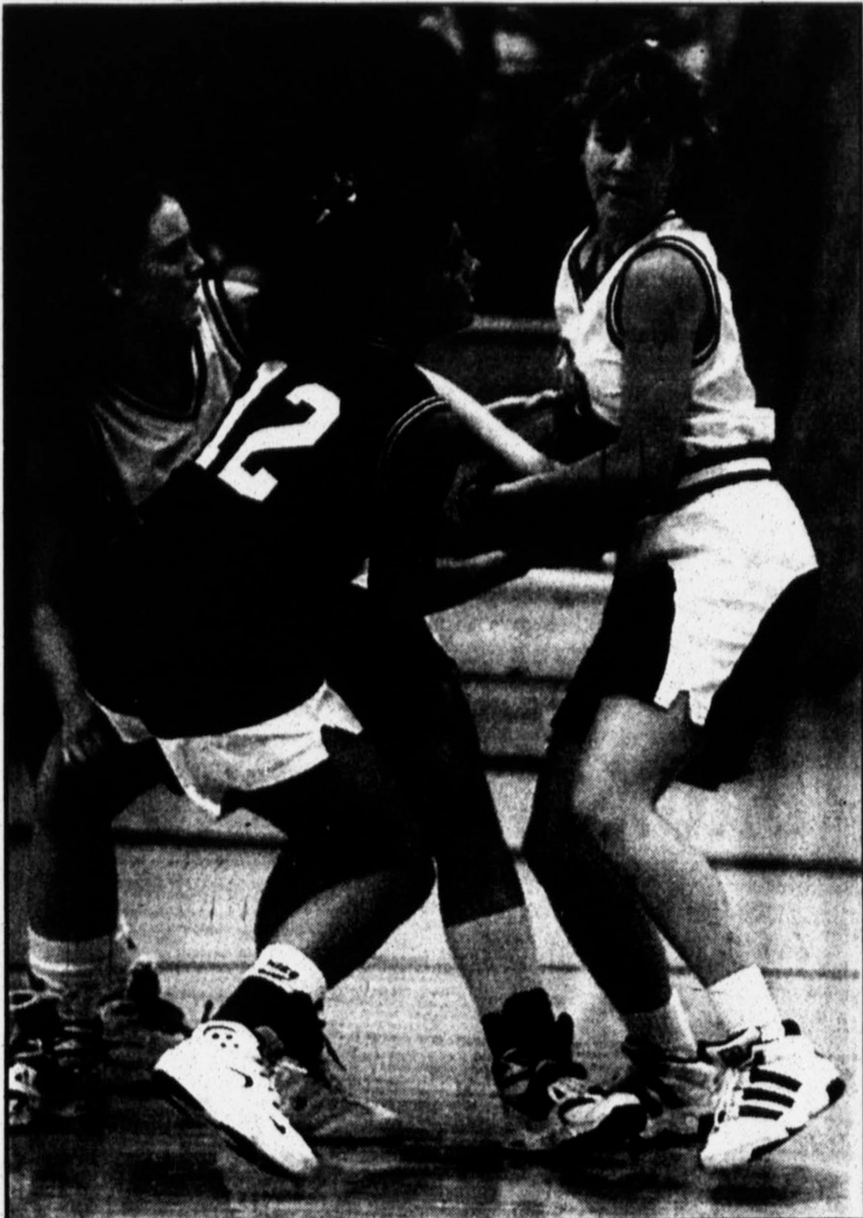

## Seles captures fourth Australian Open title

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) - A new series of injuries and a few dangerous moments couldn't stop Monica Seles from keeping her record perfect at the Australian Open.

With a 6-4, 6-1 victory over Anke Huber today, she has her fourth Australian title in four tries and a 28-0 match record.

Afterward, giggles turned to tears as questions about playing in Germany again brought back the shock of the stabbing there that kept her off the tennis circuit for 2 1/2 years.

"Don't take pictures of this," she said, pulling a hat down over her face. Then she broke off her news conference and walked out, leaving her trophy behind.

The Australian Open was the last Grand Slam tournament Seles won before the April 30, 1993 stabbing by a deranged fan of her main rival, Steffi Graf.

Winning it on her first trip back "has been very emotional for me," she said. "Standing up and holding that trophy I held in '93, I thought I was going to hold in '94, not being able to do that in '95 and now in '96, again holding it, it's very special."

Winning her ninth Grand Slam title, worth \$380,000, wasn't easy. In her semifinal here, 19-year-old American Chanda Rubin pushed her around for much of the match and was two points away from beating her before Seles pulled out a 6-7 (7-2), 6-1, 7-5 victory, calling herself "very lucky."

In the final, the eighth-seeded Huber scored the first service break and led 3-2. But then on her own serve, Huber had nine game points to build her lead to 4-2 and couldn't do it against Seles' powerful strokes.

With a 4-2 lead, Huber said, "maybe everything goes a different way, but I was just a little bit unlucky. ... I think it doesn't happen too often that I play that well and lose the set."

She ended up losing her seventh straight match to Seles.

"After I got the break, she just was hitting everything harder than before, playing even more aggressive than before, and just had a bit more confidence," said Huber, a 21-year-old German playing in her first Grand Slam final.

Seles, who won that 14-minute game on her third break point, said, "I was thinking toward the end that it was probably the longest game I have ever played. That's not a good thought while you are playing the game."

She added: "I knew that if I shouldn't break Anke there, I'm going to be in deep, deep trouble."

Seles won that game by pounding shots to Huber's forehand and watching her miss as she tried desperately for a winner.

Seles started the Open with a groin muscle injury suffered in a warmup tournament, later strained a tendon above the ankle and - before her semifinal with Rubin - strained a shoulder muscle lifting weights.

"My shoulder scared me so much," she said, and she has learned her lesson about weightlifting.

"I haven't been able to serve the last 4 1/2, 5 days at all in practice. I maybe had one or two free points on my serve, and against someone like Anke and Chanda, that's not the best you want to have," she added.

On the strength of her record before the stabbing, Seles has been awarded a co-No. 1 ranking with Steffi Graf, who missed this Australian Open because of bone surgery on her foot.

Seles said she would have liked to have Graf here, but "Steffi played a lot of Grand Slams when I wasn't there."

Graf won six of her 18 Grand Slam titles while Seles was recovering from her stabbing. Then they met in the final of last year's U.S. Open, and Graf beat her in three sets.

"I think right now Steffi is the best," Seles said. But, she added, "I think we'll play a lot in the future."

She also said she has no plans to play any tournaments in Germany.

Noting that her attacker never was jailed, she said, "I think that's very hard to go back and feel safe again."

She broke down after being asked whether returning to Germany would compete her recovery.

Earlier, Seles said that "a lot has happened that will never be erased. It's great to be back. It's really good to win a Grand Slam. At the (U.S.) Open, I came very close and it's really good to know that I can still do it."

Between the U.S. Open and coming to Australia, the 22-year-old Seles was out with knee and ankle injuries and a virus.

In the final's first set, Huber "was playing some amazing tennis. ... She's going to be in the finals of many more Grand Slams," Seles said.

Huber's angled blasts frequently forced Seles to abandon her usual two-handed shots to stretch wide with one hand.

Huber, whose best previous Grand Slam performance was reaching the semifinals of the 1993 French Open, called this tournament a great success.

"I think it gave me a lot of confidence again and just maybe I can get to the next Grand Slam also," she said.

On Sunday, another German, Boris Becker plays Michael Chang for the men's singles title.

## Magic Johnson may come back to Lakers

PHOENIX (AP) - As talk spreads of Magic Johnson returning to the Los Angeles Lakers, he paints himself as a man still undecided.

Since retiring for the second time in 1992, Johnson has often hinted of a return to pro basketball, but is now sounding more serious than ever.

"I've been practicing with the L.A. Lakers, I'm in shape, and if it happens, it happens," he said Friday night.

In town for the Super Bowl, Johnson played at a charity basketball game with pro football and major league baseball players. "Let's just say I haven't decided," he said.

The New York Post reported Friday that Johnson has "all but guaranteed" the Lakers that he will be in uniform next Friday at the Forum when Los Angeles meets the Chicago Bulls and Michael Jordan, who himself returned last season after a whirl at baseball.

"We spoke with the NBA to see what it would take for him to come back," Lon Rosen, his agent, said at the charity game, where Johnson played on the same team with rapper and movie star Ice Cube.

"He's been practicing quite a bit with the Lakers, and the intensity has gone up the past few weeks."

"He's going to make a decision very soon," Rosen said.

The Los Angeles Times, citing unidentified sources, reported today that Johnson and the Lakers have reached an agreement in principle on a new contract.

Johnson would sign a contract to play for the second half of the season and the playoffs for \$2.5 million, the maximum allowed him under the league's salary-cap rules.

"It's done," one source close to the situation told the Times.

Should Johnson, who first retired in 1991 after testing HIV positive, return, he would first have to transfer his small - approximately 5 percent - ownership stake in the team to someone else. To do so would require only the approval of NBA commissioner David Stern, who has no opposition to Johnson returning to play.

"The Lakers have had discussions with Earvin and we have had discussions with the league office on the requirements for him to come back," Lakers spokesman John Black.

## Hawks shut down Shaq, beat Magic

For once, Orlando couldn't count on its inside presence to produce.

Atlanta shut down Shaquille O'Neal on Friday night, and the Hawks won their 10th straight game, 96-84.

"They were doubling quick," said O'Neal, who was held without a basket in the second half. "I didn't have that many plays called. I guess tonight was taken big man night for me. That's my role. When I get doubled, I'm just looking for the open pass, and hopefully the other guys can hit shots."

Seattle didn't need its force in the middle to beat Utah. The Jazz held Shawn Kemp to 10 points on 2-for-9 shooting, but the Sonics won 94-93 on the strength of its perimeter shooting and Gary Payton's layup with 10 seconds remaining.

In other NBA games, it was Indiana 107, Boston 90; New Jersey 115, Charlotte 107; the Los Angeles Lakers 100, Philadelphia 88; Chicago 102, Miami 80; Phoenix 107, Milwaukee 97; San Antonio 87, Portland 83; Seattle 94, Utah 93; and Golden State 124, Sacramento 118.

The Magic's other star, Anfernee Hardaway, made only one basket the final two quarters, and Orlando missed 15 of its 17 shots from the field in the fourth quarter.

"Our defense was really working," Hawks forward Grant Long said. "Guys were moving and rotating well and they (the Magic) weren't able to get their shots."

The winning streak is Atlanta's longest since a 14-game run two years ago.

Steve Smith scored 22 points and Mookie Blaylock added 21 for Atlanta.

For the seventh consecutive game, Atlanta held an opponent under 100 points, and this defensive performance was especially impressive. Orlando, leader of the Atlantic Division, came in averaging 102.9 points, but was outscored 33-12 the final 13 minutes.

"Atlanta's on a roll," said Dennis Scott, who added 19 points to O'Neal's 20. "The impressive thing is how well they sustain defense. Every time we'd threaten, their defense would hold."

**SuperSonics 94, Jazz 93**

Payton's winning basket came after Karl Malone's two free throws with 56 seconds remaining put Utah in front 93-92.

Payton finished with 24 points, making up for the lack of production from Kemp, who was hampered by a bruised left shoulder.

For the Jazz, Jeff Hornacek scored

27 points and Karl Malone had 23 points and 10 rebounds. The loss snapped the visitors' four-game winning streak.

**Spurs 87, Trail Blazers 83**

Chuck Person made consecutive 3-pointers in the fourth quarter to put San Antonio ahead for good against Portland.

David Robinson had 20 points and 21 rebounds for the Spurs, who broke a two-game losing streak. Person finished with 21 points and 18 rebounds.

Harvey Grant led the visiting Trail Blazers with 24 points, and Clifford Robinson had 18.

**Nets 115, Hornets 107**

It was supposed to be Kenny Anderson's night, but Kendall Gill grabbed the spotlight.

Gill scored a season-high 30 to lead the Nets over the Hornets a week after the trade that sent Anderson and Gerald Glass to Charlotte for Gill and Khalid Reeves. Anderson finished with eight points and a season-high 16 assists. He was 2-of-7 from the field.

Glen Rice had 34 points for Charlotte, which had won three straight on the road. Armon Gilliam had 22 points and 11 rebounds, P.J. Brown added 18 points and Shawn Bradley 16 for the Nets, who shot 51 percent from the field.

**Pacers 107, Celtics 90**

Derrick McKey scored 23 points and Reggie Miller 22 in Indiana's victory at Boston.

The win extended the Pacers' win streak to five games. They have won four of their last five on the road.

Dino Radja led the Celtics with 26 points.

Antonio Davis had 21 points and 13 rebounds for the Pacers.

**Lakers 100, 76ers 88**

Cedric Ceballos scored 31 points and Nick Van Exel 19 as Los Angeles dealt Philadelphia its eighth straight loss.

Elden Campbell added 14 points and a career-high 18 rebounds for the Lakers, who posted a 63-32 rebounding advantage in the game. Vernon Maxwell had 26 points and Clarence Weatherspoon 23 for the Sixers, who have lost nine straight home games.

**Bulls 102, Heat 80**

Chicago tied a franchise record with its 14th straight victory, using a strong defense, 25 points from Michael Jordan and Dennis Rodman's 16 rebounds to rout visiting Miami.

The Bulls forced 26 turnovers and limited Heat center Alonzo Mourning to just 12 points, 13 under his average.

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For the non-partisan fan (is there such a creature?), this is the best matchup the NFL could have offered.

The biggest advantage for the Cowboys lies in their extremely well-balanced offense.

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Yes, Pittsburgh's defense is very difficult to solve. The brilliantly crafted "zone-dog" schemes are capable of wreaking panic and pain on an offense without incurring the big-play risks that afflict most heavy blitz teams.

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The Steelers' offense strikes quite a contrast, not just with Dallas but with Pittsburgh's own recent style.

Their offensive approach has always been sound and well-balanced.

But this season, they have become

much more daring. They have discovered and utilized the electrifying talents of what was once a relatively unknown corps of receivers. Ernie Mills, Yancey Thigpen, Andre Hastings and Kordell Stewart have all become big-play contributors. You need big plays to win big games.

The emergence of Neil O'Donnell as a premier quarterback has been a vital component in this birth of a new offense.

The Steelers have become swashbuckling and exciting. I see parallels to what occurred to us with the Buffalo Bills when we first came riding out of the tundra with our no-huddle offense a few years ago.

Such changes, however, are not without a price and not without some risks.

The Steelers' running game isn't as integral as it once was. But that, I acknowledge, is a nitpicking observation. What they have done has been instrumental in getting them into the Super Bowl.

In a championship game, you may sorely miss not being able to run effectively. But without the bold changes the Steelers made early this

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The question is whether Dallas can stop them.

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Do I believe they'll be able to do that?

I'll keep it simple: Yes. How about the kicking game?

I dislike giving this vital area such short shrift, but I will get right to the point.

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Neither team has employed a heart-stopping gamebreaker as a return man, although I believe Dallas is more dangerous - very dangerous if Deion

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Bill rallied a team that was floundering early.

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That said, I feel Dallas has a stronger team, one that can keep the pressure on in a hard-fought, well-played game.

I predict Dallas will win 28-23.

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Call it the Deion-cam.

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But while NBC will place an emphasis on Deion Sanders, network executives stress that this is not a game of toys and trinkets to them.

"I'm going to cover the game from the standpoint of basics," NBC game director John Gonzalez said. "You start with the same basic cameras and the additional facilities will be mostly for isolation."

In a game of this magnitude, producer John Faratzis said, the cardinal rule is: "You don't want to miss anything."

Faratzis said that with the Dallas Cowboys meeting the Pittsburgh Steelers, NBC expects big ratings. The network, which has sold 58 commercial units for a record average of \$1.2 million per 30 seconds, expects a rating of about 45, representing about 135 million viewers.

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Enberg says they're ready. Sitting

with Enberg in a Super Bowl hotel room on a conference call last week, Maguire had to agree.

"I'm sitting here watching Dick Enberg dribble water all over himself, and if that's any indication, we're ready," Maguire said. "I think it's been evident through the year, with this team being together all the way, how good we've become. 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
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

## Loan guarantee program considered important to value added products

Dick Geris, newly appointed chairman of the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority Board, is banking on the value of home-grown farm and ranch products.

"The bottom line is we want to keep more of the value of raw

products produced in the state," according to Geris, executive vice president of First State Bank of Uvalde. He is a former Hereford resident where he was a vice president at First National Bank.

Geris, who was appointed to the board last July, was named chairman of the nine-member state agency in December by Gov. George W. Bush. He comes into power at an opportune time following the passage of a constitutional amendment that greatly increases the amount of loans that can be made to value-added products. Proposition 3 increased the agency's loan guaranty program from \$25 million to \$225 million.

"The loan guaranty program is WASHINGTON (AP) - What vegetable generates the most money for U.S. exporters? Lettuce, says the Agriculture Department - \$184 million worth was shipped in 1995. The Foreign Agricultural Service says Canada bought 85 percent of the exported lettuce; Hong Kong was a distant second. Lettuce shipments to Mexico were down 51 percent from a year earlier, due chiefly to devaluation of the peso.

Onions were the second-highest moneymaker for U.S. exporters, followed by tomatoes, broccoli, asparagus, cauliflower, peppers and celery. Carrots and cucumbers registered sizable gains.

Vegetable exports in 1995 totaled \$1.1 billion, up 17 percent from a year earlier and 37 percent higher than in 1991. Canada accounted for 70 percent of the purchases; Japan was second.

Japan bans tomatoes from the United States because of concern over the spread of tobacco blue mold. This has become a contentious trade issue, and U.S. growers are urging retaliation unless Japan opens its market.

Most tomatoes produced in Japan are hothouse-grown and thus more expensive.

what I consider to be the most important area where we can make a difference," Geris said. Established in 1991 at the \$25 million cap, the program has already directly created 1,400 jobs and increased the state's rate of processing ag goods from 8 percent to 10 percent.

Adding just 1 percent to the state's processing rate contributes \$2.2 billion in economic activity to Texas each year, according to Geris, who noted that Texas is still well behind the national average of 20 percent. "Bringing the state's processing

average up to the national average would add \$22 billion to the state's economy," he said. Although the authority has the power to issue up to \$225 million in loan guarantees, Geris said the board will likely begin with a \$100 million program.

"We want to make sure this is a self-sustaining program," he said, explaining that although the bonds enabling the loans are state-backed, there is no use of taxpayer funds. "Our goal is to assist banks in making loans that otherwise could not be

made." Loans have already been made to meat packing and seed companies, according to Geris, as well as establishing cotton-knitting mills in the Panhandle. Most exotic projects have also been funded, including using wheat straw for fiber insulation boards.

## All-American Cowboy Cookbook features real, theatrical cowboys

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) - Hit the trail Julia Child. There's only room in this saddlebag for one cookbook and it's got John Wayne's grits soufflé on page 179.

What's that pardner? You say it's lunchtime? Just throw another log on the campfire and open "The All-American Cowboy Cookbook" to Rifleman Fried Catfish, from the kitchen of Chuck Connors.

Or if you're entertaining, how about Davy Crockett's Pork Scallops with Dijon Sauce, a favorite at the Fess Parker household?

Authors Ken Beck and Jim Clark have gathered about 300 recipes from an array of real and theatrical cowboys, and cowgirls like Doris Day (who played Calamity Jane) and Melody "F-Troop" Patterson.

Varmints won't want to pass up Yosemite Sam's Cranberry Chicken, supplied by Sam's vocal assistant, Mel Blanc.

Author Beck thinks he and partner Clark stumbled on a gold mine.

"If you grew up in the 1950s, you wanted to be a cowboy," said Beck, who subtitled the book "Home Cooking on the Range."

"I couldn't believe nobody had done a cowboy cookbook. We researched it, and no one had done it."

Beck, a reporter for The Tennessee

an in Nashville, first teamed with free-lancer Clark for the sitcom watchers' essential guide, "The Andy Griffith Show," in 1985.

Since then, the duo have compiled "Aunt Bea's Cookbook" and a "Gilligan's Island" cookbook with help from Dawn Wells (Mary Ann).

The Cowboy Cookbook surveys 175 real cowboys and pseudocowboys, and 30 ranches for recipes. Chili and cornbread recipes are popular, but there's also the good taste of Clint Eastwood who donated the secrets of his award-winning pasta dish.

Part of the royalties go to cowboy actor Ben Johnson's Helping Hand, which helps children's hospitals.

Beck and Clark also packed in photos, trivia bits and quizzes. Buffs of cowboy movies can check out the "Magnificent 77 Westerns That No Cowboy Fan Should Miss."

Work began when the duo made a wish-list of 300 names and started sending out requests. Some responded quickly, others took some prodding.

"If we didn't have Roy Rogers and Gene Autry, there was no sense in going forward," Beck said.

A call to the widow of Milburn Stone (Doc on "Gunsmoke") produced a recipe and the home number of the elusive James Arness (Matt Dillon). Beck didn't have to use the number because Arness' business

manager sent a recipe for "Gun-Smokin' Chili."

Clark contacted Wayne's family, and the Duke's widow, Pilar, contributed two recipes, including one for the grits soufflé.

"You have to have the Duke in there," Clark said.

The request got lost in the mail, but Steve McQueen's daughter called six months later to add some of the favorite dishes of the actor who appeared in "Wanted: Dead or Alive."

Character actor Jack Elam proved more elusive. A champion poker player, Beck had hoped for a sandwich recipe only to receive a recipe for whisky on ice.

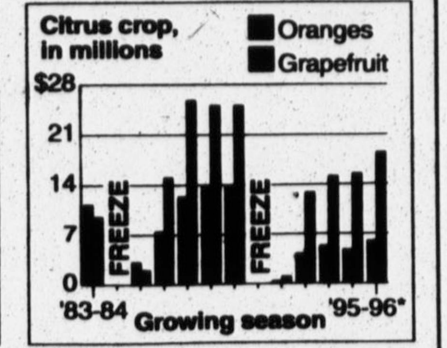
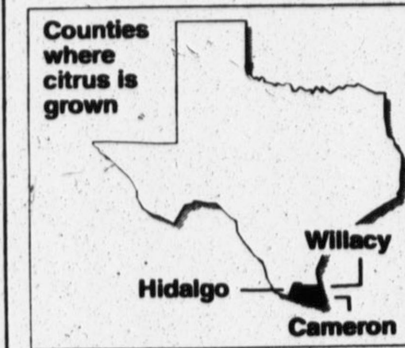

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Idaho Wheat Commission is looking for a few good farmers.

Specifically, it needs 24 farmers for a program aimed at increasing Idaho wheat sales in North and South Korea with an experimental new hard white variety.

The commission and its international market development partner, U.S. Wheat Associates Inc., have been trying for the past few years to reclaim the share of the Korean market it lost to Australian semi-hard white bran wheats.

That variety is primarily used to make noodles. Idaho Wheat Commission

Administrator Mark Samson said an experimental new hard white wheat, Idaho 3775, developed at the University of Idaho meets the needs of Korean noodle makers.

He said 14 wheat producers were hired to grow 42,000 bushels of the new variety in 1995, and 30,000 bushels were sent to Korea for commercial milling and noodle quality tests.

The commission wants to boost 1996 production to about 225,000 bushels, and is seeking 24 wheat producers who will agree to grow the experimental variety along with their regular spring wheat.

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# Veterinarian's dream is to become author of bestselling fiction books

SCHULENBURG, Texas - If Chris Pinney's dreams come true, one day he'll be cranking out fiction bestsellers like his favorite author Clive Cussler's "Inca Gold" and "Shock Wave."

But until that day arrives, Pinney's keeps busy as a licensed veterinarian, director of franchise operations in his father-in-law's national meat processing and marketing business and as the author of four technical veterinary-type books.

He and his wife, Tracy, have three little children, Alexandra, 8, Hunter, 6, and Dakota, 4. And then there's Ubu, the family dog, a full-blooded Chow, age 13.

When Pinney graduated from veterinary school at Texas A&M in 1986, he and Tracy moved to San Antonio. He opened a practice specializing in small animals and domestic pets.

He promoted his business by

making regular appearances as a guest host on a radio call-in show and then on a television show in the city.

But writing has always been his special passion. So he began writing "how to" books about lessons learned in veterinary school.

"Basically, I'd write for two or three minutes in between patients each day at work and when I could find time at home," he said.

His first effort, "First Aid for Pets," was successful but only in a round about sort of way.

"I sent out about 50 queries consisting of a sample chapter and outline to prospective publishers and got zero response," Pinney said.

But before rejection had time to set in, Pinney got a telephone call from Barron's Publishing in New York.

"They told me they didn't need a pet first aid book but said they

could use a book on pet coat and skin care," he said.

Pinney obliged and in 1990 his first book, "Guide to Home Pet Grooming," hit bookstores across the country. A second work, "A Veterinarian's Guide to Dogs, Cats, Birds and Exotics," published in hard cover on first printing and in paperback on its second by McGraw-Hill, hit the bookstores in 1992.

While writing, doctoring animals and tending to his growing radio and television audience in San Antonio, Pinney and his wife yearned for smalltown life to raise their children.

Tracy's father, Bill Bucek of Schulerburg, offered his son-in-law a position at his fast-growing meat processing and marketing business, Double B Foods.

The company employs over 200 people at four processing plants in Weimar, Schulenburg and Brenham and is the second largest

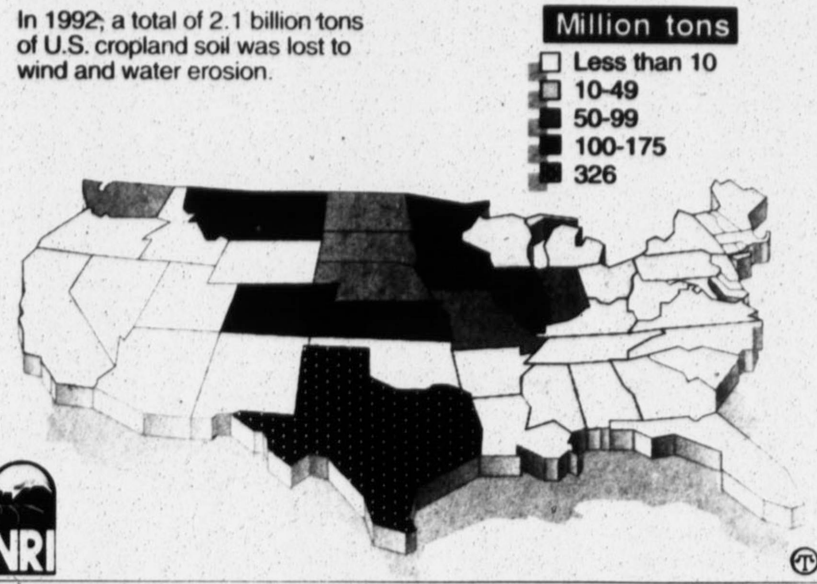
producer of beef jerky in the nation.

As Pinney settled into his new job, Barron's called again with a request for a book about the special needs of older dogs. He agreed. Last November, his third book, "Caring for Your Older Dog," hit the bookshelves. And Barron's will soon publish his fourth book, "Caring for Your Older Cat." A fourth about caring for parrots is in the works.

Pinney, 35, describes his current involvement in veterinary medicine as a hobby. He said he still gets hands-on experience working as a substitute for full-time practitioners.

Asked if he'll eventually drop healing animals, Pinney says absolutely not.

"In veterinary medicine as opposed to human medicine you get to be the surgeon, radiologist, internists and anesthesiologist all rolled into one and I love it."



(NAPS)—Most cropland soils can withstand soil erosion of up to about 5 tons per acre per year without losing long-term productivity. In 1992, the average annual rate of water erosion on cropland was 3.1 tons per acre, down from 4.1 tons per acre in 1982. The average annual rate of wind erosion on cropland declined from 3.3 tons per acre in 1982 to 2.5 tons per acre in 1992. However, one out of five acres of U.S. cropland is eroding at a higher rate than 5 tons per acre per year. Forty percent of all cropland erosion nationwide occurred in just five states: Texas, Minnesota, Iowa, Montana, and Kansas.

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# Worker's compensation law focus of Idaho Legislature

WASHINGTON (AP) - An Idaho laborer's loss of three limbs in a farming accident has focused attention on the fact that 14 states don't require farmers to provide worker compensation insurance.

The injury to Javier Tellez Juarez of Cassia County apparently has boosted support in the Idaho Legislature for a bill requiring such coverage. The Idaho Cattlemen's Association, which traditionally has been a stumbling block, has offered

a conditional endorsement.

Tellez, 24, lost both arms and one leg Dec. 13 in an accident involving a tractor-powered post-hole digger.

Had he been working in virtually any other dangerous occupation, his medical bills, rehabilitation costs and retraining expenses likely would have been paid by worker's compensation insurance. In addition, he would have been assured payments of \$9,000 to \$14,000 a year for life because of the permanent disability.

Because the state has no such program for farm workers, Cassia County will pay \$10,000 of Tellez's medical expenses, which are expected to total \$400,000. A special state fund, designed to protect against catastrophic health-care costs, will cover the remainder, according to a county welfare officer.

Michael Martinez, a lawyer representing Tellez, said no federal program, including Medicaid and Medicare, will help the injured worker because he is an alien. Donations in Idaho and Utah, where Tellez is being treated, probably will be enough to cover living expenses of the family - he has a 17-year-old wife and 4-month-old daughter - while he spends six months to a year in an extended-care facility, Martinez said.

Idaho State Sen. Dean Cameron, whose committee has jurisdiction over the compensation bill, said its chances have been enhanced by the endorsement of the cattlemen and of Gov. Phil Batt. Also involved in negotiations are the state's wool growers and the Idaho Farm Bureau.

Directors of the cattlemen voted to support the bill but only if farmers and ranchers are given flexibility to choose the type of coverage they want to buy - and if the rates are equitable.

According to the Labor Department, the 13 states besides Idaho that have no mandatory worker's compensation program for farm workers are Alabama, Arkansas, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Mississippi, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Rhode Island, South Carolina and Tennessee.

# U.S. agricultural exports on record-setting pace

WASHINGTON (AP) - U.S. agricultural exports are on a record-setting pace for 1996.

Farmers will sell \$58 billion of their products overseas during the 12 months ending Sept. 30, the Agriculture Department predicts. That is \$3.9 billion higher than the export record of \$54.1 billion set during the same period in 1994-95. The latest forecast is \$3.5 billion above the figure projected last August.

Americans are expected to import \$29 billion of agricultural products in 1996, \$500 million below last year. Lower world coffee prices are the main reason for the decline, USDA says.

The value of U.S. farm exports last January through October was \$45.2 billion, up 24 percent from the same period in 1994. With high world prices prevailing for most commodities, the largest gains were in grains

and feeds, cotton, oilseeds and vegetable oils and beef and poultry.

Corn shipments during the 10 months totaled 50.3 million tons - nearly double the year-earlier figure. Corn exports were worth \$5.9 billion, up \$3 billion from the 1994 period.

Japan was the biggest market, buying 13.4 million tons of U.S. corn. South Korea took 7.8 million tons and Taiwan, 5.2 million.

Ten-month wheat shipments were 26.8 million tons, a slight increase. But the value of those exports shot up by \$1.1 billion, to \$4.4 billion. Egypt bought 4.3 million tons; China, 2.6 million; and Japan, 2.4 million tons.

Farmers supplied 18 million tons of soybeans to overseas customers during the 10 months, up 4.9 million tons. The price: \$4.1 billion. The European Union bought 7.1 million tons and Japan took 3.2 million tons.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Farmers dissatisfied with decisions of the Agriculture Department have a new set of rules governing appeals.

The "interim final regulations" were announced Thursday by Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman. First proposed last May 22, they will become effective Tuesday and govern appeals until the final version is put in place later this year.

The interim appeals procedure affects such issues as denial of participation in a USDA program, amount of benefits paid and determination of whether land is designated wetlands or highly erodible land.

The appeals process is handled by the National Appeals Division, which is independent of all other USDA offices and agencies. The director reports to the secretary.

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# Technology keeps even fake movie animals safe

DENVER (AP) - American filmmakers don't parachute live elephants out of airplanes nowadays. Nor do they jump horses off 70-foot cliffs.

Once upon a time they did these things with animals, and worse, for the sake of entertainment. No longer. Should they try such stunts now, or even suggest them, somebody like Nan Stuart would lower the boom.

Besides, nowadays Hollywood has the technology, something called animal-tronics, to fake with remarkable realism any scenes that would be cruel to animals or even risky.

Nan Stuart is a field representative of the American Humane Association, one of 14 soldiers in a fight that began 55 years ago. The fight is still going on - of necessity, she believes, though filmmakers seem to have finally gotten the message.

Indeed, Stuart says, "I have never been on a set where the animal was in jeopardy in any way shape or form" in all her 15 years as an AHA rep.

Which is heartening when you consider how the association became necessary in the first place. It began in 1939 during the filming of "Jesse James." A stuntman rode a horse off a 70-foot cliff into white water. The stunt man survived. The horse did not.

The public outcry was such that the AHA established an office in Hollywood the following year and worked out an agreement with the Motion Picture Association of America. It required that the AHA be

consulted on all filmmaking involving animals and an AHA rep supervise all animal shots.

That worked for more than a quarter century until, in 1966, the agreement was dissolved. After that, AHA often was barred, sometimes at gunpoint, from sets involving animals.

Then, in 1979, in the making of a movie called "Heaven's Gate," a horse was blown up.

AHA organized a national boycott of the film and public outrage led to the reinstatement of the AHA's authority in the 1980 Actors-Producers Collective Bargaining agreement. That agreement continues today.

"We were on 411 sets last year, and at 102 sets last month alone," said Jim Moore of the AHA's Los Angeles office.

With animal-tronic technology, Moore said, "You have electronic animals that look and move exactly like real animals and digitally produced animal effects." A major advancement in safety for the animal actors.

"That really makes our job easier. You don't have the elephant thrown out of the plane" as in the bad old days, he said, but you can still have an elephant-parachute scene. Anyone who saw "Operation Dumbo Drop" saw an animal-tronic elephant float through the sky.

The AHA's mission is that no creature should be harmed for the sake of entertainment. Its reps take seriously the words no creature - lions and tigers, bugs to bears, dogs and

horses, big elephants to little cockroaches, no exceptions.

AHA rep Nan Stuart's beat is the Rocky Mountain region where photogenic creatures abound. Her office is in Denver. She is a short, stocky blond woman who has been passionate about animal welfare all her life. She loves dogs and has two golden retrievers.

Out in filmdom's trenches, when the trenches are in the Rocky Mountain area, Stuart is there.

"A lot of times the directors want the animal to do something it can't possibly do - like having a bear topple over backwards," she says. "A bear doesn't fall backwards." If a director should direct someone to make a bear fall backward... Cut! No backward-falling bears.

No tripping of horses, either. Falling horses for Western movie action scenes is no longer allowed.

If you look closely at horses that fall in the movies today, Stuart says,

you will see the same six or eight horses in most of the movies. It's a stunt, and safe. Those horses are specially trained.

Some of the human stars Stuart has worked with include Mel Gibson, Meryl Streep, Kevin Bacon, Tommy Lee Jones and Bill Murray. She gives them an excellent grade for working with animals.

"The animal usually gets the scene right the first or second time," she says. "The human actor usually takes longer. Then the animal becomes bored or tired." (The exotics, as she calls them, such as jungle cats and bears, have an even shorter attention span.) That is when Stuart keeps an even closer watch for stress in the animal.

"You watch their eyes, ears, their whole body language. Elephants will sway back and forth when they're bored. The big cats become irritable," she said.

Too many repeats of a scene and a horse, for example, will begin anticipating. If, say, a horse is supposed to run to a fence and then turn or stop,

she said, "He will begin anticipating and start turning too soon or stopping too soon. The horse thinks, 'Why should I exert all that energy running clear over there when all I have to do is stop or turn?'"

How far will an AHA rep go to protect all creatures great and small?

Jim Moore of Los Angeles recalls a recent filming in which 50 trout were used for one scene and were on the set three to four days.

"The rep was making sure the water was changed and kept at the proper temperature," he said. "When the shooting was finished, the producer rolls in his barbecue pits for a fish fry. We didn't allow that."

Same even goes for cockroaches. "You walk onto the set with 10,000 cockroaches, you walk out with 10,000 cockroaches," Moore said.

AHA's role in filmmaking begins with the scripts. Months before any shooting begins, AHA coordinates with producers on how to achieve the animal effect they seek without harming the

animals. American filmmaking has become pretty humane according to the AHA. The same, however, can't be said for some foreign films.

According to the AHA, in the filming of "Apocalypse Now" in the Philippines, a water buffalo was hacked to pieces. In the movie "Patton," filmed in Italy, two donkeys were shot to death on the set.

While Stuart has not run into that sort of barbarity, she has had some unsettling moments.

"On a set here in Denver I was working with Bill Murray and an elephant. The elephant was just an arm's length away. I was taking notes and when I looked up the elephant was gone. They move silently."

"My goodness, I've lost an elephant," I said. I felt kind of stupid."

If being temporarily misplaced is an elephant's worst misfortune on a Rocky Mountain movie set, it would seem that rep Stuart is doing her job.

## Cash-strapped duchess may be hitting airwaves

LONDON (AP) - Fun-loving, big-spending and short of cash, the Duchess of York has been offered \$1 million to host her own talk show for CBS television, a London newspaper reported Friday.

CBS denied there was any deal with in the works or a \$1 million offer on the table, as The Daily Mail reported.

"We spoke to her three or four months ago about a project and the discussions were inconclusive," CBS spokesman Tom Goodman said in New York. "We haven't spoken to her since then."

The estranged wife of Prince Andrew has another definite invitation, however - to appear in

the High Court in London: The high-living former Sarah Ferguson is being sued for \$142,500 she owes a friend, court officials said.

Press Association, the British news agency, said this apparently was the first time a member of the royal family had been sued.

A spokeswoman for the duchess, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Fergie had received "quite a number of approaches" like CBS' over the past couple of weeks, but no decision had been made.

"It's fairly unlikely she will have her own chat show," the spokeswoman added.

The Daily Mail quoted an unidentified source at the network

as saying the duchess was negotiating with CBS over an offer that could include as few as six shows a year, or as many as one a week.

British papers last week reported that Fergie owes her bank \$1.5 million or more because of her lavish spending on clothes, holidays, staff, her rented mansion and other luxuries.

Her mother-in-law, Queen Elizabeth II, resolved last week to stop bailing her out.

Lawyers for society hostess Lily Rathon Mahtani filed suit against the duchess on Thursday, seeking repayment of of a \$142,500 loan plus interest and legal costs, court officials said.

The Sun, a daily tabloid, said Mrs. Mahtani, 38, loaned the duchess \$150,000 in August 1994 to take a six-week holiday in the south of France with daughters Princess Beatrice, 7, and Princess Eugenie, 5.

The Sun said Mrs. Mahtani claims the duchess promised to repay it after a "reasonable period" but that when Mrs. Mahtani asked for it back in February, Fergie repaid only \$7,500.

The duchess' office had no comment on the suit, except to say it was in the hands of her lawyers.

The 36-year-old duchess and Andrew, 35, married in July 1986 and separated in 1992. The duchess says she has cut back on her spending, but tabloids said she flew first class Jan. 18 for a four-day visit to the United States.

But all the news might not be bad for Fergie.

Last week, the duchess announced she had struck a deal with a U.S. producer of children's TV. Published reports here said the deal was with New Jersey businessman Ray Chambers, but that has not been confirmed by either side, nor have the financial arrangements been disclosed.

"The competition is not part of 'The Grand Ole Opry,' but is held on the stage of the Opry House. Producers and publishers will be there to hear us perform," said Barker.

voice lessons from Susan Shaw, from whom he still takes lessons.

According to Barker, he spends from three to five hours a day practicing and working on music.

"It's more like six hours a day," said his wife, June, who appears to be his number one fan and supporter.

"I waitress on the weekends and just about everything I make goes to help Doug with the equipment he needs," Mrs. Barker said. "We have even done some D.J. jobs to help raise money for his music."

Barker was born in Lubbock, grew up in Colorado Springs, Colo., and moved to Hereford in 1976.

He learned about the auditions in Clovis from his brother-in-law.

"I almost didn't go, however," he said. "My wife urged me to try anyway, so I went and was the very first one to perform."

At the Nashville Starbound Talent Competition, there will be from 100 to 120 artists performing.

The winner of the competition will receive a recording session with

U.S.A. and European promotion, a \$10,000 cash prize value, according to Don Reed Productions.

In addition, a panel of judges will select contestants to perform at the White House during the Independence Day Celebration in July or the Pageant of Peace (Lighting of the Christmas Tree) in December.

"Even if I'm not a winner, singing in this competition could help boost my career since major label producers will be there," Barker said.

Contestants have been advised that Nashville producer Eric Straton will be a guest on the competition at the Grand Ole Opry House. He has produced music videos for such artists as Diamond Rio and Skip Ewing.

Barker will only be able to perform one song. It must be three minutes or

less and no medleys are allowed.

"I'm hoping to do a song where I can do both lead and back-up vocals, if we can get it worked out," said Barker.

The contestants will be judged on appearance, overall talent, originality and stage presentation.

"Performing both lead and back-up will be an original approach, so I hope it will help me in the judging," Barker added.

He plans to perform with a back-up tape, since not all the musicians he usually works with will be able to attend the competition.

"The local musicians will mix the back-up tape though," he said.

Mrs. Barker plans to attend the competition. Their daughter, son-in-law and grandchildren from Louisiana will also be there.

Hereford Rebekah Lodge #228 met Tuesday evening with 12 members present.

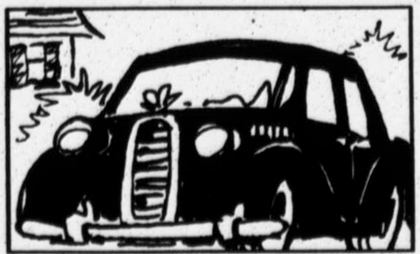

Most people think "books" when they think of a library, but these days we have so much more. (At least we haven't taken to calling ourselves a "media center," yet!) I've sung the praises of talking books until you're probably tired of hearing about them, so this week it'll be videos.

Our video collection began about three or four years ago when the Friends of the Library approached local businesses to supply a video or two, choosing from a list we had worked up. Since then, we have acquired almost 600 titles of all types.

Our aim has never been to have the hottest item or the latest releases, but rather, to cover a wide range of subjects, many of which would be suitable to use for club programs.

Some of our latest acquisitions include *American Traditions: Route 66*, *The Art of Illusion: 100 Years of Hollywood Special Effects*, and a three-volume set of *The Legends of Comedy*. We have lots of videos for kids including the entire McGee and Me series.

We have musicals such as *My Fair Lady* and classics like *Frankenstein* and *The Longest Day*. They cover everything from how to can and smoke foods, to meals for fifty. There are cookbooks for everyday foods, celebration foods, American foods, ethnic foods, pastries, pastas, chocolate lovers, cheese lovers, weight-watchers, cholesterol counters, diabetics, heart patients.

You want to know how to make a quick rice pudding? Read the side of the box! (That's the one recipe I couldn't find!)

## Series on landscaping will assist gardeners

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## Extension News

What will your children do with their million dollars?

It's not a new lottery for children--it's a fact. Most young people today will earn over \$1 million in their lifetime. Children are not born with money sense. Their attitudes and values about money are influenced by what they see, hear and learn at home and by their experiences in using money.

In their pre-school years, children can learn to count and sort coins, and can choose items from two or three options when shopping. With the parent's help, they can pay for small items at the store, and they like to read stories or books that talk about money that are written for their age group.

While elementary school youth have a short attention span and appear careless, they are beginning to become aware of how today's decisions are related to tomorrow's results. They act out these concepts by playing store, earning money for specific jobs beyond their regular chores, saving for small items to buy within a week or two and by sharing their money as they give to church or charities.

In the pre-teen stage of development, youth like to spend freely, especially to be accepted by their peers. They may relate how they feel about themselves to items they own or can buy. Parents can help youth through this stage by reinforcing positive traits of their child that are not related to money, such as their interests and skills. Set goals for money, show them how to make a spending plan and open a savings account. Decide together what expenses their allowance must cover and which money decisions they can make on their own.

The turmoil and inner conflict of teen years are an expression of a teen's desire for freedom while still needing security. Teens may reject money management skills used earlier to express conflicting opinions and ideas or to demonstrate their desire for independence or freedom

to choose.

Let teens earn money from a summer job. Encourage them to save for longer-range goals like vacations, camps or gifts. Encourage them to use comparison shopping skills to help with family shopping as well as their own shopping, feeling the benefit of getting the most for their money.

4-H Money Management and Consumer Decision Making projects are available to help youth learn these basic life skills. Letting teens be involved in family discussions about money and even helping to write checks to pay for family bills can help them see the true cost of living and the types of choices parents must make to live within the family's income.

Youth who begin saving \$38 a week at age 20--from moving a few yards or doing some odd jobs--if continued over 45 years to age 65 could easily retire with \$1 million in savings in addition to the money they have earned. The key is to help your children learn to get full value from the money that passes through their hands by teaching them money management and consumer life skills.

"Short or mid-length hair tends to be softer looking and easier to wear even on your wedding day, not to mention more versatile," says Vernon Keech, creative designer at the uptown Vidal Sassoon Salon in

New York City.

For some reason, many prospective brides start growing their hair longer as soon as they are engaged, in the belief that long hair offers more styling options with the headpiece or veil. But long hair pulled up looks just like short hair, notes Keech.

"If you grow your hair out strictly for your wedding day and then cut it

off right after the honeymoon, someday you're going to look back at the pictures and you won't really see what you looked like at the time—only on that one day.

"And, do you really want to fuss with your hair on your honeymoon, especially if you are not good with your hair?"

Short hair can be worn either very

stylized and polished or loose and natural, Keech says. Bring your headpiece to your stylist a few months before the wedding so you can practice how you will handle it on the big day, he advises. If you're going to do your hair yourself on the wedding day, a stylist can give you a lesson on handling it, which you can practice as the date approaches.

The last cut should be about two weeks before the wedding and coloring about a week before.

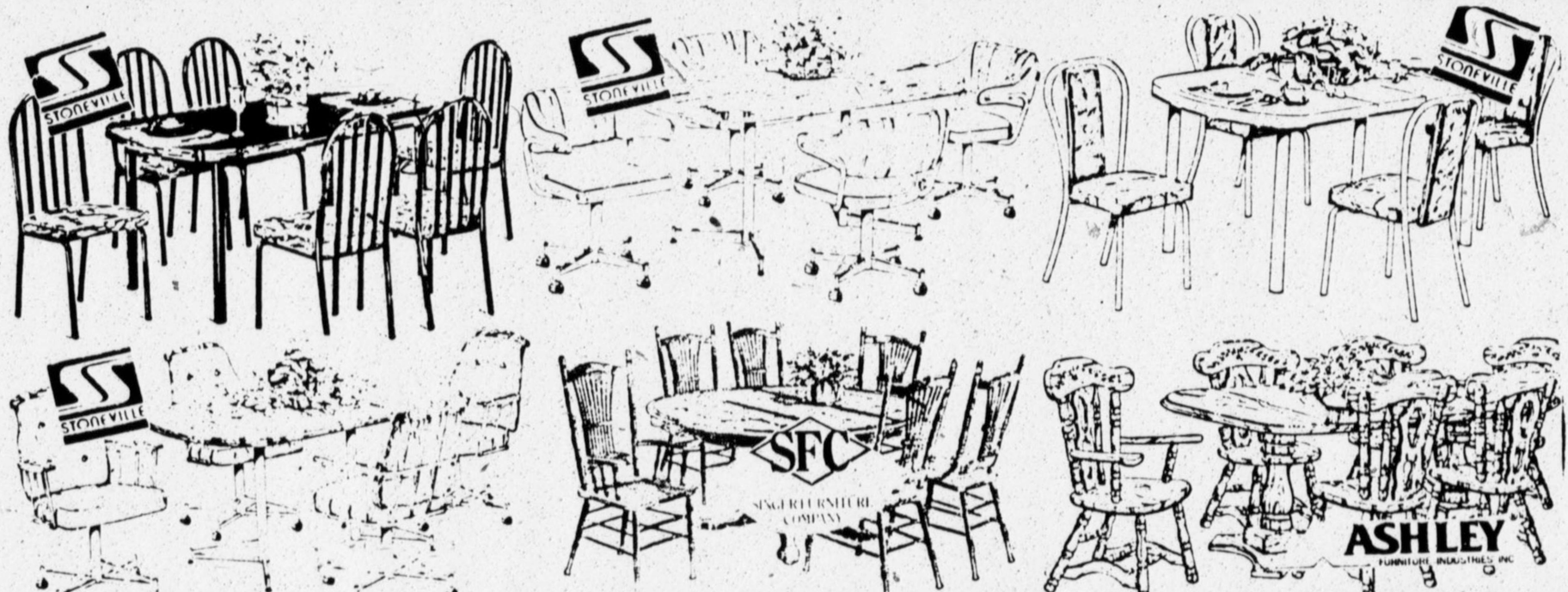
Another advantage to short cuts are that after the ceremony, you can remove the veil without upsetting a complicated hairdo. Just run your fingers through your hair, and enjoy the party.

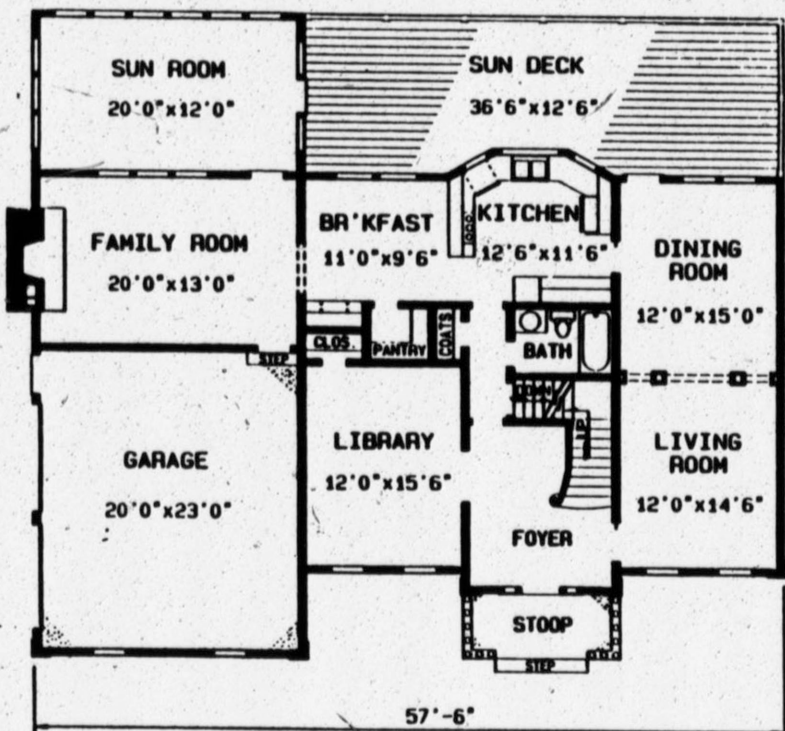

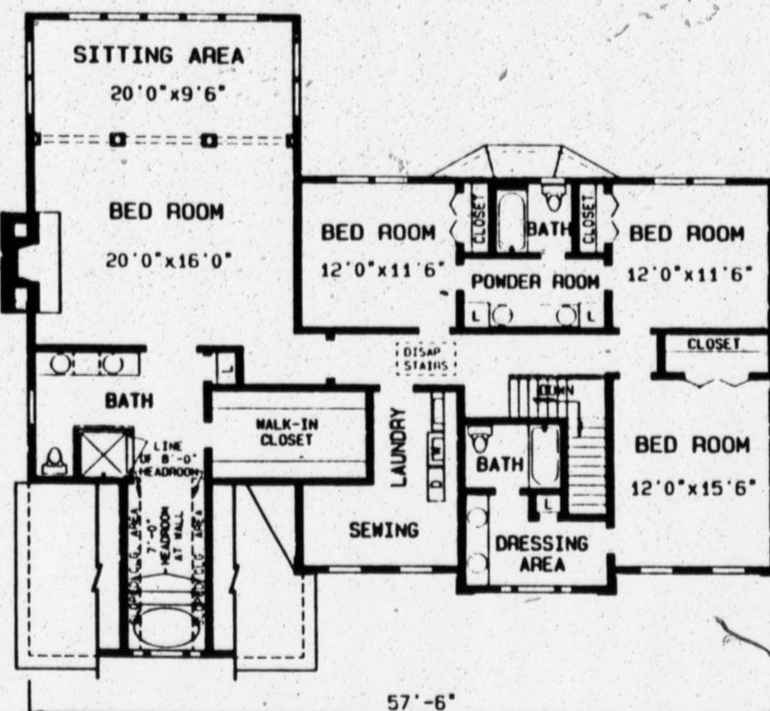

When the writers give her meaty material—such as last fall's season opener, in which her character begged *Grace* to give some of her own biological eggs to the childless Nadine and her husband, Wade (Casey Sander)—the actress unfailingly knocks the acting ball right out of the park. Her presence on *Grace*, however, has less to do with a desire for TV stardom than it does with the current wretched job market on the New York stage.

Born in San Diego, White moved at age 3 to Austin, Texas, where her family owns a ranch (Nadine's drawl is, if anything, a milder version of the actress's own). After her performance in an Austin staging of *The Baker's Wife* resulted in that musical's first successful production, the show's creators, Stephen Schwartz and Joe Stein, urged her to try her luck in New York.

She made her New York debut starring in a doomed musical called *Lucky*

*Stiff*, which featured an onstage corpse ("It's shocking, SHOCKING, I tell you, that that show didn't run," White says dryly). Soon, however, she was landing better roles in such prestigious shows as the original production of *The Heidi Chronicles*.

Rave reviews won't pay bills, however, and in time White found herself joining the westward-ho movement with such stage colleagues as Christine Baranski (*Cybill*) and David Hyde Pierce (*Frasier*).

"I was the toast of New York in *Spike Heels* with Kevin Bacon and my take-home was \$167.50 (a week)," she says with a laugh. "And I'm a single mom. I had an apartment and a kid. I had a couple of commercials running—I always seemed to do OK. But now it's a moot point. I can be like Kevin: he can go do a play and the money is completely a sidebar."

Moving from East Coast theater to West Coast TV has been a frequently surreal experience for White and her former stage cronies.

"This is just weird," she muses. "David (Hyde Pierce) and I were doing a reading for Playwrights (Horizon, a New York theater company) of a new ... play, and the next thing you know, we're at the People's Choice Awards together. I said, 'Jeez, David, how did this happen? We really hit the jackpot, didn't we?'"

Under contract with *Grace* for at least five years, White says she seeks out work in projects such as local plays and TNT's recent *Heidi Chronicles* adaptation to make her sitcom coffee-sipping more palatable.

"It's a bit of a gilded cage, but it's not my whole life," she says. "If I do it for five years, well ... I can just try to do other things to keep my acting chops ready for when the opportunity comes."

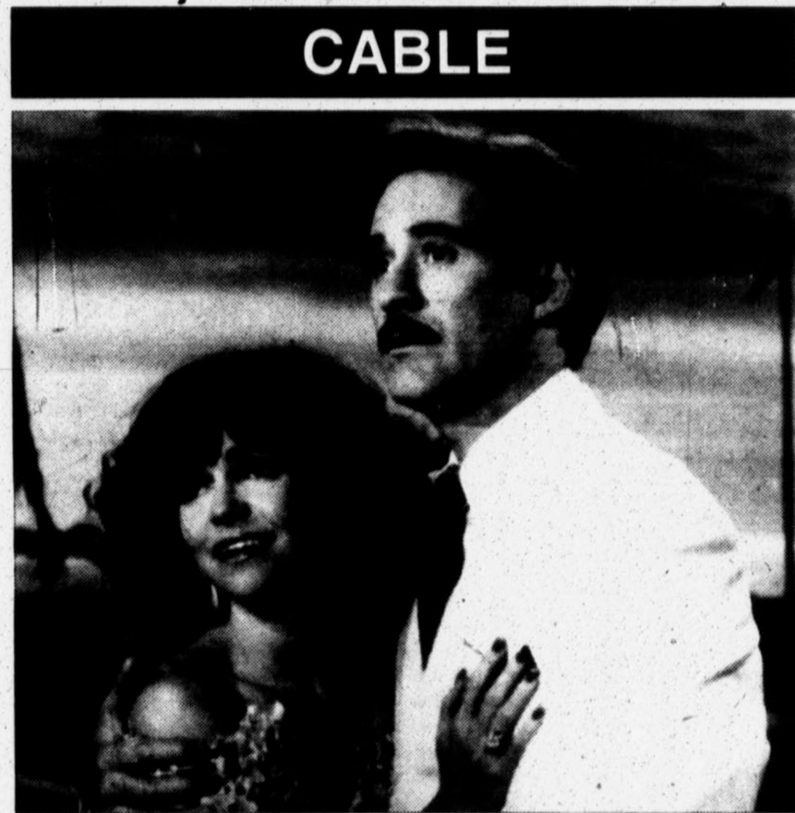

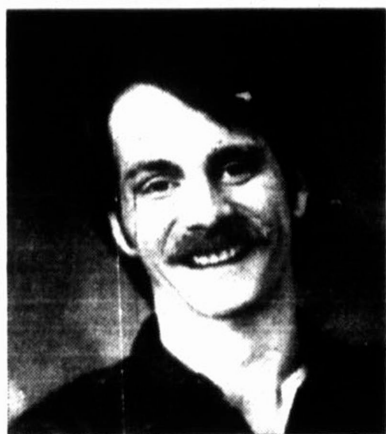

## Two PBS specials observe Black History Month

PBS observes Black History Month with two specials premiering Friday, Feb. 2 (check local listings).

First up, actress Lynne Thigpen (*Just Cause*) narrates A. Philip Randolph: *For Jobs and Freedom*, a 90-minute documentary profiling the labor activist and civil rights pioneer who lived from 1889 to 1979.

The famous 1963 March on Washington took some 22 years to reach the nation's capital. Organizers first planned the march to protest government hiring practices that excluded black Americans. President Franklin Roosevelt's executive order barring racial discrimination in the federal government led to the cancellation of the demonstration.

It was Randolph, the PBS special reveals, who persuaded Roosevelt that economics were the key to freedom for black Americans.

Weaving archival photos, film footage and interviews with filmed recreations of key events, *For Jobs and Freedom* allows scholars, colleagues and contemporaries to share their

viewpoints on this towering civil rights advocate. They also help analyze his leadership and accomplishments, from his youth in Florida through his formative years in New York to his assumption of leadership in the fledgling civil rights movement.

Immediately following on many PBS affiliates, five inspirational black artists are profiled in *African-American Artists: Affirmation Today*.

The half-hour special presents conversations with artists Leroy Almon Sr., Frederick Brown, Sam Gilliam, Lois Mailou Jones and Keith Morrison. Interviews in their homes and studios are interspersed with historical film footage to provide perspective on their interests, opinions and ideas, as well as illustrate how their cultural backgrounds shape their work.

Although their sources of inspiration and philosophies are diverse, all five artists share a deep belief in the power of their work, and work like theirs, to contribute to society and humanity in general. It is through their artwork that viewers will grasp the universality of this cultural experience.

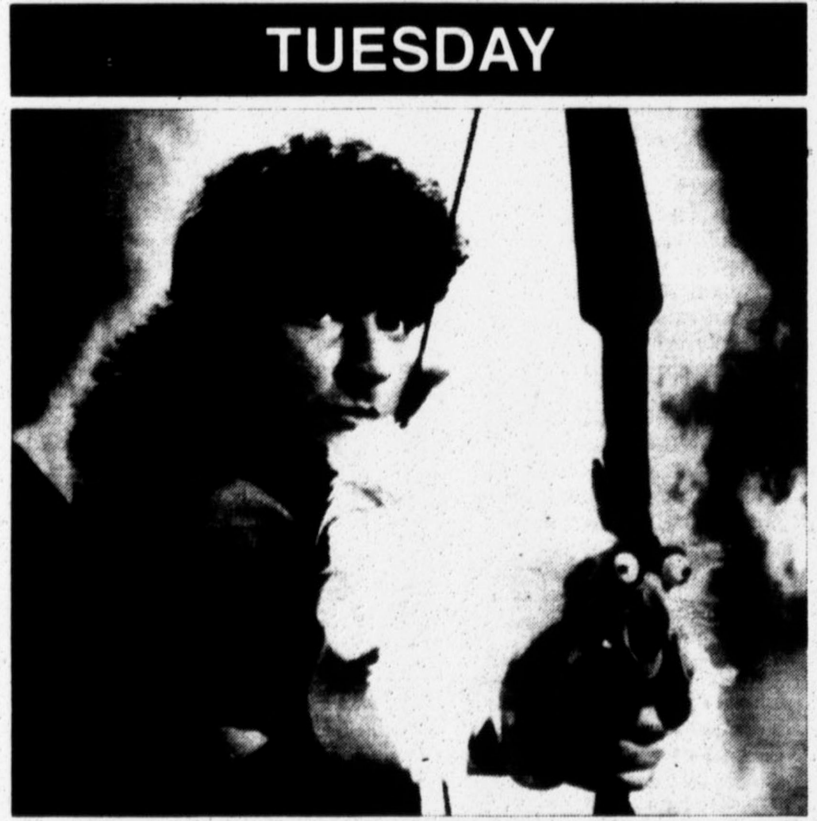



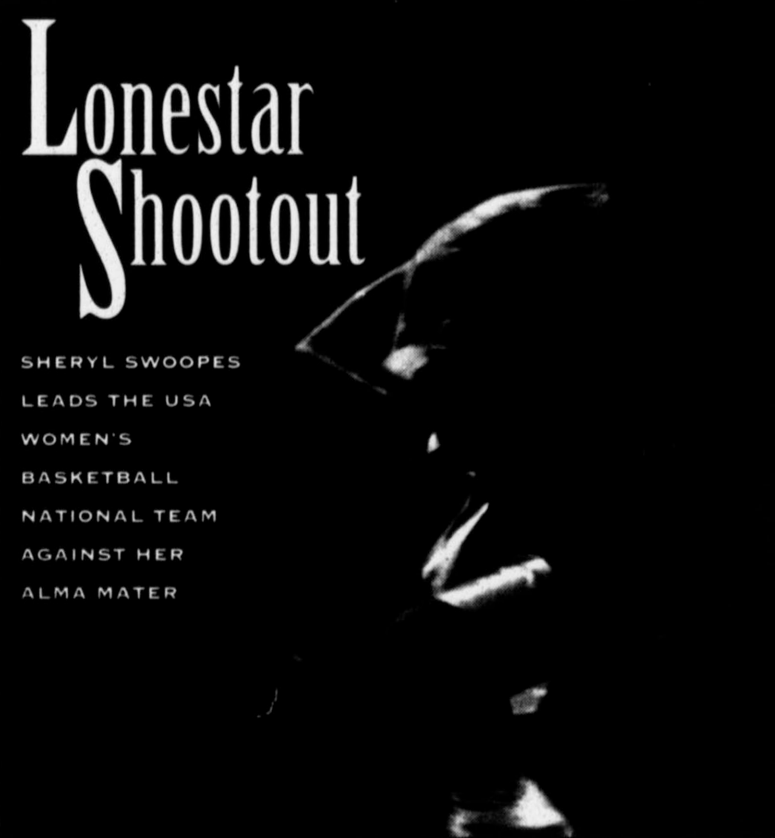
