Top tax bills revealed for city, county, school

Holly Sugar Corporation retained its place as the top taxpayer in Deaf Smith County in 1995, and there was little change in the "Top Ten" list provided by Deaf Smith County Tax Appraisal District.

Holly Sugar headed the list by a wide margin, with a total tax bill of \$640,675 and Frito Lay was a distant second at \$215,906. Holly's tax total actually figured \$750,684, but the company has advantage of a tax abatement plan which was approved for an major expansion.

The next eight, in order, were: Hereford Bi-Products, Southwestern Public Service Co., Hereford Grain Corp., Southwestern Bell Telephone, Barrett Crofoot Feedyards, Arrowhead Mills, Deaf Smith Electric Co-Op, and AT&SF Railroad.

The total tax bill from the appraisal district amounted to \$10,557,000. Jan. 31 was the deadline for paying local taxes. The top ten taxpayers accounted for approximately 17.7 percent of the total bill.

The list from the appraisal district actually showed the top 20. Number 11 was Transwestern Pipeline, followed by West Texas Rural Telephone, Natural Gas Pipeline, Bar G Feed Yard, Tri-State Chemicals, Cargill Inc., Southwest Feedyards, Sugarland Feed Yards, Cattle Town, and Farmer's Elevator of Dawn.

Temperature records fall as cold front refuses to budge

It was so cold in Peoria they brought the igloo inside.

Temperatures that had stood for a century tumbled as a deadly Arctic cold front refused to budge—forcing mercury readings well below zero for days at a stretch.

A banana froze hard enough to pound nails in Minnesota, criminals stayed inside in Kansas City, and students at Richwoods High School in Peoria, Ill., moved their igloo—building science project into the cafeteria to avoid frostbite. The temperature dipped to 18 below in Peoria early Saturday, breaking a

century-old record of 13 below.

"It's so cold, my eyelashes were freezing to my cap," said bicycle messenger Dean Davidson in Chicago, which Saturday morning set a record low for the date of minus 16.

Parts of southern Maryland were socked with a foot of snow overnight, and another foot was forecast for sections of the eastern shore. Washington, D.C., picked up 8 inches and New York City 6 inches.

Ice-laden branches pulled down power lines, cutting electricity to tens of thousands in the South. Freezing rain and sleet coated roads with ice, and heavy snow fell in a band from Oklahoma to West Virginia.

Subzero temperatures were recorded across the Plains, the Midwest and much of the South on Friday, freezing pipes, knocking out heating systems, silencing car batteries and closing schools in several states.

At least 17 deaths have been blamed on the severe weather this week, including that of a Tulsa, Okla., man believed to have Alzheimer's disease. He was found dead in a park a day after he drove away from his nursing home in a delivery van.

At least 12 people were killed in weather-related traffic accidents in the South.

The coldest spot in the country Friday was Tower, Minn., where the 60-below reading broke a 97-year state record, and that was without the wind chill. Someone even demonstrated how to pound nails with a banana.

Temperatures also plummeted to record lows for the date in Montana, South Dakota, Wisconsin, Nebraska, Colorado and Illinois.

It reached minus 24 in Spokane, Wash., breaking the old record of 19 below set in 1893, and it was 34 below zero in La Crosse, Wis., 2 degrees colder than the 1873 mark.

Rapid City, S.D., barely missed breaking its all-time low of 34 below, set in 1899, with a reading of 31 below.

Much of Texas joins frozen tundra ranks

After this weekend, Texans may not be a little more sympathetic when faraway parts of the country become snowbound.

Much of the Lone Star State has joined the frozen tundra ranks this weekend with a winter storm that doesn't seem likely to end soon.

Saturday's highs were expected to range from around 5 in the Panhandle to the 20s and 30s elsewhere, except for 60s in the Big Bend. Highs Sunday morning were expected to plummet to minus 10 in the northern Panhandle to single digits in North Texas to the 30s in the far west.

Snow was expected to give way to ice, increasing the chance for serious problems.

"The low (pressure system) is beginning to scoot off to the east. ... But the cold air mass that's coming in is just incredible," Mendy Moyser of Weather Data Inc., a private forecasting service, told The Dallas

Hereford and the area received another inch of snow from Friday to Saturday morning, totalling over 2.5 inches for the latest winter storm. Temperatures were predicted to inch up Sunday and the longrange forecast calls for warm weather by the middle of next week.

That meant the ice left Thursday and Friday by a winter storm should stick around through the beginning of the new work week.

Ice and snow affected roads in 87 of the state's 254 counties Friday, from Hudspeth County in West Texas to Shelby County in East Texas, said Mike Cox, a spokesman for the Department of Public Safety in Austin.

Most motorists took it easy on Texas highways, but accidents still were abundant, killing at least five people since Thursday.

Gramm's tax plan will be unveiled here

Hans Klingler, West Texas regional director for U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, will be in Hereford on Monday to unveil Gramm's proposal for a flat tax.

The meeting will be at 2 p.m. in the Community Center.

According to a news release announcing the meeting, Gramm's proposal would scrap the current income tax system in favor of a 16 percent flat tax.

Under the plan, a family of four making up to \$32,000 would pay no taxes. Incomes over that amount would be tax at the 16 percent level.

Deductions for mortgage insurance and charitable contributions would remain, while the standard deduction would increase from \$6,550 to \$22,000 for families, and the personal exemption for dependents from \$2,500 to \$5,000.

"I want to change the American tax system," Gramm said. "I want to adopt a simple tax system that has one rate, and I want it to apply to all income no matter how you earn it."

Gramm's plan is part of an overall economic proposal from the presidential and senatorial candidate that includes balancing the budget, holding increases in federal spending to the inflation rate and stopping new federal regulations for one year.

Voter application to end Friday; HRMC to host registration drive

Prospective voters in the March 12 party primary elections have until next Friday to apply in person for registration to meet eligibility requirements.

Applications postmarked no later than Feb. 12 also will be accepted for registration, said David Ruland, Deaf Smith County clerk and vote registrar.

At least one entity, Hereford Regional Medical Center, will promote voting by hosting a voter registration drive Wednesday.

Both Democratic and Republican Parties will conduct primaries on March 12. Both party ballots will list presidential candidates.

Early in January, Ruland said, 9,187 registration certificates were mailed to residents of Hereford and Deaf Smith County.

He said 1,123 cards were returned to his office because, by law, the U.S. Postal Service may not forward registration certificates. Returned cards indicate the address is no longer valid for the addressee.

Prospective voters who have moved since the last election are advised by Ruland to contact his office for a new application.

Names of those persons whose cards were returned are placed on a suspended list, he said.

The application for voter registration has been altered slightly since last year, Ruland said.

Persons applying must declare U.S. citizenship to be eligible, Ruland advised. Making a false statement on the application is a crime under state and federal law, he added.

Participation by HRMC in a voter registration drive is prompted, said Jim Robinson, CEO, by the knowledge in the health care industry that government policy makes a difference in care given.

"In a day and age when governmental policies play such a pronounced role in our lives, it is of utmost importance to be involved in the basic right and responsibility of voting."

Applications for registration will be available in the hospital board room from 7 a.m. to 8 a.m. and from 4 p.m. to 5 p.m., Robinson said.

Only one contest for a Deaf Smith County office is on the Democratic ballot for the March 12 election. No

Contests are listed on the GOP ballot.

In his bid for re-election, Sheriff Joe Brown is challenged by Fidel Reyna Jr., a former deputy on Brown's staff.

The winner of the primary will have an opponent in the November general election. Mike Morrison, who ran on the Democratic ticket for the office four years ago, is unopposed on the Republican primary ballot for sheriff this year.

County Commissioners Tony Castillo, Precinct 1, and Troy Don Moore, Precinct 3, and Margaret Del Toro, county tax assessor-collector, are unopposed in the Democratic primary.

On the GOP primary ballot are Wayne Betzen, candidate for the Precinct 1 spot, and Dan Hall, seeking the Precinct 3 position.

Since there is only one contest at the county level, interest in the March elections is bound to center on the presidential primaries to be conducted by political parties.

A number of judicial positions in Texas will be on ballots, but most of the state's top officials do not run this

Telemarketer random call here helps woman with broken hip

It isn't often that telemarketers making random phone calls get a chance to do something to help, but it happened Friday afternoon in Hereford.

Summer Sursa, administrative assistant for Crime Alert in Amarillo, said one her company's telemarketers, Laura Lomas, was making random calls in Hereford, trying to set up appointments for demonstrations of security equipment.

Lomas, Sursa said, called a phone number and reached Lillian Check, who asked Lomas to get help for her.

"She was just screaming for help," Sursa said.

Mrs. Check told her long-distance rescuers that she was suffering from pain in her hip.

Lomas kept Mrs. Check on the phone while colleague Richard Hunt called the Hereford Police Department and explained the situation to them.

At the police department, dispatcher Javier Frausto called Mrs. Check to confirm the information, then dispatched Hereford EMS to the scene.

Mrs. Check was taken by ambulance to Hereford Regional Medical Center for evaluation.

Lt. Bennie Barrick said the call from Crime Alert came in to the police department at 4:58 p.m.

He said Mrs. Check had been waiting for a visiting nurse to come to her house, but she received the call from Crime Alert before the nurse arrived, so asked them for help.

Sursa said police called her office later and told employees that Mrs. Check had broken her hip.

Dancer, choreographer Gene Kelly dies at 83

 LOS ANGELES (AP) - Gene Kelly, dancer and choreographer who brought his athletic grace and Irish charm to "Singin' in the Rain," "On the Town" and other great movie musicals of the 1940s and '50s, died Friday, his publicist said. He was 83.

"Gene died peacefully in his sleep this morning, his wife, Patricia, at his bedside," said Warren Cowan, his longtime publicist. He had suffered strokes in 1994 and 1995, and Cowan said he never really recovered from them. He died at his Beverly Hills home.

Kelly reigned at MGM in the postwar era, when the studio was the Tiffany of movie musicals. He also had serious acting roles and directed "Hello, Dolly!" and other films.

His most memorable dance was the title number of "Singin' in the Rain," in which he splashed joyously through puddles on a near-deserted street, his love for Debbie Reynolds rendering him oblivious to the wet.

Kelly was co-director as well as choreographer and actor in the 1952 film, a lighthearted look at the early days of talking pictures. In 1989, "Singin' in the Rain" was one of the first 25 films selected by the Library of Congress for its National Film Registry of significant movies.

Kelly's acrobatic dance style contrasted with the more elegant style of Fred Astaire, who began his film career a decade earlier.

"People would compare us, but we didn't dance alike at all!" he said in a 1994 Los Angeles Times interview. "Fred danced in tails - everybody wore them before I came out here - but I took off my coat, rolled up my sleeves and danced in sweatshirts and

jeans and khakis."

The pair danced together only twice: as two casual friends spouting clichés in "Ziegfeld Follies" (1946); and at the end of their dancing careers in a light-footed duet for "That's Entertainment Part II."

Kelly had more unusual dance partners in the 1945 film "Anchors Aweigh," sharing the screen with cartoon characters such as Tom and Jerry. The film, which also co-starred Frank Sinatra and Kathryn Grayson, won him a 1945 Oscar nomination as best actor.

Kelly choreographed many of his films and began taking more control by co-directing "On the Town" with Stanley Donen in 1949. He said it was his favorite film "because it was my first directing job and I loved it for the ground it broke." The story of sailors on leave in New York broke the mold by being shot on location.

Kelly and Donen combined again on "Singin' in the Rain" and "It's Always Fair Weather."

Kelly's most bravura performance came with "An American in Paris." He created the dances, climaxed by the 17-minute ballet with Leslie Caron to George Gershwin's music. The number cost \$500,000.

The film won the Academy Award as best picture of 1951, and Kelly was given a special award "in appreciation of his versatility as actor, singer, director and dancer, and especially for his brilliant achievements in the art of choreography on film."

Kelly always sought to elevate the art of dance in films. His first work as solo director was "Invitation to the Dance" (1956), which contained no dialogue.

"I've always held that you shouldn't underestimate the intelligence of the movie audience," he once said. "That's where Hollywood has made a mistake. I remember how everybody thought we were nuts to put that big ballet number in 'An American in Paris.'"

"We had a great group of people who were all very serious about making musicals an indigenous American art form," he said in 1994. "And we succeeded - of course, not without some yelling at studio heads."

Kelly began concentrating on dramatic roles and directing in the late '50s, particularly after a knee injury sidelined him from dancing for a couple of years.

"For a guy who had been dancing all his life, that was tough to take," he said years later. "But I began to realize there was something else I could do to make a living."

His nonmusical films included "Marjorie Morningstar," "Inherit the Wind" and "40 Carats." His films as director were limited: "Tunnel of Love," "Gigot," "A Guide to the Married Man," "Hello Dolly" and "The Cheyenne Social Club" (with Henry Fonda and James Stewart).

Kelly's last movie as a performer was the 1980 failure "Xanadu." Co-starring with Olivia Newton-John, he performed on roller skates, something he had done with his brother Fred 35 years before. More recently, he reminisced in the 1994 compilation film "That's Entertainment III."

Kelly was a successful Broadway hooper before he began his screen career. He made his Broadway debut as a dancer in the 1938 Cole Porter musical "Leave It to Me," which was notable for the hit of Mary Martin singing "My Heart Belongs to Daddy."

More Broadway shows followed: a revue "One for the Money," William Saroyan's play "The Time of Your Life" and Rodgers and Hart's "Pal Joey." Kelly's performance as the gold-plated heel Joey brought him a movie contract.

He made his film debut in 1942 with "For Me and My Gal," co-starring Judy Garland. With his high, reedy voice and his athletic agility, Kelly established himself as a musical star in "Dubarry Was a Lady," "Thousands Cheer" and "Cover Girl" (with Rita Hayworth at Columbia).

Even in those early years, Kelly took some non-dancing roles in films

such as "Pilot No. 5," "The Cross of Lorraine" and "Christmas Holiday" opposite Deanna Durbin.

After a stint in the Navy's Photographic Section during World War II, he returned to films with the tepid "Living in a Big Way." He resumed his stride with "The Pirate" (with Garland), "Take Me Out to the Ballgame" (with Esther Williams and Sinatra), "On the Town" and "Summer Stock."

Kelly appeared frequently on television and starred in one short-lived 1962 series, "Going My Way," based on the Bing Crosby movie.

Eugene Curran Kelly was born in Pittsburgh on Aug. 23, 1912. His mother, an actress, made him take dancing lessons as a youngster, but he was more interested in athletics and didn't take up dance seriously until high school.

"I was a little short then, and looking back I can see that it was pure self-aggrandizement," he once told an interviewer. "I wanted everyone to say, 'Gee, he's clever.' And they did, too."

While studying at the University of Pittsburgh, Kelly took part in campus musicals and entered talent contests in a dancing act with his brother Fred. After graduating in 1933 and a short try at law school, he

danced with his brother in second-rate theaters and nightclubs and helped out at his mother's dancing school.

"I found that I had a talent for teaching, that I liked it and that I was good with children," he recalled. "This eventually led to choreography: to be a good choreographer, you must be a good teacher."

Appearing in a revue in Pittsburgh, he was spotted by a dance director who brought him to Broadway.

In later years, Kelly was laden with honors, including a Lifetime Achievement Award from the American Film Institute in 1985 and the Screen Actors Guild achievement award in 1988.

Socially a convivial man, Kelly was a taskmaster on a movie set, alternating charm with flashes of temper. He kept his personal life private and often seemed uncomfortable with interviewers' questions. On his 80th birthday in 1992, he remained at a private vacation spot, releasing one comment: "It's only another round number."

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Eccentric Amarilloan faces lawsuit following allegations

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) - Even by Texas oil-man standards, Stanley Marsh 3 is a larger-than-life eccentric.

Self-proclaimed "United States Professional Fun Champion." A millionaire known to patch his suit with duct tape. And the mind behind the Cadillac Ranch, the Pop Art plot where 10 cars are partially buried, hoods down, like an automotive Stonehenge.

But the strangest thing about him yet may be allegations that Marsh traps teen-agers into working on his ranch by catching the boys stealing the offbeat signs he puts up around Amarillo. The signs feature subjects like dinosaurs, Mona Lisa, Marilyn Monroe and, in at least one case, the words: "STEAL THIS SIGN."

The 58-year-old heir to an oil and gas fortune is charged with kidnapping and aggravated assault, accused of threatening 18-year-old Ben

Whittenburg with a hammer and confining him in a chicken coop in 1994.

He is also being sued by Whittenburg's prominent family, accused of assault and invasion of privacy by taking pictures of the caged teen-ager and taunting him for months afterward.

"Until they started tangling, the weirdness has always been fun," says Marsh's lawyer, Charles Rittenberry. "The bottom line is, they both need to quit attacking or picking or whatever you want to call it."

There's nothing funny about it, according to the lawsuit Whittenburg's father, lawyer George Whittenburg, filed in August. It seeks an unspecified amount in damages.

The suit claims that Marsh ropes teen-agers into working for him by catching the boys with stolen road signs. Whittenburg also claims that Marsh pressures the young men into swimming nude at his Toad Hall ranch, and the lawyer has told

authorities about one 15-year-old who says Marsh molested him.

"I think power corrupts and absolute power corrupts absolutely," Whittenburg says. "Having grown up with the money he had, no one has ever told him no."

Friends of Marsh, who as chairman of Marsh Media Inc. owns KVII-TV in Amarillo, say the lawsuit stems from a longstanding rivalry with the Whittenburgs, who used to own the Amarillo and Lubbock newspapers.

They say Whittenburg sued and pushed for indictments because his conservative family doesn't like the flamboyant Marsh - and vice versa: "Messing with Ben Whittenburg is more of his antics and prank-like stuff," Rittenberry says. "No way

would he aggravated-assault anybody. It's just not in his nature."

Marsh is free on \$3,000 bail. He faces up to 20 years in prison if convicted of aggravated assault, and up to 10 years on the kidnapping charge. No court dates have been set on the lawsuit or the criminal charges.

Marsh declined to comment for this story. In his formal answer to the lawsuit, he denied "each and every, all and singular, the allegations made."

No one disputes that Marsh and two other men went onto Whittenburg property on Oct. 22, 1994, while Ben Whittenburg was sleeping in a van after a camp out. And no one disputes that Marsh made Whittenburg get out of the van, come to his ranch and

chase all the chickens but one out of the coop, then wired the door shut while a friend took pictures of the young man.

A ranch worker who came to feed the chickens about 15 minutes later found Whittenburg alone and let him out.

The lawsuit claims Marsh gave copies of the pictures to Whittenburg's schoolmates, then instructed them to take the pictures to school and tell Whittenburg to

autograph the photos or Marsh would press theft charges.

George Whittenburg says Marsh was angry about a road sign his son had stolen. The sign - depicting a red jackrabbit - was one of about 1,000 signs Marsh puts up as artwork around Amarillo.

Months earlier, Whittenburg says, Marsh had told Ben Whittenburg and other members of a church youth group that he did not mind if people took the street-side tributes.

Doomsayers aside, trends show growth

NEW YORK (AP) - Doomsayers get plenty of coverage by the media, in part because of their alarming thesis that there is no future in the future, only a stunning scenario of serial disasters.

"Why should they be believed?" asks Julian Simon. "They have been wrong for 25 years," a time period he later corrects to thousands of years during which they have proclaimed the coming of world famines and other calamities.

While doomsayers see terrible events ahead, trends pertaining to material human welfare improve rather regress. Life expectancy rises, childhood mortality falls, raw materials become more plentiful rather than scarcer.

Just about every material trend is in that direction, says Prof. Simon - production has increased and prices have fallen, the poor get richer even as the rich get richer, literacy has increased, pollution has declined.

Wrong as they are, year after year, says Simon, who teaches at the University of Maryland, the doomsayers catch the attention of the public while serious academic papers that foresee an improving future are ignored.

"Let them put their money where their mouth is," says Simon, who challenges them to form a team, put up \$10,000, as he has, and match forecasts on any of several trends, such as life expectancy or air and water quality.

The betting pool could eventually grow to \$100,000, depending on the number of categories, with all net winnings to go to nonprofit research chosen by the winner. Team Simon vs. Team Doomsayers.

"I'll bet my money and my reputation on my forecast that just about any trend pertaining to material human welfare will improve rather than get worse," says Simon.

He has had no takers. "They don't want to deal the cards," says Simon, who is an experienced bettor, having won \$1,000 from Prof. Paul Erlich and two associates in 1990 on the prices of certain raw materials. Erlich's group said prices would rise between 1980 and 1990; Simon said they would fall.

Later, he challenged Erlich, Lester Brown and other doomsayers to put their cash and names on the line, but received only one response, a \$5,000 bet with Roy C. Ward of Prospect, Ohio, on the world's per-capita cereal output.

The \$10,000 challenge was made this month simultaneously with publication of "The State of Humanity," a collection of 58 essays by 64 distinguished authors, mainly academics, who believe things are getting better.

Asked if a bet of that size wasn't risky for an academic, Simon replied with the "can't lose" assurance of a gambler who knows the odds are in his favor. He suggested that the chances of losing were infinitesimally small.

Simon, a prolific author of population economics book and many books on other subjects, is editor of the "The State of Humanity."

The contents are likely to be reassuring. Among Simon's most important long-run predictions, "contingent on there being no global war or political upheaval," are these:

- People will live longer lives; fewer will die young.
- Families all over the world will have higher incomes and better standards of living.
- The costs of natural resources will be lower.
- The environment will be healthier - the air and water will be cleaner - because as nations continue to get richer, they will increasingly demand

more cleanliness as one of the good things wealth can buy.

Inherent in all he says and writes is another prediction: No matter how wrong they might be, doomsayers will continue to doomsay.

Herd cagers have no trouble sweeping Borger

The Hereford girls' basketball team pressed Borger to death in the third quarter Friday night in Whiteface Gym.

The game was tied 26-26 at halftime, but seven minutes into the third quarter, Hereford led 53-28. That's a 27-2 run. In seven minutes, the Herd more than doubled its point total from the first 16 minutes while holding Borger without a field goal.

The end result was a 71-43 blowout win for the Lady Whitefaces in their final home game. In the second game of the doubleheader,

Hereford's boys routed Borger 66-48.

"That was great pressure defense. We got our points off of turnovers," Herd girls' coach Eddie Fortenberry said of the third quarter. "Coach T (Loy Triana) said on the bench they had seven straight possessions where they didn't get it past halfcourt."

"We told the kids as the press goes, so goes our offense," Fortenberry said. "We've got to score off our press."

Hereford had six different players score during the 27-2 run, including 12 points by Misti Davis. Borger's two points were free throws by Holly

Forrester to end a 13-0 Herd run.

Borger hit two baskets in the final minute of the third quarter to make the score 55-32. The Lady Bulldogs never came closer than 21 points in the fourth quarter.

"This was a fun night for the seniors," Fortenberry said. "We really wanted them to enjoy it, and they did."

Even though Borger was the team that spent two-plus hours driving through snow, it was Hereford that started cold.

Borger finished the first quarter with five straight points for a 10-6 lead. The Lady Bulldogs pulled off a 7-0 run early in the second and led 19-10.

Hereford woke up and outscored Borger 16-7 in the remainder of the second, tying the game at 26-26 on Julie Rampley's free throw.

"It was the realization that they'd better start playing," Fortenberry said of the turnaround. "It hit the kids: 'Hey, we're in trouble here.' The emotion and intensity really picked up."

The Hereford girls wrap up their season Tuesday at Caprock. There won't be any playoffs for the team despite a sparkling 21-5 record. The Lady Whitefaces lost two games each to District 1-4A powers Canyon and Randall Canyon (11-0, 26-0) clinched the district title with a 44-24 win over Randall Friday.

"We definitely want to thank everybody for supporting us, because this group, they appreciate it," Fortenberry said. "They put a lot of

time and effort into it, so come and see their last one (at Caprock)."

The Hereford boys, who have three games left and a shot at the playoffs, improved to 7-2 in district and 18-9 overall.

Hereford came out hot, with Brian Torres scoring six straight points for an 8-2 lead. A Johnathan Keenan three-pointer helped Hereford led 14-9 at the end of the quarter.

"Early in the game we got some steals and converted them into points," boys' coach Randy Dean said. "That got us off to a fast start, then as the game settled in, we did a real nice job of executing in the half-court. We scored a couple of baskets on real nice Hi-lo entry passes with our post players feeding each other, then closed the half out with good perimeter shooting."

Hereford slowly stretched out the lead throughout the second quarter. Keenan hit two three-pointers in the final minutes of the half, including one with one second left for a 39-22 lead.

The third quarter was the Michael High Show. The senior post scored all 13 of Hereford's points in the quarter, while Borger scored only 12 points.

"They threw a zone defense at us to start the half, and we did not do a good job with ball movement," Dean said. "When you stand around against the zone, it causes you problems. Fortunately they had a hard time matching up with Michael. He got them off of rebounds, in transition and in the half court offense."

The large Hereford crowd got an assist at the end of the third quarter.

As the ball bounced away from a Borger player in the backcourt, the crowd, especially the students seated at courtside, counted down "3...2...1..." about four seconds ahead of the clock. The Borger player panicked and tried a length of the court shot, which landed well short with more than a second left.

Hereford got the lead as high as 62-36 in the fourth quarter, but a late Borger surge made the final score 66-48.

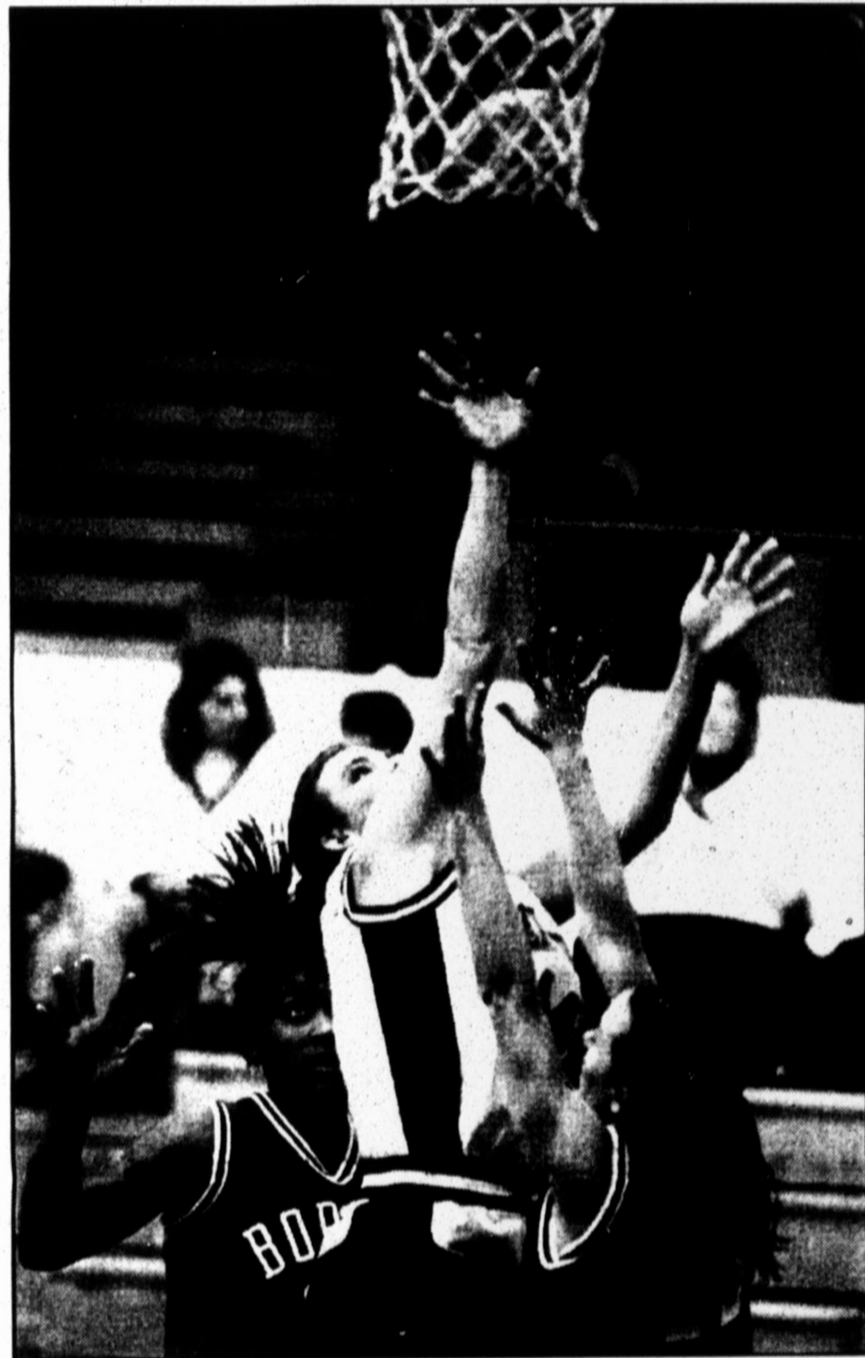
the boys with 17 points.

In the JV girls' game, Hereford doubled Borger's point total, winning 54-27. Sarah Ramey poured in 21 points for Hereford.

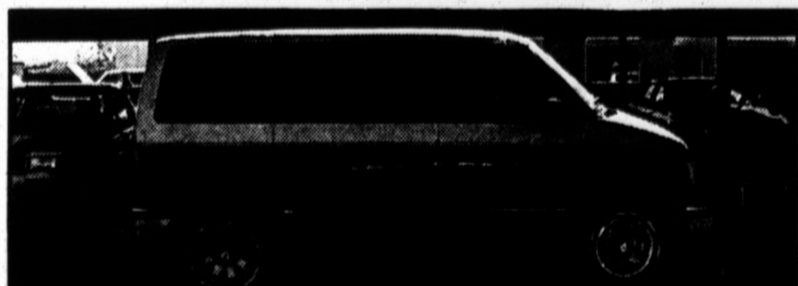

Seeds of progress

Local seed industry touted as one of the largest in nation

Known for its wide variety of agricultural enterprises, Deaf Smith County can boast as being among one of the biggest seed trade areas in the United States.

Over 95 percent of the seed produced and processed in the county is shipped domestically and abroad. Bringing in revenue from all parts of the world to Deaf Smith County.

The seed trade has continued to be a stable industry for the county for at least half a century.

Deaf Smith County has the best climate and conditions for seed production. It is dry enough to produce high yields but has the proper amount of growing days to produce sorghum seed, sorghum sudan grasses, open pollinated and hybrid millets, wheat, millet and more.

As farmers move the season to the north and then further south the season is long and hot.

The industry not only provides jobs for those directly involved in the seed companies, it indirectly involves chemical companies through seed treatments, insecticides and herbicides, machinery dealers who provide equipment for cleaning, sizing, production and harvesting equipment, seed analysts and the producer farmer.

Leaders in the industry are pioneers that began the seed trade business in the 1940s and 1950s. Ira Scott, Charles Garrison and Art Stoy are among those pioneers.

The industry has branched out in the county to Scott Seed Companies, which were founded in 1944 by Ira Scott and operated under the same name.

After the establishment of Scott Seed, many others followed suit and the seed trade in this area has remained strong.

In the late 1940s and 1950s, certified seed growers and producers and marketed seeds under the guidelines of the state and federal seed laws.

The Texas Seed Trade Association, which was established in 1963 is probably the most active state seed association in the United States," said Mr. Art Stoy, longtime seedsman and Hereford resident.

In 1982 The Texas Certified Seed Growers Association merged with TSTA and became the research and development branch of the association. Hereford can also say that out of the 61 presidents of the TSTA, five have been Hereford residents. The latest being Temple Abney of Agri-Pro Seeds.

Elected to the association throughout the years are George Warner, 1973; Armon Lauderbach, 1979; Wayne Richardson, 1982; Art Stoy, 1986; and Larry Richards, 1997. Richards is currently serving as first vice president and will replace Abney in 1997.

Honorary memberships have gone to the late Dr. I.M. Atkins, 1986; Art Stoy, 1989; George Warner, 1994; and Hugh Clearman, 1994.

Certified seed production was encouraged by companies producing registered seed from which Certified Blue Tagged seed is produced.

Certification was a practice developed to ensure that customers receive pure seed -- or as pure as humanly possible.

To accomplish this, seed standards were set by regulations. Field inspections are mandatory for growers of the seed.

Processing, handling and machinery processing are also under strict guidelines.

Through the years, sophistication of the seed trade has become more prevalent. Plant breeding and genetic engineering have become the norm.

High technology has not, however, changed the need for regulation of certified seed.

Deaf Smith is home to eight wholesale companies. According to Stoy, others have come and gone throughout the years.

"I know most people do not realize how much revenue is generated by the seed trade industry," said Stoy. "We are a very big part of the economy of this county."

According to Stoy, 120 people are permanently employed in the local seed business and there are 800 temporary employees.

That makes permanent annual salaries approximately \$3 million and temporary salaries \$2.5 million. A total of \$5.5 million annual income for employees of the seed business.

Stoy pointed out that acreages grown mainly in Deaf Smith and surrounding Panhandle counties are hybrid grain sorghum, 15 thousand acres which generates approximately 2 million, 50 pound bags which sell at retail for \$30 million.

Hybrid forage sorghum, such as hybrid Sudan grass and forage sorghum used for hay and grazing are grown on approximately 30 thousand acres which equal 3.5 million units with a value of \$50 million.

Wheat, small grains, millets and grasses are produced on about 30 thousand acres at a value of \$30 million.

These numbers reflect the huge economic value the industry has in the county.

"Seed and the seed industry has a great impact on Hereford, Deaf Smith County, and for that matter, nearly all immediate surrounding communities," said Stoy.

Family-owned seed company celebrates 50 years of service

Recently acquired by third-generation seedsmen and celebrating 50 years of service, Scott Seed of Hereford has remained one of the leaders in the seed trade industry.

Founded in 1946 by one of the pioneers of seed production, Ira Scott, the small family-owned firm continues to market a variety of seed.

Scott and his wife, Leona Fay, came to Deaf Smith County from a family ranch near Happy. He set up a farming and ranching operation in Deaf Smith County and soon followed with a seed company.

During his years of farming and ranching he was known for his conservation techniques and played an active part in the Soil Conservation District and was also a supervisor in the Deaf Smith County Wind Erosion District.

He received various awards for his work in conserving the counties natural resources.

The first location of Scott Seed was on Chalk Hill near Summerfield. Scott then moved the business to Hereford in 1957.

Betty and Gary Kriegshauser, his daughter and son-in-law, bought the business in 1971. They recently sold the business to their two sons, Colby and Chad.

"We are signing the papers today," Kriegshauser said last week. "I've always told the boys they could have the same opportunity that I have had."

When the company first began, Scott grew open pollinated milo. He soon found seed was generating more money than grain, so he switched his production to include seed.

He started bagging seed in 100-

pound burlap sacks and distributed them to the southern parts of Texas. Scott's business grew to include the first hybrids in the county.

When Kriegshauser began working for Scott in 1965, seven people were employed by Scott Seed.

"Mr. Scott taught me everything there is to know about the seed trade business. He knows this business," Kriegshauser said. "I couldn't have asked for a better mentor or father-in-law."

Kriegshauser said when he came to work for Scott Seed, everything was done by hand.

The changes in the industry have been small through the years, said Kriegshauser.

"Now we have fork lifts and auto baggers," he said. "We can do all the work ourselves. It's just the three of us."

Scott Seed cleans, treats and bags seed produced by its growers. The majority of their seed is grown in Deaf Smith County.

"Only 1 percent of our product stays in this county," he said. "The other 99 percent is shipped to all parts of the United States and abroad, including such places as Italy, Brazil, Old Mexico, Greece, Egypt and Chile."

The majority of their seed is sorghum Sudan grasses, open pollinated Red Top Cane, wheat and triticale.

Being a small, family-owned company is an advantage in the market place, according to Kriegshauser.

"We can produce a better product at a lower cost," he said. "We can compete with anyone."

Kriegshauser said he has been hearing for the last 20 years that the small family seed companies were

going to be obsolete. But, he said, he never believed it.

"We take care of our customers," he said. "If we see a problem, we take care of it right away. There is nothing shipped out of here that we haven't looked at."

Bigger companies, however, may not know about a problem until a customer complains.

Family activities can also be centered around the business.

"When we work, we work hard," said Kriegshauser. "But, we can take a day or two off in the slower season."

Kriegshauser said the biggest advantage to working in a small family business was being able to have his sons around him -- and he put them to work as soon as they were able.

"I think working down here did wonders for them," he said. "It kept them off the street."

Colby Kriegshauser has recently taken over marketing for the company.

"Colby is really good at selling," said Kriegshauser. "He can move five times more seed than I could."

Colby concentrates on the hay grazer market and Chad has taken over the wheat market.

The secret to the success of the firm, says Betty Kriegshauser, is the strong foundation and commitment that Ira and Leona Scott started with.

"Try and keep it simple and be a good listener," she said. "There has to be some form of trust, love and compassion for every person you meet."

Betty said this formula has somehow passed through three generations and maybe a fourth if her grandchildren become interested.

"I think we need to listen to the pioneers of this community -- they have a powerful message," she said.

Producers waiting for farm bill; partisan fighting blocks action

WASHINGTON (AP) — Farmers looking for planting guidance from Congress have three weeks to wait after partisan fighting shot down hopes of having a farm law passed this week in the House.

The Senate, meanwhile, hoped to have a bipartisan compromise ready for a vote next week. The compromise would give farmers some money independent of crop prices, but with additional payments unless crop prices fell. The experiment would last three years instead of seven.

The lack of a program will hinder some growers' abilities to borrow money or decide which crop to plant.

But because heavy demand will mean high market prices for corn, wheat and other major crops, a government signal may be less important than usual.

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman has said he will use his powers to announce a rice program by Feb. 15. The department says it would waste time and money to implement an outdated, expensive law that will kick in for the wheat and corn programs if no agreement is reached by March.

Despite last-ditch efforts, House Agriculture Committee Chairman Pat Roberts, R-Kan., could not get a vote. "This is not in the best interest of our

farmers or ranchers," he said, blaming Democrats.

Democrats insisted on rule that requires a three-day wait between committee approval and a vote by the whole House. "We could easily do a farm bill next week," said Rep. Harold Volkmer, D-Mo., trying to embarrass Republicans for taking their scheduled break. They return Feb. 26.

Next Tuesday is when Senate leaders from both parties hope to have a compromise bill ready for a vote. Thursday's Senate negotiations began after Republicans failed 53-45 to limit debate on their original farm bill proposal.

That means the Democrats could have blocked a final vote. Thursday's vote also meant Republicans could blame Democrats for blocking a bill. Democrats say Republicans should never have put the original plan in a budget-balancing plan that they knew President Clinton would veto.

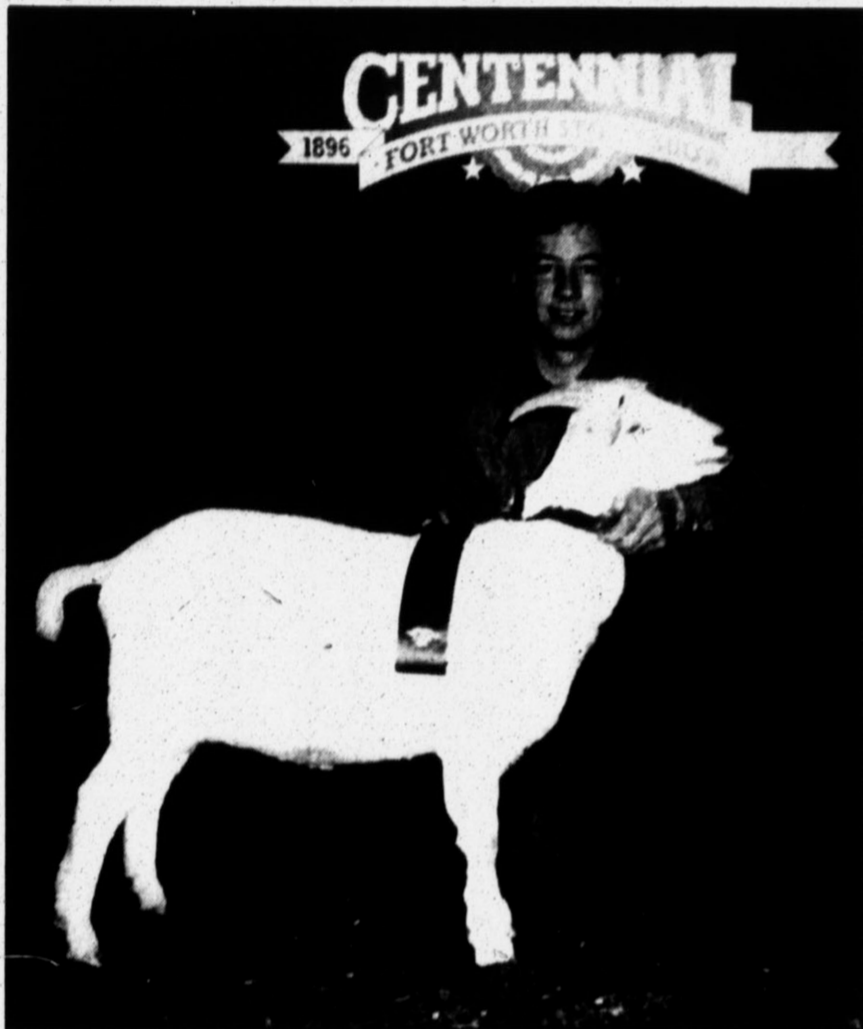
The original House and Senate plans called for an overhaul of decades-old crop programs by ending subsidies that move up and down with prices. Instead, farmers would get guaranteed payments that declined over seven years, with the future of farm programs to be determined later.

Democrats, led by Minority Leader Tom Daschle, D-S.D., fought that idea.

Under the compromise, farmers would get a 40 percent payment in advance of the harvest, with the payment somehow based on past subsidies.

The remaining 60 percent would depend on actual prices, just as current subsidies do. The compromise would also contain conservation and nutrition provisions sought by Sen. Patrick J. Leahy, D-Vt., in a previous effort at compromise. Those would last seven years.

Senators will have to iron out differences between their bill and what emerges from the House.

Water management course to be offered

West Texas A&M University will offer a five-week course on water management from 7-10 p.m. on Mondays beginning Feb. 5.

The course will focus on the basic principles of water conservation and water use efficiency. These principles

apply to both dryland and irrigated conditions, particularly where the irrigation water supply is limited.

It is intended for farmers, county agents, resource conservationists, crop consultants and other professionals interested in maximizing the use of rainfall and limited irrigation water resources.

Stewart is nationally and internationally known for his research work and was a member of the 1990-93 Committee on Long Range Soil and

Water Policy, National Research Council, National Academy of Sciences.

One hour of college credit, either under graduate or graduate, can be obtained for those interested. The course may also be applicable for continued education units for crop consultants of other certified professionals. Cost of the course is \$48. The deadline for registration is Thursday.

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When Dr. James Dobson speaks, candidates listen

EDITOR'S NOTE - James Dobson, father of Focus on the Family, the avuncular radio voice for thousands seeking guidance, has timely advice for presidential hopefuls: Keep right; judgment is nigh. Third-party strategists are listening. Stay tuned.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) - James Dobson, the folksy founder of Focus on the Family, has earned the trust of millions by quietly dispensing his prescription for troubled times: family values and the Scriptures.

Now Washington is listening, too. Dobson has met with every major Republican presidential candidate. He has warned party leaders - and the Christian Coalition's Ralph Reed - that if they stray from strict moral values such as opposition to abortion, they stray at their peril.

"We are not campaigning for anything and I am not a political figure," Dobson says. "Our purpose is not to aggrandize ourselves or project ourselves into the public arena."

"But," he says, "I do have very strong beliefs and moral values which are being discussed and being decided in the political arena. So that takes us into that area in the marketplace of ideas."

Few would deny Dobson's reach. About 5 million Americans tune in to his weekly Focus on the Family radio program broadcast by more than 2,500 stations worldwide. Moreover, about 8,000 letters and 3,400 telephone calls pour into the Focus on the Family offices here every day.

The vigor of his organization is equally apparent. Dobson founded Focus on the Family 19 years ago in a two-room office in Arcadia, Calif. Today it employs 1,300 and has annual revenues of \$100 million, mostly from donations.

Many listeners seek comfort and prayer in dealing with personal matters, substance abuse, sexual and marital problems and the like. But just as many listen to his radio shows, read his newsletters and are well aware of his views on abortion, child pornography and prayer in schools.

"People don't need me to tell them who to vote for; they can figure that out on their own," Dobson said. "They do want me to talk about these moral issues and articulate the things they care about."

Dobson says he has warned GOP Chairman Haley Barbour and others that compromising conservative views - such as opposition to abortion - could mean losing the support of Christian conservatives. He believes a third party could emerge, he said.

"There are a lot of people out there that ... have very deep convictions and concerns (about their families)," Dobson said. "Most of our representatives in Washington don't know they're out there ... but they're out there by the literal millions, and they are becoming more and more politically active."

Barry W. Lynn, executive director of Americans United for Separation of Church and State, says that in his view Dobson's friendly, paternal, nonthreatening image makes him "a more powerful religious figure than ... even Pat Robertson."

"People were listening to him when he was simply giving grandfatherly advice and now when he's getting political. ... They're familiar with him," Lynn said. "He started out talking to people in times of personal crisis and has

turned those people into a gigantic political mailing list." Dobson's audience, responding to his views on certain issues, can jam fax machines and clog phone lines in Washington. The abortion issue prompted

Dobson to consider a hiatus from Focus to run an anti-abortion rights campaign. He decided against it. "But if the choices are ultimately Clinton and Gore, and the Republican candidates are pro-choice, or weak on pro-life issues," said Paul Hetrick,

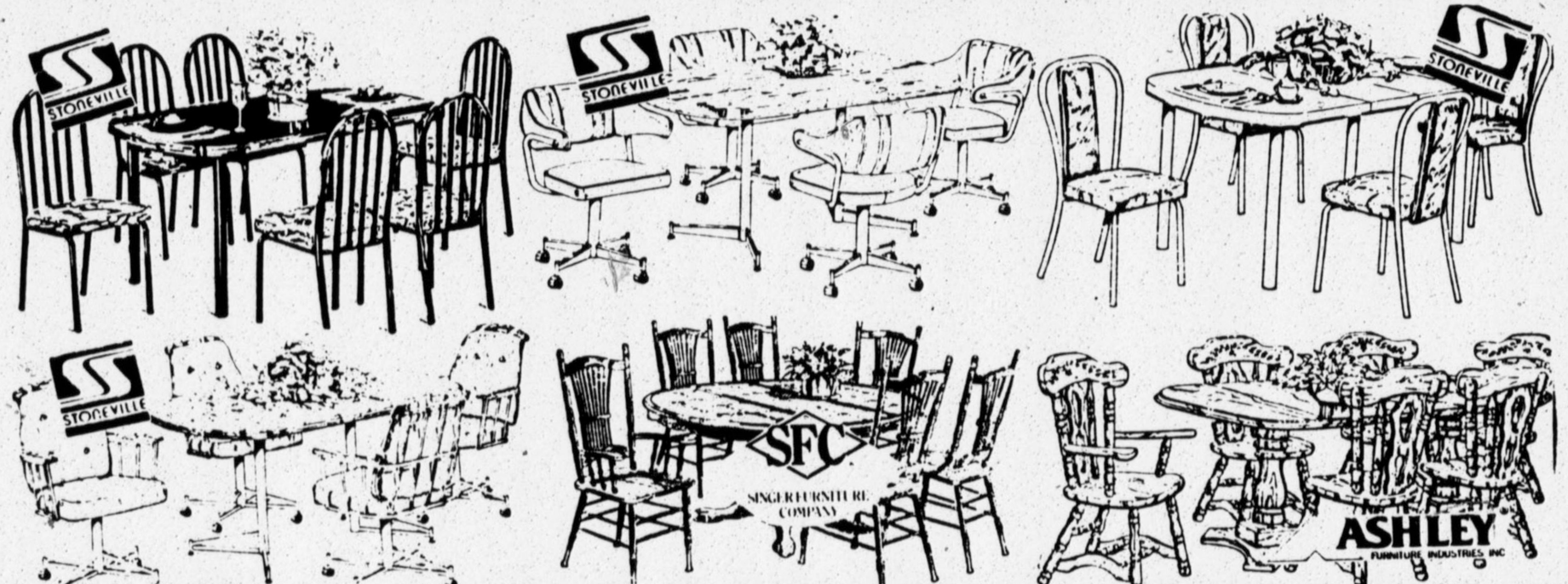
Focus on the Family spokesman, "then that could prompt him to reconsider." The response to Focus on the Family has surprised even Dobson. (See DOBSON, Page 11A)

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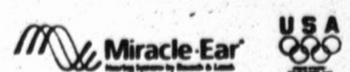


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Jell-O production smells cause controversy

WOBURN, Mass. (AP) - A few years ago, a lobbyist offered to help state Rep. Carol Donovan visit the big, four-smokestacked factory off Route 93, a few miles north of Boston.

When Donovan appeared as scheduled, she was told she would not be given a tour. All she saw was the inside of a conference room.

"If there's nothing going on, why are they so protective and why are they keeping everyone out, and why are they so suspicious?" she asked. "It makes me suspicious of what's going on."

What is going on is not nuclear fission or top-secret weaponry. What's going on is Jell-O.

For the past 75 years, at the Atlantic Gelatin plant in Woburn, workers have been making the stuff that wobbles, wiggles and jiggles, the stuff of America's Jell-O molds and Jell-O shots.

Here, in a plant that often emits odors, they make Jell-O. Just don't ask to see how.

State Rep. Paul Casey, a Democrat who represents the neighboring towns of Winchester and Stoneham, was invited several years ago into a conference room to speak with factory officials.

"It was like entering a concentration camp," said Casey.

Repeated requests for a plant tour by The Associated Press were refused.

"We generally don't give tours of the plant to anybody because what goes on in our plants we consider proprietary," said Nancy Daigler, spokeswoman for Kraft Foods.

"We are a food company and keeping things very sanitary are of utmost importance to us," she said.

Daigler later accused a reporter who tried to visit the factory of trying

to "sneak into the plant" behind one of the many trucks that pass through the factory's gates.

The reporter had heeded an 8-foot fence, signs reading "STOP" and "no trespassing" and a security guard who said to turn around.

Obviously, this factory, with its trim landscaping, American flag blowing in the breeze and sprawling brick building, is not easily penetrable.

Animal rendering is at the heart of the Jell-O manufacturing process. And for years now, some residents of the stable, working- and middle-class communities near the plant have been complaining that Atlantic Gelatin stinks up the neighborhoods.

Gelatin is made from the hide trimmings of cows and pigs, not from their horns, hooves or meat.

First, the skins are washed and bathed in hot water to remove the collagen. Once extracted, the collagen is soaked, filtered and purified, converting the collagen to gelatin, said Kraft spokeswoman Cathy Pernu.

The gelatin extract is then evaporated and dried, and sent along with flavored powders to Dover, Del., and San Leandro, Calif. for packaging.

Oils that are left in the hot water baths are sold for pharmaceutical and industrial use. Any remaining solids are removed and sold as compost.

As the hides are washed in large 70-foot vats, bits of fat, hair and skin come off into the water, said Mary Persky, an environmental analyst with the state Department of Environmental Protection and one of the few outsiders who has seen the inside of the plant.

"The water's dirty and smells like dead animals," she said.

The plant does not emit odors all the time, she said, and when it does, the smell is more likely to be of the

fruity variety. Sometimes, she said, especially when the weather is warm, the water in the vats goes septic, sending a rotting smell through the surrounding hills.

NEW YORK (AP) - When supermodel Tyra Banks leaves a trail of broken hearts, she delivers the bad news via answering machine.

"It's very detached - a phone thing," the 22-year-old Banks says in the February issue of GQ magazine. "I'm always saying to myself, 'Let it be an answering machine! And don't return the call!'"

What leads Banks to leave such messages?

"I'll meet a guy and think he's a thrill, go out for, you know, a month - then find out he's a creep and drop him," she says.

Banks doesn't discuss her current dating situation.

"I won't talk about that," she says.

Just ask Carolyn Thorne, who lives about a mile from the factory, downwind. Thorne, 53, grew up on Jell-O. She doesn't eat it anymore.

For the last decade, Thorne has complained too often to count about

the odors. She objects to the sweet smells, but the stink of rendering is worse: "It's like if you leave a piece of fat out in the sun too long."

Then there's a third smell - a deodorant. "But it's as disgusting as the fat smell," she said.

After years of complaints, the DEP issued a 1992 order of compliance that forced Atlantic Gelatin to change some of its operating procedures.

Kraft's spokeswoman, Pernu, said the plant, which employs about 270 people, spent in the "multi millions" to address the problems. "We're doing everything we can to make sure we're a good neighbor," she said.

Things improved for a while, Thorne

said, but the smells returned. "If you have a month or so of odor-free air, you get that false sense of security. And then one night, you'll smell it and you'll say 'oh my God it's back,'" she said.

Persky admitted that the odors still are problematic. She agreed that Atlantic Gelatin has worked hard to comply with regulations.

"Nothing is ever going to be perfect," she said.

And not everyone is disgruntled. Don Sweeney, who has lived in Woburn for about half his 82 years, lives just a short walk from the plant. He said he likes the fruity smells that reach his home.

"I think it's like having a deodorizer for the whole neighborhood," he said.

who remembers doing a "scary thing" when he left a teaching job at the University of Southern California to open the Christian ministry in 1977.

"I saw the institution of the family beginning to disintegrate and the values that I believed in begin to wobble," said Dobson, who is not a minister, but holds a Ph.D. in child development.

Dobson had gained notoriety in the early 1970s with his book, "Dare To Discipline." The book emphasized parental authority, advocated spanking, drew a surge of media attention and became a best seller.

When others were urging permissiveness, Dobson espoused a return to the "traditional values and understandings that our grandparents didn't debate and didn't have to question... deeply felt spiritual values and roots."

The approach struck a chord, remarks Dobson. Since then millions have turned to him when troubled.

"Obviously the family is in serious trouble and people are hungry for those traditional values and the how-to principles that we believed in," Dobson said. "We just made it available to people and the response is overwhelming."

Dobson is a graying, bespectacled 59-year-old who sounds like a proud father as he talks about the people he has influenced.

He personally greets some of the thousands of visitors at his Colorado Springs offices and can work a room like a politician - kissing babies, administering hugs, shaking hands. Last year, more than 100,000 people visited the modern, three-building campus with its panoramic view of Pikes Peak and the Rampart Range.

The Focus operation, staffed by smiling, name-tag-wearing employees, resembles a cross between a crisis hot-line center and Santa's workshop. In one area, a troop of employees, most with college degrees, responds personally to calls and letters. They consult a computer database containing Dobson's views on a huge array of issues when writing responses.

The few critical cases that require

more serious attention are shunted to one of the dozen or so trained counselors on the premises.

Stacks of books, magazines, videotapes and audio cassettes - on drug abuse, money matters, sexual awareness and myriad other subjects - rise to the ceiling in a warehouse. Workers send them to those who have written or called. There is no charge, but donations are suggested.

In the visitors center, an interactive computer center and a reproduction of a soda shop from one of Focus' children videos create a kind of Disneylike attraction for youngsters.

For people like Kay Jordan of El Paso, Texas, Focus on the Family remains a friend to turn to in times of need.

"When somebody gets to that point when their whole world turns upside down, the people you want to turn to first are the people who are going to pray for you, especially if you are a Christian," said Jordan. Focus on the Family was "at the top of list because I knew how genuine they were."

"The whole purpose is to be a friend," said Dobson. "The people out there are desperate for friends. Focus on the Family has established itself as a friend that can be trusted."

Researchers at A&M facility boost Mother Nature

WESLACO, Texas - They tamed the fiery jalapeno. Cut out an eye from the South Texas onion and sweetened it up. They toughened up the melon and straightened out the carrot.

Some might call it playing God, but researchers here prefer to think of it as giving Mother Nature a boost.

For more than 70 years, scientists at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Weslaco have helped keep farming a viable industry in the Rio Grande Valley. One of the country's largest off-campus university agricultural research facilities, the center has brought international recognition to this city of 26,000 people for its work in revolutionizing American's food.

In 1972, researcher Ben Villalon introduced the TAM1 mild jalapeno and brought mass appeal to salsa, kicking off a multimillion-dollar industry. Originally, the idea of taming the three-alarm jalapeno was ridiculed; Villalon even got a Bum Steer Award from Texas Monthly magazine back in the early '70s. Today, though, the mild variety Villalon developed is the industry standard.

And then there's that onion. Marvin Miller was part of a team of researchers responding to the public demand's for a sweeter, more manageable onion with one core. What happened was the now famous 1015 onion, developed by cross-breeding different varieties. Today, the 1015 is the centerpiece of the annual Onion Festival in Weslaco.

Miller's success in keeping the lucrative melon industry alive in the

face of fungus and pests has captured the attention of farmers and scientists around the world.

A former military outpost set up to battle bandits along the border, the research station opened its doors in 1923 to help the agricultural industry produce a safe, inexpensive and plentiful food supply.

Today, the research station can measure its success in dollars and cents. The 1015 onion, released to growers in the early '80s, today is a \$30 million industry in the Valley, generating an additional \$60 million for the economy in spinoff from the fertilizer, equipment, seed and other related businesses. It produces nearly one-third of all revenue for the region's total onion crop, according to the experiment station.

In addition, the station's breakthroughs in melon diseases and pest control buttress the area's \$70 million melon industry, which generates an additional \$210 million from related businesses.

The center's scientists say they now face a challenge as rapid urbanization sweeps the Valley, eating up thousands of acres of farmland each year and bringing with it close scrutiny of the farming industry's impact on the environment. Some 14 scientists and more than 85 support staff conduct plant experiments on the 100-acre site at the northwest corner of Farm-to-Market Road 1015 and Business Highway 83 in Weslaco.

"Agriculture is shifting very rapidly," researcher Jim Dunlap said. "The traditional kinds of activities we've conducted over the last 30 years are starting to go.... We've had

to add on a new dimension that really deals with the expanding urban population."

Responding to the public's demands, scientists at the station here are focusing their research on developing more environmentally friendly crops that require less land and are better for you. They're looking into developing fruits and vegetables packed with higher dosages of vitamins, which also last longer on the shelf and require less pesticides and water in the field.

Future generations may find themselves munching on vitamin-packed maroon carrots, enjoying a burn-free sugar cane crop, or buying a cantaloupe that lasts almost two weeks before starting to rot.

Texas A&M researcher Leonard Pike developed the maroon carrot through a Darwinian process of crossing only carrots with an unusually high content of Vitamin A. The vitamin gives the carrot its rosy look. Besides bearing one of the Texas A&M school colors - maroon, of course; the other is white - the carrot is believed to reduce the risk of cancer.

But researchers warn it is no sure bet. They still do not know if such a crop could withstand the area's weather conditions; how economically feasible it is to grow; whether consumers will like it; or if it can be sustained over a number of years without disease and pest problems.

Scientists also are experimenting with a sugar cane breeding and molecular program they hope will lead someday to a cane that sheds its own leaves. That would eliminate the need for burning the cane, resolving a longstanding battle with environmentalists concerned about air pollution.

Texas A&M researcher Jim Irvine, based at the Weslaco center, consults sugar cane growing regions in Brazil and other parts of the world. He is the first scientist on the globe to successfully transfer genes in sugar cane.

The center also is expanding its research into the viability of a local medicinal herb and plant industry, and an orchid business. Its extension service now includes programs that teach colonia residents about pesticide safety; train low-income women to sew to help their job prospects; and develop innovative ways to use wastewater to grow crops.

Researcher Dunlap, a former pharmacist, is studying medicinal herbs and plants grown in India, China and other parts of the world to see which plants, if any, could be grown in the subtropical Valley to supply not only local health food stores but the nation's medical industry as a whole.

"We need to start looking at a lot more smaller, high-value crops that limit the resource input, limit the chemical input," he said. "I think in

the future you're going to see small pockets of agriculture in the Valley that are very highly diverse and will be underneath the main crops of citrus, cotton and sugar cane."

Another alternative crop for the Valley under research is the orchid. Yin-Tung Wang, a Taiwanese scientist, has developed a method for Valley farmers to propagate the beautiful moth orchid. Researchers also have learned how to force the

exotic flower to bloom by adjusting the light, temperature and other treatments, so it can be ready for Mother's Day and other holidays.

The center's director, Jose Amador, a native Cuban who came to the Valley in the mid '60s to help revive the sugar cane industry after falling world prices and bad weather wiped it out in the 1920s, said one never knows which way the agriculture industry will turn.

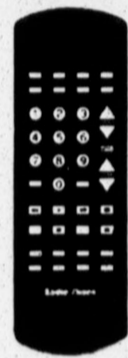
But one thing is certain: Despite

rapid urbanization here, agriculture will find its niche, and the station's scientists will be at the ready, advancing farming for the next generation.

Researcher Dunlap said things are changing for the agriculture business, and they can't just sit back and wait. "We have to get ready for that now," Dunlap said.

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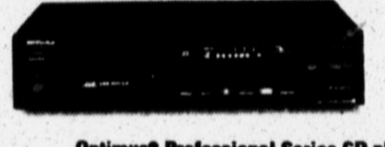

I had been out of the building most of the day, so I missed several calls. When I finished practicing with the German-American choir, a teacher friend told me my name was in Stars and Stripes, the newspaper for the Armed Forces. I said, "Yeah, right!" and laughed. She elaborated, "You are in Ann Landers' column, and I am not kidding."

I insisted that I had never written to you, but my friend asked, "Did you meet a lady on a plane who adopted a child from Russia?" I couldn't believe my ears. I bought the newspaper at once and read all the details.

Ann, that couple did such a good

job with their little girl. By the time we arrived in Atlanta, most of us DID know about that sweet family because whenever her new mother needed to leave for the rest room, the baby would scream. She was otherwise very well-behaved.

I wanted to express my appreciation to the adoptive parents for what they had done, but I had only a few seconds because the plane had landed, and I needed to secure my luggage, go through customs and make my connecting flight. So I handed the little girl her first \$20 bill.

I am planning to come to the United States soon and hope to arrange a visit and see for myself how that little girl is doing. Because of your column, I have received letters from all over the world. Friends I haven't seen in 20 years have written. Many do good deeds every day and never get recognized. You will never know how many lives you touch, Ann. I am honored that someone remembered my moment of thoughtfulness.--Bea McGraw, Weisbaden, Germany

DEAR BEA: And now, because of this letter, you are going to hear from even more people. How nice! Your 15 minutes of fame is going to last a lot longer. Since your letter reached me, I've heard about your visit with that little girl's family. Watch for a follow-up soon.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: My husband, to whom I have been married for 12 years, left me--not for another woman but for his brother.

Five years ago, "Steve" and I rescued "Herman" (who was living in a van) and invited him to stay with us temporarily. Herman has an income from a lawsuit and works for a man who pays him under the table. He is on the run from the Internal Revenue Service, as well as the welfare department, for back child support.

Herman now rents a room near us,

She has one son, Bob Kinsey of Amarillo, and three grandchildren.

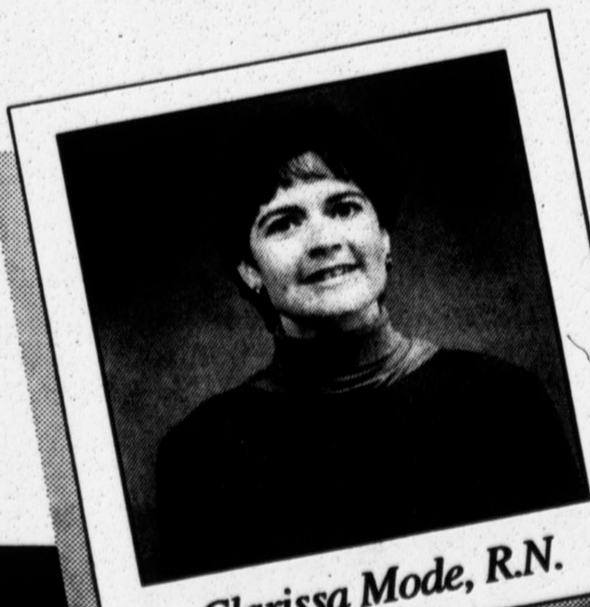

Extension News

A personal property inventory, also referred to as a household inventory, is a record of everything you own. It generally contains a description of the item, model and serial numbers, the purchase date, purchase price, and the cash value. Why would you keep a record of what you own? There are several very good reasons:

1. A personal property inventory is a valuable record in the event of fire, theft or other loss. If you were to lose everything you own in a fire, could you remember everything you lost? Probably not. Insurance claims people estimate that clients filing a claim only remember about half of what was lost or stolen.

Take two minutes to write down everything in your wallet or purse

without looking. Now, open your wallet and purse and see how accurate you were. If you had trouble remembering what was in your wallet, just think how much trouble you would have remembering everything in your house!

2. If you had a record of your personal property, all you would have to do is refer to it when filing a claim. You can also use a personal property inventory to determine how much insurance coverage you need. If your personal property inventory indicates your belongings to be worth \$25,000 you should have personal property insurance for at least this amount. If you only have \$10,000 of coverage you are underinsured.

3. A personal property inventory can help you calculate your net worth more accurately. Your net worth is the value of all your property minus the amount of your liabilities--what you owe others. The value of your personal property from your inventory can be used in your net worth statement. It is a much more realistic figure than just guessing what your possessions are worth.

4. A personal property inventory can also be used to assist you in your estate planning. Knowing exactly what you own can help you decide how you want it distributed following your death.

Next weeks article will give details on how to conduct a personal property inventory.

MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

STARING OUT THE WINDOW

"When I worked in the corporate world years ago, I heard a story about a man named Smith. Smith was a longtime employee, but his fellow workers weren't sure what his job really was. He spent most of his time staring out the window.

One day several disgruntled employees approached the company president and suggested that she should fire Smith. "We've never seen him do any work," they complained. "You could save the company a lot of money by letting him go."

Their remarks made the president smile. She said, "I couldn't fire Smith. He's one of our most valuable employees."

"But, all he ever does is stare out the window!" One of the

co-workers grumbled.

"Smith isn't staring out the window, he's thinking," the president explained. "Last year, Smith thought of a way to save our company more than \$400,000 in production costs. This year he's already come up with two new products, and found a way to reduce transportation costs by \$75,000. He's not staring out the window, he's making and saving money."

Time for thought

Today's business environment leaves little time for creative thinking. Small business owners and corporate managers often find their days consumed with urgent matters and activities. They seldom have time to think and plan. This results in short-term problems that demand immediate action, and often require more attention later.

Today's fast-paced, highly-competitive conditions are creating more overworked, highly-stressed men and women. Some can handle the pressure, whereas others burn out or bail out.

One difference I've noticed between these two groups is that those who are handling the pressure, are apparently taking time to think. One successful business owner told me that when his business begins to stifle him, he goes for a drive. He has a 25-mile route that takes him out into the rolling Pennsylvania countryside. In the quiet of his care-away from customers, employees and telephones - he thinks his way through his problems.

Another busy executive uses the early evening time to catch up on her thinking and planning. "When everyone else goes home, I get my best work done," she said. "I divide my work into three lists: That which must be done before I leave, that which I want to finish tomorrow, and other work of less importance and urgency."

My best creative thinking time is early in the morning. I use the

first hour or two before my co-workers arrive to get a head start on the day. I often find that when I get off to an early start, I accomplish more than I'd planned.

The benefits

There are many benefits of setting aside some quiet time for thinking and planning. Here are a few I've found:

- You can often find little problems before they become big problems. Little problems are more easily solved, so use your quiet time to anticipate them.
- You can accomplish more important work when you identify critical tasks. Use your thinking time to prioritize your activities.
- Constant pressure contributes to stress and tension. Use your quiet time to relax and let emotions cool, then you can step back into responsibilities with renewed vigor.
- Exercise can also lower stress levels. Some busy folks combine their thinking time with a walk or other forms of activity.
- Every problem has more than one solution. Use your thinking time to list possible solutions. You may find the best solution incorporates two or three ideas.
- Planning is an important element of any business. You can use your quiet time for short-term planning or organizing long-term plans. You may profit from time just spent staring out the window.

This design satisfies the functional requirements of a smaller site, while maintaining a sense of comfort. Entrance is from a wide country porch into a large two story great room. The deluxe kitchen with island sink and snack bar is efficient by design. The dining area is completely open to the kitchen and is well lighted by an expanse of glass, taking in the outdoor panorama. Sliding glass doors lead to a rear covered porch and provide side and rear yard access. Stairs up to the loft and bonus room are nearby. A laundry area provides passage to the side entry double garage.

Continuing back from the great room you will find the bedrooms of the home. Two family bed rooms share a central hall bath and each is indicated with a closet behind bi-fold doors. Linen storage and utility closets are provided in the central hall.

The master suite is an almost square room, providing ease in furniture placement. A true stand out is the luxuriously large walk-in closet. An optimum garden bath

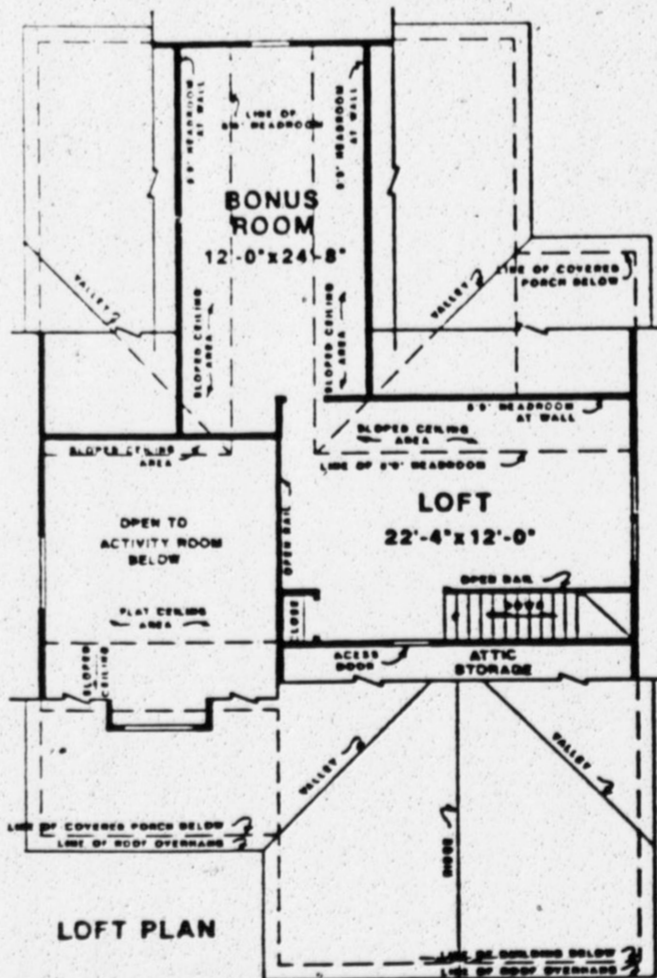
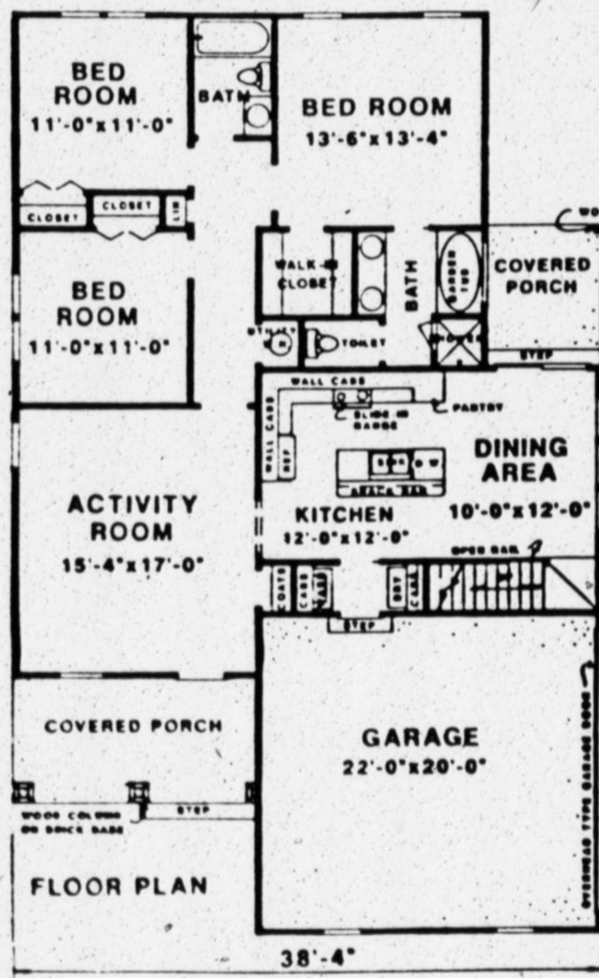
is full of little extras like a double vanity, separate toilet compartment and both garden tub and shower stall.

A loft is upstairs. It features an open rail stair overlooking the great room. Adjacent is a large bonus room which could be finished off at a later date, adding square footage when you need it.

The exterior is cottage type with a combination of brick and horizontal siding. The roof has multiple gables and a small dormer with arch top window providing extra light for the great room. The plan is furnished with crawl space or slab foundation and includes 1,376 square feet of heated space on the first floor and 311 square feet of space in the loft. The bonus room adds an additional 287 square feet.

Danson heads all-star cast in dazzling *Gulliver's Travels*

Can an acknowledged 18th-century literary masterpiece draw a large audience in a *Dumb and Dumber* world?

NBC is gambling that the answer is yes, as the network turns over four hours to a dazzling adaptation of *Gulliver's Travels*, premiering Sunday and Monday, Feb. 4 and 5.

Two-time Emmy winner Ted Danson (*Cheers*) stars as Dr. Lemuel Gulliver, an English physician whose faith in himself and his society is shaken to its roots during an involuntary nine-year journey.

Mary Steenburgen, also known as Mrs. Danson, stars as Mary Gulliver, who must decide whether her distraught husband's fantastic tales of floating islands and talking horses should consign him to Bedlam.

The two-part NBC movie marks the first time all four parts of Jonathan Swift's dark, biting 1726 novel have been committed to film (*The 3 Worlds of Gulliver*, a well-known 1960 feature starring Kerwin Mathews, covered less than half the book).

Danson admits the monumental scope of the project gave him pause, and he initially questioned the wisdom of casting an American in a role that seemed quintessentially British. Then he realized his character is left shattered and disillusioned by his ordeal.

"Gulliver is definitely this man without a country, this man who is completely dislocated from reality," Danson explains. "Basically, this is a man who is just turned totally upside down. By the time he is finished with his travels, he is this total frantic, nervous wreck who has completely rejected humanity."

"In a funny way, it was good to be away from your home, surrounded by things that aren't familiar, by people

who have shared the same history and jokes," he adds (the project was filmed in England and Portugal). "They'd know who was funny four years ago, and I'd never heard of that name; all the jokes and references went over my head. It was kind of good to be dislocated like that to play the part."

A visual treat for children, with special effects by Jim Henson Productions, *Gulliver* also is provocative entertainment for adults. Simon Moore's sophisticated screenplay is remarkably faithful to Swift — including the scene in which a sozzled Gulliver extinguishes a fire in tiny Lilliput by using the readiest source of water at, um, hand — while imposing an ingenious unifying story line on this episodic novel.

As the movie unfolds, the action shifts fluidly between the outlandish cultures Gulliver visits and the world of 18th-century England, where doctors and judges are trying to determine whether he is mad.

The final product is an eye-popping, mind-teasing feast for the entire family, acted to the hilt by a cast that also includes Sir John Gielgud, Omar Sharif, Alfre Woodard, Geraldine Chaplin, James Fox, Edward Woodard and Peter O'Toole.

The prospect of acting with O'Toole, his idol, intimidated the former *Cheers* star at first.

"Then I delighted in the realization that, when we are on screen together, he will be 6 inches tall and I'll be 60 FEET tall!" Danson says with a laugh. "I think that satisfied my ego."

"I truly cannot tell you how amazed and delighted I am by this production," he adds. "I usually have a tough time with stuff that I'm in. I unequivocally think that this is a brilliant piece of work."

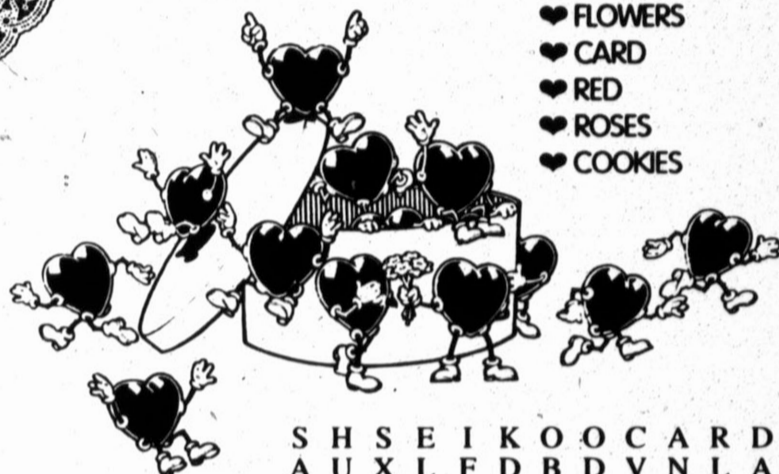

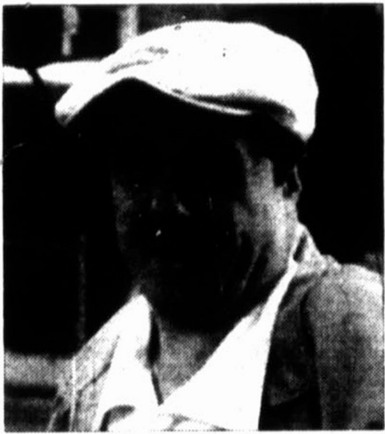

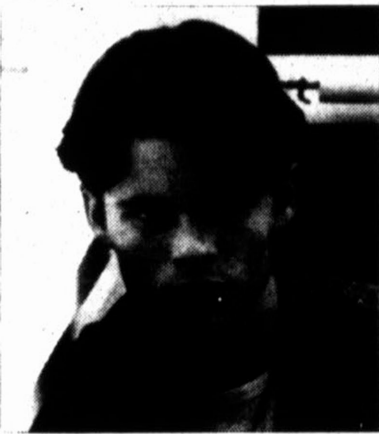

Week on PBS offers hot zone, hot seats, heated debates

Maybe nothing can put a permanent chill on the commercial networks touting their February "sweeps" programming, but PBS is hoping viewers will warm to a variety of special offerings scheduled for this week. (Check local listings for air dates and times.)

On Sunday and Monday, Feb. 4 and 5, *Masterpiece Theatre* airs the conclusion of the wicked political satires *House of Cards* and *To Play the King*. Ian Richardson gives his hail and farewell as Frances Urquhart, the Machiavellian prime minister, in *The Final Cut*. As amoral as ever, Frances has made a lot of enemies, and they are not about to ignore him. Everyone who ever has had a nasty boss — or been one — will love it.

Tuesday, Feb. 6, brings two documentary highlights. First, *Nova* presents "Plague Fighters," a report from the front lines of last May's Ebola outbreak in Kikwit, Zaire. The town, says producer Ric Esther Bienstock, has "no sewer system, no electricity, no running water, no television, telephone or newspaper."

The film's medical consultant, author and surgeon, William T. Close, estimates that two or three new "killer" viruses are discovered each year.

"My concern," he says, "is that a lot of these diseases... are breeding in cesspools of poverty."

"We're living in a very small world, and with modern transportation we can't be isolated from anything."

Then on *Frontline*, "Murder on Abortion Row" shows the repercussions for the pro-life movement from the killings of two women in clinic attacks by an anti-abortion activist.

The week concludes with a political road show as moderator Ken Bode takes the Friday, Feb. 9, edition of *Washington Week in Review* to Iowa to take the pulse of the presidential campaign there just days before the state's precinct caucuses.

Later in the evening Bode returns with *Iowa '96: A Washington Week in Review Special*, 90 minutes of reporting from the trenches and cornfields.

"Historically Iowa starts the winnowing of the field," Bode notes. "Somebody is going to drop out after Iowa."

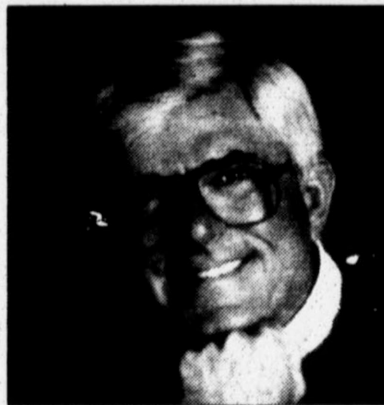



We always have many people playing dominoes and other table games, quilting or visiting. We would love for you to be a part of the indoor activities at the Senior Center these cold, windy days.

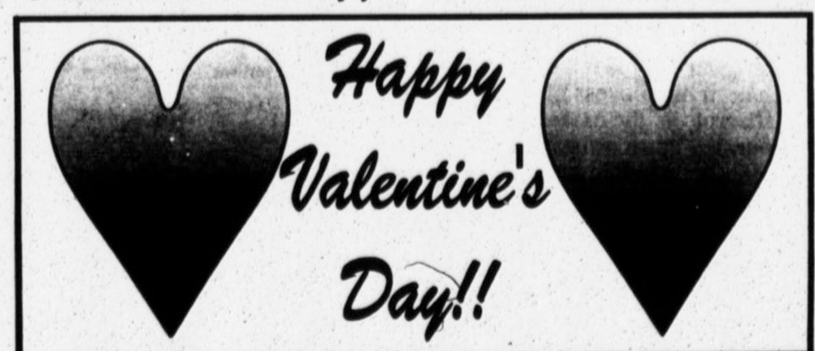

Nutrition Notes

Energy is defined as the capacity to do work or to produce a change in matter. When used in nutrition, the term energy deals with the chemical energy locked in foodstuffs because of the chemical bonding present in the nutrients. It also deals with the human body's requirement for energy to maintain life and work.

"What is a gram? How is it measured?"

This question has been ASKED several times during the past month.

The total caloric content (total energy) available from a food can be measured by means of a device called a bomb calorimeter, which consists of a closed container in which the food is burned while the container is immersed in a known volume of water. The weighed food sample is burned in an oxygen atmosphere by igniting it with an electric spark. The rise in temperature of the water after ignition of food can be used to calculate the heat energy or calories generated.

Each food has a specific caloric value: that is, a given amount of food will yield a certain number calories when it is burned or when it is metabolized in the body, and the caloric yield depends on the composition of the food in terms of protein, fat, carbohydrate and alcohol.

The amount of heat produced per gram of purified samples of protein, fat, carbohydrate and alcohol burned in the bomb calorimeters as follows: 1 gm. of protein 5.65 kcalories ...value given for practical purposes=4

1 gm. of fat 9.45 kcalories ...=9

1 gm. of carbohydrate 4.10 kcalories ...=4

1 gm. of alcohol 7.10 kcalories ...=7

Since the body is not completely efficient in the process of digestion and absorption, the extent to which the ingested nutrient is available to the cells, or its digestibility, is of importance. Normally about 98 percent of carbohydrate, 95 percent of the fat and 92 percent of the protein is absorbed.

A gram is a unit of weight or mass; 28 grams weigh about one ounce

avoidpoids. The avoidpoids weight system uses a pound containing 16 ounces. It is important that one realizes that a gram which can be measured in a laboratory on specific scales can not be measured in the home; in other words a gram cannot be measured in the usual circumstances like one would measure an ingredient in a recipe, it cannot be defined as unit of cup or spoon measurement.

The basal metabolic rate (BMR) is the minimum amount of energy needed by the body at rest in the fasting state. It indicates the amount of energy needed to sustain the life processes: respiration, cellular metabolism, circulation, glandular activity and the maintenance of body temperature. Basal metabolic rate may range between 0.8 and 1.43 kcal/min. depending upon many factors. The resting metabolic rate (RMR) is the energy expenditure under similar conditions except after eating or exercise. Because the conditions for measurement are not

as strict as with BMR, the RMR is more frequently measured and used.

A person's RMR is greater than the BMR and would include one or more of the many factors that raise BMR.

Factors that affect BMR: surface area, sex, age, body composition, endocrine glands, and pregnancy. Secondary factors that affect BMR: nutritional status, sleep, fever, muscle tone and exercise.

A adequate diet is composed of the various nutrients that the body needs for maintenance, repair, the living processes, and growth or development. It is a diet that meets in full all the nutritional needs of the person.

There is no ideal diet, since such a diet is a matter of individual requirement. Besides nutrition principles, the adequate diet will also reflect the availability of foods, socio-economic conditions, taste preferences, food habits, age of the family members, storage and preparation facilities, and cooking skills.

SOCIAL SECURITY QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q: I was talking to an employee benefit specialist at work, and she told me that Social Security has a financial planning service. I don't understand the connection between Social Security and financial planning.

A: Social Security is not in the financial planning business. However, we can offer you a free Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement to help you in your financial planning. To get your free Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement, call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213.

Q: I'll be 65 this year and plan on retiring. I know I'll be eligible for Medicare when I turn 65. Will my wife who also will become 65 this year, but who has never worked, be eligible for Medicare?

A: Under certain conditions, your spouse can be eligible for Medicare on your work record. Contact our toll-free number (1-800-772-1213) or the Amarillo Social Security Office for detailed information.

Q: I called Social Security and asked if Medicare pays for nursing home care. The representative explained that Medicare does help pay for "skilled" nursing care, but not for "custodial" care. I'm confused. Can you explain the difference between the two types of care?

A: Custodial care is the kind of care usually associated with long-term nursing home stays. It includes help with walking, bathing, dressing, eating, taking medicine, etc. Custodial care can be safely provided by people without skilled medical training.

Skilled care is care provided by a Medicare-approved skilled nursing institution that specializes in skilled nursing or rehabilitation services. This care can be provided or supervised only by licensing nursing personnel or professional therapists.

Q: Do I call Social Security or my bank to sign up for direct deposit of my monthly Social Security check?

A: To sign up for direct deposit, call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, any business day between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. The representative will ask for your Social Security number, your address, and the name of your bank and your bank account number.

Q: I am a divorced woman, age 62, and I plan to apply for Social Security benefits. My ex-husband has remarried and has young children. Can I qualify for Social Security on my ex-husband's record?

A: Yes, if you are at least age 62, unmarried, and were married to him for at least 10 years, you may be eligible for Social Security on the record of your ex-husband. The benefits you receive will not affect any benefits that may be payable to his present family. If your ex-husband is not yet receiving benefits, you must have been divorced for at least two years to qualify for benefits.

Social Security

If you're 65 or over and don't have Part B Medicare coverage, you'll have a chance to sign up for the Part B medical insurance coverage during the 1996 annual enrollment period, according to Jim McDaniel, Social Security manager in Amarillo.

Every year, the government offers a three-month open enrollment period from Jan. 1 to March 31.

"This period is to give you a second chance if you didn't enroll when you were first eligible or you dropped your coverage in the interim," said McDaniel.

If you enroll during the current sign-up period, your coverage will begin July 1, 1996. For 1996, the cost for Part B coverage is \$42.50 per month. Most delayed enrollees pay a 10 percent surcharge for each year they could have been enrolled but weren't.

Part B coverage, also "medical insurance," helps pay for doctors' care, outpatient hospital visits, and other medical services.

People are offered the option of signing up for Part B at the same time they are automatically enrolled in

Medicare's Part A program. Part A helps pay for inpatient hospital care and certain other services.

People who want to sign up for Part B Medicare coverage should call the Amarillo Social Security office or call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. any business day.

"The lines are busiest early in the week and early in the month, so it's best to call at other times," said McDaniel.

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Time does little to erase greatness of Arcaro

Dominating jockey reflects on life as he nears 80th birthday

EDITOR'S NOTE - He was the greatest jockey of his era; some say of all time. Eddie Arcaro, at 80, reflects on highlights of a remarkable career. The writer, also retired, has known the jockey since his days as an AP reporter.

NEW YORK (AP) - They pinned three nicknames on him: Banana Nose, Heady Eddie and The Master. The third was what the other jockeys called him. They held him in awe.

Eddie Arcaro, the king of race riders for almost 30 years, the big money booter, the guy with the winning touch when the stakes ran high, will celebrate his 80th birthday on Feb. 19.

As ever, he is taking the weight of all those years in stride. He expects to observe the day as he observes every day, with a round of golf - if it doesn't rain. Eddie has mixed feelings about rain.

His brilliant career, and his life, very nearly ended on a muddy track. As it was, he rode for two more years before he called it quits, in 1961. He had turned 45 and had a page of the record book all to himself. Some of his records have been eclipsed over time but no other jockey has come within a furlong of Arcaro's record in Triple Crown races. He won 17.

The ride that nearly cost him his life was a Triple Crown event. It was at the Belmont Stakes in 1959 on a muddy track. As an Associated Press reporter, I saw it happen.

The Belmont is a relentless run of a mile and one-half, once around the spacious oval. Eddie rode Black Hills, a long-striding colt and the second choice to Sword Dancer, the eventual winner.

Arcaro had Black Hills in third or fourth place behind Sword Dancer for the first mile, the position he wanted. In the middle of the stretch turn he sent Black Hills up along the rail with a flashing move that seemed certain to carry the colt into the lead.

Then the left front leg of Black Hills snapped, sickeningly. The horse went down and the jockey went flying. Eddie landed face down on the sloppy track. Two horses charged up from behind and one of them struck Arcaro a glancing blow in the head.

"I was unconscious," he recalled recently. "I was drowning with my face in a puddle. Only one man was nearby, a photographer. He ran out on the track and lifted me up. He saved my life."

The view from the stands was chilling. In my AP report, I wrote: "Arcaro was sprawled grotesquely on the track, a rag doll in a mud puddle."

Arcaro suffered a concussion and was out of action for a month. His only other serious spill was in 1933 at age 17, at the beginning of his career. He was riding a horse named Gun Fire at a Chicago track. He suffered a fractured skull and a punctured lung and was sidelined for four months.

Both times, he climbed back in the saddle and picked up where he'd left off, riding winners.

From 1931 to 1961 he won the Kentucky Derby five times, a record he shares with Bill Hartack; the Preakness six times, a record; and the Belmont Stakes six times, a record he shares with a 19th century jockey named Jimmy McLaughlin.

And he's the only jockey to win all three Triple Crown races twice. He won with Whirlaway in 1941 and Citation in 1948. Both horses raced for Calumet Farm and were trained by Ben Jones.

Arcaro recalls the two horses and their trainer with fondness and remarkable clarity.

Jones, Arcaro recalls, had contrived a special set of blinkers for Whirlaway for the Kentucky Derby. They gave the colt a view of only the inside rail. He also gave Arcaro specific instructions:

"Don't mind if you break last. This colt is slow to get going but he

can run the fastest last half mile of any horse I have ever seen. Make your move at the half-mile pole."

Arcaro did just so. Running eighth at the half-mile pole, 10 lengths behind the leader, Whirlaway began his move. He streaked into the lead at the head of the stretch and won in a gallop.

Citation's Derby was in 1948. Eddie always listed Citation first when asked to name the greatest horses he rode. (Second: Kelso.) Actually Eddie wanted to ride Citation's stablemate, Coaltown,

George Wallace working to change image

EDITOR'S NOTE - George Wallace back in the public eye? So it seems. Deaf and bedridden, the feisty Alabamian is waging a last campaign. Will his epitaph call him Diehard Racist or Repentant Populist? Maybe he'll have to settle for Influential Loser.

Arcaro found himself six lengths back of Coaltown at the half-mile pole on a sloppy track at Churchill Downs. But he waited. At the head of the stretch he asked Citation for his best. In a half-dozen strides the big horse was in front and pulled away in a romp.

The Jones-Arcaro team had won the Derby with Lawrin in 1938 and won it again with Hill Gail in 1952. Eddie is not much for looking back at losses but he still regrets having picked the wrong horse in 1942.

He had his choice of two Greentree Stable starters, Devil Diver and Shut Out. Trainer John Gaver told him: "Shut Out is in better condition right now."

Arcaro mulishly stuck with Devil Diver and finished out of the money. Shut Out won. Had he listened to Gaver he'd have had a record six Derby winners. He did ride Shut Out later that year, winning the Belmont, Travers and Arlington Classic.

"Shut Out hated me," Eddie said. "Once when we came out on the track, he tried to rear over backwards and crush me. I turned the whip around and hit him on the nose with the handle. His manners improved immediately."

When he retired in 1961, Arcaro left a record, since surpassed, of 554

bedsheet up to his neck. Curled into fetal position in bed, his face pale, he grimaces when asked how he feels. "Bad," he croaks. "I feel bad. The pain."

The smell and haze of his cigar hang heavy in a pale blue room in the modest ranch-style home where George Wallace spends most of his time these days. A movie plays soundlessly on television. Wallace sips water through a straw, tugs the

time you ask him to," Jones said, stakes victories.

Eddie now lives in Miami. He and his late wife, Ruth, had two children who have given Eddie five grandchildren, all girls. "There are no male Arcaros to carry on the line," Eddie commented ruefully.

He has had two heart bypass operations and is holding prostate cancer at bay with monthly hormone shots. But none of the ailments seem to dim his love for golf. Once a 10-handicap player, he still, at age 80, shoots in the 90s.

He says he's as much addicted to vitamins as he is to golf. "I take 10 or 12 vitamins a day," he said. "I consider them one of the reasons I can play 18 holes of golf a day without collapsing."

What made Arcaro great? His textbook seat on a horse, clearly. He also had strong and sensitive hands, cold nerve of a skydiver, the judgment of a fighter pilot to make split-second decisions.

And now, from the high hill of age, he has an uncluttered perspective of his accomplishments and his place on the planet. What was the greatest day of his life?

Eddie grinned. "The day my father boarded a banana boat in Italy to come to the United States."

Little in the surroundings or appearance of this ailing, bed-bound 76-year-old man recalls the days when he dominated Alabama politics, drew national attention with a roar of "Segregation forever!" and thrust his magnetic, firebrand style and populist, race-tinged message into four presidential races.

But even now - as he endures ailments that have accumulated from World War II service, Parkinson's disease and from 23 years of paraplegia caused by an assassination attempt - Wallace is in a final campaign.

It's one to help shape a historical legacy that's evolving, to turn it from that of a segregationist demagogue to that of a populist visionary who atoned.

"The crowds," Wallace replies when asked his favorite memories of his life in politics. "I remember the crowds."

When able, aides say, Wallace enjoys picking through a box of black-and-white photos of presidential campaign appearances that drew tens of thousands to hear him.

"I outdrew all the other candidates," Wallace says. "They said I was the best speaker who ever ran for president... (the Rev.) Billy Graham said that."

Wallace is now deaf. He receives questions written out in large black letters on a legal pad. As he warms to the interview, dark eyes grow intent and his hand reaches impatiently for the next page and question.

"I didn't have anybody for me but the people. I talked about the real issues, the issues that everyday citizens talked about," he says.

"I might have been ahead of my

time. But it was the issues that needed to be discussed."

"I draw the line in the dust and toss the gauntlet before the feet of tyranny, and I say: Segregation now! Segregation tomorrow! Segregation forever!" - Wallace in 1963 inauguration speech.

"I have learned what suffering means. In a way that was impossible, I think I can understand something of the pain black people have come to endure. I know I contributed to that

pain, and I can only ask your forgiveness." - Wallace in 1979 visit to the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church.

Nearly two decades after he departed the national stage as a political force, renewed attention appears to be focusing on George Corley Wallace. It has taken a variety of forms in the last couple years.

His "stand in the schoolhouse door" against integration showed up in the movie "Forrest Gump." John F. Kennedy Jr., whose late father and uncle were political adversaries of Wallace, came here for an interview that highlighted the first issue of Kennedy's magazine "George." Wallace's children and supporters have started a Wallace Foundation and a museum, and are raising money for a George and Lurleen Wallace Center for the Study of Southern Politics.

Two recent, thick biographies have appeared. One, "George Wallace: American Populist," by former Newsweek correspondent Stephan Leshner, came out in 1994. "The Politics of Rage," by Emory University Professor Dan Carter followed last year. Carter's book is sharper-edged than that of Leshner, with whom Wallace cooperated, but the authors share a conclusion - that Wallace was the "most influential loser" of his time.

As years go by, Carter predicts, Wallace's role in modern American politics will be increasingly recognized. Both authors see Wallace's influence on a succession of leaders from Richard Nixon to Newt Gingrich, albeit in a more sophisticated style.

"They inherited a lot from him. But one reason his legacy is not fully appreciated is he didn't have any

(political) descendants who were proud of him," Carter said in an interview.

Wallace's outsider conservative populism, with its railing against Washington, "pointy-headed bureaucrats," taxes and welfare, along with calls for a strong military, tough law-and-order and nostalgic clean-cut values, has been incorporated into many campaigns since. However, any self-proclaimed "Wallace disciple" would also be associated with his appeals to hidden fears and scapegoating, and his politically shrewd use of what's now called the race card.

"Like the imagined indelible bloodstains on Lady Macbeth's hands, the stains of racism on Wallace's reputation will never be washed away," Leshner wrote.

However, Leshner adds in his book that Wallace's success couldn't be tied solely to one issue, "certainly not from race-baiting. Rather, Wallace became the dominant and most important issue-maker of his time because of his political instincts, his sense of theater, his overpowering energy and magnetism, and his single-minded dedication to vote-getting."

"He didn't ever have an innate, visceral hatred of blacks," Carter said. "But he made a conscious decision to manipulate the race issue. And in some ways, that's even worse."

After losing his first run for governor in a 1958 election in which he was portrayed as soft on segregation, Wallace vowed never again to let that happen. He didn't. As governor, he made opposition to integration the centerpiece of his first inaugural address and staged his showy, if futile, "stand at the schoolhouse door" at the University

of Alabama.

In the years that followed, the Wallace years, Alabama became synonymous with intransigence, bombings and brutality, all to do with race.

"Gov. Wallace never pulled the trigger or threw the bomb, but he created the climate for others to do it," said U.S. Rep. John Lewis, D-Atlanta, who grew up in Alabama and was a leader of the 1960s civil rights movement. "I think he in a sense provided cover for a lot of people."

He also welcomed the national spotlight. He made strong showings in three Northern Democratic primaries in 1964, and in his third-party run for president in 1968 carried five states with 10 million votes.

He ran again in 1972, as a Democrat, and was the early delegate leader when he was shot in Laurel, Md. To this day, Wallace doesn't believe his assassin, Arthur Bremer (now serving a 53-year prison term), acted alone.

Struggling against near-constant pain, Wallace campaigned in a wheelchair in 1976. Fellow Southerner Jimmy Carter of Georgia upset him in Florida's primary, and went on to win election.

No longer a national figure, Wallace at first faded into the background at home, too. He made his 1979 trip to the Dexter Avenue Church, a shrine of the civil rights movement where the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. had been pastor, to make amends.

Penitent and pitiable, he returned

in 1982 to win, with crucial help from black voters, his fourth term as governor. (His first wife, Lurleen, who died of cancer in 1968, was elected Alabama's first female governor in 1966 when Wallace was barred from succeeding himself.)

In his last term, Wallace tripled the number of minority appointees and put blacks on many state boards and commissions for the first time.

In interviews as he left office for the last time in 1987, Wallace worried that he still would be remembered for his segregationist past, and asked:

"Why won't they rehabilitate me?"

"What do you want left behind? You want a great, big marble monument that says 'George Wallace: He built.' Or do you want a little piece of scrawny pine lying there that says 'George Wallace: he hated?'" - President Lyndon B. Johnson to Wallace in 1965 White House meeting.

Last September, Wallace made brief comments in his home county to highlight what had been billed as the opening of a campaign-style

fund-raising tour for the Wallace Foundation. But his poor health and forced cancellation of most of the events and severe bedsores kept him homebound most of the last two months of the year.

When able, he dines out at his favorite family style restaurants and goes to the foundation offices several times a week. He greets visitors, signs books and, according to workers, sometimes spends tearful moments looking over memorabilia in the museum - such as crew photos of his World War II bomber, Sentimental Journey, and reminders of Lurleen. His two later marriages ended in divorce.

The initial fund raising for the planned Wallace center and scholastic complex has gone slowly. Only a fraction has come in for a \$12 million project aimed at breaking ground in the year 2000. Five acres of land overlooking the Alabama River here have been donated.

His children, including son George Jr., a former state treasurer, and daughter Peggy, are leading the effort. Peggy's husband, Alabama Supreme Court Justice Mark Kennedy, is also on the foundation's board.

"We're not attempting to revise history by any stretch of the imagination," said Kennedy. "We are sincerely trying to show all sides of the story. And there's a lot of pain

and heartache in the story of George Wallace. There's also a lot of triumph and accomplishment."

Proud of an honorary doctorate given him by historically black Tuskegee Institute, Wallace has continued to reach out to black leaders.

He participated last year in the 30th anniversary commemoration of the Selma-to-Montgomery voting rights march that he had tried to block. This time, Wallace welcomed the old marchers and grasped black hands for a singing of "We Shall Overcome."

Lewis had helped lead marchers on "Bloody Sunday" in 1965 when Alabama state troopers and a sheriff's posse attacked them at the Selma bridge. Lewis laughed as he recounted how Wallace once had told him that the troopers were trying to stop the march for the demonstrators' own protection. Lewis' skull was fractured that day by his supposed protectors.

"I think he will be remembered more than anything else for his position on race and the role that he played in the civil rights movement," Lewis said.

"But on the other hand, he will be remembered as a person who laid the foundation for some of the movement toward conservatism. He had an appeal to a certain sector of working families, people who identified with his ability to stand up and fight, to articulate some of their feelings and views.

"I like to give Governor Wallace the benefit of the doubt," said Lewis. "I think he's had an opportunity since the attempt on his life to reflect on a lot of things. I think he's been trying to get right with a lot of people, not just with his maker."

Carter, the biographer, said the question he most often gets about Wallace is "Did he change?"

In answer, he writes: "We can never weigh with certainty the mix of calculation and contrition that have marked the last years of George Wallace's life.... 'Men's hearts are concealed'... Boswell wrote to his friend Samuel Johnson. 'But their actions are open to scrutiny.'"

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Orange-Buttered Brussels Sprouts

Cook brussels sprouts according to package directions; drain. Meanwhile, in a small saucepan, combine remaining ingredients. Cook and stir over low heat until margarine melts.

To serve, toss orange juice mixture with brussels sprouts. Serves 4; ½ cup per serving. Preparation time: 5 minutes. Cooking time: 7 minutes.

Microwave Method for Sauce

Place orange juice mixture in a 1-cup glass measure. Microwave on 100% power (high) about 30 seconds or until margarine melts. Proceed as directed above.

*Select margarine with liquid vegetable oil as the first ingredient and no more than 2 grams of saturated fat per tablespoon.
