HHS names finalists for homecoming king, queen

Finalists for the title of Homecoming Queen and King -- and underclass attendants -- were named today by Hereford High School.

Vying for the title of Homecoming Queen will be seniors Cassie Abney, Stephanie Bixler and Andrea Scott.

Homecoming King candidates are Brian Thomas, Josh Alvarado and Rob Reinauer.

Crowning of the Homecoming Royalty will be the highlight of a pep rally to be held at 2 p.m. Friday in the high school gymnasium.

After the pep rally, the Queen and King will be honored in the Homecoming Parade, which will begin at 3 p.m. from HHS.

Leading the parade will be Parade Marshal Tom Simons. The County Judge is being honored for his 25 years as the "Voice of the Whitefaces" on football radio broadcasts.

The parade route will be from HHS south on Avenue F to Park Avenue, west to Main Street, then south to downtown.

Floats from each high school class, school and community organizations, local businesses and individuals will be featured.

Prizes will be awarded for the best overall float, best theme float, most creative float, best business float and most school spirit float.

Construction of restaurant set to begin

Construction is reportedly set to begin on Hereford's third fast-food restaurant project in recent weeks -- and the first new such store in more than 15 years.

A building permit for construction of the restaurant on West U.S. 60 had not been issued as of 11 a.m. today.

However, preliminary information indicates the former Taco Villa restaurant will be torn down to make way for the new restaurant -- reportedly to be a Taco Bell.

A telephone call to The Hereford Brand Monday indicated demolition of the abandoned Mexican food eatery was to begin today.

However, that cannot begin until a building permit is issued.

Mike Carr, former executive vice president of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce, said it has been more than 15 years since a new fast-food restaurant has been built here.

Last month, the McDonald's and Sonic Drive-In franchises here began construction on new stores in the same location as their previous operations. The McDonald's closed down and tore down the old building, while the Sonic is being built adjacent to the old building, which will be razed when the new one is complete.

Library carpet bids re-opened at Commission meeting today

Deaf Smith County Commissioners this morning opened bids a second time to replace the county library's carpet, which after more than 20 years has begun to unravel in places.

New specifications will define eligible bids as those for woven carpet carrying the industry standard 10-year warranty.

The original specifications called for, among other details, a 20-year warranty and sewn seams throughout the 1,000-square-foot library.

Commissioners originally budgeted the job at \$20,000.

Only one bid for two different grades of carpet was offered from an out-of-town dealer. The bids from Witt Builders Supply of Amarillo were each thousands of dollars in excess of the court's cost estimate.

Neither of two local carpet companies bid the job.

One local dealer said the specifications, as written by County Librarian Rebecca Walls, foreclosed possibility of his participation.

Jerry Poarch of Poarch's Furniture and Carpet in Hereford said he neither sold the specified carpet, nor could he meet the 20-year warranty required.

The other local dealer, who sells the specified carpet, claimed Mrs. Walls failed to follow the conventions of open bidding.

Lloyd Webster of Webster Carpet in Hereford said the specifications

Mrs. Walls provided him lacked specifics of bidding deadlines.

Both local dealers agreed sewing the carpet's seams was an unreasonable expectation.

Commissioners agreed to re-open bids with more simple specifications in the hope of obtaining a bid that meets the county budget.

"I still believe there is carpet, good carpet, (available) for the (\$20,000) we have budgeted," said Precinct 2 Commissioner Lupe Chavez said.

County Judge Tom Simons, who presides over Commissioners' Court, noted, "We buy things all the time that cost more than we estimated."

Simons pointed out new Sheriff's Department vehicle also approved this morning.

New bids for the carpet will be read in Commissioners' Court at the Nov. 11 meeting.

Commissioners also approved a \$20,793 bid to purchase a new vehicle for the Sheriff's Department.

Dole may visit Lone Star State

AUSTIN (AP) - President Clinton's state campaign chairman is crowing over a report that Republican challenger Bob Dole has decided not to visit Texas between now and election day.

The Dallas Morning News, in its Sunday editions, quoted Dole's campaign manager, Scott Reed, as saying the GOP nominee didn't plan any Texas stops between now and Nov. 5 because the campaign believes it has already won the state.

"If Bob Dole's going to take the state for granted, it's going to be that much easier for us to carry the state," Garry Mauro, Clinton's Texas chairman, said Monday. "Texas voters have a long history of turning out politicians and voting against politicians that take 'em for granted."

"From my perspective, it's an early Christmas present."

But other Republicans were talking differently on Monday, saying it's too early to rule out an appearance, and The Houston Chronicle said Dole now plans a trip to Texas next week.

Christina Martin, a spokeswoman for Dole's campaign in Washington, said Monday that Reed's comments were based on information he had before a weekend strategy meeting.

"It's premature to rule out a visit from Bob Dole," she said, although she didn't release Dole's schedule.

The Chronicle reported today that Dole will be in Dallas for a fundraiser and a political rally on Oct. 24.

Trustees okay pay increases

School board accepts Cumpton's resignation

The Hereford Independent School District board of trustees unanimously approved a salary increase for support services personnel on Monday.

In other business at the first regular meeting of the month, trustees:

-- Postponed action on hiring a consulting company for the district's technology plan.

-- Accepted the resignation of Don Cumpton, assistant superintendent for support services.

-- Granted a leave of absence to Kristen Hicks, a sixth grade teacher at Shirley Intermediate School.

-- Heard a campus report from Hereford Junior High School.

The meeting was held in the library at HJH.

At the Aug. 24 board meeting, Cumpton presented three minimum wage salary options for support services personnel to trustees.

On Monday, trustees unanimously approved Option Three, which will take the hourly raise already given for the 1996-97 school year, and add to it enough to make it a total of 50 cents an hour. This amount would vary for each employee, but it would be a total of 50 cents an hour above what they earned during the 1995-96

school year.

Whether it was 5 cents or 30 cents, support services personnel were given a merit raise based on performance at the beginning of this school year, Superintendent Charles Greenawalt said.

The salary increase will be retroactive to Oct. 1, he said.

Since the minimum wage law went into effect Oct. 1, 29 employee salaries were raised from \$4.25 an hour to \$4.75 an hour.

The salary increase will cost the district \$49,177, of which \$9,100 is to come into compliance with the minimum wage law, Greenawalt said.

The other \$40,000, he said, the district should be able to absorb within its budget. However, if the money is not absorbed, budget adjustments could be made at a later date.

On the technology plan, trustees heard presentations from Peter McManamon of CyberLink Corp. of Boulder, Colo., and Jim Sinopoli and Jodi Bole of OTM Engineering of Austin.

The consultants discussed the need for technology in school districts, the need for a consultant and how their companies could assist HISD in its

Man arrested following drive-by shooting here

One man was arrested late Saturday in connection with a shooting incident that involved a house and a passing car.

According to reports, police were called to 315 Lake Street at 11:50 p.m. Saturday in reference to a shooting incident.

On arrival, officers discovered the front west windows of the house had been shot out.

Witnesses told police that a resident of the house shot at a blue two-door car as it was passing by. The three males occupying the car fired back at the house with a shotgun.

Marcelo Arguijo, 23, of 315 Lake Street, later reported to police that his house had been shot at.

Officers obtained a warrant for Arguijo's arrest on a charge of deadly conduct based on interviews with the witnesses.

A .25-caliber handgun was recovered from the home.

The men in the car have not been apprehended.

No injuries were reported and police detectives are continuing their investigation into the incident.

Arguijo was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Johnnie Turrentine, who set bond at \$7,500.

The Little Eagles of Siberia, a children's choir from Russia's Far East, will kick off the Hereford

Community Concert Association season on Sunday in the Hereford High School Auditorium at 3 p.m.

The 28-member touring musical act of Russian youth aged 11 to 19

will perform Siberian songs and instrumental works as well as representative works from great Russian and Western international classics.

This season's program includes

instrumentals for the piano, accordion and balalaika -- a two-to-four stringed Russian instrument similar to a guitar.

The repertoire and choral arrangements range from Glinka to Gershwin.

Now on their fourth tour of North America, the Little Eagles, who hail from Krasnyarsk -- 1,800 miles east of Moscow on Russia's Pacific coast -- have also performed extensively in eastern Europe.

Ludmila Stebnjkova, the group's founder, also directs the performance.

Colorful national costumes were created for the group by artists from the Krasnyarsk Ballet and Opera.

Admission to the concert is by season membership, which are available at the door opening day.

Season memberships range in price from \$10, student, to \$50, family, single adult admissions are \$20.

There will be three concerts presented locally. Also included in the cost of a season ticket is a reciprocal agreement with Plainview, Pampa and Borger which allows Hereford members to attend concerts in those communities.

Season ticket holders will be entitled to attend a total of 11 different programs in the four communities.

The Herford boys' cross country team captured the championship of the Oil Patch Run, held Saturday in Sundown, while the Bethany Townsend-led Herd girls took second in their race.

The boys totaled 52 points to beat Sundown by 17 points on its own course. Plainview was third with 136 points, followed by 10 other schools.

Tommy Mather led Herford, finishing sixth in 17:05. He was followed closely by the rest of the team: Inez Lopez, ninth in 17:14; Adam Hernandez, 10th in 17:18; Sergio Saenz, 13th in 17:41; Brandon Coleman, 14th in 17:42; Miguel Huerta, 15th in 17:47; and Jason Stark, 22nd in 18:09.

"The boys' team ran very well," coach Martha Emerson said. "We were back in a better pack this week, placing sixth-15th, and even the seventh runner was in at 22nd. Our top five runners were 37 seconds apart and our top six were only 42 seconds apart."

Townsend won the individual title in the girls' race, running the two miles in 11:53. She beat Priscilla Aguirre of Muleshoe by nine seconds.

Muleshoe won the team competition, though, scoring 53 points to Herford's 57. Sundown was a distant third with 102, followed by 12 others.

Herford girls took the fifth and sixth spots individually. Jamie Harrison was fifth in 12:08, and Erica Delgado was sixth in 12:09. The other Herford girls were: Teresa Lopez, 21st in 12:45; Kitt Jennings, 24th in 12:51; and Griselda Carrillo, 33rd in 13:05.

"Bethany Townsend competed really well as the individual girls' winner, and she was followed closely by Jamie Harrison and Erica Delgado," Emerson said. "Our fourth, fifth and sixth girls also have improved and are getting closer to the top three."

Both Herd teams have only one more meet - the South Plains Meet Saturday in Levelland - before the District 1-4A meet Oct. 25 in Amarillo.

"We want this meet (Sundown) and the one this next Saturday in Levelland to be confidence builders," Emerson said. "This was a good meet for the boys and girls after two very tough meets in Amarillo and Lubbock."

Emerson didn't get a team score for the boys' junior varsity team, but two of the runners were in the top five of the JV race. James Mather was third in 18:42, and Miguel Carrillo was fourth in 19:00. The other Herford boys were: Brent Coleman, 14th in 19:49; Chris Casarez, 21st in 20:40; and Chris Briones, 36th in 21:55.

The JV girls didn't even get places: Danielle Garza, 14:51; Mayra Nava, 14:53; and Denise Amaro, 14:57.



 In 1917, Mata Hari, a Dutch dancer who had spied for the Germans, was executed by a firing

squad outside Paris.
 In 1939, New York Municipal Airport, later renamed La Guardia Airport, was dedicated.
 In 1945, the former premier of Vichy France, Pierre Laval, was executed.
 In 1946, the St. Louis Cardinals won the World Series by defeating the visiting Boston Red Sox, 4-3, in Game 7.
 In 1951, the situation comedy "I Love Lucy" premiered on CBS.
 In 1964, it was announced that Soviet leader Nikita S. Khrushchev had been removed from office. He was succeeded as premier by Alexei N. Kosygin and as Communist Party secretary by Leonid I. Brezhnev.

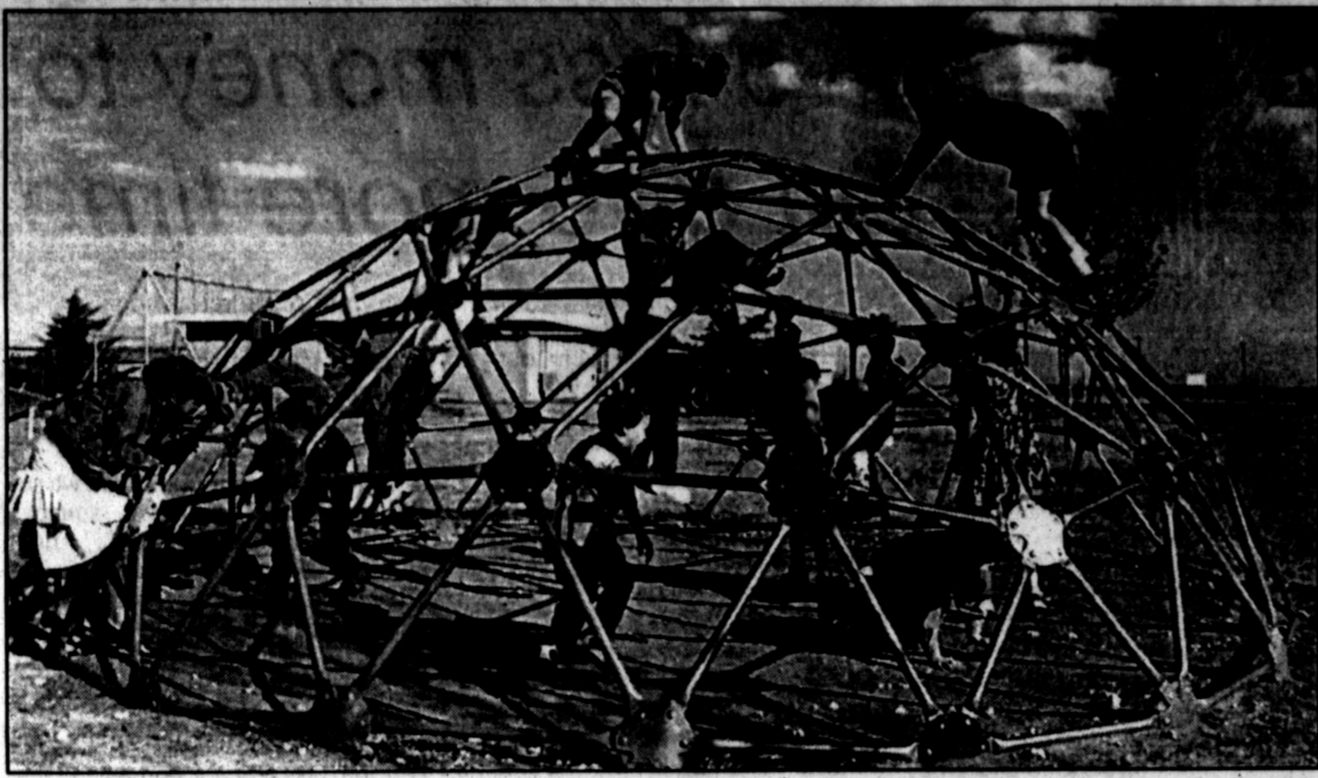

Citation against student dismissed, district defends tickets for swearing

AZLE, Texas (AP) - An Azle High School ninth-grader charged with two counts of disorderly conduct had one of the tickets dropped by a judge Monday night because of a technicality.

Municipal Judge Wynette Parchman ruled that a ticket issued to 14-year-old student Chris Gordon for calling another student a "fat cow" was invalid because it wasn't signed by a complainant, the girl who was the target of the boy's alleged remark.

The judge left intact, at least for now, a second ticket against Gordon for allegedly using profanity during a flag football game.

American Civil Liberties Union attorney Craig Watkins asked that the second ticket also be dropped because it doesn't specify what words Gordon used. Parchman said she would rule on the ticket Oct. 28.

The student said Monday night that the whole incident has aggravated him.

"This is ridiculous," he said.

"My grades have really fallen because this is always on my mind."

The boy's mother, Phyllis Gordon, said the school went too far in issuing the citations. They're among hundreds of tickets that have been issued, with the blessing of school officials, for a variety of offenses.

Monday's pre-trial hearing, just for Azle students, was packed. Most of the students pleaded guilty.

"This is serious - he's been charged with a criminal offense," Mrs. Gordon said. "This is absurd and it's not going to hold up in court. That's what happened tonight."

"They didn't even do any of the things schools normally do when a child gets in trouble... They didn't ask for a parent conference, they didn't even paddle him," she said.

Azle police, in the past two years, have issued 540 citations to high school and junior high school students for a variety of offenses, including 139 for offensive language.

"If you come to my school and you start cussing, you're going to

have to pay for that," Azle Independent School District Superintendent Santo Forte has said.

Most students ticketed under the district's 2-year-old policy of using criminal charges as a disciplinary tool have grudgingly paid their fines, performed community service, or in a few cases, had the charges dismissed.

If Gordon is convicted of the second charge, he could be fined up to \$132. The offense would be recorded on his permanent record.

The boy denied taunting his classmate but admitted using profanity in a gym class against a student who had tackled him repeatedly during a flag football game.

Azle High School sophomore Jimmy Goynes has gotten into trouble for what his teachers call foul language and other misconduct. The 16-year-old has paid \$544 in fines for disorderly conduct and theft.

AUSTIN — Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock wants tougher rules of conduct for those who oversee Texas' nursing homes and he wants the rules adopted right away.

In a letter to the Texas Board of Nursing Facility Administrators, Bullock pushed the agency to adopt the rules at its Oct. 18 meeting. It normally would take months to overhaul the agency's regulations.

Proposed rules would require nursing home administrators to keep a sufficient number of trained workers on duty, protect residents from harm and ensure that residents have proper medical treatment and nutrition.

Mike Hailey, press secretary to Bullock, told the *Austin American-Statesman*, "The residents of some of the facilities have waited long enough for an assurance that standards are going to improve."

Attorney General Dan Morales said the tougher nursing home rules will be ineffective unless an independent agency is given power to sue nursing home directors. He suggested his office would be the appropriate agency to enforce the new set of rules.

Problems at nursing homes came to light and drew state officials' attention last month when the *American-Statesman* published a report on its months-long investigation of the Texas Home of Nursing Home Administrators.

The *American-Statesman* found

pervasive problems in the board's regulation of the state's 2,700 nursing home administrators. The newspaper discovered staff shortages, sloppy record-keeping and failure to follow through on disciplinary action proposed by the agency's own members.

Meanwhile, Bullock called for an end to school property tax abatements, which cost public schools about \$143 million in funding last year, according to a study released by the Senate Economic Development Committee.

While speaking last week to the Association of Texas Colleges and Universities, Bullock said it's wrong for some businesses to ask for property tax abatements while calling for a better-educated work force.

"The very idea of industry coming in to Texas and saying they want tax breaks before they will locate in Hillsboro, Houston and Dallas is beyond my comprehension."

"Where in the world do people believe we get an educated work force?" Bullock asked.

Many Texas cities, counties and school districts — a majority of them property-poor — have used tax abatements to lure new businesses, allowing them to forego or pay only a portion of their property taxes for a specified number of years.

But Bullock opposes such practices, and said, "When it comes to our public schools, everybody ought to pay taxes."

Sen. David Sibley, R-Waco, chairman of the Senate Economic Development Committee, said he may sponsor a bill in the next legislative session that will eliminate school property tax abatements.

Judge Excuses Gov. Bush

Gov. George W. Bush reported for jury duty but was dismissed from an Travis County jury pool last week.

Bush waited in a Travis County Courthouse hallway for over an hour while lawyers and a county

judge whittled down the list of potential jurors.

David Wahlberg, the lawyer representing the defendant, argued that it would be a conflict of interest for the governor to sit in judgment of a case in which he later could be asked to grant a pardon.

Barnes Defends Contract

Former Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes said his business dealings in Texas with a former GTECH executive were approved by the company and unrelated to the executive's conviction in New Jersey on charges of taking kickbacks, the *Dallas Morning News* reported.

Barnes is a lobbyist for GTECH, the company that won a contract to operate the Texas lottery. Barnes said former GTECH sales director J. David Smith "didn't have anything to do with my contract in Texas."

Smith was convicted Oct. 4 in a New Jersey federal court for taking \$169,500 in kickbacks from a New Jersey consulting firm hired by GTECH to help the company expand its lottery contract there, the *Morning News* reported.

Business Climate Favorable

A new survey shows Texas offers the second most favorable business climate in the United States. North Carolina leads the states, followed by Texas, New York and New Jersey.

Brenda Arnett, executive director of the Texas Department of Commerce, said she was pleased with the survey and not surprised at Texas' high ranking.

"Texas' success will be reflected in our continued growth and job creation," she said.

Answering the survey were 173 top corporate executives at companies with annual sales of more than \$100 million and 250 or more employees. Ninety-nine percent of the respondents have been involved in decisions to relocate, expand, consolidate or build new facilities for their companies. The survey was conducted by the New York marketing firm, Development Counselors International.
