## HISD approves computer project

### New equipment to be placed in existing labs

A computer project was approved by Hereford school trustees Monday night, which will replace computer equipment in existing labs. New computer equipment will be placed in the junior high Computer Literacy department, the high school Business department and the high school English department. In other business, trustees:

-- Approved an election order resolution for the May 3 trustee election.

-- Heard a technology update from the district's Technology Director, Dianna Drew.

-- Heard a presentation on low rate loans from representatives of Nations Bank.

-- Appointed Tracy Straughan to the Deaf Smith County Appraisal District Board.

-- Approved a temporary class size waiver request for a third-grade class at Tierra Blanca Primary School.

-- Heard a campus report from Stanton Learning Center.

The total cost of the computer project is an estimated \$259,257, which will come from the technology budget.

The estimated cost includes the hardware, software and furniture for the labs, Drew said.

The current computer labs in these departments are being used every period, every day. The computers are simply worn out, Business teacher Ann Warwick said.

"We did it first class when we did the one (RECC lab) in the library, so

we should do this one in the same fashion," Straughan said.

On a motion by Randy Tooley and second by Dave Charest, four trustees voted to approve the computer project. Jeff Torbert abstained from the vote. Charlie Arellano was not present for the vote.

A board election will be May 3 with the positions of Karen Sherrod, District I; Tooley, District II; and a vacant position in District VI up for election.

The first day for a candidate to apply for a place on the ballot is Feb. 17, and the last day is March 19, Superintendent Charles Greenawalt said.

Early voting will begin April 14 and end April 29, he said.

Drew presented trustees with a preliminary schedule of the cabling infrastructure and networking equipment on the technology project. This phase of the technology

project should be complete by late summer, Drew said.

Trustees scheduled a technology workshop for March 18, where they will discuss the next phase of the project.

Shane Bounds and Gary Johnson, loan officers with Nations Bank, made a presentation on low interest loans. The bank works with school districts on loans for the purchase of equipment, computers, other personal property and construction of school facilities. Trustees took no action on this item.

Straughan was appointed to the Deaf Smith County Appraisal Board. He will replace Ron Weishaar, who resigned recently.

## City may use grant for new sewer lines

It won't come cheaply, but the residents of Hereford suffering sewer troubles could be in for some relief in the future.

The Hereford City Commission listened to a proposal from City Engineer Rick Oller and Hereford City Manager Chester Nolen on a plan to replace a portion of the city's antiquated sewer lines - a chore that could be accomplished at little or no cost to the residents of Deaf Smith County.

Nolen and Oller indicated that grant money could be available to cover the expense of the plan, which would help ease the plumbing woes of residents in the city's older portion of town.

The City of Hereford, according to the report, could be eligible to receive funding from the state for up to \$500,000 to replace the existing

lines in the areas north and east of Highway 60. The lines in this area, according to Nolen, could be up to 25 years in age and are located in an area of the city that is mainly made up of minority and low to moderate income families.

"We have a window of opportunity right now that we need to take advantage of," said Hereford Mayor Bob Josserand. "I think if we can do something about this we should look into it very seriously."

The "window" is limited, however. To be eligible for the grant money, the City of Hereford would have to have its grant application submitted by April 25, 1997. Oller, who is scheduled to present more information concerning the sewer plan during next Monday's meeting, indicated he felt it was possible for the city to meet the deadline.

Oller also informed the commission that it was time for the city to begin preparations for the renewal of its wastewater permit. There are some concerns that the city will not be able to obtain a new permit in its present state.

Nolen said the city has been operating on a permit that does not require the waste discharge to meet any quality parameters, but that the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission has established new codes concerning the disposal of wastewater. The city's sewer controls system, in its current state, would have trouble meeting those standards. The system was installed approximately a quarter of a century ago by a company that is no longer in business.

The new permit application must be submitted to the TNRC by June of 1998.

In other business, the City Commissioners also heard a proposal from the Hereford Beautification Alliance concerning a proposed downtown improvement project. Further discussion on the plan, which included planting new trees and removing some architectural structures, was tabled until next week when the HBA will make its recommendations available.

## County makes study on condition of roads

## HEDC okays proposal

# Multiplex movie facility coming

A proposal for a six-screen multiplex cinema located in the former Furr's Supermarket space at the south end of Sugarland Mall was accepted by Hereford Economic Development Corporation Monday morning.

"Moovies 6" is the title put on the facility by Gary Moore of Big Spring, president of Premiere Cinema Corporation. "What else would you name a new cinema in a place called Hereford?" asks Moore.

Moore says construction will begin by the end of February and the facility should open in time for the blockbuster summer movie season of 1997.

Moore says the site was chosen over potential build-to-suit sites for three reasons:

--The space is readily available and easily configured into a comfortable and spacious six-screen theater;

--the mall ownership has supported the project, and we all believe the theater can be a big catalyst to spur the resurgence of the mall and attract more tenants;

--the economics of using an existing building are very favorable.

The agreement with Premiere Cinema Corporation, is subject to proper documentation and approval by Hereford City Commission, reported Cliff Skiles, HEDC president.

Total capital investment is listed at approximately \$350,000.

The proposal calls for an HEDC grant of \$100,000, forgiven at the rate of 10 percent a year over a period of 10 years, plus a \$75,000 loan amortized over five years. Premiere Cinema is also to invest \$100,000 plus a \$75,000 loan. Premiere Cinema has agreed to subordinate to HEDC its first-lien interest in the business, leasehold and furniture, fixtures and equipment for a period of five years as collateral on its loan.

Before approving the plan, the HEDC board voted to reject a

proposal presented last week by Nies Theaters of Dumas. It proposed a new facility to be built near the HISD administration building on North US-385. It would have been a four-screen theater with 540 seats, with an estimated cost of \$846,000. Henry Reid, representing Nies, reported Monday that \$50,000 had been trimmed from the cost.

The Nies proposal requested a \$100,000 grant and \$150,000 loan, as well as co-signing a \$500,000 loan.

"Moovies 6" will encompass some 14,000 square feet of space at the mall and have approximately 1,000 seats in different size auditoriums. The largest auditoriums will have over 200 seats each.

It will feature stereo surround sound, cupholder armrests, and side-aisle configurations. The new facility will provide 10 to 16 full and part-time jobs based on seasonal needs. Building plans have been submitted and tentatively approved by the City of Hereford. Local sub-contractors have been invited to bid on the construction.

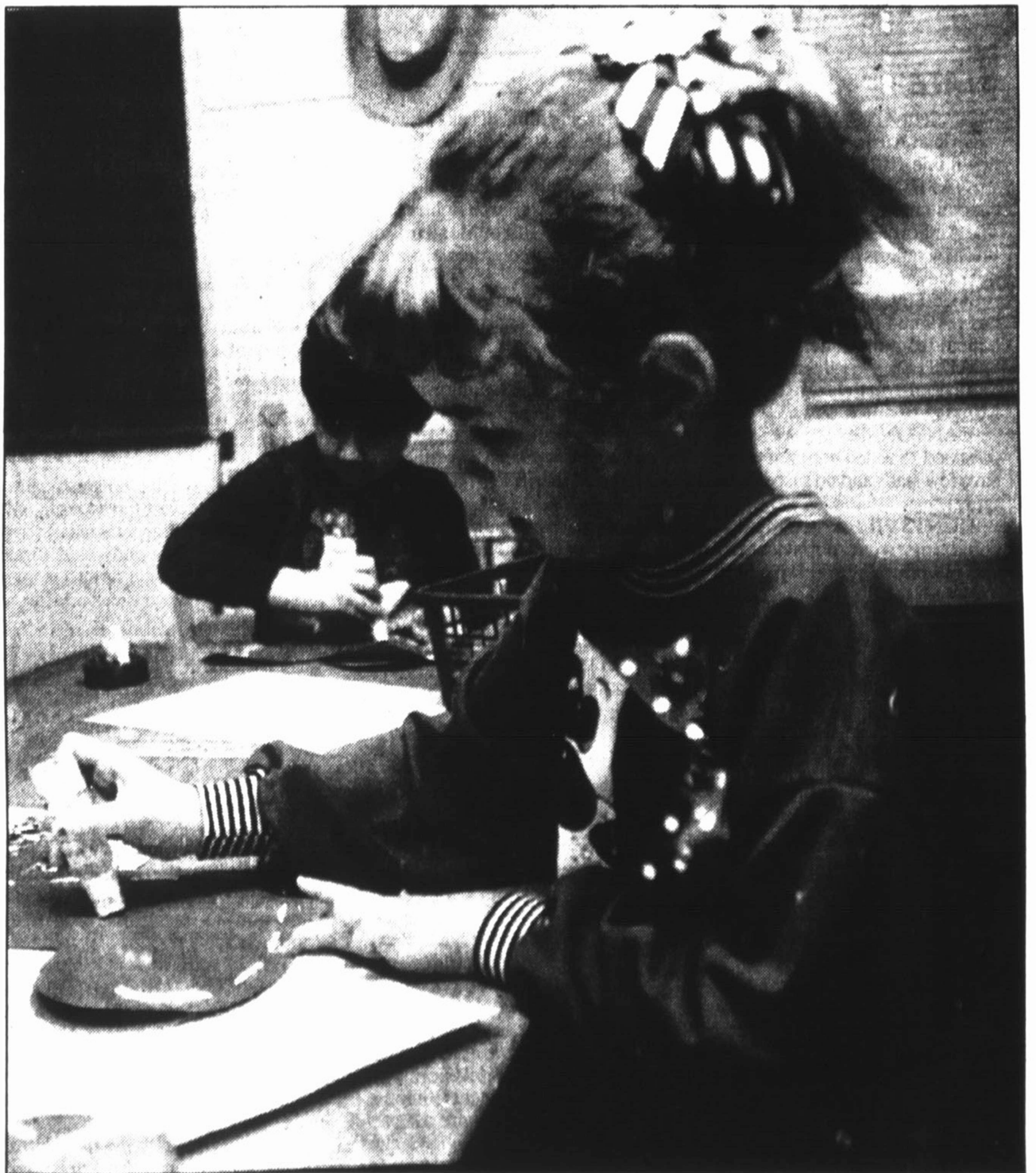
"We are hoping the cinema, by virtue of greatly increasing the traffic, can spur interest and help the mall once again become a viable part of the Hereford community," said Moore.

By developing six screens under one roof, "Moovies 6" will have the variety and flexibility necessary to bring in first-run movies as soon as they are released, added Moore.

Moore has been in the theater business since 1985, when he bought the historic Ritz Theatre in Big Spring. He remodeled the abandoned movie house and reopened it.

Premiere Cinema Corp. was formerly Cinemore Theatres, one of Texas' largest independently-owned theatre circuits. Moore opened a number of multiplex theatres, then sold them and started his new corporation.

Moore said he liked "the commitment we saw to the project in Hereford and negotiated a lease with mall and decided to move forward.

# Punitive damages awarded to plaintiffs in Simpson trial

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP) - So, this is how it ends: a jury with no regrets, a former football star with no money, and two families with little joy.

Jurors who decided O.J. Simpson was a killer and a liar tried to make sure he would never be a crass profiteer. On Monday, they decided he should pay \$25 million in punitive damages to the heirs of ex-wife Nicole Brown Simpson and Ronald Goldman, on top of the \$8.5 million in compensatory damages meted out Feb. 4 for Goldman's parents.

Even by the plaintiffs' own evidence, that's more than double what Simpson is worth. And Simpson says he doesn't have the money to pay.

The verdicts - on liability, compensation, punishment - resonated with confidence.

At a post-verdict news conference, six jurors and two alternates spoke of decisions made carefully with logic and compassion during 17 hours of deliberations over five days for both phases. The criminal trial jury took just four hours in October 1995 to acquit Simpson in the killings of Ms. Simpson and her friend.

"Finding O.J. Simpson liable of the murders and acting with oppression and malice was one of the easiest decisions I have ever had to make," said juror Laura Fast-Khaz-ace, 27.

Juror Deena Lynn Mullen, 40, dispensed with any notion that Simpson got nailed because the civil trial jury used the preponderance of evidence standard, rather than the beyond a reasonable doubt standard used at the criminal trial.

"What I needed to be able to walk out of that room was not just a reasonable doubt, but beyond a shadow of a doubt and I was willing to stay there for a month if that's what it took to answer all of those questions for myself," she said.

Jurors said they took 12 hours to reach a verdict in the compensatory phase last week because they painstakingly went through the evidence. They didn't take their first vote until the very end - and found out then they were unanimous in their feeling that Simpson was a killer.

"We had to break down everything and examine everything and have a clear conscience," said Stephen J. Strati, 35, who acted as foreman in the punitive phase.

On the NBC "Today" show today, a juror who did not take part in the news conference, Arthur Li, said he might not have convicted Simpson in a criminal case with its more rigid burden of proof.

"I would have looked further into the evidence," he said. "If I'm in the criminal jury, I won't come to the verdict so fast."

The mostly white jury, which contrasted with the mostly black jury that acquitted Simpson, said race had nothing to do with its decision.

"We went by all the evidence and it had nothing to do with the color of Mr. Simpson's skin," said juror No. 400, a white woman in her 60s.

The jurors said the most compelling evidence was the blood and photos showing Simpson wearing the same type of Bruno Magli shoes that left bloody prints near the victims' bodies. They also said Simpson, who denied ever wearing the shoes, could not be believed.

"He really should have gotten his stories straight before he got up there," said juror Lisa Theriot, 25.

She voted for punitive damages but dissented on the amount, saying she believed the figure should have been lower.

Lurking behind the confident jury was a troubling issue. The lone remaining black panelist, an alternate who listened to the same evidence but didn't deliberate, thought Simpson got a raw deal.

"For the most part, I felt Simpson was pretty credible," said the woman, in her 40s. "The plaintiffs were more like bullies than professionals."

The other black on the panel was the only one to vote against awarding punitive damages, though he joined the majority in holding Simpson responsible for the killings. The juror, a Jamaican-born man of black and Asian descent, has yet to comment publicly.

The \$33.5 million in total damages dwarfs the \$15.7 million that plaintiffs estimated Simpson is worth, based on the predicted \$3 million he

stands to make every year for selling his name, likeness and trademark. The estimate is important because by law creditors can garnish up to 25 percent of future wages. The \$25 million punitive award is to be split evenly between Goldman's parents and Ms. Simpson's children.

Before the plaintiffs can claim their money, the judge must decide whether the awards are reasonable, or inflated by irrational passions. He can pare them down if he chooses.

Simpson also could appeal, but that would not let him postpone payment. Bankruptcy is another possibility, but it would not allow Simpson to avoid his debts.

Across the street from the courthouse, in the hotel headquarters of the plaintiffs, there were smiles and tears, but no jubilation at a verdict forcing a man to pay money he says he doesn't have to make up for the loss of two people who will never return.

"There will never be closure. Nicole is forever gone. Her kids will forever be without a mother," said one of Ms. Simpson's sisters, Tanya Brown.

Kim Goldman, Ronald's sister, said: "This has taken 2 1/2 years out of all of our lives and it's going to affect us all for the rest of our life."

"I will be glad when all the cameras are gone and when we can sort of just sit and look at our family and be proud of what we've done and be able to go to the cemetery as a family and tell Ron that we did it," she said.

And then there was Simpson, watching reports of the verdict not from the courtroom, but from the golf course, which has always been his sanctuary.

Simpson ate a chili dog at the bar of suburban Knollwood Golf Course, as a TV a few feet away carried the news, a bartender said. Simpson showed scant reaction, even as his friends ribbed him.

"He was having lunch, joking around with his buddies," said the bartender, who wouldn't give her name. "He didn't even want to watch the TV. He just kind of wanted to avoid it."

Marjorie Fuller, the court-appointed lawyer for Ms. Simpson's two children, said today that she did not expect the civil verdict to change a judge's decision awarding Simpson custody of Justin and Sydney.

# On space shuttle mission Discovery races into orbit

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - Creating its own dawn with the fire of its booster rockets, space shuttle Discovery raced into orbit today on a mission to bring the powerful Hubble Space Telescope up to date.

"With a little luck and a couple weeks, the best telescope in the universe will be even better than it is now," commander Kenneth Bowersox said just before Discovery lifted off at 3:55 a.m. with a rumble that shook the ground four miles away.

Spewing white flame, the shuttle passed quickly through a stray cloud and headed off over the Atlantic. It was visible to the naked eye for nearly six minutes when it was 365 miles away and only a pinpoint in the sky.

It was as pretty a launch as any of the 81 shuttle flights that preceded it.

The seven-man crew will catch up to the Hubble 360 miles above the Earth early Thursday. On their 10-day mission, the astronauts will swap out two science instruments built with 1970s technology and install modern counterparts that will allow scientists to peer even further back into time and space.

"Have a great mission and do some good Hubble upgrades," said launch director Jim Harrington.

In an unexpected development, the upgrade comes just in time. One of the telephone-booth-sized instruments, a spectrograph, suffered an electronic failure last Friday. Ordinarily, ground engineers would have tried to make a long-distance fix. But since the instrument is coming back on Discovery anyway, they didn't bother.

Since it was lifted into orbit in

1990, the Hubble has revolutionized astronomy and upset long-held beliefs about the birth of the universe.

Three years ago, another shuttle crew visited the telescope on a more urgent mission: to fix the \$2 billion instrument's blurred vision with corrective lenses.

The modernization, planned from the start, will require four spacewalks - two each for two pairs of astronauts - working under the constraints of space and bulky suits.

# Teachers get little respect from students

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - At school, they're hit in the face, harassed in the hallways and worried about making it through class.

They're not the students. Teachers, under stress from disruptive students and sometimes combative parents, are thinking more often about leaving their profession. Some have already bailed out.

The final insult in Scott Tuomey's classroom career came the day the Fort Worth science teacher was poked in the face by an angry grandmother because of a child's lost textbook.

"There's a general lack of respect for teachers," said Tuomey, a swim coach who left Morningside Middle School after five years in the science lab. "I loved teaching. I have moments now when I think about throwing everything away and going back. Then I have flashes of reason."

Although surveys have identified more teachers dissatisfied with their careers, one educator is now studying job turnover.

"Teacher attrition is a hot topic," Diane Beltz told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. "It's no longer salary that drives them out. It's paperwork. Red tape. They are frustrated with parents and the community. They are feeling devalued. That leads to burnout. Morale sinks."

The Arlington second-grade teacher is surveying Tarrant County teachers for a master's thesis from the University of North Texas on teacher turnover.

"A lot of people don't look at teachers as professionals," said Ms. Beltz, 29, adding that most teaching jobs require a college degree. "Society has placed such high demands on teachers, yet given them such little respect."

Fifty of the 90 vacancies in the Fort Worth Independent School District haven't been filled since the school year started for lack of qualified applicants, according to J.D. Shipp, assistant superintendent for personnel.

The district employs 4,259 teachers.

One-third of public school teachers nationwide quit in the first three years, with a growing number citing stresses from unanticipated demands in and beyond the classroom, according to "Teaching for America's Future," a September report of the National Commission on Teaching and America's Future.

Cheryl Walz, a former Fort Worth PTA president, disagreed that parents are a problem.

"Most parents are supportive and respectful of the teachers, but there's always going to be a few who are not," she said.

Tuomey, who now says he makes more money as operator of a swimming pool maintenance business, also criticized the Texas Education Agency's push to link teacher evaluations to TAAS test scores.

## Today in History

Today is Tuesday, Feb. 11, the 42nd day of 1997. There are 323 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: One hundred and fifty years ago, on Feb. 11, 1847, American inventor Thomas Alva Edison was born in Milan, Ohio.

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# Rodman returns to Bulls' lineup - for now

CHICAGO (AP) - Scottie Pippen says Dennis Rodman cares only about Dennis Rodman. Michael Jordan says he and Rodman "have no relationship."

Chicago Bulls coach Phil Jackson, however, is warmly welcoming the Worm back from his latest suspension. Rodman returns to action tonight against the Charlotte Hornets after sitting out 11 games for kicking a cameraman.

"He's a very easy person to have on the team. We've got a lot harder guys to have on the team than Dennis," Jackson said Monday without revealing who they might be.

"That's the thing people don't understand. He does his job, comes to practice and keeps his mouth shut. He works hard. He is never delinquent."

Of course, Jackson doesn't enjoy having to coach around the NBA

rebounding leader's suspensions - which now number three, for a total of 19 games, in 1 1/2 years with Chicago.

"When you get to rely on a person as dominant as he is and he's not available, then it is a problem," Jackson said. "We had a brief chat, Dennis and I, just to reiterate that there have to be some stipulations about his behavior. We just can't risk the possibility that he's not going to be here for the playoffs."

Pippen doubts that Rodman will change at all.

"A I know is that Dennis doesn't give a damn about most things," Pippen said. "I'm not sure he's capable of learning any lessons from his suspensions. I don't expect him ever to change, because if he did, he wouldn't be the Worm, the personality he has invented for himself."

The cross-dressing, hair-dyeing,

referee-baiting forward helped the Bulls win the NBA title last season. And Rodman has promised to demonstrate his love for Chicago fans by donating his salary from the next 11 games to charity.

So he'll probably receive a loud ovation tonight at the United Center. But Jordan and Pippen, the team's stars and leaders, are wary.

What will the Worm do next? Will it be bad enough for NBA commissioner David Stern to banish Rodman forever?

Jordan is prepared for the worst. While leading Chicago to a 9-2 record during Rodman's latest suspension, Jordan often said the Bulls can repeat as champions without his tattooed teammate. They had a record 72 wins last season even though Rodman missed 18 games due to suspension and injury, and they're a league-best 42-6 this season despite

playing 13 games without Rodman.

"We can be better with Dennis. We know that. But we can survive without Dennis. We know that, too," Jordan said. "Our will to win is just as great without Dennis."

Asked what advice he'd give Rodman, Jordan said: "I'd tell him to wear pants all the time."

It was the first time Jordan took a public shot at Rodman's assortment of evening gowns, feathered boas and lingerie.

Pippen, meanwhile, is disappointed that Rodman "knocks the game so much."

"Someday, maybe, he'll realize that he wouldn't have all the movies and books and fans if he didn't have basketball," Pippen said. "He says he doesn't need the game, but it's the game that's made him who he is." Rodman - who might not start

tonight, just as he came off the bench for five games after serving a six-game suspension for head-butting a referee last March - didn't talk to the media after Monday's practice.

Thursday on the "Tonight Show," he told host Jay Leno that he was treated unjustly by Stern.

"It wasn't fair," Rodman said. "I haven't raped anybody. I haven't been thrown in jail. I haven't done this, I haven't done that. Tell me something I've done that's been harmful."

Teammate Steve Kerr said that apologizing - to the public, to the league or to the team - isn't Rodman's style.

"We don't expect an apology, at least a verbal one. His apology comes on the floor when he goes out and plays hard and gets 20 boards," Kerr said.

"He knows that if he screws up again, he could be in serious trouble. The team definitely has to keep an eye on him and try to keep him out of trouble."

# Tagliabue clears way for Parcels to begin coaching Jets next season

NEW YORK (AP) - In hiring their fifth new coach in five years, the New York Jets put on a bizarre show reminiscent of the team they put on the field the past few seasons.

But they finally got Bill Parcels - without giving up the first pick in April's draft.

NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue brokered a deal between the Jets and New England Patriots on Monday that will allow Parcels to coach the team immediately without spending a year in the nebulous position of "consultant."

New England gets four draft picks - the Jets' third and fourth this year, second in 1998 and first in 1999. The Jets get Parcels, who coached the Patriots to the AFC title last season and the Giants to NFL championships in 1986 and 1990.

"We're very happy. The commissioner did a hell of a job," said Leon Hess, the Jets' 82-year-old owner, who made a rare public appearance.

"Hey, is that Hess? It's about time you showed up," one man yelled at the owner during a rush-hour news conference in the lobby of a midtown office building that was the site of the six hours of negotiations.

Today, it's Parcels who shows up - now officially the Jets' coach and chief operating officer, a position he would have had to wait a year to take

had the Jets not compensated the Patriots.

He's the fifth coach in five years, counting the six-day tenure of Bill Belichick, Parcels' longtime right-hand man who last Tuesday was named the 1997 coach while the Patriots and Jets haggled over Parcels. Belichick now moves over to assistant head coach and defensive coordinator.

Parcels arrives with a contract to coach at least four years, and perhaps five.

It's an apt number - he won the Super Bowl in his fourth season with the Giants, again four years later, and then took the Patriots to the title game in his fourth season in New England. They lost to Green Bay, 35-21, and Parcels almost immediately severed his ties with the Pats.

But his return to New York was a test for the Jets.

Rich Kotite left seven weeks ago following two years in which the Jets went 4-28. "I didn't quit and I wasn't fired," he said, although it was clear the latter would have occurred had Kotite not stepped down.

For the ensuing seven weeks, while nine other teams were interviewing prospects and filling vacancies, the Jets interviewed no one, clearly waiting for Parcels.

Throughout Super Bowl week, the coach was the focus, dodging questions about his future, usually unsuccessfully.

But the week after the title game, Tagliabue perused his contract with New England and ruled that Parcels could hold no other coaching job "or comparable position" in 1997.

Undeterred, the Jets named Belichick their coach for next year, said Parcels would be a "consultant," and then signed him to a six-year deal as coach and chief operating officer. It's likely to make him the highest paid coach in the NFL and perhaps in pro sports - estimates of its value go as high as \$20 million.

That led to Monday's hearing, at which Tagliabue was to determine whether "consultant" violated his directive.

It turned out instead to be a day-long mediation session.

For five hours, Hess and president Steve Gutman of the Jets and owner Robert Kraft of the Patriots presented alternating deals, the Pats starting out with their original request for the Jets' top overall pick in April's draft.

Then Tagliabue proposed that he be an arbitrator, with his decision to be binding on both teams.

"There were wide differences and both thought it should be resolved today, and they authorized me to make a decision," Tagliabue said. "Both teams had to give a little and neither got exactly what they wanted."

Twenty minutes later, he had a deal.

"I wanted to get this over with," Kraft said. "Bill gets to work this year and we get our draft choices. I'm just glad it's settled."

"I did what I think was fair to both sides," Tagliabue said. "I looked at a young team with talented players like the Patriots and gave them choices that would ensure their future as they begin to lose veterans to the salary cap."

Parcels, in a statement released by the Jets, said, "I can't wait to get to work tomorrow morning to start rewarding the tremendous confidence Leon Hess has placed in me."

"That's a lot of draft picks we can build on," Patriots linebacker Marty Moore said. "I think it's beneficial. I think Kraft was really wanting the first-round pick, and he got one down

the road, so he got what he wanted and Parcels got what he wanted."

Parcels now heads for the Jets' headquarters in Hempstead, 25 miles east of where the talks were held on Monday.

But his absence didn't keep the crowds away.

As officer workers came out for lunch and saw the media parked in the building's lobby, word spread that "Parcels is here."

But despite being told that he wasn't, people continued to congregate. At one point, television lights came on, cameras pointed to a bank of elevators and a group of young women began to point, bringing even more fans.

It was not to be - no Tuna for lunch on Monday.

But at least the fans of a franchise that's gone longer without a title of any kind than any NFL team have reason to hope - not since 1970 have the Jets won as much as a division championship. Parcels has won four of those since 1986 ...

Not to mention two Super Bowls.

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# Three Texas cities are among possible sites for Big 12 game

DALLAS (AP) - Big 12 athletic directors are considering three Texas cities as well as Kansas City and St. Louis for sites for the 1997 Big 12 football championship game.

The Texas cities are Dallas, Houston and San Antonio, Big 12 commissioner Steve Hatchell said Monday.

The Dallas site would be at Texas Stadium, home of the Dallas Cowboys. At San Antonio, the game would be held at the Alamodome or in Houston at the Astrodome.

The first Big 12 championship game was held at St. Louis where 63,109 fans watched the Texas Longhorns upset the Nebraska Cornhuskers 37-27.

The 1997 game would be played on Dec. 7.

"There are some very compelling

reasons for Dallas," said Missouri athletic director Joe Castiglione.

"Dallas is a car trip for just about every school in the conference, and it's certainly an attractive destination as far as a city," said Castiglione, chairman of the league committee in charge of site selection.

Hatchell said the conference is very impressed by the joint bid for the game by the Dallas Chamber of Commerce and Cowboys owner Jerry Jones.

The belief that stadiums in Dallas and Kansas City would not get serious consideration because of cold weather in December is not as strong as it once was, officials say.

Donnie Duncan, Big 12 director of football operations, said that an open air stadium is no longer considered a major limitation.

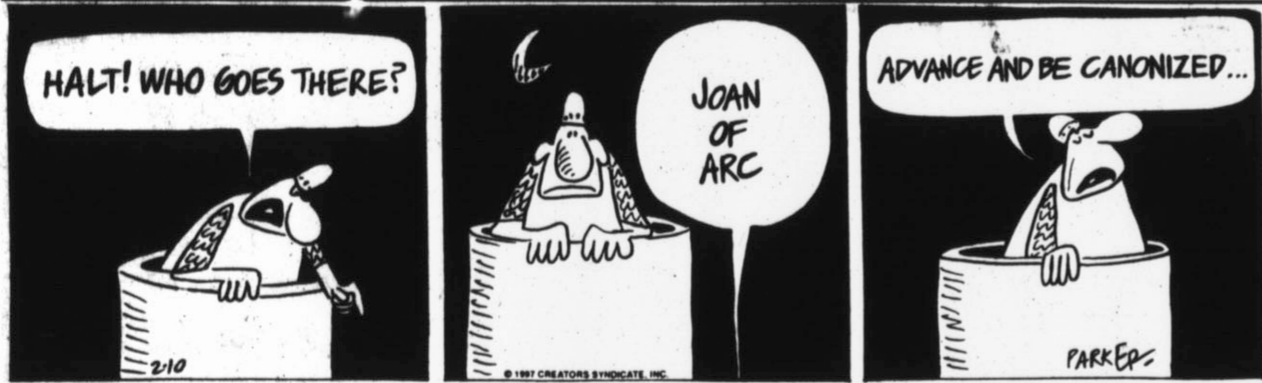

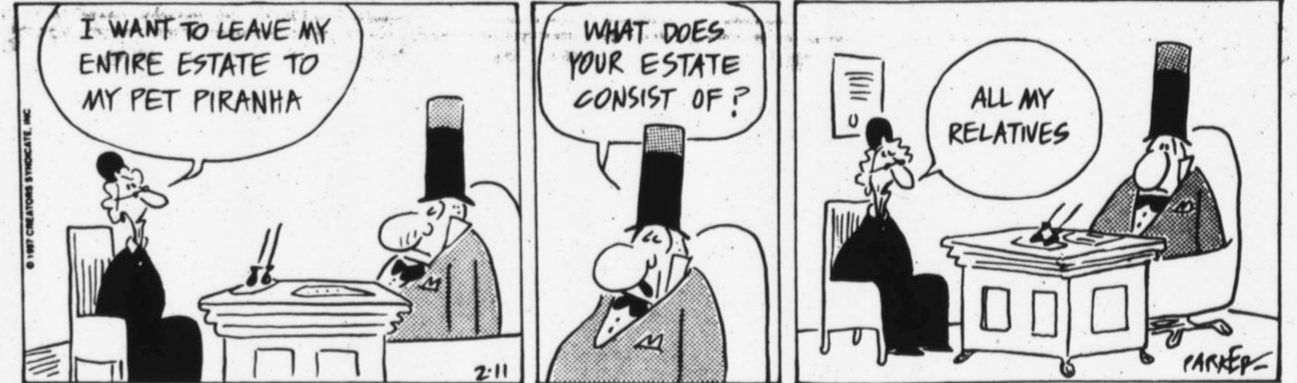

**PLN addresses environmental issues on national, local levels**

A letter prepared by Lydia Villanueva, organizer of The Promised Land Network, was delivered last week to Vice President Al Gore by a delegation of senior religious leaders.

The delegation met with the Vice President and congressional leaders to discuss environmental legislation in the coming Congress. They have singled out The Promised Land Network's activities as one of 35 model projects nationwide which link environmental protection and social justice.

At a press conference, the delegation announced a three-year, \$4 million campaign designed to more closely link federal programs to protect both the environment and under-privileged people.

The campaign, being run by the National Religious Partnership for the Environment, brings together the U.S. Catholic Conference, the National Council of Churches of Christ, the Evangelical Environmental Network, and the Coalition on the Environment and Jewish Life.

The Promised Land Network, a rural outreach ministry, is organizing the El Hormiguero Project. The

project builds community organizing, leadership and empowerment skills with Mexican-Americans who live in unincorporated farm villages where families live and work on 5-10 acres.

In a local community meeting scheduled to coincide with the meetings in the nation's capital, local leaders met to discuss current issues affecting Coronado Acres, one of the colonias.

Castro County commissioners Bay Baldrige and Larry Gonzales met

with Deaf Smith County commissioner Lupe Chavez, along with Villanueva and others from The PLN.

The commissioners from Castro County announced that an \$84,000 grant had been received from the Texas Department of Transportation to be used for improving two miles of road in Coronado Acres.

Additional community meetings are planned in the future to further discuss such issues as water and who will respond to 911 calls.

**Dear Ann Landers:** The enclosed clipping from the Aberdeen, S.D., American News is about two boys who stole a car in Wyoming and were pursued in a 110-mph chase by a deputy sheriff in Nebraska, 10 miles south of the South Dakota border.

The chase was abandoned after nine minutes because the cars were approaching curves and entering a town. The officer lost sight of the stolen car, but it apparently missed the first curve, left the road airborne at 111 mph and crashed into a house, leaving a 20-foot-wide hole and coming out the other side. A woman in the living room was killed, along with the two teen-age boys in the car. You can be sure that woman didn't know what hit her.

In my opinion, the thieves probably would have been caught eventually in a safer situation. After all, police in every state can contact one another instantly with electronic devices. This was not a life-or-death situation, but it became one when the officer pursued the thieves in a chase that far exceeded the speed limit, endangering himself, the boys and innocent bystanders. At 111 mph, the boys had just over a minute between the time the officer stopped chasing them and when they reached the first curve. That was hardly enough time for them to realize that the officer had given up.

What was the purpose of the chase? To get the car back? To catch the thieves? Neither was accomplished, and another crime was committed -- the death of an innocent

victim. It should be against the law for the police to initiate a high-speed chase after a stolen car. Such tactics are sheer lunacy. -- Outraged in S. Dakota

**Dear S.D.:** You must be a mind reader. I can't tell you how many times I've thought about this craziness. Thank you on behalf of the victims, their families and the sweethearts of officers involved in high-speed chases. You have hit a hot button with this issue. Now we need laws to make this madness illegal.

**Dear Ann Landers:** I read with interest your column mentioning the Reader's Digest survey of Americans' honesty and how it was tested. I had a related experience with a little different twist.

When I came out of the grocery store last week, I saw a wallet lying under my grocery cart. I unloaded my groceries, sent my son back to the store with the wallet and told him to give it to the manager. I felt good about myself, knowing how thankful I would be if some stranger were honest enough to do the same for me.

A week later, I was back in that store and asked the manager if he had located the wallet's owner. He nodded his head sadly and said yes, he'd found her, but instead of being grateful, she had accused me of

stealing \$7. The woman said she was certain there had been \$147 in the wallet when she left the store.

Ann, I had no idea how much money was in that wallet. I didn't check, but believe me, had I wanted to steal the money, I would have taken all of it. What's the point of stealing \$7 and returning \$140? I went home completely disillusioned.

I would like to believe that people are basically good, and I have tried to instill that concept in my children. Honesty is taught by example, and I'm glad my kids saw me make the effort to do the honorable thing. I was disappointed, however, at the way it turned out. -- Rosburg, Wash.

**Dear Rosburg:** When you sent your son back to the store to return the wallet, he learned a lesson that will stay with him forever. Consider the total experience a huge plus. Believe me. It was.

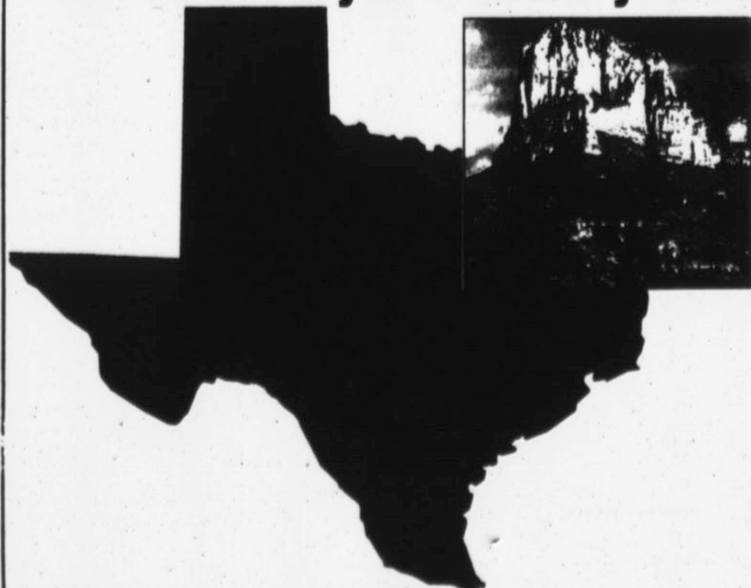

**Writing Want Ads that really sell!**

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.  
 For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs." Then, remember these hints:  
 --Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.  
 --Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.  
 --Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.  
 -- Don't be mislead'ng. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

# 'Star Wars' places first at weekend box office

LOS ANGELES (AP) - "Star Wars" held its ground against the volcano disaster film "Dante's Peak" to place first at the weekend box office with \$22.7 million in ticket sales, according to industry estimates Sunday.

"Dante's Peak" grossed \$18.6 million, and "The Beautician and The Beast," a new comedy starring "The Nanny" TV star Fran Drescher, opened in third place with \$4 million, according to projections by Exhibitor Relations Co. Inc.

The only other debut was for "The

Pest," a comedy starring John Leguizamo that finished out of the top 10.

"Star Wars," a 20-year-old space epic burnished by upgraded effects and a few new scenes, continued to captivate audiences. Its projected gross was down 37 percent in its second week but such dips are typical even for the most adroitly hyped new film.

With a total gross of nearly \$392 million, "Star Wars" is within striking distance of becoming the all-time domestic best-seller. The

current title holder is 1982's "E.T. The Extra-Terrestrial" with \$399.8 million.

Packing the audiences are parents who loved "Star Wars" when it first opened in 1977 and now are taking their children to see it, said Tom Sherak, chairman of 20th Century Fox Domestic Film Group.

"There's something about the movie that touches you," he said. "They want their kids to see it because they've gotten something from it."

"The message doesn't change," he said. "It's a message about good and evil, a message about getting a new life, and saving the empire."

"Dante's Peak" had the best February opening ever, beating "Wayne's World," which took in \$18.1 million over the four-day Presidents Day holiday in 1992.

"People are fascinated by the raw power of nature," said Alan Sutton, vice president of publicity for Universal Pictures.

The film features Pierce Brosnan as a scientist and Linda Hamilton as the mayor of a small town threatened by a volcano. It got to the screen ahead of the upcoming "Volcano," starring Tommy Lee Jones.

The movie, which reportedly cost more than \$100 million, is the latest in a string of simple-minded thrill rides that some critics blame the success of "Star Wars" for making fashionable.

But big-budget action films have been a mixed bag lately. Last year's "Twister" and "Independence Day" were blockbusters while Sylvester Stallone's "Daylight" had disappointing grosses.

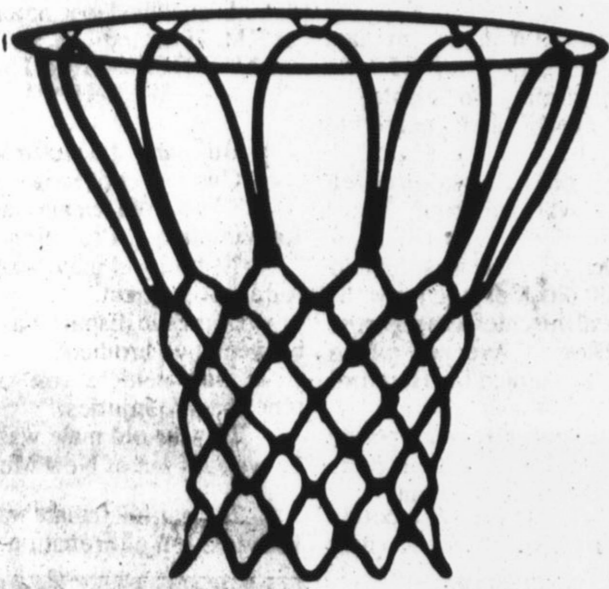
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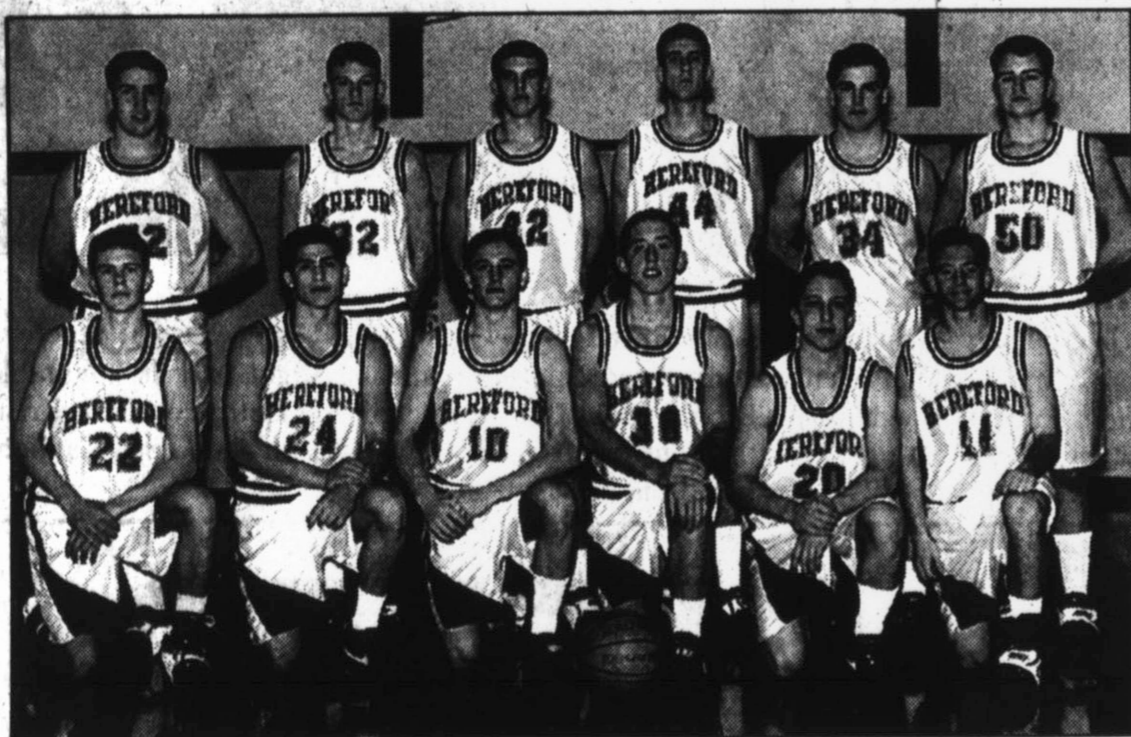
