"The success of se poultryman is measured very larger by the quality of the pullets with which he replenishes his flock," say Martin Decker, poultry research specialist at the New Jersey agricultural experiment sta-

"Great care should be exercised to keep the pullets growing uniformly from hatching to maturity, as a check or setback will cause them to mature too late for winter laying. Development is best promoted by free range with an abundance of shade and green.

"We feed grain and keep mash before the growing took continually
The mash is compared of nearly the
same combination as our laying mash,
but the pullets ten to begin laying
too early if allowed too much of it.
We must figure on laying the pullets
come into production about the middle
of October, or before cold weather

"The pullets should be transferred to winter quarters, gradually—a few at a time. Do not put on the lights until they have been accustomed to their new surroundings. Then feed the laying flock the following rations:

### Ensilage Corn Hest for Silc

Results of Tests Made With Two Varieties at Different Stations.

Is it more prottable to plant ensilage corn for the sile than ordinary
seld corn? is the question that presents
itself to many a powners at this
time of the year. In lowa few are
growing special valeties for the sile,
the majority of fa mere believing that
the regular field form, taking everything into consideration, can be more
profitably handles than some special
ensilage variety that grows more forage and less grain per acre.

Larger Amount of Water.

There is no dealt but silage made
from ensilage come contains a larger
amount of water than that made from
field corn. In other words, that the
former is more acculent than the latter or that it contains less dry matter
per pound or per ton. On the other
hand, ensilage or m produces a larger
tonnage than field corn and the question arises wheher the greater tonhage containing less dry matter per
ton is more economical for the dairy
cow than field orn silage, which is
more concentrated.

The Indians experiment station has been testing this matter for a number of years and has come to the conclusion that eld corn silage processed approximately 1.5 per cent more milk and per cent more fat than ensilage corn silage. Ton for ton, in other work, the field corn produced slightly more milk and fat than ensilage corn silage, but the yield of dry matter or of total nutrients per acre from ensilage corn was much greater than from field corn. The difference in yield of the two kinds of ference in yield of the two kinds of corn was large mough so that enstiage corn prove the more profitable. Similar results here been obtained at the Ohio and Connecticut experiment

There is another factor aside from yield per acre to e considered in connection with this problem of whether to plant ensilage or field corn for the silo. If the entire corn crop is of the same variety, any part of it can be put into the silo. If, on the other hand, ensilage corn is raised for the silo, the particular field that is set aside for that purpose nust be used. There are times, owing to late planting or to excessive moleture in the spring, when some part of the corn crop cannot be cultivate as thoroughly as some other part, and may on that account mature a wek or so later. In count mature a week or so later. In such a case the lite corn may be put in the silo, and be handleap due to late maturity par fally avoided. Such late corn might not mature, and, unless it could be put in the silo, much of it would be wated. of it would be w



The cost of milk production depends largely upon the cost of foodstuffs. Therefore, to cheapen milk production dairymen should feed large quantities of leguminous routhages, such as alfalfa, clover hay, bean pods, possessing high digestible entent.
