OIL DEVELOPMENT IN THIS SECTION

Increasing Activity Noted in Mitchell Reagan, Sterling, Midland and Glasscock Counties

Completion of 4 Wells Expected

San Angelo, Texas, April 22.—Although Big Lake Oil company's No. 6 has not yet found production, attention continues centered on the Reagan County field, where the completion this week of the No. 6, Big Lake No. 4, Associated No. 1 and Big Lake No. 5—all of the Big Lake Oil company—is expected by the operators.

After being shut down on account of a broken crank shaft, Big Lake No. 6 was to have resumed early this week. The setting of six-inch casing to shut off sulphur water, filling the hole from around 2900 feet, will probably be the first operation.

The depth announced was 3115 feet, although rumors are that it is around 3160. At any rate the operators assert that the depth at which they expect to pick up the Santa Rita sand has not been passed. Big Lake No. 4 was shut down around 2700 feet for the installing of new boiler flues and No. 5 was idle about 2600 owing to a short crew. No. 7 was making good time and drilling below 2150 feet. No. 8 at 1914, No. 9 at 625, No. 10 at 2159, and Associated No. 1 at 3050 feet. No. 11 is being supplied by Santa Rita well and Big Lake No. 3 to Big Lake Nos. 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10, and Associated No. 1, Shannon No. 1, of the Crockett Drilling syndicate and the World Oil company's No. 1. Work is scheduled to be resumed Tuesday on Big Lake No. 3 following the setting up of a mud hog pump. This well is being deepened and is down 15 feet.

The Smith-Enders well in Crockett county has been taken over by the Big Lake Oil company and will be completed by W. J. Redmond, who recently acquired the project through foreclosure of a mortgage and a trust sale. The depth is 735 feet.

Location for a well to be drilled

the Texon Oil and Land company, which brought in the discovery Santa Rita last May, has been made about 2 miles southeast of the Santa Rita, on section 9, block 1. A water well is being drilled and materials on the ground.

Location in Colorado District

Colorado, Texas, April 18.—Big Springs are being moved to two new areas made this week by the California Company on their A. L. Mitchell lease, in proven territory north of Westbrook. The new tests, known as Miller Nos. 3 and 4, offset Smartt Nos. 3 and 4 of Sloan Oil Company.

Anderson-Prichard Oil Corporation

has received twenty cars of material for the refining plant under construction at Colorado. The pumps at the plant is completed and the foundations for boilers will be completed this week.

Well No. 3 of the Sloan Oil Company

is drilling at 2,312 feet; well No. 4 at 1,992 feet, and No. 5 at 1,992 feet.

Well No. 1 of Colonel Hummer

on the Wellborne lease near Seary County, is on top of sand at below 2900 feet.

Well No. 1-A of the California

is drilling at 2,321 feet; well No. 4 is cleaning out at 3,111 feet, and LeBure No. 2 swabbing at 3,050 feet.

well of the Fidelity Oil Company 16 miles southwest of here, drilling was resumed this week, and we learn that good progress is being made.

O. H. Kilpatrick, of the Transcontinental Oil Company, which is operating in the Big Lake field, was here Wednesday and reported that the new well in the McIntosh pasture, two miles south of Stiles, was drilling below 400 feet. He said that great activity was displayed by oil operators in that field.

Oil Activities in the Midland Section

Midland, April 23.—Oil activities are rapidly increasing in the Midland section. Texas Development No. 1 was spudded in Monday at a barbecue attended by people from all the surrounding counties. This well is located on the Cowden ranch in Crane County. S. F. Johnson and his 49 eastern associates will start a second test within six weeks about seven miles from the well now drilling, but on the same structure, the Marathon field.

Drilling is progressing rapidly on the Brunson well 18 miles southwest of here. This well is within six miles of the McDowell, a small producer.

Tentative arrangements have been made for investigation of a structure in Andrews county. Drilling for water wells in that county has resulted in passing through an oil sand at 590 feet.

At McDowell No. 4

Two attempts to discharge dynamite in McDowell well No. 4 so the casing could be withdrawn proved unsuccessful this week. The dynamite for some unexplained reason failed to explode in both trials.

It was decided to send for an expert shooter to try his hand so the casing may be withdrawn from well No. 4 and used in well No. 3 which is to be drilled to the oil sand which is known to exist in the McDowell section.

The Bell Well

Since the Bell Well was shot about ten days ago the crew have been busily engaged in cleaning out the debris occasioned by the shot and for the last three days have been pumping the water that had gone back into the formations. Because of a bit of trouble with the pump valves slow progress was made for a few days, but now that the troubles are known, rapid progress is being made, and the prospects are good that we will have a producing oil well very soon. —Pecos Enterprise.

Death Claims W. M. Reed

W. M. Reed, a well known and highly esteemed citizen of the Luther community, was claimed by death Wednesday, April 23rd. He passed away at Mercy Hospital in this city at two o'clock Wednesday morning. Death was due to cancer of the stomach. He had been ill the past two years but it was not until the past six months that his condition became serious, and noted by his loved ones.

Mr. Reed had been a resident of Howard County the past twenty-five years and was respected and esteemed by everyone who knew him. He was a good friend and neighbor, ever ready and willing to aid those in need or in time of trouble and he practiced the Golden Rule in all his dealings with his fellow man. Those who knew him best loved him most and many hearts are saddened because of his death.

Funeral services were conducted at the home of his son, Mitchell Reed, in the south part of this city, by Rev. M. Phelan, pastor of the Methodist Church, at 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. Interment was made in Mt. Olive cemetery.

He is survived by his wife and four children, Mitchell and Clay Reed; Mrs. C. L. Wilcox and Miss Gertrude Reed; a brother, S. P. Reed of Stanton, and a sister, Mrs. Minnie Smith of this county and other relatives, and to these who mourn for their loved one is extended the deep sympathy of the many friends in Big Spring and throughout the county.

ARE YOU GOING TO BROWNWOOD?

It's Time for Big Spring Folks to Get Busy if We Expect to Gain Any Recognition at Convention

"Too busy." That's the one big obstacle to accomplishment in Big Spring. Everyone is so selfishly busy looking after No. 1 that he can't afford to donate a little time and energy to the general welfare.

How the citizens of Lamesa, Stanton, Midland, Colorado find time to go to the various conventions we are at a loss to understand. On May 2 150 business and professional men from the busy city of Dallas will be visitors in Big Spring. How do you suppose they manage to spend seven days on this booster trip?

Our citizens have been requested to inform the Chamber of Commerce, whether or not they could make the trip to the annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at Brownwood, May 13 to 16th. Less than one dozen folks were interested enough to supply this information. Rather discouraging when you learn that Lamesa is to send a big band and 400 delegates, San Angelo is to send 10 carloads and other live cities will be there with bands and big delegations.

Big Spring has as good reasons, and more, for sending a big delegation as any other city in West Texas.

We have an opportunity to elect a Big Spring man president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and any city can well be proud of such an honor. This opportunity will be mighty slim however if we have but a handful of delegates at Brownwood.

We need a band at Brownwood and of course it is going to take some real coin to pay the expenses of this organization. But most of all we need a bunch of enthusiastic boosters who will go to Brownwood to let them know that Big Spring is a live city—that her citizens are not too busy to boost for their home town.

If you intend going to Brownwood why not let the Chamber of Commerce know. Orders for special cars must be placed now—no a day or two before the convention opens. If you are not going—why not? Don't give the old threadbare excuse of "too busy." That should be one reason why you are better able to go than are the citizens of some of these towns where business is not so rushing. It might be well, too, to keep your town on the map so busy times might continue.

If you are too busy to go, pay some other fellow's expenses to represent you at Brownwood.

Why make it necessary to send a committee around to urge and urge you to go.

At 2 p. m. there will be another song feast, followed by sermon, and at 3 o'clock the executive board of the Big Spring Baptist Association will meet for the purpose of securing a Missionary for Summer Evangelistic Campaign.

Why Was It Permitted?

In the last issue of The Herald we noted with much interest the following news item: "The county officials were quite busy Wednesday night. They made eight arrests; four white men were arrested, charged with gambling; two white women were arrested, charged with vagrancy; and two negro men were arrested on suspicion of having broken into a freight car."

All of which is highly commendable on the part of the officials who have been entrusted with the enforcement of the law.

Would it not have been fine and gratifying to every person who believes in law enforcement, and law and order, if we could have read in the same issue of The Herald that a carnival outfit landed in Big Spring the first of the week; set up their tents for business and proceeded to operate various petty gambling devices and games of chance but were immediately stopped and prevented from doing so by the city or county authorities who have been entrusted with the enforcement of the law.

There is not an individual in this community who can open a place of business, and install any one or more of a number of games of chance operated at the carnival here last week and get away with it. If there are any who think they can, just try it out.

Why give more consideration to such an aggregation as we had here last week than we would to an individual? Really if favors should be given in this respect such favors should be given to those who get in some secret place to gamble where at least women and children are protected from viewing the games as well as from participating in them.

Last fall Big Spring was afflicted with just such an aggregation as was with us last week and we are of the opinion that neither of these outfits left us one whit better from any standpoint but much worse from any angle we may view it.

As we see it there was no justification, reason or excuse for the "chance" features of either of these carnivals operating in Big Spring not even for one time.

We have legislated against gambling, we have condemned it from the pulpit and forum, all of which is right, so why tolerate it even in a petty way in the most flagrant form.

Will some one tell us why?

1 Killed, 2 Wounded Near Tahoka

Dr. S. H. Windham, owner of a large ranch between Tahoka and Brownfield, was waylaid and killed as he was driving to his ranch home in his automobile Monday evening. He was found shortly afterwards and a search for the slayer was started.

Shortly after daylight Wednesday morning a ranchhand named Moore was shot near the barn on the Windham ranch and another named Montgomery was seriously wounded by a man concealed in a barricaded dipping vat.

A posse of three hundred was soon on the scene and after a twelve hour siege, Will Ward, a ranchhand, surrendered, late Wednesday afternoon. He has made no statement since his arrest. Ward has lost a leg and the wooden substitute he wears has gained him the sobriquet of "Pegleg."

DALLAS BOOSTERS TO BE HERE MAY 2

Big Spring Folks Should Tender These Apostles of Good-Will a Royal Welcome to Our City

One hundred fifty strong—a party of Dallas business and professional men, traveling in a special train, will arrive in Big Spring Friday, May 2, at 11:02 a. m. for a 60 minutes visit with our citizens. The occasion is the Twenty-Third Annual Good-Will Tour of the Dallasites to points of interest in the Southwest Trade Territory. This year the party is endeavoring to stop at as many cities and towns in West Texas as its seven day schedule will permit.

Knowing the reputation of our business men for hospitality, the Dallas party is looking forward with keen interest to its brief call here.

A letter received from General Chairman, C. L. Norsworthy, announces the time of the trains arrival and expresses regret that owing to the large territory to be covered the party will not be able to spend a longer time in our city. The trip will embrace 2,026 miles, the longest and most important ever undertaken, and stops will be made at 69 West Texas cities, Mr. Norsworthy said.

The purpose of the tour will be to bring about a closer relationship and understanding between our merchants and the Dallas wholesale and manufacturing market. Members of the party will call personally at our business houses to meet our merchants and extend to them an invitation to visit the Dallas market and avail themselves of the service it affords to its patrons.

The party will be made up largely of the executive officers of the large banks, jobbing houses and manufacturing concerns in Dallas. Each individual will be loaded with novelty souvenirs and will be anxious to renew old acquaintances and make new friends. Every effort will be made to develop commercial and industrial contact and the men from "The City of the Hour" are full of enthusiasm concerning the development possibilities of West Texas—"The Bread Basket of the Nation."

Mr. Norsworthy especially requests that, if practicable, our school children be on hand to greet the party at the depot. He promises that no child will go away empty handed.

A magnificent uniformed band of twenty pieces will accompany the Good-Will party and will render a short concert during their stop. No effort or expense has been spared to make this the greatest Good-Will Tour Dallas has ever undertaken.

Converting Ranch into Farms

The famous Slaughter ranch north of Big Spring is to be enlarged at once. Surveyors are now plotting a 17-thousand-acre section which is to be sold in large or small tracts and on terms that will permit home-seekers to secure a home in the Big Spring Country.

The office of the Lone Star Real Estate and Insurance Agency will be the western headquarters of the Lone Star Land Company of Fort Worth, who have the contract to dispose of the Slaughter lands and will represent them in the handling of this land.

Excursions will be run from Fort Worth to Big Spring in the near future so that prospective purchasers may have an opportunity to personally inspect the lands offered for sale.

Building Room for Bible Classes

The members of the Young Men's and Young Women's Bible classes of the First Baptist Church are so numerous that larger quarters were needed.

The members agreed to build a class room if the church authorities would consent to the erection of a building. The permission was granted and a frame structure twenty by forty-five feet is being erected just east of the church.

It takes a live company and cooperation to put over a proposition of this kind and the young men and young women of the First Baptist Church are to be commended for their loyal spirit of cooperation.

Many See Aerial Acrobatics

The folks came from far and near to witness the famous Diavolo do his stunts in an acrobatic at the aviation field in Big Spring on last Sunday afternoon, and everyone seemed highly pleased with the exhibition.

It is estimated that between four and five hundred automobiles loaded with folks were at the aviation field. Diavolo, the stunt man "did his stuff" on an aeroplane piloted by Captain Yerex. These stunts included balancing on the upper wing tip, standing on his head on the upper wing, climbing under the lower wing, hanging in turn by the knees and one hand from the wing skid and the same thrilling stunts repeated on the landing gear, and to cap the climax, Diavolo rides the top wing while Captain Yerex loops the loop.

Captain Yerex also conducted passenger flights, Saturday afternoon, Sunday, Monday and Tuesday and many of our folks went up for a trip.

As Captain Yerex passed over Big Spring on his arrival he threw circulars from his plane. Four of these were marked and the finders were treated to free rides in the plane by The Herald and T. W. Wheeler No "Easy Mark—Bigger Ports Closed—Would Miracles Do?"

Some enthusiasts out West, stimulated by large pocketbooks, have included Senator Wheeler trying to do courage his able investigating. By this time they probably regret it, for the Senator is investigating THEM to find out just what and who are behind the indictment.

Washington knows that when Senator Wheeler found public life in Montana he found two political parties out there, one called Republican, one called Democratic, both owned by copper mines.

When he ventured to oppose the copper capitalist he was informed that he would be run out of Montana. But he had other plans, got himself elected to the Senate of the United States, and now the people are hearing from him.

Even the fattest pocketbook ought to realize that this is no time for financial rough stuff.

The Chapman, excellent scientific work of the American Museum of Natural History, reports from the Arctic continent bringing a bird that "lays like a doudley and a duck that can fly."

Belgian amazement carries you away at thought of a duck that can't fly, ask yourself how many human beings there are that can't think?

New York is proud, learning from United States authorities that New York's port handled more than one-half of the total ocean passenger traffic of the United States. Seattle, Boston and San Francisco were next.

Well, that's to-day's news. How long do you suppose it will be before Jacksonville, Fla., and Los Angeles both have an ocean traffic bigger than that of which New York is so proud to-day? This country is only starting, and the really big ports and cities are still to find their place.

That ought to interest railroad men now. If it doesn't, the kind of competition it will give them will interest them later—and TOO late.

GROWTH OF HOSTILITY TOWARD THE RAILROADS

People came to realize that their great public domain was not limitless. By 1876 attention was called to the fact that all the best land of the state was already reserved or disposed of under the law. Six years later it was found that the state had issued the railroad certificates for eight million acres more than it possessed. When the people heard these statements and when they thought of the tens of thousands of square miles of land that the state had recently owned and when they saw the need of the thousands of miles of railroads as yet unbuilt, they felt that somebody had been unduly prodigal with the public lands.

In 1886 a series of railroad strikes were instituted under the guidance of the Knights of Labor. The great railroad strike of that year originated at Marshall, Texas, on March 2nd. The employees of the carriers became very bitter against some of the roads of Texas, particularly the Gould lines. These employees made demands which today would be regarded as conservative. They had the sympathy of large sections of the public throughout most of the state. This large popular support was no doubt due to no small degree to the assistance and activity of farmers organizations in the State.

The Farmers Alliance is supposed to have originated in Lampasas County, Texas, in 1878. It was formed in secret societies and spread with amazing rapidity. It was estimated in 1886 that there were about 100,000 members of such organizations in Texas alone. The order established a state paper in Dallas and

in many counties there were "alliance papers." These papers together had a very large circulation. They kept the people informed as to the details concerning the incidents of the strike. Moreover, the expressions in the papers were very favorable and sympathetic towards the employees and were often in condemnation of the railroads. The farmers met in secret every two weeks and in almost every neighborhood there were members of the alliance. They discussed questions of interest to themselves, among these being the details of the strike. A solidarity of opinion was quickly formed. Many people over the state came to feel that the railroads were at fault and responsible both for the beginning of the strike and for its continuance. This dissatisfaction began to express itself through party platforms and in proposed legislation demanding state control of railroads, some going so far as to urge government ownership. The Farmers Alliance started a movement for manufacturing in Texas. They established several small plants such as cotton gins, compresses, and flour mills. Many of these got into financial ties. Their managers charged they were discriminated against in the matter of rates and of These charges very naturally led widespread antagonism. (To be continued)

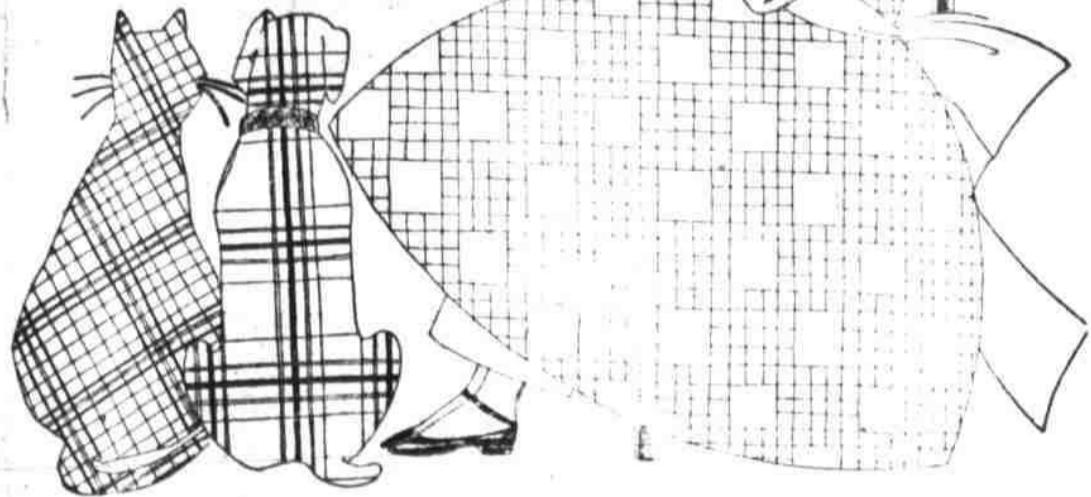

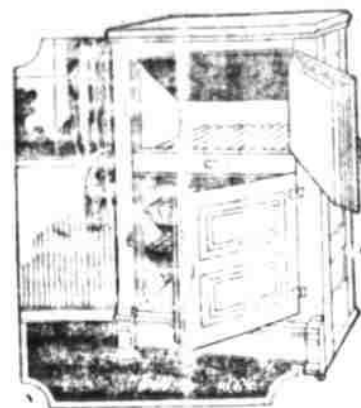

Texas Needs Cotton Mills

The industrial salvation of the Southwest lies in the development of cotton goods mills in Texas—such is the conclusion reached by the Industrial Relations Committee of the Dallas Manufacturers Association after a careful survey of Textile fabrication possibilities in the State. Furthermore, Texas can become the foremost cotton goods manufacturing center in the world, the committee believes, if her citizens will take advantage of present opportunity.

A report submitted to the Association discloses that there are now twenty-three mills in the State operating approximately 200,000 spindles and furnish employment for 4,500 operatives and, at present machinery cost, represent a capital investment of \$15,000,000.

An accurate estimate of the value in dollars and cents of the cotton piece goods produced is impossible, the report continues, but it may be said that the cloth is worth approximately double the worth of the staple cotton, when cotton sells at from 25 to 30c per pound. One interesting feature of the price analysis is that fully 65 per cent of the increase goes for labor, therefore, a mill is a factor in strengthening the buying power of any community.

Outside capital has built only one cotton mill in Texas and all plants now operating, with this exception, have been made possible by the faith of Texans.

There is hardly a community in the Southwest that could not profitably organize a cotton mill. Texas towns, however, should look with disfavor upon any plan of organization where 100 cents out of every dollar does not go into machinery, buildings or material.

An interesting comparison of production is that existing between Texas and North Carolina, the South's leading cotton goods State. North Carolina has 425 mills with 5,281,000 spindles and consumes at least 200,000 more bales of cotton annually than the entire State produces. Texas, on the other hand, fabricates only 3 per cent of her staple.

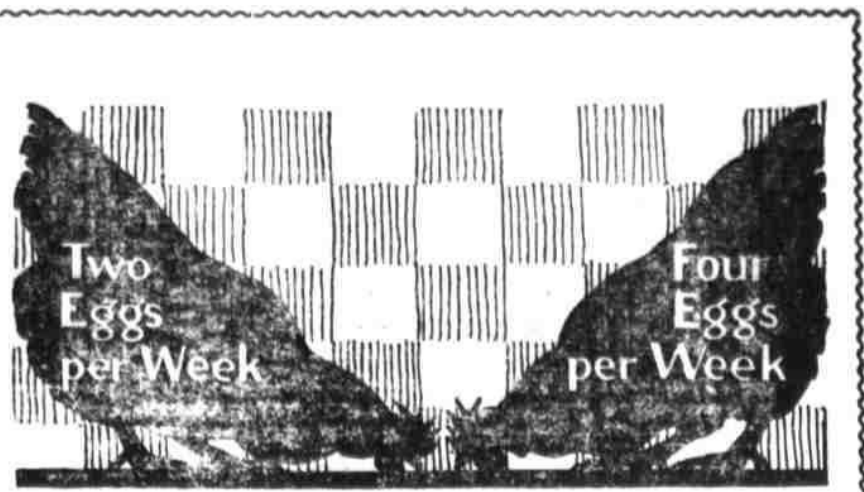

PAT. CROWLEY REACHES TOP

New President of N. Y. Central Got Job as Railroad Messenger Boy When 14 Years Old

Written Specially for The Herald By ROBERT FULLER (Through Autocaster Service)

New York.—Pat Crowley wanted a job.

He was 14 years old, had just finished eight grades of grammar school, and because most of the men folks in his family were railroaders, Pat naturally turned his boyish blue eyes toward the railroad yards.

It was necessary for Pat to go to work, so he went down to see the yard. Perhaps it was his earnestness—anyhow, he got a job as messenger boy, salary \$5 a month, hours 7 a. m. to 9 p. m.—which meant that little Pat must get up at 5:30 every morning.

That was 46 years ago in Pat's little home town of Cattaraugus, N. Y., on the Erie Railroad.

Today, at a salary of perhaps \$10,000 a month—or more than \$120,000 per year—more money than is paid the President of the United States, Patrick E. Crowley is still railroad-ing—working every wakeful hour. He is the new President of one of the world's greatest railroad lines—the New York Central.

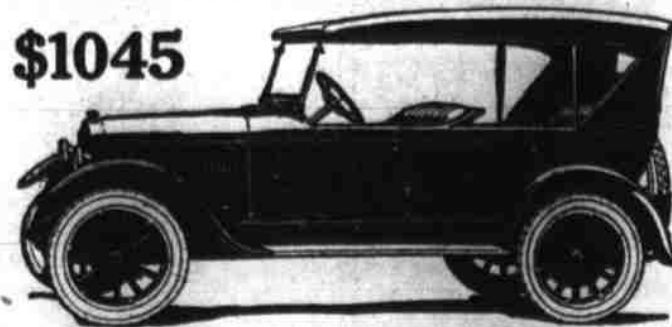

to the New York Central policy of choosing an "operating" man for the Presidency—and Mr. Crowley was the logical man.

Briefly told, the life story of Mr. Crowley is of another American boy, who, through knowing his job, honest work and perseverance, has found success unavoidable—and, like all earnest workers—surprised that there should be glory to his achievements.

Starting as a messenger boy at 14, Mr. Crowley had learned the "code" and was a telegrapher at 16. Two years later he was made a train dispatcher. During the next nine years he did much hard work—but did it so well that he was made train master. Then at 27 he was married. Ten years later, at 37, he was promoted—made a superintendent of a division and the home folks thought Pat Crowley had reached the top.

But young Crowley kept on working and in three years—attracted the attention of the general superintendent—and was made assistant to him. Three years later, when he was 43, Mr. Crowley was made assistant general manager. Five years of work at the job and he was made general manager, in 1912.

It was then but a step to be an assistant to a vice president, and he was rewarded two years later. In 1916, age 52, he was elected vice-president, which job he handled so thoroughly that his election—at 60—to the presidency last week, was inevitable.

Mr. Crowley has just one hobby. It is "Railroading"—he says.

The city commissioners voting an ordinance permitting fishing on Lake Abilene for its first reading Friday, accepted a responsibility far beyond the desire to please those that want to fish and turn Lake Abilene into a resort.

Best authorities will promptly order the city to chlorinate its water before it is used for drinking. If the chlorinating plant works smoothly Abilene will continue to drink pure water, made so by treatment—if it fails to work, as anything mechanical sometimes does, the city accepts the responsibility of serving contaminated water.

In California a city's chlorinating plant broke down for a day. A tourist passed through, took a drink, filled his jug with the city's water and drove on to the next town. He developed typhoid fever. The germ was in the water. He sued the city and a jury awarded damages to the amount of \$32,821.29.

The amount of this judgment was small compared to the amount of unfavorable advertising this California town is still receiving, not to speak of the dread its own citizenship must live under.

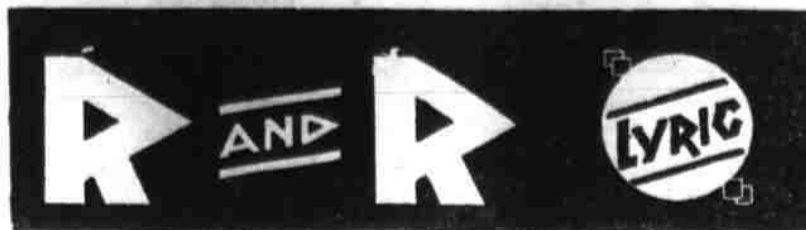

The difference between the old and the new idea of educational discipline is large and marked, but many, not as familiar with the modern public school system as they should be, still visualize a school as a place where silence and timidity, iron discipline and punishment, are paramount.

The old idea of school was a place of confinement of youth where study was compelled by the threat of a switch. It has long since given way to the idea of a place where the young are taught because what they are taught is more interesting than idle play. There are always the wayward and the undisciplined, but the modern idea is to let the school take care of such by public opinion, rather

than by making of the teacher a martinet.

As an instance of how the modern system works, consider the code adopted by the pupils of Washington Irving High School in New York, as their "Standards of Right." This code was written, and is lived up to, by the pupils of their own motion, not coerced by teachers. They consider that their best interests are served when all obey this code:

- To serve faithfully our God, our country, and our school;
- To obey the law;
- To be honest in thought, word and deed;
- To keep clean in body and mind;
- To do our work earnestly as a part of our loyalty to parents, to teachers, and to student officers;
- To practice thrift by caring for the property of others and by making the best use of our own time and possessions;
- To be courteous by doing unto others as we would have others do unto us;
- To live up to our school motto:

Intelligence, Industry, Integrity.

This school has more than six thousand girl pupils. When so large an institution can formulate and live up to such rules, it is visible evidence of the long distance forward which education has come since the days of the rod, the flogging and the public whipping as "aids" (!) to education.

RADIO HINTS

It will be static season in two weeks. Put a lightning arrester on your aerial. Remember, lightning is NOT attracted by an aerial. The arrester is to discharge any excessive electrical charge accumulated in the atmosphere to its shortest path, which is the ground.

Your plain variable condenser can be made into a vernier type by adding a small vernier control, sold by all radio dealers.

You cannot get too expensive or good a rheostat, or a grid. The best is far the cheapest.

If your antenna is stretched across a city apartment house roof,

and the roof has a tin covering, or if water pipes or water drainways pass under the antenna, your antenna is only as distant from the ground as the tin roof, the water pipes or the water runways.

Hurry will never get you anywhere. Therefore, when you hook up a radio set, take your time and do it very carefully and slowly. Guard particularly against the plates in your condenser touching each other.

If you suffer from body interference when your fingers touch the knobs on the panel, place a shield of tin-foil or thin copper directly behind the knobs on the

inside of the panel and ground them by soldering them to the ground wire. Shields can be held to the panel by shellac.

The bugaboo of soldering has brought about another device for making quick and sure connections. It is a small semi-circle of brass, which will make a firm and instant connection for as many as six wires. This is specially valuable when you find it necessary to reverse wires to get the best out of a set. The new brass clip is being sold everywhere.

If we could go to school four months out of 12, we thought we were doing well, and if we could get in a wagon once a month and go five or six miles to an old brush arbor and hear an old-time preacher for two hours, we thought that fine.

But don't think that we didn't enjoy life. There was much hard work to do, but my father would give us a task on Monday morning for the week, and how we boys would get up and dig and often we would finish long before the week was up, and if it were in the spring of the year, we would go fishing or grape hunting, or whatever we wished to do. In the fall and winter, there was plenty of wild nuts and huckleberries to gather, and also we would call old Ring and Towser and go rabbit or coon hunting.

Yet, I am glad that the boys and girls of today have better schools and Sunday schools and other nice places to go to prepare themselves for the great task of life that they must take up, when we older ones have passed away. Others may claim that those old, log schoolhouses we had then are good enough for the boys and girls of the present day. If that is so, then we might as well contend that the old, wooden plows and oxen and hand reapers are good enough for us to farm with. So let us older people pull together and give our young people better schools and better opportunities than we had in the old times in the South.—T. W. W., in The Progressive Farmer.

He claims to be a man without a country. He served with the Louisiana Tigers of the Confederacy during the civil war; served five years in the U. S. Navy, served with the Second Louisiana Artillery in Cuba during the Spanish American war, and also served with Uncle Sam's Army in France during the World War.

Though he has proven himself an American by fighting for America, by living in and loving it, Uncle Sam does not claim him because they have no proof that his parents, who came to America 74 years ago, were naturalized. Griffin therefore contends that he must therefore remain a Confederate.

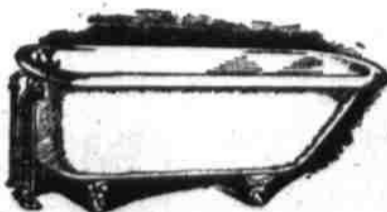

THE PASSING DAY

By Will H. Mayes, Department of Journalism, University of Texas

From an acquaintance with Texas towns extending over a period of about forty years, I have learned that those places whose citizens keep some community work under way all the time are the places that enjoy the greatest prosperity and the most substantial development. Towns whose citizens are inactive soon become stale and uninviting as homes of people of progressive ideas. It doesn't matter so much what is undertaken just so it keeps the people meeting and working together for their common good. Whether it is a county fair, a poultry show, a clean-up campaign, a tree-planting, building a factory, a good-roads movement, a school building campaign---whatever it may be, large or small---does not matter so much, if only it is carried to a successful finish. The good comes as much from the team work of the citizens as from the accomplishment of the thing in hand.

 Many places make the mistake of putting through some one undertaking to their credit and stopping with the single achievement. When something else is to be undertaken the work of organization has to be done all over again. The result is that there are long intervals of community inactivity in which the town loses practically all it has gained by its progressive spurts. The business of town development is just like that of the individual. The merchant who would close his store for a rest after a big sale would certainly fail. The town that does only occasional things makes little progress. Unless your community improves, your business is not likely to improve beyond certain fixed limits. The way to help the town is to keep something doing all the while for the good of the place. In that way you will help yourself.

 Brownwood is this year doing about the biggest thing of any place in its class in Texas in entertaining, May 13-15, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in its annual convention. The estimates are that 25,000 people will be there, and Brownwood is going to spend \$22,000 in giving them a good time. The town's enterprise is shown in the erection of an \$80,000 auditorium, built on a bond issue, in which the convention will be held. This building is a permanent structure, and was erected as a memorial to the Brown County soldiers of the World War. A town with a spirit like Brownwood is showing can't be kept from growing. All people with life in them like to be among others who are alive.

 Several thousand visitors from thirty East Texas counties are expected at the East Texas Singers' Association meeting at Athens, June 13-15. There will be many vocal artists from different places in Texas, some of them from out of the State, and the rest will be just plain East Texas singers. These East Texas singing conventions have brought about a renewed interest in vocal music all over that part of the State, and people are always better for singing. Singing may not be a permanent cure for all the ills of mankind, but it does make those who do the singing forget their troubles for the time, whatever the effect may be on others. Community singing under good leadership brings about a close fellowship, and when people sing together in the real spirit of song, hatreds, bickerings and jealousies are likely to be forgotten.

 Farm life is much easier than it was in the days of our fathers. In no other field of labor has machinery come any more to lighten labor if only the farmer will go to the expense or the pains of equipping his farm as it should be. Of course, no farmer can get all the machinery he would like to have, but many do not use that which is available. On farms where wood is used as fuel the work of chopping or sawing the wood by hand is back-breaking, but seldom necessary. Most farmers now have automobiles. By jacking up the back of the car and attaching a saw the winter's fuel supply can be sawed in a short time. The saw attachment costs but little. Dozens of other cheap labor-saving devices are available to most farmers and farmer's wives. By providing them and making farm work lighter, the boys and girls will be more likely to stay on the farm.

Advisory members to represent the interest of the association in their respective counties were chosen as follows: Mrs. Geo. Langston, Cisco, for Eastland County; R. E. Sherrill, Haskell County; Mrs. L. C. Vinson, Nolan County; W. C. Holden, Taylor County; Jno. R. Hutto, Leuders, Jones County.

It was voted that the charter of the association be held open for a period of three months in order that others may join as charter members. Headquarters are to remain in Abilene, but meetings may be held at other places by direction of the executive committee. A historical publication will be launched as soon as practical. The executive committee are anxious that all persons interested come into the organization at once and participate in its work.

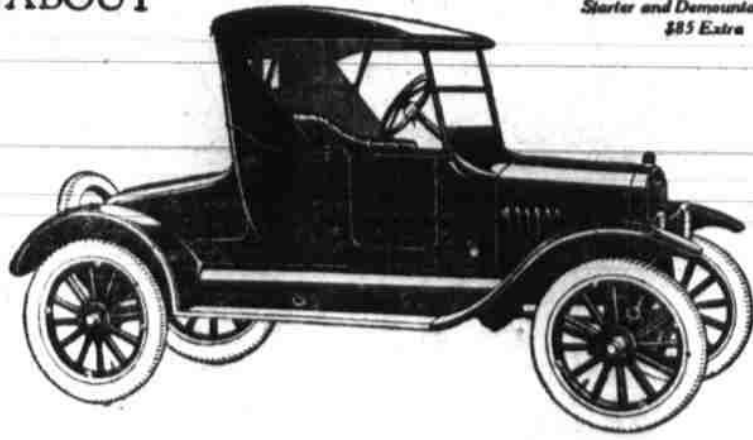
