stock in this country who came here to avoid Huguenot prosecution. They were protestants and are still true to the faith. But when the United States took over Louisiana the Romanist French did not assimilate like their Huguenot brethren. They still cling to the Catholic church, and today they still speak their own language, have their own institutions and try to undermine America. They have their French parochial schools, catholic and prejudiced. The French Huguenots became Americanized. The Louisiana French did not become Americanized. Their boys and girls are being taught to despise American institutions. What is the result...Babylon or confusion. Alien culture and alien creeds are working mischief. We are at the cross roads. Shall we advance or recede? The Klan aims to keep American institutions to the front, and to preserve our institutions and American traditions.

In his conclusion Hon. Wauken boxed how these pernicious foreign elements were submerging and destroying American ideals and the moral Anglo-Saxon protestant stock that founded the government and its institutions. He showed how Babylon and its glories fell because of these very evils that threaten this nation. Alexander, Caesar, and Rome, where are they? The homes, the churches, the schools, and the government are threatened. A solemn warning was given the audience that if it did not take steps to thwart these evils America would fall as did these by-gone empires. He denounced spiritual wickedness in high places, and recited Kipling's recession. "God of our fathers," he urged "be with us yet." The Knights of the Ku Klux Klan taught sacrificial service, a service demanded of all true loyal citizens.

"The Klan is a bulwark against Bolshevism and world wide ecclesiasticism. The southern Klan stood for protection and reduced lynch law. It has written its name in the pages of southern history. The Klan did it for civilization in the south, and we are following in its footsteps. Not only for America but for the whole world. The Klan is for sacrificial service."

In a parallel of the scoffing at Methuselah and the deluge, and why Noah built the ark, he said that in spite of the scoffing of the present day Ku Klux Klan was building the ark of American safety, against the coming deluge. Some objections had been raised to the regalia of the Klan. But it was a lodge regalia. In a Masonic lodge a white apron is used. Then why object? The regalia is but a symbol. He warned against the perils of prejudice raised by the Romanist, the Jew, and the Bolshevik. "Keep American ideals before the people. Perpetuate its institutions. Care for the homes, and the schools. Respect the government, and work for the good."

**MILK OF CHRISTIANITY FEEDS
 WORLD, BUT, SOURS BY
 HATE, IT BECOMES
 DEADLY POISON**

Recently papers of Lubbock contained the statement that five members of one family living in the country near our town had been poisoned by drinking milk. Two of the family are dead and the other three are yet in the hospital. There was no question as to the health of the cow that gave the milk. The trouble simply was that the milk, which was doubtless perfectly good at first, was allowed to stand in a tin pan until it became poisonous.

Not long ago I read of a little child who died suddenly of acute indigestion. The papers stated that the death was caused by drinking some milk and a little later drinking some orange juice. It was stated somewhat as an after thought that the milk was probably a little bit sour.

Food May Become Poison

There is a current belief in the minds of some people that it is poisonous to take fish and ice cream both at the same meal. A good physician told me that the basis for this belief lies in the fact that milk, even though pure in itself, furnishes an excellent culture for the development of any kind of germ, and that if there is any ptomaine at all in the fish, the milk in the ice cream will furnish an excellent means for propagating it and for developing the poison.

Every one knows that pure sweet milk is one of the most wholesome and nutritious foods to be found in all nature. And yet the instances given above, and others with which we are all familiar, show us that if even the best milk is improperly or carelessly handled, and allowed to spoil, it may become an exceedingly dangerous and deadly poison.

Has Spiritual Significance

Now there is an exceedingly close resemblance between milk on the one hand and a number of things that are of the highest value in the spiritual world. Shakespeare, for instance, speaks of "the milk of human kindness," and his expression has passed current among the classic phrases of the world. The Scripture speaks of human beings, "as new born babes, desiring the sincere milk of the world." In other words, there are many points of resemblance between milk in the material world, and love, or Christianity itself in the spiritual world.

No one in all the world has a word to say against Christianity as it comes fresh from the hands of Jesus and as it is embodied immediately in his words and teachings. There may be those who deride, or even execrate the church, but even atheists speaks only with commendation about the work of Jesus himself. There are multiplied millions of people in the world who believe that the teachings of Jesus are the one and only means for healing the diseases of the world and for solving its problems.

Milk of Christianity Sours

And yet no student of history and no observer of the times of today can fail to realize that it is possible for the milk of Christianity to sour and decay until, instead of being for the healing of the nations, it becomes a deadly poison.

In fact, just as there is no more potent force for good in all the world than the teachings of Jesus, so likewise there is no more virulent poison in all history than this same Christianity after it has gone sour.

If anyone doubts this fact, let him but think for a moment of the Spanish Inquisition. At this period in history, men cut each other's throats and burned each other at the stake, all in the name of the gentle Lord Jesus, the Prince of Peace.

The people who did this were not infidels. They believed in the historic Christ. They tortured and murdered their brothers in defense of what they truly believed to be the fundamentals of Christianity. In fact, the leaders in the inquisition were etbe fundamentalists of their time.

Religion Has Caused Wars

The massacre of the Huguenots was planned and carried out in the name of Christ. Many of the bloodiest wars in all history have been wars waged in the name of religion. Many of the feuds which have racked society in comparatively modern times have been brought about by difference in opinion on religious matters.

This is not necessarily a reflection on Christianity. Men do not lose faith in cows merely because ignorant or incompetent dairymen in some instances allow the milk to become contaminated and to be a source of death instead of life. Men should not lose faith in the teachings of Jesus merely because weak

and erring men have allowed these teachings to sour and to become perverted from their original purport.

Christianity May Become Poison

One does not have to read the history of the dark ages to become convinced that Christianity, if allowed to sour and become contaminated, may be turned into deadly poison. Here are some of the things I have observed within comparatively recent years:

1. I have seen a layman in the church writing in the public press and describing his own little denomination as a beautiful young woman and an allied denomination as a cruel tiger waiting with fangs and claws to tear this young woman to pieces.

2. I have seen statesmen who called themselves Christians striving desperately to keep America from entering any organization to make future wars impossible throughout the world.

3. I have seen ministers of the Gospel aligning themselves, by the hundreds with an organization that boldly proclaim a doctrine of hatred along lines of racial or national or denominational difference.

4. I have seen a bishop standing in the pulpit "waving the bloody shirt" exactly as the third-rate politicians used to do until they found that it did not pay; inflaming old hatreds and bitterness and reopening old wounds of sectional strife; all for fear the particular denomination he represented might perchance come a little closer to another very closely allied denomination, from which it had in the past been separated.

Men Denounced for Doctrines

5. I have seen a group of men who call themselves fundamentalists bitterly denouncing and striving to drive from the fold of Christianity men who differed with them in regard to certain Christian doctrines. I have heard them denounce such men as Harry Emerson Fosdick, the author of the little book entitled, "The Meaning of Prayer." I have heard them condemn to eternal torment such men as William Howard Taft and President Elliot, not for anything wrong in their lives, but because they were Unitarians.

6. I have seen a distinguished exponent of Christianity bitterly denouncing those men who believed in a certain scientific theory which has no more connection with the doctrines of Christianity than has Einstein's theory of relativity and which is understood fully by as small a number of people.

In fact, I have seen enough in our own generation to convince me that one of the greatest proofs of the divine power of Christianity is the fact that it has survived the ministrations of its misguided friends. If Christianity were purely a human institution it surely would have been killed by such misrepresentations as those referred to above.

Love Basis of Christianity

I do not undertake to say that the people above referred to, were not Christian people. I think they were even the bishop, though I would never have guessed it from his sermons. I merely feel that their Christianity has become so soured that at least in some instances it had become poisonous. I do not believe that any one of the instances referred to would meet with the approval of the great founder of Christianity.

It seems to me that we need a restatement of the fundamentals of Christianity. As I see it, the great fundamental doctrine taught by the founder of Christianity was Christianity which is based on that of love. Any presentation of hatred is as I see it, a soured perversion of Christian teachings. I believe that any doctrine which teaches men to love one another would meet with the approval of Jesus and that any doctrine which teaches men to hate one another would meet with his disapproval.

I know very little and care very little about the controversies between the fundamentalists and the modernists. I know, however, that these controversies are very bitter. A modernist, as I gather from the discourses of the fundamentalists, is a man whose theology is slightly above that of an atheist and whose mentality is slightly below that of a moron. I do not believe that Jesus would approve of such classification.

How can you keep milk from spoiling? Drink it; or else make it up into some form of permanent usefulness.

How can you allow milk to become poisonous? Simply allow it to stand exposed to the air in tin or brass vessels. (I have it on good authority that a man without love in his heart is "a sounding brass or a tinkling cymbal.")

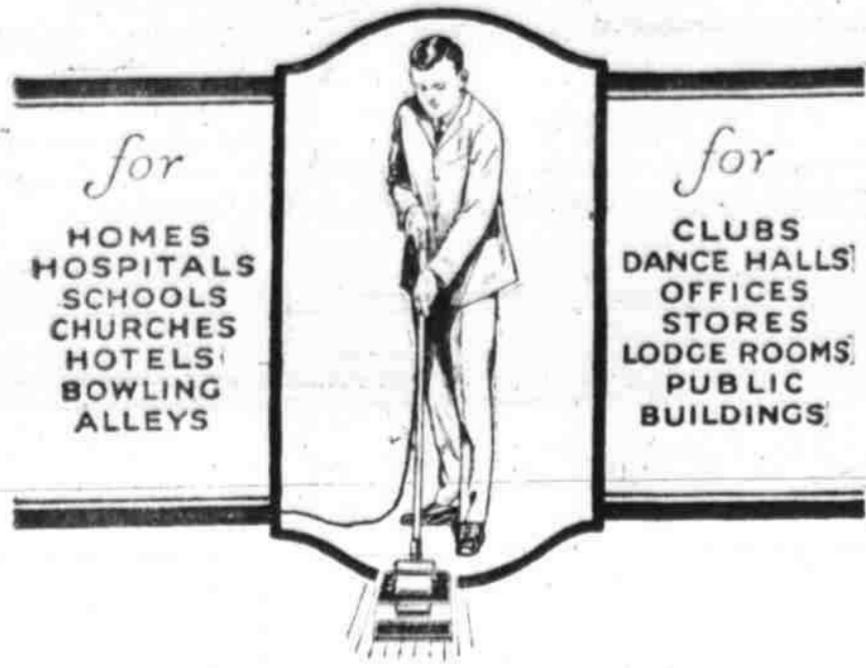

Smith County's Ten-Year Program.

Down in Smith county where Tyler is the county seat there is a man whose name is Judge J. W. Fitzgerald. And as much dust and water as there is in Texas we don't see why the Lord did not make enough Judge Fitzgeralds so that every county in Texas could have at least one. But since He did not, then all Texas should rejoice that there is even ONE Judge Fitzgerald, who has a vision in both his head and his heart for not only HIS HOME COUNTY but for every county in Texas. Not everybody could apply the exact pattern of his vision to their county, but they might modify the pattern to fit the natural conditions of their county.

Joseph of Bible times was not the only man of vision and vision that will be full of dreams even today. And how many of us have some dreams which we dream it is the vision in the mirror of the future and then go to work with his hands, his head and his heart to make that dream and that vision come true? When would we ever have a railroad if men waited until the railroad was needed to build it? Men build railroads and then the railroads make possible the demand for them. Somebody must look ahead into the future of every generation of human beings and open the door of opportunity for that generation.

Judge Fitzgerald Opens the Door of opportunity to every man, woman and child in Smith county and invites them to walk in and possess Smith county anew in all its richness and fruitfulness. And from his example we may all profit if we will.

The Origin of His Vision.

Judge Fitzgerald is a banker-farmer in Smith county and he has observed this lesson. There was a time when Smith county, Texas, was new. There was a time when there were not so many people in Smith county to be fed as there are today. And there was a time when there were not so many children to be educated and so many homes to be developed and made fit to live in. And when that time was, there was another peculiar condition that is now entirely out of date. Fifty years ago, even twenty-five years ago, when there were not so many homes in Smith county it did not take much to make a home and rear a family in that day as it does today. Therefore, as the population has increased and the land has been drained to support it instead of living expenses going down they have GONE UP. And the business of making a home and rearing a family has become a more complex business. Why, many a man spends more these days to support his automobiles and his dogs than he does to support his children. The question is what is going to become of the CHILDREN if we do not find some better ways of producing crops and food and clothing. That's Smith county's problem this very day. How to make Smith county keep up with the 20th century and make the 20th century living for its 20th century people.

Everybody's Problem.

And is that not YOUR problem in your county and in everybody's county. We are trying to live our 1925 model lives on the same old 19th century income. And that is one big reason so many of us are skidding into a domestic or economic ditch.

Seeing this, Judge Fitzgerald called his neighbors and patrons and his townsmen and countrymen together and they plotted a new plan of life for Smith county for the next TEN years. And the most marvelous part of it all is the fact that thousands of the Smith county people have positively pledged themselves to help carry out the plan. The Tyler Chamber of Commerce is for it. The county press is behind it. The farmers are behind it. The ministers and lawyers and teachers are behind it. All this means that Smith county WILL carry out her ten-year program and their dreams will more than come true.

The DREAM.

"Realizing that our present method of farming spells disaster and ruin, we have banded together for a quick uplift, right about face, a determination to take the lead and keep it, making Smith county the banner county of Texas. It can be done. It must be done. Fall in line. Let's pull together."

"Don't Be a Knocker."

"Don't take the opposite side. Be honest with yourself. We are speaking our best thoughts straight into

your soul and saying that you have got to build up your FARMS or move off and leave them."

The following sixteen points make up the new farm program for Smith county's TEN-YEAR demonstration:

1. Every farmer own his own land.
2. Better homes, better farms for all.
3. Every farm properly terraced and drained.
4. Better accommodations for tenants.
5. Soil conservation and soil building with legumes.
6. A three year crop rotation scheme on every farm.
7. Feed and food crops 40 per cent of cultivated acreage.
8. Home orchard and an all-the-year round garden.
9. 20 hens, one cow, one sow for every farm.
10. No scrub seed, no scrub soil, no scrub farming.
11. Liberal, sensible use of credit.
12. No financial speculation on a farm.
13. Better farm homes, better farmsteads.
14. 1924 for good means in acquiring homes.
15. Community fairs in every section of the county.
16. Good schools and churches for ALL. Unfailing fellowship for ALL.

These are the high points in Smith county's farm program. Can anybody imagine what the harvest would be if these sixteen points could be carried out 100 per cent? Smith county even has an ideal farm plotted which they are holding up before their people as a family goal. Their ideal farm might not fit the average family in your county. But would it not be a fine thing if every county in Texas would work out an ideal farm for their county and then all work together to help every family reach that ideal? There is a lesson in Smith county's Ten-Year Farm Program for every county in the whole United States. And there is a new germ of hope in Judge Fitzgerald's vision for every homeless family in this nation; And the beauty of it all is that we might all dream and try to make our dreams come true. Every county could have a ten-year program.

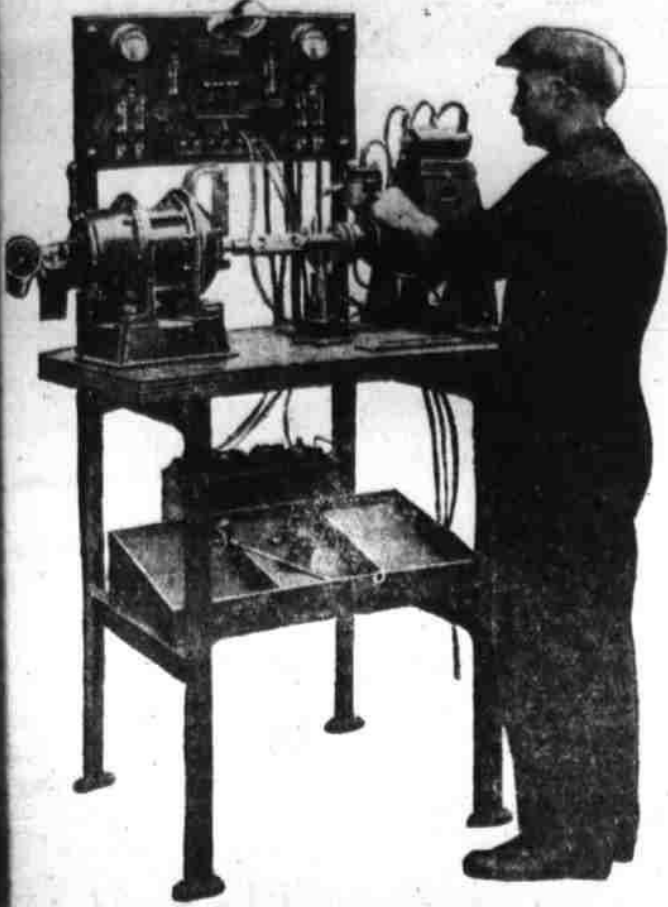

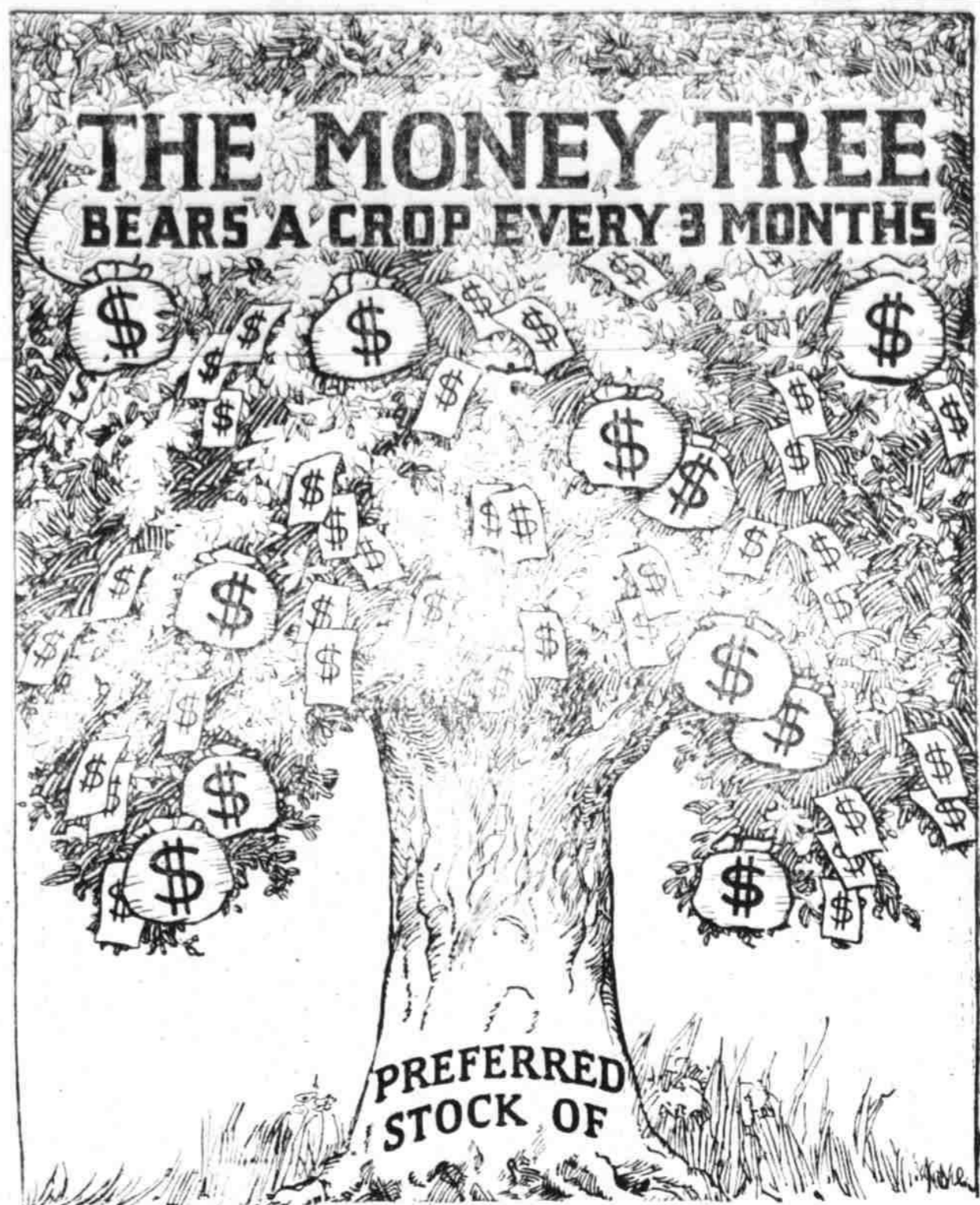

BRYAN HELD MODERNISTS AS BITTEREST ENEMIES

William Jennings Bryan regarded advocates of the teaching of evolution in the public schools as his bitter enemies and the evolution issue as the most important question confronting the American people in an interview a week before he died.

The Commoner requested his views not be published at the time because of the pending Scopes trial. "In all my days of public life, I have never been so abused by anyone as by the evolutionary crowd—not even by Republicans," he said. "They misrepresent me and they vilify me. The defense in this case can not open their mouths without hurling insults at me.

"The issue, one year from today, is going to be more burning than it is now," he continued, referring to the enormous flood of publicity attendant upon the trial. "The churches at last are awake. I confess I was disappointed by their lethargy and indifference toward this question, which strikes at their roots. But now they are aroused. They are talking about it. They are in the fight to stay."

The Commoner told how at least seven Legislatures were going to

take up anti-evolution measures as soon as they met, and he expressed the belief the movement would spread.

Bryan declared he had no intention of seeking a union of the churches to defend Christianity from evolutionist onslaughts.

"On the contrary," he said, "it is better that they continue as they are. With more churches you have more people active, more ministers, more Sunday school teachers and more active workers in the field. If I had the choice of establishing one church of a thousand members or 10 churches of 100 members, I would choose the latter. For I would have ten ministers and Sunday school superintendents at work, where in the former I would have but one each. I have never suggested a union of the churches."

Bryan was particularly bitter at the tactics of modernist ministers, who, he said, undermined Christianity from within and could not be driven into the open.

"How many people do you think would attend a church which hung out a sign, 'Church of the Unresurrected Christ?'" he asked. — Fort Worth Press.

SNOW FALLS SIX HOURS IN EL PASO

El Paso, Texas, Aug. 1.—Despite the fact that the thermometer registered above 100 degrees early in the week, snowflakes fell here for six hours Friday. Heavy snow clouds hid the peaks of mountains in the Franklin Range near here.

JUSTICE VS. SLUSH

The jury system was devised back in Anglo-Saxon days to see that justice was done—that an overbearing lord could not deal out excessive punishment to a lowly fieldholder.

Today, the average jury in Texas has failed utterly in backbone and in the purpose for which it was created. The jury box has become the nesting place of those who dry their eyes at the heart-stirring plea of the highly paid defense counsel.

The duty of the juror in a criminal case is that justice be done to society—to the community—as well as to the man who sits at the judgment bar. Justice does not contemplate any sentimental feeling for the defendant. A juror may feel sorry for him—but justice contemplated doing one's duty—not allowing feelings to run loose.

The performance of justice in criminal cases, especially murder cases, means that proper punishment must be dealt out to offenders, so that society may be protected and the law upheld. The task is not always easy. Jurors are but human. They allow sentiment and undue sympathy to prevail. Here is the offender before them. He is, of course, penitent. He knows his career, his liberty, maybe his life, is at stake. Perhaps his mother is present. She is in tears. Out yonder away from the court is the public. It is an abstract thing. Its rights do not carry a direct human appeal.

So the prisoner seems to be the object of persecution. The jury feels he ought to be given "a chance," maybe he isn't so bad after all. But that is mere sloppiness. And justice is not a sloppy thing. It is hard. It ought to be. It must be. If the criminal is to be discouraged and human life and property made safe.

The great need in Texas today—in West Texas and in Tom Green county—is for men who will sit in the jury box and not forget what they are there for. There is only one way to put a stop to the better than three murders a day in Texas and that is to get juries who will stop it by giving the Lone Star State and her citizens justice.

Texas deserves a better reputation than three murders a day. Texas need have no such record if jurors, in their high position, will keep their minds steadfast upon the issues in the case and remember that the man who once lived is now dead—that a life has been taken and that a man who put no value on a human life, has already placed this valuation on his own.

Jurors—do your duty to your friends—to your own families, when you get in the jury box.—San Angelo Standard.

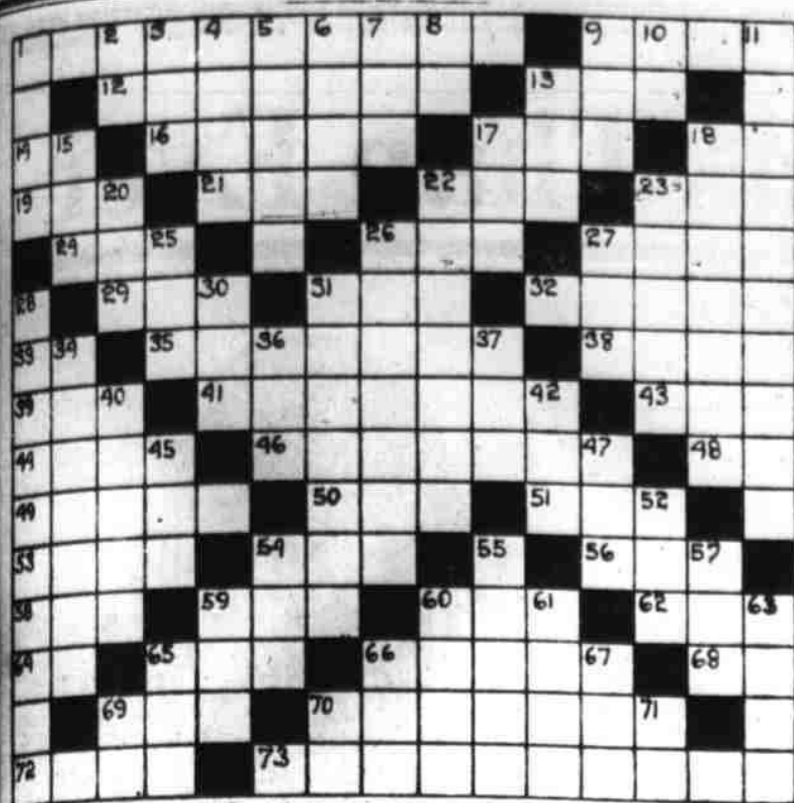

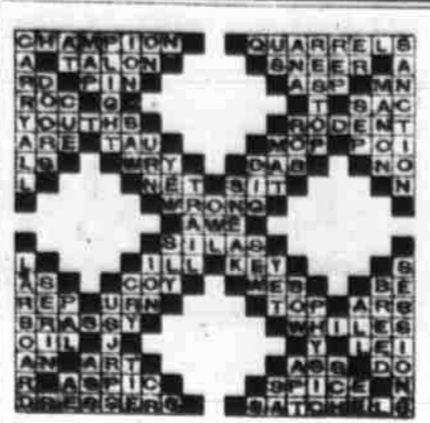
