Lord's Day-Bill Bagwell,

AN ORDINANCE BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS, PRO-HIBITING "U" TURNS AT THE INTERSECTION OF THIRD AND MAIN STREETS, AND PRESCRIBING A PEN-ALTY FOR VIOLATION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS: SECTION 1. It shall be unlaw-

ful for any person driving or operating a motor vehicle to make what is commonly known as a "U" Turn at the intersection of Third and Main Street.

SECTION 2. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misconviction shall be punished by a fine of not more than Twenty-Five Dollars.

C. Wurzbach, Medina; J. M. Campbell, Dallas; T. S. Cunningham, Fannin; E. D. Altemus, Galveston: J. H. Brison, Camp: J. C. Ferguson, Kleberg, and C. M. Caraway, Comanche county. The average size of the farms operated by these men was 395 acres, 242 of which were in cultivation. Their farms were well equipped. which is shown by the fact that their average total investment was \$63,514. Human Nature Clinics

BY THOMAS ARKLE CLARK

BELONG to far too many things and am engaged in a

shameful number of activities. Betions to which I am attached and the number of committees of which I am a member, I feel sure that much of my effort is useless, many of my memberships merely a name. I scatter my energies far too much, and take a minor part in too many investigations.

In spite of the number of organizations now extant and in spite of the large percentage of this number to which I belong, I should be glad to be a charter member of a new one-a society for the discouragement of investigations. Scarcely a day goes by-certainly not a week-that I do not receive a long questionnaire from some inquisitive soul or organization asking for detailed information of one sort or another which it is supposed that I shall be able to fur-

One cannot always ignore the investigator by throwing his request into the wastebasket, and one can still less afford ordinarily to give the time and thought necessary properly to fill out his ques-tionnaire.







\$250,000 Granted for Research at Texas U

AUSTIN, Aug. 3.-An uncondi tional grant of \$250,000 to extend over a period of five years has been made to the University of Texas by the Laura Spelman Rockefeller Memorial Foundation in order that the University may inaugurate a program of research in economics and business administration and the related social sciences, according to an announce ment made by C. D. Simmons, secretary of the Board of Regents of the University. Definite plans were made at a recent meeting of the board for the beginning of this program during the coming year when the first \$50,000 of the grant becomes available.
