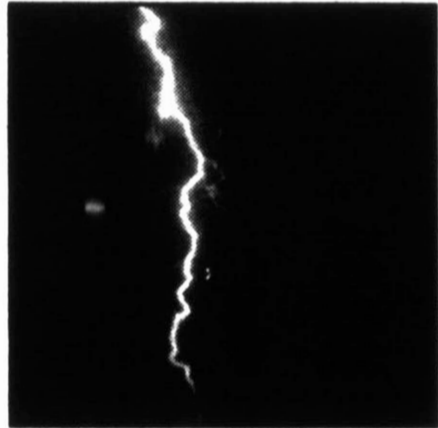

Rainfall possibility returns to forecast

The relentless summer heat could be interrupted in some parts of Texas by showers and thunderstorms, according to an Associated Press report.

A weak upper-level disturbance toward the northeastern Panhandle is dropping scattered showers and thunderstorms on the region.

Scattered showers and thunderstorms were also moving Wednesday through the eastern High Plains.

Early-morning readings were mostly in the 60s to 80s. Extremes were 64 degrees at Marfa and 84 at Del Rio.

Other readings were 72 degrees at Conroe and 81 at both Childress and Odessa.

Winds were mostly northerly to northeasterly at 5 to 15 mph.

More sweltering temperatures and partly cloudy skies were expected through the start of the weekend in the central Plains from West Texas to Missouri. Heat advisories were in effect for most of Arkansas.

The National Weather Service forecasts afternoon and evening thunderstorms through Thursday.

Daytime highs through Thursday should range from the 90s to around 100, except 103 in the far south and near 108 in the Big Bend valleys.

Lows overnight were expected from the 60s to 70s.

Cirrus clouds covered northwestern parts of North Texas.

City officials hope some added cash will encourage residents to help clean up city alleyways, backyards and porches.

Since late last year, the city has offered residents the chance to claim vouchers when they bring in whole loads of trash or building materials and a \$1 per item for junked appliances, furniture or bedding. In April, the city tried to spur more interest in the "Trash for Cash" program by increasing the voucher amount to \$4 per cubic yard or junk appliance.

About \$5,700 in vouchers were issued.

The city will try the increased payment program again this weekend, according to City Manager Chester Nolen.

Nolen said the effort was so successful in April that the administration decided to do it again. The city landfill will be open 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Saturday and 1-5 p.m. Sunday for residents to dump trash. They will receive vouchers for \$4 per cubic yard or \$4 per appliance or similar large item.

Officials ask that household trash

not be brought to the dump, but only large items, which would normally not be allowed in dumpsters. Nolen also said tires will not be accepted at the landfill.

City dump rules remain in effect during the extended hours. All loads must be covered or tied down, and residents need to bring a copy of their water bill or drivers license as proof of residency.

Officials hope this temporary change in policy will encourage residents to get rid of some of the unsightly piles of refuse which builds up.

AERIAL SPRAYING

Another round of aerial spraying for mosquito and fly control will be Thursday, or the first available day thereafter, weather permitting.

Nolen said mosquitoes continue to be a problem in the city requiring him to request the second round of aerial spraying. Acknowledging complaints about the last spraying, which took place during the Hereford Open golf tournament, Nolen said future aerial applications will be on weekdays only.

CRITICS CRY FOUL

Congressional Republicans claim 'power grab' by the Clinton administration in requiring states to develop new pollution control rules for waterways

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional critics accuse the Clinton administration of conducting a "power grab" by moving to require states to develop new pollution control plans for dirty waterways just days before legislation blocking such regulations can go into effect.

Now the question is whether Republicans can muster enough bipartisan support to overturn the action by the Environmental Protection Agency within 60 days, as provided by the law. Such a prospect is slim in an election year when few lawmakers — Democrats or Republicans — want to be labeled anti-environment.

The decision may fall to Texas Gov. George W. Bush, if he is elected president, to decide whether to roll back the new rules before they take effect late next year, some opponents

of the regulations conceded.

The regulations issued Tuesday by the EPA require states to examine more than 20,000 lakes, streams and other waterways, establish which ones are most polluted and develop a cleanup program to meet federal water quality standards. The new cleanup requirements eventually could cost farmers, businesses and other polluters billions of dollars a year.

President Clinton called the new regulations "a critical common-sense step to ensure clean, safe water for all Americans" and said the rules can be implemented "in close partnership" with states and local communities.

EPA Administrator Carol Browner issued the new regulations only days before Clinton was expected to sign into law a must-have emergency

spending bill that contains a provision specifically barring the EPA from issuing the rule.

"It's a tremendous thumb in the eye to the United States Congress," complained Sen. Tim Hutchinson, R-Ark., echoing other GOP lawmakers angered over what they viewed as "a slap in the face" of Congress, which had wanted the rules delayed for 16 months.

Opponents of the new rules accused the Clinton administration of pushing out the rules despite widespread concern from many governors, the business community, farmers and lawmakers on Capitol Hill about the requirements' costs and complaints that the EPA was trying to thwart the authority of states in dealing with water quality issues.

Although some believe the time allowed for waterway cleanup is still

far too long, many environmentalists said the EPA action marks the first time the federal government has directly addressed the problem of waterways polluted by runoff from agriculture, industry, construction and other so-called non-point sources.

Largely because of such pollution, 40 percent of the country's lakes and streams currently are so dirty people can't fish or swim in them, according to the EPA.

Instead of requiring specific plants or businesses to reduce pollution through restrictive permits, as already is done widely, the EPA wants states to examine the waterways individually, determine the maximum amount of pollution that each can sustain, and craft a cleanup plan that brings the water within federal health standards.

Compromise sought on Medicare drug plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman of the Senate Finance Committee said a draft Medicare prescription drug plan is an attempt to reach elusive compromise on what has become a major political issue. The government would pay a share of older Americans' drug costs under the proposal.

"This has been a real effort to bring together a bipartisan program," said the chairman, Sen. William Roth, R-Del. "We're all in agreement that Medicare is one of our most important domestic programs, but it has to be brought into the 21st century."

The Senate Finance Committee met behind closed doors Wednesday to discuss the plan, which aims for a middle ground between President Clinton's large new government entitlement plan and a House Republican bill based on subsidized private

insurance.

A senior White House official said today that the plan could form a basis for compromise but that details would have to be carefully examined.

"It certainly is a step away from the unworkable House Republican plan, but it remains unclear as to whether or not there will be enough steps to ensure that it achieves the president's bottom line of a meaningful, affordable prescription drug benefit," said Chris Jennings, the president's top health policy adviser.

The senior Democrat on the Finance Committee, Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan of New York, said Democrats "very much welcome" the Roth proposal as a starting point.

"This is a positive event and a welcome event in a season where there aren't many such," Moynihan said.

Food bank receives 2 grants

AMARILLO — A \$110,000 in grants will be used for an expansion project at the High Plains Food Bank.

The food bank received a \$90,000 grant from the Brumley Foundation and a \$20,000 grant from the John D. and Nona Payne Foundation to fund an expansion project.

According to food bank spokesperson Mandy Wulfman, the Brumley Foundation provided the grant monies because foundation officials are committed to help organizations and projects that serve the needy throughout the Texas Panhandle. The Payne Foundation grant was made because of the food bank's service into the Pampa area.

In 1999, more than 385,000 pounds of food was delivered into Pampa to assist that community's

needy. The High Plains Food Bank is an area agency, with more than one-third of the distribution going into towns outside Amarillo. In 1999, the agency distributed a total of 3.56 million pounds of food, with more than 1.15 million pounds of the donated food being delivered to 13 different communities serving 27 counties.

The High Plains Food Bank has launched a capital campaign to double the size of the facility at 815 Ross. The expansion project will provide increased freezer and cooler capacity and enlarge the warehouse and salvage repack areas.

The agency now sends trucks each Wednesday and Thursday to deliver

food into Borger, Clarendon, Childress, Dalhart, Dumas, Dimmitt, Hereford, Hedley, Memphis, Panhandle, Perryton and Tulia. It also services Wellington once a month and Pampa twice a month.

The deliveries are made in the food bank's refrigerated trucks, enabling area agencies to receive greater quantities of food, including fresh vegetables, frozen and perishable food products.

Hundreds of lives of low-income children and individuals are touched each month through the efforts of 89 non-profit organizations and churches in the area.

25th executive scheduled

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) — Lubbock apartment resident Orien Cecil Joiner called police to tell them he discovered the bloody bodies of the two women who lived next door to him.

What authorities later determined was that even though he told of seeing two men fleeing the women's apartment and escaping over a fence, it was Joiner who wreaked the havoc a week before Christmas 1986.

The former long-haul truck driver faced lethal injection Wednesday evening for killing the Lubbock waitresses, Carol Huckabee, 26, and Eva Marie DeForest, 29.

The execution of Joiner, 50, would bring to 25 the number of condemned inmates put to death in Texas this year. One more execution is set for later this month and at least six are scheduled for August.

Both victims were bound with duct tape. DeForest was stabbed 41 times, her throat was cut and the broken knife blade was left sticking out of her chest. Huckabee, her roommate, had her face and neck slashed plus four stab wounds to her chest. Both were raped during or after the fatal attacks.

DNA tests fail to clear convict

ARLINGTON, Va. (AP) — New DNA tests have failed to clear a Texas inmate given a reprieve by Gov. George W. Bush last month just minutes before he was to be executed on rape and murder convictions, according to USA Today.

The way Bush has dealt with the death penalty in two terms as Texas governor has been a campaign issue as he awaits formal nomination next month as the Republican candidate for president.

Sources close to the case told the newspaper in Wednesday's editions that recent tests by the FBI point to Ricky McGinn or a maternal relative as the source of a public hair found inside the body of Stephanie Flanary, 12, the convicted man's stepdaughter.

The paper noted that no member of McGinn's family has been linked to the case.

He was facing execution the night of June 1 after being convicted in 1995 of raping and killing the girl an exhausting all appeals. But Bush granted a reprieve less than 30 minutes before the scheduled execution to allow time for DNA testing.

McGinn, 43, and his attorneys wanted additional DNA testing, which they hoped would exonerate him. Although DNA evidence was used by prosecutors to help convict McGinn of the May 1993 rape and ax slaying of the girl.

Throckmorton in search of water

Officials buy supplies as city wells go dry

ABILENE, Texas (AP) — You'd have to be pretty thirsty to go 35 miles for a drink of water. Throckmorton is.

The prospect that the town's sole source of water, Lake Throckmorton, could be too low to use for drinking water in less than 90 days has spurred municipal officials to go to nearby Graham to try to buy supplies.

According to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, the town of 1,036 residents is one of 129 Texas towns and cities with water

restrictions and the only one that is in danger of losing its water supply in less than a month and a half. Throckmorton residents can't wash their cars or water their plants.

The town is so parched, Gov. George W. Bush has declared it a disaster area.

Throckmorton has an \$800,000 state grant to build a pipeline, but has yet to find another town to buy water from.

Throckmorton officials will meet with the Graham city council Thursday to work out a deal to buy water from the comparatively water-logged city nestled between lakes Graham and Eddleman and the Brazos River.

Graham has so much water, it sells the Fort Belknap Water Supply Corp. water for

rural Young County residents and Elbert, which is 13 miles northeast of Throckmorton.

But Throckmorton officials were tightlipped about their prospects to tap into Graham's water, 35 miles to the east.

"We'll know more Thursday," Steve Bowlin, Throckmorton's director of public works, told the Abilene Reporter-News.

Throckmorton officials hope to be able to buy up to 125,000 gallons per day from Graham during emergency conditions.

If the towns reach an agreement, Throckmorton will use its recently approved \$800,000 grant from Texas' Small Towns Environment Program to lay a 13-mile pipeline to Elbert to connect to the Fort Belknap Corp.'s line.

But the grant will only pay for the pipe to lay the line

and a pumping station, the town will have to find volunteers to lay the line. Bowlin said the city should have no problem finding enough volunteers.

"We're pretty proud out here, though, and don't like to ask for help to lay our own pipeline," Bowlin said. "People are just getting anxious to get this problem solved and anxious to work on the pipeline."

The deal would also require a replacement for the 4-inch pipeline that runs from Elbert to Graham. The line could only move 65,000 gallons of water a day, about half of what Throckmorton wants.

Fort Belknap Corp. officials say they plan to build an 8-inch pipeline using U.S. Department of Agriculture grants and loans that would handle Throckmorton's thirst.

Officials resume search for missing atheist

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Federal agents and cadaver dogs have returned to a Central Texas campground to search for the remains of missing

atheist Madalyn Murray O'Hair and two of her children, but again found no trace.

"They completed their search around noon (Tuesday) and did not find the remains of the O'Hairs. We were acting on newly acquired information, looking at the same campground but in a different area than we did on previous trips," FBI spokesman Darren Holmes told the San Antonio Express News.

Two searches of the Real County ranch last year were also futile.

The lack of bodies has hampered further prosecution and cast doubt in the federal trial of 52-year-old Gary Paul Karr this summer. Karr was the only man charged in the disappearance of the famous atheist, her son, Jon Garth Murray, and granddaughter, Robin Murray O'Hair.

The O'Hairs disappeared from San Antonio along with \$500,000 in gold coins in Sep-

tember 1995. Madalyn Murray O'Hair is best known for a 1963 Supreme Court decision that, along with a ruling the previous year, struck down organized prayer in public schools as unconstitutional.

At the time, authorities were unsure if they were victims of foul play or merely ran off with the money from their organization, United Secularists of America. Others suggested O'Hair, who was 77 and ailing, had gone off to die quietly so Christians wouldn't pray over her.

Federal agents, however, believe there was extreme violence. They have theorized the O'Hairs were killed and cut up into pieces before being buried somewhere in large plastic drums.

But without bodies, a federal jury had a hard time convicting Karr of anything more than extorting money from the missing atheists in 1995.

Karr faced five charges, not including murder, and was acquitted of federal kidnapping charges because without bodies, jurors disagreed on whether the famous atheist, her son and granddaughter are alive or dead.

Karr still faces life in prison under the so-called federal three-strikes law because of prior convictions. Sentencing is scheduled for Aug. 4.

Last year, Karr allegedly gave police a map of the site showing where the bodies were buried. His attorney, Tom Mills, said Karr had not talked to investigators recently.

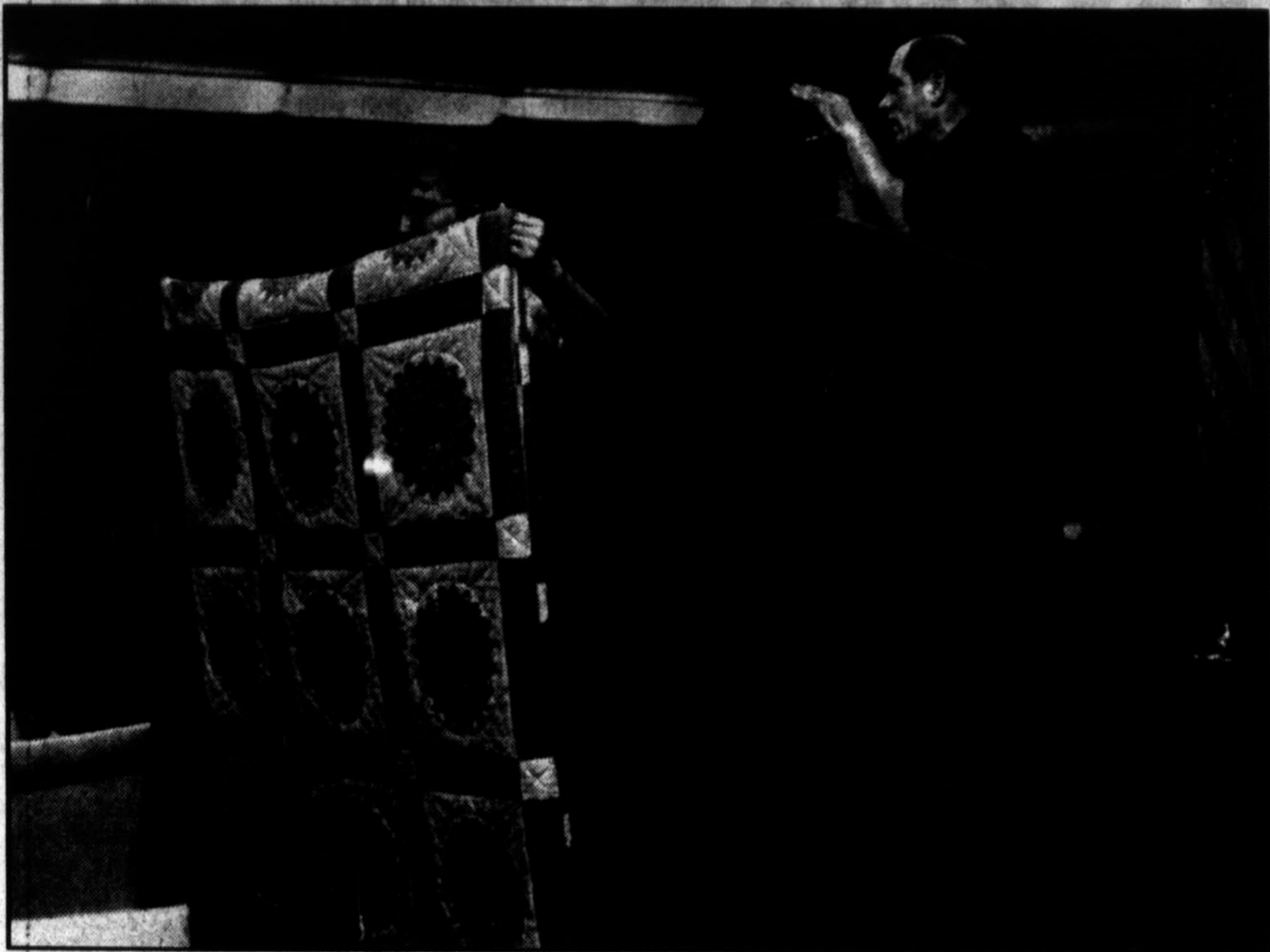

■ Poll suggests Bush could gain edge in key swing state by picking governor as his vice presidential running mate

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — The presidential race in Pennsylvania remains close, but a new poll suggests George W. Bush could gain an edge there by picking Tom Ridge, the governor of that key swing state, as his vice presidential running mate.

The Keystone Poll, conducted by Millersville University's Center for Politics and Public Affairs and released Wednesday, showed Bush with 44 percent support and Al Gore with 40 percent.

The margin of error for the survey of 634 registered voters was 4 percentage points, making the race too close to call. It was conducted from June 8 through Sunday.

But if the Republican Bush put Ridge on his ticket, the poll shows the Texas governor's support climbing to 51 percent and Gore's dropping to 39 percent. The poll did not have a four-way hypothetical matchup.

Pollster G. Terry Madonna said the message was clear.

"Right now, it could go either way," Madonna said. "If Bush picks Ridge, the evidence shows that he is making a decision that will probably result in gaining 23 electoral votes."

Ridge appears to help Bush most with undecided voters — nearly 21 percent of whom said they would be "more likely" to vote for Bush with Ridge as No. 2, compared with only 10 percent who said they would be "less likely" to vote for Bush-Ridge.

Gore campaign officials noted that the Democratic vice president was virtually tied with Bush in a state that has a Republican governor serving his second term.

"We're going to continue to focus on the economic prosperity that has benefited the people of Pennsylvania because that is obviously resonating with voters," spokesman Doug Hattaway said.

He said Gore's campaign would not change tactics if Bush were to choose Ridge.

The Bush campaign did not immediately return calls for comment.

However, Ridge spokesman Tim Reeves predicted a Bush win regardless of the choice for No. 2.

"Governor Ridge has always made the point that he does not believe Governor Bush needs him to win Pennsylvania," Reeves said. "Governor Bush's message will win Pennsylvania on its own."

Ridge is among those being considered for a running mate, but his support for abortion rights are at odds with Bush. Some conservatives have expressed concern about having Ridge on the ticket.

But the poll also suggested that Bush might not lose much support from anti-abortion voters in Pennsylvania by picking Ridge. Only 13 percent of those identifying themselves as "pro-life" said they were "less likely" to vote for Bush were Ridge to be his running mate.

New anthrax vaccine supplier being sought by the Pentagon

WASHINGTON (AP) — With its ambitious anthrax immunization program hobbled by a shortage of vaccine, the Pentagon is trying to get a new source for the millions of doses it needs each year — something officials admit they should have done two years ago.

Dependent entirely on a dwindling stockpile of vaccine, the Pentagon is limiting vaccinations only to soldiers in the most risky areas: South Korea and the Mideast-Persian Gulf region. Elsewhere, the program is effectively shut down until the sole manufacturer, Bioport of Lansing,

Mich., gains approval for production from its new manufacturing plant.

"In retrospect, I wish that we would have immediately advertised for a second source," said Marine Maj. Gen. Randy L. West, Pentagon senior adviser on chemical and biological protection. The Pentagon still wants to immunize all 2.4 million military members worldwide against the deadly bacterium that it considers a potential weapon of war.

Vaccinations will be cut from 75,000 a month to about 14,000, West said. Defense Secretary William Cohen an-

nounced the vaccination slowdown on Monday as he was en route to China, and the Pentagon provided details at a briefing Tuesday.

"We thought we were on safer ground than we turned out to be," West said, adding that even with the slowdown, supplies will run out in six to 10 months.

Bioport, which has had difficulty getting Food and Drug Administration approval for production from its new plant, has agreed to cooperate with another manufacturer, he said. FDA approval would also be required for a second source, which could take up to sev-

eral years.

"Because of the problems we've had and the lessons we've learned, we feel it's worth the investment to (find) a second source," West said. Since 1998, when the inoculation program began, "the threat has only increased," he said.

Anthrax vaccines also are produced in Britain and Russia, but neither has FDA approval for U.S. use, and Britain's vaccine also is in limited supply for its nonmandatory program. The Russians use a live vaccine which likely would not be considered, West said.

FAA plan to limit delays falls short

CHICAGO (AP) — A Federal Aviation Administration program designed to reduce flight delays hasn't done much yet, according to newly released data.

After record delays in 1999 and 1998, the FAA unveiled new initiatives earlier this year to keep planes flying despite poor weather.

On-time performance nationwide fell to a record low in June, the FAA said Tuesday.

"While we have had some unusual thunderstorm patterns again this summer, I don't

think the FAA's much-vaunted initiative to route planes around bad weather passed the laugh test," said David Stempler, president of the Air Travelers Association.

"Despite the promised improvements, you still have airplanes packed with passengers being held on the ground for hours all over the country and the FAA is crying 'Weather, weather, weather.'"

"There is a crisis of delays out there and people should expect major delays every summer until the FAA starts addressing the underlying

problems instead of just the symptoms," said David Fuscus, spokesman for the Air Transport Association, which represents the major airlines.

FAA officials declined to comment on the delays, but said the new system wasn't intended to be a panacea.

"It's a complex process and we're making improvements all the time," said FAA spokesman Bill Shumann.

The minimum distance between planes flying the same route was to be shortened to fit more planes into congested airspace.

The FAA also promised that planes held on the ground because of threatening weather would be given a specific projected departure time, unlike in the past when passengers weren't told when their planes might take off.

Bush holding 2-1 lead over Gore in Oklahoma

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — Republican Gov. George W. Bush has a 2-1 margin over Democratic Vice President Al Gore among Oklahomans who have already made up their minds for president, according to the latest Oklahoma Poll.

A survey of 750 registered statewide voters conducted June 21-26 by Consumer Logic showed 57 percent for Bush, 27 percent for Gore and 16 percent undecided when asked who they would vote for if the election were held today. The poll, sponsored by the Tulsa World, has a margin of error rate of plus or minus 3.5 percent.

The poll has tracked the Bush-Gore sentiment since the first quarter of 1999. Gore

has never threatened Bush. The last time Oklahoma voted Democratic in a presidential race was in 1964 when Lyndon B. Johnson was elected.

During the period since the first quarter of 1999, support for Bush has ranged from 49 to 66 percent. His low of 49 percent came in January, which was also Gore's best showing at 32 percent. Soltow said 20 percent of those surveyed in January had no preference.

"It goes without saying, Gore doesn't appear to have much of a chance at all in Oklahoma," said poll consultant Al Soltow, director of research at the University of Tulsa.

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'The Playmaker' calls it a career

Former Cowboy receiver set to take job as Fox Sports Net analyst

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Ten minutes after he retired from football, Michael Irvin was already making headway in his new job as an NFL broadcaster.

Making his way through the crowd at his farewell news conference, Irvin shared a few moments with good pal and former Dallas Cowboys teammate Deion Sanders. They whispered some pleasantries, then Irvin got down to business.

"I'm going to call you," Irvin said.

"I'll give you your first exclusive," Sanders said.

Irvin switched teams Tuesday, going from the Cowboys to Fox Sports Net. It was difficult for the former All-Pro receiver to leave the game he loved, yet he realized it was the right thing to do after learning of a frightening spine condition.

"My doctor basically said I could play if I really wanted to," Irvin said. "It became an emotional thing, a family thing."

He struggled with the decision for months. Then he was playing with his kids one day and saw his wife crying. The tears came from thinking that Irvin might return to football and suffer an in-

jury that would leave him paralyzed.

All football players face that risk every play, but Irvin learned Oct. 10 that he was particularly in jeopardy. A herniated disc that left him temporarily paralyzed in a game against Philadelphia uncovered that he had a narrow spine.

"I tried to rationalize it: 'Any hit can be your last hit. You've been doing that all your life.' But I've accomplished a great deal of things that I wanted to accomplish, and at this juncture there's no need to risk it and go on," he said.

So, as his mother told him, Irvin is closing one door and opening another. Rather than playing football, he'll be talking about it, working primarily on the Sunday pre-game show "NFL This Morning."

"I'm looking forward to watching him," Dallas quarterback Troy Aikman said. "Michael always has taken a shine to cameras."

Irvin's high-profile hiring is an indication the public has forgiven him for his bad-boy days.

After reaching his on-field peak by capturing three Super Bowls in four years, Irvin's image went in the gutter beginning with an arrest at a motel room following a celebration of his 30th birthday in March 1996.

He went on trial that summer and settled by pleading no contest to felony drug charges. He recently completed a four-year probation.

Late that year, he was falsely accused of sexual assault. In 1998, he cut a teammate's neck with a pair of scissors while horsing around in a dormitory during training camp.

"I know fans were upset," Irvin said. "But they got back to loving me. I've been running into a great deal of fans and none have been conflicted with it. I haven't had any negative vibe."

Irvin was the kind of player only his team's fans could love. He celebrated first downs as if they were touchdowns and touchdowns as if they were Super Bowls. He dared other teams to put their best cornerbacks on him and still succeeded.

"People might think he's all show, but it's not. That's

him," longtime teammate Daryl Johnston said. "It can be irritating if you're not on his team or rooting for his team, but that's a big part of his success."

The 34-year-old Irvin caught 750 passes for 11,904 yards. At the time of his final

play, both figures were ninth in NFL history. Of the guys ahead of him, only Jerry Rice has as many Super Bowl rings.

"We've both got three. I'll take that," Irvin said, roaring at his own joke.

Sometimes, though, Irvin

had to stretch the rules to succeed.

"I can remember the competition committee changing the way offensive pass interference is called because of this guy right here," said Cowboys owner Jerry Jones, a member of that committee.

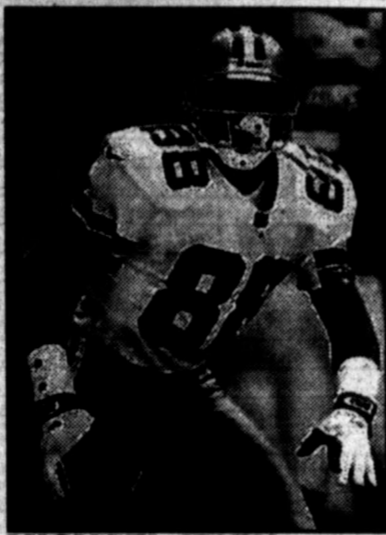

DALLAS (AP) — Rolando Blackman, the retired all-time leader in scoring for the Dallas Mavericks, is returning to the team as an assistant coach, team officials announced Tuesday.

Blackman, who retired with the New York Knicks after the 1993-94 season at age 41, will not be on the Mavericks' already-full bench but should be heavily involved with players behind the scenes, coach-general manager Don Nelson said.

Blackman played 11 of his 13 seasons with Dallas and holds 50 team career, regular season and playoff records, including most points (16,643). He led the Mavericks to the playoffs six times, including the 1988 Western Conference Finals against the Los Angeles Lakers.

The Mavericks traded Blackman to the New York Knicks in 1992, and he spent his last two seasons there. In March the Mavericks recognized Blackman by retiring his No. 22 jersey during half-time of a Mavericks' game against the Phoenix Suns.

A graduate of Kansas State University, Blackman was a member of the 1980 United States Olympic basketball team that did not compete because of a U.S. boycott of the Moscow Olympics.

Blackman has been involved in many community service activities throughout his career, including a stint as vice-president of the National Board of Directors for the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

Blackman also was co-chairman of the association's Miles of Smiles Campaign from 1987 to 1992. He serves as a spokesman for the NBA.

Tight secrecy launches landmark Mideast talks

THURMONT, Md. (AP) — Hoping to live up to the legacy of Camp David, President Clinton and the Israeli and Palestinian leaders are plunging into intensive negotiations in a backwoods setting whose informality belied the "profound and wrenching" questions at hand.

With Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Barak and Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat chatting

alongside him, Clinton on Tuesday strolled the winding paths of the rustic presidential retreat where Egypt and Israel set themselves on a course for peace 22 years ago.

The back porch of the presidential cabin served as the venue for separate talks with Barak and Arafat before all three leaders and their aides gathered for 30 minutes at a long rectangular conference

table in a weathered cottage nestled in the Maryland woods.

Clinton held separate evening discussions with the two leaders, and all three delegations, about 40 people, dined together at round tables inside Laurel cabin, according to Clinton's chief spokesman, Joe Lockhart. He said he would not release details about any after-dinner meet-

ings until Wednesday. Clinton spent the night at Camp David in preparation for another round of talks in the morning.

Occasional moments of lightheartedness, including some playful jostling by Barak and Arafat as they ushered each other into their initial meeting with Clinton, did little to dispel the sense of urgency and seriousness hang-

ing over the gathering.

The two sides remain far apart on all the key issues as they approach a Sept. 13 deadline for arriving at a wide-ranging peace accord. Once the clock runs out on that, Palestinian plans to declare independence — with or without a peace treaty — raise the specter of violence.

"One shouldn't estimate the complexity, the difficulty (of

the talks) — it's not for the fainthearted at all," Hanan Ashrawi, spokeswoman for the Palestinian delegation, said on the PBS program, "The NewsHour With Jim Lehrer."

As he left the White House for Camp David, Clinton spoke of the difficulty of the task at hand.

"The two leaders face profound and wrenching questions," he said, in their quest

Barenboim, the music director of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and artistic director of the Staatsoper Berlin, is back in Weimar for the second year in a row conducting the West-Eastern Divan Workshop.

The project brings 82 young musicians from Israel and several Arab countries to Germany for two weeks, ending Sunday, to play together and get to know each other. It

takes its name from the "West-Eastern Divan," a 19th-century book of poems by Goethe, Weimar's most famous son and an admirer of Islamic culture.

Barenboim, an Argentine-born Israeli, said he was eager to participate in the program again. He said whatever the situation in the Middle East, "we've experienced a beautiful utopia here in Weimar."

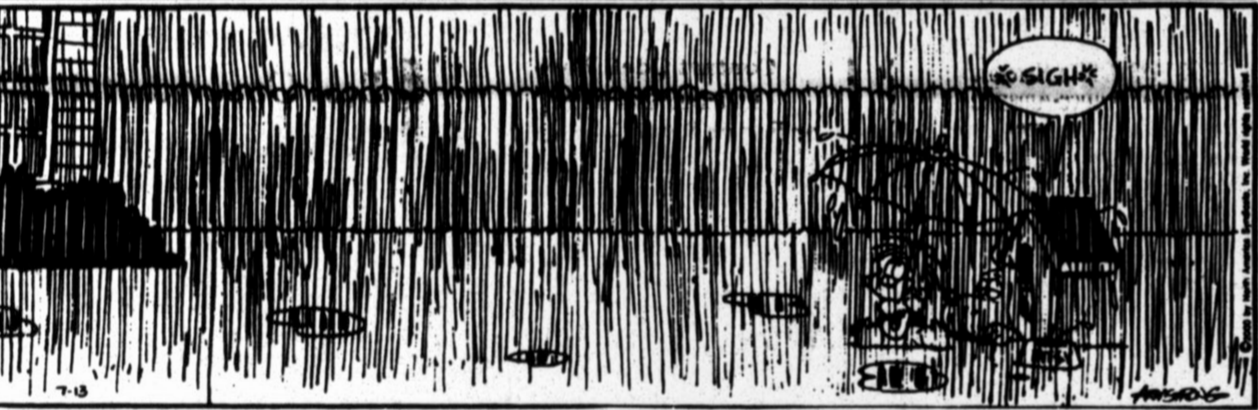

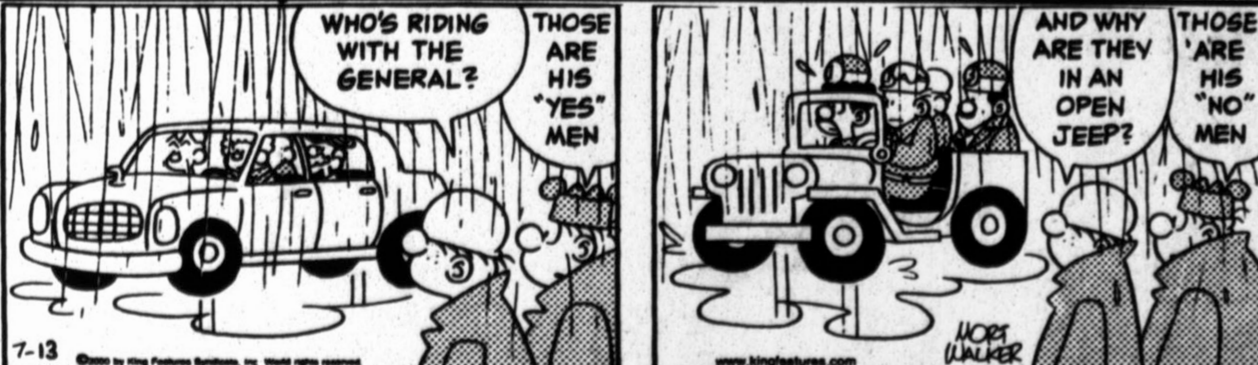
