Only an occasional afternoon thundershower threatened to break the summer heat across Texas this weekend.

Mostly clear skies greeted the state Friday morning, with lows in the 60s to 80s. It was 63 degrees at Dalhart and Marfa and 82 at Laughlin Air Force Base. Other readings were 73 at San Marcos, Houston and Victoria; and 81 at Del Rio, Laredo and Palacios.

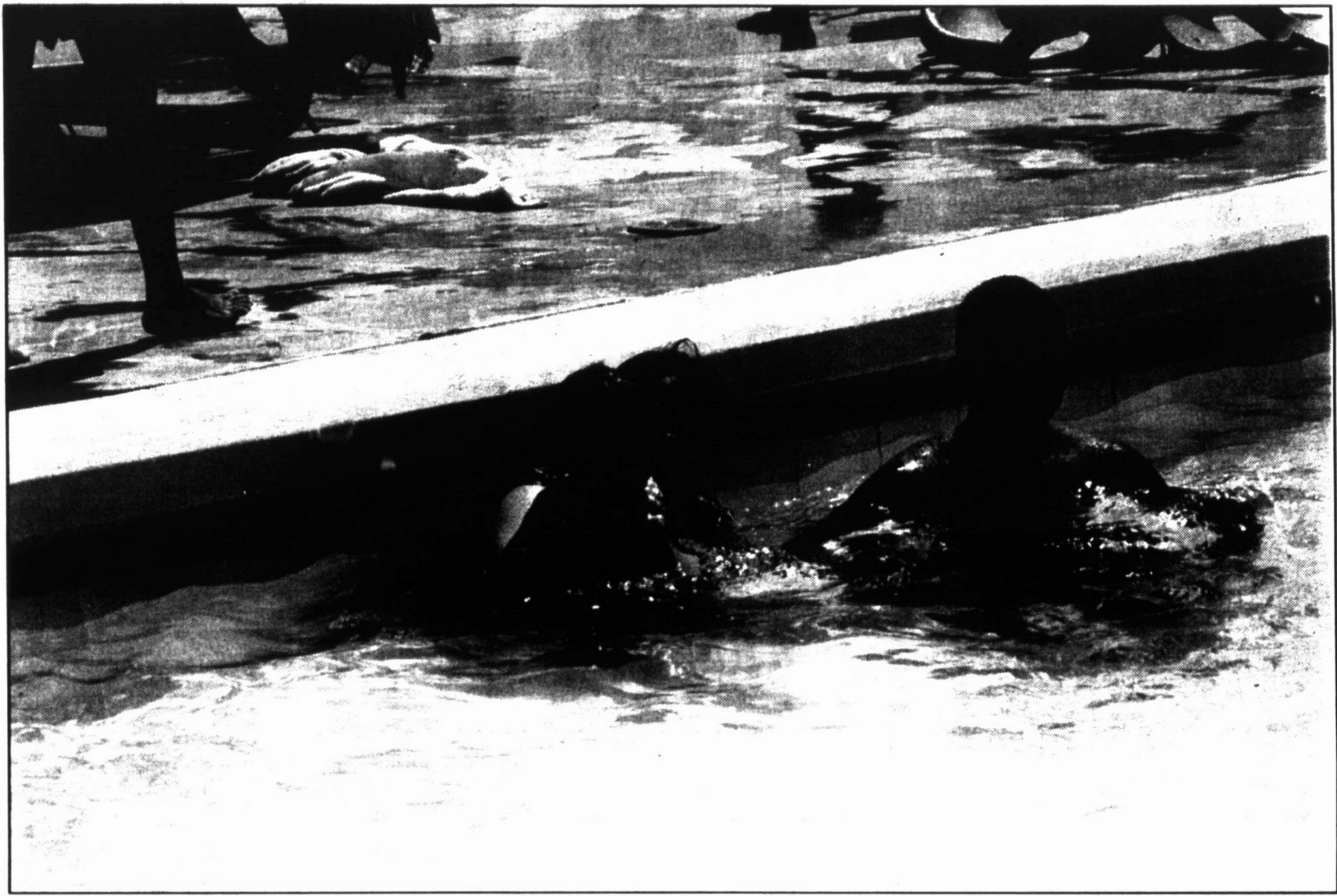
Light fog was reported in the Golden triangle area around Beaumont. Some patchy low clouds covered Central Texas and along the Rio Grande.

Winds were mostly southeasterly at 5 to 10 mph in the eastern two-thirds of the state, with light and variable conditions over the South Plains and far West Texas. Northeasterly winds of 10 to 20 mph were observed at Guadalupe Pass.

A slight chance of afternoon showers or thunderstorms was forecast this weekend in the southeast and Coastal Plains by the National Weather Service.

Daytime highs should range from the 90s to near 100 in the Rio Grande plains and South Texas, with overnight lows in the 60s to 80s.

# U.S. jobless rate falls to 4%

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's unemployment rate ticked down a notch to 4 percent in June as private employers added 206,000 jobs after cutting positions the month before.

The Labor Department reported Friday that the jobless rate fell by 0.1 percentage points from 4.1 percent in May — right on target with many analysts' expectations. In April, the unemployment rate hit a 30-year low of 3.9 percent.

Total employment including government workers rose by only 11,000 in June as 190,000 temporary workers finished work on the census and left their jobs. That was the weakest growth in four years.

Private employers added 206,000 positions during the month, fewer jobs than many analysts expected.

"The American economy has created more than 22 million jobs since the beginning of 1993," President Clinton said in a statement. "More

than 20 million of these jobs are in the private sector, giving us the highest share of private-sector job creation since President Truman was in office."

On Wall Street, stocks rose as investors welcomed the latest indication that the Federal Reserve is succeeding in its campaign to gently slow down the economy. The Dow Jones industrial average gained 99 points and the Nasdaq was up 46 in morning trading.

Bond prices also were buoyed. Prices on the benchmark 10-year Treasury notes rose as yields fell to 5.97 percent from 6.04 percent late Thursday. Prices on 30-year Treasury bonds also rose as yields fell to 5.86 percent from 5.90 percent from Thursday.

"This is hard evidence that the economy is slowing," said economist Ken Mayland of ClearView Economics. Looking at both the May and June figures, job growth is moderating, he said. "This gives the Fed the

luxury of leaving interest rates alone in August and letting previous rate hikes unfold."

Average hourly earnings rose 0.4 in June to \$13.71. Many analysts were expecting a 0.3 percent gain. In May, wages grew by a slim 0.1 percent.

While job and wage growth is good for workers, economists worry that a too-strong combination might worsen inflation. Their fear: employers scrambling to find scarce workers, recruit them with big boosts in wages and benefits, added costs that could be passed along to consumers as higher prices.

The Federal Reserve has boosted interest rates six times over the last year to slow the economy and keep inflation under control. A number of economic reports, including new home sales and retail sales, have suggested that the Fed's interest rate increases are working to slow economic growth.

The rate increases are designed

to make borrowing more expensive and cool demand for big-ticket items such as homes and cars. The Fed meets next to discuss interest rate policy on Aug. 22.

In May, total payrolls rose by 171,000, weaker growth than the government previously estimated. All that strength came in government hiring of temporary workers to conduct the census. American businesses, however, cut 165,000 jobs that month, more than the government estimated one month ago.

The increase in June's private payroll jobs reflected a mixed picture.

The service sector lost 2,000 jobs, the weakest performance since January 1996 when a blizzard hit the East Coast.

Retailers added 49,000 jobs with much of the gain coming from hiring at bars and restaurants.

Construction companies added 3,000 jobs and factories created 8,000 new positions.

Who's undecided about the presidential election? Whether it's one in 20 or one in three depends on the poll and how much people were pushed to make a decision.

No matter the percentages, Marilyn Epperson isn't crazy about either of the top candidates, Vice President Al Gore, the Democrat, and Texas Gov. George W. Bush, the Republican.

"I'm not leaning for Al Gore because of all the Clinton things, and the other one is just dull to me," said the 56-year-old retired school board member from Louisville, Ky., who considers herself independent. "It's up to me to listen more so I can make up my mind."

Pentagon begins countdown for test of missile defense system

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon is counting down to a rocket launch Friday night that could change the course of U.S. defense policy and present the next president with one of the most contentious international arms control debates in decades.

Although much is riding on the outcome the test of a national missile defense, Defense Secretary William Cohen is trying to tamp down expectations by saying it is not a make-or-break event.

In a sense, some missile defense critics agree. Regardless of the outcome, they believe President Clinton will move forward with building a nationwide shield against missiles.

Cohen stressed that the test, the last before Clinton makes his decision, is only one in a series of more than a dozen that will ultimately determine the feasibility of defending all 50 states against a limited attack of ballistic missiles.

"We are trying to take it step by step because it's very, very difficult technology we are trying," Cohen told reporters Thursday in Tampa, Fla., where he presided over a change of command ceremony at U.S. Central Command.

## Family members say they hope mother's death will send a message on domestic violence

SAN ANTONIO — Relatives, supporters and prosecutors say they hope the slaying of Sheila Bellush and the guilty verdict against her ex-husband send a message about the horrors of domestic violence.

Allen Blackthorne, 45, who became rich from inventing a muscle stimulator, is facing life in prison without parole after a federal jury convicted him Thursday of arranging the murder of Bellush, his ex-wife.

The jury convicted him on charges of interstate conspiracy to commit murder-for-hire and a charge of interstate domestic violence. He faces sentencing Nov. 2.

"This case is about domestic violence," U.S. Attorney Bill Blagg said in January when indictments against Blackthorne were unsealed. "We don't live in caves any more. Women aren't possessions. They have rights. They are human beings. In this case, we are talking about brutality, violence and death."

Bellush's husband, Jamie, recalled that statement after the verdict.

"There's no doubt about it," he said. "The federal government took a stand... and said this kind of treatment will not be tolerated." Sheila Bellush, 35, was slain in Sarasota, Fla., in 1997. She had been shot in the cheek, and her throat had been slit.

Her body was discovered by her 13-year-old daughter, Stevie, from her marriage to Blackthorne. Her quadruplets from her second marriage were crawling in her blood. They were unharmed.

## Court ruling may mean millions for tribe

HOUSTON — The U.S. Department of Justice is reviewing a federal court ruling that could mean millions of dollars in compensation to the Alabama and Coushatta Indians for 2.8 million acres of East Texas pine forest stolen from the tribes.

The ruling by a three-judge panel of the U.S. Court of Federal Claims would entitle the federal government to pay the tribe for timber, oil, natural gas and land they never got to sell, according to the Houston Chronicle's Friday editions.

"We have experts calculating those figures," Austin attorney Alan Minter, who is representing the tribe, told the newspaper. "It's potentially a huge sum. I don't know how large yet. It is into the millions."

The disputed tract of land, running from the Louisiana border to just north of Houston, dwarfs the 4,600-acre reservation in the Texas Big Thicket that half the tribe's 1,012 citizens call home.

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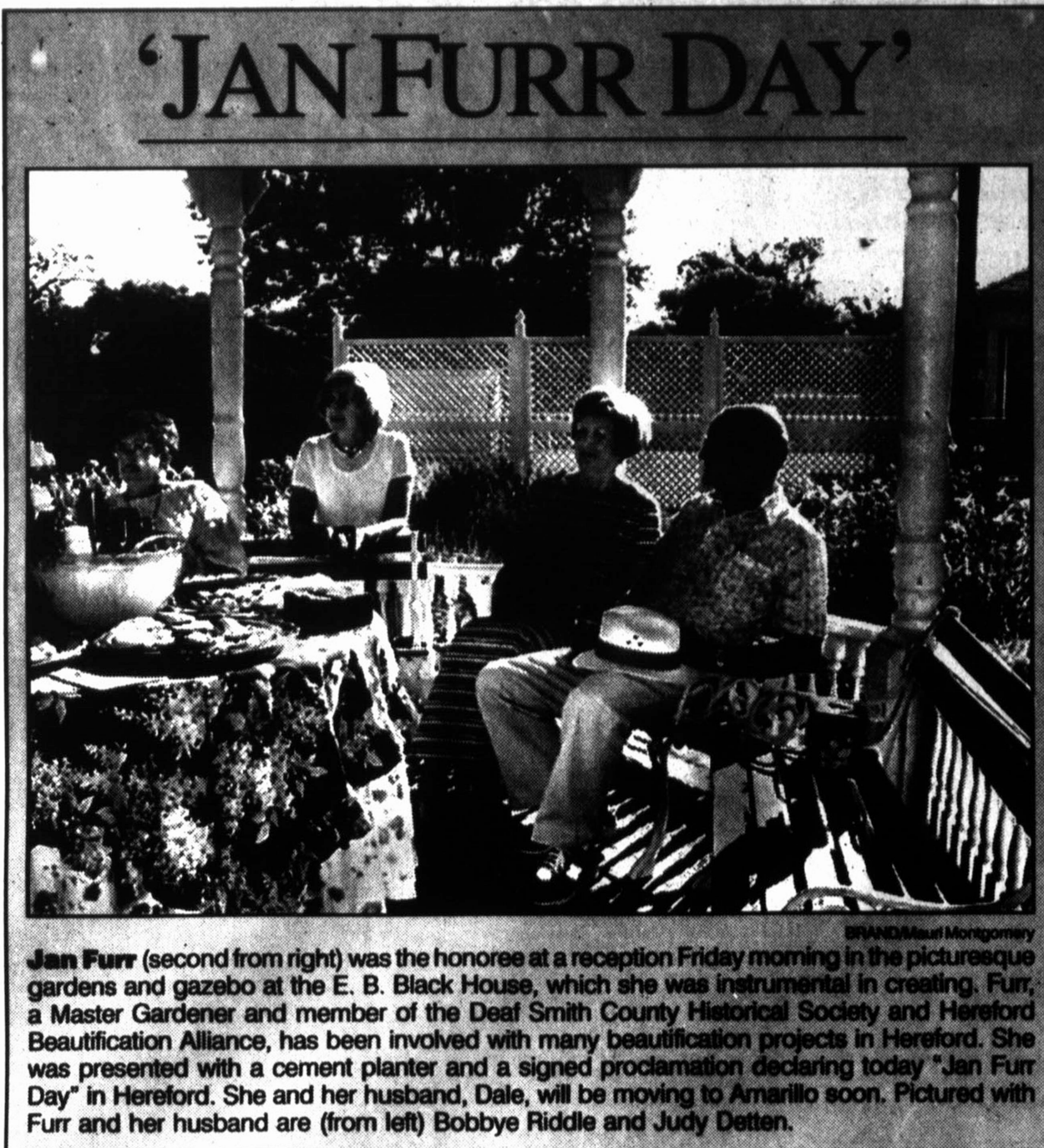

Some pollsters say nudging voters toward a decision often yields more reliable results.

"There is a high correlation between actual voting behavior and what they tell you when you force the undecideds," said Frank Newport, executive editor of the Gallup Poll. "The behavior you're trying to learn is the behavior of a voter who is forced to pull a lever."

The Gallup poll shows about one in 20 undecided when it offers four candidates — Gore, Bush, Reform Party contender Pat Buchanan and Green Party candidate Ralph Nader.

Andrew Kohut, director of the Pew Research Center for the People and the Press, agreed that pushing people to make a decision can provide more meaningful results.

"If you don't push, you find a lot of people who won't make up their minds even close to the election," he said. "And exit polls show that most people make up their minds earlier than that."

Some political analysts say the level of uncertainty is really higher than reflected in many polls.

"The other polls present a picture of an electorate that is misleading in that almost everyone out there has a pretty clear preference," said Thomas Patterson, a Harvard researcher who is measuring public interest in the campaign during his yearlong "Vanishing Voter" project.

"They get a 'top-of-mind' response. We're not saying that response is invalid, but it greatly overestimates the number of people who have a true preference," he said.

In his surveys, Patterson, a professor of government and the press, phrases the presidential preference question differently, asking: "Which presidential candidate do you support at this time, or haven't you picked a candidate yet?"

When asked with the stated option of undecided, more than half in the latest Vanishing Voter poll said they haven't made a choice, about a fifth said they're for Bush and another fifth said Gore. When asked how they leaned, the undecided number dropped to a third.

Political analyst Stuart

Rothenberg said pollsters have to press for a decision.

"I don't think you have 33 percent of the public that doesn't have an inkling," he said. "There's a balance. You nudge them, but you don't force them to make an artificial choice."

Patterson's belief is that many people are far from decided and that the upcoming political conventions will go a long way toward clarifying the race.

"This is the point where many will make a choice," he said.

In Patterson's poll of 1,000 adults taken June 28 through July 2, Democrats were more likely than Republicans to be undecided — 35 percent to 22 percent. Among independents, 41 percent were undecided. The error margin is plus or minus 3 percentage points.

Jennifer Jenkins, an independent from Reston, La., said it's too early to decide.

"The only time I have to pay attention to such things is when I don't have mis'n't impressed by Gore."

The goal of the missile defense system is to destroy a hostile warhead in space by ramming it head-on with an interceptor missile.

"We are trying to hit a bullet with a bullet," Cohen said.

Many critics believe the technology is not feasible and that the Pentagon's testing methods are fatally flawed. Other critics say that even if it worked the weapon would not be worth the international outcry against it.

"Recent statements by Defense Secretary William Cohen indicate that the Clinton administration is on a path toward approval regardless of allied skepticism," the British American Security Information Council said Thursday.

Anti-nuclear activists were hoping to halt the test by positioning a ship in an area of the Pacific where a rocket stage is expected to splash down. Greenpeace planned to station a vessel about 110 miles offshore from Vandenberg Air Force Base, said Steve Shallhorn, the group's campaign director.

The Air Force has asked pilots and mariners to avoid the area during the test or risk damage or injury but said the test could continue even with a ship in the zone.

Greenpeace also set up camp outside Vandenberg's main gate, about 180 miles northwest of Los Angeles. And a group of protesters not affiliated with Greenpeace threatened to delay the launch by breaking into the base.

The scenario for Friday's test is similar to that of the last, unsuccessful test in January: a target missile — a Minuteman intercontinental ballistic missile with a dummy warhead — launches from Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif. Twenty minutes later, the interceptor rocket takes off from Kwajalein Atoll in the remote Marshall Islands in the Pacific Ocean. If it works as designed, a "kill vehicle" will detach from the interceptor rocket and guide itself into the path of the dummy warhead, destroying it by force of impact 144 miles above the earth.

**Today's Highlight in History:**  
On July 7, 1865, four people were hanged in Washington, D.C., for conspiring with John Wilkes Booth to assassinate President Lincoln.

**On this date:**  
In 1898, the United States annexed Hawaii.

In 1930, construction began on Boulder Dam (later Hoover Dam).

In 1958, President Eisenhower signed the Alaska statehood bill.

In 1969, Canada's House of Commons gave final approval to a measure making the French language equal to English throughout the national government.

In 1981, President Reagan announced he was nominating Arizona Judge Sandra Day O'Connor to become the first female justice on the U.S. Supreme Court.

**Ten years ago:** President Bush welcomed fellow leaders of the world's leading industrialized democracies, gathered in Houston for their 16th annual Group of Seven economic summit. Martina Navratilova captured a record-breaking ninth women's title at Wimbledon, outplaying Zina Garrison, 6-4, 6-1.

**Five years ago:** Space shuttle Atlantis landed at Cape Canaveral, Fla., bringing back American astronaut Norman Thagard, who'd spent 31/2 months aboard the Russian space station Mir.

**One year ago:** In the first class-action lawsuit by smokers to go to trial, a jury in Miami held cigarette makers liable for making a defective product that causes emphysema, lung cancer and other illnesses. 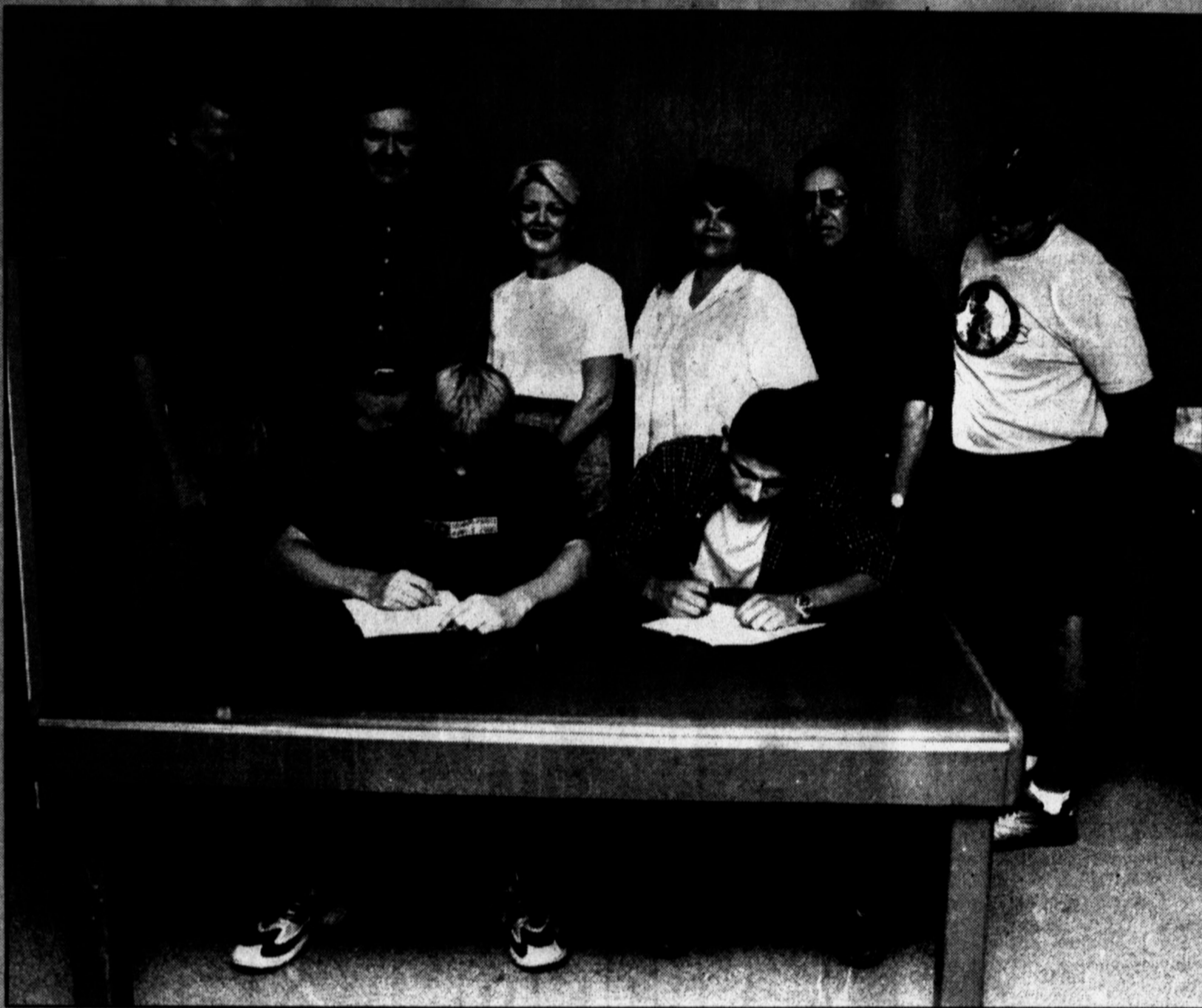

## Whitefaces hire coach

They had to search as far as Fort Stockton, but Hereford High School found its man.

Lee Walker, football and track coach at Fort Stockton High School, was named the defensive backs and secondary coach for the Hereford Whitefaces. Walker will also teach science at HHS.

"I am really excited," Walker said. "I've kept up with Hereford football the last couple of years and there is a strong tradition going."

Walker takes over several of the duties vacated by Tim Anuskiewicz. Anuskiewicz was the assistant head coach, as well as working with the defensive backfield and coordinating special teams. Anuskiewicz left the Herd to take over defensive coordinator duties at Canyon High School, his alma mater.

Walker's move to Hereford will not be so far from home. He was an all-state running back at Portales High School

and a 1991 graduate of Eastern New Mexico University.

Walker said he is glad he is going to be closer to home.

"My wife and I are going to be in the middle of our family," Walker said. "We have family in Amarillo and Happy."

Walker leaves a Fort Stockton Panthers squad that finished 2-8 in 1999. The school was in Class 4A last season, but was shifted to Class 3A for this season — a move Walker hopes will give his old program a chance to succeed.

"It is a good move for them," Walker said. "They should be able to make the playoffs."

Walker joins a Hereford program ranked seventh in Class 4A by Dave Campbell's Texas Football.

Walker brings with him several years of experience to the Whitefaces' coaching staff. While at ENMU, Walker played safety and became familiar with different types of defensive sets and coverages. He said that experience, plus similarities in Hereford's defense

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## Agassi, Sampras in action today

American finalist likes less attention

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — No hype, no hoopla, no hysteria.

For Lindsay Davenport, the most overlooked player in women's tennis, it's been another low-key run all the way to the Wimbledon final.

The first-week headlines were all about Anna Kournikova,

the Russian cover girl who was bounced in the second round. Since then, the spotlight has focused on the Williams sisters and their unconventional father.

That's just fine with Davenport, who defends her title Saturday in an all-American championship match against Venus Williams, who beat her kid sister Serena in straight sets in Thursday's semifinals.

"A lot of the times, that's the way I like it," the 22-year-old Californian said. "I don't really like to have a lot of hoopla and a lot of action and activity around what I'm doing."

"The only reason why I'm here is just to play tennis, get through it, see what I can achieve."

There were no distractions Thursday when Davenport swept 17-year-old Australian Jelena Dokic 6-4, 6-2 in just 51 minutes.

The match hardly caused a ripple, coming in the wake of the Williams sisters' showdown.

After Venus beat Serena 6-2, 7-6 (3) before a capacity crowd, Centre Court had hun-

dreeds of empty seats and a nearly deserted press section when the Davenport-Dokic match began.

Now, Davenport is one win away from adding a fourth Grand Slam title to victories at the 1998 U.S. Open, 1999 Wimbledon and 2000 Australian Open.

The men's semifinals were wet for Friday.

In the first match on Centre Court, second-seeded Andre Agassi was paired against No. 12 Patrick Rafter in what shaped up as a fascinating duel between counter-puncher and serve-and-volleyer.

Defending champion and top-seeded Pete Sampras, bidding for his seventh Wimbledon title and record-breaking 13th Grand Slam championship, faced 237th-ranked qualifier Vladimir Voltchkov in the second match.

Until last year, Davenport struggled at Wimbledon, failing to advance.

"I've gotten a little bit more used to it," she said. "Last year was just amazing. I didn't think I could do it. This year, I know I can do it."

Davenport sailed through the draw last year. This time, coming off a back injury, she's had a much rougher road.

"Last year came so easy," she said. "It seemed like I was playing so well. Everything just clicked from the first match. This Wimbledon I've had to fight a lot harder, come back in a few situations and really hang in there."

Davenport holds a 9-3 edge in career meetings against Williams, but the two have never met on grass before.

The Williams vs. Williams showdown failed to live up to expectations, undermined by a slew of unforced errors, particularly by Serena. The 18-year-old younger sibling was a different player from the one

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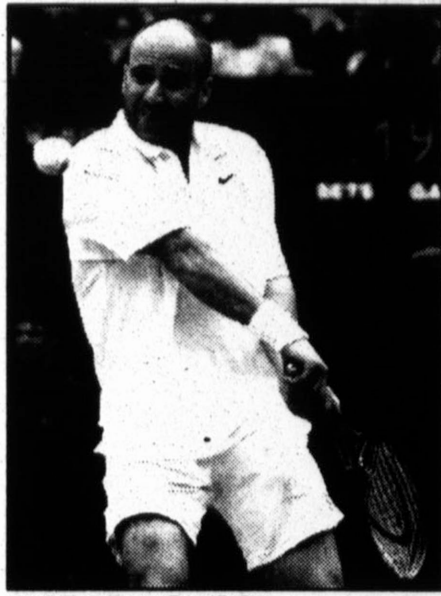

"I was crying when I heard Serena lost," he said. "Tears came to my eyes then. To sit there and watch it, I couldn't do that. This was too emotional for me."

Richard Williams promises to be at Saturday's

final.

Thursday's match was surrounded by speculation of a Williams family agreement that Venus should win, that she should get a shot at her first Grand Slam title. Serena won the U.S. Open last year.

Venus was asked whether the result was predetermined. "No, not that I'm aware of," she said.

Richard Williams dismissed suggestions he may have influenced the outcome.

As of press time, Rafter lead Agassi two sets to one with Agassi leading the fourth 3-1.

The women's final between Lindsey Davenport and Venus Williams will take place on Saturday at the All-England Club on Centre Court. The men's final will take place on Sunday with the winner being crowned with tennis' most prestigious award.

# Starr spokesman ordered to stand trial for contempt

## News digest

WASHINGTON — Kenneth Starr's former spokesman faces trial next week in a battle over news leaks during the Monica Lewinsky investigation that until now was fought mostly in secret.

The criminal contempt trial of Charles Bakaly, who is being prosecuted by the government, is to begin Thursday, according to documents unsealed at the U.S. District Court.

Court documents show that Bakaly requested that the trial be held in public and that the case be unsealed. That request was granted last week by U.S. District Judge Norma Holloway Johnson, who as the chief judge of the federal court in Washington oversees matters involving grand jury secrecy.

Bakaly faces trial over statements he made concerning investigations into alleged leaks from the special prosecutor's office during President Clinton's impeachment ordeal, according to the documents.

The documents made public so far don't specify the exact reason why Bakaly was charged with contempt. But

officials have said, and court documents show, that Bakaly was accused by his own office of having a role in a January 1999 news leak during Clinton's impeachment trial. He denied being the source of the leak.

Johnson, who presided over most of the legal cases during the Lewinsky impeachment drama, solicited the views of Bakaly's lawyers and Starr's successor, Robert Ray, as to whether sealed documents in the case should be made public at Bakaly's trial.

Bakaly was unavailable for comment; his wife said Thursday.

### English-only vote on ballot in Utah

SALT LAKE CITY — In a move three years in the making, voters will decide in November whether Utah will join half the nation's states in having English as its official language.

"This is about maintaining our common language, this is not against other languages," said Mauro Mujica, head of U.S. English, a national group that supports English-only measures. "This has to do with one country, indivisible, with a common language."

If the proposal is approved, state agencies would be prohibited — with some exceptions — from conducting government business or printing information in any language except English.

Opponents of the measure insist official-language efforts

would make many tasks impossible for new immigrants.

"We have all of these people resettling in this state, in this city, who require medical treatment, whose children require good educational opportunities," said Salt Lake City Mayor Rocky Anderson, who joined a crowd of about 50 protesters carrying signs that read "I Don't Speak English (Only)."

Immigration is expected to help drive the West's booming population growth, according to the U.S. Census Bureau, and the influx has made English-only a hot topic in the region. Utah's predominant migrant group, Hispanics, is expected to increase from 138,000 this year — just 6.5 percent of the population — to 265,000 by 2015.

PAMPLONA, Spain — Safety tip No. 1 for running with 1,500-pound bulls bred to be quick, ornery and relentless: Don't yell at them.

In fact, don't do anything that has even the slightest chance of distracting the hulking beasts which are the star attraction of Spain's most internationally known summer event, the San Fermin Festival.

Veterans of the half-mile course, which winds through narrow streets in Pamplona's old quarter, say that despite all the drinking and merriment that goes on almost non-stop for eight days.

Barak brings concessions to the summit

WASHINGTON (AP) — Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Barak will arrive at the U.S.-sponsored Mideast summit next week prepared to offer the Palestinians an expanded presence in a reshaped Jerusalem along with admission of thousands of refugees whose families already live in Israel, according to two well-placed Israeli officials.

Stressing the concessions must be matched by conciliatory Palestinian moves, the officials said Thursday the future of Jerusalem was the toughest issue on the table and may be excluded from a settlement between the two sides.

Less progress has been made on Jerusalem than any other issue in the negotiations leading up to the summit President Clinton will stage beginning Tuesday at Camp David, Md. By contrast, the two sides have made considerable headway on the question of how much land Israel will turn over to Yasser Arafat for a state, said the officials, speaking on condition of anonymity.

Barak may not insist on retaining the strategic Jordan Valley, provided Israel can maintain a security presence there at least for some time, the officials said.

The unusual disclosure of Barak's likely stance on core issues at the summit appeared to be part of an effort to project him as a reasonable Israeli leader and to coax matching concessions from Arafat.

Publicly, at least, the Palestinian leader is demanding transfer of virtually all of the West Bank, Gaza and east Jerusalem — more land than Barak is prepared to relinquish. And Barak intends to keep Jerusalem united and Israel's capital, the officials said.

Barak is prepared to con-

sider expanding areas of the city already under day-to-day Arab control in exchange for incorporating nearby Jewish settlements into the predominantly Jewish area of the city, the officials said.

On refugees, Barak is willing to consider permitting tens of thousands of Palestinians to settle in Israel if they have family members there, but he will not accept the idea they have a legal right to return, the officials said.

The precedent is Israel's acceptance of 60,000 to 70,000 Palestinian Arabs in a program of reuniting families that was in force between Israel's founding in 1948 and the Mid-east war of 1967, the officials said.

Tens of thousands of today's refugees would be absorbed in the Palestinian state, while others would receive assistance under a worldwide funding campaign.

Richard N. Haass, director of foreign policy studies at the Brookings Institution, said that overall "what Mr. Barak is suggesting is far more generous than any other Israeli prime minister has offered in the past."

Haass said the Clinton administration should focus its mediation efforts on the Palestinians.

Shibley Telhami, a senior fellow at the Washington-based think tank, said Israel was "softening" its positions, especially on the Jordan Valley which Barak had vowed to retain.

East Jerusalem was occupied by Jordan before it was captured by Israeli troops in the 1967 Mideast war and reunited with the predominantly Jewish Western part of the ancient city.

Hispanics question Bush's sincerity

HOUSTON (AP) — Hispanic Democrats are questioning Texas Gov. George W. Bush's commitment to their concerns, citing GOP opposition to an El Paso lawyer's appeals court appointment and continued squall in border colonias.

Bush, who turned 54 years old on Thursday, received a round-trip bus ticket from Austin to Pharr and two prepaid phone cards from Tejano Democrats.

"We feel he's not done enough for our people, like he claims to," Frumencio Reyes, vice chairman of the Texas Democratic Party and a member of the Tejano Democrats of Harris County, told the Houston Chronicle for Friday's editions.

Tejano Democrats, Reyes said, hope that Bush will use one of the phone cards to call Republican U.S. Sens. Kay Bailey Hutchison and Phil Givams, and ask them to drop their opposition to Enrique Moreno, a Harvard-educated lawyer whom President Clinton is seeking to seat on the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

Bush said during campaigning last week that he would hear both senators' concerns about Moreno, but stopped short

of saying he would intervene on Moreno's behalf.

"I am not going to lobby this," Bush said at a campaign stop in Michigan. "I am going to find out what the facts are."

The second phone card, Democrats said, was for Bush to call Texas Health Commissioner Dr. William "Reyn" Archer III to resign. A 1997 Bush appointee, Archer angered Hispanic groups by linking Texas' high rate of teen pregnancy to Hispanic cultural resistance to family planning.

Archer later apologized, and Bush has said he thinks Archer is doing "a fine job."

Democrats said they'd like Bush to use the South Texas bus ticket for his first visit to the border area's colonias with their substandard plumbing and other living conditions.

Bush, on the campaign trail, has taken credit for improving conditions in the colonias and improving access to health care coverage for the poor and uninsured.

"On today of all days, he should be in a good mood and therefore willing to do the right thing on Enrique Moreno, Reyn Archer, and the 400,000 people who live in colonias," Reyes told reporters.

Singer released from Florida jail

POMPANO BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Singer Bobby Brown was released from jail early Friday after getting 10 days' credit for good behavior.

Brown, 33, had been sentenced to 75 days behind bars after repeatedly violating his parole on a 1996 drunk driving conviction. He attended a drug rehabilitation program while in jail.

Brown was picked up outside the North Broward Detention Center by his wife, pop star Whitney Houston. She jumped into his arms while comedian Chris Rock led a group of sup-

porters in a mock vigil for a bit on his HBO show.

"It's beautiful out here," Brown yelled as he embraced Rock.

"I just want to be with my family and my friends," Brown said. "I'm going home to spend the summer with my kids and work on my life."

Brown was first arrested in 1996 after he crashed his wife's black Porsche 911 into a signpost on Ocean Drive in Hollywood. His blood-alcohol level was nearly three times the legal limit.
