**Excise Tax**  
**Lowered On**  
**Telephones**

A one percent reduction doesn't sound like much of a savings, but when Uncle Sam lowered the excise tax on telephone bills another one percent during 1977, that amounted to a savings of over \$2,893,000 for General Telephone Company of the Southwest customers.

The excise tax is levied on local and long distance services with the telephone company simply collecting the tax for the government.

General Telephone collected almost \$14,500,000 in excise taxes from its customers during 1977 at the five percent tax levy. The tax was six percent during 1976 and during 1978 has been reduced to four percent.

The 1978 reduction is the sixth in a 10-year elimination of the tax. The tax will continue to drop one percent each year until it expires January 1, 1982 unless congress adopts a recent proposal to accelerate elimination of the tax.

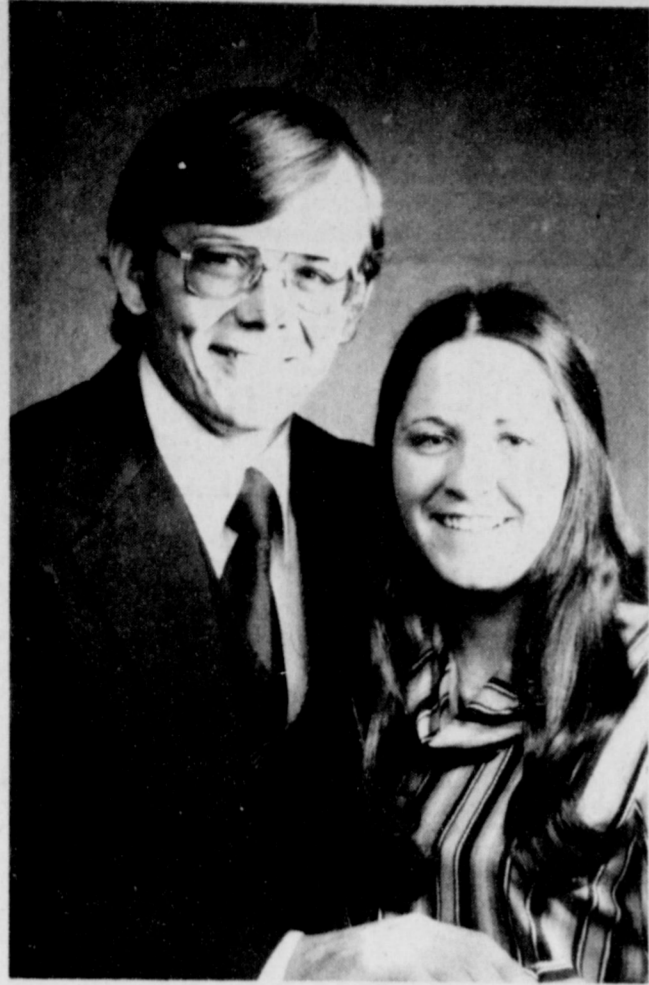

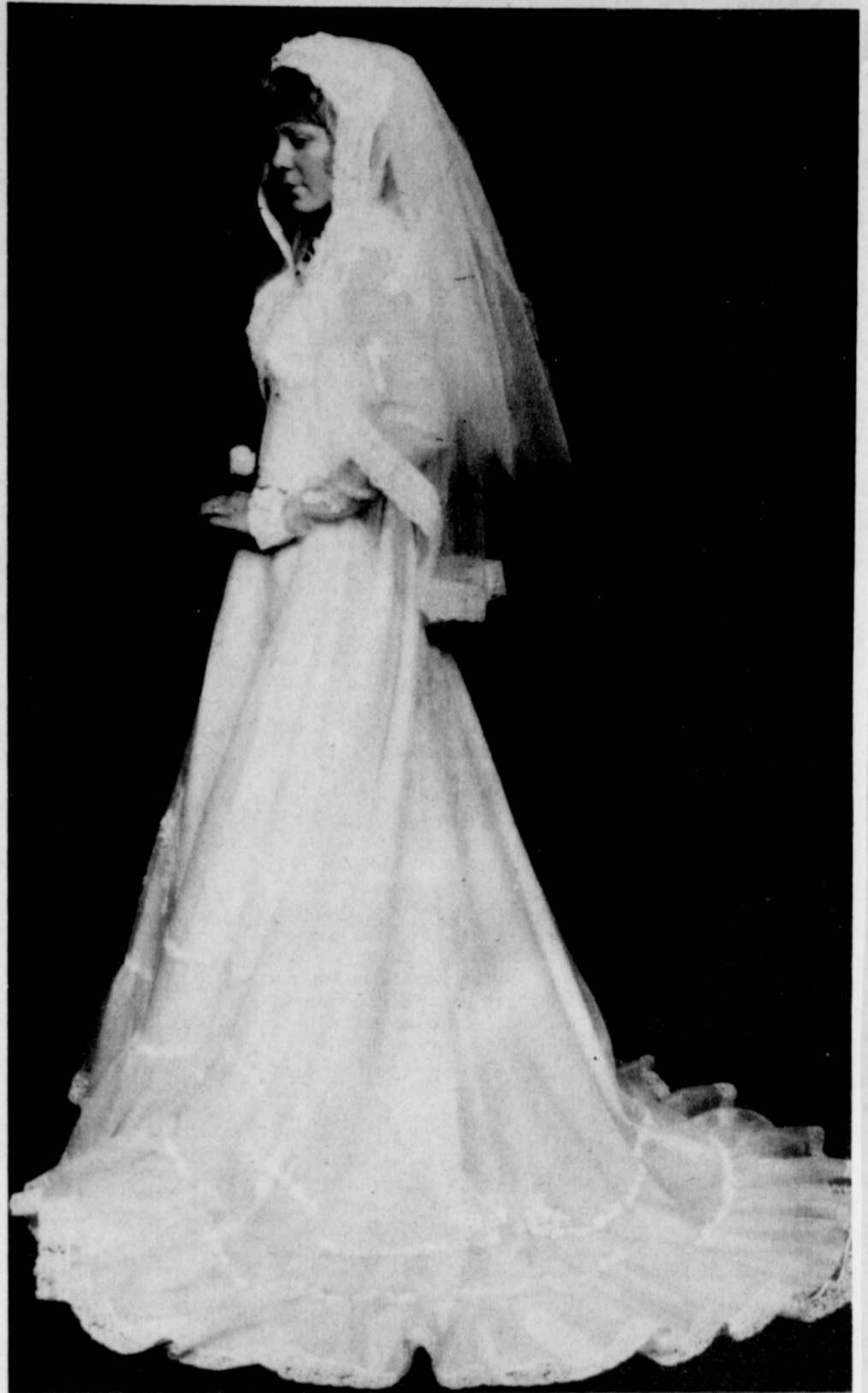

## Alcohol Traffic Safety Schools Established

A new statewide organization has been formed, the Texas Alcohol Traffic Safety Education Association.

Membership of the group will be comprised primarily of schools over the State that teach alcohol traffic safety education to some of the estimated 60,000 Texas drivers arrested annually for driving while intoxicated and who consequently may be assigned to attend such a school. There are more than 55 schools currently operating in Texas.

Association membership is open to other groups and individuals interested in alcohol traffic safety education.

Objectives of the new association include promotion of standardized, high quality education in all programs; establishment of a statewide referral service; training programs for

DWI School personnel and evaluation assistance. The Association will also foster establishment of new schools.

Peggy Dollarhide, Denton County Probation Safety Education program director and Chairman of the Advisory Committee of the new organization indicated "the Association will also assist DWI school programs in reaching agreements with local courts." Dollarhide explained that "students in the schools are court referred as part of probation conditions following DWI charges."

Members of the advisory group assisting in organizing the Association "represent a unified effort by agencies, organizations and local schools that will help achieve a higher level of quality and credibility for alcohol traffic safety education in Texas," said Dollarhide.

Members of the Advisory Com-

mittee represent the cooperative efforts of several local DWI education schools, the Texas Department of Public Safety, Texas Education Agency, Texas Adult Probation Commission. Others are the Texas Department of Mental Health/Mental Retardation, Texas Office of Traffic Safety, and State Bar Association/Texas Center for Judiciary.

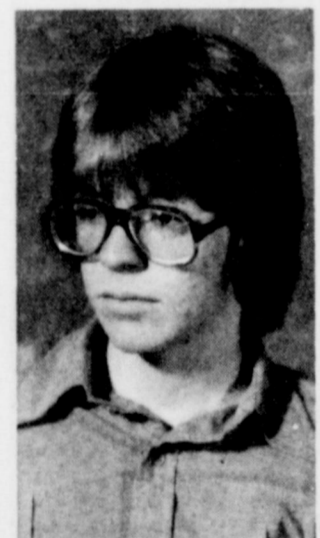
This makes the Freshmen Mules record 10-6.

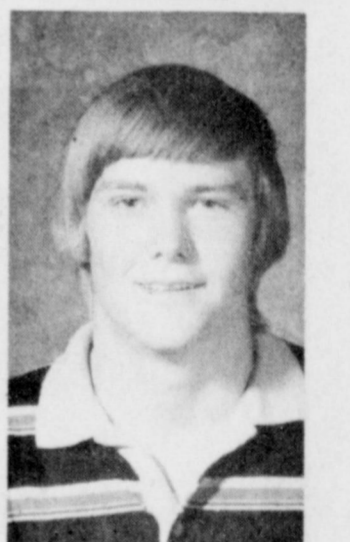

Mach explained the study and its significance to importation by saying, "This study will be a look at all aspects of water management. One of the first things that will be asked about importation is 'Are you fully using your water resources now?'. This study will help us find out."

Cost of the study will be \$1 million with completion projected for 1981.

Mach will join Congressman George Mahon, Congressman Jack Hightower and Texas House Speaker Bill Clayton on the program. The public is invited to attend. Registration will cost \$6 and will include the noon luncheon.

Water, Inc., is a non-profit organization founded 11 years ago to promote water importation as the solution to the long-term water problem of the High Plains.

### Teacher Duo In Amarillo At Seminar

Mrs. Janet Buske and Mrs. Cheryl Gist attended an Adult Citizenship Seminar, sponsored by the Farm Bureau, last Friday and Saturday in Amarillo.

The seminar featured an in-depth study of the Constitution of the U.S. Dr. Cleon Skousen of the Freeman Institute led the seminar.

Dr. Skousen has written more than a dozen books, among those *The Naked Communist* and *The Naked Capitalist*. ### Cost Containment: Doctor's Priority

Development of an effective, multi-faceted program to contain health care costs has been identified as the top priority of Texas doctors for 1978.

Texas Medical Association President John M. Smith, Jr., M.D., received the full support of the organization's Executive Board in recommending that the 14,000 member organization accelerate its efforts regarding cost containment.

Dr. Smith, a San Antonio family physician, said that the association's efforts will be directed toward activities to control or reduce costs without sacrificing quality of care or involving rationing of care.

"Providing quality care to the patient remains the foremost goal and responsibility of physicians," Dr. Smith said. While noting that doctors do not have total responsibility for health care costs (recent studies show that less than 20 cents of each health care dollar goes for physicians' fees), Dr. Smith declared, "The medical profession in Texas has the responsibility to face this issue squarely and to develop our own effective cost control programs."

Among the variety of activities being planned are educational programs directed to both the public and to the medical profession on suggested ways to control costs. Medical schools will be urged, for example, to teach about costs to medical students and physicians-in-training while they are being taught to treat patients.

Physicians will be asked to look at their patients' hospital bills and seek ways to eliminate possibly unnecessary procedures or substitute less expensive ones without decreasing quality of care.

Health insurance companies will be encouraged to use deductibles in their policies to help protect against over-utilization of benefits. These companies also will be asked to provide coverage for diagnostic tests and services on an outpatient basis rather than only as part of in-hospital care.

More efficient, cost-saving office procedures will be promoted, such as patients paying for office visits at the time of service, and providing information that would allow patients to submit their own insurance claims. In 1975, medical practice expenses amounted to an average of 43 percent of physicians' before-tax income.

Premiums for malpractice insurance, a major item in many physicians' office overhead, hopefully can be reduced through passage of laws implementing additional recommendations of the legislatively-created Medical Professional Liability Study Commission. TMA also is looking into creating its own insurance trust for professional liability protection. Special efforts will be made to educate the public to the opportunities it has to help control health care costs. "Following sound health practices, such as proper diet and exercise, not smoking, and not drinking in excess, for example, could pre-

vent up to one half of most people's health problems," Dr. Smith said.

TMA will continue its active participation with the Texas Hospital Association and others in the state's voluntary hospital cost containment panel. It also will make a complete review of the 48 recommendations made by the National Commission on the Cost of Medical Care and implement those recommendations which are appropriate.
