According to Wall, funds in the amount of \$213,000 were set aside for construction of the Tolk Station approximately 14 miles east of Muleshoe on Highway 70. Wall's information said the

new Tolk Station Road will be designated FM2910 from US 70, 2.4 miles west of FM303, sought, 2.0 miles. It provides for relocation assistance and construction, grading, structures and surface, to cost \$213,000. At Littlefield, Lamb County

He did predict that wheat production is expected to be below normal for a combination of reasons, including a hard winter, lack of ...oisture and sandblasting.

"Corn is up to a good stand, but growth is slow at this time. Planting is expected to begin during the next seven to fourteen days on other crops," he added

The county agent commented on the fruit trees which are in good condition and with good fruit loads, but once again, cautioned producers with the cold May nights to be ready to protect the young fruit crops.

Pastures and ranches are in an average condition, said the county agent, adding that the rainfall will help the ranges and grass conditions for cow-calf operators.

Livestock are in an average condition, with stocoer cattle being in a good condition at this time, according to the report by Tanksley, and he said no activity is being conducted at this time as farmers are waiting for fields to dry out enough to get

For persons who wanted candidates to 'choose from' there was no lack of candidates listed on the ballots for the primary elections scheduled Saturday.

As voters were going into the polls at presstime, the Democrats found the biggest choice with 17 contested races listed on a very long ballot.

These ranged from governor of the state to two contested county commissioner races. Predictions that a slightly larger than normal vote was expected was indicated by the number of absentee votes cast in the office of Hazel Gilbreath **Bailey County Clerk totaled.103** prior to election day, indicating

a slightly more than usual interest in the primary this year. Most interest was concentrated on the Congressional race with three democrats and three republicans seeking the seat of 19th District Congressman George Mahon.

On the Democratic slate were Kent Hance, a Lubbock attorney and former Texas Senator and Morris Sheats, a Lubbock minister. Republicans seeking the bid included George Bush Jr., a Midland oilman; Joe Hickox, a retired colonel from the U.S. Air Force, of Lubbock and Jim Reese, former mayor of Odessa.

Only slightly less interest has been shown in the governor's race. On the Democratic side, School cafeteria at 8 p.m. on major attention has focused on incumbent governor, Dolph Briscoe. Contesting him were Burreson Named Preston Smith,

former governor, and John Hill, presently serving as attorney general. Other Democratics on the governor's ballot were Ray Allen Mayo, San Juan and Donald H. Beagle, Nederland. Republicans seeking the seat of governor included Bill Clements, oilman from Dallas, Ray Hutchison, also of Dallas and Clarence G. Thompson of Fort Worth. Two races were contested





State Meets Set For Conservation

Two statewide meetings will be held in Texas to give groups and individuals a chance to state their views concerning present soil and water conservation programs and to propose needed changes or additions to present approaches.

The meetings will be held May 16 in Stephenville and May 18 in San Antonio. The Stephenville meeting will be held in the Humanities and Business Building on the campus of Terleton State University. The San Antonio meeting will be held in the Fiesta Room of the Convention Center. Both meetings will start at 9 a.m. with registration beginning at 8:30 a.m.

"These meetings will be held to comply with provisions of the Resource Conservation Act of 1977," according to George C. Marks, State Conservationist of the USDA Soil Conservation Service.

The meetings are called by the **USDA Soil Conservation Service** and the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation board. Both meetings will be co-chaired by Marks and Carl Spencer, Executive Director of the TSS & WCB

conservation districts "Soil and water conservation programs--from their beginning--have sought public participation and input," Spencer said. "The RCA Act further insures that conservation programs will continue to be responsive to public needs and reaffirms the need for public leadership. We hope to recieve public input so a meaningful appraisal of grass roots conservation program will provide the means for their improvement."

However, Spencer said that the right to private ownership and management of land is one of the most cherished privileges of American citizenship. As the general public becomes more involved with the growing shortage of soil and water resources, we see more proposals in legislative form concerning what landowners ought to do in the way of erosion control, flood prevention, protection of wildlife habitat and providing public acess to private property.

"Any approach to soil and water conservation problems or issues must consider that a high percentage of farm and ranch land is privately owned, and that the interests and the welfare of the owners must be

served. Programs must be

"Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland has said that this law will help shoe the efectiveness


of the 40-year partnership among the Soil Conservation and soil and water conservation districts, state and local governments and individual land users," Marks said.

"Together these groups and the public will make informed, long-gange policy decisions about the conservation and improvement of our national soil, water, and related natural resources," he added.

"Laws pertaining to the organization and functioning of soil and water conservation districts provided that their programs and plans of work be

developed by local people and be a voluntary program. No program is more accetpable to a landowner than a voluntary type and one in which he had a part in developing," said Spencer.

The appraisal and program provided for by the newly enacted law will be presented ot enacted law will be presented to Congress by the end of 1979. This will be followed by the first evalutation report on existing services of the Soil Conservation Service which is to go to Congress by the end of fiscal year 1982.



Social Security Institutes New Teleservice



The answer to any question about social security is as near as the telephone. Most social security offices

around the country now offer a new teleservice program to the public. Using the service, a person can contact the nearest social security office by telephone and receive an answer to

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



Program Cleared

A \$20.9 million program for 387.7 miles of Farm and Ranch to Market roads has heen approved by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

The 1978 program includes 80.1 miles of new construction and funds for completion and further development of the remaining miles. A total of 127 projects are included. The all-paved Texas system of farm to market roads now extends more than 41,000 miles.

At the same time, the commission also approved a \$5.8 million 1978 railroad signal program for the fedcral highway system, subject to Federal Highway Administration approval. It includes 94 projects in all sections of the state.

Most of the projects involve railroad crossings on federal-aid urban system streets. Others are on federal-aid primary and secondary highways. The projects will be funded 90 percent by federal money and 10 percent from the state highway fund.
