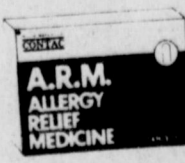

# State Meets Set For Conservation

Two statewide meetings will be held in Texas to give groups and individuals a chance to state their views concerning present soil and water conservation programs and to propose needed changes or additions to present approaches.

The meetings will be held May 16 in Stephenville and May 18 in San Antonio. The Stephenville meeting will be held in the Humanities and Business Building on the campus of Terleton State University. The San Antonio meeting will be held in the Fiesta Room of the Convention Center. Both meetings will start at 9 a.m. with registration beginning at 8:30 a.m.

"These meetings will be held to comply with provisions of the Resource Conservation Act of 1977," according to George C. Marks, State Conservationist of the USDA Soil Conservation Service.

The meetings are called by the USDA Soil Conservation Service and the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation board. Both meetings will be co-chaired by Marks and Carl Spencer, Executive Director of the TSS & WCB.

Local meetings relative to the Act are being planned in each of Texas' 198 soil and water

conservation districts.

"Soil and water conservation programs—from their beginning—have sought public participation and input," Spencer said. "The RCA Act further insures that conservation programs will continue to be responsive to public needs and reaffirms the need for public leadership. We hope to receive public input so a meaningful appraisal of grass roots conservation program will provide the means for their improvement."

However, Spencer said that the right to private ownership and management of land is one of the most cherished privileges of American citizenship. As the general public becomes more involved with the growing shortage of soil and water resources, we see more proposals in legislative form concerning what landowners ought to do in the way of erosion control, flood prevention, protection of wildlife habitat and providing public access to private property.

"Any approach to soil and water conservation problems or issues must consider that a high percentage of farm and ranch land is privately owned, and that the interests and the welfare of the owners must be served. Programs must be

acceptable to them," added Spencer.

"Individuals or groups with an interest in conservation should attend one of the statewide meetings or a meeting in a local soil and water conservation district," Marks said.

"Interested persons are being encouraged to bring written or oral statements reflecting the direction they think conservation programs should take in

the future. Such statements will be accepted, made a part of the record and considered fully."

From information and suggestions received at public meetings as well as data collected from surveys and inventories, RCA calls for determining:

- quality and quantity of soil, water and related resources.
- ability of these resources to meet current and future

demands.

- changes in resource condition resulting from past uses.
- costs and benefits of alternative soil and water conservation practices, and
- alternative irrigation

techniques and their effects on conservation and the environment.

Based on inventories, survey data and public input, the Soil Conservation Service will work together with conservation districts, state soil and water conservation agencies, local governments, and individual land users to enhance present conservation programs and set multiyear objectives. Accomplishments will be monitored at least annually.

"Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland has said that this law will help show the effectiveness

of the 40-year partnership among the Soil Conservation and soil and water conservation districts, state and local governments and individual land users," Marks said.

"Together these groups and the public will make informed, long-range policy decisions about the conservation and improvement of our national soil, water, and related natural resources," he added.

"Laws pertaining to the organization and functioning of soil and water conservation districts provided that their programs and plans of work be

developed by local people and be a voluntary program. No program is more acceptable to a landowner than a voluntary type and one in which he had a part in developing," said Spencer.

The appraisal and program provided for by the newly enacted law will be presented to Congress by the end of 1979. This will be followed by the first evaluation report on existing services of the Soil Conservation Service which is to go to Congress by the end of fiscal year 1982.

any question he has about social security. And, a claim for any type of social security benefit can be filed over the telephone too. For example, if a person is disabled and cannot come to the office, or if a person wants to file for retirement or health insurance benefits and cannot find the time to come to the office, he can call and give the necessary information over the telephone. When the application has been completed, it will be mailed for signature. An envelope will be sent, also, so that the signed application and all the necessary proofs which will be requested can be returned to the social security office by mail. 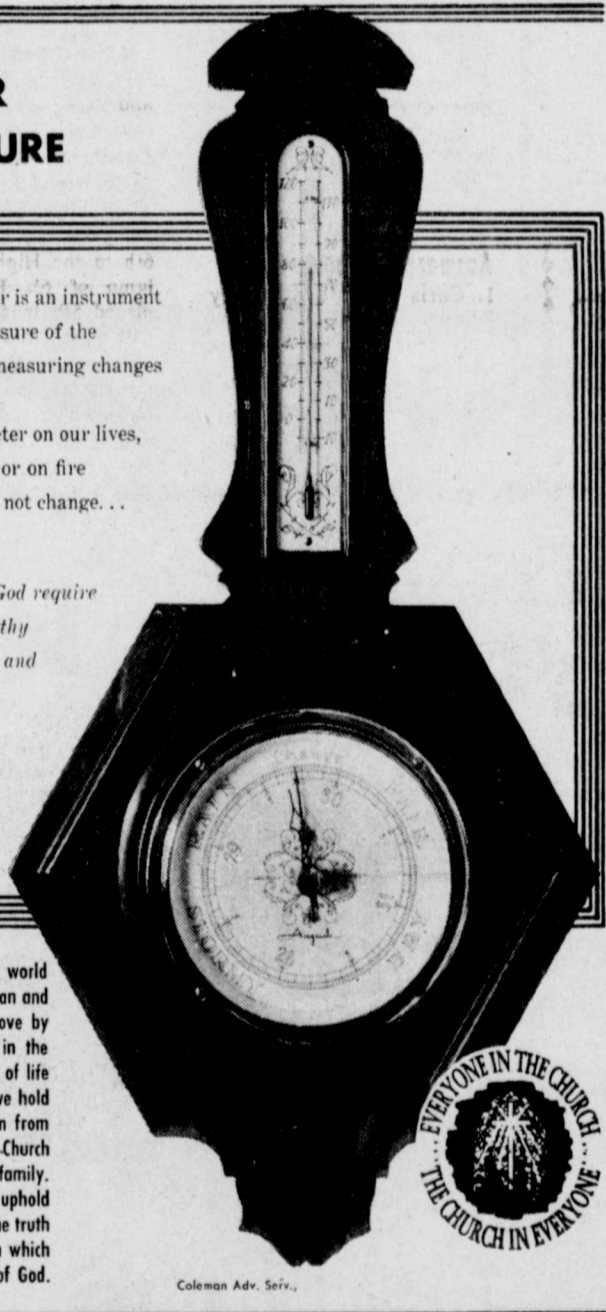

"Previously, all a person had to do was submit the stub of the lost card, or the old card, and a new card could be issued on the spot. This can no longer be done," Peacock said.

In addition to submitting evidence of identity, the person's application will be checked against the records at social security headquarters. If all the information checks out, a new card will be issued.

Peacock said the new rules are intended to help protect the person's social security record, assure that it is complete and accurate, and to prevent anyone else from misusing or abusing the person's social security number.

Evidence of identity should show the person's picture, signature, date of birth or age, or other identifying information. All documents are subject to verification with the agency which issued them.

Since it takes 3 to 4 weeks to issue and deliver the new card after all documents have been submitted, Peacock said it is a good idea to apply for the duplicate card as soon as possible.

A free leaflet, "Applying for a Social Security Number," lists the kinds of evidence that can be used to establish a person's identity. Copies can be obtained at the Lubbock social security office, located at 1205 Texas Avenue, Room 102, Lubbock, Texas 79401. The telephone number is 762-7381.



## STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Texas has one of its hottest statewide elections in years coming up Saturday, but interest is lagging.

Secretary of State Steve Oaks, who has been monitoring registration and absentee voting, predicts the turnout may drop below the modest 29 percent for 1974 primaries.

Oaks said only a remarkable near-deadline upsurge in absentee voting would give reason for reassessment of low-participation calculations.

According to Oaks' prediction, the Democratic primary turnout will be in the 1 million to 1.2 million range. About 1.5 million voted in 1974. Oaks' office previously had indicated as many as 2 million (still an unspectacular turnout) would vote Saturday.

None can predict accurately the Republican primary turnout. Oaks is sticking with a 100,000 to 150,000 projection, but some Republicans think the primary may attract fewer than 100,000. Only 69,000 voted in 1974 when there were no spotlight contests on the GOP ballot.

Voting in both parties shot upward in 1976, of course, due to the first Texas presidential preference primary.

There are now about 5.5 million registered voters, according to Oaks' staff estimate. Deadline for registering to vote in the May 6 primary was April 6.

Absentee voting continued through Tuesday of this week. It was reported about average in Dallas, but below average in many other counties.

**Bases Closing?**  
The Carter administration has proposed closing Goodfellow Air Force Base in San Angelo and trimming personnel at Fort Bliss near El Paso by 608 military and 41 civilian jobs.

The plan will be under study by the Pentagon for about 10 months, and could be blocked by Congress. Gov. Dolph Briscoe has

urged top federal officials to reconsider the plan.

Briscoe argued a strong case can be made against the reductions, and said "cost effectiveness of these bases is such that they actually merit expansion, not reduction."

The Goodfellow security training center would lose 375 military and 225 civilian jobs. Fort Bliss is a 35,000-military personnel installation.

Nationwide, the cuthack plans would affect 14,600 military personnel and 8,600 civilians.

#### Program Cleared

A \$20.9 million program for 387.7 miles of Farm and Ranch to Market roads has been approved by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

The 1978 program includes 80.1 miles of new construction and funds for completion and further development of the remaining miles. A total of 127 projects are included. The all-paved Texas system of farm to market roads now extends more than 41,000 miles.

At the same time, the commission also approved a \$5.8 million 1978 railroad signal program for the federal highway system, subject to Federal Highway Administration approval. It includes 94 projects in all sections of the state.

Most of the projects involve railroad crossings on federal-aid urban system streets. Others are on federal-aid primary and secondary highways. The projects will be funded 90 percent by federal money and 10 percent from the state highway fund.

a tire test driver, killed when a tire blew out, is a consumer under the products liability law.

—Held a waitress killed in an auto accident on her way home from work at 2 a.m. was not entitled to workers' compensation benefits.

—Upheld the Houston Court of Civil Appeals decision that a former executive with a grass trimming products firm must yield for a year his job with a competitor under a no-competition contract.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals held that all Texas auto insurance liability policies provide uninsured motorist coverage automatically, unless motorist-policyholders reject it in writing.

#### AG Opinions

An opinion by Attorney General John Hill effectively blocked a controversial \$8 million proposal to buy land in Hidalgo County for a new prison farm, unless courts reverse the finding.

Hill said money from sale of Blue Ridge Farm in Harris County can be used only to buy other land within 75 miles of Huntsville.

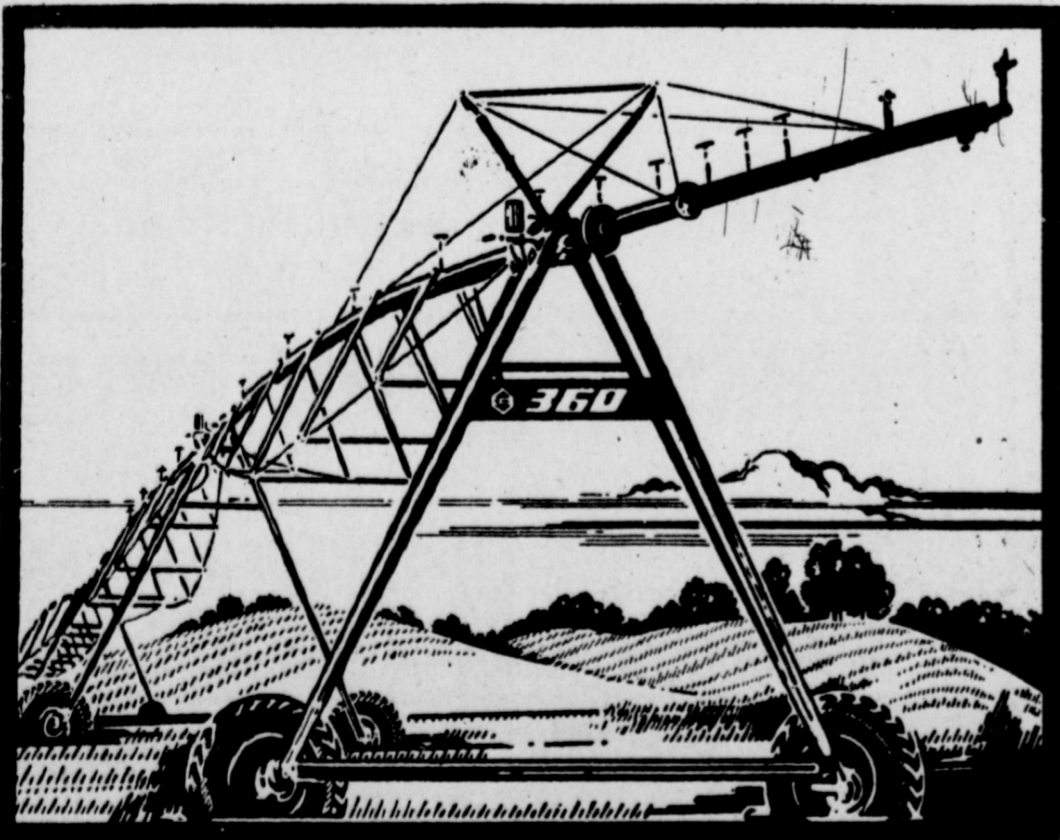

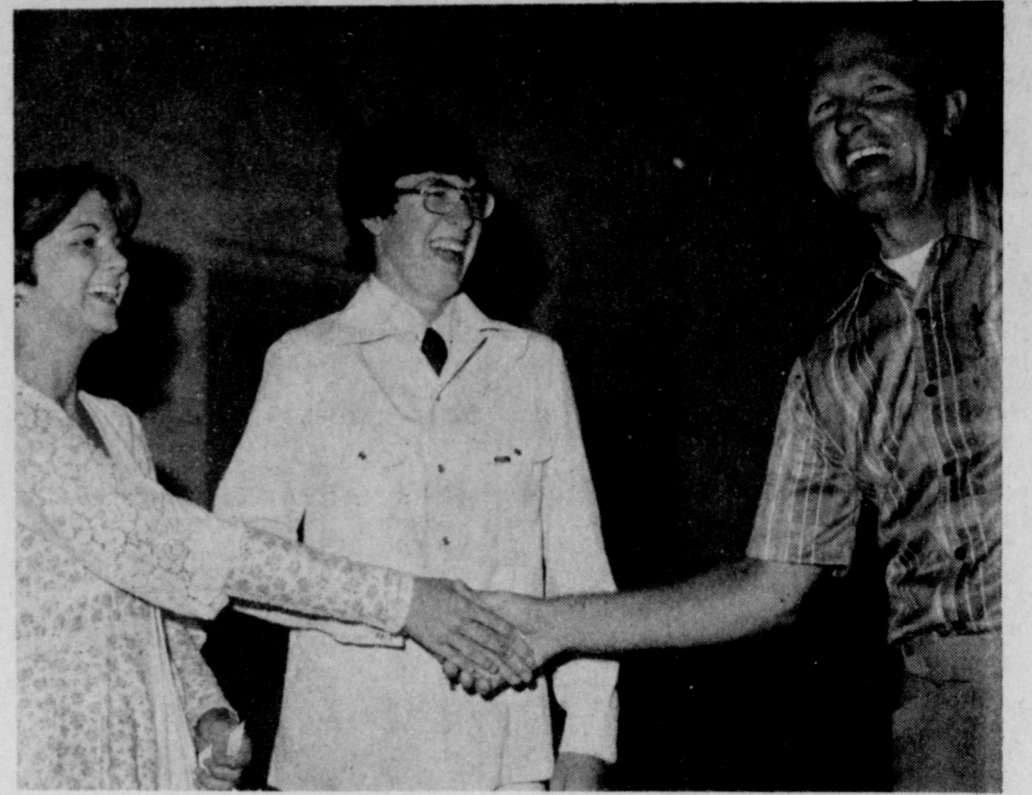

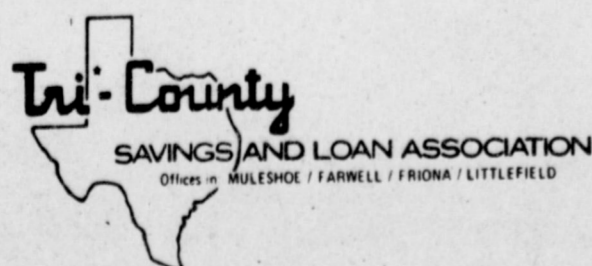
