The members of Company K., New Mexico national guard, are all "puffed up" this afternoon, as they have a perfect right to be, because at noon they had a dinner that would have been fit for a king, and, if reports are true, it was, in quantity, variety and quality, far superior to what the crowned heads of Europe are privileged to enjoy these days. Among the "highbrows" the meal would have been referred to as "luncheon," but in the army, as well as among the common herd in civil life, dinner continues to be served at noon.

A day or two ago State Senator Mersfelder of Curry county, who is now a resident of Albuquerque, hit upon the happy idea of providing the Clovis company of guardsmen with the necessary funds to enable them to have a "big spread" today. He communicated with the Clovis chamber of commerce and yesterday he received a substantial check from the organization to be used in defraying the expenses of buying extras for today's meal.

A glance over the following menu will convince one that there was nothing much that could have been added which would have contributed to satisfying the appetites of the soldier boys:

Those in charge of preparing the meal were: L. M. De Ford, mess sergeant; J. C. Miller, A. J. Hartson and F. E. Newsom, cooks, and that they

did their work well was evidenced by the manner in which everything passed off. It is not an easy task to prepare and serve in an army camp a meal that would have been a credit to any first-class hotel, nevertheless these men did it.

The following letter was sent to the Clovis chamber of commerce by the boys of Company K., Albuquerque, N. M., July 4, 1917. Chamber of Commerce, Clovis, N. M.

Gentlemen:—Fourth of July 1776, was undoubtedly a great day for the American nation, but certainly July 4, 1917, was the biggest day in the annals of Company K., First New Mexico Infantry.

Speaking of celebrations, we had one and the reasons are obvious. For three weeks we have been milling around in the sand and heat, putting up tents, building cantonments, taking final examinations and executing the squads right and squads left. It was hard, dry, dusty work and all executed on the government mobilization camp rations. This ration includes meat and potatoes, canned and dried foods. It is a staple all right and entirely filling. Not a man is looking weak and wan, so the food must be substantial. But listen, each and every man in the company is a man from home—somewhere or other, and deep in the recesses of his memory unobliterated by the sand blasts of the mesa is still a recollection of the days that were, when the Fourth of July was synonymous with ice cream and cake and lemonade and cigars and a hundred other extras for the dinner table.

You see, this great Fourth of July day was drawing near, and there was much nervous speculation as to the noonday meal, and there was a faint hope in the breast of every man that he might afterward refer to this day as different from other days. Then imagine the grins of appreciation that appeared on the faces of tan when Senator Mersfelder brought a telegram, from Mr. Shipley saying the folks at home were going to make their dream a reality. Imagine the feeling that came over hungry men when they read the menu.

Picture in your mind's eye the air of satisfaction that one assumes as he puffs his perfecto after partaking of such a banquet with the army in the field.

Perhaps you have in the past, or perhaps in the future you will understand the spirit of appreciation of such remembrances from folks at home. No word that we can say can express our gratitude, and we trust you understand.

The banquet was served on impromptu tables built in one of our recently completed cantonments, with Senator Mersfelder as our distinguished guest representing Curry county and home.

This day will ever be remembered as characteristic of the generosity, reputation and spirit of the ones we left behind. We as men from home have tried to make this day such that no one will ever have cause to show regret—we know not where the trend of time and conditions will have taken us when this day arrives once more, and we thank you.

OIL FIELDS NEAR HEREFORD

Large Area to Be Leased by Oklahoma Oil Co. and Later Prospected for Oil.

The Hereford country has been added to the list of prospective oil lands, and a possibility of increasing her wealth more rapidly than by the safe and sane, always reliable, farm and stock route, is already beckoning most alluringly in the uncertain future.

Mr. Morris Jouvenot, representing the Empire Gas and Fuel Co. of Bartlettville, Oklahoma, was in Hereford the first of the week and declared his intention of leasing, if possible some 60,000 acres of land in the immediate vicinity and nearby territory. From the Vega country south to some distance below Hereford and east into Randall County, already many leases have been obtained.

The company, which is a \$20,000,000 concern, is altogether reliable and has been operating in Kansas and Oklahoma for several years, having already "wild-catted" 75 holes in that section. They have been in the Panhandle about ninety days and their willingness to make the leases for which they pay liberally is evidence of their confidence in the oil value of this territory. The method used by this company is different from that usually employed, as they are leasing one-fourth section out of every section, instead of the usual entire section. Three geological surveys are said to have been already taken here although definite information, so far, has been very guarded.

There is surely encouragement however, in the fact that the company is willing to spend so much money to secure the leases.

Provided the requisite number can be obtained, and it is altogether probable that they can be, the tests will be made and drilling commenced. Although oil lands prove to be bonanzas less often than they prove to be will of the wisp, the Hereford country is just as deserving of the best chance and has just as much probability of winning it, as many another section that has successfully developed its natural resources and achieved fame and fortune.

NO MORE IRRIGATION

Owing to delays in the delivery of irrigation machinery it will not be possible to install pumping plants for next year unless orders are placed very soon.

Orders for engines placed now will be delivered next February and March so it would be impossible to get wells completed in time for next year's crop if the contract is delayed now.

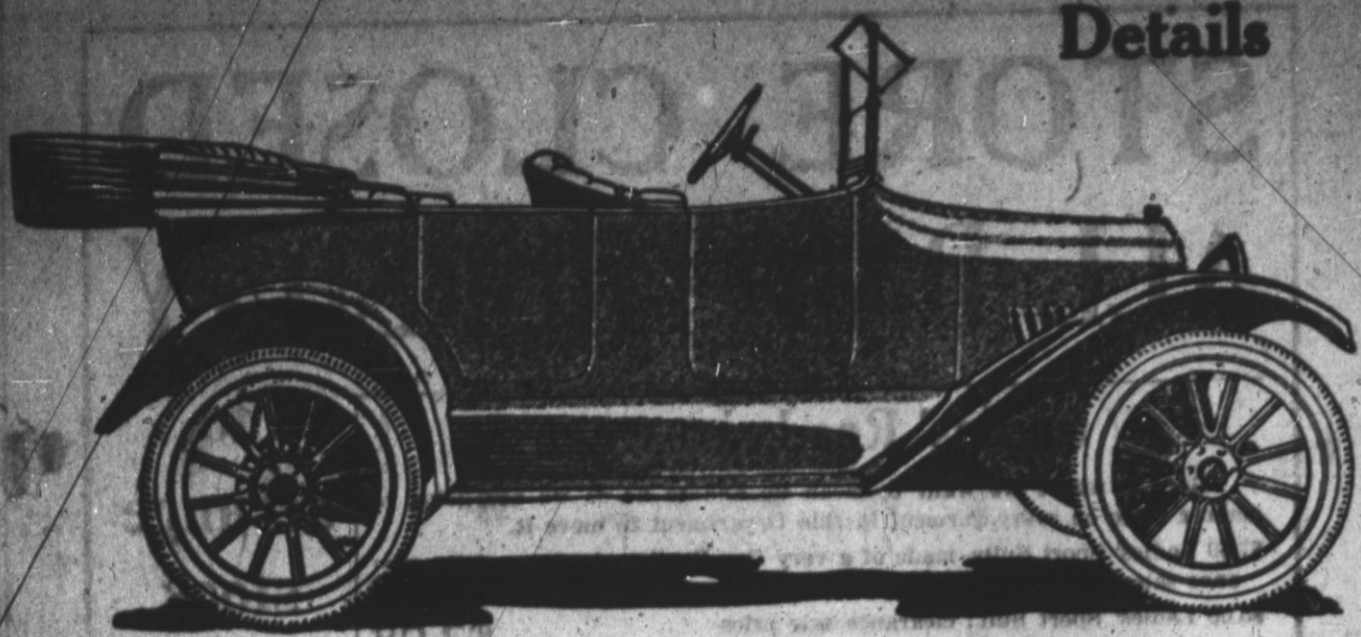
