Festival of Trees to begin Thursday at Senior Center

The holiday season begins at Hereford Senior Citizen Center Thursday when a four-day program of activities and entertainment gets underway for the annual "Festival of Trees."

A full day of festival activities are scheduled Thursday through Saturday, from 8:30 a.m. to 6 p.m., climaxed with special events each night, while a holiday turkey buffet and a Music Festival are on Sunday's schedule.

The main feature of the event is the display of 26 beautifully decorated trees for residents to enjoy

during the four days. A Festival Gala is on the program Thursday, beginning at 7 p.m., and the auction of trees is planned from 8 to 10:30 p.m.

The tree display is a major community involvement with trees sponsored by the Senior Citizens and 20 other individuals, organizations or businesses. The tree auction is a major fundraiser for the center. Last year, approximately 5,000 people attended the display and took part in the festival activities.

Children's programs are scheduled

from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Thursday and Friday, and a Christmas Tea with Santa is planned for children from 2 to 3 p.m. Saturday. Admission is \$2.

A Fashion Show and Dinner highlights the Friday night special event from 7 to 9 p.m. Tickets are \$7.50 each. A dinner theater is scheduled Saturday night from 7 to 9:30. Ticket cost is \$15.

Continuous festival activities include: Herd Restaurant, Bake Shop, tree display, children's shopping, children's crafts, gift tree, Holiday Bazaar, Lionel Train display, children's programs, and voting on the best tree.

Advance tickets only will be sold for the special events each night, with space limited to 200 persons. The Sunday buffet is \$7.50 for adults and \$3.50 for children 12 and under. There will be no admission charge for the tree auction, continuous festival activities, or the music festival.

Showers forecast for Hereford, rest of state

A chance of showers or thunderstorms was forecast across the state Saturday night and was expected to linger in some areas through Sunday.

Early Saturday, skies were generally cloudy except in some parts of North Texas where they were clear. But clouds with the potential for showers or thunderstorms were expected Saturday night and Sunday.

For Hereford, the National Weather Service is predicting a 50 percent chance of showers and thunderstorms Saturday night, with a low of 40-45 degrees and southwest winds at 10-20 mph and gusty. Sunday, look for partly cloudy skies and a high around 60 degrees with west winds at 10-20 mph and gusty.

In West Texas, mostly cloudy to cloudy skies were forecast

regionwide with a chance for showers and thunderstorms across most areas through Sunday. Cloudiness and rain chances were to decrease from the west Sunday, when highs are expected from near 60 in the northwest Panhandle to the upper 70s in the Big Bend lowlands. Lows should be in the 40s and 50s.

Cloudy skies were also forecast in North Texas Saturday night with a chance of showers and thunderstorms in the west and central portions of the region.

On Sunday, the same wet conditions are likely across most the region except in the east where there is only a chance of thunderstorms. Sunday night, showers should end in the west while elsewhere it will be mostly cloudy with a chance of showers and thunderstorms.

GOP firm on many issues

WASHINGTON (AP) - Rep. Newt Gingrich, the prospective new House speaker, is warning President Clinton that while the two parties may cooperate, Republicans who will run the next Congress won't budge on many issues.

"On those things where we believe we represent the vast majority of Americans, there will be no compromise," the Georgia Republican said Friday in his first speech since Election Day. "So let me draw the distinction: Cooperation, yes; compromise, no."

Just three days after the GOP captured control of both houses of Congress for the first time since 1954, the combative Gingrich broadly sketched the new, conservative direction in which he will try to steer

the House. The 104th Congress, which convenes Jan. 4, presents Clinton with a hostile majority and questions about the prospects for legislation.

In a dramatic swipe at Democratic orthodoxy, Gingrich said many federal anti-poverty programs are not helping the poor and need to be replaced.

"We simply need to reach out, erase the slate and start over," he said in a luncheon address to financial investors.

In remarks later, he said Medicaid, Head Start and Job Corps were among the programs that need to be scrutinized, adding that re-examining a program "doesn't mean it has to be abolished."

GOP efforts to dramatically revamp those programs would be sure to run into stiff Democratic opposi-

tion. White House chief of staff Leon Panetta, appearing on PBS' "MacNeil-Lehrer NewsHour" Friday night, said it's easy for Gingrich to say he wants to "start from scratch and build from the bottom up."

"The question you have to ask is what does that mean? ... Does that mean he wants to replace the veterans program? Does it mean he wants to replace the Head Start program? ... He has to approach his members and try to develop the majorities to get these things done," said Panetta, a former House member.

Isaac Shapiro of the Center for Budget and Policy Priorities, a liberal think tank, criticized Gingrich's views. Head Start and the Job Corps are among the most effective anti-poverty programs, he main-

da Vinci manuscript sells for \$30.8 million

SEATTLE (AP) - Microsoft Corp. Chairman Bill Gates won the bidding war for a Leonardo da Vinci manuscript, paying a record \$30.8 million for 72 pages of notes and diagrams exploring the mysteries of the cosmos.

Christie's America in New York said the purchaser was anonymous, but a spokeswoman for Gates' public relations firm confirmed that he was the buyer, the Seattle Post-Intelligencer reported Saturday.

"Leonardo represents the fusion of art and science," said the spokeswoman for Waggener-Edstrom of Portland, Ore., who refused to be quoted by name. "I think that's why he is of such interest to Bill Gates."

The manuscript contains Leonardo's distinctive backward handwriting and meticulous drawings, and includes his explanation for why the sky is blue and his advice on building dams.

Gates plans to tour the work in museums around the world, the spokeswoman told the Post-Intelligencer. Gates was unavailable for comment.

Christopher Burge, chairman of Christie's America, said Friday's sale was the highest price paid for any work of art sold at auction in the past four years, and the highest ever for a manuscript.

In the document, dated 1508 to 1510, Leonardo studies the water and cosmos through words and pictures. His explorations range from astronomy to the atmosphere, from physical geography to geology, from hydraulics to canal building.

On one page, he remarks that the light of the moon is reflected sunlight. He wrote a century before Galileo proved that the moon does not shine of its own accord.

The manuscript was sold by the Armand Hammer Museum of Art and Cultural Center in Los Angeles. The late oil tycoon Armand Hammer had bought the work at a 1980 auction in London for \$5.6 million.

The pre-sale estimate was \$10 million to \$15 million. But after bidding opened at \$5.5 million, the auction turned into a feverish battle between Gates, bidding through a Seattle representative, and a representative of the Cariplo Foundation of Milan, Italy, who was in the auction room.

The two raised the price in increments of \$500,000 and \$1 million. When the 2-1/2-minute duel ended and the gavel finally went down, the standing-room-only crowd applauded and cheered.

"It's an extraordinary moment in auction history," Burge said.

The address was typically Gingrich, a former history professor - at times a political stump speech, at other points a discourse on everything from World War II strategy to the books of his friend Alvin Toffler, who has written about society of the future.

Gingrich took swipes at the "counterculture" and the "Washington elite," whom he never identified but said were rejected by the voters on Tuesday.

Gingrich told reporters that he opposes an increase in the tobacco tax, which the administration proposed to help finance its aborted health-care plan.

Shuttle astronauts grab satellite using new flight maneuver

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) - Astronaut Ellen Ochoa on Saturday used Atlantis' robot arm to snatch a 7,500-pound German satellite loaded with millions of atmospheric images gathered during eight days of free flight.

The satellite had trailed Atlantis by upwards of 50 miles since its release last week to measure atmospheric gases without interference from the shuttle.

Thruster firings sent the shuttle over, around and directly under the \$35 million satellite. Commander Donald McMonagle took the controls as Atlantis crept up beneath the triangular craft, stopping about 35 feet away.

Ochoa then steered the jointed 50-foot robot arm into place and grabbed the satellite as the two spacecraft orbited 186 miles high just south of New Zealand.

"That was a superb rendezvous," Mission Control told the crew. "Well done."

Shuttles normally approach rendezvous targets from the front, but NASA tried the new method in

anticipation of next year's docking with the Russian space station Mir.

By approaching from below, the shuttle can avoid firing steering jets toward its target. The space station has solar panels that can be damaged by shuttle exhaust.

The Mir docking, set for June, is Atlantis' next flight after the current 11-day mission. The only other docking of a U.S. and Russian spacecraft was the Apollo-Soyuz meeting in 1975.

Retrieval of the German satellite was critical to the current mission because only about 1 percent of the data collected was beamed directly to the ground. The rest is stored on digital tapes that scientists will examine after Atlantis returns to Earth on Monday.

Klaus Grossmann, a physicist at the University of Wuppertal near Cologne, Germany, said the satellite's infrared telescopes collected some 15 million spectra, or atmospheric wavelength images.

"It worked just perfect, just absolutely perfect," Grossmann said.

Pharmacy school head visits health group here

Arthur A. Nelson Jr., R.Ph.D., dean of the Texas Tech University Pharmacy School in Amarillo, on Thursday addressed a group of 20 health care professionals and students in Hereford.

"The location of the new pharmacy school in Amarillo has the potential to be a positive influence in our community," said Jim Robinson, administrator of Hereford Regional Medical Center, which sponsored Nelson's visit to town.

"Hereford Regional Medical Center and Hereford pharmacies will be able to participate in the programs of the school by providing facilities for pharmacy interns," Robinson said.

During his address at the hospital, Nelson spoke on goals of the new pharmacy school, the role of rural pharmacists in education of pharmacy students the Pharm.D. degree for

registered pharmacists. He also indicated that part of the mission of the pharmacy school will be to provide pharmacists to rural Texas.

"Dr. Nelson explained the vital role of the new pharmacy school and the impact this kind of professional training can have on the availability of health care professionals in our area," Robinson said.

"The exciting thing about a pharmacy intern program in this region of the Panhandle is that when pharmacists train in an area and see the advantages of a smaller community, such as Hereford, many of these professionals choose to make the community their permanent residence," Robinson said. "That certainly helps us as we continue to work toward recruiting top-notch professionals to our community."

Battered sailor located near coast of Bermuda

By RICHARD LORANT Associated Press Writer BOSTON (AP) - His battered sloop was kept afloat by inner tubes. His drinking water was low, his radio transmitter and cellular phone silent. The Coast Guard gave him up for dead.

But Gabriel Feldman survived four weeks on often rough seas.

Pounded by storm after storm and tossed overboard four times, Feldman was finally spotted Thursday by a fishing boat off the coast of Bermuda.

A Coast Guard spokesman called his survival "somewhere between amazing and a miracle." Feldman was resting Friday on his boat in St. George's and didn't immediately return telephone messages.

"He's a very tough person," said his 25-year-old brother, Fernando. "He doesn't go to die in the sea."

The brothers, both experienced sailors, had set off Oct. 12 in separate boats for San Juan, Puerto Rico, where they planned to race Gabriel Feldman's 36-foot vintage boat, the Tao.

The two had restored the one-mast wooden vessel from the keel up and raced it in regattas in Portland, Maine, and Newport, R.I.

But two days after leaving, they lost sight of each other in a fierce storm.

Gabriel Feldman, 30, had no life raft and no emergency satellite beacon on his boat. The storms

knocked out his transmitter and phone.

The Coast Guard pulled Fernando Feldman off his disabled boat Oct. 20 and began to search for the older brother on Nov. 2, the day the Tao was supposed to have arrived in San Juan.

Twenty-five U.S. and Canadian aircraft covered about a half-million square miles of ocean before the search was suspended Nov. 8.

They were looking in the wrong place.

The Coast Guard assumed Gabriel Feldman either was adrift or following his intended course to Puerto Rico. Instead, he waited for days at the edge of the storm for his brother to appear, then sailed slowly before giving up on seeing Fernando alive.

"He was not disabled," said his girlfriend, Cynthia Williams. "He would sail minimum amounts but keep his eye on the rhumb line. ... Finally he was just completely distraught."

Fernando Feldman, meanwhile, was growing desperate at a Cape Cod house where a man had offered him shelter.

Gabriel Feldman told his brother he passed through eight intense storms and fell overboard four times. He rationed his water and caught fish to augment his ample supply of canned goods and dried food.

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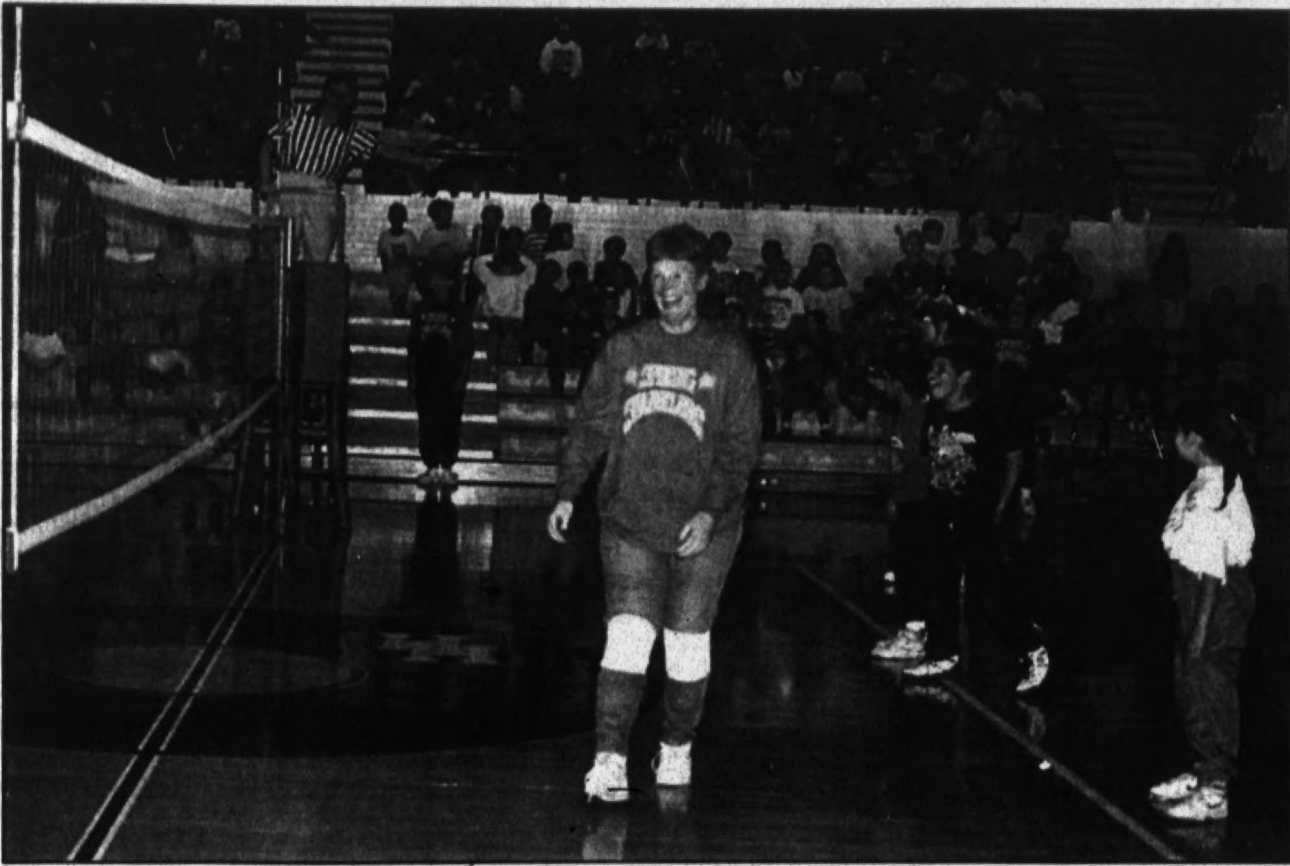
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Reacting to the call

Christopher assures leaders that US policy won't change

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) - Departing from a prepared text, Secretary of State Warren Christopher took pains to reassure foreign leaders that the Democrats' election debacle doesn't mean a change in U.S. foreign policy.

The text of Christopher's speech to Pacific rim leaders referred only briefly and obliquely to Tuesday's Senate and House elections. In the actual speech Thursday, Christopher gave an impromptu and "very personal" assessment of its impact, State Department spokesman Michael McCurry said.

Christopher spoke of "the likelihood of continuity in our foreign policy in the wake of the recent election results," McCurry told reporters today, and many foreign ministers "came up afterward and thanked him for his comments, said

they were very useful, very timely." Asked whether Christopher felt a need to calm foreign governments that fear the Republican takeover means a foreign policy shift, McCurry said: "I think he detected great interest. At dinner last night a number of his dinner partners asked about the elections."

Christopher is attending a meeting of the Asia Pacific Economic Cooperation forum. He addressed foreign ministers of the 18-member group behind closed doors and no text of his impromptu remarks was available.

U.S. Trade Representative Mickey Kantor also offered reassurances, saying: "The elections in the United States are not going to affect our trade policy. Our trade policy has been bipartisan from day one." He said that while flying to Jakarta

he spoke by phone with Sen. Robert Dole, the new Senate majority leader.

"We look forward to working with Sen. Dole," Kantor told reporters. "We've worked very closely together and he's been a great supporter of our trade policy and we would expect that to continue."

In his prepared speech, Christopher offered a sweeping initiative to build electronic bridges across the Pacific and host a transportation ministers' summit on the infrastructure problems created by Asia's rapid economic growth.

"We live in a time when a company in Jakarta can start with capital from Hong Kong and New York, make a product designed in Osaka or Seattle with parts from Pusan and Detroit, market and advertise that product with firms based in Singapore and Los Angeles, and sell it all over the world," he said.

Apart from the transportation summit and a proposal to set up a forum to advise small businessmen, Christopher suggested "an APEC-wide, multimedia telecommunications network" linked by telephones, computers and video.

Christmas mailing dates set

Deadlines to send parcels by surface mail to military and international mail destinations have passed.

In order to get there on time, air parcel post service to the Middle East must be mailed by Nov. 15. Air parcels to Africa, Europe, the Far East, Greenland, Southeast Asia and Central and South America must be mailed by Dec. 1, while gifts going to Australia and the Caribbean may be mailed by Dec. 5.

Air letters and cards must be mailed to those destinations by Dec. 1, except Australia, the Caribbean and Central and South America, which has a deadline of Dec. 5.

For military mail, deadlines range from mid-November to early December for APO/FPO addresses and U.S. domestic ZIP codes.

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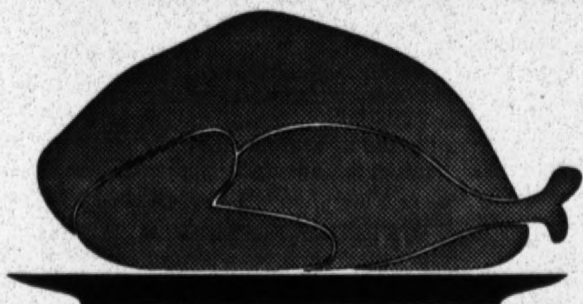


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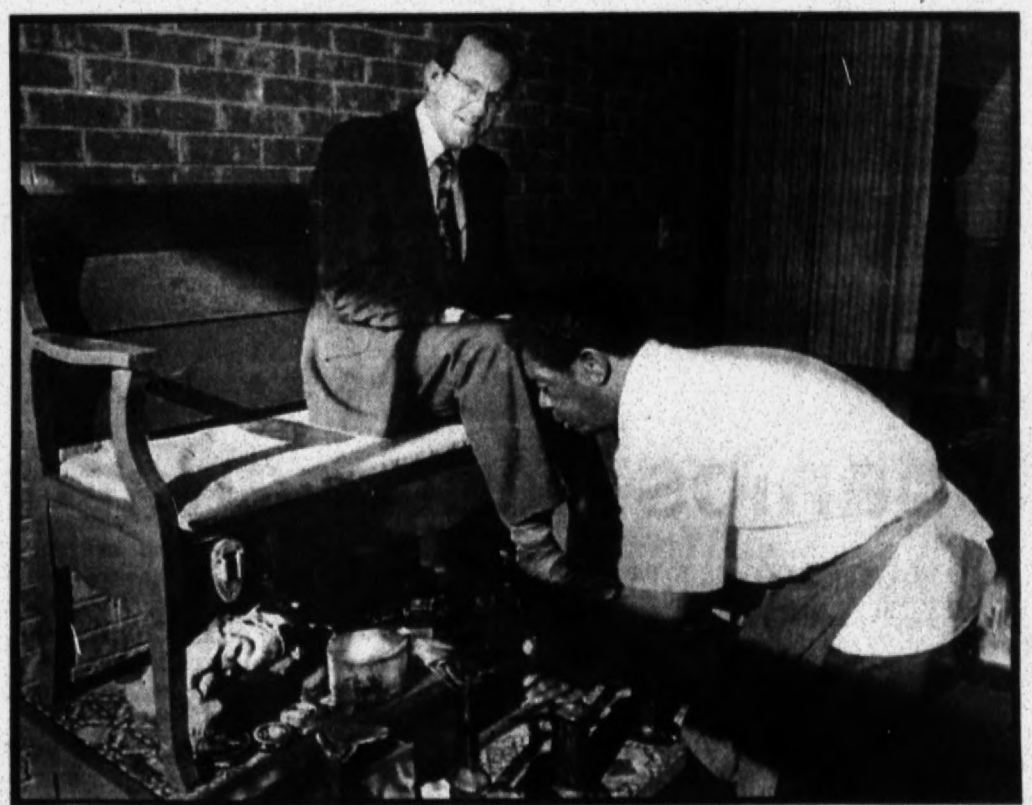

OUT OF THE BLUE

I'm sure you all expect me to comment on this past week's elections, so here goes.

In case you didn't hear, the value of life has just dropped significantly, thanks to voters in Oregon.

That state has taken the lead in the "right to die" movement with passage of a ballot proposal that makes it the first state in the U.S. to allow physician assisted suicide.

Of course, proponents of the measure will say that the strict "controls" make it such that the law will only be used rarely and in extremely limited instances.

That is not the point. The fact that anyone can have his doctor prescribe lethal drugs to end his life is the first step in a downward spiral that threatens the very existence of the human race.

Just like the legalization of abortion has led to the killing of a million unborn babies a year, the passage of Oregon's assisted suicide law may one day claim the lives of millions who have no choice in the matter.

The law says a patient with six months or less to live can ask for a lethal dose of drugs.

The "conditions" are that at least two doctors must agree with the diagnosis (I'm sure there are lots of Kevorkians around who will see to that!), then the patient must ask three times, the last time in writing, to die.

Finally, after a 15-day waiting period, the doctor makes the lethal prescription.

What bothers me is that, now that one state has approved such a step, how long will it be before such laws are commonplace across the country?

Then, how long before the conditions are removed one by one, so that a terminally ill patient can one day walk into a doctor's office and demand the chance to die?

I foresee the day when the families of the aged and infirm will be allowed to request euthanasia for loved ones who may not be able to speak up for their own rights, such as Alzheimer's patients.

Finally, if this abomination is allowed to continue, laws will be amended to allow the euthanizing of mentally retarded, physically handicapped and elderly people, possibly using the rationales that "overpopulation requires survival of the fittest" or "if they understood what we are doing, they'd agree."

As I said, the value of life has just dropped dramatically.

I'm sure just about every conservative voter out there is experiencing -- to one degree or another -- a certain amount of glee over the happenings in the elections.

After all, it was quite a long way from predictions early in the campaign that the Republicans might regain the Senate to the onslaught of

upsets that not only gave the Senate to the GOP, but also put Republicans in control in the House, a majority of governorships and several state legislatures.

In Texas, George W. Bush takes over as governor and Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison keeps her job.

But that is only the beginning.

The Texas Supreme Court is now controlled by the Republicans, as is the Railroad Commission for the first time ever and the State Board of Education.

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry kept his job as well.

In fact, about the only places Texas Republicans didn't win were in some statewide offices, lieutenant governor, land commissioner and treasurer. Although the GOP gained a seat in both houses of the State Legislature, the Democrats still control those bodies.

But all that aside, this election proves one thing and one thing only to me -- voters who were fed up with incumbents in 1994 can be just as fed up with incumbents in 1996.

Just getting into office was the easy part -- turning from the minority party into the ruling governing party will be the challenge facing the

Republicans next.

And, they have to act quickly, because they don't have the luxury of 40 years -- or even four years -- to settle themselves in cushy jobs.

They have to act as quickly as possible to prove to the American people that the Republican party is the best party to run the country.

When my children asked, "what did you watch on television when you were little?" and my answer was a simple "nothing," they couldn't believe how deprived my life must have been.

Life in a small town in West Texas was not high in entertainment. There were radio programs. The picture show had about three changes of features each week, but not necessarily first-run movies.

Roller skating was not a pastime to be universally enjoyed. Only a few blocks in downtown had sidewalks and most streets were unpaved.

Pick-up games of baseball were fairly common but boys in those days were chauvinistic. No girls allowed.

Comic books were heavy trading items. No one could buy them all but among us, we circulated all the popular publications.

The public library was no great shakes. Occupying a small room in the courthouse, the library had a book collection that was quite a bit less than outstanding. But, hurray, there were Nancy Drew books by the shelf.

From the time I learned to read, my greatest love was centered on books. My father claimed that he knew where to find me when I disappeared. His theory, he said, was to look for the darkest corner in the house and there I'd be, with a book.

Friends and relatives gave me books for presents. I cherished every single one, from the Elsie Dinsmore series to Tom Swift to Nancy Drew. To this day, I could spend a quiet hour, or day, in a library or bookstore.

When we went to homes of friends and relatives, the kids played games and the adults talked. In good weather, there were outdoor games, such as hide/n/seek, London Bridge; Red Rover, Red Rover; Mother, May I?, and dodge ball.

The number one board game of all time, Monopoly, became a favorite when some family became affluent enough to buy one. We had homemade boards for Parcheesi and Chinese Checkers.

And, there were card games that kids could play ... books (a/k/a as

Authors when we got a deck made for that purpose), Old Maid, Double Solitaire, hearts, etc., etc.

As I grew older, my grandparents undertook to teach me to play bridge. They were of the Auction Bridge generation and I went off to college not knowing there was a card game called contract bridge.

But, I learned in a hurry. There were any number in the dorm who knew more about the game than I did. However, I was more adept at bluffing my way through as I learned about contract bidding, Goren's point count system and high and low card signals.

In eight semesters of college, I managed to run through five roommates (one at a time). A roommate in my freshman year was not going to win any academic honors with, or without, me playing bridge frequently. But her mother decided I was a bad influence and at fault for daughter failing.

One roommate and I got along for two whole years, until she graduated a semester ahead of me.

When I think of roommates, I think of her. We played bridge, morning, noon and night. When we couldn't find anyone who knew how to play but was willing to learn, we taught them. It was our goal never to be without a fourth for bridge.

In a day when students didn't have dorm door keys and roomcheck meant having to be in your own room at 11 p.m., we still managed to get in many hours of bridge-playing.

The best times of all, though, came during "dead week" when nearly everyone else was studying for finals. Getting that fourth could be tough then.

Not wishing to brag about either our prowess at the bridge table (Actually, we played bridge across a bed -- two sitting on the bed, two on chairs at the sides.) or our academic skills, we finished our higher education in good shape.

We settled for a B-average in courses. If a grade in bridge had been available, surely we would have received an A.

Say a little prayer for American farmers

Did you know there are now fewer farms in this country than any time since 1850? The U.S. Census Bureau reports there are only 1.9 million farms in the nation, compared to 1.4 million in 1850 and a high of 6.8 million farms in 1933.

From 1935 to 1954, American lost farms at the rate of about 500,000 a year. Another million farms were lost between 1954 and 1959. The statistics are a little misleading, of course. Those five million farms didn't disappear--the vast majority just became larger farms. Some farmland was also converted to other uses--such as housing developments, parking lots, airports, etc.

This fact is indicated by the growth in size of the average farm from 168 acres in 1940 to 468 acres today. That trend is even more prevalent

in the state of Texas where the average size of a farm is 708 acres.

While the average size of the farm got bigger, farm employment has fallen dramatically. In 1850, nearly two-thirds of the entire labor force of the nation worked on farms; by 1991, only 2.5 percent of the civilian labor force worked in agriculture production. It is also interesting that in 1850 it took nearly five million people to raise the food and fiber for a nation of 23 million. Today, it only takes half that many, 2.5 million farmers, to feed and clothe a population of 250 million.

Next time you say a prayer before your evening meal, include the American farmer. There are fewer of them than in the past, but through their effort, you are enjoying the safest and least expensive food supply in the world.

Hispanics need sense of belonging

Earlier this year, I was fortunate enough to share in a celebration of Hispanic culture at a middle school in the small town of Dimmitt. The occasion was a Cinco de Mayo celebration--a full day of festivities organized by administrators, educators and parents for the benefit of not only the students of Hispanic descent but for the entire school population, in order for everyone to fully appreciate the differences that exist among us.

Now can you imagine, in the 1960s, having a public school set aside a full day to celebrate a Mexican holiday such as Cinco de Mayo? Not very likely.

Yet, as it turns out, these observances are very important for a number of reasons. No. 1, it is America's way of telling its Hispanic citizenry, "You are indelibly written in our country's history and you will undoubtedly play an increasingly more important role in shaping its future."

And probably just as importantly, it gives Hispanics a greater sense of belonging, that our contributions do not in fact go unnoticed by our own country and fellow citizens.

As an individual, I can truly relate

to the challenges yet before us while ever mindful of the opportunities that these challenges represent. I can empathize with the new arrivals in this country while identifying with fourth-generation Hispanic Americans who find themselves immersed in the pursuit of the American Dream. Having experienced both of those periods in my own life, I am certain of one thing--success is within the grasp of each and every one of them.

I was born in Mexico and labored as a migrant worker, along with the rest of my family, as we traveled across the country in search of work. I enrolled in school not knowing a single word of English. It was not unlike the challenges faced by the countless stream of families that enter our country on a daily basis, hoping against all odds to find a better way of life.

Today, new arrivals to this country find themselves bearing the brunt of the backlash directed not at them but at those who choose to come to this country illegally.

When my family came to this country, we faced a different sort of immigrant bashing. As a child, I always wondered why white people would treat my parents with such disrespect, especially my father.

You have to understand, my father had served heroically in the Navy during World War II, coming home with a number of commendations, including the Purple Heart. So it bothered me that in spite of his service, he would be denied the simplest of requests, such as entering through the front door of a restaurant to buy food for his family.

These were obviously not pleasant experiences and only now, by reflecting back on them, can I more fully appreciate how far we have come and the progress we have made.

My father's response to acts of prejudice and racism is essentially this: It matters not what other people think and it matters not the color of your skin. What truly matters is what nobody is able to discern or judge by simply looking at a person--for what matters is the moral compass and the sense of worth contained within the human heart.

It would be very easy to blame all of our failures on racism and thereafter accept our lot in life. Instead, by truly believing in ourselves, we'll assume responsibility for our own success in life, recognizing the only limitations on our future are those that are self imposed.

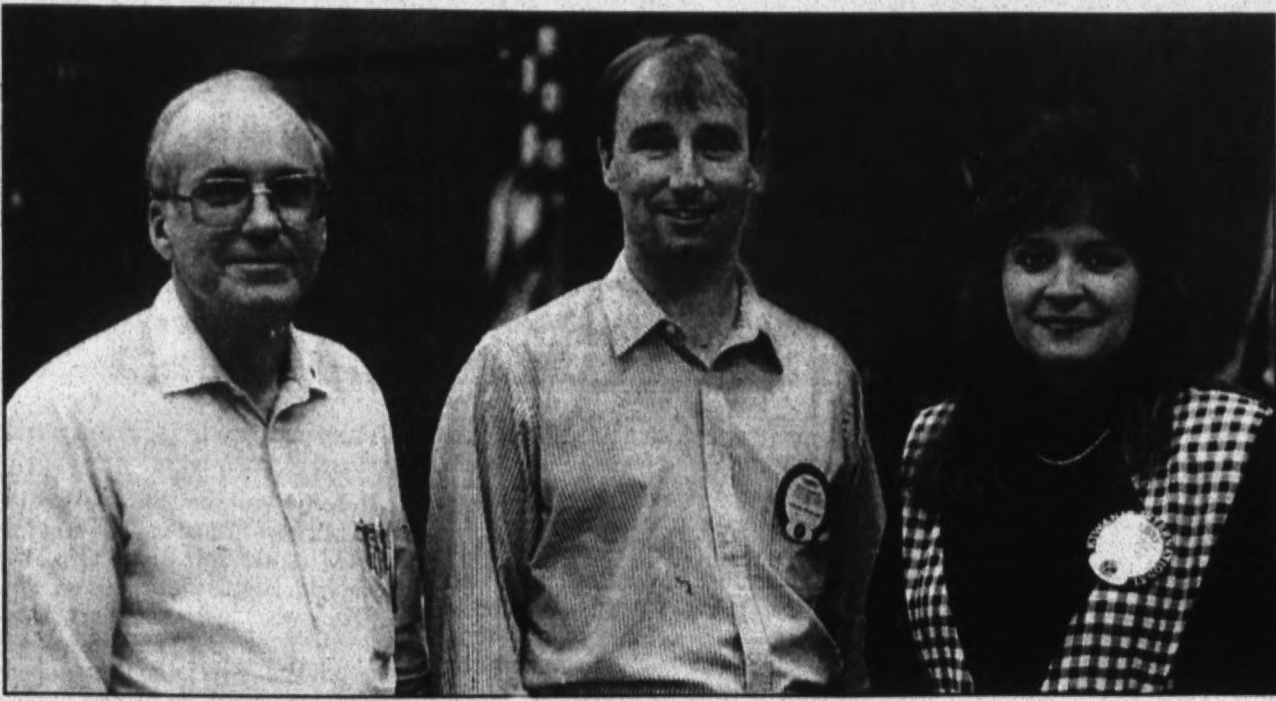
My success, like the success being

experienced by ever-growing numbers of Hispanics all across the country, did not come easy. There were numerous difficult challenges to overcome along the way. In addition, my parents also had to pay a price--sacrificing a comfortable life for themselves in order to see their children succeed.

Today, the opportunities for Hispanics are greater than at any time in the history of this country, for although we have made many advances, Hispanic American representation in most of the prestigious fields and professions is certainly not proportionate to the number of Hispanics in the general population.

On the other hand, the professionals produced by Hispanic communities, along with the ones that have come from their homelands to make their careers in the United States, have achieved a record of outstanding success, working within the most respected hospitals, universities, laboratories, law firms, courtrooms and businesses that this country has to offer.

Barney getting own theme park

NEW YORK (AP) - Barney is getting his own Jurassic Park.

Universal Studios Florida is planning to open "A Day in the Park with Barney" next summer, a 60,000 square foot attraction devoted to the chortling purple dinosaur.

The Barney park will include a 350-seat enclosed theater and an interactive game area, Tom Williams, president and chief operating officer of Universal Studios Florida, told a New York news conference Thursday. He did not disclose the cost of building the park.

Barney and his sidekicks Baby Bop and BJ will make appearances several times daily. Admission to the Barney-area will be included in the regular theme park ticket price.

The project is the latest venture for Barney creator Sheryl Leach and her father-in-law publisher Richard Leach. The pair already is worth \$84 million in combined 1993-94 gross income, according to Forbes Magazine.

Despite outside concerns that overexposure could send Barney the way of his ancestors, both Universal and The Lyons Group, which produces the dino-celebrity, say there's more than enough interest to sustain the attraction.

"I think it's jumping the gun to say he's up," said Jim Hampton, a Universal spokesman. "The merchandising is going well and we think it's a good investment."

Sales of Barney merchandise soared in 1993, but have leveled off in 1994, said Lyons Group spokeswoman Kelly Lane.

"Barney & Friends," debuted on public television in 1992 and quickly became the network's top children's show. The show also is aired in Britain, New Zealand, Australia, Hong Kong, Singapore and South Africa.



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School district gets funds through ads

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) - A cash-strapped school district has sold out, selling ad space on everything from gyms to school buses.

El Paso County's School District 11 is the nation's first to come up with such a plan, using the ad revenue to buy books, lab equipment and other supplies the city can't provide.

"Go for your dreams! Stay in school! - Reilly Buick-GMC Truck" reads an ad inside Palmer High School's gym. Dozens of other signs are plastered on school hallways, including ads from Pepsi and Shoney's Restaurant.

Students at Fremont Elementary School travel in bright yellow buses painted with the round red spots that sell 7-Up. Burger King ads, designed with the help of students, are painted on other district buses.

Another ad, bought by the Public Service Co. of Colorado, features PSC's Louie the Lightning Bug, a cartoon character who advises children to stay away from electrical lines.

Jay Engeln, Palmer's principal, and a handful of school administrators came up with the idea while plotting ways to raise badly needed funds. The district's 1994-95 fiscal budget of \$133 million isn't enough.

The ads first went up in January in all the district's 53 schools. About 50 businesses have bought space.

"We found that one of the things we do have is exposure," Engeln said. "We thought, 'We can start marketing our schools.'"

Teacher salaries have been frozen for three years, and voters have not approved a bond issue or tax increase for the district since 1972. The city was strapped by tight budgets and offered little financial help.

The campaign permits ad space on walls, newsletters, district reports, maps, stadium walls and buses. Businesses can also buy space on warm-up jackets for sports teams but not on their uniforms. So far, no space has been sold for the jackets.

Tracy Cooper, district public relations officer, said the advertising has raised about \$100,000 and the district's share is \$59,000. The ad agency handling the school's account,

O'Donnell and Riley, gets the rest.

The campaign is expected to raise an additional \$200,000 next year, which would meet the district's goal of \$300,000, said Pat Riley, a partner in the agency.


Engeln said only 10 percent of wall space in schools will be used for ads.

"Are we selling out our schools? I don't think so. The hallways are not solid ads from one end to the other," he said.

So far, the district has not received any complaints from students or parents, he said.

"I like them," said Josh Smith, an 18-year-old Palmer senior. "It shows that big corporations are interested in helping schools."

Herd closes season by sawing off 'Horns

The Hereford Whitefaces ended the season with a 27-14 trimming of Caprock Friday night in Amarillo's Dick Bivins Stadium.

While Caprock finished at 1-9 overall and 0-6 in District 1-4A, Hereford pulled its record up to 5-5 overall and 3-3 in district, finishing fourth.

In a hard-luck season, Hereford lost two non-district games by one point each. Then, the Herd lost three district games by a total of 25 points; a key play in each game might have turned the outcome around. Early losses to Randall and Borger, the

district's eventual playoff teams, eliminated the Herd from playoff contention fairly early.

"We played the last two games for absolutely no reason but for the fact that we're the Herd, and we're supposed to win and supposed to play hard—and we did that," coach Danny Haney said.

"We ended up the season with a lot of class," senior quarterback Michael Brown said. "We put a win in like we needed to get to .500. This team deserves better, though. But I really enjoy playing with these guys; they're the best."

Brown threw a touchdown pass to Wade Backus and ran for touchdowns of 50 and 32 yards. Tailback Marquise Brown added a five-yard TD run as part of his 134-yard total, complementing Michael Brown's 106 rushing yards.

That gave the Herd defense all it needed, as it allowed only 15 yards in the first quarter. The rest of Caprock's 243 total yards came with Hereford holding a two-touchdown lead.

Hereford gave up two pass plays of 40-plus yards, each of which set up a Caprock TD, but an interception

in the end zone by Hereford's Michael Marquez just before halftime kept Caprock from ever threatening the Hereford lead.

"I think we let down a few times," senior defensive tackle Shawn Malone said, "but other than a few mistakes we made, we played real good."

"The defense played great in the first quarter," Haney said. "Then all of a sudden, they (Caprock) got us reeling a little bit with misdirection, and we had a hard time stopping them. But we rose up and stopped

them (before) the half with the interception, and it gave us a chance to get a three-touchdown lead with us getting the second half kickoff."

While the Herd defense didn't allow Caprock a first down in the first quarter, Hereford's offense failed in its first chance to score when Caprock's Marcel Dagle intercepted Michael Brown's pass at the Caprock five-yard line.

Caprock went nowhere, though, and Hereford capitalized. Fullback Josh Urbanczyk sparked a 42-yard drive with a 21-yard run, then Michael Brown hit Backus for a 19-yard touchdown pass. The Longhorn covering Backus fell down at the end of the route, and Backus beat two other defenders to the corner of the end zone.

"I just caught the ball," Backus said. "I turned around and saw him lying on the ground, and I ran around him."

Terance High sent the extra point kick barely wide left, so Hereford led 6-0.

Hereford stopped Caprock again, this time with an interception by Martin Martinez. He was 10-15 yards deep by himself in the middle of the field, and Caprock QB Justin Ruiz probably didn't see him. Martinez saw Ruiz all the way.

"I read him, but I thought he was never going to throw it," Martinez said. "I just reached out and caught it."

Two plays later, at the start of the second quarter, Michael Brown ran 32 yards for a touchdown, bowling over one defender at the 3-yard line and beating another to the goal. Brown dove and stretched the ball to the goal line. High's kick gave Hereford a 13-0 lead.

The Longhorns responded with a beautifully set-up screen pass to Dagle that went 41 yards to the Herd

11. After one play, Dagle ran the final two yards for the score.

Hereford put the lead back to 13 when Michael Brown ran 50 yards for another score, this time virtually untouched. High's kick made it 20-7.

"They were just a couple of open backcuts," Brown said, referring to both touchdowns. "Everything developed up, and they (the blockers) kept it open for me. Both tight ends (Scott Parker and Raymond Gonzales) did a good job tonight of blocking the ends."

Caprock launched into a 13-play drive that went all the way to the Hereford three-yard line, where an offside penalty gave Caprock a first down with less than a minute to go before halftime.

After Dagle was stopped for no gain on first down, Caprock went to the air. The ball went to Hereford's Marquez, not a Longhorn. Marquez caught it two yards deep in the end zone, ending the Caprock threat and ending the half.

"I saw the tight end go out so I just followed him," Marquez said. "I looked back at the quarterback, and he was sprinting out. I just saw the ball right there."

Hereford got the ball to start the half and put together a long, time-consuming touchdown drive. It went 75 yards in 13 plays, taking up the first five minutes of the third quarter. Marquise Brown got a key five yards, on fourth-down-and-two at the Caprock 33, then he got the touchdown, running the final five yards.

Caprock wouldn't fold, though. After an exchange of punts, Caprock took over at its own 47-yard line and wasted no time scoring. Jimmy Lopez got loose on a pass from Ruiz and rambled 49 yards to the Hereford one-yard line. Dagle ran for the score on the next play, and Hernandez' kick made it 27-14 with 2:27 left in the third quarter.

Hereford ruined Caprock's comeback with another long drive and a defensive stand. The Herd ate up clock with a 16-play possession, driving to the Caprock 28, but the offense couldn't overcome a holding penalty. Brian Betzen's punt went into the end zone for a touchback.

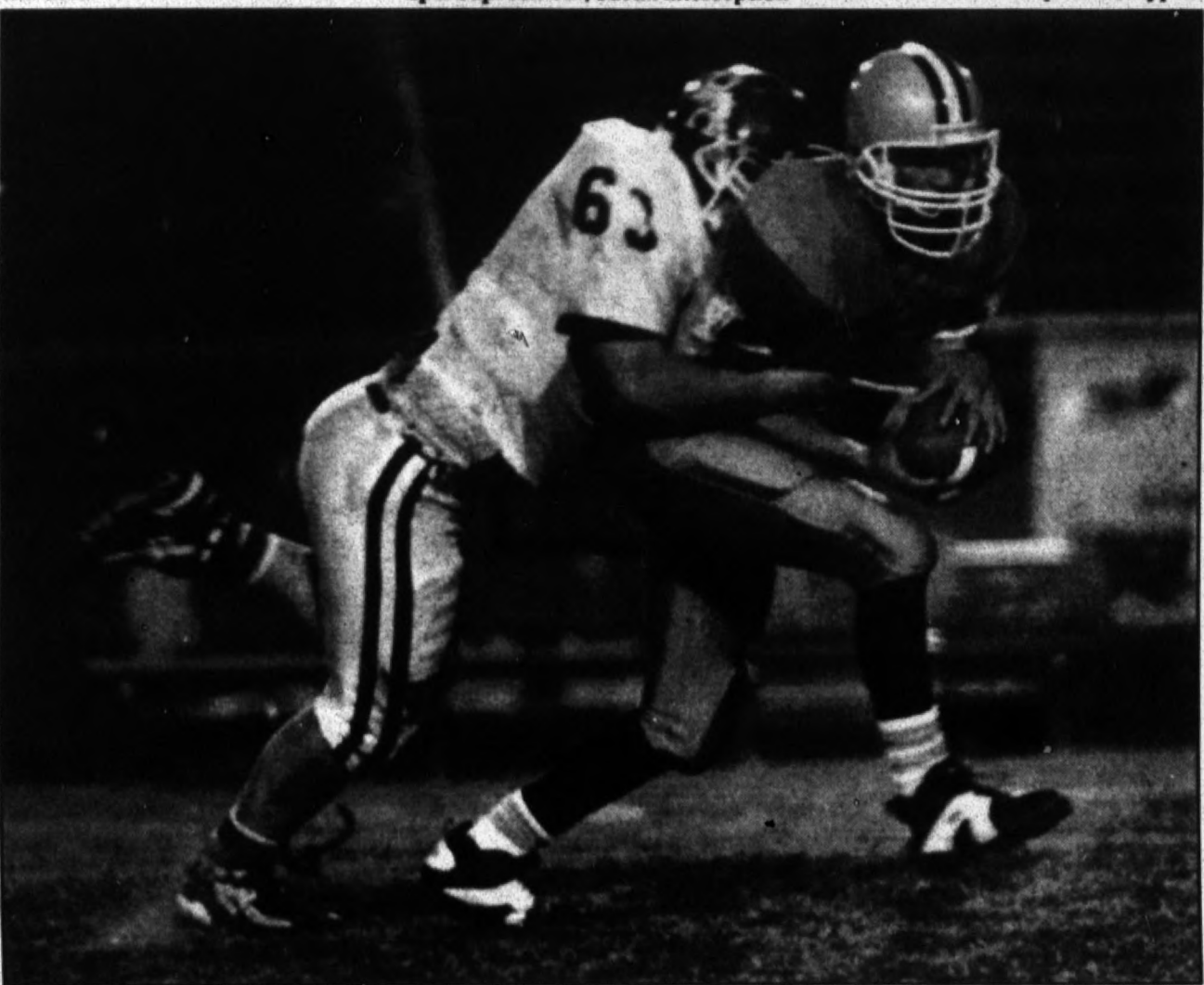
Caprock moved the ball down to the Hereford 39 with runs of 11, 12 and 13 yards, but that was it. A fumbled handoff, recovered by a Longhorn, netted a loss of two yards, then consecutive sacks involving Malone, a senior defensive tackle, moved Caprock back 15 yards. On the first, Malone was assisted by several teammates. The second was a solo job which pushed Caprock back nine yards onto its own side of the field, forcing the 'Horns to punt with 2:51 left.

"I guess the guard didn't do his job," Malone said of how he broke through the line cleanly. "They had leakage, and leakage kills an offense like that."

The game and season ended with senior captain Josh Gamboa moving from offensive lineman to running back. The 275-pounder gained about five yards before the final horn sounded.

"I appreciate all the work the juniors put in, making this season the best they could," Gamboa said. "I appreciate the fans. Even though we knew we weren't getting into the playoffs, they never let down."

"There's no place I'd rather play than Hereford."

Carroll upsets Waxahachie

Southlake Carroll's postseason success continues, even in a down year in a higher class against a much-better opponent.

The Dragons pulled off a huge first-round upset Friday night, defeating Waxahachie 26-23. The second-ranked Indians had reached the Class 4A quarterfinals the last four seasons.

Carroll, the two-time defending 3A champion that struggled into the playoffs at 5-4, advances to play Dallas Spruce in the area round.

"This is the best victory in eight years," Carroll coach Bob Ledbetter said. "We've struggled through so much adversity this year that no one believed in us. This is a testament to the kids' dedication to never give up on themselves."

The first full night of playoff action included several upsets that sent home teams that were ranked in the year's final poll by The Associated Press.

A few undefeated teams got their first loss, meaning the end of their season, and Class 3A's unbeaten Sweeny didn't lose, but had its season end because of a 7-7 tie with Columbus.

Still, of all the results Friday, none compares to the exit made by the

Indians, who finish 9-1 in their first season under coach Thomas Brooks.

Waxahachie had reached the semifinals last year, was the 4A state champ in 1992 and played in the quarterfinals in 1991 and 1990.

Yet it was Carroll that showed the postseason poise Friday night as quarterback Kris Brown threw a 20-yard touchdown pass to freshman Tyson Olivo with 2:53 left for the winning score.

The Indians had one last chance, but Marcus Swift fumbled a third-down pass at the Indians' 30 and Carroll's Derek Sargent recovered to seal the victory.

"We're still the Carroll Dragons," Olivo said. "No matter what level of competition we go at, we will play you."

The Dragons weren't supposed to win this one.

They were even lucky to be in the postseason after ending their state-best, 72-game regular-season winning streak and then being shut out. They suffered another setback when several players were suspended for being at a party where alcohol was served.

But they went 3-2 in district play and earned the right to face Waxahachie. Now they're 1-0 in 4A postseason play.

Elsewhere Friday night:

- Another big 4A game was No. 3 La Marque downing No. 7 Bay City 33-14 in a rare first-round matchup of unbeaten. La Marque avenged playoff losses to Bay City in 1990 and 1991 behind two blocked punts by J.B. Flowers and a season-high 163 yards rushing from Aaron Yarbrough.

Other interesting results found Lampasas upsetting No. 10 Austin LBJ 20-14 and No. 8 Gregory-Portland pounding Pleasanton 70-22.

- In Class 5A Division I, Deer Park bounced back from its first loss of the season to knock previously undefeated Clear Lake out of the postseason 24-7.

Also, always-powerful Odessa Permian slammed Lubbock Coronado 24-0 and defending 5A Division II champion Lewisville beat FW Richland 42-13.

- In 5A Division II, fourth-ranked Humble was upset 13-12 by Galena Park North Shore in the most surprising result of the night.

Two former 4A powers making their mark in 5A brought along their postseason experience and had easy first-round victories as No. 1 Austin Westlake beat San Antonio

Herd basketball teams hope experience pays off this year

Underclassmen scored more than half the points last year for the Hereford boys' and girls' basketball teams.

That's good news for the 1994-95 basketball season, which officially gets underway Tuesday with both teams meeting Brownfield teams at South Plains College in Levelland. The girls play at 6 p.m., the boys at 7:30.

The Hereford boys' team actually had 74 percent of its points from underclassmen, mostly juniors who are now seniors. Three of those averaged in double figures: Benton Buckley (11.1), Michael Brown (10.6), and Cody Marion (10.2). A freshman-now-sophomore, Isaac Walker, was just short of double-figures at 9.6 points per game.

Buckley, a second-team all-district selection, is the only full-time starter returning. The Herd also returns a part-time starter, Ashley Noland, who led the team in charges taken (13) and in assists (2 per game).

The Lady Whitefaces lost leading-scorer Stephanie Wilcox to graduation, but the next four on the scoring list were starters as sophomores who return for their junior years.

Mindi Davis, a second-team all-district pick, averaged 9.3 points and 7.7 rebounds, and she's already in practice. The other three returning starters are still in volleyball: Tarabeth Holmes (6.3 ppg), Heather Hodges (5.9) and Brittney Binder (5.8).

The girls' team will include no seniors and probably three sophomores and three freshmen. The core of the team will be the juniors, who helped the team to double-figures in wins last season (11-17).

"I'm as excited about this one as I was my first year of coaching," said girls coach Eddie Fortenberry, who is starting his second year in Hereford. "This kind of group—the talent we have—that's something you've got to be excited about. They're young and exciting that's all there is too it. They're fun to watch."

"I realize we're still young but we've got a lot of experience because of how much they've played," Fortenberry said. "We've got one year under our belt now, which helps a bunch, and we played a tough schedule (last year) which may help us in the long run."

Boys' coach Randy Dean, also starting his second year in Hereford,

has reason to be excited about his team. The chances for improving on last year's 8-22 mark are good, he said.

"I know we're going to have a better team this year because we've got a lot of experience coming back," Dean said. "I believe these guys are hungry to win, and that's going to show up in the intensity and the effort during games. We should be pretty strong with our guard play, and we have some inside players who are capable."

Buckley is capable of many things, Dean said.

"Benton has the talent to match up and play with anybody from this area," he said. "He's really improved his strength from last year, and it's really added a new dimension to his game. His biggest asset, though, is he can handle the ball and shoot off the dribble."

Just looking at the boys' team, it's difficult to tell who plays where. Buckley, with those dribbling and shooting skills, is 6-foot-3, and Marion, at 6-2, was the team's best three-point shooter last year (51-of-142, 36 percent). When Marion gets on a hot streak, Dean said, "people last year never found a way to cool him off."

Walker, at 5-11, was probably the team's best inside player and led last year in rebounds (5.0 per game).

Noland, who Dean calls a "hard-nosed" defender has the right height for a guard at 5-11, as does Brown, who brings quickness and defensive pressure as well as offensive skills, Dean said.

Walker will play more outside this year, Dean said.

"We'll let him face the basket more, and hopefully he won't have to battle the biggest player from the other team," Dean said.

Michael High (6-foot-3) will move up from the junior varsity to play center.

"We're going to be real uniform in height," Dean said. "We don't have a real big player, but all of them have good size. We're going to range from 5-11 to 6-3. Our size is fine. That's not something I'm concerned with now. Michael and Benton both have 30-inch vertical leaps, which compensates a little bit for size."

The boys' team returns one letterman besides those listed above: Terance High, who averaged three rebounds and three points per game. High and Brown will come over from football, which finished its season Friday. Dean declined to name an opening varsity

roster before getting a good look at the other players coming out of football this week.

Fortenberry has named his opening varsity roster, but with nine out of the 12 still involved in volleyball, it may fluctuate early. The volleyball team was to play Dumas Saturday for a trip to the state tournament.

The girls' varsity roster includes Davis, Holmes, Hodges, Binder and two sophomores who played enough as freshmen to earn letters: Danielle Corneliuss and Kari Barrett. Others set for varsity are juniors Julie Cole and Shay Henderson; sophomore Cassie Abney; and freshmen Katie Betzen, Julie Rampley and Misti Davis (Mindi's sister).

Of those 12, only the two Davis girls and Henderson are not involved in volleyball. Besides Mindi Davis, all the returning letter-winners have been held out of full-time basketball practice. This makes Fortenberry's job a little tougher, but he sees a bright side.

"Our kids know how to win because of volleyball," he said, listing that winning attitude as one of the team's strengths. Other strengths include depth and quickness.

"One of the obvious spots is depth," he said. "We've got a lot more depth that last year. It's young depth but its depth. And we're quicker than last year. Those girls went through a tough off-season in volleyball and in basketball, and it's helped us a bunch."

Mindi Davis, the second-team all-district post, will have to carry more of a load until the volleyball players get into basketball full-time.

"Mindi is a quiet leader," Fortenberry said. "She's not the loud type; she leads by example. She goes 100 percent every time she hits the

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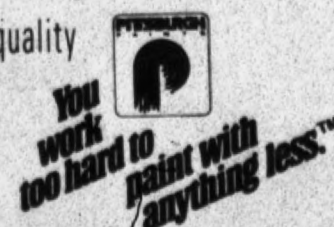

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Water use practices need re-evaluating

Re-evaluation of water use practices may be in order, in light of below-average precipitation in the last three years.

A. Wayne Wyatt, general manager of High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1, said drought conditions have resulted in heavier-than-normal pumpage by both agricultural and urban users in Deaf Smith County.

Usage and light rainfall have contributed to decreases in well yields during pumping season in some parts of the county, Wyatt said.

"It is during times of drought that people stop and wonder if more can be done to achieve maximum water use efficiency," he continued.

The volume of ground water in storage within the Ogallala Aquifer in Deaf Smith County was calculated at 12.20 million acre-feet in 1990.

Net depletion from 1990 to 2000 was expected to be about 1.65 million acre-feet, or 165,000 acre-feet per year, based on previous trends.

However, the drought may cause net depletion greater than previously expected because of extra pumpage and lack of precipitation for aquifer recharge.

The district's Deaf Smith County committee recently concluded that changes in water use practices must be made if residents are to have enough water to continue to maintain a profitable economy.

Recommendations by the committee to the agricultural community include:

-- Efforts are needed to ensure maximum use of every drop of precipitation that falls within the county.

-- Irrigation practices should be re-

evaluated to determine if water losses can be reduced further or eliminated, such as conversion of sprinklers to low energy precision application.

-- Water losses from irrigation tailwater escaping from fields should be eliminated.

-- Producers should consider lower water-use crops.

-- The most profitable crop yield per inch of water pumped, rather than irrigation for maximum yield, should be considered.

-- Recent research in precipitation enhancement should be evaluated.

Urban water use by homeowners, business owners and industries also was addressed by the committee, asking that those entities share in water conservation efforts. Recommendations are:

-- Re-use of waste water by industry

is suggested whenever possible.

-- Low-flow showerheads and lavatory faucets, flow restrictors, low-flush toilets and other conservation fixtures should be installed in homes and schools, as well as apartments.

-- City irrigation systems should be designed for maximum efficiency.

-- Landscaping with drought tolerant, native vegetation is recommended whenever possible.

Representatives of the 15 county committees in the water district will meet in January to seek a plan of action to maximize water use efficiency.

Wyatt pointed out that a survey in 1993 showed 452 center pivot irrigation systems in operation, estimated at 35.1 percent of the county. He said that Deaf Smith County still may look for new opportunities to conserve water, in both urban and agricultural settings.

Youth planning to enter swine in shows this winter are encouraged to attend a showmanship clinic Tuesday, beginning at 6 p.m., at the Little Bull Barn.

Participants need not bring their own animals to the clinic, said Vance Christie, Deaf Smith County agent.

"We will have pigs available for the youth to work with," said Christie. Topics to be covered during the clinic include selection, feeding, grooming and showing techniques.

Last chance to plan burn is Dec. 30

A deadline of Dec. 30 has been set for plans for prescribed burning on agricultural lands to be submitted to the Tierra Blanca Soil and Water Conservation District.

Since most prescribed burns are scheduled in late February or March, depending on weather and soil moisture conditions, the request should be made as soon as possible.

Producers who feel a burn is needed to revive or stimulate growth may file a request for the burn. A burn will not be permitted for weed control.

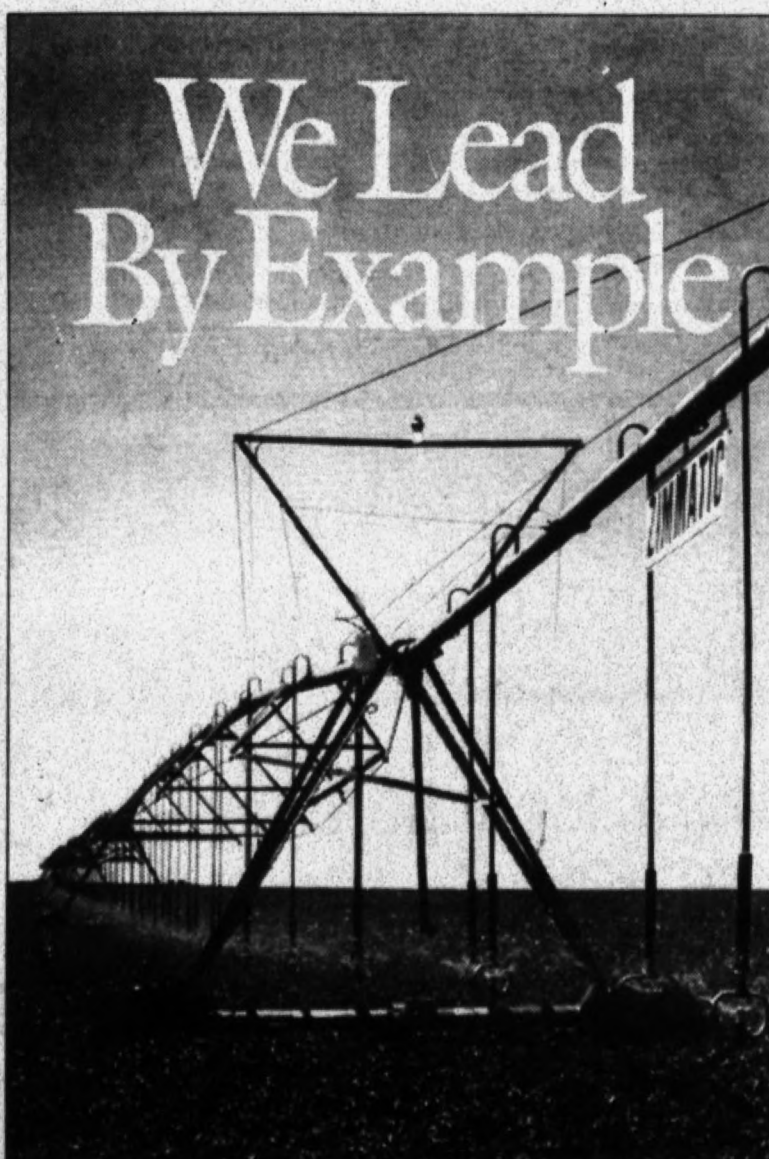
Unauthorized burns that damage grass stands could result in penalties.

Officials also remind that a burn plan does not reduce responsibility for adjacent land or property damage.

Landowners also are reminded that fire departments will not fight CRP grass fires unless lives or property are at risk.

Firebreaks may be plowed or bladed on CRP land, only after contacting the SCS office or the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office.

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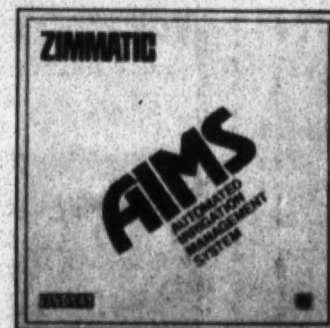


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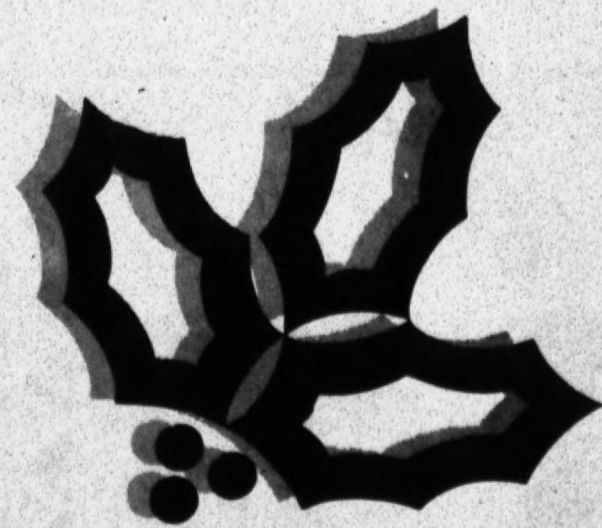

One candidate stayed home. Another asked to be fired. One hit the End of the Road, literally. Who won and who lost are now a matter of record. But in bidding a not-so-fond farewell to it all, here - for better or worse - are the awards for some of the best and worst moments of Campaign '94:

WORST SHOT

George W. Bush.
The Republican gubernatorial candidate opened dove season the traditional way - shotgun in hand. Unfortunately, he downed a killdeer instead of a dove and had to pay a \$130 fine.

FASTEST RETURN FIRE

Texas Democratic Party spokesman Joe Cutbirth.
On Bush's errand shot, Cutbirth quickly quipped: "George W. Bush has been missing his target all year."

BEST SHOT AT SELF

Bush.
"It's a good thing it wasn't deer season," he said. "I'd probably have shot a cow."

MOST CELEBRITIES

Gov. Ann Richards.
The number of well-known names helping her was almost too big to

count, but it included singers Willie Nelson, Don Henley, Bonnie Raitt and Waylon Jennings; actresses Marlo Thomas, Donahue, Rosie O'Donnell and Ann Archer; comedian Robin Williams; former Houston Oilers coach Bum Phillips; filmmaker Steven Spielberg; writer Gloria Steinem, and TV commentator Linda Ellerbee.

MOST UNUSUAL PROMISE

Democratic State Treasurer Martha Whitehead.

The senator offered to give up her place in the back seat for the bodyguard, but Kissinger declined. "If I get assassinated in El Paso, it will be destiny," he told the El Paso Times.
MOST LAID-DOWN TACTIC
Democratic Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock.
After undergoing heart bypass surgery, Bullock said he would follow doctor's orders and stay home, paying no attention to Republican challenger Tex Lezar. "I am hereby officially ignoring my opponent for the rest of the campaign," Bullock said. "No joint appearances, no debates, no nothing."

MOST SINISTER NAME-CALLING

Lezar.
Responding to Bullock's stay-home strategy, Lezar said: "Bob Bullock is the vampire of Texas politics who goes up on the airwaves at night and hides heaven knows where during the day."

Dallas billionaire H. Ross Perot.
While Perot endorsed, and campaigned for, Gov. Richards, the United We Stand America group he created polled members and found more favoring Bush.

In a letter supporting Richards, Perot wrote: "Never forget, the state of Texas is big business - not a sport." Two paragraphs later, he said, "Drive one out of the park for Texas - vote for a proven all-star player."

LEAST-FOLLOWED ENDORSEMENT

Perot, again.
At Bryce's Cafeteria in Texarkana, Richards stood in the lunch line with hometown boy Perot. Although she wanted Texans to follow his lead in choosing a governor, Richards wouldn't make Ross boss in choosing dessert. Perot endorsed pecan pie. Richards picked coconut.

MOST EX-ed OUT ENDORSEMENT

GOP Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry.
Challenged by Democratic farmer Marvin Gregory, Perry issued a news release announcing "Gregory Endorses

Perry." The endorsement was from Betty Gregory, Marvin's ex-wife.

MOST CROSSED PATH

Democratic Land Commissioner Garry Mauro.
Mauro arrived at the Lubbock airport Oct. 28 only to walk past a news conference by three Republicans out campaigning for his GOP opponent, Marta Greytok. "This is a really silly season," Mauro said.

WORST OPPOSITION RESEARCH

Greytok.
Greytok aide Tipton Ross suggested to a reporter that Mauro might not have reached the rank of Eagle Scout. Wrong. Mauro had the best defense - truth and Mom. His mother, Lou Mauro Stauch, produced newspaper clippings complete with photos from the March 20, 1962

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Extension News

Money in the family is a little different from money in a business because it involves emotional assets. Families involved in a study about the money stressors they manage indicated their most stressful areas, in order of priority were about:

- retirement funds
- keeping up with inflation
- devising a budget
- agreeing on scaling down expenses
- keeping to a budget
- need for savings
- credit cards
- college spending.

For single mothers, their greatest stress is insufficient money to meet daily needs. Second jobs create concern about less time with children. Emergencies usually force them to take loans, while fearing inability to meet loan commitments on survival income. However, while there's less money to spend, single parents have fewer hassles over how to spend it and feel freer to make money decisions.

According to Delores Curran's research on stress management by healthy families, healthy families talk about money. They do not link self-

esteem to earning power. They develop money management skills and teach their children about money. Here are some of the stress managers that work for some families:

*Coping with economic change by scaling down rather than adding extra jobs.

*Having a joint checking account, with both balancing the account, but not necessarily together.

*Having no set pattern on children's monies, but a variety of patterns for different ages and circumstances.

*Expecting children to help somewhat with college monies, usually for personal expenses and book.

*Viewing money as a temporary rather than an ongoing stress.

*Being satisfied with the family's present lifestyles.

*Enjoying family life and each other in spite of normal financial stresses.

*Accepting of financial limitations and hopeful that they will be temporary.

*Not deferring present happiness in family life until money pressures disappear.

available. When he asked about hospitals, she said, "There's one in Bullhead City across the river." He then asked for the phone number. She replied, "You'll have to call Arizona information."

My husband, by that time thoroughly disgusted, put me in the car, and we finally found the hospital. Fortunately, my problem wasn't fatal. Ann, please print this, and tell Laughlin to wake up and smell the coffee.

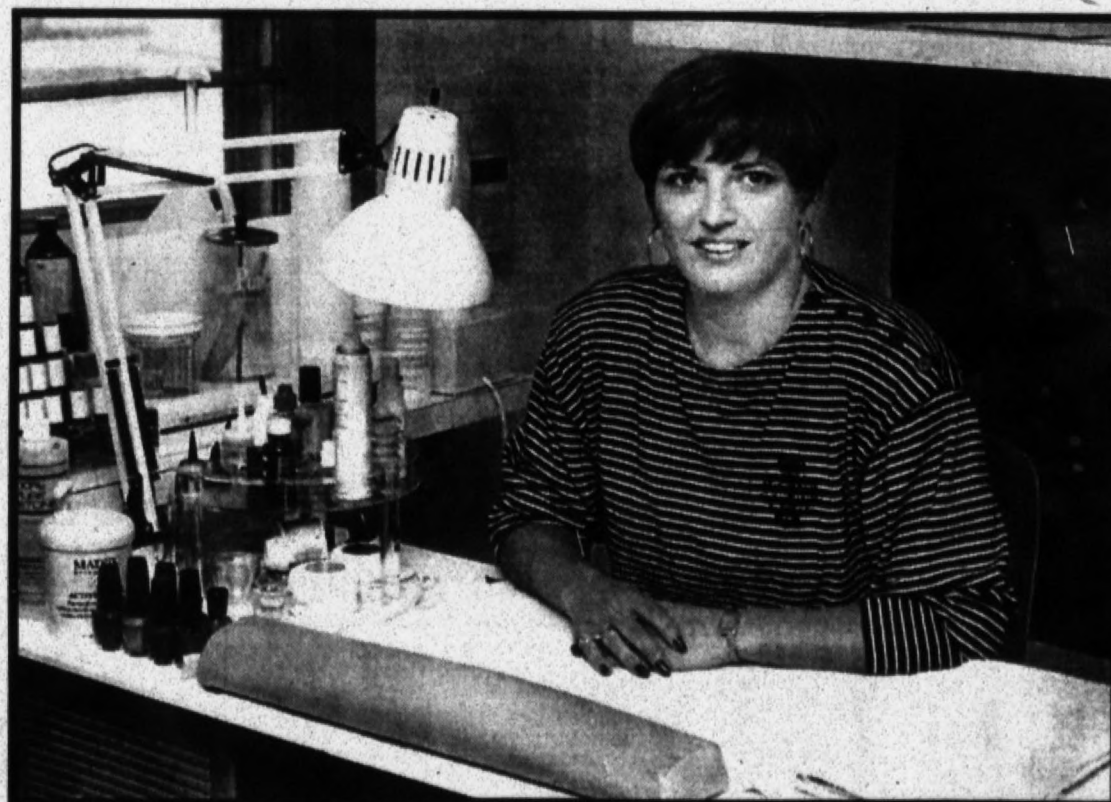

MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

KEEPING YOUR SHARE

Recently, I received a telephone call from an anxious business owner. Two megastore competitors had come to this town a year ago. Now his sales are down nearly 10 percent. "I know I can't put them out of business," he said, "but I do want to keep my share."

When the mega competitors come town on any independent business owners begin to worry about losing market share. And well they should. Most segments of retail and service industries are becoming crowded. We are approaching a condition of being "over stored" and "over serviced."

For independent businesses the game begins with holding on

to your market share. Later, you'll need to grow your business, and to do that you must stay aggressive in taking business away from others. However, before you worry too much about becoming aggressive, you better check your defense.

Are you well protected from attack? Or, do you have weaknesses that make you an easy target? If a power retailer or category killer moved into your trade area, could you keep your market share? Or, would your sales take a dip and your business be at risk?

Saving your slice

We often refer to an entire business market as a pie. Every business in your market has a slice of the pie. If the pie isn't growing, someone - megastore, category killer or aggressive independent - is trying to take some of your slice. Here are some tips on saving your slice.

• **Never relax.** You must expect aggressive competition. Even if you're having your best year ever, don't ease up. The papers chronicle business failures every day. Don't relax and become one of them.

Just as athletes train to stay in shape, business owners must work to maintain a sharp cutting edge. Monitor all critical business activities. Maintain your level of quality. Watch your costs, even small ones.

• **Never take your customers for granted.** Help all employees understand the importance of customers to your business success. You don't own any customer. You must earn their loyalty. Every day, with every transaction, you must prove your value. The quality or service award you won last year won't keep any customers this year if you rest on your laurels.

You keep customers by the value you provide to them. Whether you sell quality products at fair prices, or ideas, information and knowl-

edge, you must earn the privilege of doing business with your customers everyday.

• **Remember, everyone lives by selling something.** Regardless of the product or service you provide, sell yourself first. We've said it before, but we'll say it again: All business is personal. People prefer to do business with people, not companies.

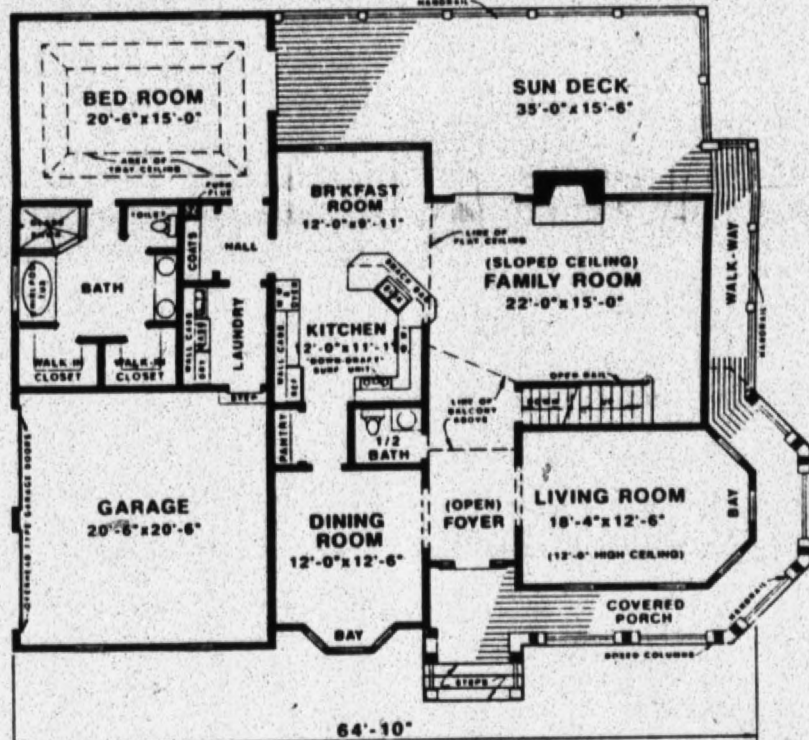

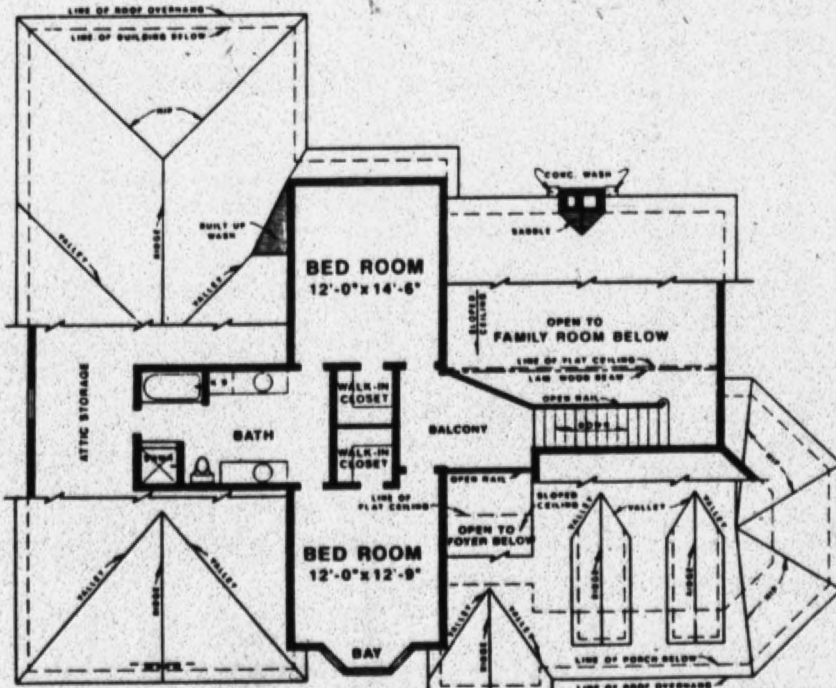

Q: Can you tell me how to care for my sump pump? Every winter, I have to call a repair man after the first rain to get it started. What is the standard procedure to keep these things in good running condition?

A: Normally, a sump pump does not require any maintenance. Certainly not yearly maintenance. In all probability, the pump's intake port is sucking in dirt from the sump pit, and this is clogging the pump. The pit should have a liner which prevents the earthen walls of the pit from

eroding and depositing silt and tiny pebbles at the base. The pump should also be positioned so that the intake port is not at the base of the pit. Some sump pump manufacturers also make screens or filter boxes that can be installed in front of the pump's intake. Check with the manufacturer of your pump. You can also make one yourself by using an insect screen. However, you should periodically check the screen to make sure it is not clogged.

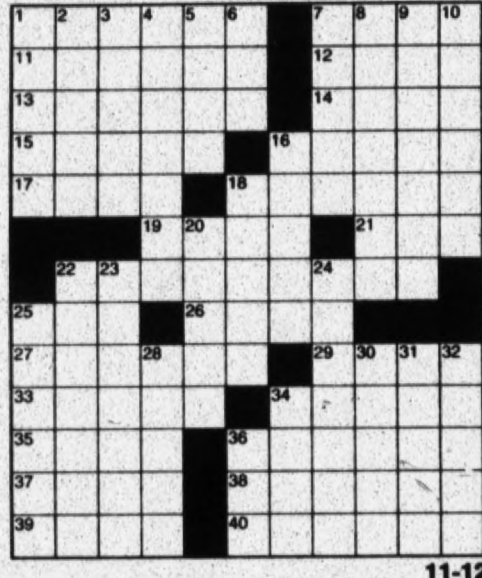

Whalley-Kilmer successfully portrays grown-up Scarlett



Joanne Whalley-Kilmer stars as Scarlett O'Hara and Timothy Dalton portrays Rhett Butler in *Scarlett*, the long-awaited sequel to *Gone With the Wind*. The movie premieres Sunday on CBS. Parts 2 through 4 air Tuesday through Thursday.

It's been more than 50 years and it's about time Scarlett O'Hara grew up.

That's what executive producer Robert Halmi Sr. must have been thinking when he decided to revive the famous Southern belle in *Scarlett*, premiering Sunday, Nov. 13, on CBS.

This four-part miniseries (Parts 2 through 4 air Tuesday, Nov. 15, through Thursday, Nov. 17) is based on Alexandra Ripley's novel of the same name. It picks up where *Gone With the Wind* left off in the soap opera life of Scarlett.

Joanne Whalley-Kilmer effectively portrays the strong-willed and feisty O'Hara woman that Vivien Leigh first portrayed in the 1939 classic.

"Well, I think it definitely is daunting," Whalley-Kilmer says. "And, you know, we had a lot of baggage that came with this one, and some big shoes to fill, as it were."

The story is not a remake of Margaret Mitchell's *Gone With the Wind*, but rather a continuation of it, with Timothy Dalton as Rhett Butler.

When Scarlett finds herself with no Rhett, no home and no friends, she slowly rebuilds her life, at the same time growing stronger and more understanding of others.

Leigh brought the young Scarlett to life, bringing out her forcefulness, her stubbornness and her selfishness.

But, unlike *Gone With the Wind*, the sequel depicts a more mature Scarlett who has had many obstacles to overcome. According to Halmi, Leigh was a perfect young Scarlett, but he had a different type of actress in mind for the sequel.

"What I wanted to do is find my vision of Scarlett, and find a lady and an actor who is the Scarlett as written, which has nothing to do with the *Gone*

With the Wind Scarlett," Halmi comments.

"This is a different lady, with different character," he continues, "And I needed a grown-up Scarlett, not a little girl who does this and that stuff."

When Whalley-Kilmer dove into this role, it was with the intention that she would not re-create the character that Leigh had created. She would evolve the character from that performance, just as Scarlett evolved from her disasters and mistakes.

"It was - you know, we're taking the story somewhere else and developing the characters," she says. "We're not doing a copy of anything."

Whalley-Kilmer successfully brings a new side to this famous belle as Scarlett slowly picks up the pieces and attempts to begin a new life.

"She grows up," Whalley-Kilmer comments. "She doesn't lose her drive and her power and the admirable side of her nature. But she does become kinder and more compassionate, which is only a good thing and it makes her a better person."

As she grows, Scarlett meets new people and creates a new world for herself.

Even though she becomes more compassionate and takes others into consideration, she continues to have the will power and stubborn drive needed to achieve her goals.

"One thing I love about her is that she's not shy of the truth," Whalley-Kilmer says. "So all the horrors that we, you know, recognize in her nature, she can face them, too."

"And she does that. And she accepts them and learns about them. So I think that most of her qualities are not exactly admirable, but they're things that we often wish we could get away with."

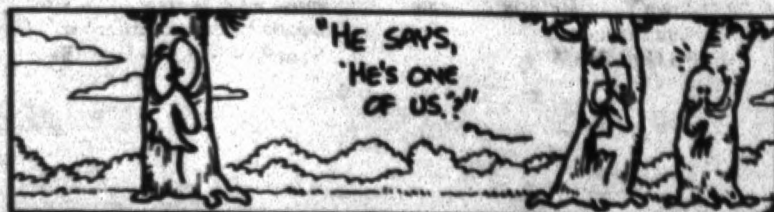

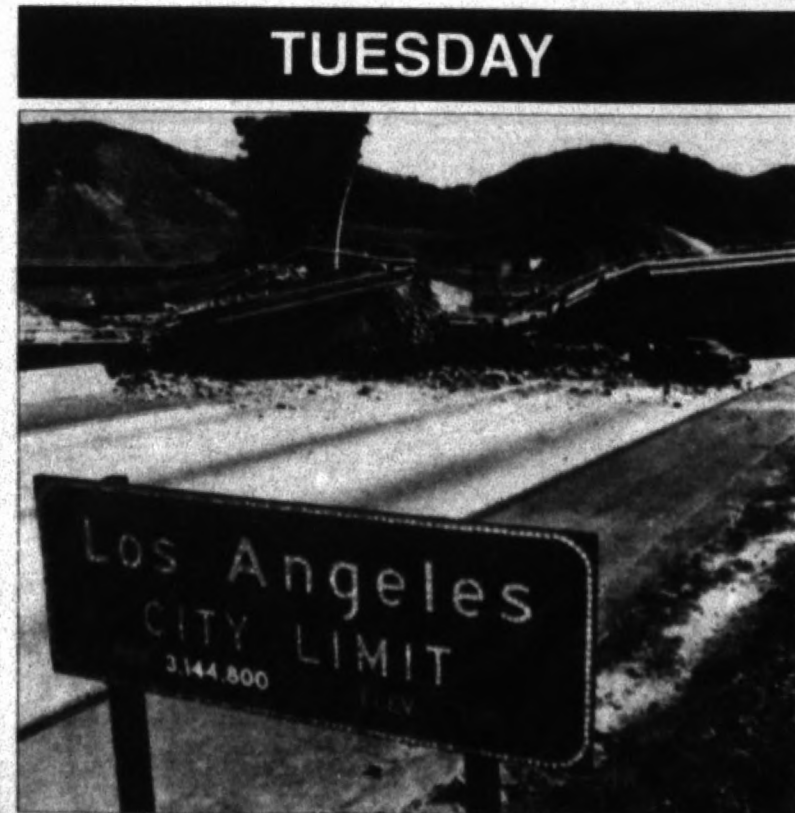

HOME BIJOU

Dennis Quaid's mesmerizing Doc Holliday salvages the Costner-Kasdan epic *Wyatt Earp*

Last year Kevin Costner branched out with his portrayal of a charming sociopath in *A Perfect World* and earned praise for the effort.

But Costner clearly wants to be the good guy, an ill-advised obsession that fueled the interesting but overlong *Dances With Wolves* and led to his laughable turn in the numbing *Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves*.

Now, his ambitions have gotten the best of him again in Lawrence Kasdan's *Wyatt Earp*, a bloated piece that would collapse under its own pretension were it not for the wonderfully watchable turn by Dennis Quaid as the ailing, irascible Doc Holliday.

Scholars can debate the historical accuracy of Kasdan's film, but Wyatt Earp as presented here (and "presented" is the right word, given the flat, still-photograph quality of Costner's unengaging performance) is not a hero. His obsession with family, his distrust of nearly everyone, his abysmal sink into drink and despair after

the death of his wife and his violent, tyrannical demeanor as a lawman do not add up to a character easily embraced. When the wives of the other Earp brothers angrily declare that Wyatt is leading them all to ruin, viewers will likely be inclined to agree. That Wyatt alone manages to live to a ripe old age is perhaps not so much a triumph as a cruel irony.

Ah, but Quaid. Commercially, he's not had a hit since *The Big Easy* and *Everybody's All-American*, and a number of his recent turns have been artistic, as well as box office, mistakes (though last year's underrated *Flesh & Bone* is a real gem.) It may well be that Quaid's days as a picture-carrying leading man are behind him.

Yet the Texas-born actor's artistic salad days are still ahead, if his rich character work in *Wyatt Earp* is any indication. In each of his flavorful scenes, he handily, and single-handedly, supplies the energy and humor sorely lacking from the rest of Kasdan and Costner's tedious, windy film.
