## Residents warned to be aware of overhead danger

Ball fields are filling up; yard work is in full force; the skies are full of severe weather. All are signs of spring.

With the increase of outdoor activities that comes with spring, Southwestern Public Service Company reminds its customers to "watch up for safety."

One of the places where electrical accidents can occur is the farm, according to Bill Mullins, SPS Southern Division Safety and Claims Specialist. "Quite often people forget to look up when they're lifting irrigation pipes, antennas or other metal objects," he said. "It's important to always 'watch up' and know where the electric lines are."

Mullins said that same warning applies to others on the job, particularly those who are working above street level. "Roofers need to be extra careful as they move equipment," he said. "Those trimming trees also have to be careful; that

extra height could be just enough to bring them in contact with electrical lines." In fact, Mullins said, federal and state safety regulations require the electric company to be notified if contractors work near electric lines.

Customers also need to be careful during the severe weather that often occurs in

"If an outage occurs at your home during a storm," said Mullins, "call your local SPS 'repair' or 'service' number listed in the phone book. SPS has employees who are trained and equipped to correct the problem and restore service."

If you see a fallen power line on the ground, call SPS and keep people away from the line. Do not touch the line or anything it is touching, such as a car or fence, Mullins said. "Assume every line is 'live' and dangerous," he said.


Parents should take the time to teach their children to avoid electrical facilities when playing outdoors. Fly kites and model airplanes in open areas, far from power lines.

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
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

## Inheriting the family farm



The latest statistics show that less than 2% of the population is directly invovled in production agriculture. It is a function of an increasing overall population and a limited amount of farm ground. Technology is able to keep up, so that less bodies are required to produce an ever increasing cernucopia of food and fiber.

But on a personal level the story isn't quite so simple.

Tom was raised on a dairy farm in the Great lakes region; 300 cows, 900 acres. His granfather established the farm and passed it down to Tom's father.

Tom's childhood memories are of work. By the time his mother came in to wake him and his two brothers for school, she and dad had already finished the morning milking. By nine years of age he was already part of the family farm. Until he was old enough to milk he pushed cows to the barn, fed calves, forked silage and did whatever kids do, which was plenty.

High school activities like

dances, meetings, sports and girls hinged around milking time and chores. He didn't need to work at McDonalds during summer vacation. If he wanted work there was plenty at home. He went to college. His two brothers left to work elsewhere. Now Tom is 33, married with kids and has a good job at the local Coop. Dad has been using hired labor since the boys left, but Dad is getting older. Tom makes his daily rounds,


dees his job and is active in the community. But hovering over everything he does is that niggling feeling that maybe he should go back to the farm. Afterall, it is a showplace.

The result of uncountable man hours and love and sweat poured into it by two generations preceeding him. It made him the good man that he is. And he could run it well if he chose to. Guilt rides hime like calling. the winter fog off Lake Michigan.

In my opinion Tom need not feel guilty. Nor should his parents place that onus upon the shoulders of their inheritors. Each person has their own

But I would suggest that there are many with no inheritance who would leap at the chance to own a farm. Immigrants, hired men, college grads, feed salesman and pen-

## Workshops to aid women in farm, ranch finances

COLLEGE STATION — Women who find themselves somewhat unprepared to operate ranches and farms that they have inherited from husbands or other family members may find some assistance from seminars scheduled around the state in June.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is sponsoring four, two-day workshops to help women explore income-generating and tax-saving opportunities for their farms and ranches.

The workshops will be held June 12-13 at the Holiday Inn. Northwest Loop, San Antonio; June 15-16, at the Sheraton Inn, Lubbock; June 19-20 at the Sheraton Inn, Tyler; and June 22-23 at University Center, Texas A& M University, College Station.

The first day of the seminar will focus on minerals on the property, according to Dr. Wayne Hayenga, Extension Service economist and attorney. Suggestions on working in new leases, as well as taxsaving hints will be given.

A special session on farm

and ranch leases will address the legal and economic items to be included in a lease. A method to develop a fair and stress-free lease will be explored, as well as suggested guidelines and standards to use in evaluating tenants.

The advantages of running a business as a corporation or partnership—from an income tax and estate-planning point of view — will be discussed. Making estate administration easier will also be addressed.

The registration fee includes all seminar materials and lunches for both days. Further information is available from local county Extension agents, or from Hayenga or Carol Sabo at the department of agricultural economics, Texas A&M University, College Station, TX 77843-2124, telephone (409) 845-2226.

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





One of your citizens brought me a copy of the Journal's edition of May 4th. In it I noticed that Chief Dominguez stated that the Muleshoe Police Department never made application to the South Plains Criminal Investigators Association as an agency, I enclose the following copied portions of the 1995 S.P.C.I.A directory.

NOTE: The directory is classified as confidential, all other member names are blacked out for that reason.



WesTex RC&D was formed in 1992 as a way to help rural communities and counties improve their quality of life, promote economic development, provide avenues for marketing agricultural products produced on the South Plains, encourage training programs to improve job skills as well as conserve all natural resources on the South Plains.

The WesTex Resource Conservation and Development Area Inc. was officially

funded by USDA on February 17, 1994. At that time USDA approved their non-profit status and provided funding for office staff and a full time coordinator.

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## **Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures**

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

· the value placed on your property

· any exemptions that may apply to you

• the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal the taxable status of your property

the local governments which should be taxing your

 any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

### Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. Hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 104 E. Ave. C, Muleshoe, TX.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

### **Review by the District Court**

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Division at P.O. Box 13528, Austin, Texas 78711-3528.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB\*

### **Usual Deadline**

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraises value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

### Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), he deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

\* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.


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

You hear the state lottery jackpot has been raised to \$10 million dollars. You've got lotto fever. The next thing you know, there's a brochure in your main urging you to participate in a lottery in Canada or other foreign country, via convenient mail-order purchase or through a share in a pool of foreign lottery tickets.

The soliciting company promises unbelievable odds and high winnings. Before you send in your money - listen to the facts. Purchasing foreign lotteries are illegal. U.S. law prohibits mailing payments to purchase any ticket, share or chance in a foreign lottery.

Most of these lottery solicitations come from fraudulent companies that seek exorbitant fees from those wishing to play. If you receive a mailed lottery solicitation that you think may be illegal, give your Better Business Bureau (BBB) a call at 763-0459 and turn the entire mail piece over to the local postmaster. Remember, if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

NOTICE OF RATE CHANGE REQUEST RELATING TO IRRIGATION INTERRUPTION CREDIT AND RECOVERY OF POWER COSTS

Notice is hereby given that Lamb County Electric Cooperative, Inc. (the "Utility") intends to change rates for electric utility service by implementing an irrigation interruption credit applicable to irrigation customers who agree by contract that their service may be interrupted and by revising the Utility's power cost recovery factor ("PCRF"), effective May 8, 1995 or as soon thereafter as may be permitted by law. The proposed changes are not expected to have any effect on the revenues of the Utility. The changes are applicable to all electric utility services, all areas served by the Utility, all customer classes, and all customers.

Copies of the proposed revised tariffs, schedules, and supporting testimony and other pertinent data may be inspected in the office of the Utility located at 2415 South Phelps Avenue, Littlefield, Texas 79339, and at the office of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Austin, Texas 78757. Inquiries should be directed to Mr. Delbert Smith, (806) 385-5191.

The Utility's wholesale power supplier currently allows a credit on the Utility's wholesale power bills in exchange for the ability to interrupt a portion of the Utility's irrigation load. The Utility's existing retail rates, which were established before the wholesale interruption credit became available, apply the interruption credit to all customers of the Utility regardless of whether such customers have agreed that their service may be interrupted. This occurs because the Utility's wholesale power supplier and the reduced level of power cost is flowed through to all consumers through the PCKF.

The rate revisions are proposed for the purposes of: (1) establishing a tariff authorizing payment of an interruptible credit to irrigators who agree by contract to allow their service to be interrupted, and (2) allocating the irrigation interruption credit received from the Utility's wholesale power supplier to the irrigation customers who have agreed to allow interruption of their load in the event the Utility's wholesale power supplier. The proposed changes will not increase or decrease the revenues of the Utility, however, the proposed changes are expected to increase the revenues derived from all customer classes other than irrigation and industrial (Plains Cotton Cooperative Assn).

Persons who wish to intervene in or comment upon these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible, as an intervention deadline will be imposed. A request to intervene or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Austin, Texas 78757. Further information may also be obtained by calling the Public Utility Commission's Public Information Office at (512) 458-0256, or (512) 458-0221 for text telephone. The deadline for intervention in the proceeding is May 18, 1995.
