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### Young Homemakers Slate Blood Drive

Blood saves lives! And on Tuesday, January 16, from 4-7 p.m., the Muleshoe Young Homemakers will conduct a blood drive at the Muleshoe City Hall in the council meeting room. Blood will be collected by the South Plains Blood Service of Lubbock, who distribute blood to 38 hospitals in West Texas and Eastern New Mexico, including the local hospital.

It was reported that the blood requirements have exceeded 100 pints per working day to service the hospitals and has increased from 70 per working day in September of 1978. In 1977, the daily requirements for blood and components were 63 units per working day.

Reasons given for the increase were an increase in the number of Open Heart surgeries performed at Methodist and St. Mary's of the Plains Hospitals.

South Plains Blood Service said there is an average of 12-14 open heart surgeries per week, each requiring six pints of blood per surgery.

Other increases are increases in medical procedures requiring blood and its components. An upcoming increase will be used for the kidney transplants, with the first scheduled early this year. Each kidney transplant surgery will require four pints of blood.

also, opening of the New Health Sciences Center Hospital has increased the usage, along with an increased population in the 120 mile radius serviced by

South Plains Blood Service.

### More Officers Add More Miles To Patrol Cars

All types of driving records fell as the Muleshoe City Police logged a total of 80,742 miles driving in 1978, compared to 60,708 during 1977. In the month of December, 1978, officers drove 7,777 miles, compared to 5,042 during December, 1977.

Muleshoe City Police Chief Johnny Richards attributed this to the addition of new officers and a 'beefed-up' patrol of the business and residential sections during nighttime hours.

Also, records were broken in schooling, with the Chief sending officers to different schools, and his attempt to keep his officers current on new law enforcement technology.

Officers responded to 124 complaints compared to 98 during the same month of 1977. This was a total of 1,599, down by eight from the 1,607 calls answered last year.

Accidents for the year were down by 10, with 130 accidents checked by city police in 1978, compared to 140 during 1977. The icy weather was expected to have contributed to the increase in accidents in December of this year, with 21 checked, compared to nine in December, 1977.

### Six Muleshoe Mules All-South Plains

Football time is not quite over. Last week, the All-South Plains football team for AA was announced, and Muleshoe placed the most players, with six Mules named to the team. Mike Northcutt, a 170 pound senior, was named as quarterback; Jeep Shanks, a 165 lb. senior, was chosen as one of the three running backs; and Dicky Sudduth, a senior and weighing 165 pounds, was named one of the two ends.

The other offensive player was Doug Cowan, a 165 pound junior, was named linebacker and Charles Briscoe, a 165 lb. senior, was named defensive back.

Brent Burrows, a 170 pound senior, was named defensive back on the honorable mention team. Mike Northcutt, who was one of the four underclassmen chosen to the team, gained 1,253 total offensive yards, with 779 of these being in ground gain. He threw for 474 yards and seven touchdowns, and ran for nine touchdowns.

Jeep Shanks gained 1,123 yards running and scored 11 touchdowns. Dickey Sudduth was honored for his ability to catch the ball, as he latched onto 10 of Mike's 34 completed passes and 152 yards and scored five of the Mule's touchdowns.

Cowan was praised as being an outstanding center, and both Whalin and Briscoe were honored for their actions on the defensive team.

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### Soil Fertility Meet Slated Next Week

On Monday, January 22, at 7:30 p.m., the seventh annual Bailey County Soil Fertility meeting is scheduled at the Bailey County Civic Center and Coliseum.

Bailey County Extension Agent Spencer Tanksley said he would like to encourage all agriculture producers and agri-businessmen to attend the meeting which will be conducted without charge and open to the public.

Four speakers will bring latest information and technology to the area.

Ken Wolf, farm economist from the Texas Agriculture Extension Service at College Station will speak on "Farm Labor Management". He will give information on handling farm labor personnel which will benefit both the farmer and agri-businessman.

"Marketing Outlook" will be presented by Dr. Carl Anderson, state cotton marketing specialist.

He will present the outlook for the markets for both cotton and grain sorghum. Dr. James Supek, area cotton specialist from Lubbock, will talk on "Cotton Hybrids". He will speak on the hybrids which could be on the market by 1981. Most farmers are familiar with grain sorghum and corn hybrids,

The Bailey County Civic Center and Coliseum will be the site of the annual Bailey County Junior Livestock Show on January

24-26. Between 2 - 6 p.m. on January 26, animals will be checked in at the coliseum with lamb judging scheduled to begin at 6 p.m. This will be immediately followed by the cattle judging.

Bailey County Agent Spencer Tanksley said this time has been scheduled in order to give as much time to the general public as possible, so more people can attend in the nice, new, warm facility with adequate seating. He also reminded there will be adequate parking on the coliseum parking lot.

At 8:30 a.m. on Friday, swine judging will begin, with the gilts to be judged first, followed by barrow judging.

Tanksley said, "The Livestock Show Board has put in a tremendous amount of extra time to improve the operation of the show and are proud of the facilities and the show to be made available to the public.

"They have purchased new pens for holding the animals and keep them for the show, and I would like to encourage any contribution or donation of extra finances which have been

spent for additional equipment for the show."


### Two Directors To Be Elected This Month





All blood is taken on a voluntary basis only and there is no monetary value for the blood donation given. The minimum age to give blood is 17 and the maximum is 65. At least eight weeks are required between donations. Persons who may not donate blood include persons who have or have had

Hepatitis, active disease of the heart, lung, kidney, liver, stomach, internal malignancy (cancer), diabetes requiring medication, addition to injectable drugs or epilepsy, convulsions, or frequent fainting spells. Potential donors may also be deferred if you have or have had: Acute symptomatic flu, cold or upper respiratory infection; close contact with hepatitis within the last six months; ears pierced or disease presently

requiring medication; vaccinations in last 24 hours, with some vaccinations having longer deferral periods; major surgery or blood transfusion in last six months; dental surgery in last three days; pregnancy in last six weeks; currently active allergies or traveled to malaria area in last six months. South Plains Blood Services suggest that it is best to eat a substantial meal before donating, preferably one low in fats. Fasting is not recommended. They also say that if you are taking vitamins, hormones, birth control pills, mild diet pills, thyroid medications, or antibiotics for acne, you may donate unless otherwise deferred. Your support in the blood drive in Muleshoe is encouraged by the Muleshoe Young Homemakers to assure adequate blood supplies in emergencies.

Traffic citations were the same for both December 1977 and 1978, at 31 both months. Citations for the year were up, however, with 395 citations issued in all of 1977, and 552 issued in 1978.

Crime in Muleshoe was down for the year, although there was a rise in crime reported in December of this year. This last December, 17 reports were made, compared to 10 in December of the previous year. Officers checked 383 reports in 1977 and 236 in 1978.

Breaking and entering (burglary) cases increased by two. In December, 1978, officers checked five incidents, compared to three for December, 1977. They only increased by four for the year, with 51 being reported in 1977 and 55 in 1978.

but the cotton hybrid market is just being set up. He will also talk on furrow-diking, or building of small dams and explain how farmers can use them to reserve heavy rainfall.

Winding up the program will be Leon New, area irrigation or engineer, who will speak on "Use of the Tenchometer." The Tenchometer is a soil moisture sensor which measures the moisture available in the soil during the coming year, and will denote whether or not irrigation motors will need to be turned on.

During the past year, tests were conducted with the Tenchometer in this county, and he will be explaining what was learned from the testing.

Tanksley said, "I know there is a lot of Agriculture Movement talk at this time, but we would like to invite everyone to this well-planned and beneficial program. The variety of topics to be discussed are very good and for further information, contact me at the Bailey County office of the Texas Agriculture Extension Service at the courthouse."

**You Have The Right To Know By Jim Latimer Social Security**

Every employer is reminded to make reports using the 1978 version of the new W-2 forms when preparing Wage Reports to the Social Security Administration. Before 1978, these reports were filed by the employer with the Internal Revenue Service, but now the reports are filed with the Social Security Administration. Proper filing of the new forms is important because much time and money can be saved if the forms are completed correctly. In addition, the employer should not tear off the balance of the sheet of three forms if only one or two of the forms are filled out.

The Social Security Administration reports that all of the W-2 forms that can be read by Optical Scanner will be so read. Using the Optical Scanner permits use of a magnetic tape which can be input directly into SSA's big computers without further separate steps that take time and money.

Concerted action was taken by Social Security in 1978 to get as many large employers as possible to use magnetic tape or floppy disc reporting as possible. SSA estimates about 1/3 of all reports will be filed by this method. The other 2/3 of the reports will be made by employers on paper W-2 forms.

### Stock Show Rodeo Fans To See Concept

When the 1979 edition of the World's Original Indoor Rodeo opens Jan. 24 as part of the 83rd annual Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, fans will be seeing a new concept in Rodeo production.

W.R. Watt Jr., Stock Show president-manager, said Neal Gay of Mesquite, Texas, will be Fort Worth Rodeo production manager. He will have an association of seven other major stock supplying companies from the United States and Canada.

The Rodeo will be presented in 22 performances through Feb. 4 in Will Rogers Coliseum. The box office is open daily, including Sundays, from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Good tickets remain for most of the performances, and are priced at \$5 each.

"The Stock Show Rodeo, being one of the foremost competitive events of its kind in the nation with a purse of over \$150,000, draws more than 700 cowboys and the rodeo stock must be sufficiently strong in order to present an outstanding performance to the public," Watt said.

Production of a rodeo in the manner prepared for Fort Worth this year will mark another first for the rodeo business, Gay said. "Fort Worth is recognized by many as the nation's most outstanding rodeo," he added.


