Officers Strike Jim Hill Hotel

Several weeks of investigation by the combined forces of the Hereford Police Department and the Deaf Smith County Sheriff's Department culminated Tuesday when three bellmen from the Jim Hill Hotel and a former Big Spring bellman were charged with procuring, a felony.

Charged were Alvin E. Cameron, 37, 236 W. Third; Ralph Gilliam, 38, 236 W. Third; Joe Magaro, 44, 827 Brevard; and Delmer William Wyatt, 55, of Big Spring.

The four waived examining trial in the Justice Of The Peace's office at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday. Bonds for each were set at \$2,000 by Justice Of The Peace Berry Miles. All made bond immediately afterward, and were released, except Wyatt, who remained in the county jail.

A 23-year-old Big Spring woman is being held as state's witness by local authorities. The procuring activity allegedly occurred at the Jim Hill Hotel.

The woman was said to have come to Hereford sometime last week, according to local authorities.

The chain of arrests began Monday morning, when Wyatt was taken into custody by Police Chief Henry Aycock. During the afternoon Monday, Ma-

Deputy Sheriff Bill McCarver said Ramirez was arrested in Hereford Monday after McCarver received a report that Martinez had been injured with a knife during a disturbance at the Labor Camp.

Bond for Ramirez was set at \$2,000 by Justice Of The Peace Berry Miles. Martinez was taken to the hospital by automobile.

Two Hereford Men Die In Accident

School Budget Hearing Friday

Public hearing on the 1959-60 budget for the Hereford Rural High School District will be held Friday, Aug. 7, at 8 p.m. in the Board Room at Senior High.

Board President W. R. Hair announced the meeting.

School trustees were slated to wrestle with the budget Thursday, Aug. 6. The board has been working more than two months, trying to balance the expenditures with the estimated income.

At present, the budget indicates expenditures of about \$960,000, which is comparable to that of the past school term.

West Pakistan Insect Experts Inspect County

Four extension service workers from West Pakistan visited Deaf Smith County Tuesday and Wednesday to make a brief study of insect control and plant diseases here.

They are M. Rashia Chand-hui, I. A. Baloch, K. H. Malik and Iqbal Wahaj. During their stay here, they toured county farms with County Agent J. W. "Lefty" Thomas.

They left Hereford for Muleshoe early Wednesday morning. They have been in the United States since January and are scheduled to return to their country sometime in September.

Since coming to the U. S. early this year, they have studied at Texas A & M College. They are called "plant protectionists" in their native country.

The four told the Brand that crop growing and soil conditions in their country are similar to this county. Most irrigation comes from surface water there, compared with underground water irrigation sources here.

At Texas A. & M. they made an intensive study on entomology and plant pathology. They also studied weed control, a complex problem in West Pakistan.

Dr. Hendrix, Gunshot Victim, Buried Monday

Funeral services were conducted at 4 p.m. Monday in Rose Chapel of Gilliland Funeral Home for Dr. J. W. Hendrix, 58, a chiropractor who had practiced in Hereford for more than 25 years.

Dr. Hendrix died of gunshot wound in the basement of his home, 507 W. Third, at about 9 p.m. Saturday.

The body was found by Mrs. Hendrix, who heard a shot a few minutes after her husband said he was going to the basement to clean some guns. Justice Of The Peace Berry Miles had not rendered a coroner's verdict in connection with the death at press-time Wednesday.

Miles said the fatal wound was made by a bullet from a .35 caliber deer rifle. The bullet entered Dr. Hendrix's body under the left arm and passed through a wall and closet ceiling in the basement.

The Rev. H. L. Thurston, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Hereford, officiated at services. Burial was at West Park Cemetery.

Dr. Hendrix was born Sept. 13, 1900, in Martin, Tenn., and came to Texas in 1926. He was married in 1927 at Colorado City to Miss Billie Beavers, daughter of the late Rev. M. M. Beavers, Methodist minister who held pastorates at Hereford and other West Texas towns.

Dr. Hendrix was a licensed private pilot and was one of the first men in Hereford to own his own airplane. He was a member of the First Methodist Church of Hereford.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Mrs. Joan Adair of Lubbock; two brothers, the Rev. J. W. Hendrix of Shanon, Tenn., and Roy W. Hendrix of Memphis, Tenn.; four sisters, Mrs. R. B. Freeman and Mrs. Junius Carnathan, both of Abilene, Mrs. Romie Jones of West (Continued on page 2)

Mrs. Anderson sustained back injuries in the accident. She was taken to the hospital by Kreig-Marcum ambulance.

Highway Patrolman Kenneth Maxwell of Hereford said the car apparently overturned while travelling toward Hereford from Dimmitt and landed on its wheels again. Anderson was taking his wife to the Hereford hospital in the wrecked car when the ambulance and patrol car, headed to the wreck, stopped Anderson and transferred his wife to the ambulance.

No charges had been filed on the driver Wednesday morning.

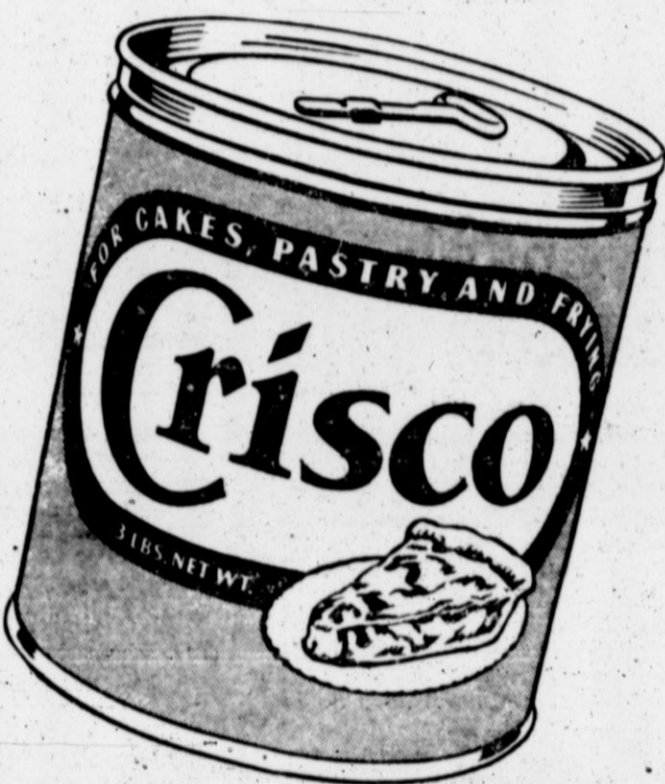

Led by the Veterans of Foreign Wars color guard and Amarillo Air Force Band, weeks of preparation were revealed in the form of floats, formations and other entries.

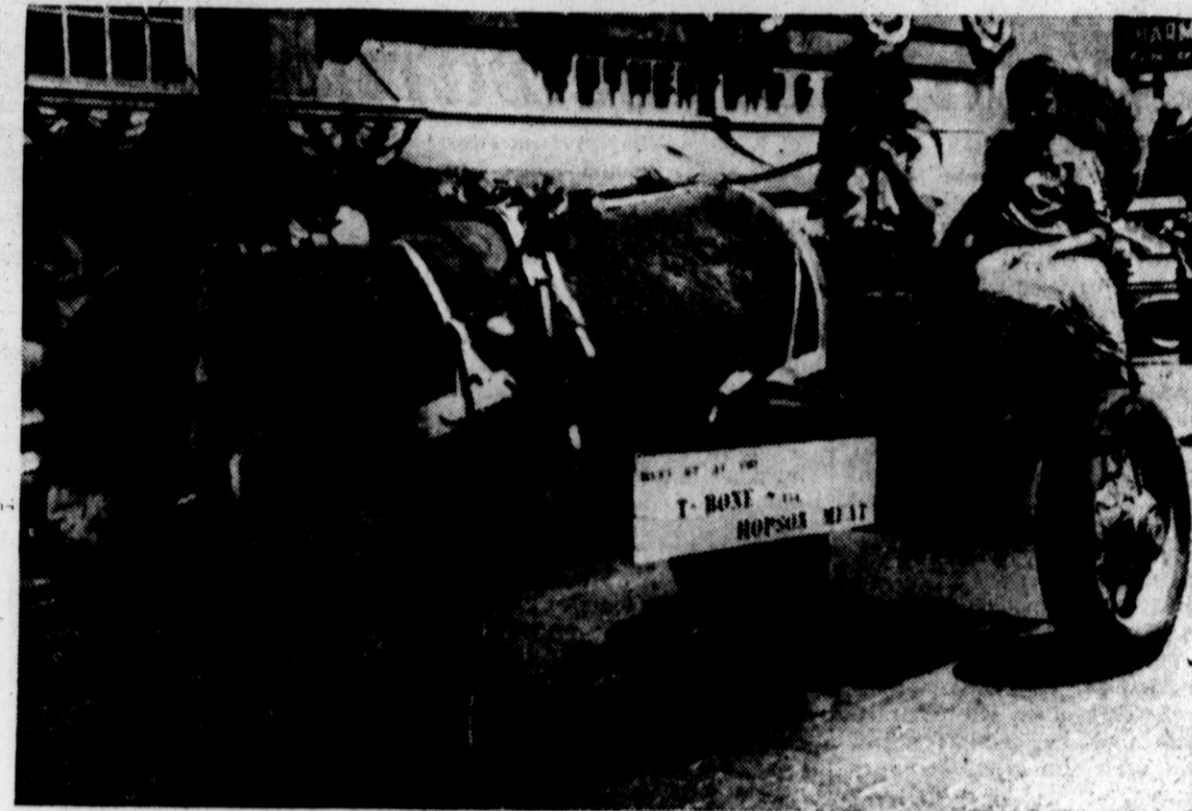

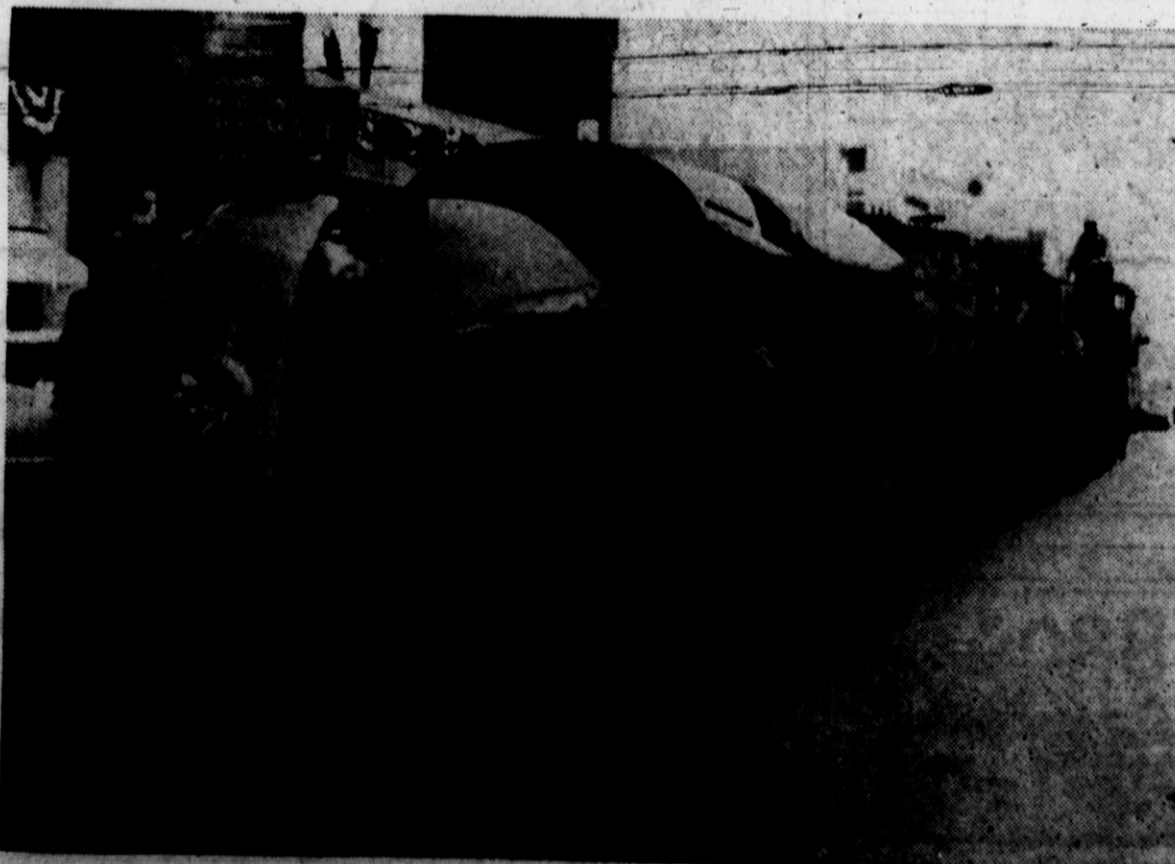

# Conservation Contest Open To Area Women

By ARGEN DRAPER

The Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M College System will cooperate with the Fort Worth Press in their fifteenth annual Conservation Awards Program — "Save the Soil and Save Texas."

The selection of Conservation Homemaker of the Year gives an opportunity to recognize rural women of Texas in the area of conservation in the home.

Each county in a Soil Conservation District may nominate one rural woman who lives on a conservation farm. Deaf Smith County has had some nominees but has never had a winner, and this is the right time to get behind some of your neighbors who've done a good job of conservation work, nominate her and then help in working up her records.

A judging committee composed of committees of the County Program Building Committee will be asked to judge county winners. Each county winner will be sent to be judged on a regional basis.

The State Conservation Homemaker of the Year will be selected by March 15, 1960, from the first place regional winners of the current year. The second place winner in her region then becomes first place homemaker of that region.

Local recognition may be planned for special occasions. The county winner may be Home Demonstration Week.

The nominees need not be home demonstration club women so do not limit your thinking and nominating to the club women.

Some of the material needed in the story for competition is a brief history and background of the family — number in the family and ages of the children. Complete story of the conservation practices in the home according to the score card which can be gotten here in the office.

A few pictures showing the development of conservation practices should be included in the recommendation. Many of you have before and after pictures of landscape, closet and other storage improvement.

Leadership activities should be brought out in the story. The contestant should help the people who want to nominate her to get the information and make the report as good as possible. It is an honor to the neighborhood and to the community to have a nominee and a winner.

ever before.

**SWEET PICKLES**

4 qt. sliced cucumbers  
1 qt. vinegar  
3 T salt  
3 T mustard seed  
5 T sugar.

Simmer cucumbers in above mixture for 10 minutes. Drain. Place in jars and drain again. Pour the following mixture boiling hot over cucumbers.

3 1/2 c. vinegar (white, of course)  
5% c. sugar  
1 T pickling spice.  
Seal at once.

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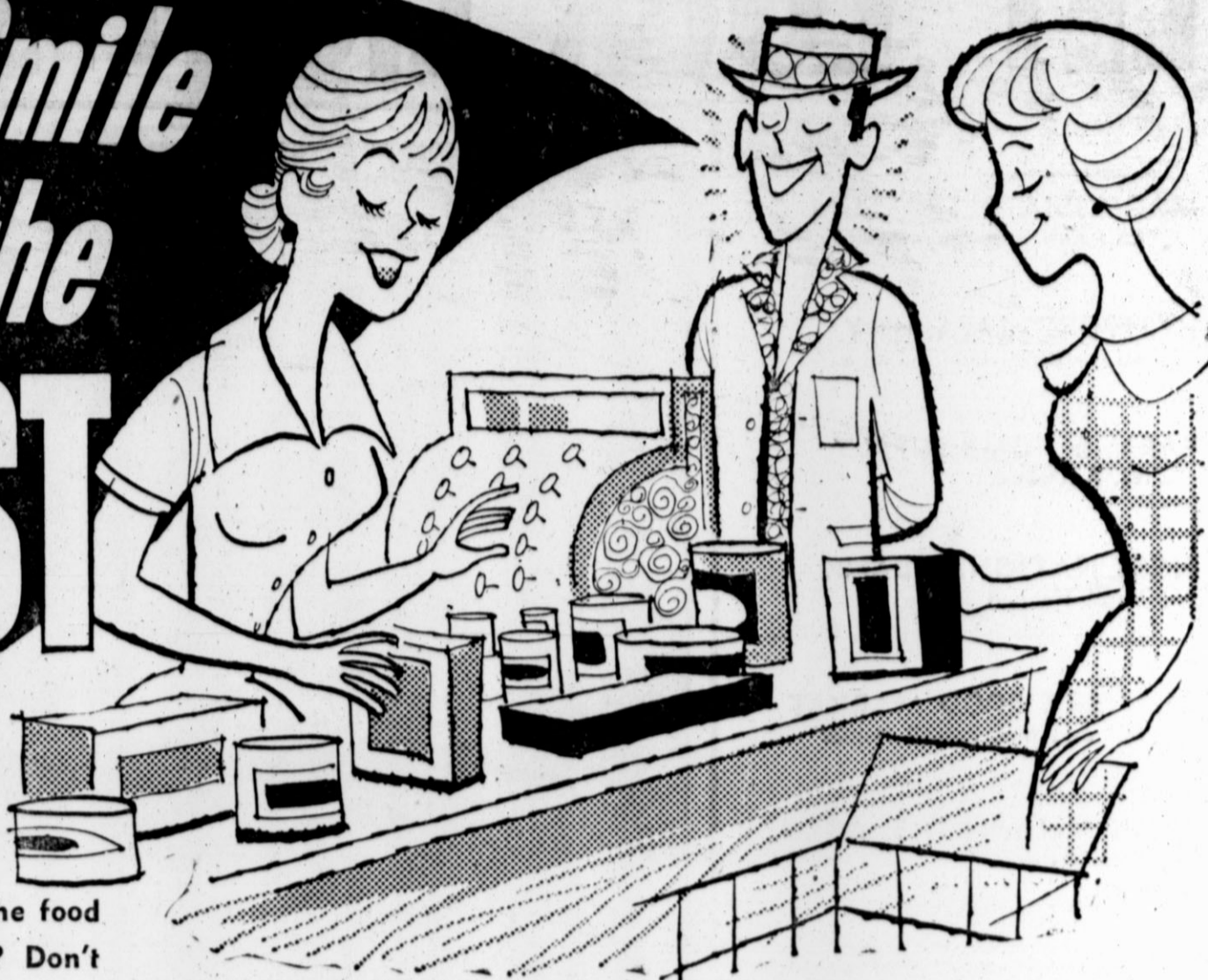

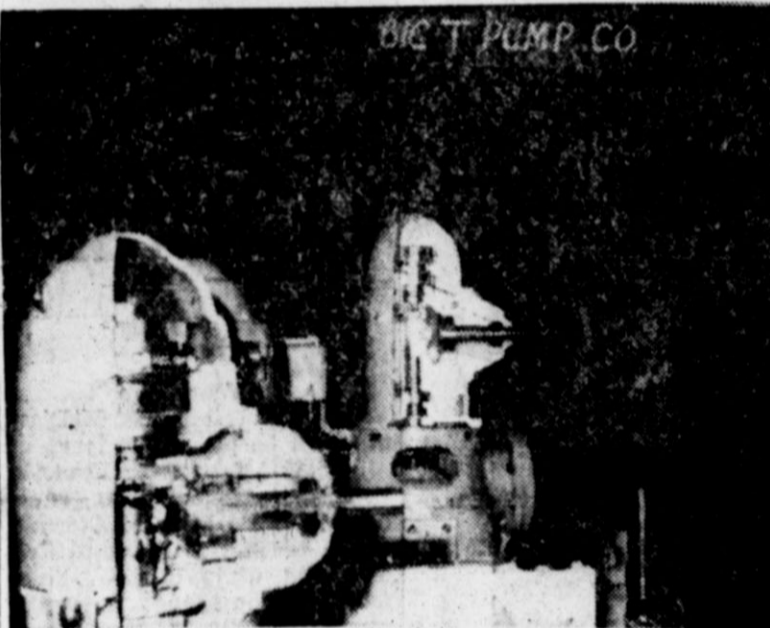

# Scale Model Of Pitman Grain Company Is Just Like The Real Thing--Only Smaller

In parades and on display, viewers see a replica of a grain elevator moving down the street on a float or in a display booth. The display is complete with trucks delivering grain, railroads tracks and real honest-to-goodness piles of grain.

Most of the display is the work of Art Manjeot and other employees of Pitman Grain Company, who in their spare time built the replica of the elevators seen at the south end of Main St.

Manjeot, who has worked on elevator crews since he was a young man, saw the Pitman elevator built in 1937. He has been with the company to see all the additions added to the building and from this was inspired to build a model of it for various displays.

Taking old type five-inch galvanized well casing, wood and sheet metal, Manjeot teamed with Henry Harms and Roy Rogers of Hereford to build the model. They used the casing to make the cylindrical portions of the elevator and completed the other structures by using wood and sheetmetal to make them.

Wood circles are fit into each end of the cylinders and the tubes are joined together through these. The display is completed by the use of model trucks and railways, laid out on a sand table.

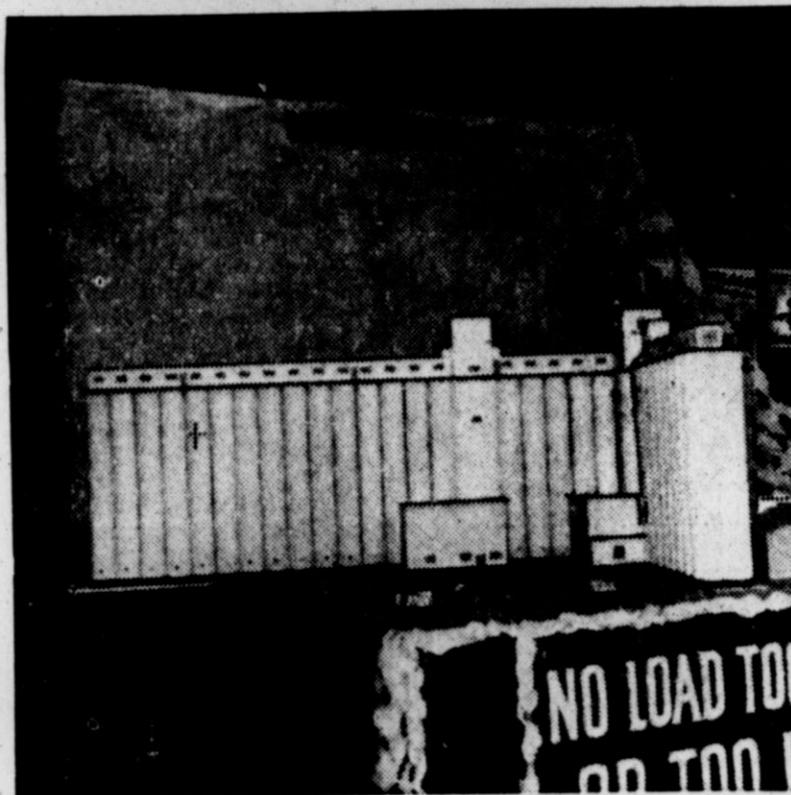
One of Manjeot's complaints about the display at the Harvest Festival was that he didn't have enough room for his display. He could not use the railway in conjunction with the display because it would have fallen behind the building and

out of sight. As it was, he used two ping-pong tables for his display. Two booths would have been adequate for the display, Manjeot believes.

Although Manjeot and the other builders of the model were not conscious of any scale as they built the model, it came out pretty well on a 1 to 42 inch scale. It was built at a cost of \$450 during the slack seasons between harvest in 1951.

Since additions have been made to the Pitman elevator since the model was constructed, Manjeot plans to add to his model. He plans to soon add another million bushel elevator to his present structure.

The model has been a highlight of two parades as well as the Harvest Festival display. Manjeot and his wife took the display to Dimmitt for a parade

there and it has been in a parade in Hereford.

The display was so well liked by an insurance company that the company wanted to store it in their office and display it in one of their windows. Manjeot claims that it would be an excellent display for any such purpose.
