Another Deputy;

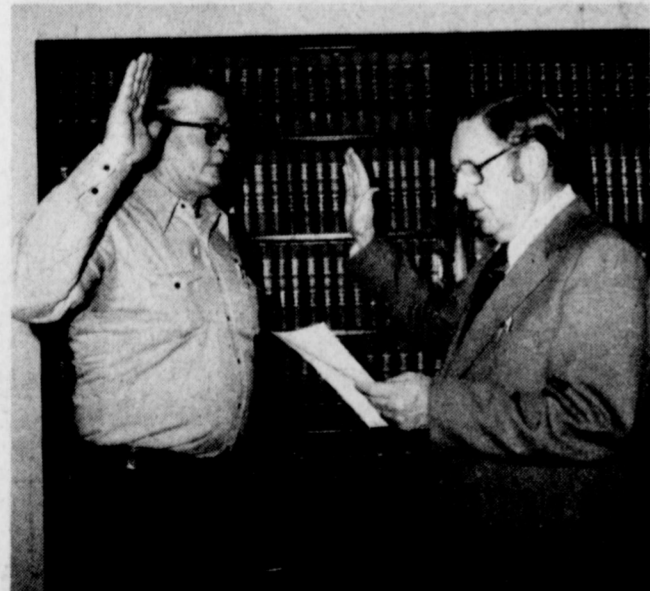
Henderson Hired

Friday, former Bailey County Deputy Sheriff Bob Henderson again joined the Bailey County Sheriff's office after six years in other employment. Commissioners approved the addition of a third deputy, and Henderson was sworn in by Bailey County Judge Glen Williams.

The new deputy officially assumed his duties Friday afternoon, and joins Deputy Sheriffs James Williams and Monty Phipps. Both the other deputies have nearly two years with the sheriff's office.

Commissioners also approved publication of the county salary schedule in the paper and authorized Bailey County Judge Glen Williams to sign county checks while county treasurer Edith Wilt is hospitalized.

They also paid routine bills during the day.

ards, has announced a determined effort to rid the city of an estimated more than 150 junked or abandoned vehicles.

He said the junked vehicles are not restricted to any certain area of the city, but may be found all over town. Some vehicles have already been removed and others are pending final paperwork.

City Police Lt. Jerry Hicks said an abandoned vehicle is one that is inoperable, over eight years old and on public property for 48 hours or more or on private property without the consent of the owner for 48 hours or more.

Lt. Hicks said a junk vehicle is inoperable, has expired license plate or motorvehicle inspection sticker; wrecked, dismantled, partially dismantled or discarded, or remains inoperable for more than 120 days, visible from a public place or on a public right-of-way.

Officers cited many factors determining the detrimental effects of the junked or abandoned vehicles, including the fact that they invite vandalism; area public nuisance and are detrimental to safety and welfare of the citizens as well.

Police Work Big 'Backlog' Bad Checks

With the addition of 36 more bad checks this week, the Muleshoe City Police are working warrants for persons filed on for issuing bad checks to local merchants, according to City Police Chief Johnny Richards.

They have already issued 34 warrants prior to the latest checks coming in and 17 persons have been picked up on issued warrants. Some of the persons were arrested for issuing more than one bad check.

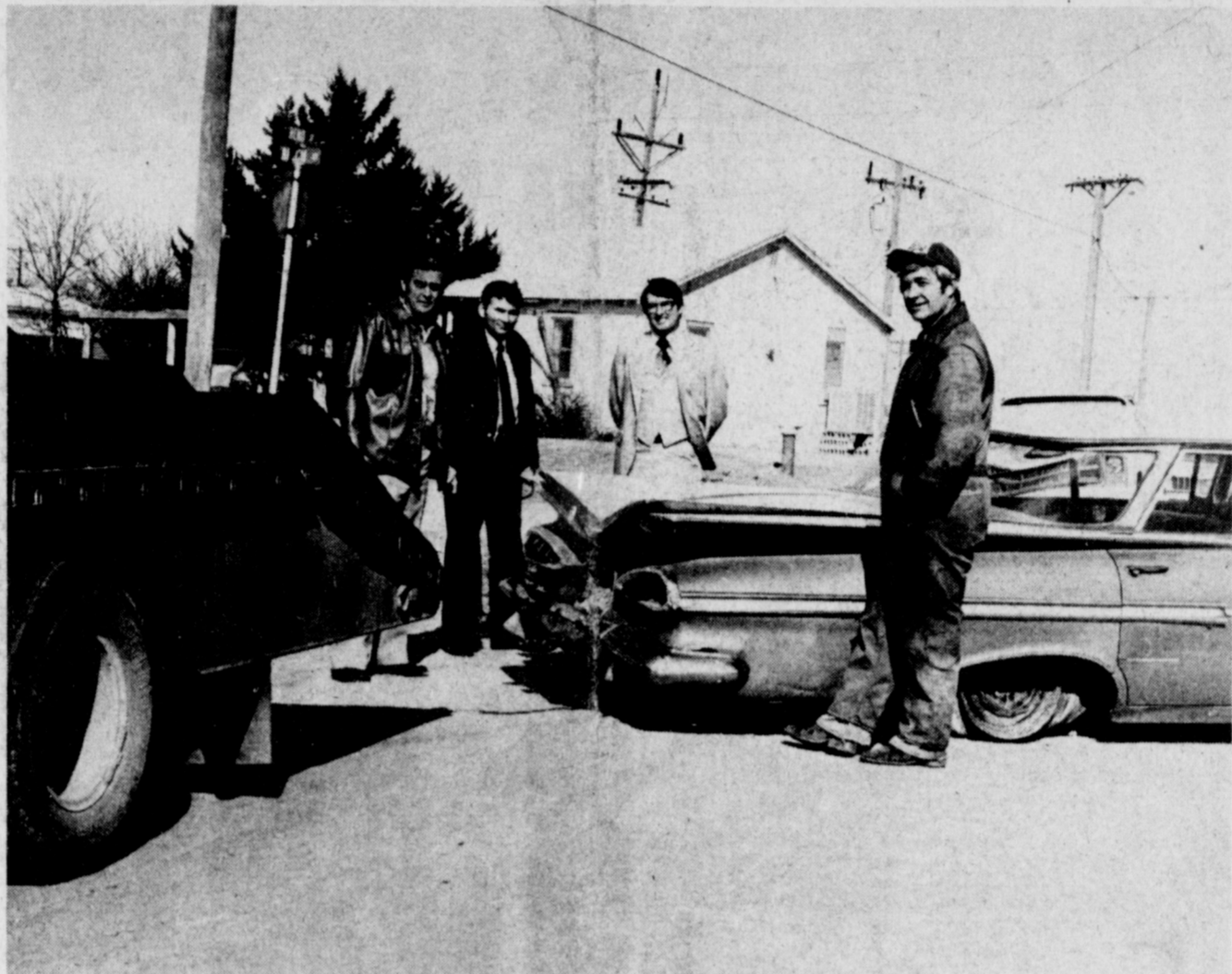
"People realize now there is really a push on to get the checks collected for the merchants," commented the police chief. "We are going through the paper work as fast as we can and getting the warrants served."

He added that the amount collected, along with fines assessed, now runs into the hundreds of dollars and he said a lot of people have been located who left town after giving the bad checks.

At least two forgeries were turned in, both involving counter checks given with no identification.

Optimist Club Plans Show

A rare treat is on hand for local and area people on Saturday, February 10 and Sunday, February 11. Two jet-turbine powered cars will be on exhibition in Muleshoe, along with two wheel standers and up to 12 dragsters.

Fred Sibley will bring his two jet-turbine powered cars from Elkhart, Indiana for the two day show, which will include showing their 150 miles per hour, plus, speed, and will exhibit the extreme heat from the rear exhaust as he melts a car he will be towing in one portion of the exhibition.

Pete and Don Huerta, the Mexican Jumpin' Beans, will be here with two wheel standers, from Brownfield. One is the world's smallest rear wheel stand vehicle which travels for one-fourth of a mile on the rear wheels at 40 miles per hour. The other is the 1977

National Champion Wheel Stander, which will travel 110 miles per hour on its rear wheels.

Tickets go on sale this week for the advance sale. Tickets will be \$4 advance sale and \$5 at the gate for the show which will be 1-5 p.m. on both Saturday and Sunday.

Tickets for children will be \$2.50 advance and \$3 at the gate, and children under the age of six will be admitted free of charge.

Also, a special carload price will be observed at the gate. Carload price will be \$20 per carload, with that special price available only at the gate at the Muleshoe Airport on the dates of the show.

In the event of inclement weather and the cars will not be able to perform, the will go on exhibition at the Bailey County Exhibition Center and Coliseum.

Persons showing advance tickets will be allowed in for the exhibition, plus receive a portion of the initial ticket price as a refund if the show is at the coliseum.

A former resident of Muleshoe, Ken Duncan, who is now employed with Justice Brothers automobile parts and accessories, is coordinating the show for the Optimist Club of Muleshoe, and will be here with the performers and their vehicles.

Public Meeting Slated Tuesday At City Hall

The City of Muleshoe will conduct a public hearing on the potential use of Community Development Block Grant funds on Tuesday, February 6, at 7 p.m. in the city council chamber at the city hall.

The city is eligible to apply for \$500,000 under the Community Development Act of 1974. Citizens are encouraged to submit their proposals and opinions on the use of the funds. The funds are to be used to assist low to moderate income families, particularly in the area of housing.

In conjunction with the public hearing, the Muleshoe City Planning Commission will also conduct a meeting, to consider a proposed subdivision.

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Water, Agriculture Highlighted Topics

Because a group of local people decided too many people are unaware and uninformed about current issues, especially where water and agriculture are concerned, a new organization was formed in Muleshoe last week.

Friday, more than 25 business leaders, presidents of local civic organizations, local sororities, bankers and financial institutions were represented at a noon meeting at the Bailey County Exhibition Center and Coliseum.

Keith Pate acted as spokesman and narrator for the session, which concerned the proposed water legislation and agricultural prices and costs.

He said it is not too late for the average citizen to do something to combat bureaucracy, which has grown to enormous proportions and threatens to do away with the family farmer and the small agribusinessman.

He challenged each person at the meeting to find an area and see what they could do to help.

First, he used a January 20, 1948 issue of The Lubbock Avalanche - Journal to show a comparison in the markets 30 years ago and today's prices.

According to the figures from the Fort Worth Market, wheat was \$3.12 to \$3.21 per bushel, compared to \$3.81 to \$3.87 today. He also showed yellow corn at \$2.97 to \$2.99 in 1948, compared to \$2.91 to \$2.97 today and milo, that was \$4.33 to \$4.38 in 1948 is \$4.39 to \$4.55 today.

Cotton sold for 35 - 36 cents a pound and today's price is at approximately 43 cents. Pate said that in 1943, cotton sold for 43 cents and in 1972, the price dropped to 22 cents before rising to 73 cents in 1973.

He exhibited a vacuum bag with 10 percent cotton, and said it was purchased three days ago for \$21. In 1972, the same vacuum bag was \$11 and in 1973, cost of the bag was \$19. The higher price was attributed to the increase in the price of cotton, even though the bag contained only 10 percent cotton.

He cited prices on new farm equipment, which was increased again this year by approximately 12 percent.

Pate gave figures on loans at the FHA office, citing 1974 loans for Bailey County at \$1,106,000 and the 1978 figure of \$8,945,000. "Where will it end," he asked? "This can only go on for so long." Food still costs less in the United States than any country in the world, according to figures presented by Pate.

He also presented a copy of a news release which stated in part: "Agriculture Department officials said the government could help conserve the nation's water supplies by cutting back farm price supports and other economic incentives for irrigation of croplands.

"The draft report acknowledged that the actions would place economic hardships on farmers. The report continued ... quoting ... 'Nevertheless these actions would reduce the incentive to over extend or deplete ground water.'"

"The draft report which was discussed at a public meeting, represented a portion of the Department's response to President Carter's report.

Poultry, root vegetables and selected fruits are among budget buys at Texas grocery markets this week, according to Gwendolyn Clyatt.

Mrs. Clyatt is a consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. Current price and quality trends are the following: **POULTRY**...Eggs are a bargain with large sizes

offering the best buy. Fryer chicken prices, generally, are a bit higher, but some markets continue to offer specials on both whole birds and fryer parts.

**FRESH VEGETABLES**... Best values include carrots, dry onions, rutabagas and potatoes. Current supplies of lettuce are dependable, however spinach, escarole and endive offer excellent substitutes. Cabbage is a good buy, but reduced supply may increase prices.

**FRESH FRUITS**... Best buys include apples, bananas, avocados, oranges

and pears. Look for most economical grapefruit buys on large - size -- they are more plentiful than the smaller size grapefruits.

**GROCERY MARKET AISLES**... Feature items include canned tomatoes and tomato products, pot pies and some dinners.

**RED MEAT OUTLOOK**... Adverse weather conditions continue to make the

red meat market irregular. Prices are higher on some items, so careful comparison shopping is necessary for best values.

**BEEF**... Features generally include chuck roasts and steaks, a variety of steaks for broiling, ground beef and beef liver.

**PORK**... Some markets feature Boston butt roasts, shoulder steaks, quarter loin cut into chops and pork liver.

**Your Tractor Saves Money Maintenance**

A poorly operating tractor engine can waste up to 30 percent or more of its fuel daily, says Spencer Tanksley county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Many diesel tractors under heavy loads use six to eight gallons of fuel per hour. At 45 cents a gallon for diesel fuel, that is \$2.70 to \$3.60 per hour. For a 10 hour day, the cost is \$27 to \$36, just for fuel.

If 30 percent of that fuel is wasted, then that tractor operator is throwing away between \$8.10 and \$10.80 per day, Tanksley says.

Common causes of fuel waste and improper engine operating in diesel engines are worn fuel injector pumps and nozzles. These pumps and nozzles are also affected by water condensation and dirt in the fuel.

Dirty, improperly adjusted carburetors, and fouled spark plugs cause problems in gasoline engines, points out Tanksley.

The causes of fuel waste and engine wear in all engines are improper lubrication, dirty air cleaners, and improper inflation of tires on tractors and equipment being pulled by the tractor. Faulty thermostats, stop and go operation, and light loads for a big tractor are additional factors in fuel use.

In addition to fuel waste, poor engine operation results in reduced power and increased engine wear. The County Agent recommends that farmers rely on the tractor operator's manual and follow the recommended maintenance practices.

**New Eyes For Needy Seeking Old Glasses**

Ten year old Timmy S. of Waco, Texas, loved to play baseball, but his friends teased him and called him Casey because he always struck out. He could not see the ball. Every game ended in humiliation and near tears for him.

New Eyes has earned the reputation of being one of the most effective sight-saving charities in the world. It has helped many thousands of needy people obtain glasses -- here and abroad -- and it has never asked for a penny in donations.

Since its inception 47 years ago, New Eyes has asked only for used eyeglasses and precious metal articles such as old watches, jewelry (real, costume and antique), good or damaged silver and dentures.

The eyeglasses and glittering clutter are sent to New Eyes for the Needy, Inc., Short Hills, New Jersey 07078. Thousands of packages from all over the U.S. arrive in the neat stucco headquarters every year. There, volunteers, mostly housewives, sort out the glasses, separating

those in plastic frames from those in metal frames.

Many of the 250 workers have learned to operate complex optical grading and testing equipment. They help fill specific orders from missions and hospitals in foreign countries where plastic framed glasses and sunglasses are sent.

The metal framed glasses have their uses, too. Through refining, they yield precious metals that are sold, along with the jewelry, to finance New Eyes funds in over 100 hospitals and health agencies throughout the U.S. The money in these funds buys glasses for people who have nowhere else to turn.

In addition to these funds, arrangements have also been made in 48 states through health and welfare agencies whereby New Eyes purchases glasses for carefully screened persons, to whom no other private or public funds are available.

But, as public response has grown throughout the years, so has the volume of requests. Therefore, New Eyes needs more discarded jewelry and eyeglasses to do its job.

These gifts can bring vision to a little boy, like Timmy.

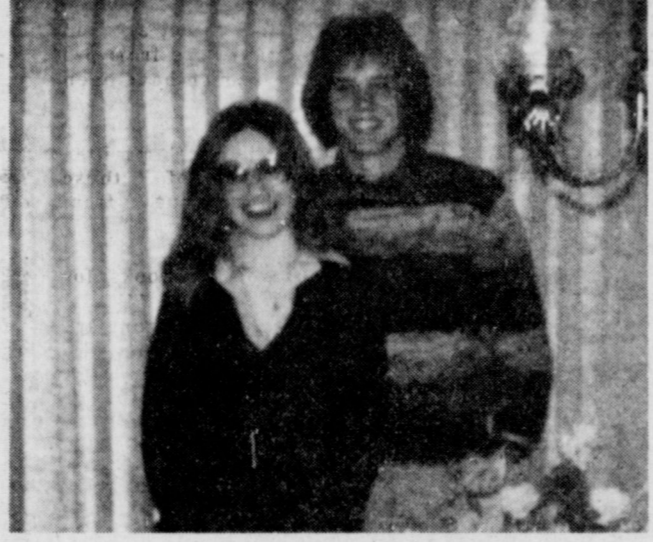

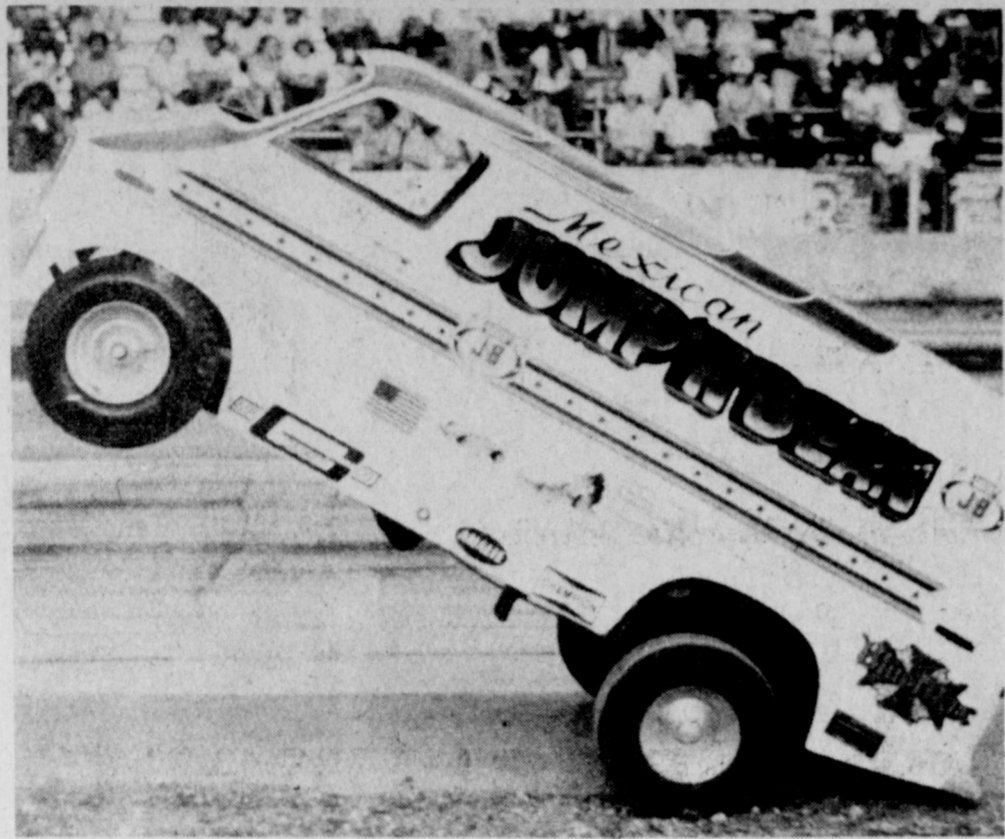

well as being a fire hazard and a health and safety hazard for youth.  
He said the process used to remove the vehicles is to go to the property where the vehicle or vehicles are located; write down information including the vehicle license and identification number and check for the owner or resident of the property.  
The owner of the property, or resident, has ten days to arrange for disposal of the vehicle or to put the vehicle into operating condition, and a legal paper called a 'Notice to Remove,' is sent to the tenant of the premises.  
All papers are sent by certified mail to assure arrival. Also, at the time the Notice to Remove is mailed, a complaint is filed with the Municipal Judge, along with a copy of the complaint.

This is followed by an Order of Removal issued by Municipal Court, at which time a wrecker is taken to the premises to remove the vehicle, or

Burglaries and theft reports have decreased, allowing the police department more time to work on the bad checks and the junked and abandoned vehicles, the chief explained.

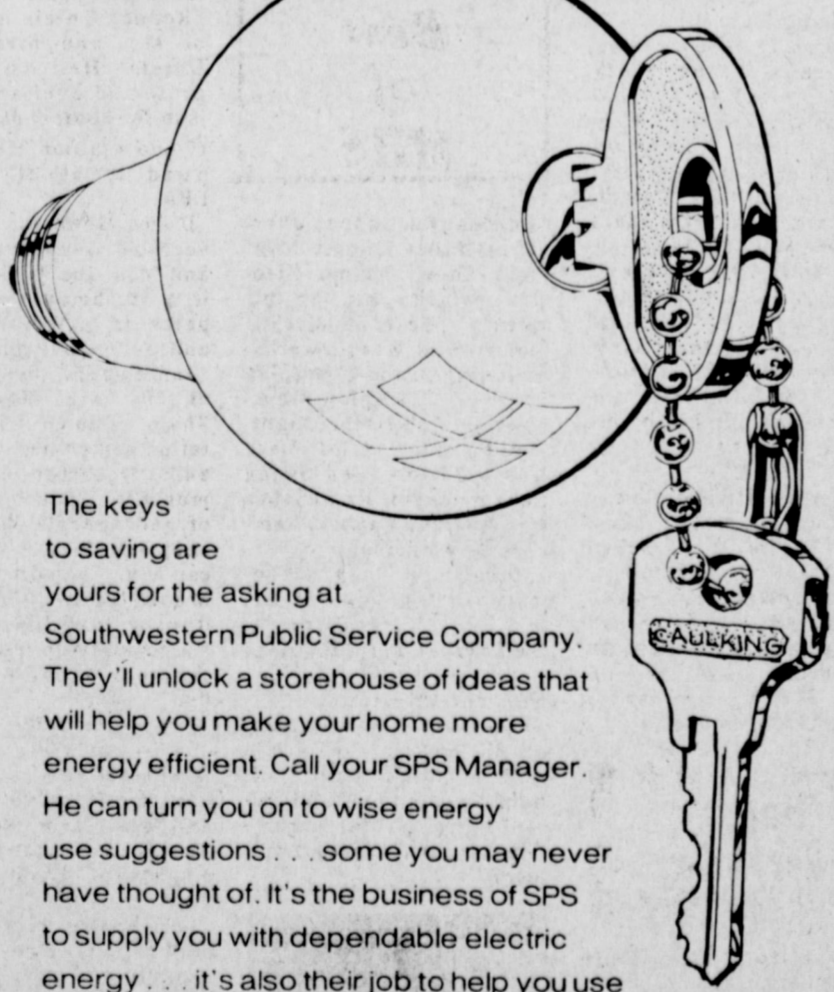

dent Carter's July order that the Interior and Agriculture Departments come up with ways to reduce depletion of the nation's water supplies. The discussion focuses mostly in western areas where water use is significantly exceeding water availability."

Edward Osann of the National Wildlife Federation expressed strong approval of some of the draft's proposals to tailor programs to reduce crop production in areas with scarce water supplies. "The draft includes numerous other options, such as discontinuing financing of conservation programs which increase water utilization. Other options include requiring irrigated acreage to be taken out of production under the set-aside program and lowering price supports for milk in water-short areas."

Farm Bureau adopted a national policy last week at the National Convention which reads in part:

"The U.S. Department of Agriculture should continue to be a full cabinet level department. We shall vigorously oppose all efforts to rename it or consolidate it with any other department or agency of government. We will oppose efforts to remove any significant division or agency from USDA."

The policy was approved because of an indication that President Carter would soon send to Congress a proposal to create a new Department of Natu-

ral Resources to replace the present Department of the Interior, and a new Department of Community Development which would be built around the existing Housing and Urban Development (HUD) program.

As a part of this reorganization proposal the U.S. Forest Service, all resource-related portions of the Soil Conservation Service, and the Rural Development Program would be stripped from the Department of Agriculture and transferred to the new

Department of Natural Resources. Major functions of the Farmers Home Administration would be transferred from USDA to the new Department of Community Development. Letters should be mailed to reach the Congressman or Senators prior to Feb. 15.

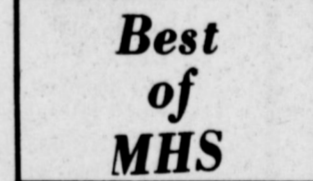

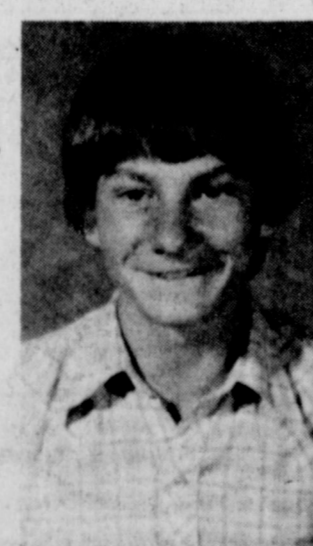

U.S. and Canada will discuss common wheat pricing strategy during the National Farmers Union Convention, March 11 - 15 in Kansas City, NFU President Tony T. Dechant announced today.

Dechant said the legislators are U.S. Senators George McGovern and Henry Bellmon and Canadian Senator Hazen Argue of Saskatchewan.

"One of the approaches to improving farm income is to get a better price for U.S. grain and other commodities in the world marketplace," Dechant said.

"An extreme example of the market power that a handful of nations can gain has been clearly shown to the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC)," Dechant said.

Dechant said the panel of lawmakers is especially well qualified to discuss export strategy.

Argue is the chairman of the Agriculture Committee of the Canadian Senate. A senator since 1966, Argue is a family farmer and the leading rural advocate in his country. He has spoken out for joint ventures by

the U.S. and Canada to improve farm prices.

McGovern is the ranking Democrat on the U.S. Senate Agriculture Committee. He is important to the advancement of a wheat pricing strategy because he also serves on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

Like Argue, Bellmon is a farmer in his home state of Oklahoma. He is the ranking Republican on the Senate Budget Committee and holds a key position on the Energy Committee.

The three senators participated in a meeting in Winnipeg last year sponsored by the National Farmers Union to promote cooperation among wheat exporting nations.

Dechant said another panel on the convention program will explore the development of multi-national trade agreements and international wheat agreement to guarantee minimum prices for farm commodities.

Also getting focus during the 77th annual convention of the National Farmers Union will be monopoly influences in domestic livestock and grain markets in Kansas City, Mo., and will involve farmer delegates from around the nation who will set the policy for the Farmers Union for the next year.

Texas Farmers Union is sending four elected delegates to the meet.

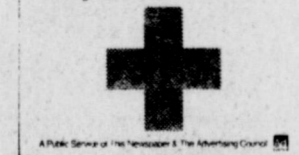


