Driver Unhurt In Collision

A driver for Barrett-Crofoot escaped injury early today after his rig was struck by a westbound Sante Fe trainabout two miles west of Summerfield. Danile M. Aguirre, 47, driver of the tractor-trailer rig, said that early-morning sun blinded him just prior to the accident.

"I stopped at the crossing and looked both ways," Aguirre said. "The sun was real low and I didn't see anything coming so I started across.'

Aguirre's rig was nearly across the tracks around 8 a.m. when the 50-car train cut through the trailer, which

was loaded with corn headed for Barrett-Crofoot East. The grain was scattered alongside the tracks and highway. Approximatey half of the trailer was shorn from the rest of the rig.

The train was being pulled by four engines, and the front engine sustained substantial damage as a result of the collision. The train was pulling some 45 cars loaded with piggy-back with trailers.

U.S. Urges Arabs To Shelter PLO

WASHINGTON (AP) -The Reagan administration is urging a reluctant Arab world to find a permanent place for the 6,000 Palestine Liberation Organization guerrillas under seige by Israeli forces in west Beirut.

"Now is the appropriate time for the Arab community to assist in the resolution of this particular issue," Dean Fischer, the State Department spokesman, said Thursday. "We are hopeful that the Arab community will find a way to help resolve this issue

"It is the major stumbling block," said another U.S. official, who asked not to be identified. "We think the monkey is on the back of the Arabs to sort this thing out. They think it's on our back because we armed the Israelis. There's certainly no solution yet."



Pot-growing Granny Changes Mind

After Family Talk

HOUSTON (AP) - An 82-year-old grandmother has changed her mind about pleading guilty to marijuana possession after talking with her

family for two hours, her lawyer says. Earlier this week, Laura Clark telephoned Assistant District Attorney Glenn Gotschall and told him she was ready to plead guilty in exchange for a two-year probated sentence. Mrs. Clark said she was too weak and too ill to wage a legal fight.

But her lawyer, Bill Portis, said Thursday that Mrs. Clark had changed her mind after talking it over with her family.

State District Judge Michael McSpadden would accept the plea bargain only if Mrs. Clark really believed she was guilty, Portis said Thursday.

"She knows she didn't knowingly and intentionally possess marijuana. She is going to plead not guilty and we will try the case Aug. 23," Portis said.

Mrs. Clark, a grandmother of five, was arrested in May after police officers confiscated several marijuana plants growing in her garden.

She has steadfastly maintained her innocence, saying the illegal week was to be used in an ointment to ease the pain from her arthritis.

Mexican-American Legislators Seek

More Bilingual Funds AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - The Mex-

ican American Legislative Caucus wants to raise the state appropriation for bilingual education by nearly \$100 per pupil.

The caucus said Thursday it would ask the 1983 Legislature to appropriate at least \$150 per pupil for bilingual education. A measure enacted by the 1981 Legislature extended bilingual education through the elementary grades and allocated \$56.85 per pupil for instruction.

The caucus also said it wanted to improve the 1981 law by making sure the Texas Education Agency monitors school districts "to assure equal education opportunity for all students not be compromised by local politics which could be antagonistic to the rights of Mexican American pupils."

The caucus added in a statement that it wanted to make certain that: - Standards for entering and leav-

ing the bilingual program do "not exclude those students who are in need of such instruction."

Remedial English programs other than bilingual education are effective.

Grievances Filed Over Two Blacks' Third Chance

HOUSTON (AP) - A disgruntled group of policemen have filed a formal protest over Chief Lee P. Brown's decision to allow two probationary officers who twice failed a training program to resign and re-enter the police

Lt. B. J. Todd, head of a field training officer program, said 104 police officers signed the grievance list asking Brown to reverse his decision.

Last week, Brown decided to let two probationary officers resign and then re-enter the police academy next

The two probationary officers, Isaac Boney, 19, and Claire D. Phillips, 22, twice flunked performance evaluation tests given as part of the Houston Police Department training.

After their first failure, Brown reversed the recommendations of the training supervisors that Boney and Ms. Phillips be fired. The pair were given an additional five weeks training and again took the tests, but failed a second time.

Brown's action, in effect, gives the pair a third chance, officers argued. Some officers have alleged the action was racially motivated. Boney,

Ms. Phillips and Brown all are black. Brown had no comment on reports of the grievances.

The list of grievances filed by the officers said Brown's decision represents special consideration, makes it difficult to defend the training program in court and difficult to fire "incompetent" probationary officers in the future.



WASHINGTON (AP) - In southern New Mexico, property owners in the small town of Cloudcroft are battling the federal government over national forest land where private citizens have inadvertently trespassed.

"It's not like getting along with an ordinary neighbor,' says Dorsey Bonnell, a local leader of the fight and owner of 185 acres caught up in the dispute. Temporary boundary markers left by government surveyors started the argument.

"The government's a bad neighbor," charges Bonnell. 'They just say, 'It's our way or none.' What can you do? You're just an individual."

But in northern Washington state, the federal government had to pay \$480,000 after discovering that the national forest timber it sold to an adjacent landowner was actually on his land. The price for that mistake was nearly 20 times more than the government felt the timber was

And officials say they're uncovering more and more instances of inaccurate private and public land survey work as they search out the real boundaries separating millions of acres of valuable federal and private lands.

They say long-standing land titles are being jeopardized and the government's losing vast sums in undeveloped resources because of uncertainty about the exact ownership of border

"Those are not everyday horror stories, but they're not atypical either," says George Liddicoatt, deputy director of the National Forest Service's lands division. "We have 50,000 claims on

A U.S.-mediated cease-fire has been holding with only scattered violations for the past five days, but Israel still is threatening to storm west Beirut if the PLO does not get out of Lebanon voluntarily. The Israelis have refused to withdraw their siege force until the Palestinians leave.

The PLO says it won't consider evacuating until a multinational force is deployed to stand between the guerrillas and the Israelis. Khalaf reiterated this demand in his speech Thursday.

For weeks, Habib has been trying to find a home for Arafat and the 8,000 PLO fighters believed trapped in west Beirut by Israeli forces that invaded Lebanon June 6

Syria, the nearest Arab state, has refused to give the armed guerrillas a refuge, and no other Arab nation so far has offered to do so.

"Now is the appropriate time for the Arab community to assist in the resolution of this particular issue." said State Department spokesman Dean Fischer in Washington.

"It is the major stumbling block," said another U.S. official, who asked not to be identified.

Unconfirmed reports from the Syrian capital of Damascus said President Reagan wrote Syrian President Hafez Assad to ask him to take the PLO, but Assad replied that the Palestinians have not asked to go to Syria.

There also were press reports that Reagan wrote to King Fahd of Saudi Arabia, asking him for help in finding a haven for the guerrillas.

Gov. Bill Clements has acknowledged an earlier projection by the Texas Employment Commission that payroll taxes for 280,000 employers may jump from \$6 to \$114 per employee if unemployment in the state continues to rise.

The taxes, currently the lowest in the nation, support the unemployment insurance program. The payroll taxes go up whenever the unemployment insurance fund drops below a \$225 million floor.

The fund presently stands at \$197 million but is expected to drop as low as \$130 million by October, when the tax increase would go into effect.

Clements earlier expressed. doubts about the TEC's projections and he called a recent rise in unemployment in Texas to 7.2 percent not "all that significant."

EAGLE PASS, Texas (AP) - A band of Indians whose ancestors once ruled 13 million acres near the Great Lakes are sweltering through another hot summer on the banks of the Rio Grande waiting for the U.S. Senate to act on their request for a small plot of Texas land.

The Traditional Kickapoos claim the federal Bureau of Indian Affairs has treated them like renegades for the 150 years they have migrated through this Texas-Mexico border city, living in cardboard and cane wickiups, speaking the same Algonquin dialect and worshipping the same Indian God they have for centuries.

The House of Representatives has approved a bill by Rep. Abraham "Chick" Kazen, D-Texas, that would clarify the citizenship of about 700 impoverished Kickapoos who fled from reservations in Kansas and Oklahoma in the 1830s, alleging Christian missionaries interfered with their freedom of religion.

Since then, the aborigine tribe has migrated back and forth from Eagle Pass to a holy ground granted them early in this century by President Benito Juarez in Mexico. Eagle Pass is their home base for they travel throughout the United States as migrant farmworkers.

The Laredo congressman said the Traditional Kickapoos may be the most pure tribe of native Americans.

"It may be difficult to believe in our modern age of space travel and scientific marvels that such a situation exists, but it does," Kazen

Kazen's bill now goes to the Senate and tribal supporters have scheduled a meeting in San Antonio next week to plan strategy should Congress decide not to fund the propos-

Kurt Blue Dog, an attorney for the Native American Rights Fund, headquartered in Boulder, Colo., said representatives of the Kickapoos from Eagle Pass

and Oklahoma would attend the Monday meeting in San Antonio to discuss raising private funds should Congress decide against spen-

ding any money. "I guess we're realistic enough to realize that (funding) portion of the bill is going to be real tough to get passed. What we're trying to do is do as much as we can on our own and possibly the government may augment it,"the Sioux lawyer said.

"We're going to get some land. If not by federal funding, then we'll do it through contributions. There are still some people in the world with a good heart," said Nakai Breen, a Cherokee Indian reared since she was 12 among the Kickapoos.

Mrs. Breen and her husband, Bud, a western artist who has sold paintings to help the indigent Kickapoos, planned to meet with Blue Dog, the Oklahoma Kickapoo chairman, and the Rev. James McCloud of McAllen, a Presbyterian minister who has taken an interest in the plight of the tribe.

"It is important that they have the funds to back them up if Congress doesn't go the money part," said Breen at his home in Brackettville,

Although the Kickapoos were declared an official Texas tribe by the state legislature in 1977, Attorney General Mark White ruled that they were not eligible for any state assistance because the federal government is constitutionally authorized to deal with them.





Works of Sculptor Zadkine in Garden Museum

PARIS (AP) - The tiny, sunlit garden forms a cultural oasis amid the tall apartment buildings on the Left Bank. It is the official museum for the works of Ossip Zadkine, one of the leading sculptors of the 20th century.

For the first time, the works of the man who influenced generations of sculptors and was a friend of artists Marc Chagall and the late Pablo Picasso can be viewed in the setting where they were created. The villa and surrealistic

sculpture garden, where the Russian-born Zadkine lived and worked until his death in 1967, house over 300 bronze, wood, plaster and terra-cotta sculptures as well as the artist's private collection of paintings, drawings and tapestries.

Zadkine bequeathed his work and house-gardenstudio complex to the city of Paris. But, says museum curator Marie-Claude Dane, "city bureaucrats thought the pieces were reproductions and didn't know the value of Zadkine's art. Besides, they didn't know what to do with such a costly gift."

The sculptor's wife, Valentine Prax, finally gained the support of Paris Mayor Jacques Chirac, who pushed the project ahead.

Zadkine was born in Smolensk in 1890, sent off to London as a small boy to learn good manners and finally settled in Paris in 1909. There, on the Left Bank, he met Picasso, Chagall and Guillaume Apollinaire.

As an art student at the prestigious Beaux Arts Academy, Zadkine, with fellow artist Modigliani, peddled drawings in Montparnasse cafes.



Drying sweaters

DEAR POLLY — I know you're supposed to lay sweaters flat on a table to dry, but that takes forever. Isn't there any way you can hang them up to dry? — ELLEN

DEAR ELLEN — Hanging sweaters, especially heavy ones, is likely to stretch them way out of shape. The weight of the wet fabric drags down the entire garment. Hang those sweaters only if you want the arms to be twice as long as they were before washing! However, I've found that most knits can be safely tumbled in the air-only cycle of an automatic dryer — that means no heat at all! — until most of the excess moisture is gone. Then, while slightly damp, spread the garment out on a towel-covered table to finish drying. This will save hours and hours of drying time. Be sure to This will save hours and hours of drying time. Be sure to shape the sweater to the correct size as it dries.

A few years ago, a reader sent in a wonderful Pointer for a drying rack that would also speed up sweater-drying. Lay a clean window screen across two chairs and spread the sweater directly on the screen. Put a heavy towel or piece of plastic on the floor underneath to catch any drips. Again, shape the sweater to the correct size. The air circulation

In the early 1960s, she was a go-go dancer. Overweight even then, she did a comedy routine along with her danc-





DEAR READER - This is a fairly common com-plaint and I hate to tell you this but it is called senile purpura. The black and blue or dark purple areas usually have clear-cut margins and are not painful in any way.

Your doctors have not helped you because there is very little anyone can do for it. The cause is believed to be from a loss of supportive tissue. As you will notice the skin moves freely over the area. As the mobile skin moves, it pulls on and rup-tures small blood vessels. This mobility may be from loss of collagen for connec-

tive tissue. In any case, it is impor-tant to avoid medicines such as aspirin that may increase bleeding tendencies. And it is a good idea to eat plenty of fresh fruits for a plentiful supply of Vitamin C. But don't expect miracles.
