### Street Grading Continues.

J. P. Woods' street grading outfit has been kept busy on the streets of Hereford for the past few weeks. Besides the streets already mentioned in the BRAND he has just completed grading the street north of the Presbyterian church, beginning at Dr. McFarling's residence and extending to the intersection of that street with the College street. This was done by some of the enterprising property holders and residents along that street, thus enhancing the value of their property and giving them a pretty and well-drained street.

Mr. Woods also has the contract to grade the street just east of the lake, beginning at the lake and extending two thousand feet north across and beyond blocks 9 and 16 in the Evans addition. This work is being done principally by C. E. Edwards and L. A. Stroud who have extensive property interests along the street. The grading of this street will mean much to that portion of the town as it will serve to drain the low places above the lake where water is accustomed to stand in wet weather.

We are glad to see such interest taken in beautifying the streets of Hereford. Grading them not only gives them a respectable appearance but fills up all the low places and makes them delightful for driving.

It also drains the city and adds considerably to sanitary conditions. We hope to see every thoroughfare in Hereford drained and graded in the near future. This place is fast forging to the front as an enterprising little city.

### New \$15,000 Church Building

On Tuesday night the members of the local Christian congregation held a meeting to determine the question of building a new church edifice in place of the present one. The meeting was very enthusiastic and well attended and the object of the meeting thoroughly discussed by a great many members. It was decided that the present building was entirely inadequate for their large and increasing membership and not at all in keeping with the growth and prosperity of Hereford. A new building was decided upon and that to be of brick and not to cost less than \$15,000. A finance committee consisting of Judge L. Gough, T. J. Graves, W. L. Vaughn and Ed Connell were appointed to solicit subscriptions. This committee have their work of soliciting well under way and donations are coming in at a lively gait. Several \$1000 subscriptions have already been pledged and others of \$500 and the work has hardly begun. Their members are responding freely and they are receiving substantial assistance from outsiders. The building "will be built," says one of the enthusiastic committeemen. "The country is prosperous and the time right for just such a building."

It will be built on the present location of the old building and is to be started just as soon as suitable preparations can be made. The beautiful structure they contemplate building will be a great credit to the Christian congregation as well as to our progressive town.

The team broke away from the court house rack, being frightened at an approaching automobile, and ran north several blocks turning east and ran through the barbed wire fence around the residence occupied by Paul Barnett. ### Hog Crop As a Money Crop.

In discussing diversification and farming in general, farmers often refer to some particular crop as a "money crop." This means, of course, that they can rely with more certainty upon the income from that crop than upon that from some other. This is because of the fact that the product referred to seldom fails to make a satisfactory yield, and of the further fact that it is always in demand at some price, whether large or small. Such, for instance, is the cotton crop. The man who owns a few bales of cotton knows that when he hauls it to market he is sure to find a buyer for it, whether the price is what it should be or not. The same may be said of wheat, oats and a few others of the staple products. Since the advent of packeries into Texas there are other things for which the demand is just as steady and the market just as reliable as it is for cotton, wheat, oats or any product of the field. Among these are hogs. The farmer who has hogs to sell is now just as certain of a market for them as the farmer who has cotton to sell, and it seems at present that the price he receives is just as likely to be satisfactory as

the price he receives for cotton.—Dallas News.

### Plow Less and Cultivate More.

Methods of cultivation are becoming better understood says the Texas Farm and Ranch. Not long ago corn growers plowed their corn two or three times and "laid it by." And they plowed it too, using two big shovels to the gang and sending them down to the beam. Now, the custom of the best corn growers is to give corn a light cultivation with the harrow first, then if the soil has become compact by heavy rains as often happens, it is given one deep cultivation resembling the "plowing" that used to be given. This deep cultivation admits air to the soil, which is necessary, and does not disturb the corn roots because they have not yet developed between the rows.

Later, cultivations are uniformly shallow, the second and third with a riding cultivator, which kills weeds and loosens the surface only to a depth of one to three inches. After the corn is too high to straddle, some implement that will cultivate the space between two rows is used. All that is desired is to keep the surface loose down to a depth of one to three inches. Cultivation is often continued until the corn is practically matured.

There are sound reasons for this practice. Compact soil loses moisture rapidly because the capillary action is unbroken, and moisture comes up to the surface to supply the evaporation. A layer of loose soil on top prevents this loss of moisture and saves it for the use of the crop. If the soil is loosened to a depth of six inches, it dries out to that depth, and the roots are broken by this deep cultivation. The nearer a crop approaches maturity, the more water is used by the plant, and its only supply of water is in the soil. Shallow cultivation prevents loss of water from the surface of the soil.

The same general principles apply to all cultivated crops. Cotton and potato growers are doing less plowing and more cultivating, and are getting better returns. The purpose of cultivation is to save water for the use of the crop that is growing.

## TROUBLE AND ITS CAUSE.

As a rule we can detect the immediate cause of our troubles; but the most of us are slow to discover the remote and the real cause. For example typhoid fever invades a home and prostrates two or three of its members; and we all know that the germ is the immediate cause, but how came that germ there? where did it hail from? and through what channel did it come? When these questions are properly considered, then we begin to approach the real cause, though it may be very remote.

The wind is one of nature's great purifying agents; and the good gentle cow is one of the very best domestic animals owned by the human race; and yet as channels for the conveying of deadly diseases they are without an equal.

Some one has said that the gentle, harmless cow has destroyed more people than all of the mad-dogs, rattle-snakes, lions and tigers combined. Then is the wind and the cow the cause of our sickness, our drug store and doctors' bills, our funeral processions and so on? By no means. We must go further back in our inquiry—go back to our filth, if we would understand the real cause of so much unnecessary trouble the human race is enduring.

And just now there is a mighty crusade going on all over our country against filth—just common every day filth, not any thing new im-

ported to our shores. Such filth as is seen too often right here in our little town.

"Cleanliness is next to godliness," said Wesley; and it is high time we were all getting that near to heaven, if we never expect to enter the golden gates.

The "cleaning-up crusade" is coming to every city, town, farm ranch and community in Texas, says the Dallas News. People are beginning to wake up everywhere to better sanitary conditions, and this question is being agitated strongly throughout the whole country. In the city of New Orleans, which has suffered so much from the yellow fever pest, the germ of this disease has been almost stamped out by cleaning up the city and adhering strictly to sanitary methods.

Occasionally one will hear the remark "I wish I was out of this town" and then one feels like saying, I wish you were, for a man who stands on the streets chewing and spitting, telling obscene stories, cursing the town, finding fault with his grandmother because she was a woman, claiming that the merchants are a lot of thieves, that the lawyers and real estate agents would skin a man to a finish and a whole lot more, is a nuisance and abomination. Any town pestered with one or more such worthies would be justified in exercising cowhide authority on the bosom of their overalls. No one is obliged to live where he is not suited. If one hasn't an encouraging word for the business enterprises and institutions of his town, he should shut up and "go 'way back and sit down." If things don't suit you, move on to where they will. A growler and a sorehead in a town is an enterprise killer every time. It would pay a town to donate \$5.00 and tell him to migrate.—Leon Journal.

### Not a Fake Road.

The following from the Line county News shows what the people in the counties south think of the Panhandle Short Line proposition:

Yes the Panhandle Short Line is an essentially different proposition from the fake railroads that have proposed crossing the plains. This is easily discernable by the manner of procedure. The fake road begins operations generally by getting a charter, which while it is essential, does not cost much and is no guarantee that the road will ever be built. On the other hand the Panhandle began work by putting a corps of surveyors in the field, which as every one knows takes considerable money. The next move of the fake road is to send a representative over the proposed route, who holds a jumped up mass meeting at the principal points, making considerable fuss and noise, but costing the promoters little or no money, and as a general thing this is the last heard of them.

The Panhandle Short Line after spending good money making the preliminary surveys, decide on the most practicable route, keep right on spending money, going back and fourth, securing right of way, bonus and such things. After doing all of these things, gaining the confidence of the people all along the line, making arrangements for the actual construction work to begin, even to putting the final survey party in the field. Then, and then only do they file the charter, which they did at Austin, March 26, 1907.

One of the most important pieces of legislation by congress at the last session was the adoption of Senator Hansbrough's amendments to the free alcohol law says the New York Tribune. Many supporters of the original measure had expected that it would enable the farmer to manufacture small quantities of spirits for use in running a portion of his machinery. To some agriculturists that privilege would be more welcome than any increased demand for their corn by wholesale distillers. When therefore it was discovered that the proper provision had not been made the senator from North Dakota took the lead in a movement to correct the oversight, and was entirely successful. The new law does not go into effect until next September, but it will then be permissible for anybody who complies with regulations which the commissioner of internal required to issue, to distill on his own premises a quantity of alcohol not exceeding 100 gallons

(about two barrels) daily. It does not matter how little he produces or how much of the time his still stands idle. The all important thing is not to exceed the prescribed limit in an interval of twenty-four hours.

Before availing himself of the opportunity soon to open to him, the farmer will need to obtain a variety of information. For some of this he must look to the head of the internal revenue bureau. Mr. Yerkes alone can tell him how large a bond he must give to guarantee the government against fraud, what kind of storage tank will meet the approval of the government, how often and under what circumstances the attendance of an inspector can be secured to release the product from the tank and what sort of poison and how much must be added to the alcohol in order to make it available for use and exempt from tax. Certain other facts—the price of denaturing substances, for instance, and the difference between grain (or ethyl) alcohol and wood (or methyl) alcohol—any intelligent farmer can ascertain for himself. Even then, however, it will be injudicious to go ahead without suitable instruction in regard to methods and materials. Practically all kind of vegetation, including such un-

promising articles as sawdust and dry chips, can by suitable treatment, be made to yield ethyl alcohol, but in most cases the quantity would be too small to pay. Besides, what might be an economical source in one region might prove wastefully expensive elsewhere. Without helpful guidance in the choice of materials, therefore, needlessly disheartening mistakes may be made.

Foreseeing this possibility, Mr. Hansbrough has suggested to the secretary of agriculture that a circular be prepared for the enlightenment of such farmers as wish to attempt distillation. The plan is an excellent one. The senator from North Dakota is doubtless aware that documents relating to the subject have already been issued under Secretary Wilson's auspices, but he may think that they are so voluminous as to be confusing to the novice. Other men entertain that opinion, at any rate, and have wished for a more succinct presentation of the matter and for something more specific in the way of advice. It is thought probable that the internal revenue bureau will issue its new regulations about July 1, or two months before the law goes into effect. If Secretary Wilson saw his way clear to comply with Senator Hansbrough's request at that time or even sooner he would unquestionably help those interests for the promotion of which his department of the government was established.—Ex.
