20,000 CLUB MEETS

Constitution and By-Laws Adopted. Charter Applied For.

A good attendance was had at the call meeting of the Hereford 20,000 Club at the court house Monday evening. This was an occasion of more than usual importance inasmuch as it was the time for the adoption of by-laws and constitution and adjusting other matters whereby the

Club might be enabled to get down to active business.

In the absence of the president, the meeting was ably presided over by Vice-President Heinbach, who, after the reading of the minutes of the last meeting by the secretary, called for the report of the committee appointed to draft by-laws and constitution. The committee had performed its work and made the report through its chairman, G. A.

F. Parker. In addition to by-laws, a form for a charter was presented which proposed incorporating under the Texas state laws the Hereford 20,000 Commercial Club with no capital stock, all of which was unanimously adopted by the Club with but little discussion.

Under the provisions of the charter, the annual dues of members will be \$5.00, payable in advance, no extra assessment being permitted except by a two-thirds vote of the members.

After some timely and interesting talks, the Chairman got busy arranging the details for some immediate work for our city. An advertising committee, composed of B. H. Smith, L. A. Baskin and J. Ray, was appointed to procure suitable badge buttons and provide such other advertising as was thought best.

While the principal part of the details of the business will be given the Board of Directors for adjustment, yet the Club will meet in regular monthly sessions to discuss questions of general interest.

The meeting adjourned at a late hour, everyone feeling that a part of his duty was to talk and work for the betterment of Hereford.

RAILROAD NEWS

Grading Will Soon be Completed. Bridge Material, Ties and Steel Ordered.

Hans Helland, chief engineer of the Panhandle Short Line Railroad, in conversation with a Brand representative this week, gave out some important railroad news. He stated that his surveying corps had passed through Castro county and were now working south of the new townsite of Norfleet in Hale county, and would finish the survey to Stanton, on the Texas & Pacific, in three or four weeks.

He further stated that the contractors had six outfits at work on the line between Hereford and Dimmitt, using in the neighborhood of one hundred teams. Most of the elevating has been done and all of the grading will be completed by the last of July or the first of August.

Bridge material has been ordered for the large bridges across the Tierra Blanco river and Frio creek, and also for the smaller bridges and culverts between Hereford and Dimmitt. Cross-ties and steel have been ordered for the new road and are expected to be on the ground within a short time.

The citizens of Seminole in Gaines county have subscribed \$30,000 for the grading through their county.

Trip to Clovis.

The following citizens of Hereford made a flying automobile trip last Saturday to the new town of Clovis, the new Santa Fe division point about eight miles west of Texico in New Mexico: Gene Turrentine, C. E. Edwards, M. A. Lamkin, J. P. Rhodes, Sam Brunk, Mr. Furche, H. F. Mitchell, J. F. Collup, Mr. North and Con Schrimsher.

The trip was made in Edwards & Lamkin's Ford and McDonald's Winton machines, and the round trip of

129 miles was made in less than a day. A number of the party invested in Clovis residence lots.

WILL MAKE TWELVE BUSHELS

So Says Mr. Mollenhour After a Careful Survey of the Situation.

A Brand representative was accosted by our friend, J. S. Mollenhour, this week and authorized us to say to the public that both his large threshing outfits are now in tip-top shape and he is in every particular ready to begin threshing this year's small grain crop.

Mr. Mollenhour has recently made

a more or less thorough investigation of the wheat and oat crop with a view to ascertaining more accurately what would be the extent of the work to be done during the threshing season. He tells us that as far as his investigation has gone, he is thoroughly convinced that Deaf Smith county will average twelve bushels of wheat this year, some crops of course going lower and some higher than these figures.

When asked what would be the extent of the crop this year as com-

pared with last, Mr. Mollenhour stated that in his opinion we would ship 150 cars this season, whereas we only shipped about 75 cars last season. At any rate, the small grain is decidedly better than it was expected to be a week or so ago and it is safe to say that Deaf Smith and Castro counties will not only lead all the Panhandle country but we are told that the prospects here are better than in any other portion of the grain belt.

He was never conscious though he lived 54 hours. Leslie had his back to the gate and did not see how it occurred. On the gate about fifteen inches from the ground were two prints of the hammer, and eight inches lower the hammer struck the lower cross-piece of the gate and knocked a piece out of it. Evidently the pistol fired when it struck the cross-piece, as the gate was powder

A Visitor's Observation.
Editor of the BRAND:-

Being a visitor in Hereford for some time I feel that a few words from me might be of benefit. I think Hereford has a very bright future and in a few years will be a great commercial center and distributing point for the whole Panhandle district. You have a very rich soil and the lay of the country is certainly magnificent. You are attracting a wealthy class of people to your midst, and some beautiful homes are being erected here. One thing I wish to call your attention to, however, and I would like to make it forcible as possible. Dewey Avenue, which is your main business street, is macadamised and could be made a very fine street. You are now erecting several good business blocks on this thoroughfare and put-down cement sidewalks. It seems to be the custom of your contractors to leave material and tools scattered about most any place on the street,

and at times, it looks more like Hogan's back alley than the principal business street of a town of 4000 people. If you have a city marshall it is his duty to notify these contractors to keep things in a more tidy condition while they are at work, and when they have finished a job to clean all their litter up after them. People in the North and East who are coming down here in quest of a new home are not used to seeing the main business street of a town all strewn with brick bats, pieces of lumber, piles of gravel and sand, waste paper etc. These things all have a tendency to impress these new comers badly; and I would advise that the city authorities see to it that your main business street, at least, is kept spink and span all the time. Contractors can be tidy and neat about their work just the same as merchants, housekeepers etc. And if your officers will speak to them about it in the proper way, you will soon see a marked change.

Three pieces were inspected, two of which had been cultivated by the usual method of farming, the yield of which will not exceed 10 and 12 bushels per acre. The last field inspected had been cultivated according to modern methods, and after a most thorough examination, the entire company decided that the field would make 20 or 25 bushels per acre. The stalks are of good height and the crop can be easily cut and bound by an ordinary harvester; the spikes are large and grains well developed. This crop fully demonstrates what can be done in the Panhandle when proper and scientific methods are used, and our Mayor is to be congratulated for giving this demonstration.

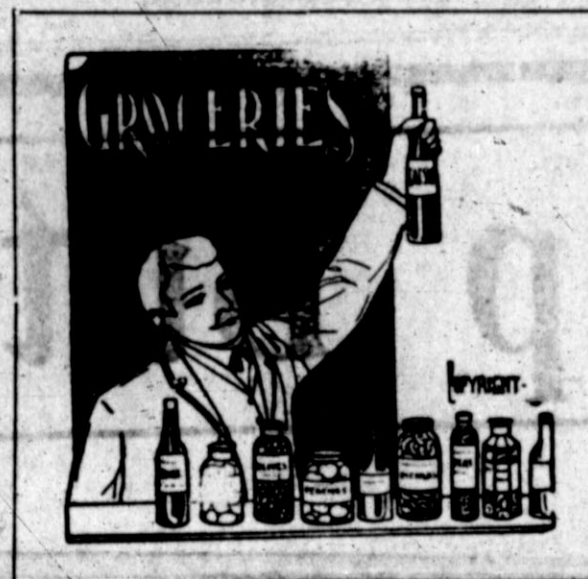

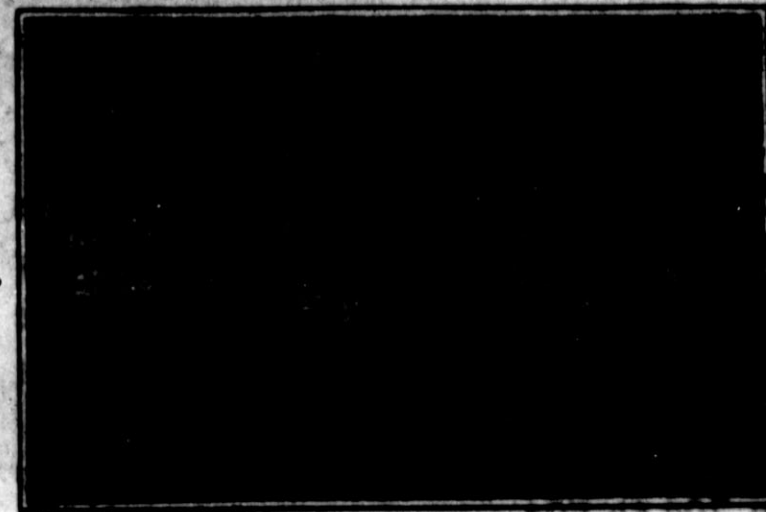
