

Scientific Feeding Demonstrated By C. G. Robbins, Hereford Farmer Who Gets Results

One of the finest shipments of grade cattle made this year from Hereford was made last month by C. G. Robbins, who runs a model irrigated farm one mile west of town. He fed 79 head of steers for about 250 days, and during that time the average weight per head increased more than half.

Mr. Robbins purchased the steers in November of last year. He began his feeding schedule on Thanksgiving and continued it until August of this year. The average weight when he bought the lot was about 800 pounds; he sold them at an average of 1324 pounds.







He cannot use it for hay unless it is used as a nurse crop for legumes and grasses and cut, green, or is grown in a mixture containing at least 25 percent by weight of winter legumes.
