REA Lines Out As Result of Substation Fire

Leo Forrest, REA manager, stated that the failure of the insulator might have been caused by lightning damage in Monday's electrical storm, with the full effects failing to develop until the next day.

Fire Causes Estimated \$5,000 Property Loss

County Tops Quota in 7th War Loan Sale

Deaf Smith County topped its 7th War Loan quota by more than \$85,000, it was announced this week by Robert L. Thompson, war loan chairman, who stated that total sales amounted to \$465,178.71.

E Bond sales also exceeded the quota, Thompson said, reporting total purchases of \$264,623.75 by E bond buyers. This was \$14,623.75 over the \$250,000 quota—the largest quota yet set in any bond drive—and represents a record investment by individual purchasers.

"On behalf of the county war finance committee, I extend sincere appreciation to every person and organization who has aided us in reaching our quota," Thompson said, pointing out that the record set up by the county is proof of home-front support of the war effort and is aiding in preservation of a stable economy.

FSA Announces Farm Purchase Loans for Vets

Congress has increased the loan authority of the Farm Security Administration by \$25,000,000 to permit loans to returning veterans for the purchase of family-sized farms and ranches. The loans are to be made under the provisions of the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act through which approximately 37,000 loans to tenant farmers have been successfully completed since the program was authorized by Congress in 1937.

A committee composed of experienced farmers in each county will assist in the administration of this program by determining (1) eligibility of the applicant with respect to farm background, experience and likelihood of success as a farmer; (2) the adequacy of the farm to provide a living for the family and to pay off the loan; and (3) the soundness of the committee in reviewing the applicant's qualifications and the soundness of the loan is considered extremely important by Farm Security Administration officials in protecting veterans from entering into an unsound operation.

Farm Machinery Purchase Priority Goes to Veterans

Further details on the manner in which veterans may secure preference ratings for the purchase of new farm equipment were received this week at the County AAA office, which will handle the new priority program for honorably discharged veterans of this war.

According to instructions from the war food administration, any veteran who owns a farm, operates a farm as a tenant or who is a sharecropper may apply for a veterans preference certificate for the purchase of any new item of farm equipment (except repair parts).

The veteran must show that he has been unable to purchase the equipment through regular trade channels, and the county ACA committee may then issue him a certificate for purchase of the desired machinery. Veterans certificate should have a priority rating above (Continued on Page 12)

Lineman Suffers Electric Burns

Burns on the thumb and two fingers of his right hand and on both feet were suffered by M. H. (Hap) Wiseman, Southwestern Public Service Co. lineman, last Tuesday when he received a shock from a 12,500 volt electric line near the O. E. Sherman place, northeast of Hereford.

Wiseman was on a pole, connecting a secondary transformer at the Sherman irrigation well, when he dropped a jumper which connected with a hot wire, burning his hand and feet and knocking him unconscious for a moment. As he reports it, he "just crumpled up and sat down" on the transformer and was in that position when he became conscious. "Fuzzy" Farris, Wiseman's assistant, was on another pole and saw the accident happen, and had started up to rescue Wiseman, who was, however, able to climb down from the pole by himself.

The first truck of Hereford potatoes of the 1945 season were shipped from here to Dallas Tuesday and two more loads moved out yesterday, it was announced by H. V. Hennen, manager of the Hereford Potato Growers processing plant.

The potatoes, raised by John and George Paetzold, were Bliss Triumphs and tested 83 per cent No. 1's, with the rest of the load testing 15 per cent No. 2's and two per cent culls. The exceptionally high quality of the first potatoes brought in bears out early predictions of growers and processors that the 1945 spud harvest will set a record for both quality and quantity, with the largest seeded acreage in the history of the Hereford potato district.

Many new growers, both local farmers entering the potato business for the first time, and Idaho growers who have moved to Hereford this year, are looking forward to good yields and the prospects on most potato acreages are bright.

Fence Row Levelling Program Scheduled

Farmers desiring to have fence rows levelled may now arrange for the work by getting in touch with the county AAA office, where a schedule for such work is being outlined.

The work will be done by the same crew which is now building tanks and dams in this county.

County AAA Aids In Distribution Of Phosphates

Distribution of a carload of 20 per cent super phosphate is now being supervised by the County AAA Committee as part of a conservation program not previously practiced in the Panhandle territory.

The fertilizer is being distributed for use in the aid of full seeding of perennial or biennial legumes and summer pasture crops and is expected to be used here principally in the cultivation of alfalfa. Farmers desiring to buy some of the fertilizer are asked first to see County Agent A. R. Bateman for instructions on application and use.

According to the plan as outlined this week, the phosphate will cost the farmer 24 cents per hundred pounds, payable on delivery. In addition, the farmer makes a request at the county AAA office for payment of the remainder of the price—\$1.05 per hundred, which is the payment rate for application of the fertilizer. Thus, the original 24 cents per hundred remains the only actual money cost to the farmer.

Week's Rain Totals Third of Inch

Rain continued to make its appearance on the small instalment plan in Hereford this week as a total of .32 of an inch was reported at the city weather station.

Showers Monday afternoon amounted to .07 of an inch and the rainfall early Thursday morning measured .25 of an inch.

The earlier rain was reported heavier to the east of Hereford and scattered moisture has delayed the completion of what harvest and stopped plowing for a short time on some farms in the area.

## SONS In the Service

Jennings of Nevada  
ABOARD THE USS NEVADA IN THE PACIFIC—Robert N. Jennings, seaman, second class, USNR, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Jennings, of Hereford, is serving aboard this battleship which has written a blazing

chapter in the history of World War II.

The only battleship to get under way during the Jap attack on Pearl Harbor she cleared the blazing USS ARIZONA and through a sea of flaming oil, passed by the USS OKLAHOMA. Nearing the Pearl Harbor entrance channel, she avoided Jap planes attempts to sink her and block the channel, by running aground in shallow water.

Raised from the bottom, she put in at a West Coast port for repairs in April, 1942. From here the NEVADA supported troop landing operations at Atbu, and then steamed to European waters to participate in the Normandy invasion. After helping silence the German shore batteries, she steamed into the Mediterranean for the invasion of southern France in August,

### Pacific an American Duck Pond

ABOARD A U. S. AIRCRAFT CARRIER IN THE PACIFIC (Delayed)—Joe Weldon Beene, ship's cook, first class, USNR, whose grandmother, Mrs. J. W. Beene, lives in Hereford, learned how completely the Pacific has been transformed into an American duck pond today when his ship, one of the Navy's mightiest carriers, steamed toward the Jap homeland, knocked on the door—and got no answer.

Belated antiaircraft fire greeted this carrier's planes when they struck the key Jap naval air station at Kanoya in southern Kyushu, but not a Jap dared take to the air or to the sea to meet the American challenge.

This carrier's initiation into the combat area had long been awaited by her crew and her Captain. Yesterday the rumors began to circulate that this was to be "the" day.

That something was in the wind was indicated by the massed carriers, battleship, cruisers and destroyers churning up the Pacific. Crewmen remained outwardly calm. They checked battle gear and wrote thoughtful letters home, but for the most part they went about their tasks as usual. They shined shoes, stole brief naps, tried to bribe extra pie from the baker or merely sat around and talked.

This morning things began to happen. The call for "general quarters" brought men racing to battle stations. Plane captains okayed the planes which had been earmarked to protect the Fleet overhead while others dropped visiting cards on Kyushu.

Lookouts scanned the horizon, gunners hugged their cannon, flight deck crew put-putted around in tiny gasoline jalopies attending to last minute details and plane directors coaxed the Hellcats into the air.

Hours went by. Finally the planes returned and the sun

Tomato fruit worms are putting in their appearance. They are greenish or brownish striped, feed on tomatoes, beans, peppers and sweet corn. Dust with equal parts cryolite or calcium arsenate and sulphur every two weeks until fruit is half grown. Then change over to dusting sulphur and rotenone.

Frequent light sprinkling of the garden is bad practice. If water is to be applied, the garden should be thoroughly and deeply soaked, as by a fairly heavy rain, and watered again only when the soil shows signs of becoming dry.

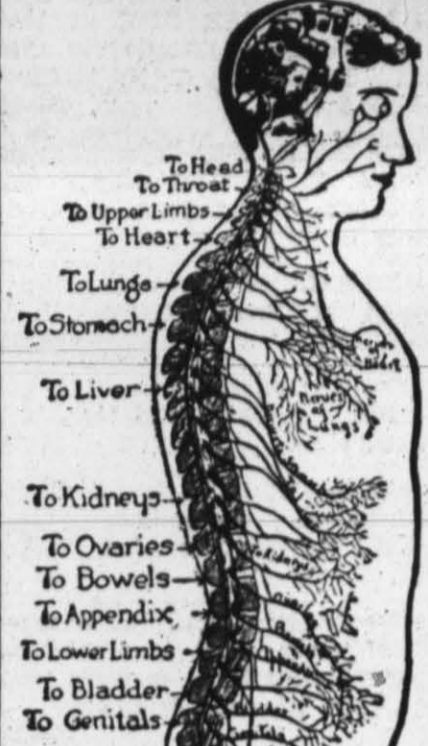

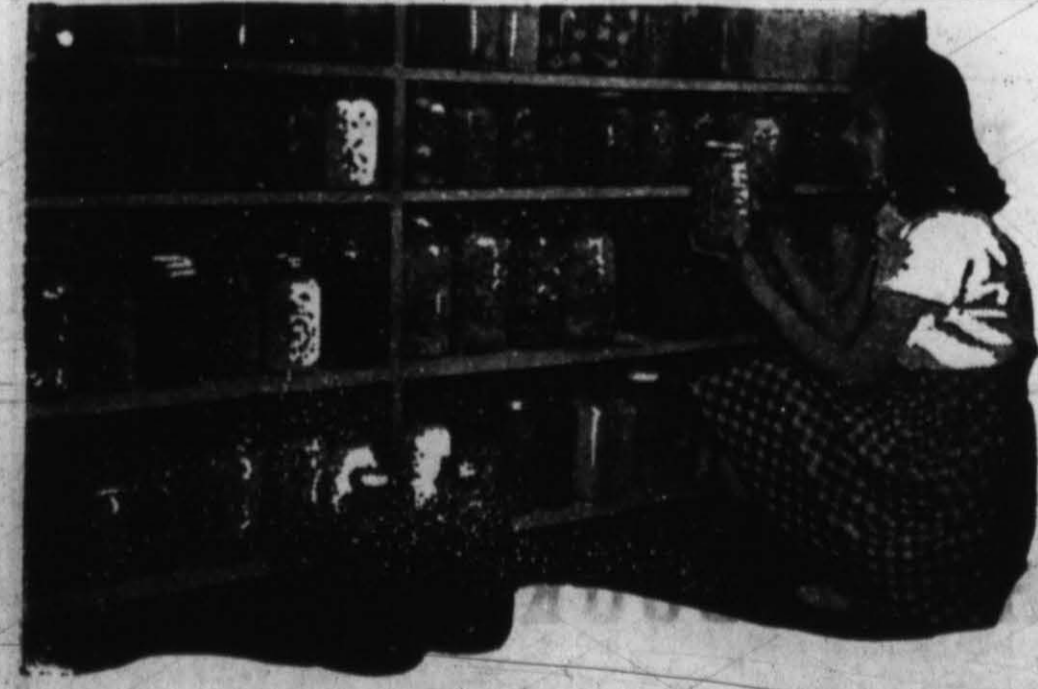

### Winfrey Made D-Day Landing, Fought To Czechoslovakia Through Naziland

Pfc. L. W. Winfrey, who was in one of the first assault waves to hit the Normandy beach in June, 1944, has recently written his wife a rapid-fire account of his experiences starting with the night before the invasion when, as he says, "the Jerries came over and bombed hell out of us. One bomb just missed our boat, and the way the old tub rocked I thought it was going to sink."

Of the actual landing, he says that no hits were scored by the German artillery on his landing boat, which hit bottom about 300 yards from shore, from where Winfrey's gun crew drove the truck and gun onto the beach and were in firing position by 10:25 on the morning of June 7. "We didn't sleep any the first night or for several to come," Winfrey says, adding, "I've never heard so much noise."

"We fought about 30 days without any rest," Winfrey recounts. "Some days we fired over 1,200 rounds," and he recalls the hedge-row fighting in France as some of the bitterest he experienced and the fight for Hill 122 as one of the toughest in the entire campaign, with a three-day battle for its possession won first by the Yanks, who later lost the hill to the counter-attacking Nazis and then retook it when fresh forces arrived on the scene.

The St. Lo breakthrough, opened up by bombing of the German lines by American B-24's and B-17's presaged the race across France, and was climaxed for Winfrey when a German Panzer outfit hit his unit from the rear and the Nazis were within a quarter of a mile before the Americans got their guns turned around.

A Christmas rest for Winfrey was interrupted when his outfit was sent to Belgium to help stem the advancing tide of the German advance. The weather combined with the natural hazards of war made the Ardennes forest drive tough—and the breaking of the Seigfried line was no easier, Winfrey reports.

"We were fighting in Czechoslovakia when we met the Russians," Winfrey concludes. "We sure were glad to see them and the end of the war."

Pvt. Winfrey was with the First Army in the initial landings but later transferred to Patton's Third Army, where he says the 90th and 4th Armored divisions always worked together. Winfrey is in the Field Artillery of the 90th Division. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. F. C. Winfrey and his wife is the former Miss Edith Standifer.

## Use Caution in Penicillin Dose For Livestock

Austin, Texas — News that penicillin, the "wonder drug", has now been released for treating livestock as well as human diseases, brought a word of caution to stock producers today from livestock health authorities.

"Penicillin has very definite limitations, and there is danger that many livestock owners

will be carried away by all the publicity it has received and endanger the recovery of sick animals by not knowing these limitations," says an announcement released here today by officials of the American Foundation for Animal Health. "Like the sulfa drugs, this new drug is effective against some types of disease-producing germs, but wholly useless against others. For this reason, a veterinarian should check any sick animals before penicillin is prescribed. The technique of penicillin administration is also complicated—it must be given by hypodermic into the vein, or deep in the muscles, and the dosage must be repeated at stated intervals if the drug is to have the full effect through the blood stream."

Foundation authorities pointed out that penicillin is of no value against virus diseases such as hog cholera and sleeping sickness, and that many of its other uses are still subject to further research. They suggested caution in expecting the impossible of it, and care to see that it is used in the right manner.


