Marketing companies with nation-wide outlets are buying in Hereford and other Plains areas to fill the gap between summer and winter harvests from other

truck growing areas. Deaf Smith County expects a 1,000-acre vegetable harvest this fall. The Williams Farms Company of Oxnard, Calif., has contracted for over 400 acres of lettuce and 150 cars of carrots. The company formerly operated only in California.

The Hereford area also provides a large acreage of potatoes. The area, according to John Morrison, production manager for Alexander Marketing Co., permits a two-crop vegetable season if potatoes are planted first, and lettuce or another

crop later. Morrison estimates over 5,000 acres of vegetables grew this year in the million-acre irrigated belt, from Lubbock to Here-

· Acreage next year will be somewhat larger, but Morrison believes the accent will be on "better" rather than "more" farmeven as home gardeners, seem to have a knack for growing vegetables, while some do not. Growers have received more than \$1,000 an acre on some
