Bert Ballengee, President of the Company, then addressed the crowd giving some statistics which indicated that the new plants, when both are completed will serve over one million citizens of the area. SPS now serves more than one million people in the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, with southwestern Kansas, Southwestern New Mexico and the Oklahoma panhandle thrown in.

Whiteface, Friona, Hereford, Bovina, Olton and several others. Each dignitary in turn was allowed to throw the switch giving the power to his particular city or area.

The tour of Tolk Station Unit #1 began with a guided bus tour which included the site of the plant diesel which is used for start ups, huge pedestals which are used for the turbine generators which will be placed on Unit 2, various buildings and structures that make up the total plant. Of particular interest was the bag house, which according to tour guides contains 13,000 30 by 1 foot bags made from cloth and fiberglass, these bags contain the fly ash from the plant which is currently being sold at a very good price and then the profits used to offset customer charges.

Tolk now has about 307 thousand tons of coal in storage and according to guides, this amount would last approximately 75 days. The coal is low-sulfer and is shipped from Wyoming. The low sulfer content makes the coal fly ash worth more when it is sold back to construction companies for use in paving and mixing with concrete products. Visitors were also shown the site of the actual coal dumping facilites, where cars are dumped by Cont. Page 8, Col. 6





We normally get about a 30 per cent response rate on the election, which is rather poor, actually. Hopefully year that per cent can be improved upon. It costs you nothing to vote and might help your county op-eration if you do," the Director stated.

rotating on a swivel about 180 degrees, literally turned upside down to empty them into the pits. From the pits, the coal is transferred to the coal pile by conveyors where it is stored until needed.

Following the bus tour, 300 visitors were served a catered meal and then continued on the inside tour of the plant, seeing such things as the coal pulverizers, the boilers, the turbine generator, along with miles of steam piping and the plant control room which houses all the equipment that operates the plant.

Bert Ballengee, president and chief operating officer of SPS said that the detailed planning and design for the Tolk Station which is named after former SPS board chairmen Roy Tolk began in 1975.

General construction contractor for the plant is Missouri Valley, Inc. of Amarillo; the electrical contract work was done by Budwine Service Electric of Carlsbad and several other companies were contracted to do specific work. After more than four years, and at times over 800 workers on the job, Tolk Unit one is complete, except for a little spit and polish.

Only 150 people are re-

quired to operate the Tolk plant on a 24 hour basis. The control room is manned around the clock by enginneers and specialists who are entrusted with the \$228.2 million dollar plant.

"We are very proud of the fact that the unit came on-line on schedule and within the planned budget," Ballangee stated. We at SPS are especially proud that Tolk, like our other coal fired station near Amarillo was completed for less than the national average cost for coal fired plants. Obviously, when we can perform like that, we're saving our customers a lot of money.

"Our long range fore-sight in 1970 of the rise in the cost of natural gas led us to the coal plants. It has always amazed me that we can buy coal and have it shipped from Wyoming at a cost less than what natural gas can be piped in only a few miles away,' the Chairman stated. "So, one of the many ways we are helping our customers or, as we express it in our Company's theme, partners -managing elec make the difference," electricity,

The Company's theme is "You and SPS, partners managing electricity make the difference.'
