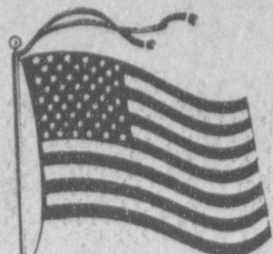

## Advance Cotton Cash Sales Contracts Fold

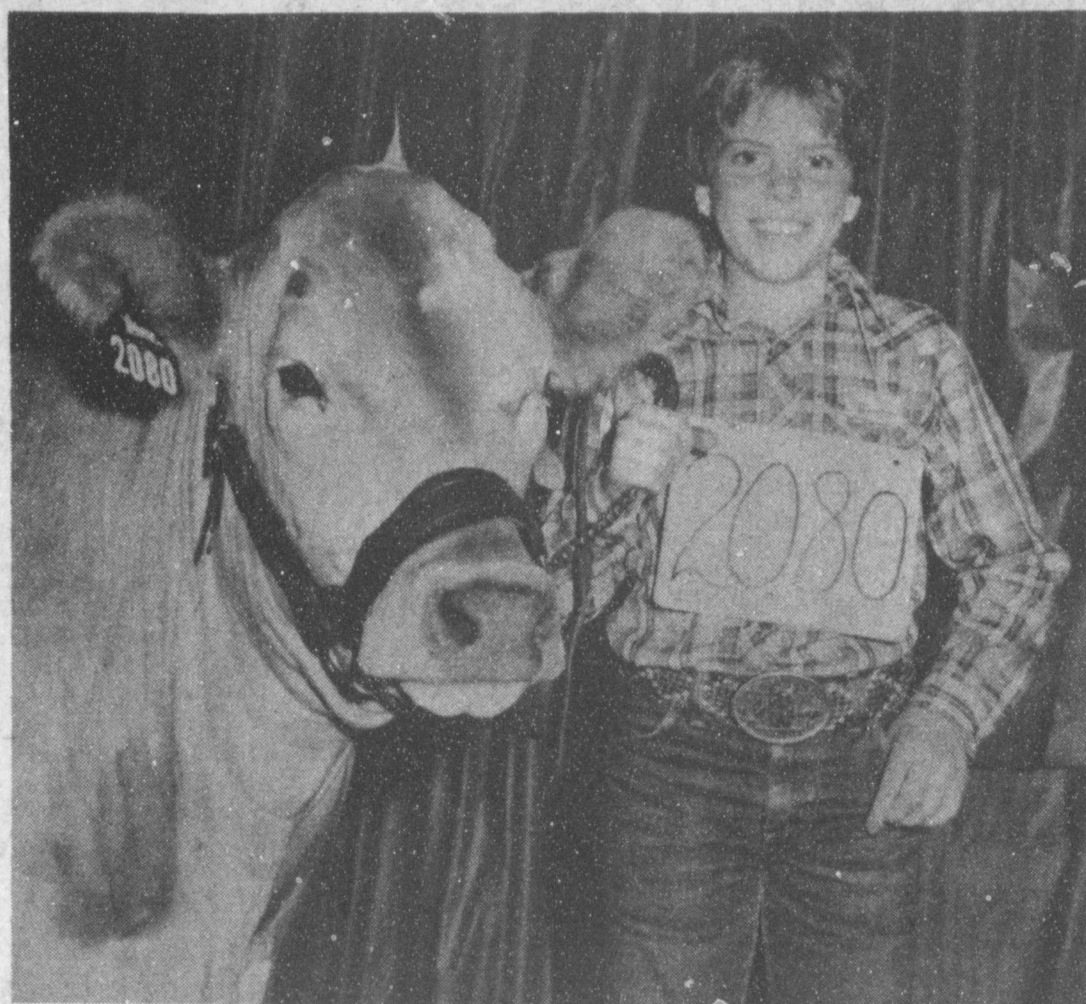
### Around Muleshoe

## Local Youths Capture Livestock At Houston

Two young men from Muleshoe, Russell Brown, 13 and Todd Bessire, 14 were recently winners of a \$600 calf purchase certificate sponsored by their individual sponsors at the 1983 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo's March 5 evening performance.

Brown's calf was sponsored by Harvey and Judy Hayship and Bessire's calf was sponsored by the Heritage Bank. Muleshoe has a winner most every year. The calf scramble is a rough, tough action-filled event that is the highlight of every rodeo performance. In the event, a dozen or so wild, young calves are turned loose in the vast Astrodome arena to be pursued by two dozen or so eager youngsters. To win, the calf must be caught, haltered and brought back across a finish line.

The winner then receives a calf purchase certificate valued at \$600 to be used toward the purchase of a registered beef or dairy heifer. These certificates are donated by Houston area businesses, firms and individuals who believe in the programs sponsored by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. ## Local Producers Show Disappointment

Reports of the 'fold-up' of the Plains Cotton Cooperative Association of Lubbock, the resulting outcome would seem to be that the expected cash in advance forward contracts that could have pumped over \$50 million into the hands of Texas cotton farmers are virtually not worth the paper they have been written on.

Officials of PCCA say that forward contracts that have already been sold will be honored. "However," according to one official of the PCCA, "no more of the contracts will be sold." Questions regarding the change in procedure have failed to yield any solid answers as yet. Some farmers and cotton businessmen felt the offer to be a way out of a desperate

situation, since a forward contract allows a farmer to agree to sell cotton now for a designated price even though he does not yet have physical possession of the commodity. The cancellation of these proposed contracts was revealed by a Journal news source shortly after noon on Friday.

Danny May, an official with the PCCA verified the report of the contract cancellation with Journal reporters on Friday afternoon. May explained that the Plains Cotton Cooperative Association felt that it was time for them to take a look at their outlays and to see how they stand in balance. "This thing has caught like wildfire, and has been going great, we just have to be careful so as to be able to recoup our losses if we have any. They have been contracting about two weeks, but the cash option has been in operation since last Friday only.

We will be making a decision in the near future as to the continuance of the program. We have booked a large amount of bales not just locally, but all throughout the country. Our staying in this business is a

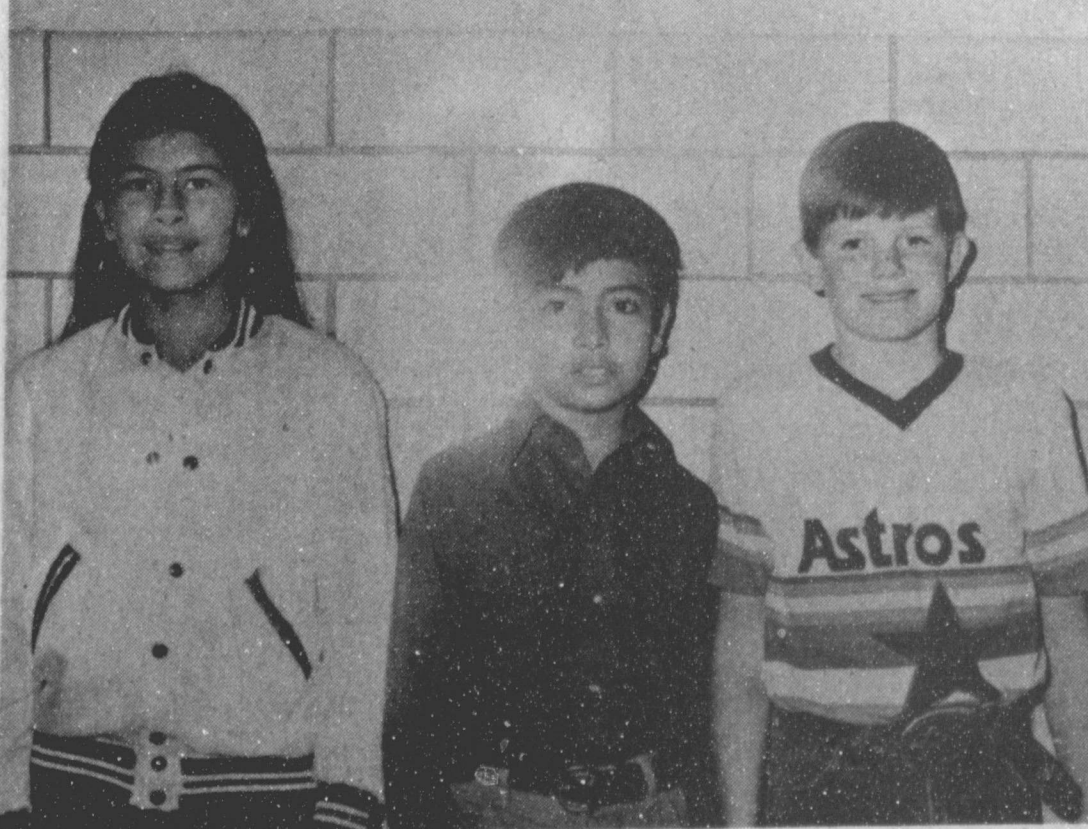

**New glaucoma drug eliminates side effects**  
**COLLEGE STATION** — Medical researchers at Texas A&M University have successfully used a mirror image of a popular glaucoma drug to develop a new treatment that apparently eliminates dangerous side effects. The new drug is D-timolol. Its structure is an exact mirror image of L-timolol, an agent first marketed under the trade name Timoptic.

Glaucoma is caused by a buildup of pressure in the chambers of the eye and primarily affects persons over age 40. People can develop the ailment as young as age 20, said Dr. George C. Y. Chiou, head of medical pharmacology. Untreated, the pressure deadens the optic nerve end and causes blindness.

Timolol inhibits formation of aqueous humor, a transparent liquid contained in the chambers of the eye, and reduces intraocular pressure, said Chiou. But large scale clinical studies have revealed that L-timolol eye drops can cause cardiovascular disturbances in patients with a history of asthma or bronchitis.

According to the researchers, D-timolol does not appear to cause such side effects.

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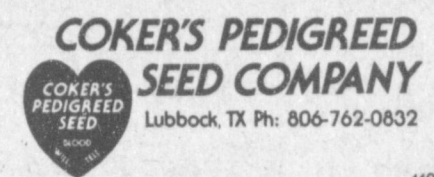

Police do not carry guns. They carry screwdrivers, to take your license plate.

It takes all day to do your grocery shopping. You go to a central market for vegetables, poultry market for chickens, eggs; a meat market for meat and grocery stores for staples.

To take care of the Americans that are living there they do import canned pumpkin, cranberry sauce and turkeys for Thanksgiving and Christmas. They export bananas. Mrs. Gage said "The medical care there is excellent."

After ten years of living there. The Costa Rica government bought their ranch for a park. Mrs. Gage said that she would never forget their stay in Costa Rica and close friends they made. But they are happy to be back in the U.S.

Mark Reilly is a guy who has cerebral palsy and uses a wheelchair which he calls his "Cruiser." Mark is limited in some ways, but boy does he play checkers like a champ!

Brenda Dubrowski is "normal" ... except she is a little bit overweight! She's a good friend of all the other kids and often

joins in activities with one or more of them.

Ellen Jane Peterson is a veterinarian's assistant. She is 17 years old, and has Down's Syndrome. Ellen Jane is really good at her job.

Melody James is another "normal" kid. She wears glasses, and has four brothers who tease her a lot. Melody enjoys playing checkers with Mark.

Mandy Puccini is deaf. She knows sign language and loves to dance. She has two sisters who can hear and a cat named Sneakers. Mandy taught the teachers at the program some sign language.

The "Kids on the Block" are a group of incredible puppets, some handicapped and some not, which help kids to understand different disabilities, and what it's like to have them.

Created by Barbara Aiello, a former teacher of handicapped children, the "Kids on the Block" are three feet tall and wear real kids' clothes and shoes, helping children relate to them and talk to them more freely than they would with adults or other children with disabilities.

According to Ms. Aiello, there are two important goals for the "Kids on the Block." She wants to teach children about handicaps in a "non-threatening and unpreachy fashion." Second, she wants to show non-handicapped children how to develop positive relationships with their handicapped peers. The puppets show them how they can be friends.

The puppets come as a kit including the puppets, props, scripts, and cards. Ms. Aiello writes all of the scripts for the puppets which are developed from the questions and concerns of non-disabled kids. All of the script material is critiqued by disabled children, adults, and parents of disabled children before being incorporated into the kit. The Region XVII Service Center has purchased a kit and they now do programs for schools in the district on Wednesdays. The program is in such demand that they are currently booked into the 1983-84 school year. Ms. Aiello's "Kids on the Block" have appeared on ABC's "Good Morning America," as well as on a CBS television special featuring Gary Burghoff (Radar of M\*A\*S\*H fame).

The Kids are truly animated, entertaining, and appealing. They show that it's okay to be friends with disabled kids, and that the disabled kids have many friends, not just other kids with the same disability. Helping children to develop positive attitudes toward people with handicaps is not an easy job, but thanks to Barbara Aiello and the people at the Region XVII Service Center, it is easier now for local and area educators who have access to the "Kids on the Block."

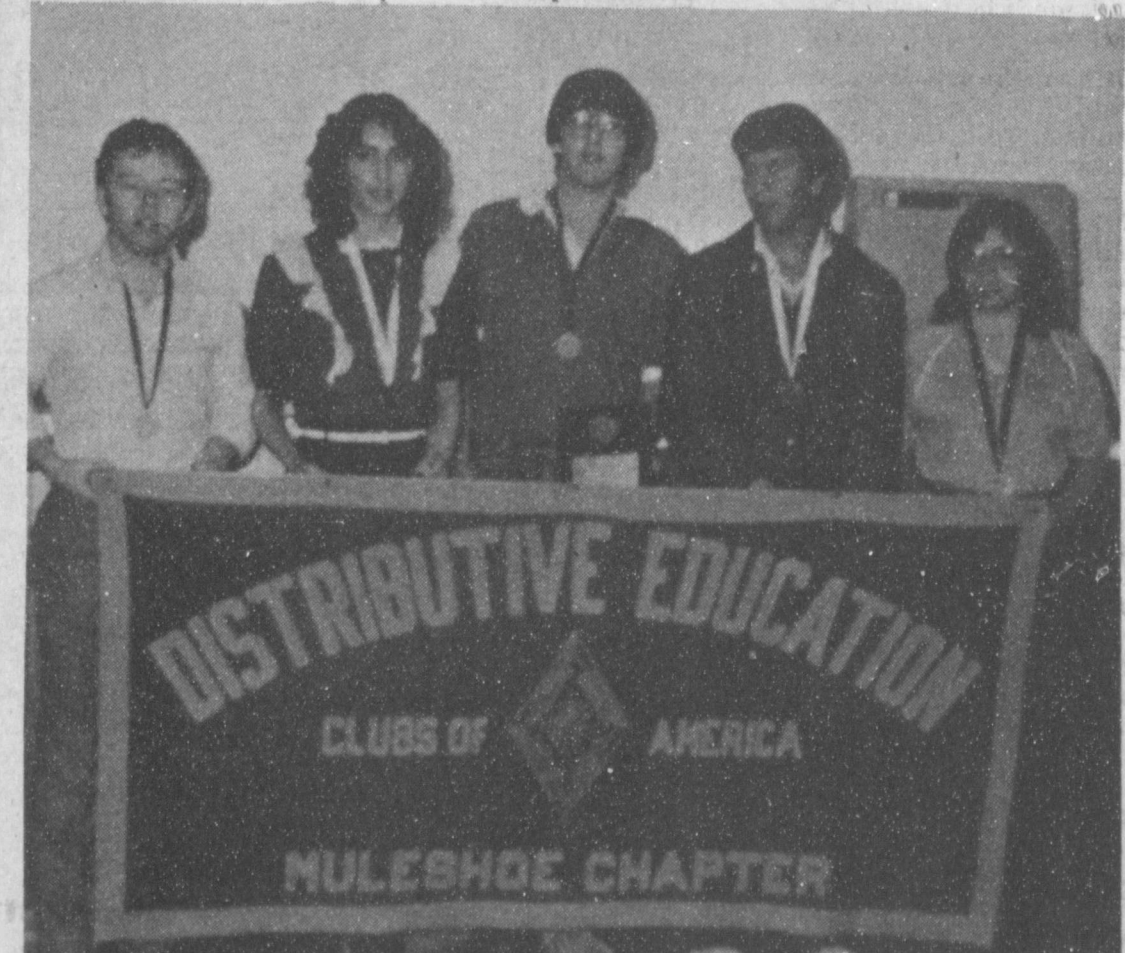

## County Soil Maps Now Available

A second round of snows have helped create nearly excellent soil moisture conditions in the upper 3 feet of most soil profiles throughout the area. The annual soil moisture survey measurements taken by the High Plains Undergrnd Water Conservation District and the Soil Conservation Service between February 14 and 23 of this year, generally indicate the top two feet are at 90% field capacity and the third foot is at nearly 75% of capacity. However the fourth and fifth feet are generally much dryer. This is especially true for marginally irrigated and dryland portions of the Southern High Plains.

Deep soil moisture reserves were depleted last summer and the area has received an average of only 4 to 6 inches of precipitation since harvest, only enough to wet the top two and a half feet of the soil profile. Where plow pans are present they did not appreciably affect the moisture penetration because the snow melt was slow enough to allow infiltration with no runoff.

Even though this year's soil moisture deficits are similar to last years, conditions are better now because 65 to 70% of the moisture is in the top three feet of the profile where the plants need it. Most of the deficit is in the fourth and fifth feet of the profile.

Plant response during the early growing season should be good. However, once the plant uses the upper level moisture, there is currently no reserve deep soil moisture to carry it through an extended dry period.

The soil moisture deficit map is published as a tool to give producers a better picture of soil moisture reserves over the entire area. It can help them make more informed irrigation decisions and help avoid both over and under irrigating in the Spring. It can also give an indication of potential production.

The map's soil moisture deficit readings are a measure of how much water is still needed to wet the soil in the crop root zone to field capacity. The sample indicates general trends over the area, but does not predict exact soil moisture conditions on any given farm. Each landowner needs to check his individual farm soil moisture to determine its water needs.

The survey is a cooper-

manager.

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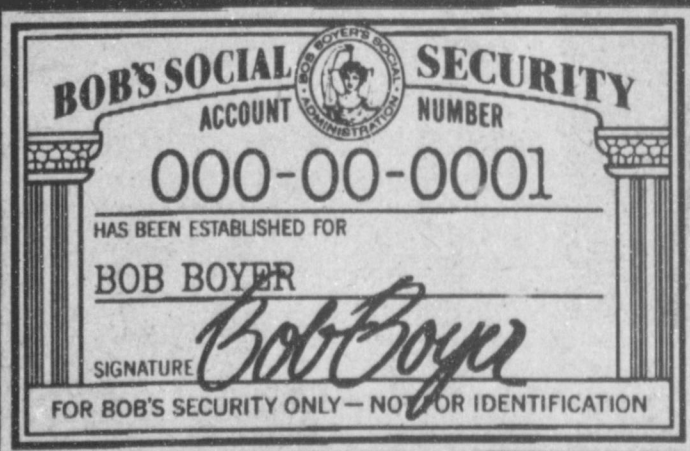

## Study Shows School Lunch Application Effective Against Fraud

The new school lunch application forms which schools began using last year are helping to curb fraud and abuse in the National School Lunch Program, according to a study released today by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Assistant Secretary Mary C. Jarratt said the new application forms resulted in 10 percent fewer applications approved for free meal benefits in schools taking part in the study. In addition, reduced-price eligibility was about 15 percent lower in schools using

the new applications as compared with schools using the prior year's application.

Beginning in the fall of 1981, the law required applications for free and reduced price meal benefits to include the social security numbers of all adult household members and a listing of current income. Previously the applications had required only names, household size, total income and the signature of the parent or guardian.

"While the initial phase of the study was too lim-

ited to allow for a nationwide projection, it looks like the new application process is working effectively against misstatements of income in the school lunch program," Jarratt said. "That means money available for special assistance for free and re-

duced price meals is going to those for whom it was intended—the needy." Savings in lunch reimbursement costs averaged more than four cents per meal. This could mean savings of millions of dollars nationwide each school year, Jarratt said.

The study showed that the new applications resulted in the reporting of an average annual increase in income of more than \$500, suggesting that the new application is at least partially successful in preventing income under-reporting.

The report contains findings from the first year of

a two-year income verification pilot project mandated by Congress in the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981. The study is intended to find ways to prevent and detect the misreporting of income and family size information on school meal applications.

During the first year (school year 1981-82), the test ran in 13 school districts scattered throughout the nation. It evaluated the

effects of quality assurance procedures. The second year of the income verification pilot project is underway in more than 120 school districts this school year. It is testing a range of more complex income documentation and verification procedures in 60 of those sites.

The National School Lunch Program currently serves about 23 million children nationwide. Of

these, about 10 million receive free lunches and about 1.5 million receive reduced price lunches. Eligibility for free or reduced price meals is based on Congressionally mandated income guidelines.
