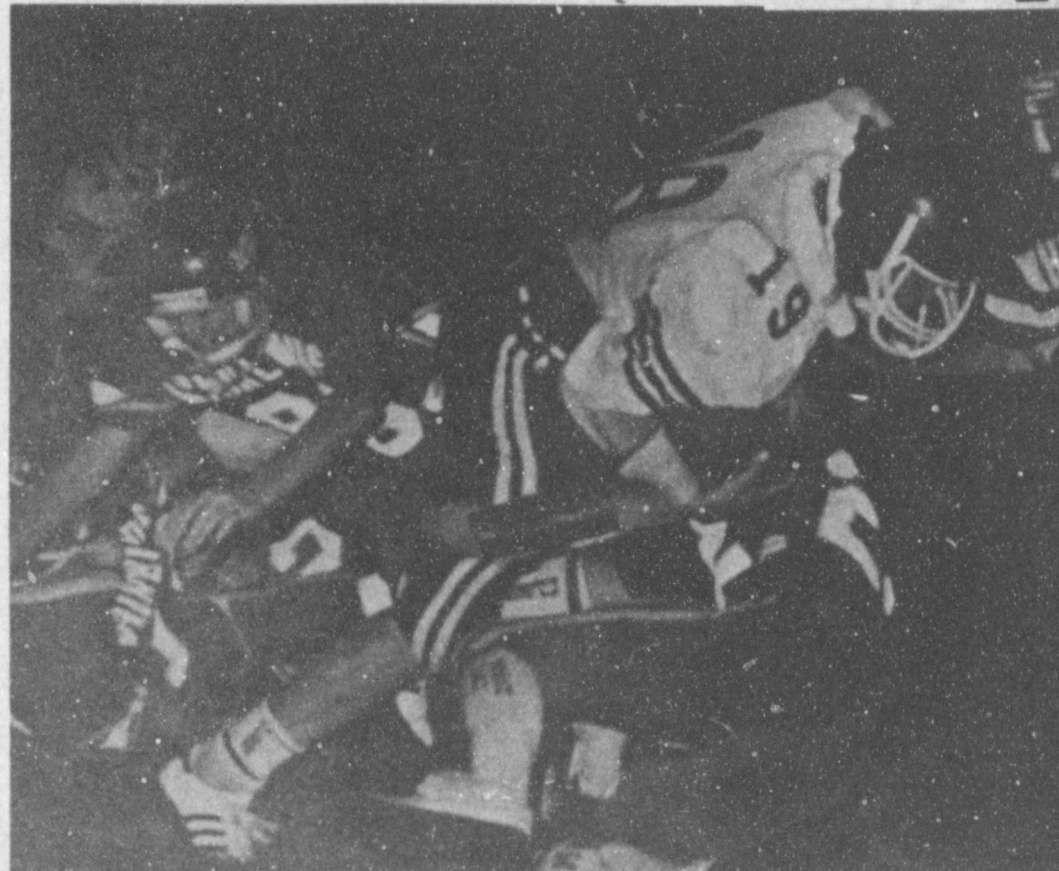

The Federal Land Bank Association of Muleshoe makes long-term real estate loans on farm and ranch and rural residence property in Bailey and Parmer counties.



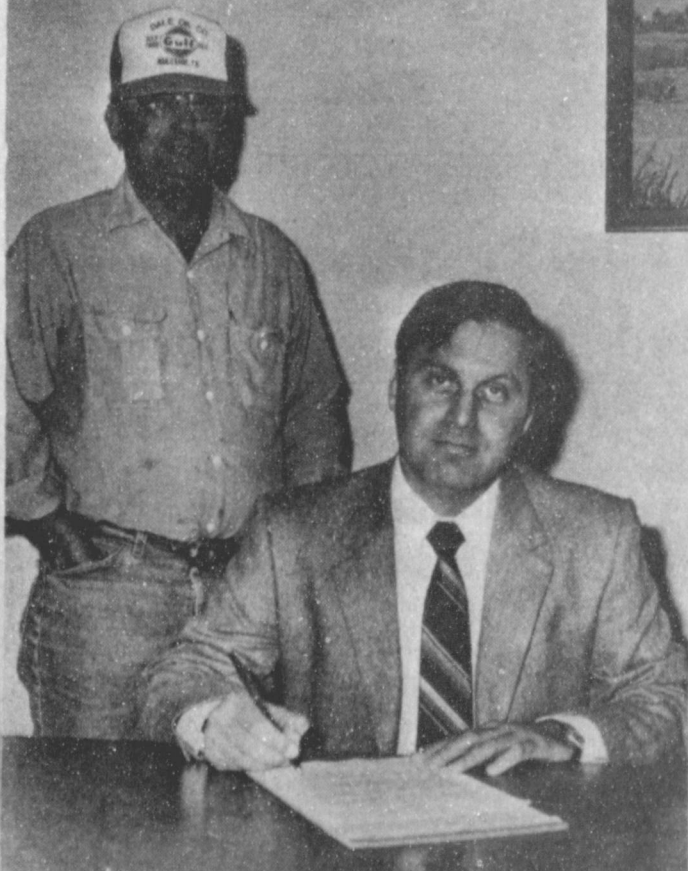

### Five Area Joins Forces On Telephone Access Proposal

The Five Area Telephone Cooperative, along with thirty-four other Independent Telephone Cooperatives and Companies operating in the state, have filed comments and plan to testify before the Texas Public Utility Commission (P.U.C.) in Docket 5113 of the P.U.C. to determine Access Charges to apply within the State of Texas. Hearings will start on the Access Charge Docket on September 12, 1983, in Austin, Texas. These Independent Telephone Cooperatives and Companies are participating in these hearings through the State Association, the Texas State-wide Telephone Cooperative, Inc. (TSTCI), reported Jimmy R. White, chairman of the committee appointed by TSTCI to participate in this hearing. White stated that TSTCI was opposing the position being taken in these hearings by AT&T, Southwestern Bell, General Telephone, Continental Telephone, as well as most other major telephone companies in the state. The major companies are proposing that the P.U.C. adopt the same plan in the State that the Federal Communications Commission (F.C.C.) adopted in February, 1983.

**SAFETY WEEK PROCLAIMED...**County Judge Gordon H. Green has proclaimed September 18-24, 1983 as Farm and Ranch Safety Week in Bailey County, at the request of J. Lewis Dale, Bailey County Farm Bureau President. The Judge stated: "I call upon parents especially to teach their children good safety practices...which will serve them throughout their lives."

Just in case it has slipped your mind, the Bailey County West Plains Fair is scheduled to get underway here in Muleshoe this coming Thursday at the Bailey County Civic Center September 22. It will run through the 24th, with the Bailey County Extension Office and the Muleshoe Rotary Club co-sponsoring.

Fair officials have at least 23 commercial and club entries this year in concession and various other type booths. However, Jeff Smith who is working as a Rotary coordinator says that spaces are still available and will be assigned on a first come, first serve basis. Commercial booths can be had for \$50 for a 8' x 10', \$75 for a 10 x 10 and \$100 for a 12 x 12 booth. Those who desire to obtain one may contact Max King, Jeff Smith or Doran Reynolds.

This year, cash prize drawings will be held on both Friday and Saturday, with the funds coming from the rental money on the booths. On Saturday there will be cash prize drawings at 10 a.m. and 12 p.m. of \$50 each and then at 2 and 4 p.m. the prize will be upped to \$100. Cash drawings on Friday will be at 4 and 6 p.m. for \$50 each and at 8 p.m. for \$100. Be sure and get your name in the hopper - you might be the lucky one.

Fair entries will be taken all day Thursday according to County Agent Spencer Tanksley. Exhibitors may bring in and set up their entries from 9 a.m. until 9 p.m. on Thursday," he said. Judging will be held during the morning hours on Friday and then at 12 noon, exhibits will be open to the public. The doors will close at 8 p.m. on Friday, due to the Mule football game here with Idalou.

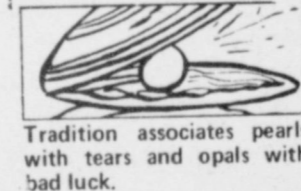

**Over 200 Cases Filed In Courts In Past Two Weeks**

Municipal and Justice Courts in Muleshoe and Bailey County have been full over the past two weeks, with numerous offenses. In Municipal Court alone, Judge Linda Huckaby has processed 52 disposals of cases and filed an additional 112 cases in the last two weeks.

In Municipal Court, 14 cases were disposed of for speeding, seven for violation of open container ordinance, five for public intoxication, three for bad checks, three for no insurance, three for violation of leash law, and three for running stop signs. Two disposals each were made on the following violations: expired MVI's, operating unregistered vehicle, no drivers license, exhibition of acceleration. One case each was paid for the following: minor in possession, driving on wrong side of road, failure to yield right of way, running red light, failure to drive in single lane, failure to appear.

Judge Huckaby filed a total of 112 cases over the two weeks, with 33 of them being for violation of city ordinance (open container). Twenty-eight cases were filed on speeding violations. Seven cases were filed for public intoxication, seven for operating unregistered vehicle, five for no drivers license, five for no liability and five for violation of city ordinance (leash law). Four cases were filed on bad checks, four for no MVI. Two cases each were filed on: running stop sign, invalid MVI, driving on wrong side of road. One case each was filed for expired plates, no valid Texas registration, minor in possession, exhibition of acceleration, running stop sign, failure to yield right of way, fail to control speed and unsafe lane change.

Court was also held in Municipal Court on August 31 with two cases being heard. Lee Murphy charged with alleged theft was found not guilty and Valencia Paez charged with alleged disorderly conduct

was found guilty and fined \$100 plus court costs of \$9. Continuances were granted on three cases. Two forfeited bonds and three entered pleas of guilty. One case was appealed to district court.

Jurors for the Municipal Court trials were Kenneth Henry, Mrs. Lee Magby, Charles Mayhugh, Mrs. Jerry Mudford, Mrs. Clayton Myers and George Nieman.

In Justice Court, Justice of the Peace Jack Bates filed 51 cases for the period between August 30 and September 6, and disposed of 25 cases. Those filed for that period included 21 for speeding five for running stop signs, eight for hunting dove from vehicle, three for over allowed gross weight, expired MVI and three for expired MVI and three for operating an unregistered vehicle. Two cases were filed for no liability insurance and one case each for the following violations: over allowed gross weight, no operators license, public intoxication, littering, failure to drive in single lane, exhibition of

acceleration, fail to yield right of way, expired drivers license and no tail lamps.

Disposals of cases docketed for the August 30 to September 6 period of time included eleven for speeding, six for hunting dove from vehicle, four for expired MVI's and one for the following: failure to drive in single lane, no operators license, over allowed gross weight, public intoxication and one for no tail lamp.

Also in Justice Court for the period from September 6 to September 12, 78 cases were filed and 49 disposals made. speeding cases numbered 46. Other cases filed included four for hunting dove from vehicle, three for over allowed gross weight, expired MVI, violation of drivers license restrictions, no drivers license, and two each for the following: possession of drug paraphernalia, unregistered in Texas, running stop sign, and two for discharging firearms from a public road. One case each was filed for the following

cases: expired drivers license, expired plates, no liability, defective turn signal, failure to drive in single lane, defective mud flaps, defective stop lamps, no motor carrier authority.

Cases disposed of for the 9/6 to 9/12 period included 29 for speeding, four for over allowed gross weight, four for expired MVI, and two for running stop signs and two for hunting dove from a vehicle. One case each was disposed of on the following: violation of drivers license restrictions, no drivers license, operating unregistered in Texas, fail to yield right of way, disregarding passing zone, failure to drive in a single lane, no motor carrier authority and discharging of fire arms from a public roadway.

Alton Parker, Johnny Ziegenfuss and Wayne Peterson have met the requirements as provided by

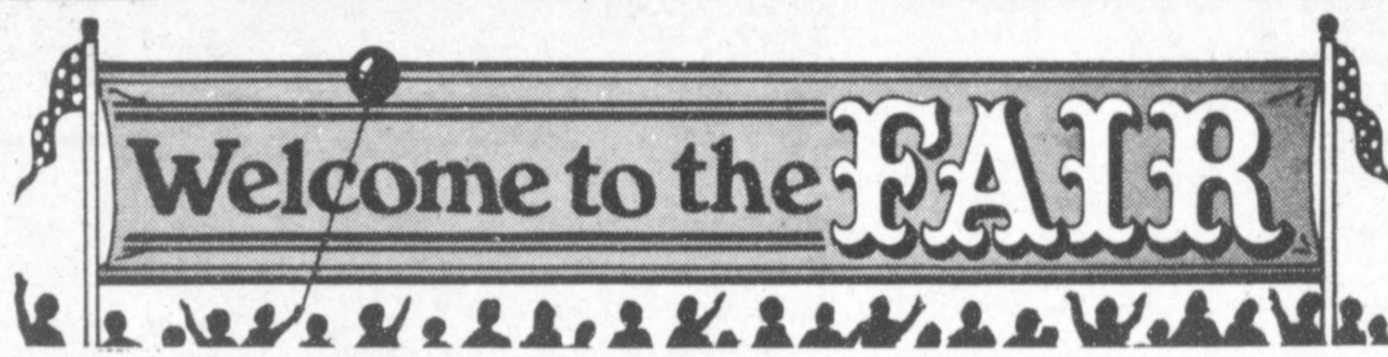
the Texas Volunteer Fire fighters certification program. Motion was made and seconded that the meeting adjourned.
