City Commissioners Approve Reduced Overparking Fines

Parking fines in the city of Hereford were dropped from the present one dollar fee to a 25 cent charge at the request of the Retail Merchants Committee of Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce.

Action on the measure was taken at the Monday night meeting of the City Commission and is to be on a trial basis. A group of 16 Main Street businessmen appeared at the meeting making the request. Don Zimmerman was spokesman for the group.

The new ordinance changing parking fines differed little from the Chamber committee proposal. The only exception by the Commission was the minimum fine after a 10-day period.

Fines for overparking will be 25 cents effective Dec. 20, with each hour overparked as a separate offense.

After a 24-hour period, the fine will be one dollar per ticket. It will be raised to \$5 minimum after a 10-day period.

In the original request by the Chamber of Commerce committee, it was recommended that the fine after the 10-day period be \$2.50. However, commissioners during a discussion of the proposal set the \$5 charge.

In presenting the proposal, Zimmerman prefaced his remarks stating it was a result of the "Town Hall meeting" called in October to discuss problems of the city and its growth.

Among the problems brought out, he noted, was the one concerning parking in the downtown area of the city.

The former public official commented that the one dollar fine for overparking causes a considerable amount of resentment among customers, especially those from outlying areas.

While pointing out that the Retail Merchants Committee proposal was not a petition, but a request, Zimmerman read the committee's proposed schedule of fines.

In addition, he read two letters in answer to queries by the committee on the policies adopted by both Plainview and Clovis regarding overparking fines. He noted that both cities issued courtesy tickets.

However, no mention of courtesy tickets to out-of-county registered vehicles was made in the proposal.

In closing his comments, the spokesman for the merchants group concluded saying that the proposal was made "in order to build up trade from surrounding areas and promote business for Hereford."

In a discussion of the proposal which followed, Mayor Ray Cowser noted that the policy concerning parking me-

AT SPECIAL SESSION

Low Bids On Tax, Revenue Bond Issues Are Approved

Two bond issues totaling \$650,000 were sold as Hereford City

Commission in a special session at 2 p.m. Tuesday opened bids on \$150,000 worth of tax bonds and \$500,000 worth of revenue bonds.

First bid tabulated by the city was on the tax bond issue for street improvements. Bidding the lowest net interest and lowest effect interest rate on the issue was Dallas Rupe and Sons, Inc.

The firm's bid on net interest rate was 3.08577 per cent with net interest on the issue to be \$32,970.

With four firms bidding on the \$500,000 revenue bond issue for water and sewer department improvements, Dittmar and Co., with Underwood Neuhaus Co., Inc., bid low on the two issues.

Net interest on the two issues, according to the bid, was \$207,500 with an effective interest rate of 3.5229 per cent. All four bids on the two bond issues were separated by less than \$1,000 total interest charges.

The three issues sold by the city at the special meeting Tuesday were voted by Hereford residents in a bond election in October.

Funds provided in the two revenue bond issues are to be used for much needed improvements in both water and sewer systems caused by rapid city growth during the past year.

Tax bonds voted by residents are to be used to install storm sewers to handle runoff in the northwestern section of the city, pay the city's share of paving cost on Harrison Highway, and a storm sewer on Highway 60, West.

Among improvements called for in the water revenue bond issues are drilling of three new water wells, construction of a booster station and underground storage facility in the northwestern part of the city and other improvements in pumping facilities.

Projects listed under bonds for the sewer system improvements called for renovation of the disposal plant to meet state requirements, a 15-inch line from Benefield Corners to the plant, and a new 10-inch main from Benefield Corners to the Aikman School area.

Other firms bidding on the tax bonds, net interest and effective interest rates bid, were First National Bank of Fort Worth, 3.3295, 3.0881 per cent; McClung Nickerbocker, 3.3320, 3.1552 per cent; Dittmar and Company, 3.34, 3.2105 per cent; Fort Worth National Bank, 3.4, 3.2394 per cent; First Southwest Co., 3.35, 3.300234 per cent; R. A. Underwood and Co., 3.35, 3.3144 per cent.

ON BOOSTER PUMP

City Approves \$21,425 Bid

Hereford City Commission at its regular meeting Monday approved a low bid of \$21,425.35 for laying of a 12-inch water line and installation of a booster pump at the McKunley Street Station.

Submitting the low bid was H. B. Jordan Construction Co. of Amarillo. Other bidders on the project were Panhandle Construction Co., Amarillo, \$21,536.28, and Brodie Construction Co., Amarillo, \$23,061.

In its bid, the Amarillo firm stated construction on the project will begin 60 days after notice of award has been received. It is expected to take approximately 30 calendar days to complete the project.

As the project was proposed at a previous Commission meeting, installation of the booster pump at the station will bring pumping capacity of the city up to limits set by the state.

Dons Down Herd 56-64; B Team Wins Third Game

Hereford Whitefaces trying for their third win of the season Tuesday at Palo Duro High School were downed 56-64 by the Dons as they went into a fourth-minute stall during the fourth period of the game.

As the Dons put the stall on, Hereford had edged to within one point, but were unable to control the ball as the Dons swept the boards.

This is the first defeat for the Herd this season after defeating Caprock High School and tripping the Canyon Eagles by a one-point margin.

County's '64 Cotton Allotment Boosted

Deaf Smith county cotton farmers will be permitted to plant 448 more acres in cotton in 1964 than in 1963, despite the fact that the over-all state allotment was reduced 30,657 acres.

The entire Texas Panhandle and Plains area, comprising 23 counties, was boosted by 21,630 acres, according to figures compiled by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

Deaf Smith county allotment for 1964 was set at 10,769 as compared with 10,321 in 1963. Total base allotment for the 23 counties served by the PCG is 2,132,499 as compared with 2,110,969 in 1963.

These are base allotment figures and do not include acres received through the "release and redistribution" program which yielded an additional 91,684 acres for the high Plains in 1963. According to Donald Johnson, executive assistant of Plains Cotton Growers, there is nothing to indicate that this figure will be substantially different for the 1964 crop.

Johnson says the increased High Plains acreage "is the result of the state ASC Commit-

tee making more efficient use of the state's allotment." Johnson said the committee is to be commended for this action.

The national cotton allotment for 1964 was 571,161, the 16 million-acre statutory minimum, as it was in 1963.

Greatest gain was granted to Lamb county, 2082 more acres than in 1963, the figure for next year set at 215,704.

Second greatest gain in the High Plains area was granted to Hale county, 1905 acres more than in 1963. Next year, that county's allotment will be 157,532 as compared with 155,627 acres in 1963.

Hockley county, with 178,359 allotment for next year, got an increase of 1684 acres, and Lamb county's allotment was upped 1524 acres to 185,910 acres.

Castro county had an 885-acre boost to 52,905, and Parmer county's allotment was set at 43,458, an increase of 1031 acres. Floyd county, with 93,365 for next year, is up 1165 acres. Bailey county received an 834-acre boost to 95,689, and Swisher county was upped to 51,113, a 719-acre gain.

By Argen Draper Holiday cooking has started in a big way. Some of you may want to call the office for the bulletin Christmas Time at Home, B-254; it contains Christmas Menus, Christmas Pies, Puddings, Cookies, Candles, Confections, Holiday Appetizers, Beverages, and Christmas Kitchen Gifts.

Many calls at the office in regard to the using of beet sugar. It can be used effectively in all recipes as jellies, candies, and icings.

FIRST-AID FOR GRAVY FALLOUT. Holidays bring out the big napkins and forget about the diet charts. In other words, it is gravy fallout time again, as Fannie Brown Eaton puts it.

But fallout first aid is as near as your dry cleaner, and your best napkins and linens can come through the holiday season in excellent condition, says Miss Eaton, who is Extension Clothing specialist at Texas A&M University.

A dry cleaner administers professional first aid by using a National Institute of Dry Cleaning prescription.

First, the garment or napkin is drycleaned to remove all oily and greasy substances. The albuminous part of the stain still remains, however. So your cleaner uses an enzyme to digest it. This makes the albumen water-soluble, so the drycleaner than applies natural detergent and flushes away the remainder of the stain with a steam gun.

Cranberry stains cause a sugar as well as a dye problem. This can be difficult, but your professional dry cleaner has a remedy. He will appreciate it if you get your cranberry stains to him promptly before they set, says Miss Eaton.

The discussion turned to the problem of parking space available in the downtown area. However, it was brought back to the issue since "it is not a problem of parking, but a problem of good will."

In acting on the proposal, commissioners agreed that every hour of overparking should be a separate offense and another ticket issued. The maximum penalty was also doubled.

Commissioners unanimously approved the action on a trial basis. Lowered parking fines will become effective Dec. 20 since it will be the earliest possible date new tickets can be printed.

on how to mail your Christmas cards and gifts to insure prompt and safe delivery before December 25.

If you use the new five-cent Christmas Tree stamps on your Christmas cards, they will be sorted and delivered first and, if you include your return address with your ZIP Code number on each card envelope, they will be forwarded in the event of a change of address, or if they are undeliverable, they will be returned to you for correction of your mailing list.

Also, remember you can write personal messages only on Christmas cards sent by First Class mail. Nothing but your signature is authorized on cards sent at the unsealed, third class rate.

The Postmaster warns against careless packing of your precious Christmas gifts. He says it is unbelievable how some people fail to use strong cartons, heavy wrapping paper and sturdy cord when packing their precious gifts for mailing.

He requests that you take special care in packing breakable gifts — mark the carton, "Fragile" — "Handle with Care" and be sure to put an extra label carrying the recipient's and your name and address inside of every package.

The Postmaster also said, "By giving special attention to your Christmas mailings right now, by being sure that your mailing lists are up-to-date and by planning your mailings so that you send out your cards and packages in groups, rather than all at one time, you'll be certain that all your Christmas greetings and gift packages reach their destinations before Christmas."

The Postmaster asks the co-

operation of all business firms to delay the mailing of circulars and catalogs until after December 25, to keep the mails clear for the Christmas rush.

If you use Christmas stickers or seals, put them on the back of your Christmas cards and packages so that they will not conflict with the address on the front. Make sure that correct postage is firmly affixed to each card and package. When mailing gifts, it's a good idea to place a piece of transparent tape over the address portion of the label to prevent defacing it in transit.

Keep in mind that parcel post size and weight limitations vary according to destination, so be sure to ask about them when you go to the Post Office to buy stamps.

The Postmaster reminds us that we can make it a merrier Christmas for everybody if we try to get all of our Christmas presents mailed before December 10th. Christmas cards for out of town delivery should be sent before December 15th, and those for local addresses should be mailed at least a week before Christmas.

The Postmaster also said he is most appreciative of the interest and cooperation shown by the mailing public so far, and reminds us that "Do it now" is the slogan from here on in. Don't put off your Christmas mailing while you still have time because this means that dreaded pileups will occur at the Post Office, causing unavoidable slowdowns in deliveries as the holiday approaches.

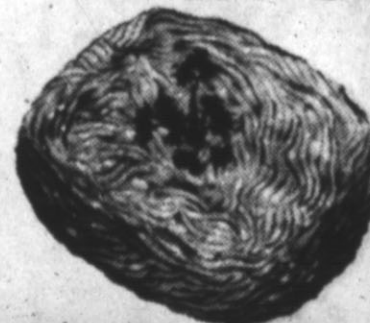

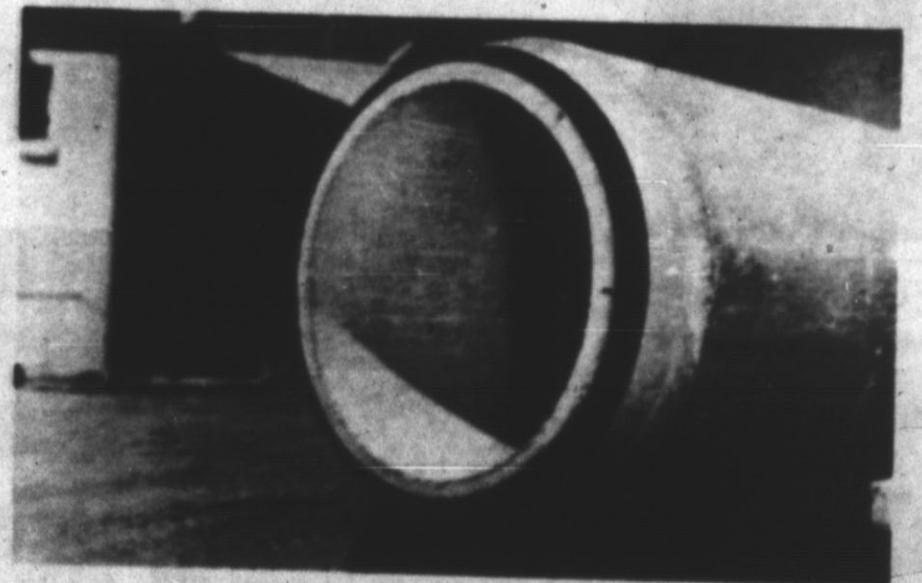

Students Learn Basic Principles In Bookkeeping

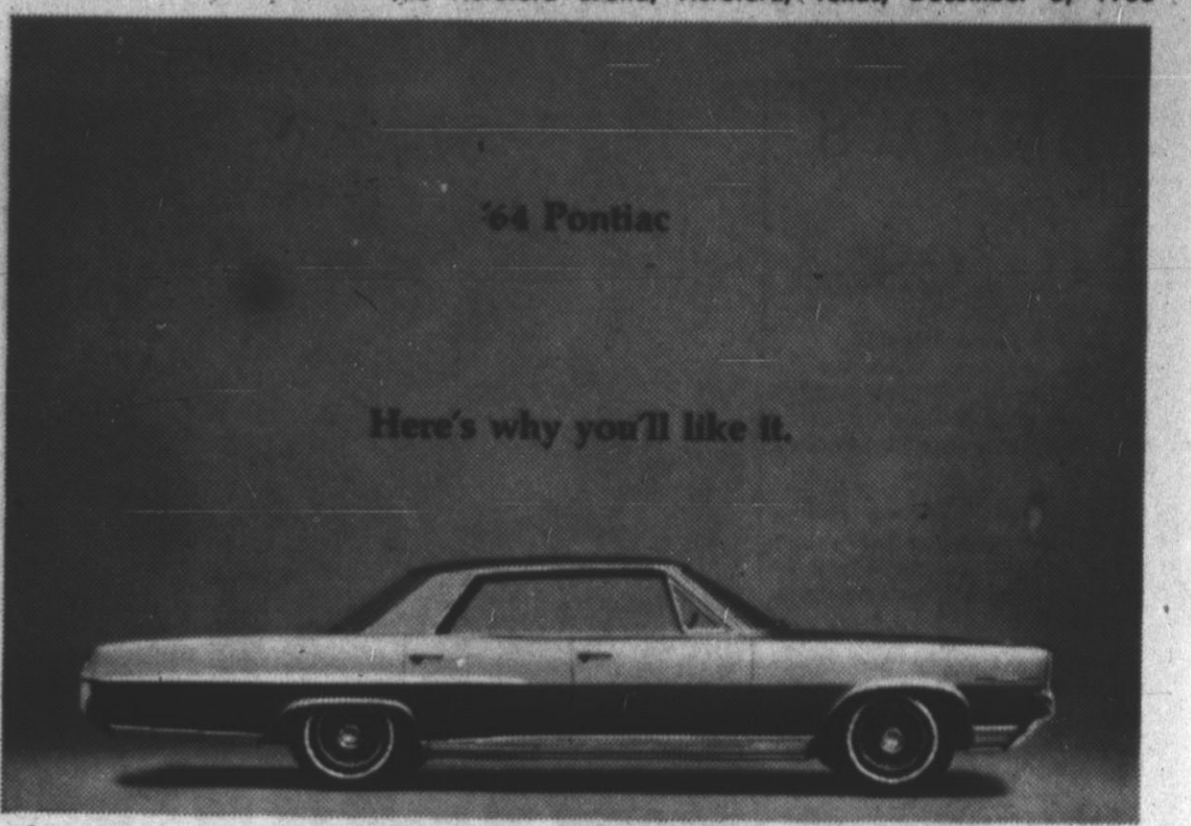

LET'S COOK SOMETHING!

Cooking Is Pleasure For Mrs. H. A. Tuck

Mrs. H. A. Tuck, 506 Avenue J, has always loved to cook and serve. Even when she was in high school, she gave dinner parties for her friends, and most of her college work was in general home economics.

Both her sons, Tommy, 8, and Terry, 11, enjoy cooking also. Except for the time Mrs. Tuck caught Tommy about to pour vinegar instead of oil into his pancake batter, their cooking experiences have been without problems.

Mr. and Mrs. Tuck have lived in Hereford for about five years. He is a tax consultant for Deaf Smith County. Mrs. Tuck is a den mother, Bible School teacher, an officer in the PTO at Alkman School, and active in Little League during baseball season. She works parttime at Southwest Offset, and her hobbies are cooking, bridge, and sewing.

Mr. Tuck lived in the same block in Lubbock until she was married. Since that time, the Tucks have lived in Louisiana, Kentucky, and Germany. They moved to Hereford from Dumas.

Some of her favorite recipes are family recipes, such as the guacamole salad, date nut pie, and pound cake included below. She says that her only culinary problem is an inability to make fudge.

Biscuit Ham Loaves
1/2 pound ham
1/2 pound cheese
1 green pepper
1 small jar pimientos
Grind ham and cheese; cut pepper and pimientos into small bits and moisten all ingredients with salad dressing. Make rich biscuit dough; roll out and cut as for fried pies. Put small portion of ham mixture on dough and fold over, pressing edges with a fork. Bake at 375 degrees until brown. Serves 6.

Bean Casserole
Soak and cook one pound dried beans. Drain beans and save liquid. Partially fry six strips of bacon cut into quarters. Combine beans with one no. 1 can of stewed tomatoes, 2 cups bean liquid, one medium onion, chopped, 1 t. salt, dash of pepper, 1 t. dry mustard, 1/2 cup brown sugar, and the partially-cooked bacon. Pour into a two-quart casserole or bean pot. Cover and bake in a slow oven about 3 or 4 hours. From time to time add liquid if needed.

Guacamole Salad
1 ripe avocado
1 tomato
1/2 cup shredded lettuce
dash of garlic salt
Salad dressing (enough to moisten)
Few drops of lemon juice

Date Nut Pie
1 cup milk
1/2 cup sugar
2 egg yolks
2 T. flour
1 box dates
1/2 cup nuts
Heat milk and cool. Beat egg yolks and add water to them. Add to milk. Mix flour and sugar and add to milk mixture. Cook as a cream pie. Just before mixture thickens, add chopped dates and nuts. Pour into a baked pie shell. Top with whipped cream to serve.

Pound Cake
4 eggs
3 cups flour
2 cups sugar
1 cup milk
1 cup shortening
2 t. baking powder
1/2 t. salt
1 t. lemon extract
Cream sugar and shortening. Add one egg at a time and mix well. Sift flour, baking powder, and salt and add alternately with milk; add lemon extract. Bake at 200 degrees for 1 1/2-2 hours, or until cake tests done.
Blueberry-Banana Pie
1 can blueberries
1 heaping t. cornstarch
1/2 cup sugar
2 T. butter
1 T. lemon juice

2 large bananas
1 cup heavy cream
Drain blueberry liquid into pan. Mix cornstarch and sugar and add to juice. Cook until thickens, stirring constantly. Remove from fire, add butter and lemon juice. Add berries; cool. Cut 1/2 banana into small pieces and add to mixture. Line baked pie crust, sides and bottom, with rounds of banana. Pour cooled mixture over lined crust. Refrigerate and top with whipped cream to serve.

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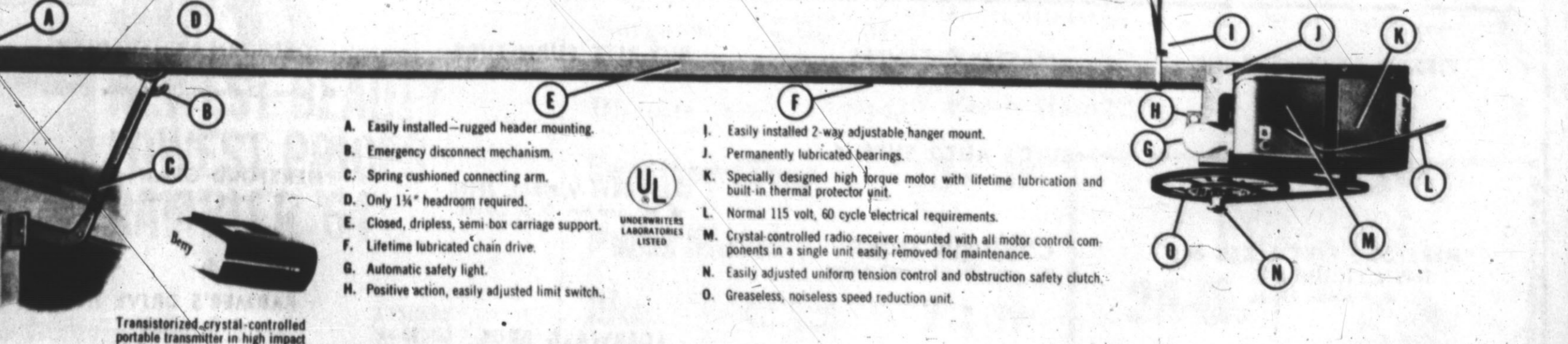

Area May Face Weevil Threat, Experts Hold

Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Saturday warned of "an ominous boll weevil threat to the entire High Plains cotton industry," even in counties such as Deaf Smith county where the boll weevil has been little problem to cotton farmers.

The organization recommended a \$1 million "diapause" control program to prevent the boll weevil threat from becoming reality.

The recommendation came Saturday after experts in entomology had met Nov. 26 with the 13-member High Plains boll weevil steering committee, sponsored by PCG.

It was pointed out that while it has not been determined that weevils hibernate on the High Plains, one of the specialists at the Lubbock meeting said "The weevil is obviously a threat to the area. He was here in 1963 and will come again." The speaker was Dr. J. C. Gaines, head of the entomology department at Texas A&M.

Dr. Gaines said he felt "the real program to knock the weevil off the High Plains is the 'diapause' program."

In discussion it was agreed that such a program would not only set up a barrier to prevent further westward encroachment of the weevil, but would also effectively deter weevil damage in those areas already infested.

The pendulum swings and hesitates just a moment before it begins its return to the opposite extreme. Actions, reactions, and opinions of human beings have been compared to the swing of the pendulum of a clock in many areas throughout history.

In our century we have noted the swing of the pendulum in such varied areas as strict discipline and permissiveness with children, isolationism and world citizenship, traditional and progressive education, "rugged individualism" and social welfare, and many other political, social, and religious extremes.

Rarely does the pendulum of public philosophy tarry long in any one place. It swings with relentless volition from one opposite to another. Occasionally society takes the good from each extreme and formulates a worthwhile and lasting philosophy that brings useness to that area of human endeavor, but not often enough.

Sometimes the pendulum of reaction hangs straight down in a position as useless as a still pendulum on a clock. For some of us that is dangerously true in our political and social philosophy in this time.

That which has created this indolent monster of our period in history is the very thing that was supposed to effectively solve the evils of the extremes of radicalism, prejudices, bigotry, and hatred. The pendulum for many of us has not slowed to something worthy and intelligent, but to a lethargic sort of attitude that is doing great harm to our nation and humanity.

This is neither as it should be, nor is it true of everyone, but it is true of enough of our citizens to be dangerous. We have learned that history repeats itself, that God created all men in his own image, that

each man must be free to express his opinions without fear, that people all over the world must share the freedoms we enjoy in the United States, all of these good things to know.

But far too many of us have confused indifference, old-fashioned "laissez faire", with tolerance and intellectuality. We have educated ourselves out of emotional reactions of any kind. If we allow ourselves strong feelings on any subject, we do not speak out for fear of being classified as a "far left" or a "far right". We even take great pride in our "middle of the road" philosophies.

This dangerous attitude was pointed out last week, by I believe, a Dallas minister, who said that it was time for the "middle of the roaders" to talk, and talk loudly, about why we are neither leftists nor rightists, why we are not intolerant, why we do not hate. I agree and feel that of all that was said last week, his words were probably the wisest.

This is not a plea for a swing of the pendulum to either extreme, nor an indictment against education for tolerance and understanding. It is a plea that the pendulum not hang useless in a fixed position of indifference or fear of the opinions of our peers.

It is a plea for mobility — the activity of the tolerant, the freedoms lovers, the proud non-nationals, to speak out fearlessly for what they believe is right, to try to convince the emotional, the extremists on both sides, that they are wrong and we are right. We must not allow those among us who have fought this battle to fight alone. We must be active, or we will lose the battle to the hate-mongers, the prejudiced, the extremists without realizing there was ever a battle.

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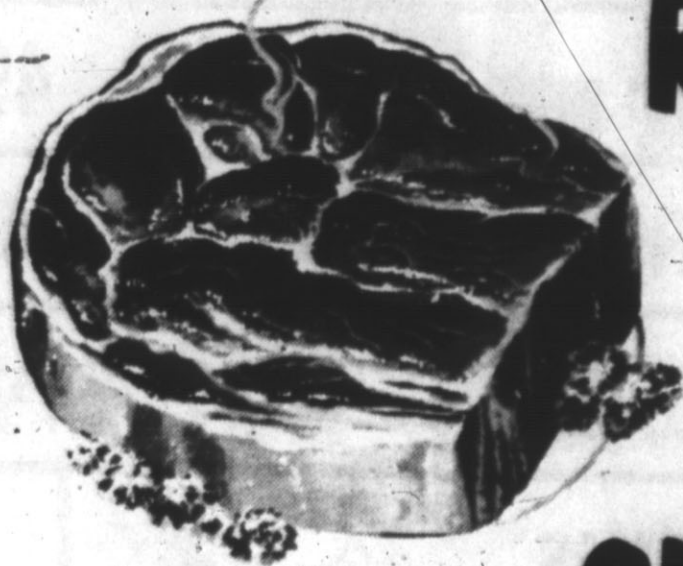

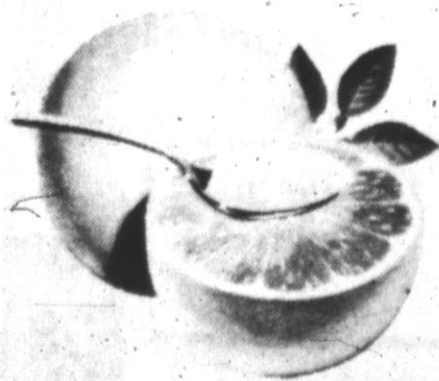
