Hereford Youth to Help Build Homes In Mexico Next Year

Nineteen-year-old Drew Kershner of Hereford will build houses, muscles and goodwill next summer when he and 14 other students from Notre Dame University will go to Mexico to build houses in the remote mountain area of Tacambaro, 110 miles west of Mexico City.

The Notre Dame sophomore, son of Mrs. and Mrs. Andrew Kershner, says the summer house-building program is a part of the Catholic International Lay Apostolate program at Notre Dame.

The project not only provides Mexican peasants with decent homes, but it also builds goodwill and at the same time offers the youths an opportunity for

clean, outdoor work in the 10,000-foot high mountains. They will work with the Catholic priest there who has chosen several families to get new homes, thanks to the Notre Dame program. Actually, says Drew, "it's a people-to-people program in which we sell the Mexican people on our kind of government as compared with the isms which are offered by many groups." He added: "All kinds of propaganda is being read these poor people in the remote sections, and since they are poor, they are susceptible to anything that offers them a promise of better security."

The homes themselves are built of cinder blocks, and are equipped with indoor plumbing, Drew explained. Last year a similar group built three homes, but it is the hope that more homes can be constructed this next summer.

In preparation for their summer in Mexico, all the boys are being instructed in night classes in Spanish. Drew had two years of Spanish in high school here, but he is taking a refresher course and hopes to be able to converse with the Mexican natives when he reaches Tacambaro.

Much of the material for the homes is being donated. "Last year several large firms offered trucks and materials, including a lumberyard which has its U. S. headquarters at South Bend, the home also of Notre Dame."

COTTON NOT HURT

Old man Winter still held an icy grip on the Deaf Smith County area as a new arctic blast tumbled temperatures from a mild 50-degree reading Tuesday to the mid-teens by Wednesday morning.

Freezing drizzle had been falling during the night Tuesday over the county and upper portions of the Panhandle, with motorists warned of hazardous driving conditions. The coating of ice, according to the forecast, was to remain on streets and highways through the day. However, the intermittent freezing drizzle was to change to snow flurries during Wednesday.

District Court Sentences Four On Guilty Pleas

Four men entering pleas of guilty to charges in 69th District Court, Judge Harry Schultz presiding, received prison terms. The probation of a fifth man was also revoked during the court term held here recently and one man was placed on probation.

Three of the men pleading guilty to charges were indicted during the final session of the Grand Jury for the July term of district court.

Pleading guilty to charges on one count of burglary was Clinton Ray Wright, 24, Fairfield, Ill. He was given a three year sentence.

Also entering a plea of guilty was Ollen Clarence Nix, 56, 511 Grand. Nix received a two-year sentence on a driving while intoxicated, second offense, charge.

James Lacy, an 18-year-old youth, charged with armed robbery was sentenced to a five year term in the penitentiary. Also receiving a penitentiary sentence was Lloyd Decker, 52, of Vega. Decker pleaded guilty to charges of forgery.

Receiving a three year probation sentence after pleading guilty to a charge of theft over \$50 was Arnulfo LaFuente, 20, 302 Norton.

During the court session Wednesday and Thursday, the four year probation sentence of Leroy Carlton was revoked.

Move To Close Alley Is Tabled

A move to close an alley between the 300 blocks of Miles and Lee was tabled by Hereford City Commission. The proposal was presented by a group of local doctors in order that the clinic might be expanded.

In the proposal, re-roofing of some utility lines was planned as well as a tunnel underneath the building to carry other utilities. Another alley would, however, be needed to the city.

According to Dudley Bayne, city manager, cost of moving the lines would be provided for in construction of the clinic building addition.

He also pointed out that sewer, gas, and water lines run be-

low the surface of the alley. The sewer line, an eight-foot deep main, could not be moved due to the gravity flow system used here.

Fail of the line, he explained, will not allow for it to be re-routed.

In discussing the proposal, it was also brought out that a part of the alley is in a fire zone. The effect 'closing the alley would have on fire rates was not known at the time of the meeting and was one of the reasons why the motion was tabled.

Bayne pointed out that this was only "one of the reasons" for tabling the proposal, and then pointed out concern expressed over moving utility lines and constructing a tunnel under the clinic building.

He also noted that in order for an alley to be closed, all residents in the block must agree to the proposal. Not all of the property owners in the area have been contacted, he added.

In other business, commissioners authorized the advertising for bids for three new city water wells. These wells, according to Bayne, will be drilled at separate locations in the 400 block of Ave. C; the 200 block of Ave. A, and Veteran's Park.

Bids also were asked on two new 20-cubic yard trash trucks for the city.

Bids on both proposals are to be opened at the first regular Commission meeting to be held in January, 1964.

During the meeting, the plan and field notes for a new plat, Green Acres, located on the north side of Harrison Highway adjoining Westhaven addition, were submitted for approval. It was approved by unanimous action. (Continued on Page 2)

Free Christmas Program Is Set By Bands, Choirs

Hereford school bands and choirs will present their annual Christmas concert in the high school auditorium tonight, starting at 7:30. It was announced Thursday. The program will be free.

Directors will be Don Moore and Joe Geoffrey for the choirs, and Ben Gollehon and Clyde Wilson for the bands.

The choirs will sing traditional Christmas carols, and a group from the bands' brass section will play for this series.

The bands are doing a Christmas Rhapsody which includes such favorites as Jingle Bells. The bands also will play hymns from Symphony No. 6 by Tchaikovsky and the Christmas Suite by Walters.

Hereford jumped into the industrial spotlight for the second time in 1963, when Jack Allan, executive vice-president of James Allan & Sons, San Francisco meat packers, announced purchase of location and released plans for a meat packing

plant which will run well over \$1 million. Actual construction is scheduled to begin next Spring, and the plant will be put into operation as soon as possible in 1964.

Both plant and offices will be located east of Hereford on a section purchased from Homer Brumley, directly east of the feed lots on U. S. Highway 69, south of the Santa Fe tracks.

"We will expect to handle a round 100,000 head of cattle the first year," Allan said. "Our primary markets will be on the West Coast, and we naturally expect to establish secondary markets in Texas and the Panhandle."

A total of 50 employees will be required to maintain and operate the plant in its first year. Allan said that every effort would be made to train and use local labor as far as possible, and that he hoped it would run 100 percent. Meat produced in the Hereford plant will be slaughtered and shipped on Piggy-back rail cars and by truck.

Allan, a third generation member of the firm, will move to Hereford as active manager of the local plant. Present plans are to move here with his family in February if possible, pending disposal of his home and other obligations in San Francisco. In addition to Mrs. Allan, the family includes five children: A son age 14, a daughter 12, a daughter 9, and twin sons, age 4.

Three Firms Hit By Burglaries; Losses Slight

Three burglaries at Hereford business firms have been investigated with two of the break-ins reported over the week-end, according to Hereford Police Department. The other firm was broken into on Monday.

First burglary reported by Hereford Police Department was that of Hereford Laundry, 144 Schley. The break-in was discovered about 11 a. m. Sunday.

According to an offense report, the building was closed at noon Saturday.

Entry into the building was gained through a window on the side. Persons entering the firm went to the office and reportedly took \$6 in change from two desks.

Some clothing was believed to have been taken, but the number of items missing and their value has not yet been determined, according to Hereford Police Department.

The second burglary of the week-end occurred at WAC Seed Co.; however, nothing was reported missing from the firm.

The building was closed at 6:30 p. m. Saturday and the break-in was not discovered until the following day at 4 p. m. Third burglary reported to the police department occurred sometime Monday night at El Corral, 211 Ave. F.

A small square hole was sawed in the west door of the building and the door unfastened. Nothing was reported missing, according to the report.

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"We selected Hereford for our plant for several reasons," he pointed out. "Primarily because of the abundance of feed and fine cattle. We have had our eyes on this territory for several years and had decided some time back that a plant in this territory would offer many advantages."

"Yes, the by-product from the Holly-sugar refinery afford an attractive addition to an already well-balanced feed-lot country."

"And let me add, too, that the wonderful people and spirit of friendship in the territory were important in making our decision, along with adequate transportation, schools and other facilities. We feel that you have a fine country and a good community. We want to be part of it and grow along with you."

James Allan & Sons is one of the pioneer meat packing plants in the San Francisco area, having been launched by Jack Allan's grandfather around the turn of the century. Their first plant, in fact, was demolished in the San Francisco earthquake—and had to be rebuilt. The San Francisco plant handles cattle, sheep and hogs, including curing and marketing, and employs around 400 persons.

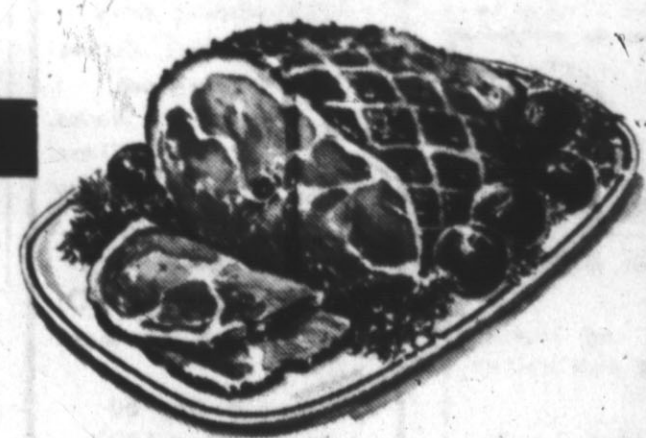
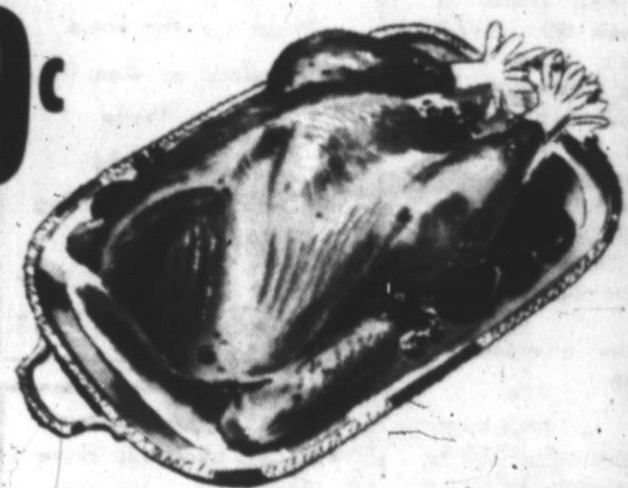

Hereford's future as an industrial center brightened again this week with the announcement of the location of a million dollar meat packing plant here. The plant will be located on property formerly owned by Homer Brumey east of Hereford.

Planning to process some 100,000 head of cattle yearly, the operation will require approximately 50 permanent employees. Construction will begin next spring, according to Jack Allan, spokesman for the firm.

Allan indicated that the Hereford area was a natural location for a plant of this type due to the abundance of feed and fine cattle. He plans to move here with his family shortly after the first of the year and will become active manager of the local operation.

Negotiations for the purchase of the plant site were handled locally by Justice Realtors.

Naturally, we're elated at the announcement of another giant industrial plant for the Hereford area. Although we've always felt that Hereford had a bright future, the snowballing growth that we have seen this past year is still fantastic; almost unbelievable.

But we're predicting, this is only the beginning. We'll see more, many more changes to our little city before the end of 1964.

Certainly, with changes will also come problems, and although we do not want to sound pessimistic, we most certainly do want to be realistic. We have already seen our school population outstrip a five-year planning program in one year. This, again, is only the beginning. But on the other side the optimistic side is the increased prosperity that a plant of this size will add. And regardless of what anyone believes, a town that doesn't grow, doesn't offer many

opportunities for its people. We'll stick with a winner... problems and all, and welcome the addition of James Allan & Sons meat packing plant to Hereford.

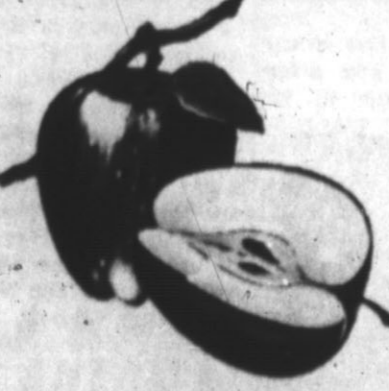

Course Designed To Qualify Girls In Care Of Sick

A Red Cross course is being given to 53 second year homemaking students in order that they may become qualified to care for the sick and injured in the home.

The course, "Home Care of Sick and Injured", will qualify each girl for a Red Cross certificate upon completion.

"Due to the new department and rooms which were added to HHS this year, the girls have a better chance in which to receive their certificates," said Mrs. Margaret Durham, home economics teacher.

Girls learn several things in practicing to care for the sick. They learn to make a bed in proper order and form. They learn to turn a patient in bed, to raise and lower a patient, to bathe a patient and to put a patient in and out of bed.

They learn to take temperatures, pulses, respirations and to give various kinds of medicines, such as eye drops.

A daily record is also kept, by each student, for the doctor, as a practice only.

They also practice all these things at home besides demonstrating on family and friends such as inspecting the throat, giving eye drops, feeding a sick patient, turning a person in bed, bathing a patient in bed and changing linens.

Girls also are instructed to make several articles which would be needed around the house to care for the sick. A (Continued on Page 9)

Let me share with you this Christmas season some thoughts from an article clipped from Good Housekeeping in 1958. The pages are frayed now and almost worn through from frequent reading. It first appeared at a time when I needed help desperately, and it has continued to be a source of strength during times of personal crisis since.

The article is a condensation of a chapter from the book, *Out of My Heart*, by Agnes Sligh Turnbull. The title of the chapter is "The Triumph of Acceptance." Although I have never been able to completely follow the paths laid out by the author, I have found in it much to guide me if and when my heart and spirit would let me accept "acceptance."

The following are statements or paragraphs that I have found helpful.

"A definition is likely to illuminate even the most familiar word, so I checked with Webster on 'acceptance.' Here is what I found: 'A receiving of what is offered, with approbation, satisfaction, or acquiescence. Of course, no one but a completely other-worldly mystic could receive life's blows with satisfaction, but acquiescence is yet another matter. And here's the little gem, all unexpected, I found among the other definitions: 'Acquiescence: to remain at rest (in a place or mental state). This seems to me the golden key to the whole matter. For if, upon accepting life's troubles, we can then remain at rest in our minds, the battle has been fought and the victory won. But oh, it is a hard battle, and I, for one have to wage it over and over.'"

"So many people in great sorrow keep saying, 'Why, why did God send this upon me?' And because of the bitterness underlying this question, it is doubly hard for them to accept what has befallen them. Would it not be better if they ceased thinking they were singled out by God for special punishment, and dwell instead on the fact that the universe and our own small world are subject to fixed and intricate laws? The suffering that comes to us happens

because we or someone else, somewhere, sometime, interred with or broke one of the laws."

"But while this latter attitude may remove from the heart any hard or bitter feeling of injustice at God's hand, it need never remove God from the situation itself. When the blow falls, when the black grief strikes us, then it is that God enters in. With that impelling intuition that seeks and finds a Power greater than ourselves, we reach up to Him, and discover strength on which we can lean."

"And in the imitation of Christ, by Thomas A. Kempis, there is this wonderful passage: 'My son, I am the Lord who giveth strength in the day of tribulation. This is what most of all hindereth heavenly consolation, that thou art too slow in turning thyself unto prayer. But do thou, having now recovered breath after the tempest, gather strength again in the light of my mercies: for I am at hand (saith the Lord) to repair all not only entirely but also abundantly and in most plentiful measure. Where is thy faith? Stand firmly and with perseverance: take courage and be patient; comfort will come to thee in due time. Wait, wait, I say, for Me. I will come and heal thee.'"

The author then discusses worry and quotes Plotinus: "Let the soul banish all that disturbs; let the body that envelops it be still, and the frettings of the body, and all that surrounds it; let earth and sea and air be still, and heaven itself. And then let man think of the Spirit as streaming, pouring, rushing and shining into him from all sides while he stands quiet."

She then concludes: "...I have been guilty at times of stirring up the stream of events with distress over the present, remorse for the past, or anxiety for the future. ... Let the waters run softly, without muddying them, softly under the bridge and on down the stream."

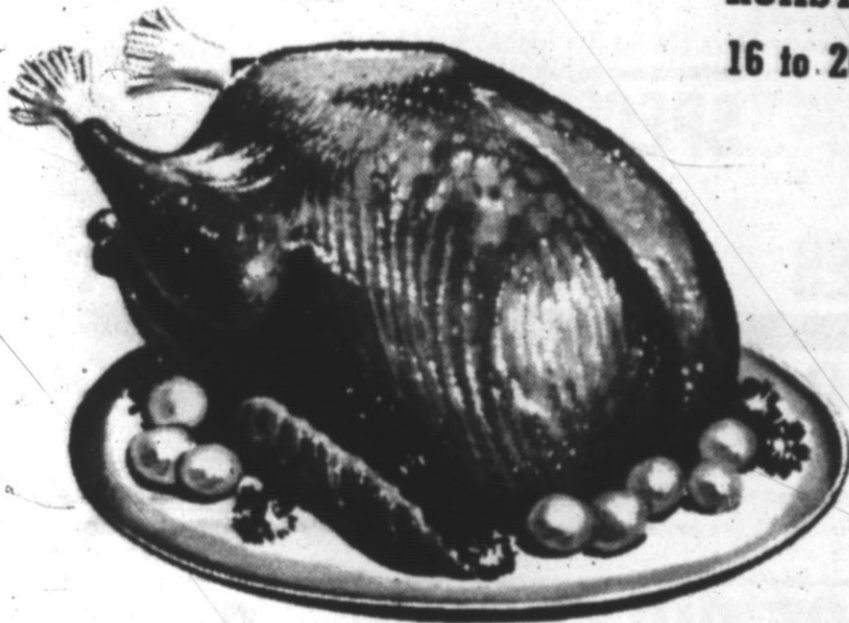

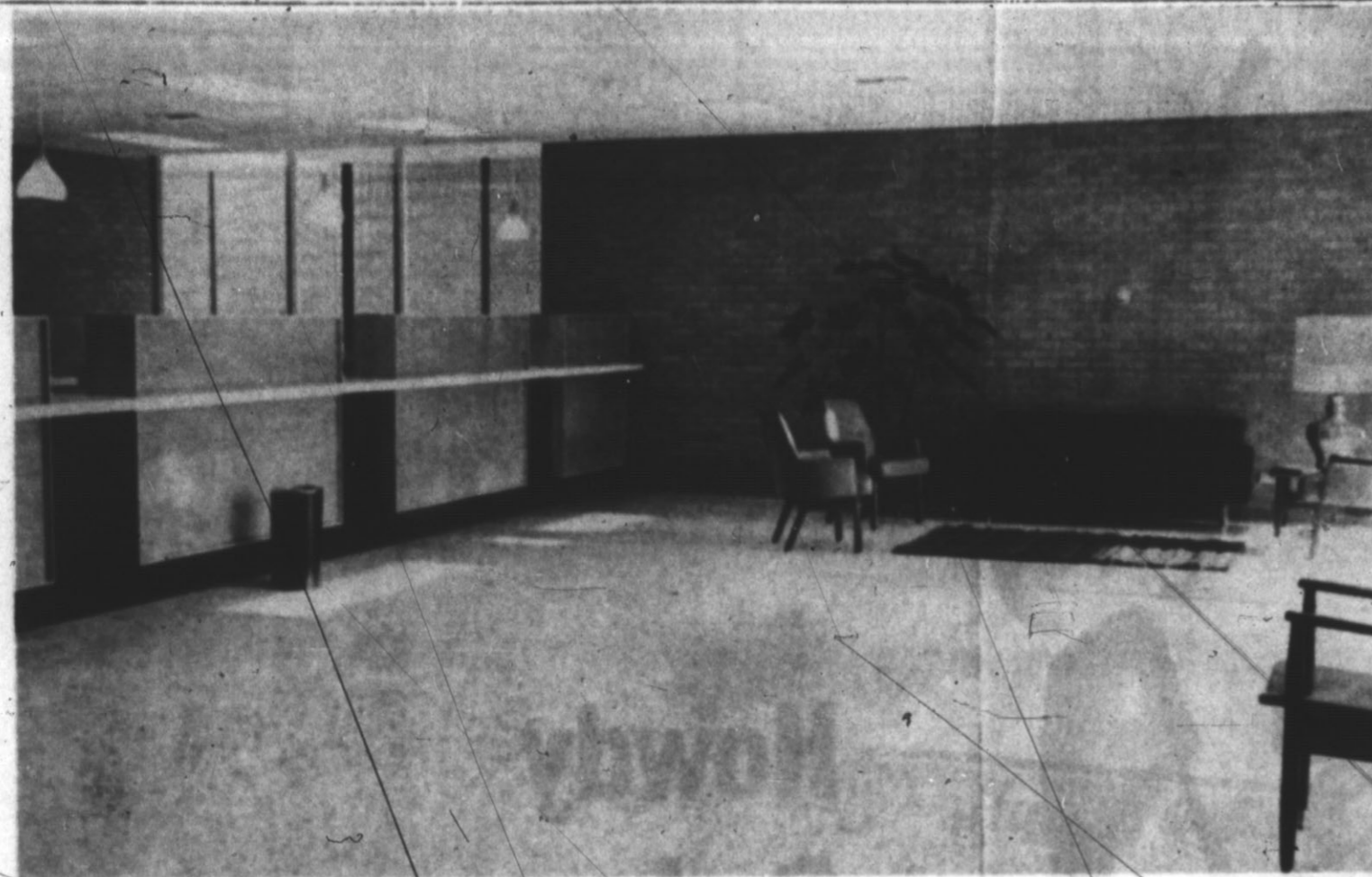

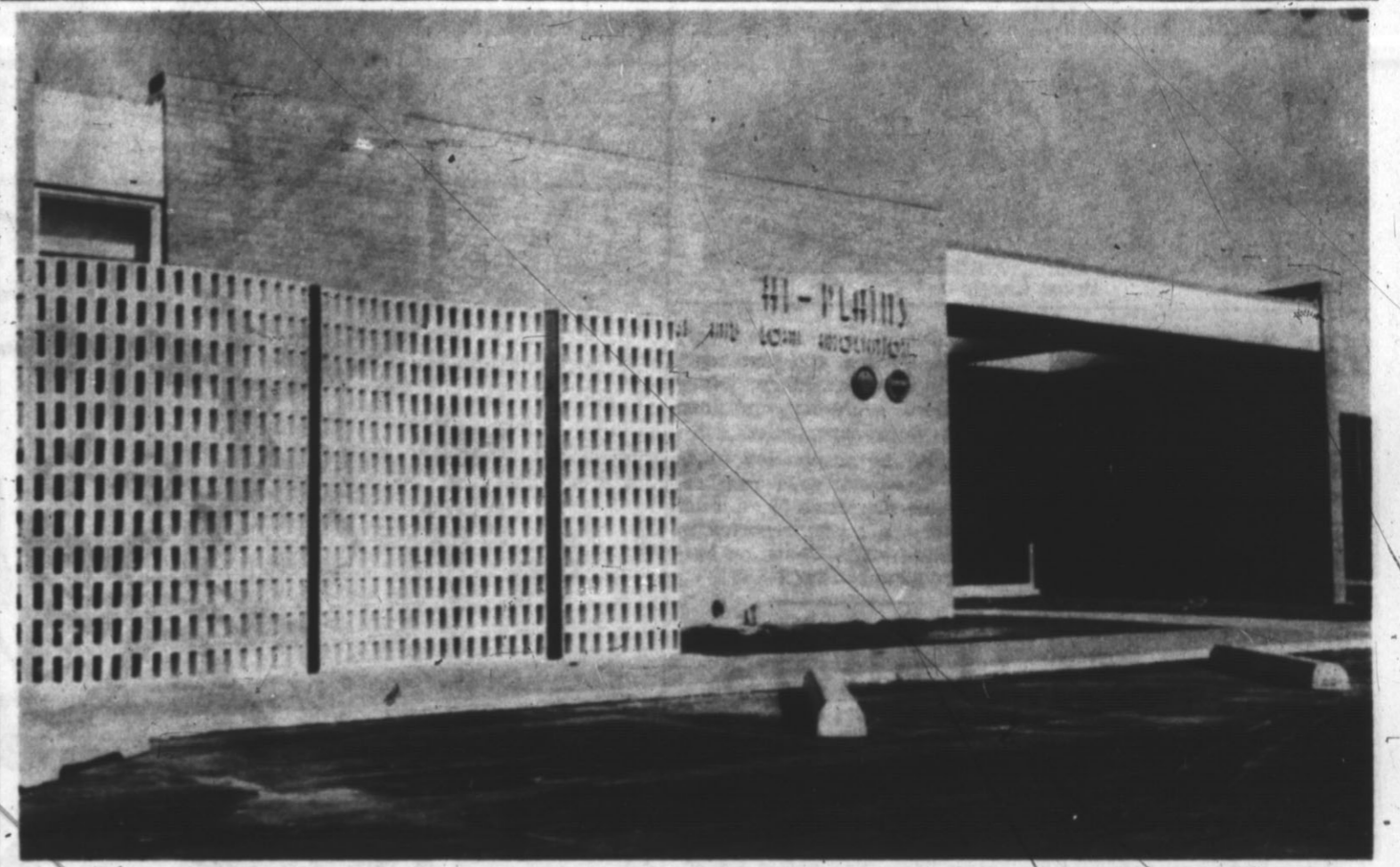

THE NEW Hi-Plains building has a spacious lobby, set off counter-type tellers' windows at left. with parlor-like furniture at one end. Note new modern

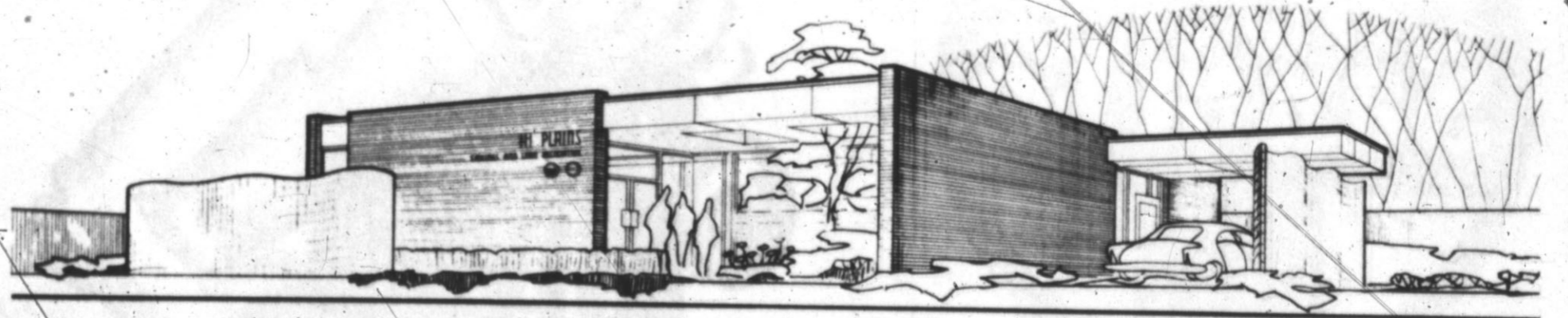


HERE'S THE FRONT view of Hi-Plains new office building at wall follows a serpentine pattern. In-front parking is provided for 25 automobiles.

Add a well beaten egg, a couple of tablespoons of melted butter and a little light cream to two cups of seasoned mashed sweet potatoes; bake in a moderate oven until puffed and browned.

LET'S COOK SOMETHING

Fruit Cake Requires Only Four Ingredients

Mrs. Bruce Burney, 202 North Texas, shares with us this week a very quick recipe for fruit cake. Recently she and her daughter, who lives in Odessa, prepared several of these for a church sale.

Mrs. Burney says that she is not a "good cook" — a family phrase which one of her sons used when he was quite small.

Mr. and Mrs. Burney have a daughter and two sons, one who lives in Develland and the other in Hereford. They moved to Hereford from Levelland in 1961. He has farming and ranching interests in this area. Mrs. Burney takes art lessons and enjoys playing bridge.

Fruit Cake
1 can sweetened condensed

milk.
1 pound pecans
1 pound dates
1 box coconut
Mix ingredients. Line a greased loaf pan with waxed paper and grease the paper. Bake for about one hour at 300 degrees. Serve with Wine Sauce if desired.

Wine Sauce
1/2 cup sugar
2 T. flour
2/3 cup water
2 T. butter
4 T. port wine
Few grains cinnamon
Mix all ingredients except wine and cinnamon. Cook until thickened. Add wine and cinnamon after sauce has cooled.

1 t. salt
2 T. shortening
2 cups boiling water
6 1/2-7 cups flour
2 yeast cakes

Mix sugar, water, salt, and shortening; add half of the flour. Melt yeast cakes in 1/2 cup lukewarm water. Add this to first mixture. Add remaining flour. Let rise several times before making into rolls. Then let the rolls rise about an hour. Bake at 350 degrees. This dough cannot be refrigerated.

Devil's Food Cake
1 cup vegetable shortening
2 cups sugar
1/2 cup cocoa
2 eggs
1 cup sour milk
2 t. soda
1 cup boiling water

Stir all ingredients together in order named and mix with electric mixer for two minutes or more. Bake in loaf pan for about 40 minutes at 350 degrees.

Blue Cheese Dressing
1 carton sour cream
Lemon juice
Worcestershire sauce
Chopped green onion or minced onion
Garlic juice
Salt and pepper to taste
1 package blue cheese
Beat all ingredients except cheese in mixer. Then add cheese.

Foods In Good Supply For Christmas Season

By Argen Draper
Christmas is almost here, and there are a few last-minute hints and the latest news on buying food. These releases are from the Extension Service and the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Biggest produce news this week is in citrus fruits, report Texas A&M University consumer marketing specialists. Tangelos and tangerines have made their appearance in local markets, and quality of all citrus appears to be excellent. However, supplies are shorter than last year, so prices reflect this smaller supply.

Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist, also suggests cranberries for holiday menus. Apples, grapes, bananas and pears are other good fruit choices, she adds. The production of edible tree nuts is expected to break records this season, with the pecan crop likely to be the largest ever recorded, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Nut prices should be relatively low in comparison with past seasons, and homemakers may want to freeze some for later use. Mrs. Clyatt reminds.

Ample food will be the least

among problems for Texans this December, as they plan festive get-togethers. Producers and processors, together, are keeping trade channels full of holiday grocery needs. Seven foods are particularly abundant. They make up the U. S. Department of Agriculture's December plentiful foods list, points out the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Beef and Pecans — two important Texas products — are featured on the list. Pork, turkeys and peanuts, also grown extensively in Texas, will be plentiful all month. Apples and cranberries complete the list for December.

Beef takes a top spot on the list of its abundance and favorable prices for consumers. The all-time record pecan crop of 277 million pounds for the 1957-61 average, four times more than last year's small crop. Prices being paid to growers are lower, and therefore, more favorable for increased use by consumers.

Similar reasons stand behind the listing of pork, turkeys, peanuts, apples and cranberries. USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, that keeps in constant touch with available supplies of all farm-produced foods, says consumers will find it to their advantage to shop the "plentiful routes." Food markets regularly promote these items with special prices and a wide choice of quality.

REP. ROGERS WRITES

Civil Rights Bill Proposals Are Listed In Brief Outline

Three weeks from now a new session of Congress will begin the Second Session of the 88th Congress. January highlights on Capitol Hill will include President Johnson's State of the Union address to the House and Senate and his budget message

to Congress accompanying delivery of the massive 1965 fiscal year budget proposals prepared by the Executive Branch. It remains to be seen what matters President Johnson will stress in his State of the Union speech as well as the budget sums he'll request to operate the federal government's departments and agencies in the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1964.

These January events will be dramatic. But for many Americans, regardless of their personal view of the matter, the congressional drama will center on developments affecting the civil rights bill.

The civil rights proposal—the so-called "omnibus civil rights bill"—has cleared the House Judiciary Committee and will be

called up for hearing next month before the House Rules Committee. Early in the Second Session it will probably reach the floor of the House for prolonged and bitterly controversial debate. Then, if passed by the House, the bill will move on to the Senate where it faces a certain filibuster.

There has been so much discussion of this bill and its provisions that I would like to summarize it for you, section by section, to give you as clear an understanding as possible of the measure's contents, hoping that it will be of some service to you in studying the technicalities involved.

TITLE I — VOTING RIGHTS: Requires that election officials apply uniform standards in the use of literacy tests and other

qualifying devices; that they be prohibited from disqualifying a voting applicant for immaterial errors or omissions in papers requisite to voting in Federal elections.

Requires that literacy tests be in writing, unless the applicant requests and state law permits a non-written test, and creates a presumption that a person who has completed the sixth grade possesses sufficient literacy to vote in Federal elections. The title also requires the courts to give priority in ruling on voting cases brought by the Federal government.

TITLE II — PUBLIC ACCOMMODATIONS: Prohibits discrimination on grounds of race, color, religion, or national origin in specified places of public accommodation. Included are hotels and motels, theaters and other places of amusement presenting sources of entertainment which move in interstate commerce, and restaurants, lunch counters, and gasoline stations which sell food or goods which move in interstate commerce or which serve interstate travelers.

TITLE III — DESEGREGATION OF PUBLIC FACILITIES: Authorizes the Attorney General under certain circumstances to bring suit to desegregate public facilities (other than schools) which are owned or operated by state or local governmental units.

TITLE IV — DESEGREGATION OF PUBLIC EDUCATION: Two purposes: First, authorizes the Commissioner of Education to provide, upon application by local school authorities, technical assistance and financial aid to assist in dealing with problems incident to desegregation.

Second, authorizes the Attorney General to institute suits seeking desegregation of public schools where students or parents are unable to bring suit and where he considers that a suit would further public policy favoring the orderly achievement of desegregation in public education.

TITLE V — CIVIL RIGHTS COMMISSION: Makes the Commission on Civil Rights a permanent body and gives it authority to serve as a national clearing-house for information concerning denials of equal protection of the laws and to investi-

gate allegations of Federal election discrimination.

TITLE VI — NONDISCRIMINATION IN FEDERALLY ASSISTED PROGRAMS: declares it to be the policy of the United States that discrimination on the grounds of race, color, or national origin shall not occur in connection with programs and activities receiving Federal assistance.

TITLE VII — EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY BACKGROUND AND PURPOSE: Empowers a Federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission to seek elimination of discrimination in employment based on race, color, religion, or national origin.

TITLE VIII — REGISTRATION AND VOTING STATISTICS: Directs Secretary of Commerce to conduct a survey to compile registration and voting statistics in areas recommended by the Commission on Civil Rights, to determine extent to which minority groups register to vote and have voted.

TITLE IX — PROCEDURE AFTER REMOVAL IN CIVIL RIGHTS CASES: Provides specific appeals procedure.

TITLE X — MISCELLANEOUS: Preserves Federal authority under laws now on the books; authorizes necessary appropriations to carry out the act; provides that invalidity of any portion of the act shall not affect the validity of the remainder of the act.

Rackets Flourish Even At Christmas

The Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce today warned the public to be on guard against the fraudulent and misleading sales and promotional schemes that flourish during the Christmas season.

Each year thousands of hurried and unwary Christmas shoppers are victimized by sharp operators who step up their activities during the holiday season, said W. T. Thompson, Manager of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce.

According to the National Better Business Bureau, with which the local chamber is affiliated through membership, these seasonal swindlers drain millions of dollars annually from consumers and business men throughout the U. S. They capitalize on the Christmas rush and the fact that people tend to be more generous, more trusting and less likely to turn down a request at that time of the year.

Thompson said holiday shoppers can protect themselves by avoiding fly-by-night operators and by making Christmas purchases from dealers of known reliability.

Based on past experience, he said, the following schemes can be expected to make their appearance again this year:

Mail-order bargain offers quoting toys, watches, jewelry and other items allegedly at a fraction of the retail price. When the gift arrives it may be a cheap imitation of the item thought to have been ordered.

Mail and phone appeals for donations from unknown charitable organizations.

Attempts to collect on C.O.D. packages supposedly for your neighbor who, the deliverer says, "is not home." The package may contain unordered merchandise or merely paper or cotton wadding.

Mail-order schemes in which you get a claim stub telling you that the shipper is holding a package which will be sent on return of the stub and a small amount. If you send the money you get a cheap pen-and-pencil set or something similar which you never ordered.

Unordered merchandise appeals by unknown charitable organizations with requests for

donations for the goods shipped.

Personal appeals by mail from self-described needy individuals seeking clothing, food, fuel and funds.

Distribution of courtesy cards for purchasing gifts at discounts from fictitious prices.

Thompson said various perfume hoaxes were prevalent in past years and have already reappeared in some areas in one form or another. Prime targets are executives who buy gifts in quantity at Christmas. Sales may be attempted in offices, at factory gates, on the street, door to door or in some offices.

The most widespread perfume scheme involves the sale of well-known brands of cologne and toilet water re-bottled in small, purse size containers by companies having no connection with the original manufacturers, said Thompson.

The public is fooled into believing that it is buying expensive perfume at a bargain price, Thompson said. Actually, cologne and toilet water is being sold at several times the regular retail price of the product packaged by the manufacturer himself.

Other perfume hoaxes involve the use of counterfeit labels of well-known brands on cheap imitations, phony pricing and the sales of spray containers labeled with the initials of nationally known fragrances. The sprays are concocted to simulate those fragrances.

Thompson made these additional points:

Consumers who receive unordered merchandise through the mails generally are not obligated to return it or pay for it, unless it is used. They are required to surrender it if the shippers or their agents call for it within a "reasonable" time.

Consumers ordering Christmas gifts from mail-order firms should generally allow 3 or 4 weeks for delivery.

Sales may be final. Ascertain conditions of sales and obtain guarantees in writing. Examine purchases before Christmas. Don't expect transient vendors to be around after the holiday to listen to complaints.

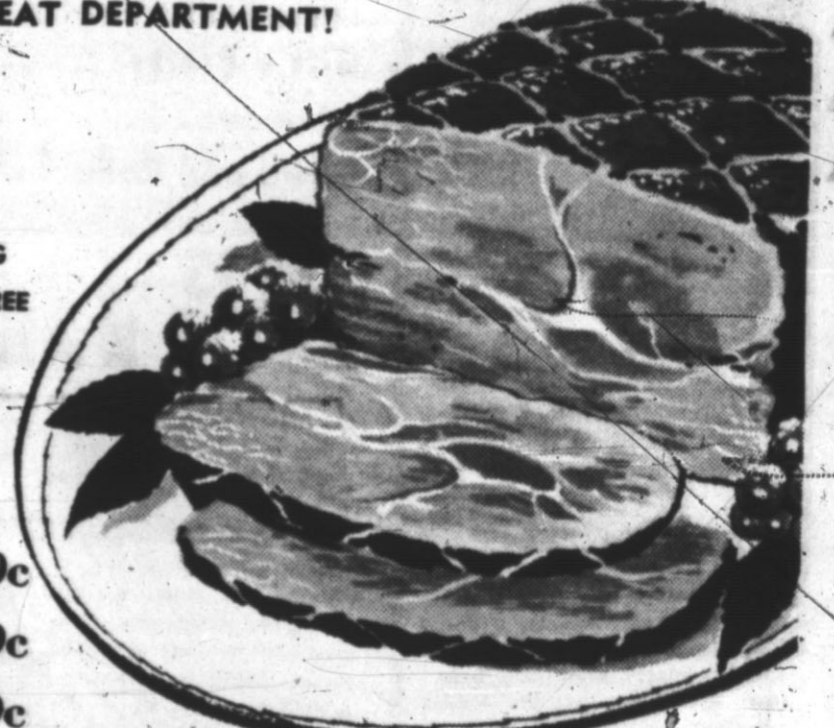

AUSTIN HIGHLIGHTS

Speculation Increases Over Candidates For Senate Race

Although the Christmas Spirit is settling soothingly over the political scene in the state capital this week, one political topic—the 1964 U. S. Senate race—got a steady workout.

Big question is: Will Sen. Yarborough, in spite of his recent pledge to back new President Lyndon B. Johnson all the way, get a tough opponent?

Best guess is: He will, although President Johnson will assume no active role in the campaign.

Leaders of the liberal Texas Democratic Coalition—a combination of labor, Negro groups, the Political Association of Spanish-speaking Organizations, and independent liberals—recently endorsed President Johnson for election in 1964. But they linked that support to backing of Yarborough also.

These names have been at the center of speculation as possible opponents for Yarborough: former Congressman Lloyd Bentsen Jr. of Houston; Congressman Jim Wright of Fort Worth; Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr of Lubbock; and former Gov. Allan Shivers of Austin.

Carr has said he won't run against Yarborough but will seek re-election and look toward the governor's race in 1966 instead. However, some think he still might change his mind.

Bentsen, once regarded as the most-likely contender; cooled toward the Senate race after early opinion checks. Now, with a new political climate in the making, observers say he has reassessed the situation and decided to run. He won't talk until after the December 22 political moratorium, however.

Wright has kept the door open. Both he and Bentsen conceivably could be candidates.

Only announced Democratic candidate for the U. S. Senate Post is John Van Cronkhite of Dallas.

Regardless of who emerges as the Democratic nominee, he will have to meet Republican opposition in November. Republicans who already have announced are George Bush of Houston and Dr. Milton V. Davis of Dallas.

REDISTRICTING
Attorney General Carr asked the U. S. Supreme Court to accept the appeal of the State of Texas against a three-judge Federal court's decision that all 23 Texas Congressmen should be elected statewide.

Carr's appeal says that the high court should recognize the unfairness of such an order. Furthermore, that it should agree to accept briefs and hear oral arguments on the legal questions involved.

Court has under study a similar order from Georgia in which a three-judge Federal court refused to enter the Congressional-districting field.

Still pending is a suit seeking to require redistricting for state legislative purposes. Primarily it is aimed at the Texas constitutional provision under which the 1,200,000 people in Harris County are limited to a single state senator.

Rep. Dick Cherry of Waco has proposed a new approach to this question. He plans to introduce a constitutional amendment which will let the Legislature grow as the state does. This would make possible additional representation for the big-city counties without such a sharp reduction in rural representation.

Cherry's plan would allow Legislature to determine how many members it shall have, with maximums set for the

Senate and House. These would be based on the number of Congressmen Texas is allowed, under automatic Federal law which reallocates seats in the national House of Representatives after each census.

Based on the present census, the Cherry proposal would permit an increase in the State Senate from today's 31 to as many as 46 members, and expand membership in the House from 150 to 172.

REPORT TRAFFIC VIOLATIONS

Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has called on motorists not only to drive safely themselves during the Christmas-New Year Holidays, but to watch out for those who don't and report them to the nearest police agency.

DPS forecasts 96 traffic deaths during the nine days from Christmas Eve through New Year's Day.

Over 150 additional highway patrolmen will be on duty. "But the best work toward reduction

of the highway toll can be done by drivers themselves," Garrison said. "General carelessness and inattentiveness, coupled with disregard for the law, stand out as the greatest cause of highway tragedies."

BRAZOS HEARING SET

Texas Water Commission will hold a hearing January 20 on the Brazos River Authority's application to take water for municipal, industrial and irrigation use from four big reservoirs in its watershed.

Commission, which has bought conservation space in the reservoirs from the U. S. needs a state use permit. Reservoirs are Proctor on the Leon River in Comanche County, Belton on the Leon in Bell County, Stillhouse Hollow on the Lampasas River in Bell County, and Somerville on Yegua Creek in Washington County.

FRUIT FLY INFESTATION

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White plans to turn loose a Mexican fruit fly infestation in the Rio Grande Valley citrus groves next month.

But no damage will result. State and federal entomologists will release large colonies of sterilized fruit flies in the area to study their migration habits. Test flies will be fed a dye which glows under fluorescent light. Data gathered from the sterile fly tests will help researchers work out an effective control program over dangerous flies in the future.

UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

A record \$68,300,000 in unemployment compensation benefits was paid by the Texas Employment Commission during the year ending Aug. 31, 1963. This was revealed in a TEC report to Governor Connally, which said a record payment represented a 28 per cent increase over 1962.

During the report period, the number of persons paid state unemployment benefits rose six per cent to 271,800, while 79,000 Texas employers covered by the Act contributed two per cent more than during the preceding year.

On the bright side of the job picture, the Commission said it found jobs for 900,000 persons during 1963.

CONTEMPT HEARING SET

A January trial date has been set in the Travis County court on contempt charges growing out of refusal of four to testify before legislative committees.

M. D. Mallard of Bryan, M. C. Parson of Austin and E. D. Dickson of Dallas were cited for balking at House General In-

vestigating Committee questions in the Southwest Conference basketball point-fixing probe.

Judge Earl Sharp of Longview failed to appear before a House committee investigating slant-hole oil well drilling.

SHORT SNORTS

Governor Connally named Mrs. Neatha Frame of Fort Worth to the State Board of Cosmetology to succeed Mrs. Edna Moore of San Marcos.

A Legislative Internship Advisory Committee is negotiating for a Ford Foundation grant to supplement State Funds in a program aimed at interesting young Texans in governmental careers.

Texas public school administrators will hold their annual advisory conference on education here on January 8-10.

First meeting of the statewide Citizens Committee for Comprehensive State and Community Mental Health Planning was held here on Dec. 14 to map a county-by-county study of mental health problems.

The State is back in the red, state treasurer Jesse James reports. The shaky general revenue fund showed a \$12,400,000 deficit on December 12.


