Mr. and Mrs. Frank Turner came to King's Manor in May of this year, Mr. Turner is the Business Manager for West Gate, the nursing unit on the campus. Mrs. Turner, called Ruth by most of our residents, is Director of Nursing Service at West Gate. The Turner's came to us from Lubbock, Texas. He has been associated with Quicksall-Pryor for nineteen years. He began work with them shortly after his release from World War II. His father was the Rev. J. M. Turner, a Baptist Minister who came to the South Plains in 1912. Frank has been an official in First Methodist Church in Lubbock for many years.

Ruth is a registered nurse, a licensed technician, and was for some time on the surgery staff as an anaestatist in more than one Lubbock hospital. In 1946 she joined the staff at First Methodist Church in Lubbock to direct a program of nursing service for people of limited resources in the older section of the city. Her station wagon was soon well known in the areas of the city where suffering and pain was too expensive except as served by the beloved nurse. Ruth became the agent for people of many denominations who wanted to express compassion through her ministry. The work was given national recognition by an article in the Christian Advocaet in an illustrated story titled "Church Nurses Are Different." The national Methodist magazine Together also featured a pictorial story of her work. "To the suffering unfortunates, she is the First Methodist Church — a woman whose service is a witness to Christ's compassionate and healing ministry on earth."



During the past week, the United States came face to face with a crisis centering around unwarranted attacks on our ships in the Viet Nam conflict area. Our answer came in the form of immediate and forthright action, which makes us proud to be

At the same time, we cannot help but wonder if many people around the world are not a little bit confused? Lo, these many years, it has been an accepted fact that few Americans could interpret and understand the methods of "Asiatic mind." Now, the worm may have turned. Asiatic leaders, for instance, may find it difficult to have listened to the Republican convention, digested the accusations and insults hurled at President Johnson and the Democrats then. in one undiscussed, unrehearsed moment, find these two forces united firmly and ready to do battle for the welfare of the

Understanding the "American mind" and its workings will be all the most dif-ficult for much of the world, because most of the people have never known or enjoyed the fruits of true freedom and democracy and from this source alone springs our ability to unite overnight in behalf of a common cause. This is all the more surprising in that it includes the masses as well as the

The achievement of unity in this fashion, including Pearl Harbor, no doubt contributes most heavily to the fact that our

### Growth Pattern Marches Along

Hereford is still establishing new growth records with a total of \$2,379,400 in permits issued for the first seven months in 1964. This figure breaks the 1963 record of \$2,307,930 by a margin of \$71,470.

The result of this phenomenal growth while other farm areas are going down instead of up - has resulted in two important questions: "How big is Hereford" and "How big will Hereford get?"

Estimates on the present population figure vary from 10,000 to 14,000 and, of course, no one really knows - or cares enough to make a nose count. Future growth falls into pretty well the same category in that all predictions, at best, can be no more than educated guesses.

We can foresee an upsurge in business and service growth during the next two or three years, however, in view of the fact that almost all of our present expansion has been in the form of housing and population. Much depends, too, upon the factor of future industry - and how much of it will follow the pattern of industry now under construction. Just as our schools, hospitals and other public facilities have found themselves over-crowded, it is logical that individual firms will expand, or that new competitive firms will move into the area.

Meanwhile, Hereford has jumped into the national spotlight due to its growth, definitely contrary to general trends of growing cities and smaller towns. Some people are beginning to wonder if "Small Town, U. S. A." is truly a thing of the past, or if the brain-trusters have merely conned us into believing some unproved theory.

At home, most of us are finding it nice to vary from the statistical pattern as we continue to grow, and grow and grow.

### 'Rithmetic' On The Way Out

The "Three R's" — "reading, 'riting and 'rithmetic" - long symbols of American education, is finally on the way out. At least, so says a national release from San Antonio which heralds the institution of "modern mathematics" in Texas schools, come September. "Reading and 'riting", at least for the time being, are destined to continue their present role in education.

The new mathematics system was instituted in some grades in Hereford last year, and will make further inroads here in 1964-65. Ultimately, the new system will take over completely. Current delays, we understand, are delayed on some levels due to the difficulties in changing out text books and finding teachers.

The new system, based on decimals, has many advantages, according to educators, who say that students primarily have a more complete understanding of the subject, chiefly because the new method shows them "why" certain conditions exist, rather than committing tables to memory, and accepting them as proven fact. Also of considerable influence is the ever-growing acceptance and adaptation of computers, now used extensively in government and in busi-

To say the least, the shift will provide some consolation to harassed parents previously confronted with the chore of helping merely say, "I don't understad this newfangled stuff" - and believe you me, he will be telling the truth.

### Driver To Blame

Law enforcement officials, editors and any of the public concerned with the appalling toll of traffic accidents feel a common futility about how to cope with the

There are many causes, and various remedies have been advanced by experts. But a Dallas citizen, in a letter to a newspaper in that city, speaks more truth in blunt language than all of the learned dissertations on the subject we have seen.

Speaking of drivers' tests, the Dallas

"Wrecks are not caused by people who do not know how to drive. Most of them are caused by the idiot who doesn't care. Grounding the habitual lawbreaker is more important than drivers' tests."

Drivers' tests are essential, and serve a good purpose, but they alone do not guarantee traffic safety.

The intent of the driver behind the wheel, toward law enforcement and toward the rights of others, unquestionably is the greatest factor bearing on traffic safety.

Texas' toll of accidents and deaths is increasing and unless the trend is reversed, and it seems unlikely, this will wind up a grisly year indeed.

This problem deserves the most careful attention of the 59th Texas Legislature which will convene next January. Every cause and every measure relating to improving traffic safety should be considered. If the laws need to be stricter on revocation of licenses of incorrigible drivers,

it should be done.

Let us hope that the legislature does not become so burdened and preoccupied with the problems of congressional redistricting, legislative redistricting, teachers' salarles and higher education that the crisis on our streets and highways is slighted. -The Abilene Reporter-News



Dear editor:

I read something in the paper last night during a rerun that convinces me this country needs a new law regulating political statements.

I don't know how many words a human being utters in life-time, but it must run into the millions, maybe hundreds of millions when you average in women too, and it's impossible to use that many words without getting on practically all sides of all questions at one time or another, especially if you needed a few more votes back in that election 15 or 20 years ago.

I'm not sure this law would work, but that's no reason for not passing it. If you set up the rule a law has to work before you pass it, you'll eliminate half the lawyers in this







Williams also stated that new equipment such as desks and balckboards will be placed in many of the schools. To replace old equipment as well as meet the demand of the growing school system.



will reach all levels of the Hereford Public School System in two years, is designed to take the student out of the language of the adding machine and put him in the language of the calculator, said Bill Phillips, who is in charge of high school curriculum.

He explained that almost every college and large company has computors and it is therefore necessary for the students to understand the basic principles that make these machines operate.

This new math program was used on a limited extent in high school last year. The algebra books and a few of the higher math books contained some of the new math.

"In an Algerra I class, the students seem to catch on to the new match just as easily as they did the old math, but those who had Algebra one from the old books and Algebra II from the new books found it more difficult.

"It is just like learning a foreign language or anything else for the first time, it is just as easy to learn one thing as another. For instance, it doesn't matter whether a student learns Spanish or German, both will be equally difficult. It is the same way with the new math," said Phillips.

This fall, the program will be started in the seventh and eighth grades for the first time, said Della Stagner, coordinator of the program in the elementary grad-

She also said that there had been some transitionary work done in the sixth grade last year, to prepare students for the new type math next year.

This year the first through the fifth grades will continue to study the traditional math, but in the fall of 1965, the new math program will go into affect in all grades of the Hereford Pub-




NEW BUILDING — Here's the architect's drawing of the new north elementary school to be erected just north of 16th Street. The building is to be ready
