Thought to be the first of its kind State lawmakers, who asked in the United States, the measure allows the withholding of victims' names, addresses and other identifying information.

Sen. Kent Caperton, D-Bryan, a frequent sponsor of open-records legislation, said the bill "just slipped through," during the regular legislative session, which ended May 29.

Blair said, "There was no opposition (to the bill) at any level ... It went through the process like every other normal bill does.

"It's just that those who were interested didn't pay any attention and didn't do anything about it," he said, referring to the lack of opposition by news organizations.

"I think the lawmakers are just like you and everybody else," Blair told reporters. "I think all the lawmakers saw the bill as I saw the bill.'

Clements signed the measure June 14. He said later that he hadn't thought it would put crime victim information crime information, such as the names

Numerous police departments have sealed or severely restricted their arrest and offense reports. Some departments were studying the law before making changes in polices on releasing

State troopers have been told to withhold any victim information in a possible felony crime.

Texas Media, a volunteer-run, freedom of information group composed of statewide news organizations, didn't notice the bill as it went through the Legislature, said chairwoman Sharon Jayson.

"Texas Media is so new that I think it's going to take some (legislative) sessions to get everybody in gear," she said. The group watched and researched about 50 of the more than 5,000 bills lawmakers filed in the regular session, she said.

The organization did the best it could to protect open meetings and open records laws this session, Ms. Jayson said.

"I've talked to several legislators who called me themselves in the past few days and said, 'What happened? How did this happen?' and they (had) voted for it," Ms. Jayson said.

"It shows that there's a problem. Things slip through," she said. "No matter how good anybody does their job, things slip through."

"information that identifies or serves to identify a person who, based on information in the possession of the governmental body, appears to have been the victim of an offense that is a felony"

Today as Friday, June 30, the 181st day of 1989. There are 184 days left in the year.

Today's highlight in history:

On June 30th, 1934, Adolf Hitler began his "blood purge" of political and military leaders in Germany. Among those killed was Ernst Rochm, leader of the Nazi storm troopers and Hitler's one-time ally.

On this date: In 1834, the Indian Territory was created by Congress.

In 1859, French acrobat Emile Blondin crossed Niagara Falls on a

tightrope as 5,000 spectators watched. In 1870, Ada H. Kepley of Effingham, Ill., became America's first

female law school graduate. In 1906, the Pure Food and Drug Act and the Meat Inspection Act

became law. In 1936, the novel "Gone with the Wind" by Margaret Mitchell was

published in New York.

In 1952, "The Guiding Light," a popular radio program, made its debut as a television soap opera on CBS.

In 1963, Pope Paul VI was crowned the 262nd head of the Roman Catholic Church in an outdoor ceremony at St. Peter's Square.

In 1971, a Soviet space mission ended in tragedy when three cosmonauts aboard Soyuz 11 were found dead inside their spacecraft after it

returned to Earth. In 1971, the 26th Amendment to the Constitution, lowering the minimum voting age to 18, was ratified as Ohio became the 38th state to approve

In 1977, President Jimmy Carter announced he had decided against production of the B-1 bomber, saying it was too costly. (However, the B-1 was later revived by President Ronald Reagan.)

In 1982, the time limit for the proposed Equal Rights Amendment to the Constitution expired, with proponents falling short of the three

additional states needed to ratify it. In 1985, 39 American hostages from a hijacked TWA jetliner were

freed in Beirut after being held 17 days. In 1986, in a 5-4 decision, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that states could outlaw homosexual acts between consenting adults, even in the privacy

of their own homes. Ten years ago: President Jimmy Carter, on a visit to Seoul, South Korea, reaffirmed America's military commitment to its Asian ally, but also challenged his hosts to match their human rights record with their

economic achievements. Five years ago: John Turner was sworn in as Canada's 17th prime minister, succeeding Pierre Elliott Trudeau. Playwright Lillian Hellman

Lewis says some interests 'greedy'

AUSTIN (AP) - Lawmakers adjourned for the long holiday weekend on a sour note over the issue that brought them here in the first place - workers' compensation.

House Speaker Gib Lewis on Thursday blasted special interests picking over a proposed overhaul of the state workers' comp system and said another special legislative session may be needed to break the impasse.

'I don't remember any issue that I have been so frustrated over in my life," said Lewis, D-Fort Worth.

Lawmakers have been in special session since June 20 after failing during the 140-day regular session to reach a compromise on the issue of compensating workers who are injured in on-the-job accidents.

"Nobody wants to be fair. It's all greed, and nobody wants to give an inch," Lewis said. Meanwhile, he said, employers and workers are getting a 'raw deal.'

"You've got the highest premium charges and the lowest benefits," he said.

"I had some scandalous things exposed to me on how workers' comp works ... and it's really disheartening to see how people who should not be involved in the system at all have raped, robbed, and pillaged the system.

"I'm talking about doctors, insurance companies and trial lawyers and everybody that is connected with the system," he said.

Although most lawmakers left Austin for the July 4 period, Lewis said closed-door negotiations between key legislators will continue.

State Rep. Richard Smith, who has been meeting with Senators in the private negotiations, said, "We are not near getting a bill agreed to by the Senate, but we are making progress, and it's very slow."

"It's not real encouraging at this point," Smith, R-Bryan, said. Smith said the House will consider his bill in about one week.

The major dispute is over whether to allow disputed workers' comp claims to go to a jury trial.

A Senate proposal maintains the right to a jury trial, while the House wants to eliminate the trials in favor of an administrative system of resolving disputes.

Businesses say that jury trials have driven up the cost of workers' comp insurance premiums, which have increased 148 percent over the past four years, but labor groups and trial lawyers, who represent injured workers in court, say the increases are due to inadequate work safety conditions and greedy insurance companies.

CASSEROLE 4 small zucchini, sliced small onion chopped

2 tablespoons olive oil or cooking

One 16-ounce can stewed tomatoes, cut up One 8-ounce can tomato sauce

1/4 cup snipped fresh oregano or 1 tablespoon dried oregano, crushed 4 ounces Cheddar cheese

4 ounces Monterey Jack or mozzarella cheese

In a large skillet cook zucchini and onion in hot oil for 2 minutes or until just crisp-tender. Do not overcook. Add undrained tomatoes, tomato sauce and oregano. Bring to boiling; reduce heat. Simmer, uncovered, for 5 minutes.

Meanwhile, slice two or three 1/4inch slices from each block of cheese; reserve slices for garnish. With a sharp knife cut remaining cheese into 3/4inch cubes. Stir cubed cheese into zucchini mixture. Transfer to a 11/2quart casserole. Bake in a 350-degree F oven for 10 minutes or until heated. Remove. Arrange cheese slices on top. Let stand 5 to 10 minutes or until cheese melts. Makes 8 to 10 servings.





Police arrest tree-poison suspect

AUSTIN (AP) - The Travis County district attorney praised an "outpouring of support from the community" for the historic Treaty Oak after a man was charged with felony criminal mischief in the poisoning of the tree.

Paul Stedman Cullen, 45, of Elroy, was being held in lieu of \$20,000 bail in connection with the poisoning, authorities announced in a Thursday news conference at the centuries-old tree. Elroy is a community south of Austin.

Authorities said the pouring of the powerful herbicide Velpar around the tree's base may have occurred during some sort of ritual. Police would not elaborate.

"The arrest is a tribute to both the good work of the Austin Police Department and to the caring of this community," said District Attorney Ronald Earle, noting that several residents phoned in tips to police.

"The people who live here have a pretty high awareness of their environment and take steps to preserve it," he said.

Cullen was arrested at 11:41 a.m. near a farm and ranch supply store where he worked, said Austin Police Sgt. John Jones, who investigated the

Velpar through the business.

Senator wants talks suspended

WASHINGTON (AP) - A Florida senator is calling for a suspension of U.S. talks with the Palestine Liberation Organization after two secret meetings between the Bush administration and Chairman Yasser Arafat's second-incommand.

And Israel is registering regret and disappointment. Ambassador Moshe Arad called at the State Department Thursday to say PLO terrorism is escalating and that the U.S. move has hurt chances for holding Palestinian elections. Sen. Connie Mack, R-Fla., asked

Secretary of State James A. Baker III in a letter to suspend all contact with the PLO until Congress can review the development in hearings and in committees.

"It is incomprehensible to me that the administration would escalate its contacts with the PLO without any consultation with Congress or any improvement in PLO behavior," Mack said.

While the senator said the Bush administration had "upgraded its contacts," State Department officials said the two meetings did not reflect a change in policy.

The State Department confirmed that Robert Pelletreau, the U.S. ambassador to Tunisia, met twice with Salah Khalaf, known also as Abu Iyad, who is Arafat's security chief. There was no immediate word on the outcome of the meetings.

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

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
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
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
