### Plant Nears Full Steam

OKALHOMA CITY (AP) - An Oklahoma firm has begun turning a long unappreciated resource - cattle manure into valuable methane gas.

In the next few weeks, a pipeline will begin carrying the product to Chicago, where it is expected to furnish enough power to meet the natural gas demand of 3,500 homes each year.

Already, 580,000 cubic feet of methane gas is being produced each day at the plant in the rural Oklahoma Panhandle run by Calorific Recovery Anaerobic Process Inc. - or CRAP - said Jim Samis. president of the parent firm. Thermonetics, Inc., of Oklahoma City.

When full production is reached in the next few weeks, the plant is expected to turn 1 million pounds of cattle manure into 1.76 million cubic feet of methane gas each day.

"Even if gas was produced from all the nation's cattie feedlots, it would still be an insignificant energy source in terms of national needs," Samis said. "But the basic process we use is a future energy source. We could use waste from agriculture or plants taken from the ocean to make ger in the same way."

The plant near Optima, Okla., is using manure rather than the other substances mentioned by Samis as a fuel source because the manure is relatively cheap.

"Nobody ever told me I was crazy, but I imagine they thought so," Samis said with a laugh, recalling the four years of planning and \$3 million worth of construction that went into the plant.

The firm's name - Calorific Recovery Anaerobic Process - explains how the plant turns manure into methane, Samis said. The initials were arranged for a humorous effect, he added.

"As far as we know this is the only commercial-size plant like this in the world," Samis said. "The process we use isn't new, but it's never been done on this

Rising costs and dwindling supplies of energy led Thermonetics to conclude that cattle manure could be a money-making raw material, said Samis, who is part-owner of Thermonetics with Clint Murchison, owner of the Dallas Cowboys

CRAP has tentative plans to build three manure gasification plants in the Texas Panhandle, near Hereford and Dumas, and is considering a plant in California.

"We need at least 100,000 head of cattle in an area" to make a manure gasification plant feasible. Samis said. 'There's just a certain number of sites in the country.'

CRAP has signed a 25-year contract with People's Gas Co. of Chicago to

supply the utility with methane gas. Samis said. People's Gas will pay \$1.94 per thousand cubic feet when the gas starts moving, and the price will rise with inflation, based on the Consumer Price

The price People's Gas will pay is a few cents less than it costs to produce the fuel, but the difference will be made up with the sale of other manure

### **Hereford Plant Construction** To Begin When System Complete

Thermonetics will begin construction of two methane-producing plants in Deaf Smith County as soon as a pulvarizing system is developed in the company's Guymon, Okla., operation, according to Ron James, Thermonetics marketing

Thermonetics announced plans last year to construct two plants--at costs of \$6 million and \$3 million--near Hereford and a \$3 million plant in Dumas, bringing the total number of operations in the company to four James called the pulvarizing system

which decreases the particle size of raw

cattle manure, a source of methane, "the final engineering scheme in our Guymon

The Guymon facility has been in operation for six months.

"Just as soon as we know exactly what the final enginnering scheme will be, we'll begin construction in Hereford," James said. "It must be within a year at the outside because our contracts, our time committments, with the feed yards in Hereford begin to expire in the first part of the summer of 1979.

"Right now we're trying to get the Guymon plant up to capacity. We're about 40 percent capacity right now.

"All these problems are definitely

correctible. There's no question about that. It'll just take a little more time before we can start on these other plants."

The Guymon plant is processing approximately 200 tons of manure daily, with a potential capacity of 500 tons.

"One item of good news, though, is we are on the pipeline, shipping gas to Chicago. We can produce gas and we are very, very pleased with the results.

"We've also begun marketing a bi-product called Calfeed and we're extremely impressed with the economics of that feedsutff in growing and fattening

### **Economy Recovering** From Winter Slump

WASHINGTON (AP) - The government said today that U.S. industries increased their output in March by the largest amount in a year, an indication the economy is recovering from its winter

Industrial production for March was up 1.4 percent, the largest increase since March 1977, when it rose 1.6 percent. In January, industrial output dropped 0.8 percent and in February it was up 0.3

Growing industrial production means factories are hiring more workers and there is an increased demand for products.

In 1977, the economy rebounded strongly in March after snowstorms and freezing weather forced factories to close. The economy has been recovering more slowly this year, but today's report indicated activity is picking up.

Although striking coal miners did not return to work until the last week of March, output of energy materials was up I percent in March.

Despite the strong showing in March, the output of the nation's mines, factories and utilities increased only slightly from the fourth quarter of 1977 to the first quarter of 1978. The Federal Reserve Board, which released the report, said that reflected the effects of severe winter weather and the long coal strike.

The biggest gain in March was in production of consumer durable goods. such as automobiles, home appliances and furniture, which went up 5.2 percent. These products, which could lead to increased consumer buying, has been less in demand in January and February.

### **Education Department** Has 57 Sponsors

WASHINGTON (AP) - Two months after President Carter renewed a campaign promise to create a separate Department of Education, his administration is telling Congress what it wants to include in the new agency.

**Budget director James McIntyre was to** confer with the president today before testifying about the administration's preferences to the Senate Governmental **Affairs Committee** 

Sen. Abraham Ribicoff, D.-Conn., the committee chairman and a former secretary of health, education and welfare for two years in the Kennedy Administration, has 57 sponsors for his bill to establish a new department.

White House officials were still conferring Thursday about which functions to include in the new department and which to exclude. Only about half the more than \$20 billion that the government spends on education passes through HEW.

Sources within and outside the government say the new department was not likely to include HEW's Head Start program for preschoolers, the National Endowment for the Arts and Humanities or the Agriculture Department's School lunch program.

It will be up to Congress to make the

final decisions. Although the president has broad powers to reorganize the executive branch, he cannot create a new department without legislative approval by Congress.

### Guerillas To Endorse Black Rule Transition

DAR ES SALAAM, Tanzania (AP) Rhodesian guerrilla leaders are expected to endorse the British-American plan for their country's transition to black rule in a round of meetings begun today with Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance and British Foreign Secretary David Owen.

But U.S. officials say Rhodesian Prime Minister Ian Smith - and not guerrilla leaders Joshua Nkomo and Robert Mugabe - is blocking a conference of all Rhodesian factions to negotiate a peace agreement

Vance and Owen first met with the two guerrilla chiefs for about a half-hour today at the Kilimanjaro Hotel, where Vance is staying. The four were then joined by representatives of Botswana. Tanzania and Zambia, three of the black states that back the guerrillas.

Envoys from Mozambique, Angola and Nigeria were to join the talks later. The discussions are scheduled to continue

Some of the gas the plant produces will be used for power in the manure gasification plant, but most of it - 1.6 million cubic feet a day - is to go to

People's Gas. Plans call for the plant to sell 584 million cubic feet of methane gas produced from manure to People's Gas each year for \$1.13 million.

The plant also is expected to produce 75,000 tons of cattle feed annually from manure. The selling price of the feed hasn't been determined, but it will probably be less than for comparable feed, which goes for \$18 to \$20 a ton.

Material left after the production of methane gas and cattle feed will be sold as liquid fertilizer. Fertilizer sales will be "very minor from a revenue standpoint," Samis said.

At the gasification plant near Optima, manure is put in a 35-foot high, 100-foot wide enclosed tank, where bacteria break it down in about 10 days into a mixture of gases. The gases consist primarily of methane, carbon dioxide and water

The methane is then separated from the other gases and fed into a pipeline. The methane gas produced from cattle

manure at the 50-acre plant "is identical to piped natural gas that comes from the ground," Samis said.

Though some expensive than federally regulated interstate gas, the gas derived from manure is competitive because it offers a steady supply and because the price of natural gas is expected to rise. Samis said. He said gas produced from manure is cheaper than foreign-produced natural gas and gas produced from coal.

The gasification plant gets its manure from three nearby feedlots. A full-grown steer produces 91/2 to 10 pounds of manure each day. CRAP pays \$1 a ton for the manure.

The Treasury Department says that although this group represents only three-tenths of one percent of U.S. citizens, they pay a full 10 percent of all personal income taxes. percent of total taxes collected by the federal government.

It is admitted that there are many happenings, and possibilities to cause us to be frightened, and the fright will be a normal response: more for some than others. In view of these known facts, we must condition ourselves so we

WE MUST ADMIT that there is a wholesome feeling which we refer to as "fear" which should not be discouraging. "There is a virtuous fear which is the effect of knowledgeable fear, and a vicious fear which is the product of doubt and distrust." - Pascal. One is helpful, but the other is harmful; the source of discouragement and terrible imaginations, "This "vicious fear" can tryannize in the imagination to raise phantoms of horros, or to beset life with supernumerary distresses." - Johnson.

THE DISTINCTION BETW. EEN what we shall call "wholesome" fear and "unwholesome" fear can be made by reasonable effort. This is just exactly what we must do. We can usually get all of the information we need, we have the power to sort it out and to get the facts, and we are intelligent enough to see the differences; even to rid ourselves of the "vicious" unwholesome fears and act with good judgment regarding the

DEAR ANN LANDERS: My husband and I are heartsick. Our youngest child, a daughter aged 21, has dropped out of her senior year at a fine university (she was an honor student) and has joined a religious cult.

This girl was not on drugs. She did not smoke or drink. She was a delightful, full-of-life. sensible, solid young woman -until she met a young man who persuaded her to look into his religious rebirth and join him in "a whole new world."

His "whole new world" has caused our daughter to cut herself off from education. family and all former friends-except those who are cult members. She left our home taking nothing with her except a few pieces of underclothes and a coat. No shoes, dresses, slacks, sweaters, cosmetics--nothing. It was made clear we were not to try to contact her, that she would write or call when "God told her to."

She kissed us both goodbye and left the house saying, "I haver never been happier in my life." (Her boyfriend was

waiting outside in a 1964 Buick.) What should we do, Ann? Her brother and sister are heartsick. It has been nearly three weeks and we haven't heard a word. I cannot sleep at night and my husband and I are going to

WASHINGTON (AP) - On the morning after President Carter delivered his latest fight-inflation speech, Washington newspaper readers could take their pick of reaction reported from business and financial circles.

The lead article in the business section of the Washington Post said "business leaders, such as General Motors Corp. Chairman Thomas

A. Murphy, expressed relief that the president continued to reject wage and price controls....."

Four pages later, under a headline that read "Dollar Weakens Sharply After Carter's Comments," a New York foreign exchange specialist, James Sinclair, was quoted as saying, "The market had anticipated some form of

controls other than the voluntary restraint called for." Carter, in his carefully

prepared address Tuesday to the American Society of Newspaper Editors, noted that. where inflation is involved. 'There are no easy answers.'

This was something of an understatement. Indeed, every American will be watching to see if there are any workable

answers that do not carry political or economic price tags too inflated to be acceptable to Carter, the Congress, business and labor.

Already the unions that represent federal workers are in full cry against a central feature of Carter's anti-inflation program - a proposal to limit the 1978 salary increases for government while collar employees to 5.5 percent. Carter said he was bent on

"setting an example for labor and industry to moderate price and wage increases." So, for purposes of argument, let's assume Congress approves the wage hike ceiling and that private employers do the same. Then further assume that living
