'Jump-Starting' Dead Car Battery

COLLEGE STATION - Learn the correct way to "jump-start" a dead battery before attempting the procedure, advises Claudia Kerbel, a consumer information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Jump-starting involves using a pair of booster cables to borrow starting power from the battery of another car, the specialist explains.

If it is necessary to jump-start a car, follow instructions in the owner's manual.

If you don't understand the instructions, don't attempt the procedure. Get help from someone who knows how to jump-start.

Ask a qualified mechanic for a demonstration before trying to jump-start a battery alone, Ms. Kerbel recommends.

Exercise the following precautions when jump-starting a dead battery:

- Learn which is the positive and which is the negative terminal on the dead battery and on the booster battery.
- Remember, connect "+" TO "+" and "-" TO "-" when jump-starting.
- Make sure the booster battery and the dead battery are of the same voltage before trying to jump-start.
- Use extreme caution when connecting or removing booster cables. Grasp the cables by the insulated handles--never by the bare metal ends.
- Be careful of moving engine components like the fan and fan belt.
- Improper jump-starting or carelessness with a battery can be hazardous, resulting in damage to a vehicle's system or possibly a battery explosion, the specialist cautions.
- The prime hazards from battery explosions are flying particles and battery acid getting in the eyes or on the body.

Baked Ham, Always A Family Favorite

COLLEGE STATION - Baked ham, juicy and flavorful, makes a big hit anytime of the season, says Marilyn Haggard, foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Therefore, appearance, inspection marks and the number of people to be served are pertinent in the ham selection:

- Look for the inspection marks that indicate that the meat was inspected and passed by the United States Department of Agriculture.
- Choose hams with a higher proportion of lean to fat and bone.
- Fresh hams should have a grayish-pink or red color--cured hams, a deep pink color.
- Size--allow one-half pound per person for bone-in hams.
- Ham, as well as other pork products, are high in nutritive value and can ease into any calorie-conscious diet.
- It is rich in protein and thiamine (B1), as well as the other B-vitamins and iron, too, the specialist continues.
- Calorie-wise, a three-ounce serving of cured ham, fat trimmed off, contains about 160 calories.
- Preparation-wise, hams are best when roasted in an open, shallow pan with no water added.
- Some tips on cooking ham are:
 - It is easier to remove the rind from the ham when it is hot.
 - Follow cooking directions on the wrapper or container when available.
 - A shallow pan is better than a deep one for roasting.
 - A rack under the ham holds meat up from drippings and allows heat circulation.
 - A meat thermometer is the best guide to the doneness of ham.
 - For easier slicing, allow 15 to 20 minutes after removing it from the oven.
 - To eliminate the fuss of carving the ham at the last minute or even at the table, here is a recipe that calls for slicing the ham before putting it in the oven.

BAKED STUFFED HAM
1 2 1/2-pound canned ham
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped celery
3 tablespoons butter
2 1/4 cups fresh bread cubes (1/4-inch)
1/2 cup chicken broth
1 tablespoon minced fresh parsley
1 egg
Cut ham into 10 slices (3/8-inch thick), and place on foil-lined jelly roll pan.

Saute onion and celery in melted butter in skillet until tender.

Combine bread cubes, broth, egg, parsley and sauteed vegetables in large bowl. Mix lightly but well.

Arrange stuffing between slices, leaving two slices between stuffing layers. Tie securely with string. Cover loosely with foil.

Bake at 350 degrees F. for one hour. Remove foil and continue baking one more hour or until stuffing registers 165 degrees F. on meat thermometer.

Remove from oven. Let stand 10 minutes. Makes six servings.

Soybeans Recommended For Baking

What is one of the world's most versatile crops and most nutritious foods? How about soybeans!

Soybeans are not just a field crop grown for livestock feed. Soy flour, soy oil and margarine and soy proteins are common ingredients in a wide array of prepared foods and mixes, and are used in many favorite recipes. Whole field variety soybeans can be used in many tasty dishes, from appetizers and soups to main dishes and even desserts.

Considered one of the five great protein foods, soybeans are the best source of protein in the vegetable kingdom. The following recipes were developed by two eastern Oklahoma farm women, Jan Pearson and Modean Ross. They started with common field variety soybeans, straight from the combine.

Husbands, children and neighbors on their "taste-testing panels" weren't the only ones to rave about these gals and their cooking ability. Jan's Pecan Soya Buttons and Modean's Soyprize Bread won top honors at the Muskogee County Pecan Show last winter.

Quick cooking method: Use three cups of water for one cup of dry beans. Bring water to a boil, add dry beans and let set for one hour. Drain and replace with enough water to cover beans, simmering until tender (three to four hours) or pressure cook at 15 lbs. of pressure for 15 minutes.

PECAN SOYA BUTTONS
1/4 cup margarine or butter, softened
1 1/2 cups firmly packed brown sugar

1/2 cup cooked soybeans, ground and firmly packed
1 egg
2 cups flour (all-purpose)
1/2 cup soy flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon ginger
1 cup chopped pecans
1 teaspoon vanilla powdered sugar

1 teaspoon cloves
1 1/2 teaspoons allspice
Add to: 3 cups sugar and 3 1/2 cups flour

Stir until smooth.
Add:
1 1/2 cups pecans, chopped
1 1/2 cups raisins
Stir until smooth. Pour into greased pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes to 1 hour.
Makes 4 loaves.

SOYPRIZE BREAD
Blend together in blender until smooth:
1 cup salad oil
4 eggs
2 cups cooked soybeans
1/2 cup water
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
2 teaspoons soda
1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon

Soot, Stain Removal

COLLEGE STATION - Soot and smoke create special removal problems--especially from synthetics, says Linda McCormack, a family resource management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Soot or smoke damage is usually the result of a fire either from a fire damage sale or from a fire in the home.

When trying to remove these stains, take the article to a dry cleaner first.

The more different treatments used at home first, the harder it will be to remove the stain, the specialist cautions.

In fact, tumble drying would probably set the stain permanently.

Explain the stain or discoloration to the cleaner. They can remove the greasy component easily.

If discoloration remains in the fabric, it can be bleached with sodium proborate especially in white fabrics, she adds.
