Controversial Election May Draw Good Turnout

City, county hospital district and school board elections are scheduled for 7 a.m. Saturday at the Hereford Community

The elections will end at 7 p.m.

Local voters will cast ballots for two Hereford city commissioners, mayor, two Hereford Independent School District trustees and three Deaf Smith County Hospital District directors in separate rooms at the Community Center.

There are three candidates for Place 1 on the city commission--incumbent John Matthews, Wes Fisher and Trini Gamez. Matthews is a school teacher seeking his second two-year term. Fisher operates a produce company, while Mrs. Gamez is a

paralegal at Texas Rural Legal Aid.

Place 2 candidates are incumbent Ed Coplen, John Arsola and John Claypool. Coplen, owner of Western Auto, also is

hoping for a second term. Arsola, who ran for the commission last year, is employed at Armour Food Co. Claypool is a drama and aerospace instructor at Hereford High School.

Mayor Bartley Dowell is unopposed in his bid for a second term.

School board candidates seeking three-year terms are incumbents Sallie Strain and David Hutchins, and Americo Gamez. Two of those candidates will be elected, although persons may vote for two or fewer under the rules of an

Mrs. Strain is a housewife, Hutchins a farmer and Gamez a draftsman with J.W. McMorries Inc.

Running unopposed for an unexpired one-year term on the school board is Paul Ramirez. Ramirez, who was elected to the board last year, had to resign to comply with a state nepotism statute. His wife had been employed in the school district for less than two years at that time, and the statute requires a term of employment for at least two years.

All three candidates for the hospital district board are assured of election to the three open seats. Candidates are Warner Lawson and incumbents Dr. Gerald Payne and Eddie Reinauer Jr.

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter's new energy plan to couple higher domestic oil and gasoline prices with a "windfall profits tax" is already facing stiff opposition in Congress.

Top administration allies on Capitol Hill predicted an uphill battle for the tax proposal the president announced Thursday night.

"It's going to be tough," said Senate Energy Committee Chairman Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash.

In a nationally broadcast address, the president said he would gradually lift price lids on domestically produced crude oil, leading to total decontrol by mid-1981-a goal long sought by the U.S.

Administration officials said the plan would add 4 to 5 cents a gallon to the price of gasoline and other petroleum products by mid-1981. But other unofficial estimates put the total increase at up to 15 cents a gallon.

Carter's address came two years after he sent his first energy plan to Congress as "the moral equivalent of war," a package of proposals that took Congress until last fall to pass.

Carter said the action would help conserve oil by making it more expensive and also would provide a financial incentive to U.S. oil companies to seek

Reactor Out of Control For 16 Hours, Report Says

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) - Three Mile Island's renegade reactor, now stabilized and slowly approaching cold shutdown, was out of control for 16 hours before engineers harnessed it after the initial accident, a Nuclear Regulatory Commis-

But on Wednesday, March 28, the day the plant began leaking radiation, Metropolitan Edison, the plant's operator, insisted things were under control and there was no danger to the

"We had a situation where the safety of the plant was going downhill in fits and spurts from 4 a.m. to 10 p.m. and then started to level off again," said Robert Bernero, the NRC's decontamination expert said Thursday in an interview.

"It took 16 hours of arm wrestling to restore the reactor coolant flow,' Bernero added.

"Everybody knew there was danger Wednesday," he said. "Wednesday night, it was known that an awful bash had been given the plant."

Engineers were cooling the damaged nuclear reactor and removing gas from its sealed dome and its coolant system today. They were awaiting the go-ahead on a 10-day plan to drop its temperature below the boiling point while pressure drops to normal.

After reaching cold shutdown - the point where the reactor poses no threat of escaping control - radiation spills can be mopped up and 250,000 gallons of contaminated water converted to sludge and buried.

U.S. Unemployment Rate Remains At 4½ Year Low During March

WASHINGTON (AP) - The nation's unemployment rate remained at a 41/2-year low of 5.7 percent in March, while the number of persons who have abandoned the search for jobs fell to the lowest level since 1974, the Labor Department said today.

The department said there were 725,000 so-called "discouraged workers" in the first three months of the year those who want jobs but have given up looking for them because they believe none is available.

The March employment report showed the economy is maintaining sufficient strength to provide jobs for newcomers to the labor force, although the economy did not make any further dent in the number of previously jobless persons.

The Labor Department said total employment increased by about 200,000 during March, to a total of 91.8 million, while unemployment remained at the February level of 5.9 million.

The unemployment rate of 5.7 percent, the same as in February, was the lowest since August 1974, when it was 5.4 percent. The number of discouraged workers was the lowest since the third

quarter of 1974, when it was 617,000. The increase in employment of 200,000 in March compared with substantially larger gains in the first two months of the year and appeared to reflect a slowdown in economic growth that the Carter administration says is necessary to help

control inflation. Most of the March job gains occurred among adult women, the department said. It reported a big increase in jobs in wholesale and retail trade. And it said there was a gain of 70,000 jobs in manufacturing industries, notably in electrical and transportation equipment and machinery.

The department said the number of persons in the labor force increased by 190,000 during March to a record 102.7 million. The labor force includes both persons with jobs and those who are

seeking them. The Carter administration has been trying to slow the econony's growth to help restrain inflation. That, according to the scenario most economists follow, should mean a rise in unemployment.

Although a decline in joblessness would seem to be good news, the administration has reacted with less than complete enthusiasm. It feels the jobless rate has been at a level that reflects inflationary conditions.

The administration predicted in January that unemployment would rise to 6.2 percent in the final quarter of this year, reflecting the slower economic growth the government is trying to engineer to help control inflation.

The problem in the last few months. however, has been that the economy showed more strength than expected, especially in the final quarter of 1978, when it grew at an annual rate of 6.9 percent as measured by the gross national product.

Inflation continues to be the major preoccupation of administration economirts. The labor Department reported Thursday that wholesale prices rose 1 percent in March and were up 14.1 percent at an annual rate during the first three months of the year, the largest quarterly advance in more than four

Food prices increased 1.2 percent in March - down slightly from a 1.6 percent increase in February and a 1.8 percent rise in January - but still substantial. Prices of food ready for consumers increased 12.8 percent during the 12-month period ending in March.

House Committee Restores Funding for Inner City Aid

WASHINGTON (AP) - The House Budget Committee restored \$500 million for President Carter's troubled urban program Thursday, partially reversing an earlier decision to eliminate \$1.5 billion

for the plan to aid inner cities. "This was really the centerpiece of the president's urban program," said Rep. Stephen R. Solarz, D-N.Y., sponsor of an amendment to restore the funds. "I'm trying to preserve at least the possibility for this promising program to get off the ground."

The urban aid vote came amid mounting White House pressure for a

reversal of Wednesday's vote to delete funds for the program. The aid is "desperately needed by our cities," declared White House press secretary Jody Powell.

After the committees action, Powell said, "This is certainly a step in the right direction which we appreciate." He said the president would continue to fight for restoration of the full amount.

The House committee added the urban aid funds Thursday as it put finishing touches on a proposed budget that calls for \$533 billion in spending, \$507.8 billion

Mengden Defends Hike In Legal Drinking Age

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Sen. Walter Mengden ended up Thursday defending his bill to raise the state's drinking age to 19 against attacks it would contribute to teen-age unemployment.

"There are a lot of 18-year-old high school seniors and college freshmen trying to work their way through school, but under this they couldn't work in a restaurant that serves beer," said Sen. Gene Jones, D-Houston.

Mengden, R-Houston, told the Senate that school teachers and administrators have complained of drunk students attending classes and showing up intoxicated at school-sponsored activities. "All the education associations in this

state favor a higher drinking age," Mengden said. His bill would raise the state drinking

age from 18 to 19. The legal limit was lowered in 1973 from 21 to 18. "This is the Unemployment Act of Texas of 1979," quipped Sen. Oscar

Mauzy, D-Dallas. Even before the drinking age was lowered from 21, Jones said 18-year-olds could work in places that served alcoholic Mengden's bill had been reported

favorably from the Senate State Affair's Committee. But committee member Chet Brooks, D-Pasadena, said employment restric-

tions never were discussed. "I don't believe the question of employment opportunities ever came

up," Brooks said. The sponsor agreed to postpone Senate consideration until Tuesday to allow him to remove the work restrictions.

However, some senators opposed the entire concept. "It would make a second-class citizen

of someone in one area," said Sen. Jack

Ogg, D-Houston. "It's not equal, it's not just and it's unequal protection," Ogg continued. "It's putting every other area of responsibility on them but saying in this

Plane Narrowly Avoids Disaster

DETROIT (AP) - The 80 passengers aboard the TWA flight from New York to Minneapolis had just eaten a mid-air snack when they felt the craft begin to

Suddenly, the plane swerved to the right, completed a 360-degree barrel roll and nosedived from 39,000 to 12,000 feet - 5 miles - in a matter of seconds at a speed apparently exceeding that of

"You could feel your face pressed back and the blood rush to your head," said 22-year-old Chell Roberts, a University of Utah student who was aboard. "Everyone was screaming. I thought it was over.

"We were just through eating when it happened...People started to scream and a flight attendant started to cry," he said. "It's really a funny feeling to see what everybody does before they think they are going to die."

But nobody died Wednesday night. Only three people aboard suffered minor

Federal Aviation Administration inspectors said it was "miraculous" and 'unprecedented" that the Boeing 727. jetliner survived such mid-air trauma before being brought under control in a desperation maneuver. Evans Electrocution Stayed by Justice

ATMORE, Ala. (AP) - Condemned murderer John Louis Evans III, who was down to his last meal, his last shower. and his last words of love to his family before being spared from electrocution, now must decide whether to fight his execution.

Evans, six hours from death today in Alabama's electric chair, burst into tears Thursday evening when he learned of his reprieve - a stay of execution he had not asked for.

U.S. Supreme Court Justice William Rehnquist - acting on an appeal from Evans' mother, Betty Evans ordered the execution delayed at least until April 13.

The decision brought an explosion of cheers and death row inmates at Holman Prison and words of grief from death penalty advocates who had assembled near the prison.

Foes of capital punishment held candles aloft in the night and sang "We Shall Overcome." Clergymen describing themselves as "biblical fundamentalists" said the court had turned its back on God's rule of "a life for a life."

FCS Loans Set Records Last Year

WASHINGTON (AP) - Loans by member units of the Farm Credit System set records in 1978 and are expected to increase further this year, according to its top officials.

Donald E. Wilkinson, governor of the Farm Credit Administration, says the continued growth in lending will be due in part to "continued improvement" in the general farm economy, including a willingness by many farmers to buy additional land.

Net farm income jumped about 40 percent last year to about \$28.2 billion from \$20.1 billion in 1977. The Agriculture Department says a further gain is expected this year, perhaps to around \$31 billion.

The FCA is an independent federal agency that oversees the Farm Credit System, which includes federal land banks, production credit associations and banks for cooperatives.

In an annual review, the FCA reported that total lending by the system last year was a record \$45.1 billion, up 15.9 percent from \$38.9 billion in 1977.

Wilkinson said strong demand for loans developed in the second half of last year - coinciding with rising prices for livestock and generally improved prospects for many other commodities.

"New loans by the federal land banks during the fourth quarter of 1978 were up 27.6 percent over the same period in 1977, the highest fourth-quarter growth rate in four years," the report said.



Oilman Says Carter 'Shifting Blame'

HOUSTON (AP) - A Texas oilman says President Carter is trying to take advantage of public discontent on energy by using the decontrol of domestic crude oil prices to shift blame for high prices to the oil companies.

"Putting the windfall tax on the oil companies and accusing them of cheating the public and damaging the country was 100 percent demagogic," Michael Halbouty, former head of the 20,000 member Association of American Geologist, said Thursday.

"That's no way to win the support of

the people he needs to get the energy."

President Carter, during a nationallytelevised speech Thursday night proposed the phase out of federal price controls on domestic crude oil by September 1981 and the passage of a 50-percent windfall profits tax.

Halbouty called the phased deregulation a "step in the right direction. But he said the President is "not doing it in the





COLLEGE STATION - Learn - bare metal ends. the correct way to "jump-start" a dead battery before attempting the procedure, advises Claudia Kerbel, a consumer information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System.

Jump-starting involves using a pair of booster cables to borrow starting power from the battery of another car, the specialist explains.

If it is necessary to jump-start a car, follow instructions in the owner's manual.

If you don't understand the instructions, don't atempt the procedure. Get help from someone who knows how to jump-start.

Ask a qualified mechanic for a demonstration before trying to jump-start a battery alone, Ms. Kerbel recommends.

Exercise the following precautions when jump-starting a dead battery:

-- Learn which is the positive and which is the negative terminal on the dead battery and on the booster battery.

Remember, connect "+" TO "+" and "-" to "-" when jump-starting. -- Make sure the booster

battery and the dead battery are of the same voltage before trying to jump-start. --Use extreme caution when

connecting or removing booster cables. Grasp the cables by the insulated handles--never by the





Times Get Rough for Builder of 3-Mile Plant

have been rough lately for J. Ray McDermott & Co. Inc., the conglomerate whose Babcock & Wilcox Co. subsidiary built the damaged Three Mile Island nuclear power reactor near Harrisburg, Pa.

McDermott already was plagued by a lengthy decline in profits from its sizeable oilfield construction business. Then former chairman Charles L. Graves, who stepped down March 2 because of "medical problems," pleaded no contest in a federal court March 30 to conspiracy and fraud charges.

an investigation of price-fixing in the offshore oilfield construction industry. McDermott, a leader in the industry, earlier had pleaded no contest to a conspiracy charge and was fined \$1 million.

The Three Mile Island plant was damaged by an accident March 28 that sent radiation into the surrounding area and brought threats of a "meltdown," the worst possible disaster at an atomic reactor. The Nuclear Regulatory Commission has said three separate human errors contributed signiThe NRC said it has no

immediate plan to close the seven other Babcock & Wilcox atomic power plants in other states, although it is sending inspectors to them.

Things haven't been all bad for Babcock & Wilcox, which has a healthy business building coal-fired power plants. And McDermott - despite the legal troubles and a pessimistic profit outlook - easily raised \$150 million on Wall Street on March

Some of that went to pay bills McDermott ran up two years

ago, when it spent \$748 million in cash and stock - an outbid conglomerato United Technologies Corp. - to buy Babcock &

Until 1977, McDermott's business was the construction of offshore oil and gas production platforms and underwater pipelines. But offshore drilling activities worldwide have slackened while competition for the remaining business has intensi-




