Readers Are Asking .

IS DYSPEPSIA a real disease or is it a symptom of a

stomach disorder? Dyspepsia is derived from the Greek dys. meaning bad, and peptein, meaning diges-The word, therefore, applies to almost any stomach upset that is associated with

a sense of fullness, nausea, vomiting and an acidy taste

in the mouth. The term. dyspepsia, is sometimes stitute for acute indigestion, acid

gastritis and upset stomach. These short - term stomach upsets are called by a variety of names, none of which differs markedly from

To these has been added another vague term, "the twenty-four-hour virus," which has a certain kind of class distinction, but which really presents much the same symp-

It is interesting to note that there are very few basic symptoms caused by disorders. inflammations and infections of the stomach and the upper intestine. It is for this reason that self-diagnosis of indigestion or dyspepsia, must not be made especially if the condition occurs frequently.

The stomach is said to be a very good neighbor and makes the loudest noise when organs in its immediate vicinity become sick. Diseases of the gall bladder, the pancreas, the liver and the ducdenum may make the stomach the loudest complainer with the identical symptoms of nausea, vomiting and heartburn.

It takes the discriminating judgment of a physician to distinguish by the history of the origin of the condition, the frequency with which it occurs and other clinical evidence, to come to a firm conclusion about the basic cause. This is most important because early treatment of the "vague dyspepsia" keeps the condition confined and uncom-

ly into the lung to find the cause of a chronic cough? A procedure known as bronchoscopy is one that can be

done either under local or general anesthesia. An instrument, the bronchoscope, is a rigid metal tube that comes in many lengths and widths. chosen according to the size and age of the patient. It is passed through the mouth, past the larynx and beyond trachea, and into

By this method almost all the bronchial tubes can be carefully examined for the possibility of chronic infection and growths. Cultures and sputum examinations can be made directly through the bronchoscope and can add valuable information for the diagnosis of complex lung conditions.

It is possible to instill a liquid dye through the bronchoscope, allowing it to trickle down even into more inaccessible areas. By X-ray, the dye is followed, and often reveals disease that might otherwise remain hidden.

Foreign bodies of every conceivable kind have been removed from the lungs through the bronchoscope. At the Manhattan Eye, Ear and Throat Hospital there are on display hundreds of objects removed from the lungs of children and adults. The hardware, like nails, screws, safety pins, bobby pins, dentures, springs and toys, are but a handful of those that stand as mute testimony to the indiscriminate swallower and to the success of bronchoscopy. A similar technique called esophagoscopy is used to examine the esophagus, the tube that leads from the mouth to the stomach. This, too, adds important diagnostic information.

This is because increased exemptions may, actually fuel the inflation which has plagued our economy for so many years. Inflation is a tax for more cruel than actual income taxes. Another example can be found in proposed changes in the taxation applicable to the oil and gas industry. Changes in this sector of our economy would affect all Texans because, as an oil-producing state, the Texas economy is tremendously affected by the oil and gas industry.

The Senate has voted to reduce the current 271/2 per cent depletion allowance for oil to 23 per cent. The House had earlier approved a reduction to 20 per cent. When the Senate completes its action on the remainaspects of the bill in which the House and Senate have not pre-

It is my opinion that action to reduce the allowance is a result of an eagerness to take vengeance on a sector of our economy which has been erroneously depicted as earning large sums at the expense of the average taxpayer.

-HB-Well, the TV networks are at it again. They have spent so much time and film on the My Lai incident that we seriously doubt that the accused soldier, Lt. Calley, will ever be able to get a fair trial.

Someone once said that "war is hell," and no one knows that better than the soldier that has been on the firing line. War is mean, and dirty and . . . fatal. The only iron-clad rule that we ever heard when a soldier went into combat was to try to stay alive.

And who ever said that the enemy had a corner on all the atrocities? They happen on both sides and too manytimes the victims are the innocent by-stander rather than the soldier as is apparently the case in My Lai, but if your propaganda machine is well oiled and working, you're supposed to make the world believe that only the enemy is responsible for such happenings. That's part of the dirty.

In the old days of World War II, a soldier responsible for such a massacre as has been alleged in the little South Vietnam hamlet of My Lai, would have been tried in a military court without all the fanfare of a Hollywood production. Many have been, and when found guilty, they were given their just due by the military courts, who can, by the way, be a lot tougher than civilian courts. But not so today. The TV networks are trying the man over the air before all the facts are in.

Perhaps he is guilty, and if so, he should certainly be punished. There is no excuse for mass anniliation of civilians, and this is certainly not representative of our fine military. But the man should have his day in court. He should not be tried over the air by a team of commentators. Besides that, we believe this nation's efforts to win a just peace in Vietnam has been seriously hampered by the adverse publicity over My Lai.

Which makes us wonder. Which side are the TV people

Inflation Is Popular

If inflation were like the measles or chicken pox it could easily be curbed. For no one wants these diseases and everyone joins in the crusade to combat them. Inflation, on the other hand, is far from universally unpopular. While most persons agree that it is a menace, they personally enjoy it and suggest that any attack on it be confined to the other fellow's area.

The dangers of inflation would be eliminated for instance, were we all to accept a cut in income, in business profits, and in prices to place the value of the dollar on a stable level. But who would expect a worker to yield to a reduction in his wage in the hope that eventually the cost of living would be cut proportionately? Or a manager to reduce the price of his product because his payroll may eventually be smaller?

The decline in the stock market is good medicine for inflation but it is a better pill for brokers and investors. Higher taxes are also prescribed as helpful in curbing inflation but they don't evoke applause from taxpayers. Now President Nixon has called for a 75 per cent cutback in new Federal construction, and while this is considered an effective device for curbing

inflation it has been greeted with howls of anguish rather than a cheer. So long as they post-pone federal construction in another state or district there will be no protest but once the cutback hits home it will come under heavy at-

But the presidential order indicates a growing awareness of the futility of trying to combat inflation with an army of volunteers. Those wage-price guidelines promoted by President Kennedy and Johnson were nobly conceived but they proved useless because they could not be enforced. And every other attempt to curb inflation by voluntary acceptance of sacrifices has proved equally futile. It may not be pleasant to contemplate, but all evidence points to the compulsion of law as the only hope of effectively carbing inflation. This can take the form of wage-profit-price controls, a reduction of government spending, higher taxes, or any other enforceable restriction. For most people so enjoy basking in the euphoria of inflation that they will not take the medicine necessary to cure it. Hence, the prospect that indesperation ovn me they have toram it down the ram in down their throats. Asbury Park (N.J.) Press

Give them time to lay down some rules similar to what every legitimate and conscientous newspaperman goes by. Tell both sides and don't try to slant the news. Don't just select certain items for the newscasts because they appeal to the ideological views of the announcer.



Rule Is Keep To The Right

In general, the rules for flag display call for a keep-to-theright practice. In a chancel of a church or on a speaker's platform, the American flag is placed to the speaker's right. However, when the flag is displayed elsewhere than on the platform, the flag should be to the right of the audience, facing the platform, with any other flags on

In a parade which includes one or more flags the American flag should be on the marching right (the flag's own right), or if there is a line of other emblems, in front of the center of that line. The flag should never be displayed from a parade float except from a staff, or so suspended that its folds fall free as though staffed.

When flags of two or more nations are displayed, they should be flown from separate staffs of the same height and the flags should be of approximately the same size. International usage forbids the display of the flag of one nation above that of another nation in time of peace.

When the American flag is hoisted or lowered or passes in parade, all persons should face the flag, stand at attention, and salute. A man should remove his hat and hold it over his heart with his right hand. If hatless or a woman, the salute is made by placing the right hand over the heart;

FOOTNOTE TO HISTORY - The Sweetgum, Yubadam and Yoo Hoo Railroad has to be one of the unique transportation enterprises in Texas history.

It began about 1889 as a narrow gauge line running from Hallsville, in Harrison County, to Yubadam, a now vanished village where Thomas F. Durham operated a sawmill. Durham built the line to haul lumber.

Originally the railroad was known as the T. M. & C. (Two Mules and a Car) because mules were used to pull the single car from the mili to Hallsville. It became, for reasons no one now can remember, the Sweetgum, Yubadam and Yoo Hoo wher. it acquired a wood-burning locomotive.

The line existed until the sawmill closed about the turn of

SHOPPING NOTE - Chastity belts are among the souvenirs for sale at Houston's unique Weatherby Arms Museum. Ochiltree produces more of the golden grain than any other Texas county, and is among the top wheat-growing areas in the U. S.

TOTEM POLE TOWN - Big Spring, Howard County, is the unofficial totem pole capital of Texas.

The town got its first authentic replica of this old Indian art in 1933 when Nat Shick became seriously ill and decided to take up wood-carving during his convalescence. When he got through whittling on a hefty pole that had been used to support a clothesline, he had his first totem.

In the 6 years since, Mr. Shick has averaged turning out about one totem pole each year. They range in size from miniatures to a few that tower more than 25 feet. Several are on permanent display in Big Spring, including one in the Shick front yard at Sixth and Gregg Streets.

DOWN MEMORY LANE - Hangar No. 9 at Brooks Air Force Base in San Autonio, the only remaining World War I military aviation installation in the U.S. is being restored to its old elegance.

It was on Hangar 9's flight line that voice communication between instructor and student via a speaking tube was first introduced in the U.S. The first aircraft to be equipped for instrument (blind) flying also were housed in the historic
