#### Skeleton discovery termed 'significant'

WASHINGTON (AP) - When Mount Vesuvius buried the Roman city of Pompeii and much of its population, the people of neighboring Herculaneum were thought to have escaped. It now appears many did not make it.

Scientists have discovered more than 80 remarkably well-preserved human skeletons in the ruins of Herculaneum, and suspect that hundreds more might lie beneath the volcanic debris, the National Geographic Society announced today. The discovery is significant because few other complete

skeletons of ancient Romans survive. The society is sponsoring efforts to preserve the find, which is in danger of decay with exposure. The find includes bones of an oar-clutching sailor lying

beside a capsized boat, a woman with a hand still adorned with gold gemstone rings and a cluster of 12 skeletons huddled together in embraces of death. Discovery of so many, skeletons on what was the

beachfront of the town is the first indication that large numbers of people were overtaken by volcanic ash and stone as they tried to flee by sea, said Dr. Giuseppe Maggi, director of the Herculaneum excavation. Because few remains were found previously, scholars

thought most of the townspeople had escaped the fate of many of their neighbors. Herculaneum is believed to have been a wealthy resort

community of about 4,000 persons when Vesuvius erupted on Aug. 24 and 25 in the year A.D. 79. Located in a suburb of present-day Naples, the town was

a few miles from the base of the volcano and 10 miles from Pompeii. Its seashore, now buried under 80 feet of solidified ash, is 500 yards inland from the present Mediterranean shore. The cache of skeletons was found in and around a large

public bath near the old beach outside the town walls. Two terraces supported by stone arches connected the bath with two nearby religious buildings. While many people fled Herculaneum on foot after the

first day of eruptions, which buried Pompeii and 2,000 of its citizens, others stayed near the shore awaiting rescue by ship, scientists believe.

The second day of eruptions sent an avalanche of debris pouring onto Herculaneum at 60 miles per hour, overwhelming and obliterating the town. Herculaneum remained lost until 1709, when a well dig-

ger broke through to an underground theater. Although the town was tunneled in search of art and treasure, it wasn't until the last century that archeologists systematically began removing the blanket of debris.

Recent excavation at the old beachfront led to discovery of four skeletons in 1980 and triggered seeping ground water. Workers dug trenches to combat the water and under arches supporting the terraces found more skeletons, most of them this year, researchers said.

The skeletons are all nearly complete from head to toe. scientists say, and are the first human remains from the Romans to be studied by modern scientific techniques.

Among the findings so far are that many of the victims had sound teeth, attributed to the low-sugar diet of the

#### **Technicality** saves draft resister

LOS ANGELES (AP) - A federal judge, citing a legal technicality, tossed out regulations that require millions of young men to register for the draft and also said the government cannot selectively prosecute registration resisters.

In knocking out the government's case against 21-yearold David Wayte, U.S. District Judge Terry Hatter Jr. ruled Monday that the Selective Service System should have waited 30 days for public comment before enforcing a draft registration proclamation issued by President Carter in 1980.

'The court cannot close its eyes to the fact that the proclamation became effective a mere 21 days after it was published in the Federal Register," Hatter said in his ruling. Hatter also ruled that the

#### Body identified as that of businessman

SULPHUR SPRINGS, Texas AP -Medical examiners positively identified a decomposed body found last week as that of a former Braniff International executive, who disappeared during a business trip to East Texas last month.

The body was that of Edson Emerson Beckwith, who died of multiple stab wounds, according to Deborah Sanders, a field agent with the Dallas County medical examiner's office.

The death has been ruled a homicide, authorities said Monday.

Hopkins County Sheriff J.E. Tittle said Texas Rangers, an investigative branch of the Department of Public Safety, have joined the sheriff's department in the murder investiga-

A ranch foreman discovered Beckwith's body Friday in woods about four miles northwest of Sulpher Springs and four miles northeast of where Beckwith's abandoned car was found Oct. 15.

The 51-year-old financial consultant was returning to Dallas from a business meeting in Omaha, Texas, when he disappeared.

His wristwatch and a wallet, containing no money; were found on his body, authorities said.

His wife, Jane, said she suspected foul play when her husband, who was always punctual, failed to return home as scheduled.

I'm sure it was robbery, because they found no money on him," she said. "I think they held him up, and he tried to fight them.

"He was probably fighting for his life," she added. "But he was always a fighter. He probably was just reac-

ting to somebody holding him up." Beckwith's 1979 Oldsmobile was found along a rural road 75 miles east of Dallas. The keys were in the ignition and Beckwith's suit coat was hanging on a hook in the back seat.

Officers found a pair of driving gloves nearby with a spot of blood identified as being Beckwith's type.

#### Man arrested on obscenity charges

LUFKIN, Texas AP - A 62-year-old Pollok man arrested on obscenity charges this weekend ran a child pornography operation for possibly two decades and even planned a book entitled "Little Girls of East Texas," sheriff's officials say.

Richard Amos Limoges remained in the Angeline County Jail today in lieu of \$30,000 bond set by Peace Justice Hulon McClure.

Limoges was charged with obscenity and sexual performances by children after officers arrested him Sunday night and seized about 4,000 photographs, videotapes, camera equipment and a color laboratory. said chief sheriff's deputy Ron Bran-

Limoges, a maintenance man at Lufkin State School, was taken into custody after a two-week undercover investigation, Brandon said.

The man had been taking pornographic photographs of pre-teens and young females in the country "for some time," Brandon said, speculating Limoges may have been operating for 10 or 20 years.

Limoges was paying the girls \$100 per sitting and then selling the photographs to magazines, the deputy

The undercover agent, whose identity was not disclosed, accompanied one of the juvenile girls to Limoges'

Pollok home, was wired with a hidden microphone, Brandon said.

Names of some of the girls could be turned over to juvenile authorities for investigation, but none has been arrested, the deputy said.

Limoges also had a few pictures of older males, he said.

#### Two held in shooting death of guard

CARROLLTON, Texas AP - Two men faced questioning today in the Oct. 28 shooting death of an armored car guard who was gunned down while carrying a cash deposit from a supermarket, authorities said.

The men, ages 19 and 25, were ordered held without bond Monday by Justice of the Peace James Erwin. No formal charges had been filed early

Billy Perkins, a guard for Purolator Armored Inc., was shot three times in the chest after two men approached him in the vestibule of a Skaggs Alpha Beta store, police said.

The 19-year-old, who listed a Carrollton address, was arrested Friday on a narcotics warrant, according to Lt. Pete Cole

Officers began questioning the man about the slaying after the second suspect was arrested Sunday night at his home in The Colony, Cole said.

rise the year before. Economists have attributed the improved wholesale price inflation showing in part to the deep recession, abundant crop harvests and the worldwide oil glut.

The department reported this detailed examination of wholesale price activity last month:

-The overall food price decline was paced by lower prices for pork. Prices also declined for fresh fruits. flour, dairy products and rice and other cereals. Egg prices were up sharply, however, as prices also rose for poultry. fish, coffee, soft drinks, and shortening and cooking oil.

-The decline in energy prices came despite a 1 percent rise in home heating oil prices, which had been off 1.6 percent in September.

All the increases are adjusted to take into account normal seasonal variations. such as weather.

In advance of today's report, economists were, predicting that further modest inflation reports could be expected in the months to come. Said Thomas Thomson.

chief economist for San Francisco's Crocker National "I think the good news continues on the inflation front. I

can't conjure up any situation that would rapidly accelerate prices. ... We're going to have a very low rate of inflation over the next six months."

Today's report said that for the 12 months ending in October, wholesale prices rose

#### Newcomer recalls poverty stricken African city

"Seeing children and adults running naked through the streets begging for money just to buy food was heartbreaking," says Gladys Greenawalt.

Mrs. Greenawalt and her husband, Bill, who reside at 709 Seminole, moved to Hereford from Crete, Neb. While Bill was working as

supervisor maintenance engineer for Seaboard Allied Co. out of Kansas City, he had an opportunity to work in Nigeria, Africa for a year," explains Ms. Greenawalt.

We had originally planned to live there for two years but things got pretty rough. The government was changing and there was much killing in the area we lived. We decided to come back to the states

'It was a fascinating experience living in a foreign country," continues Ms. Greenawalt. "I never did get used to seeing the horrible poverty, though, that exists in Africa. We read of the pathetic living conditions and we see photographs of starving children, but the ugly reality of it all can never really sink in until we see it firsthand.

"If the African people were fortunate, they had shacks to live in, if not, they literally made their homes on the streets. They used the streets as their bathroom as well as their sleeping facilities. If they lived on the river, the water was used to urinate in, to bathe, in and they even had to drink the green-tinged, contaminated water.'

"It was a common sight to see people beg for food for their families. Shopkeepers would line the streets of the cities and cry for people to by merchandise," explains Mrs. Greenawalt

'My husband and I lived in a small town called Sapel-Bendel which is located in West Africa. We had a very nice apartment and I had a steward and driver available at all times.

'Our driver was very faithful. He was trained to literally give his life for me and the steward was equally faithful.


'He performed all the household chores, did all the cooking and purchased household goods for us," continued Mrs. Greenawalt

Everything, especially food, was extremely expensive. We had most of our food shipped to us from the states. Just as an example to the

'I like to keep busy," she says. "Bill and I have done a lot of redecorating on the house and plan to build an enclosed sun porch. We also share an avid interest in sports, especially baseball."

"I wouldn't trade the experience for anything. I love people and I love seeing how people in different countries live." said Mrs. Greenawalt.

We have traveled to London and Amsterdam and thoroughly enjoyed it. I have been as far east as New York and as far west as California. In fact, I guess I have been in most every state except Mississippi and Georgia."

Mrs. Greenawalt's hobbies include reading and cooking, and she is currently teaching herself to play the organ.

Texas was expected to be Sun Bowl-bound.







The official bowl bids must wait until the weekend, but college football's postseason lineup is beginning to take shape now that it appears that the Sugar Bowl has lined up Penn State as the opponent for No. 1-ranked Georgia on New Year's Night.

While Penn State apparently had not made a definite commitment to the Sugar Bowl pending a meeting between Coach Joe Paterno and his senior players, The Associated Press learned that Paterno had been in touch with a New Orleans

hotel concerning accommodations. The Nittany Lions were ranked No. 4 in last week's AP poll.

Georgia and second-ranked Southern Methodist are the only major unbeaten-untied teams. Georgia clinched its third consecutive Sugar Bowl berth by defeating Auburn 19-14 on Saturday. The 10-0 Bulldogs close out their regular season Nov. 27 against 6-4 Georgia Tech.

SMU, also 10-0, winds up its regular season Saturday the Southwest Conference in Texas Stadim. Arkansas is the SWC's only other Cotton Bowl possibility.

Pitt reportedly will be the visiting team in the Cotton Bowl. Penn State, 9-1, and Pitt, 8-1, meet Nov. 26, six days after most of the bowls will be locked up.

The annual rumor circulated that some of the bowls would wait for the results of the Thanksgiving weekend games before making their decisions, but that didn't last long.

The host team in the Orange Bowl will be the Big Eight champion, either Nebraska or Oklahoma. If Florida State beats LSU on Saturday night, the Seminoles will be the other

half of the Orange Bowl matchup. However, an ISU victory would throw the Orange Bowl into a state of confusion since LSU is not high on its

If LSU wins, it is in line for the Bluebonnet Bowl, probably against Arkansas or SMU, whichever one does not go to the Cotton Bowl. The LSU-Florida State loser likely will go the Gator Bowl against West Virginia, although the Bluebonnet Bowl will take LSU win, lose or draw. The Orange Bowl has not given up on Pitt, especially if SMU loses to Arkansas.

Some Orange Bowl committee members are pushing for Notre Dame, which has lost two games and tied one and has road games remaining at Air Force and Southern Cal. Notre Dame, regardless of its record, would almost certainly cut into the TV

Also on the Orange Bowl's list-possibly-is defending national champion Clemson, which won the 1981 title by defeating Nebraska in Miami. However, Clemson has been under investigation by the NCAA and the Atlantic

It was known that Clemson had told certain bowls last week that the school would not be allowed to play in a post-season game, but later word said the ACC would permit Clemson to play in a Jan. 1 game because of the large payoff. However, if Clemson does go on probation, the Tigers may decide to begin the penalty immediately and get one no-bowl year out of the way so other schools cannot use it against them as much in recruiting.

The Rose Bowl, of course. matches the Pacific-10 and Big Ten champs. Michigan has clinched the Big Ten title, while Washington is favored to beat Washington State on Saturday and lock up the Pac-10 crown.

Arizona State reportedly will host the Fiesta Bowl in its own stadium at Tempe-it could be embrassing to all concerned if the Sun Devils lose to Arizona on Nov. 27-against the Nebraska-Oklahoma loser.
