# Hobbs is Miss Hereford

Deanna Hobbs was crowned the 1988 Miss Hereford Saturday night at the annual Miss Hereford Scholarship Pageant held in the Hereford High School auditorium.

Selected as first runner-up was Cathy Smith, who was also chosen by her fellow contestants as Miss Congeniality. Mindy Rowton was named second runner-up and received the talent award.

Miss Hobbs, a 5'6" brown-eyed brunette, is the daughter of Roy and Trudy Hobbs. Miss Smith is the daughter of Jim and Sharon Sutherland. Miss Rowton's parents are Jimmy and Dianne Rowton.

County Judge Tom Simons served as master of ceremonies after being introduced by Donna West, pageant director. Judges were Angela Knapp and Dave Oliver, both of Amarillo, and Bill Daniel of Tulla.

"G'Day Hereford!" was the pageant's theme, evidenced by a stark Australian outback scene complete with kangaroos, tiny sheep, a koala bear, trees, and geraniums. The theme, an Australian greeting expressing "good day", served as a preview of the Hereford Chamber Singers' upcoming June visit to World Expo '88, part of Australia's bicentennial celebration. Simons entertained the near-capacity au-

dience with his smattering of Australian expressions.

For the opening number, the 19 contestants danced and sang to a routine choreographed and coordinated by Keith Ann Gearn. The teenagers, ranging in age from high school sophomores to 20 year-olds, wore belted khaki walking shorts topped with pastel shirts and bandannas.

Delight Thames, 1987 Miss Hereford, performed a ballet routine to begin the pageant. Later in the evening, she took the customary final walk down the runway before presenting awards and crowning her successor.

The contestants were interviewed Saturday morning by the

judges, and Saturday night's first event was the evening gown competition. Winner Hobbs wore a deep purple gown of satin that was fashioned with a dropped waist and leg o' mutton sleeves. Smith wore a gown of black taffeta containing a bodice of black sequins flowing into a silhouette skirt. The gown modeled by Rowton was of aquamarine and also had a full skirt and sparkling bodice.

Following was the talent presentation by each contestant. Talents ranged from singing, dancing, twirling, comedy routines, a magic act, to performing on the flute or piano.

# One killed, three injured in accidents

One traffic accident this weekend claimed the life of a Hereford man and critically injured a Hereford woman, while two other accidents critically injured a 5-year-old Hereford boy and a Canyon man.

Michael S. Sossaman, 21, was pronounced dead at the scene by Oklahoma State Highway Patrol authorities Saturday afternoon after Sossaman was thrown through the windshield of his tractor-trailer rig near Guymon, Okla.

Christine Sossaman, a 21-year-old passenger, was also ejected from the vehicle and is listed in stable but critical condition at Southwest Medical Center in Liberal, Kan.

According to authorities, the tractor-trailer rig rolled three-fourths of a turn after Sossaman lost control of the truck on a county road four miles east of Guymon.

Services were held Monday at a funeral home in Hereford.

In another traffic accident, a 5-year-old Hereford boy, Michael Duffy of 220 Beach Street, suffered a skull fracture when he darted in front of an oncoming pickup at 6:50 p.m. Sunday.

Duffy is in critical condition at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

The pickup's driver, 23-year-old Eric Shawn Stubbs of 211 W. Sixth St., said he was driving south on Beach Street going approximately 20 mph when the boy ran from in front

of a parked car on the west side of the street.

"He came in front of me on the side I was driving on," said Stubbs. "If he had been behind the parked car and ran in front of me, I probably would have had time to see him."

Investigating police officer Cpl. R.V. Tackitt said no skid marks were found on the street, which is labeled a 30 mph zone.

Tackitt said he is still looking for witnesses.

A Canyon man sustained internal injuries when his pickup struck the back of a tractor-trailer rig at U.S. Highway 60 and Farm-to-Market Road 1057 at 2:30 a.m. Monday.

Robles Avila, 51, is in critical condition at Northwest Texas Hospital.

Texas Highway Department trooper Darrell Matthews said Avila was traveling west on U.S. Highway 60 behind the semi-truck's driver, Paul Finley of Paris, who was preparing to turn.

"Avila apparently never saw the truck because there were no skid marks, and all the taillights on the truck were working," said Matthews.

Matthews added that Avila was not wearing a seat belt since his head went through the windshield and the steering column was bent at a 90-degree angle.

Matthews took blood samples from Avila to check for alcohol, but the trooper said the results will not arrive for another two weeks.

## Fire destroys store

Allsup's Convenience Store at U.S. Highway 385 and Hiebach Street burned at 12:26 a.m. today after a fryer ignited. Damages are estimated at \$70,000 to \$100,000, said Fire Marshal Jay Spain.

The fire, which took the Hereford Volunteer Fire Department more than two hours to extinguish, destroyed all the merchandise in the store and warped the steel beams in the roof.

Russell Haley, director of the real estate and development departments

at Allsup's headquarters in Clovis, N.M., said he has not had an opportunity to view the damages, and doesn't know if the store will be rebuilt.

According to the fire report, Ruby Ramirez, the store clerk who was working at the time the fire started, said she was in the process of changing the oil in the fryer when a customer detained her. When the customer left, she saw black smoke billowing from the back of the store. No one was injured in the fire.

## Italians complete sentimental journey

18 Italian men completed a sentimental journey Saturday, coming to Hereford for the first time as free men to visit the site where they were imprisoned during World War II and to see the chapel the prisoners built to commemorate their comrades who died while imprisoned at the Hereford POW Camp.

Many of them brought wives and other family members with them to see the chapel, which is in the process of being restored, and to see the remains of the camp south of Hereford, in Castro County, where they were held from 1943 to 1946.

"We are so delighted and so proud to be able to take this pilgrimage to our camp where we spent three years," said Gen. Franco DiBelle, who was a junior officer when he was captured in North Africa almost 45 years ago.

"When we came here, 'Sentimental Journey' was one of your top songs, and this is a sentimental journey for us, for the possibility to visit here and to visit St. Mary's where we painted for three months.

"We are proud and happy to meet you now as free men and loyal fiends. Before, we were fierce enemies, fighting each other. We now consider you as real friends, as citizens of the leading country of the free world."

The Italian visitors were visibly moved as they unloaded from a

bus to see the chapel they built of hand-mixed cement. Some of them remembered those who came to see them—nurses, guards, farmers and others who worked with and around the prisoners.

"The emotional shock is something to take note of," said DiBello, who has been back to the area twice before but was still moved by the site of the chapel, and ceremonies at the chapel and at the Hereford American Legion Hall.

"They (other Italian visitors) are very seriously touched by the ceremonies and finding themselves in front of the chapel. The emotions of people, some of whom are 70 (years old) or more, is almost dangerous for the nervous system.

"They are all really touched, with tears coming to their eyes. The reception we have had is something—we certainly appreciate it very, very much."

The reception for the men included exchanging gifts and memorabilia at the chapel and at the American Legion. Gifts to the Italians included a scrapbook about the chapel restoration efforts from the Castro County Historical Commission, a book about the camp compiled by Joe D. Rogers and Charles Schlabs, keys to the cities of Dimmitt and Hereford, and strands of barbed wire which once surrounded the camp.

The barbed wire was decorated with ribbons in the colors of the American and Italian flags. The former prisoners held the wire skyward when the Rev. Blase Burneston explained to the visitors that the barbed wire was from the prison compound where they were held for three years.

Another special presentation came straight from the pockets of the Italian guests—over \$1,500 in

contributions to the Castro County Historical Commission for their efforts to restore the chapel. Adding to those donations were sales of additional barbed-wire pieces and booklets about the camp's history. The memorabilia is available for a minimum \$10 donation at the Deaf Smith County Museum in Hereford and at the Castro County Museum in Dimmitt.

The ex-POWs milled around the camp's remains for most of an hour, pointing out various features and following a map and blueprints drafted by Joe D. Rogers of Hereford.

"North? North?" asked Dr. Manzoni Aurelio of Milan, pointing northward and looking at the map. Assured he was pointing northward, Aurelio man pointed out that he was standing in the compound where he "spent three years as a very young man. I had received my law degree in 1938 and went into the army in 1939." Aurelio later became one of the most famous lawyers in Milan, DiBello said.

DiBello said most of the Italians were "not dismayed about returning here because in some ways this was the most positive experience we had in the war. After six months in Africa we were in bad condition, full of lice and everything. Our uniforms were in bad condition and worn out.

"The first hour in Norfolk, Va., was a great relief. All of our clothes were taken off and we had marvelous showers and were given all-new underwear. We were treated well.

"We were astonished to see the way we were treated on the train. We were served iced tea upon request—we had not had something like that to drink in months.

"There were more good impressions in Como, Miss. We were

given uniforms and got to sleep under two clean sheets—we had almost forgotten how good that was. We also received mail from home. We couldn't have hoped to be treated so well.

"Things became worse for us when Italy surrendered in 1943. From that time on something unpleasant began to happen in most of the camp. We were all given a chance to sign a cooperation paper, but 30 percent of us refused to sign it, refused to change. Many of those of high rank hoped to go home earlier and gain an advantage for themselves by signing the cooperation paper.

"At the end of the war, something unqualifiable and unbelievable took place. In a matter of days our food was strictly cut down, and our PX privileges were cut. After two months many began to starve and lost from 15-20 kilograms (30-45 pounds)."

DiBello could have returned to Italy earlier than 1946, but decided to stay to paint a Texas Historical Landmark—the murals at St. Mary's.

"The interior was blank," DiBello recalled. "We said we would paint it under the condition that our work would not be considered cooperation and that we not be paid at all. We painted the church for the glory of God in memory of our country.

"Everyone accepted this, and we made this work of which I am very proud and honored. We did this work for nothing but the glory of God—I would have refused even one cent."

Monday, the group departed Amarillo to tour the western U.S., including the Grand Canyon, Las Vegas, Los Angeles and San Francisco.

## Stories about for Italians, ceremonies

Saturday was also a day for swapping stories about experiences at the Hereford POW Camp—by Americans who worked there, and by Italians who were imprisoned at the camp south of Hereford.

"I think we treated them pretty well," said Viola Griswold, who was a nurse at the camp's hospital. "I know we fed them well, because I ate the same thing they did, and I didn't have any bad meals at the hospital.

"Usually the prisoners fixed all of the food. They put spices in EVERYTHING. It wasn't 'hot,' it was just spicy—a lot of spices we weren't used to, and spices in things we weren't used to having spices in.

"One day I was fixing to eat, and somebody asked, 'What's wrong with the potatoes?' Well, they had put a bunch of spices in the mashed potatoes. We had a hard time convincing them not to put spices in the mashed potatoes.

"They treated us well, and we treated them well. I guess the worst case we had was the first patient we had at the hospital. It was one of the original prisoners. Everybody else had marched from Summerfield to here, but they had to bring this boy by ambulance because he had tuberculosis. We was pretty far gone by the time he got here, and there wasn't much we could do for him.

"We really never had much trouble from them."

It is well-documented that soldiers of any war, and especially prisoners of war, carry mental scars for the rest of their lives.

"I was in the barracks right here," said one of the ex-POWs at the prison site Saturday afternoon, pointing to blocks that still delineate where barracks were placed.

"There was a guard tower right over here," he explained in broken English, drawing out and grasping for each word. "The lights were on all of the time, and I had to put my arms over my face to shut out the lights and go to sleep.

"I still put my arms over my face to go to sleep every night. My wife didn't understand at first, and she pulled my arms down from my face, but I just put my arms back up there. She doesn't move my arms now—she knows that's the only way I can go to sleep."

"I've got to tell you about the skunk," said Virgil Walker, who has lived three miles east of the camp site for over 50 years.

"We'd go to the camp every day and take them over to our place to shock feed," Walker said.

"They were working out there and all of a sudden this skunk ran out from under one of the stacks. One of the Italians grabbed the skunk by the tail, but he let him go real quick—I guess it was the first time he had seen a skunk, or smelled one.

"Well, they all started chasing after the skunk, and one of them finally got him and threw his cloth hat over the skunk. Then they went back to the truck and emptied out this box that had their lunch in it and threw the box over the skunk.

"They turned the box over, with the skunk still inside. They put the box in the back of the truck, and one of the Italians sat on the box the rest of the day.

"Well, it came time to go back, so they let us in. The American guards searched all of the Italians, and they were all just standing there waiting for the guards to open the box, and we waited around just to see what would happen.

"One of the guards got right up there to see what was in the box. He opened it up and this skunk jumped out. They all started chasing it, and the skunk would run under one of the barracks. They'd almost get it, then the skunk would take off again. They chased that skunk all over the camp—I don't think they ever got it. It was pretty funny to see 'em chasing that skunk."

Some of the organizers of Saturday's activities thought it would be great fun for everyone to sing "Rosemunda"—the Italian version of "Roll Out the Barrel." The first group of Italian prisoners sang the song as they marched from Summerfield to the camp in 1943.

As it turned out, it wasn't such a good deal. "Politico! Politico!" shouted one of the Italian visitors as the first strains of the song rolled out.

It seems that "Rosemunda" was the marching song of the Fascist loyalists during World War II.

Gen. Franco DiBello saved the day for an embarrassed Don Nelson, who was leading the singing. He took the microphone from Nelson and belted out a fantastic version of Cole Porter's "Don't Fence Me In," to the amusement of the crowd.

Clara Vick, secretary of the Castro County Historical Commission, was going to make a special presentation to Gen. DiBello, but couldn't find him.

Vick and Grant Hanna asked and asked for DiBello to come forward. Finally, the general made his way through the crowd to the front of the chapel.

"I'm sorry," DiBello apologized. "I have only been captured twice in my life. Once was in North Africa by the British, and the other time was here today by the TV people."

Rowton, dressed in a white pinafore complete with bloomers, clutched a Raggedy Ann doll while singing "Giggle," to earn the talent award.

The state meet is scheduled May 13-14 in Austin.

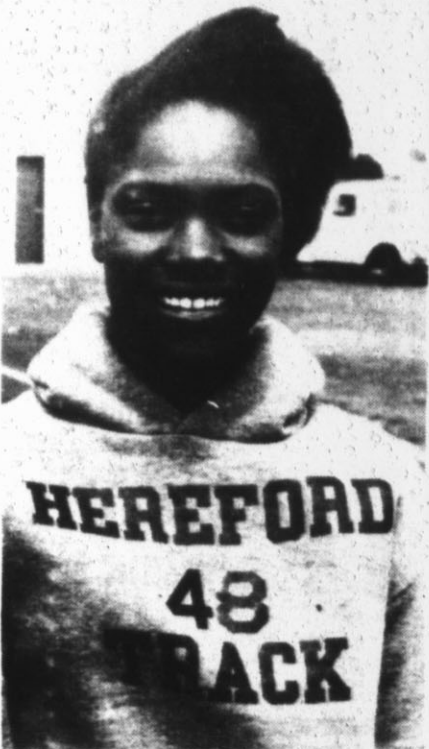
Hereford distance runner Nancy Garza just missed out on state meet berths when she finished third in two races -- 1,600-meter run and 3,200-meter run.
