



Nickel a gallon tax takes effect

WASHINGTON (AP) Motorists seeking a bargain fill-up had a tougher time today as the federal gasoline tax jumped a nickel a gallon across the country.

Maine and West Virginia were dealing drivers a double whammy by matching the nickel increase with an extra 5 cents of their own.

While it is the first time in nearly a quarter century that the federal gasoline tax has been raised, industry and government experts predicted only muted protests from motorists who are currently enjoying lower gas

Drugs, alcohol may have caused accident

BEAUMONT, Texas (AP) - Blood tests were conducted on 293 employees of a Gulf Oil Corp. refinery because officials determined that drugs and alcohol may have had some part in accidents that killed one worker and injured others, the company's response to a suit says.

The company made the statement Thursday in a nine-page response to a lawsuit filed by Maxie J. Cooper, who said the test violated his rights and constituted "assault and battery."

Cooper's attorney, James W Mehaffy Jr., is also seeking an injunction to keep Gulf from destroying records kept by the laboratory that conducted the blood tests.

Gulf's statement said that a year ago, the Port Arthur refinery where the tests were conducted was "the victim of a few inexplicable accidents which injured some employees and killed another while they were working in the course and scope of their

The company said officials determined that some of the accidents might be drug- or alcohol-related. The tests were necessary to "protect the health and safety of its employees, property and the community," Gulf's statement said

The statement said that at the time of the accidents, management had received reports from responsible employees working in the plant that illegal drugs were being used by some workers during working hours, and that some workers were reportedly intoxicated while attempting to perform their job duties and responsibilities.

Results of the tests, conducted between May 26 to July 6, bore out the reports, the statement noted

The twins, Brenda and Miriam Hernandez, were listed in stable condition after the surgery Thursday, said Linda Wilson, a spokeswoman for Providence Memorial Hospital.

"It was a difficult piece of surgery, performed with excellent skill," said neonatologist Richard Heath.

Doctors say their chances of survival are good and that their scars should heal within four weeks.

"I never lost hope that all would end well." the mother. Maria Delores Hernandez, 26, of Ciudad Juarez, Mexico, said after the operation. 'God was listening to our prayers."

A team of 20 medical experts had suspected before the operation that the twins might have shared a common heart, or at least a common heart wall, but the operation, expected to take eight hours, was completed quickly when surgeons discovered the separate hearts, Ms. Wilson said.

The key to separating them depended on how much they shared hearts," said cardiovascular surgeon Joe Kidd told the Dallas Times

The twins were joined from the sternum to the navel, but medical tests showed the girls had enough separate vital organ material to attempt a separation, Ms. Wilson said.

Gas decontrol would cut price, boost supply

HOUSTON (AP) - Removing federal price controls on natural gas would give the nation a 212-year increase in gas supply while reducing the price to the consumer, Shell Oil Co. Vice President Donald G. Russell said in prepared remarks.

In a speech prepared for delivery today in Nashville, Tenn., and released in Houston Thursday, Russell said that a Shell study finds the federal decontrol of gas prices will make it economical to boost recovery of gas from old fields that are now regulated

He said this would add about 50 trillion cubic feet of gas to the nation's reserves, or about 212 years of U.S. requirements, he said.

Without decontrol, said Russell, these additional reserves would be lost because they would be uneconomical to produce.

Russell said gasoline prices came down after President Reagan decontrolled the price of oil.

"Decontrol can work for natural gas, too," he said. "By pricing natural gas competitively with other fuels, drilling activity would increase, old wells would get a shot in the arm from new investment, market distortions would disappear, industrial competition would be restored and consumers would enjoy lower prices.'

Russell said President Reagan has proposed a decontrol bill that restore gas to the free market where prices would be established by competition by Jan. 1, 1986.

"N.C. State started well but Dereck Whittenburg, their best shooter (17.2 game average), broke his foot and some of the 10 games they lost happened while he was out of the lineup," Holland said. "They seemed to peak at the end of the season - an opportunistic, ball-control team."

"It's a poised, disciplined team which has been in the Final Four three times in the last four years," Holland said. "Yet Houston can be overpowering. Drexler is a tremendous athlete. Micheaux is less sensational but more workmanlike. And Akeem is dominating."

Houston finished the season with No.1 national ranking

on a record of 30 victories and two defeats. Louisville was back at No. 2 with 32-3.

"Incredible records," Holland acknowledged. "It looks like the logical championship game but, as we've found it, anything can happen."

He said Georgia's season record of 24-9 is very decep-

"Outside their conference they were unbeaten," he added. "they're in a crazy league - Kentucky, Alabama, teams like that - where everybody beats up on everybody else. People talk about their lack of height (starters range from 6-1 to 6-7) but they are exceptionally quick and againt North Carolina they destroyed the theory that you can beat them by making them shoot from the outside.

"Still, they'll have their hands full with N.C. State. Whittenburg is the team's best scorer and (Thurl) Bailey is deadly from the outside, but the guy who makes them win is the littlest guy in the lineup, Sidney Lowe (6-0).

"He controls the play. He is one who says, 'Now's the time to shoot.' I don't mean out loud. He's just the guy around whom the whole wheel turns.

"It sounds contradictory, but I think Louisville can take Houston out of the game by attacking. N.C. State, if it gets the chance, can do it by not attacking - just hanging onto

No other player among the 16 who received votes attracted more than three

And no other player, since the AP began the honor in 1961, had won more than twice. Ohio State's Jerry Lucas (1961-62), UCLA's Lew Alcindor (1967 and 1969), UCLA's Bill Walton (1972-73) and North Carolina State's David Thompson (1974-75) were two-time winners. Alcindor changed his name to Kareem Abdul-Jabaar

Walton also won the Rupp Trophy, in honor of the late Kentucky coach, in 1974, before it was presented to the AP Player of the Year.

Sampson, 22, averaged 19.1 points, 11.7 rebounds and blocked 103 shots in leading Virginia to a 29-5 record and a berth in the NCAA playoffs this season. But Sampson, the most dominant player in the college game, couldn't lead the Cavaliers to his goal, the

seasons.

He averaged 60 percent from the field and 70 percent from the free throw line this He is only the sixth player

in NCAA history - and first since Houston's Elvin Hayes to score more than 2,000 points and grab more than 1,500 rebounds.

Strike averted

NEW YORK (AP) - Two previously untouched concepts - guaranteed percentage of gross revenues and salary caps - are being added to the sports labor lexicon with the tentative agreement by the National Basketball Association and its players'

NBA management and players agreed on a contract Thursday that will guarantee players 53 percent share of gross revenues, effective next season. The salary cap provisions will not begin until the 1984-85 season

The salary cap provisions will prevent teams from signing other clubs' free agents or trading for players who would increase their payroll. They also require teams to spend a certain amount on salaries, and if they do not have enough money to reach that figure, the NBA would use a pool of shared revenues to bring the struggling clubs

up to the minimum standard. Bob Lanier of the Milwaukee Bucks, president of the Players Association, said the players believe "that not only have they maintained competitive bidding, but have greatly enhanced it because now all the teams will be bidding rather than merely a handful, as has been the case for the last few

years." However, the five teams with the highest payrolls -Los Angeles, New Jersey, New York, Philadelphia and Seattle - will be frozen at their current salary levels next season, before the salary cap provision takes effect.

These teams will be able to

sign other teams' free agents next season if they adjust their payrolls in other ways to keep their salary at the same

The final roadblock to ratification is 23 player representatives, who will consider the proposal Monday. Larry Fleisher, the union's general counsel and chief negotiator, said ratification is a formality.

NBA Commissioner Larry O'Brien said 22 of the 23 members of the Board of Governors, which consists of the league's owners or their top-level representatives, already have voted for the settlement. Eighteen votes were needed for approval.

Sam Schulman, owner of the Seattle SuperSonics, was the lone dissenter.

A strike would have been the third by a professional sports league in as many years. In 1981, baseball players struck for 50 days; last year, NFL players struck for 57 days.

NEW YORK (AP) - "I'm not too naive about the position that some day somebody's going to get me," said Larry Holmes, the World Boxing Council heavyweight champion, who has won all 42 of his pro fight.

"You're born to die; you're born to lose," the 33-year-old Holmes said at a news conference, attended by four other heavyweights who feel they were born to beat Holmes - Michael Dokes, Tim Witherspoon, Greg Page and Renaldo Snipes.

The news conference was held by Don King to formally announce a show at the Dunes Hotel and Country Club in Las Vegas, featuring Holmes' 15th title defense in a scheduled 12-rounder against Tim Witherspoon, and Dokes' first defense of the World Boxing Association title against Mike Weaver, from whom he won the title in 63 seconds last Dec. 10.

Witherspoon will be Holmes' second fight of 1983 he outpointed Lucien Rodriguez of France last Sunday - which the champion said again will be his last year of fighting.

Also on the card will be a 12-round WBC elimination bout between the top-ranked Page and Snipes, who knocked down Holmes before being stopped in the 11th round of a title bid in 1981, and Ossie Ocasio's 15-round WBA junior heavyweight (195-pound limit) title defense against No. 1-ranked Randy Stephens.

Expos' Carter plays hard

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (NEA) - Years ago, when Francis Tarkenton was playing quarterback for the New York Giants and Minnesota Vikings, an interview with him was an exercise in rhetoric. You wound him up with a subject "let's talk about play action passes" — and half an hour or an hour later, you

said, "Fran, that's enough." I recently had the same experience with Gary Carter, the effervescent, effusive catcher for the Montreal Expos. In fact, after we had been sitting for an hour at the American Airlines Golf Classic, in which he competed, columnist Mel Durslag of Los Angeles came by and muttered, "Lousy interview,

Carter smiled broadly and said, "He's only asked me two questions so far.'

Gary Carter is loquacious. He is also handsome and rich. In 1982, the Expos signed him to an eight-year contract whose figures he refuses to pin down but, he concedes, enrich his bank account by close to \$2 million a year

And, to bring up the major subject of our dialogue, he has a scar to show for every one of those millions he will collect, present and future.

The physique is impres-ive. Six-feet-two-inches tall, covered by 215 to 220 proportioned pounds to absorb the brunt of catching up to 157 games a season. Look closely, and you'll see the toll of the last eight years as the Expos' catcher. Or better yet, let Gary show

"My left elbow," he points out, "see that bump. Maybe some arthritis is in there. Couple of times, guys have taken backswings, and the

Last year, I couldn't pick up a carton of milk and I couldn't do any pushups or it killed me to pick up a bat. I said, 'All's I need is a cortisone shot. Give me two

days.' "Naw,' they said, 'we need you in there.' So I played with it. Had my best year ever. I hit .293, had 29 home runs and 97 RBIs. And that was with a hurt arm the last three weeks. "I have always played

hurt. If I sat out all the games I didn't feel good, I wouldn't have been in half of them. You got to be a dog to be a catcher. Ask John Bench (the Cincinnati Reds great whom Carter has supplanted as the outstanding catcher in baseball). "One year, 1977, I was

catching every day and we went in to play the Chicago Cubs a July 4 weekend. I caught both games of a doubleheader, and that was the first time since high school that I'd gotten under 200 pounds. I was some kind of dehydrated.

"Catching really does slow you up. When you catch 154 games a year like I do, you've got the wear and tear. If I don't keep my weight at a level of 215 or 220, I'm so tired by the end of the season I can barely get through.

'The thing I see with John Bench, he paid his dues and caught a lot of games in 13 years — 1,738 games behind the plate. My first 18 games I catch this year, I'll be over a thousand. I've got seven years remaining on my con-tract and if I average 100 games a year, I'll break Bench's mark. He had two more years of catching full time than I have. We both started at the same age, 20. I turned 21 on April 8, 1975. He was a starting catcher right away, but I had to divide my time between

first two years. So I felt that I lost quite a bit of time behind the plate.

"You see, I had more injuries in the outfield. I ran into a brick wall in Winter Haven. I busted up my thumb. I cracked two ribs on a Jarry Park fence. Right here," pointing to his rib cage, "there are some calcium deposits that have built up. I only missed one game. It was painful, but I was a rookie and didn't want to stay out."

Also evident is a long scar on his right thumb. 'That was at home plate,'

he continues. "Alberto Lois in '79 with the Pittsburgh Pirates, when we were going for the pennant and those were the guys we eventually lost out to. Third inning, second game of a double-header, he came sliding into home and Andre Dawson threw the ball up the first base line. I just came over, and he must have caught me, got his foot in there and bent the thumb straight back. Tore the ligaments and had a fracture.

"I've had a numerous amount of injuries, but you wouldn't know it because I've played with them. I'm just that type of player. Gary Carter goes out and gives 110 per cent and gives the fans what they want to see. That's why I don't complain about catching as many games as I do. The last six years, I've led the National League in games caught. I'll probably lead it again this year. If I could play another position (Bench is now a third baseman), it would keep me around longer. I've already offered suggestions, but this is a decision they're making.

"I got a scar on my foot, where it was torn up by a sprinkler head. I tore up my right knee playing high school football — there's scar tissue from the ligament and the cruciate. Then here on my right arm. there's a long scar where I fell through the shower as a kid of 11. My elbow hit the glass, and a piece came down and sliced it wide open. I had my little toe operated on. Took the bone out and it's just a flap right now. This scar above my eye is from running into the brick wall in Winter Haven.

Aliens top pedestrian fatality list in El Paso

EL PASO, Texas (AP) - the Southwest to work at sum-About one-third of El Paso's pedestrian fatalities are desperate, job-seeking illegal aliens who dart across border highways and are run over by

motorists, officials say. "They dash across the highway like they're crazy. Those who never look don't make it." El Paso County Sheriff Mike Davis said Wednesday. "It's a common occurrence on U.S.-Mexico border."

One who didn't survive was Esther Rodriguez Reyes, a 56-year-old illegal alien who worked as a \$10-a-week maid in El Paso. Mrs. Rodriguez Reyes was killed Sunday when she bolted in front of a car on the Border Highway that separates El Paso from neighboring Ciudad Juarez.

"I'm sure she wasn't committing suicide," said El Paso Hit-and-Run Division patrolman Elaine Roundtree. 'They're just trying to beat the traffic.

Officials say 10 of the 28 pedestrians killed last year in this far West Texas city of 450,000 were illegal aliens.

"That's 35 percent. That doesn't surprise me," Davis

Through the first quarter of 1983, two of El Paso's six pedestrian fatalities were illegal aliens, including Mrs. Rodriguez Reyes, who police said was traveling to her job in El Paso.

U.S. Border Patrol officials say March is the third successive record-breaking month for illegal alien apprehensions in the busy El Paso sector, which covers 340 miles of the New Mexico-Mexico border and Rio Grande riverfront.

February's 18,000 alien apprehensions in the El Paso sector, the second busiest along the border behind Chula Vista, California, rose 60 percent over the same month in 1982, El Paso sector chief Alan Eliason said. "And the scary thing is we're not even in the peak season yet."

Traditionally, July and August are the busiest border apprehension months, when most aliens try to sneak into

mer fruit-picking jobs. Illegal aliens are fleeing the economic woes of their nation, which is suffering from its worst monetary crisis since the 1910-20 Mexican Revolution. The Mexican peso has been devalued three times, and now is worth one-sixth its value of February 1982.

The peso currently is valued at about 155 to the dollar. Thirteen months ago, the peso traded at 27 to the

Juarez, El Paso's sister city of 900,000, is the largest border town along the 1,900-mile U.S.-Mexico border, and has been particularly struck by its nation's economic problems. Officials in Juarez, Mexico's fourth largest city, estimate 40 percent of its workers are

"Most of the people who are seen dashing across the highways come across to work in the morning and go back (to Juarez) at night," Ms. Roundtree said.

Living across the river from Mexico also presents unusual problems for the border patrol, which operates alien checkpoints along all the major highways out of El

"We're trying to cope with the large influx, but as it is, we're almost stretched to the limit," Eliason said. Border patrolmen seized an estimated 2,000 illegal aliens last month who tried to sneak out of El Paso on freight

"We realize we're not going to stop them at the river's edge," he said.

In fact, Grant hasn't done much acting for the past two decades, since "Sky King" went out of production in 1962 and CBS settled for reruns of the series for another five years.

DEAR DR. LAMB Your reply to the woman whose husband was overweight brought back memories of 10 years ago when my husband, also overweight in just about that amount, tried a diet such as you recommended. It was so restrictive in allowing the foods, dressings and condi-ments which he had grown to love and indulge in over the years that after two weeks of salads with vinaigarette dressing, steamed vegetables, no butter, an apple for dessert, he rationalized that his body

couldn't take the shock. I loved the guy and cer-tainly understood the frustration, so I started a very gradual cutting down on the foods that he should not have. The salads got bigger, the bleu cheese dressing only enough to flavor it. We shared a baked potato. The tablespoon of sour cream was one-half yogurt. We ate mountains of stir fried vegetables prepared in just a trace of oil and served over an anthill of rice.

No longer did we spoon up mounds of ice cream topped with chocolate sauce. Now it was frozen strawberries, frozen apple juice, dry milk and ice cubes whirred in a blender to make a delicious

were on it forever. DEAR READER - You should contact your doctor in view of your symptoms. It could be that you really do need thyroid supplement. The other possibility is that after taking the thyroid for so long your pituitary gland that stimulates the thyroid just didn't respond when you stopped thyroid.

When you are taking thyroid you don't need, your own thyroid quits putting out as much hormone. Then when you stop the medication it is supposed to shift gears and start producing additional hormone. If this falled to happen in your case, your doctor may want to do something about it.

Sometimes thyroid hormone is given to "rest" the thyroid or during temporary conditions and can be discontinued in time.


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


