

Cumpton inks pact, takes over Monday

The Hereford school board made it official Monday morning--Don Cumpton is returning to Hereford as the athletic director and head football coach.

"I'm thrilled to have the opportunity to come back to Hereford, and I appreciate the vote of confidence given me by the school board and administration," a happy Cumpton said after the special board meeting Monday at 10:30 a.m.

Cumpton, who recently took over as athletic director for the Abilene schools, said he hopes to begin his job here next Monday. He already has tentative approval of the Abilene officials to make the move next week.

Cumpton, 41, will replace Jerry Taylor, who has accepted the head football post at Odessa High. Taylor succeeded Cumpton in 1983, after Cumpton had guided Whiteface athletic teams for five seasons, 1978-82. Cumpton had also served as an assistant coach here in 1970-73.

The board announced last week, after meeting to screen about 24 candidates that Cumpton would be offered the contract. Supt. Harrell Holder made the recommendation to employ Cumpton this morning, and the board approved by a 4-0 vote. Terms of the two-year contract in-

clude a salary of \$43,000 per year and a \$1,200 travel expense allowance.

Bud Patterson made the motion to approve the contract for Cumpton, and John Fuston seconded. Bill Townsend and board president Marilyn Culpepper joined in approving the motion. Cal Jones, Jo Garcia and Steve Coneway were absent, although Jones arrived just as the short meeting adjourned.

Asked about his decision to seek the Hereford job, Cumpton said that

"Hereford is just a unique community. I've spent nine years out of 19 coaching in Hereford, and those were the happiest years for both me and my family."

Cumpton said the AD's job in Abilene is primarily a desk job. "After just three months, I decided that wasn't my cup of tea--I just wasn't happy not working with the kids and my assistant coaches."

The enthusiastic Cumpton said when he heard that Taylor had resigned to take the Odessa job, "I

started thinking about the possibility of returning to Hereford. I doubt I would have been interested in making the move anywhere else.

"I've heard that if you wear out one pair of shoes in Hereford, you won't be interested in moving. I believe there's something to that."

Cumpton said he was not sure who his assistant coaches will be, but two or three of his assistants in Abilene are interested in coming here. "I want to visit with some of the coaches in Hereford before I make any decisions." He confirmed that Danny Haney, a former aide who remained in Hereford as a teacher when Cumpton left in 1983, will be rejoining his staff.

After serving as an assistant coach

here in 1970-73, Cumpton had head-coaching jobs at Sanford-Fritch and Muleshoe. He then returned to Hereford as AD and coach in 1978 and guided the athletic department for five seasons. His football teams compiled a 37-16-1 won-lost-tied record here, including a trip to the state semifinals in 1981. That team had a 13-1 record losing only to state champion Lake Highlands by 10-7.

In three seasons at Abilene High, his teams had a 15-14-1 record in the tough 5A district. His overall won-lost record as a head coach is 74-49-3.

He and his wife, Linda, have two sons. Brett is a ninth grader and David is in the fifth grade. Both sons were both in Hereford.

Another contested race develops with 2 more filing for county judge

Another contested race for Deaf Smith County Democrats developed Monday when two men tossed their hats in the ring for the office of county judge. Monday was the deadline for filing for county or district offices.

Tom Simons, longtime KPAN Radio staff member, and Joe Zepeda, self employed trucker and livestock raiser, filed Monday in the

county judge's race. Dempsey Alexander, school principal, had previously announced for the race to replace Judge Glen Nelson, who is not seeking reelection.

The only other candidate to file on the final day was Roland Saul, seeking reelection as Criminal District Attorney. Only person filed for the Republican Primary on the local level. Ronnie Hathaway announced

as a candidate for county commissioner, Precinct 4, on the Republican ticket.

That commission race is the most crowded with four candidates on the Democratic side. Incumbent James Voyles is being challenged by Johnny Latham, Kenneth Donathan and Pedro LaFuente.

In the Precinct 2, county commissioner race, incumbent Austin Rose has drawn a challenger in Fidel Reyna.

The office of Justice of the Peace has drawn three candidates. Incumbent O.K. Neal will be challenged by Johnnie Turrentine and Ruben Gutierrez. The other contested race will be for county treasurer, where incumbent Vesta Mae Nunley will face the challenge of Herbert DeLaRosa.

Uncontested candidates include District Judge Wesley Gulley, DA Roland Saul, Lola Faye Veazey, district clerk, David Ruland, county clerk; and Ken Hagar, county surveyor.

Simons, 42, has been a resident of Hereford for 15 years. He has worked with the radio station for about 14 years, serving as news director,

news and sports announcer, and advertising salesman during these years. He is a former school board member and has been active in the chamber of commerce and other civic activities.

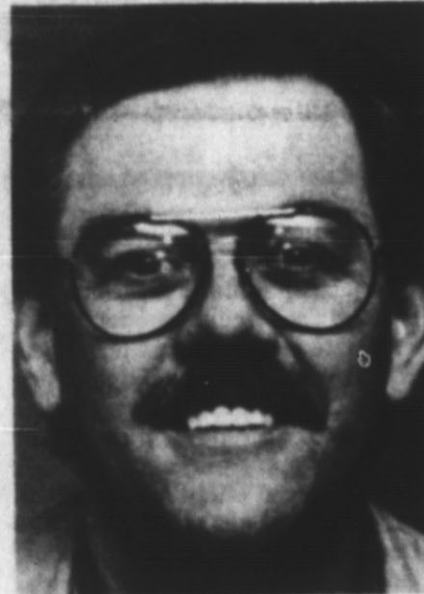
"In my work, I have covered the courthouse and county commission meetings and feel I have a knowledge of the duties and responsibilities of the office of county judge. I feel I am qualified to perform the duties of the office and to help in the future growth and progress of the county," said Simons. He and his wife, Cindy, attend First Baptist Church. Simons is the father of two daughters, one son and one stepson.

Zepeda, 56, has lived in Deaf Smith County since 1964 and has been self employed as a trucker and buying and selling livestock for the past 10 years. He is a former crew leader for Griffin & Brand and Dubryn Packing. He operated a grocery store and was an apartment manager from 1960 to 1975. He operated a restaurant in Corpus Christi before moving to Hereford.

Zepeda was born in Three Rivers, in south Texas. He and his wife, Janie, have six children--four graduating from high school and the two youngest now in HHS. Zepeda served in the U.S. Army, 1950-53, and attended Del Mar College in 1953-55.

"I am an American, Catholic and Democrat, and I place God first, family second and job third," stated Zepeda. "I believe that I have the compassion and understanding to provide equal justice under the law," he added.

Zepeda has been active in support of the Boy Scouts, Camp Fire, Inc., and the American Legion and VFW. He was a member of the former Paisano Lions Club and has served on ad hoc committees for the chamber of commerce and the school district.

City agrees to maintain streets of proposed housing project

The Hereford City Commission agreed to support with street maintenance a housing development project proposed by the Amistad Housing Development Corporation of Hereford. The action was made during Monday night's regular commission meeting.

Amistad president Charlie Ruiz told the commissioners that he was part of a group of citizens who were concerned about housing for agricultural workers. "We got together and found out that there is not enough adequate housing for the farm workers," Ruiz stated. "We are here to ask for your support and help."

Amistad's intent is to build family housing for migrant workers and farm workers who are residents of

Hereford. Currently, Amistad does not have the location for the development selected but did say they were looking at land on North Ave. K, on Country Club Road, and Austin Road. Amistad plans to build the housing development inside the city limits.

The estimated \$1 million for the project will come in a loan from the Farmers Home Administration. Amistad asked the city to maintain the roads surrounding the development, and Amistad would maintain all the grounds.

"We are planning to make this a nice place to live," Ruiz said. "We feel that people will take care of this place and take some responsibility for the upkeep."

Commissioner Emory Brownlow

said that he was in favor of supporting such a project and the commissioners approved a motion to support the project.

In other business the commission rejected a request made by Betty Driver to rezone the area on South Schley near James Street from A zone, family housing, to D zone, restricted commercial. Ms. Driver told the commission that she was planning to reapply for redistricting but would apply to have the area rezoned to E zoning. Ms. Driver stated that she did not want the area to be in D zone after all. The commission will act on Ms. Driver's new application after it goes through the zoning commission.

Reagan will call for changes

WASHINGTON (AP) -- After a week's delay due to the shuttle Challenger explosion, President Reagan goes before Congress tonight to deliver a State of the Union address calling for welfare overhaul, catastrophic health insurance and

revamping of the international monetary system.

The half-hour speech to a joint session of the House and Senate will be carried live by the major radio and television networks beginning at 8 p.m. EST.

Aides have said Reagan will use the speech to "redefine the role of government" for the rest of the century. As part of that, they said, he will order yearlong studies designed to develop proposals for revising federal programs for the needy, initiate a program to protect all Americans from the costs of catastrophic illness and deal with uncontrolled currency fluctuations that aggravate the U.S. trade deficit.

Two officials who agreed to discuss the administration plans said the studies would be modeled after the Treasury Department's analysis of the income tax system, which Reagan called for in his 1984 State of the Union address and which led to

TCGA told farm bill may die young

DIMMITT--The best news about the recently passed farm bill is that it may not survive its appointed five-year life, according to comments made at the Texas Corn Growers Association meeting Monday.

"When you analyze the Security Food Act, the bad will far outweigh the good," said Carl King, president of the association, told about 200 agribusinessmen. "I predict that two years from now, we'll have a new farm bill. There's no way we can live with this one."

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower said that one plus in the farm legislation was that "dirt farmers shifted the debate to price instead of subsidy," but added that there would be a fight to change the policy this year.

"For some, it's ideological, for us it's survival," he said. "It's supposed to be a five-year bill, but I doubt that it lasts a year."

Marion Garland, of American Agriculture, said many of the national farm organizations really lobbied Congress for higher prices to boost exports. "I call them parasites," he said.

Fred Lundgren of the Texas Department of Agriculture said the farm bill was "designed to get a bunch of sold-out congressmen through the election. You can't cure lower prices with lower prices."

This year's target prices were reviewed by Lundgren, with how the Gramm-Rudman bill would reduce them this year and next.

In the bill, corn's target price is \$3.03 a bushel. Gramm-Rudman will cut it to \$2.50 and in 1987 it will be at

\$2.41, according to Lundgren. Wheat will go from a target price of \$4.38 to \$4.19 after Gramm-Rudman, then to \$3.48 in 1987.

The farm bill will cost taxpayers \$125 billion, and Hightower said the taxpayers couldn't sustain it and the people in the agriculture industry don't want to sustain it.

Low prices for farmers have caused 7,000 of them to be delinquent on loans statewide, Hightower said. Many other are in severe economic trouble. The agriculture hotline at the Austin TDA office is getting close to 50 calls a day from farmers who don't know what they are going to do, Hightower said.

Marketing and diversification may help farmers stay in the business, though, according to Hightower and State Sen. Bill Sarpalius.

Hightower noted the plans to build a flour mill near Dawn as an example of farmers finding a market and getting into processing. He had reports from around the state of growers trying blueberries, Christmas trees, grapes and a hibiscus used for making a cheaper newsprint quality paper.

Looking into the future can help encourage farmers, Sarpalius said. Genetic engineering is on the verge of developing potato crop that can produce all the tubers identically, finding a strain of cattle that is disease free, and generally grow better crops which may even be planted by robotics.

But the legislative focus is on the current crisis. Sarpalius said a committee has been formed to examine

Brown loses supreme court appeal

AUSTIN (AP) — Sen. J.E. "Buster" Brown, who announced as a candidate for state attorney general, did not want to take "no" for an answer from the Texas Supreme Court.

But apparently he has no choice. The court Monday denied Brown's plea to get on the Republican Party primary ballot, but Brown said he would appeal to the 1st Court of Appeals in Houston.

Meanwhile, State GOP chairman George Strake said he had refused for a second time to accept Brown's filing fee as a candidate.

Strake, however, said, "I kind of feel sorry for him," and he joined Brown in criticizing the court for not holding a full hearing on Brown's appeal.

The court overruled without comment Brown's motion to file a writ of mandamus with the court, but Brown said the justices had failed to answer his "questions of law."

Strake said the court had failed "to make a decision as it's paid to do." The court often overrules mandamus motions such as Brown's without comment.

Brown said the Supreme Court "can refuse to hear (an appeal) for any number of reasons, and since it didn't spell it out, I have no way of knowing" what the court's reason was for denying his motion.

Attorney General Jim Mattox, a Democrat running for re-election, said, "Any layman or any lawyer could read the (Texas) Constitution and see that Buster Brown was in violation of the wording of the constitution should he be allowed to run..."

Drilling companies suffer

ODESSA, Texas (AP) — Oil drilling companies are the first to suffer economic hardships as the price of crude oil plummets, and some companies are even taking on jobs they know will lose money, a contractor said.

The Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries announced in December it intended to pursue a larger share of the world oil market instead of continuing to prop up prices by restricting production.

Oil prices started sliding from the \$27 a barrel level on Jan. 15. Five days later, the price of West Texas Intermediate crude fell \$2.25 a barrel to \$21.25 on spot markets. West Texas Intermediate, the benchmark of U.S. oil, was trading on spot markets at about \$32 per barrel in December 1985.

"It seemed like there was a panic, an immediate reaction to the big oil drop," said Ray Peterson, owner of Midland's Peterson Drilling Co. and president of the Permian Basin chapter of the International Association of Drilling Contractors.

On Monday, oil prices tumbled below \$18 a barrel for the first time this decade. Arturo Hernandez Grisanti, OPEC's president, predicted a "major price collapse" unless producers restrain output.

"I try to keep some optimism, but it's sure hard to do," Peterson said.

Some contractors are desperate enough for business to take jobs they know will lose money, he said.

"Some contractors are drilling below cost just to keep their utilization," he said.

Drillers are willing to lose money to keep their organization together, but they can't keep that up for long, Peterson said.

Government orders 747 inspections

WASHINGTON (AP) — Airlines flying older Boeing 747s have begun special inspections of the jumbo jets after the Federal Aviation Administration determined there might be severe cracks in the main frame of some of the huge planes.

The FAA ordered inspections on as many as 160 of the Boeing 747s flying in the United States and advised foreign carriers to do likewise after routine maintenance uncovered cracks in the frame, or rib cage, of four jumbo jets.

In one case, the FAA said, three adjacent frames were found "to be essentially severed" — a condition that "could lead to rapid decompression of the fuselage... and possible loss of the aircraft."

Spokesmen for a number of air carriers, including Pan American World Airways, United Airlines and Northwest Airlines, said Monday the inspections already were under way and were not expected to disrupt service. They all said the initial findings revealed no cracking problems.

The FAA directive, sent to the airlines during the weekend, calls for Boeing 747s with more than 14,000 landings to be inspected within 25 flight cycles — a takeoff and a landing — and newer ones within 50 flight cycles. Planes with fewer than 10,000 landings or those that have had the frame inspected within the past two years need not undergo the special inspection, the directive said.

FAA spokesman Stephen Hayes said the agency estimated between 150 and 160 of the planes would be subject to inspection, including those belonging to U.S. airlines and foreign carriers serving the United States.

Immigrants may face AIDS tests

LOS ANGELES (AP) — An order requiring all permanent immigrants to the United States to be tested for exposure to AIDS has been signed by U.S. Health and Human Services Secretary Otis R. Bowen, a spokesman says.

The proposed order would add AIDS to a list of medical conditions, including sexually transmitted diseases, that exclude immigrants from entering the United States as permanent residents, the Los Angeles Times and The New York Times reported today.

The regulation must be released for 60 days of public comment and receive approval from the White House Office of Management and Budget, the Los Angeles paper said, citing sources it did not identify.

The proposed regulation does not specifically require immigrants to take an acquired immune deficiency syndrome antibody test, but language in its preamble suggests that the secretary should order the blood test, the newspaper said.

International

Anti-government protests provoked

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — Government soldiers headed for northern Haiti to control "people of bad intentions" that President-for-Life Jean-Claude Duvalier says are responsible for a week of rioting in which as many as 50 people may have died.

The 34-year-old president also toured the tense capital city with his wife on Monday to prove he still is in control of Haiti.

Soldiers were seen in Port-au-Prince heading to the highway to Cap-Haitien and Gonaives, where some of the most violent riots occurred last week. The U.S. Embassy said no demonstrations were reported Monday in either city.

Demonstrations in St. Marc also ended with the arrival of truckloads of soldiers and militiamen. A 7 p.m. to 5 a.m. curfew was clamped Sunday on the coastal city of 30,000, and soldiers in full battle gear and carrying automatic weapons patrolled the streets Monday.

University home of vintage firearms collection

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — One of the country's finest firearms collections lies in specially sealed glass cases in a vault-like room at Texas A&M University.

The collection of about 1,100 guns and accoutrements was once owned by dairy magnate Carl Metzger, an avid hunter who traveled the world looking for rare or unusual firearms.

Metzger left the collection, which includes firearms made over a 500-year span, to the university when he died in 1949.

Metzger delighted friends by showing up at a hunt armed with ancient fowling pieces such as a 16th-century crossbow or an ebony-and-ivory Oriental piece from the early 1700s.

His collection includes a 7-inch hand-held cannon from 14th-century

China and a huge "Hemingwayesque" elephant gun lies nearby.

Curator Jim Earle, professor of engineering design graphics who shares Metzger's love for unique firearms, said the collection has been valued at \$2 million.

"This collection would probably rank as one of the top five or six in the country," Earle said. "There are collections with more guns than this, but not of this quality."

The weapons are taken out of their carefully sealed glass cases once a year for oiling, Earle said.

Pointing to a brace of boxed dueling pistols from the early 1800s, Earle said society's attitude toward firearms has changed drastically.

what kind of impact the crisis has had on rural banks and on the prices.

"We've got to realize that agriculture is a world market," he said. He gave two examples of selling in the world market. Illinois and California joined for developing an "ag-ship" which was virtually a floating trade show of those states' products. And, a couple of farmers from near Dalhart are producing peanuts after a trip to Egypt made them aware of a new market.

"We wouldn't have to fight the fight if everybody knew that all the products could do," according to Bart Kanaly, TDA. He is boss of Lisa Boling who is in charge of the state's "Ag in the Classroom" program. Using lesson materials, teaching aides, arranging tours and other services,

the K-12 curriculum is hoped to "change public perception of agriculture."

Demographics is Boling's main pitch for the need of such a program. With 98 percent of the state population urban, many three to five generations removed from the farm, the basic knowledge of agriculture is distant.

Boling said she believed much of the farm economic problems would not be present now if the general public a generation ago had been educated about farm business.

The outreach may expand past Texas. Boling said that since Texas is a key state eyed by textbook publishers, that industry may realize that agricultural information needs to be included in texts.

his proposal to overhaul the tax system.

A House version of that proposal was adopted at the end of the year, and the Senate is giving the issue top priority now.

The administration officials, speaking on condition they not be identified, said Reagan's fifth State of the Union would emphasize his concern for the American family.

Rather than calling for national sacrifice to meet the stringent spending cuts required by the Gramm-Rudman budget-balancing law, Reagan is expected to stress the importance of the family budget rather than the federal budget.

The sources said Reagan would take a "pro-family" approach to overhauling welfare programs and related services, proposing to eliminate provisions that tend to encourage the breakup of families and calling for incentives to encourage the poor to overcome their dependence on government aid.

The Reagan study would encompass not only Aid to Families with Dependent Children, the principal federal-state program that provides cash assistance to the poor, but many other programs that provide assistance based on peoples' needs.

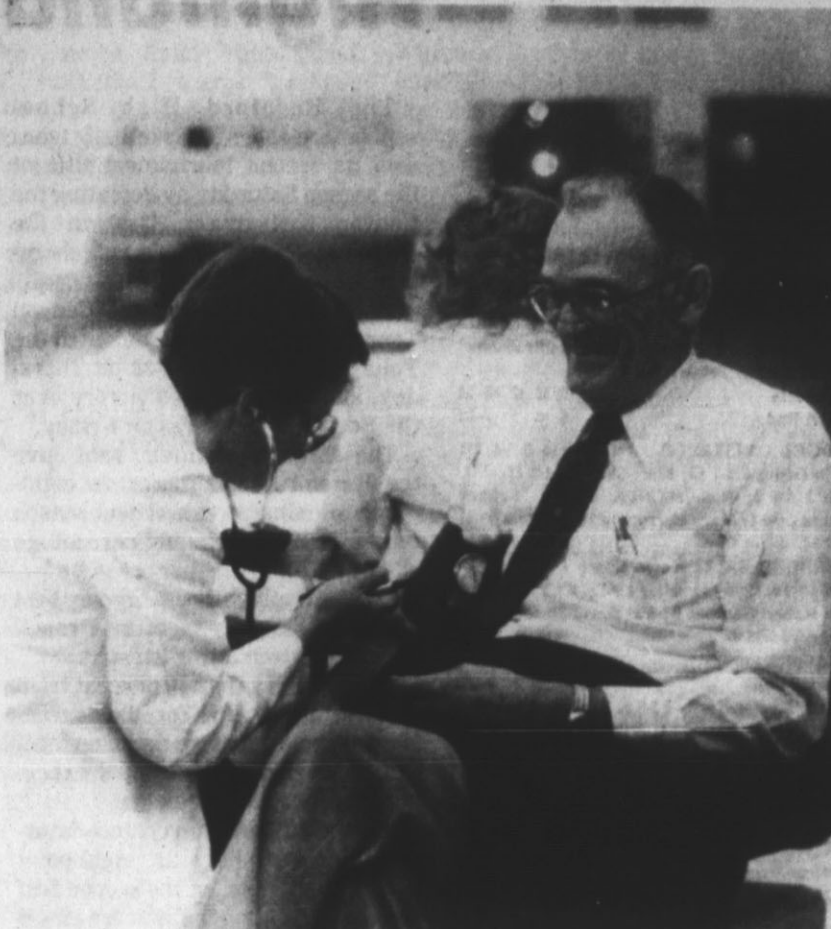
I must have been nuts to allow him to keep me on the string this long. Somehow, the years just flew by and before I knew it he was an old man and I was no spring chicken.

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Patients expect doctors to be caring about their health

How a physician talks to patients has a lot to do with how satisfied patients are with their health care, according to a Texas Tech University speech communications professor.

Dr. Richard L. Street said patients want physicians who are caring, concerned about the patient's problems and animated but not too aggressive. While those traits are desirable, it's difficult to tell physicians how to achieve and show that perfect mix.

"We're trying to determine what behaviors patients consider friendly or domineering," Street said. "The literature tells doctors they should be warm and concerned, but no one can explain to them what they have to do or how they have to act."

Street is video taping physicians and psychiatrists in the Texas Tech

Health Sciences Center Family Medicine Clinic and Pain Center to study how they interact with their patients.

Street said most medical handbooks that deal with how a physician should communicate with patients are based on studies done with psychologists. The Pain Center offers the opportunity to see if patients have different expectations for a physician's and a psychologist's communication styles because patients are treated by both.

"Patients expect different things from physicians and psychiatrists or psychologists," Street said. "Physicians may be expected to be more task-oriented because they are curing a disease. Psychiatrists may be expected to be more personal

because they are interested in a person's feelings and helping people cope."

Physicians need to be perceived as good communicators because patients want to build more than a professional relationship, he said.

"Patients are really interested in building a relationship with the physician that goes beyond physical care. They want counseling, reassurance and effective information exchange," he said.

Despite their desire for concerned doctors, patients who have long gone to a physician will more likely tolerate the doctor's domineering behavior, Street said.

"Because you have a history of successful treatment with a doctor, you are more apt to tolerate behavior

you wouldn't if it were a first visit to a new physician," he said.

Street has also found that women prefer a more responsive type of physician than men do.

"While both men and women want friendly, caring doctors, men are more likely to tolerate a more brusque manner than women," Street said. "I guess that's because women tend to be more expressive and more actively involved in relationships."

Physicians need to not only be aware of their communication behaviors, but also of how the patient is communicating, Street said.

The more serious a patient perceives his disease to be the more involved and concerned he wants the physician to be, Street said. Even minor ailments to the doctor can be major concerns in the patient's mind. Physicians need to be alert to signs that the patient is overly concerned about the ailment or, for whatever reason, not fully discussing his symptoms.

Street said a physician can't assume the patient knows what the doctor knows. A physician has to be alert for concerns and fears that the patient may not be voicing and whether the patient is telling the

whole truth about his symptoms.

"By being aware of these things, the physician can foster an effective, satisfying relationship with patients

by being aware of how the patient communicates and by adapting his or her communication to the patient's needs and characteristics," he said.

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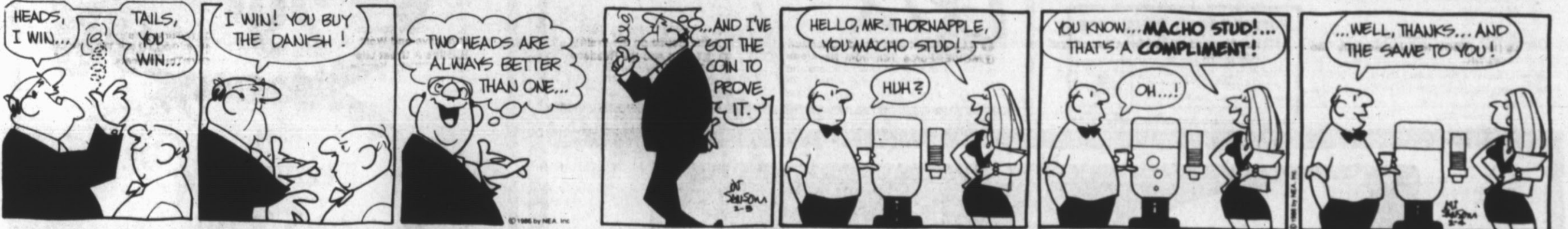

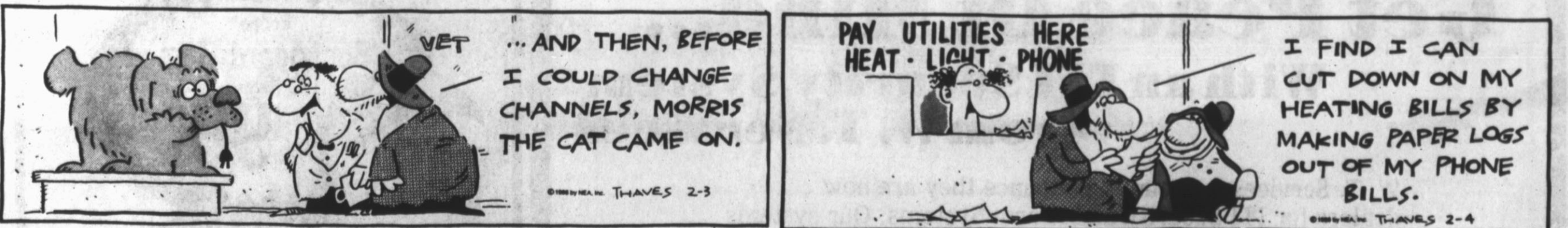

GAINESVILLE, Texas (AP) — It's not, nor is it ever likely to become a staple of American sport. In fact, it's more like a far off diversion in the court of the deranged Caligula than a pastime of civilized and sophisticated Texans.

It's bear wrestling, and for about two hours on a recent evening it shambled into Lindsay's City Lights in the form of a 725-pound hulking black bear with the fearsome appellation of Ginger.

Now, City Lights is a bar — a rocking, rolling, kicking bar. It is billed as the place where one can experience the "Sights and sounds of the '80s," and features, in addition to the usual amenities of such a place, the dancing melodies of musicians being pined from Prince and the Revolution to George Jones.

And here, on the same starlit dance floor where couples

cling to one another weeping gently to the romantic swelling of "Blueberry Hill," eight courageous men were destined to take on the brawny bruin in a tragicomic struggle pitting man against nature.

The bar is owned by James Garner, who says he has hosted the bizarre contest three times now.

The 13-year-old Ginger is owned and trained by Rip Tyler of Calhoun, Ga., himself a veteran of 32 years in the professional wrestling ring. And according to Tyler's partner of two years, Burlie Webb of Hot Springs, Ark., Ginger has never been beaten in her 10 years of big-time grappling.

"She's never really been pined," the bearded Webb explained. "But one boy down here in Denton came so darn close, we paid him anyway."

It would be no mean feat to

best this bear. Not only is she just shy of half-a-ton of muscle and sinew and hair, but she's been trained for the ring since she was six months old, and has practiced her trade against some of the best wrestling has to offer from Puerto Rico to Hawaii. In fact, Webb said, last summer she took on five members of the United States Olympic Wrestling team at the Turning Point in Stillwater, Okla.

How did the battling beast fare?

"She beat 'em all," Webb said. "And three volunteers from the audience."

When he's not collecting the cover charge, talking to inquisitive reporters or recruiting combatants (hopefuls must sign a release), Webb dons his black baseball cap and striped black-and-white jersey, tucks his chrome whistle into his pocket and steps into the ring

as the official referee for the evening's battle.

All of which begs the question: "What kind of rules apply when a 140-pound man grapples with a shaggy, black bear?"

"You've got to wrestle with the bear," Webb said. "She's a professional wrestler. No hair-pulling, no kicking and no slugging. She's been wrestling 10 years and never been pinned. She's got a pretty damn good record."

In addition to those prohibitions, Tyler explained to each contestant as he enters the ring that playing with Ginger's muzzle is strictly forbidden.

Now the bear is federally licensed to wrestle, and has been de-clawed. Her front teeth have been extracted — just in case she gets excited during a bout. But she still has her jaw teeth, and they are capable of making some pretty nifty perforations in stray arms and fingers. Hence the muzzle.

And enough of the evening's participants discovered this, as they inadvertently entangled themselves in the leather sheath encasing those jaws, dislodging it from Ginger's snout. Webb was forced through much of the night to halt the struggle and replace the mask as Ginger stared, bare-faced, into the eyes of yet another subdued foe.

There is something elemental, distinctly Melvilleian, about a struggle between man and beast. On one hand there is the monster, battling for who-knows-what dark purpose; perhaps it is in the blood. On the other hand there is the man — searching for the elusive satisfaction of conquering nature. Or maybe simply chasing the \$100 prize

for pinning the bear.

Whatever secret motivations carried the men onto the floor, Ginger made pretty quick work of each of them, straddling them, pressing them to the floor with the full bulk of her dark body, flinging them about like six-foot rag dolls, growling her approval.

"She didn't hurt me," said 165-pound Chuck King of Gainesville following his bout. "But 725 pounds — what can you say? I'd wrestle her again. It was fun."

King was, of course, one victim of the grizzly show. And as he slowly massaged his arm — he was not sure whether it was the teeth that had caused the slight cut or the chain around the bear's neck — he admitted that while he had been bested by the beast, he still had something to be proud of.

"I did something out there that I didn't see anybody else do," he said. "She had me down on my back three times, and I got away. It had to be fright."

King had some straightforward advice for bear wrestlers that followed:

"Stay behind her," he confided, "and don't let her hook you by the leg."

Barry "the Bear" Brown stayed behind her, and kept his feet for most of the two minutes allotted combatants in the ring. So stellar was Brown in his losing performance against Ginger that he received a trophy for his efforts, and the general huzzahs of the watering-hole crowd.

Brown had some good moves, working swiftly to a position behind Ginger, maneuvering for the takedown.

"I think you've got her,"

shouted someone from the crowd.

Ginger howled, twisted — a perfected reversal — and flung Brown to the floor. Takedown.

Ginger didn't pin anybody, but she won on points eight times, extending her phenomenal record to something like 10 years and no losses.

"She just sat down on her haunches. It would have taken a forklift to get her over," Brown said following his struggle. "You ever tried to dance with a tornado? She kept spinning around, trying to grab my legs."

Brown, 31, of Gainesville, has been in Texas about four months. Prior to that he worked as a lumberjack in Washington, and rolling logs, he said, is the closest he's ever come to mixing it up with a bear.

"There's just about the same amount of brute force, though. And I've been run over by a log," he said.

What would possess an otherwise rational man to risk his body in the clutches of a bear?

"My wife signed me up for it," he said. "She figured I needed the exercise, I guess."

When the matches ended, the real hero lumbered out of the pit without a sound and ambled off to the back of a tiny red and white trailer waiting in the night behind the bar.

Ginger, the premier professional wrestler, is taking her show on the road again, this time to Hawaii for two weeks this month. And like as not, when she reaches her destination she'll show all comers that she's a bear who knows her stuff.

Attorney requests gusher Spindletop suit be tried

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — More than 200 people who contend they are entitled to royalties from the legendary Texas oil gusher Spindletop deserve a day in court to prove their claims, an attorney for the claimants told a federal appeals court.

Pittsburgh attorney Richard Ferris told three 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals judges Monday they should reverse another federal judge's decision to dismiss the Spindletop royalty case.

Ferris represents more than 200 people who claim

they have rights to royalties from the field, which launched the Texas oil boom when it erupted in 1901.

U.S. District Judge Joe Fisher of Beaumont last May dismissed the case, filed in 1984 by two of Ferris' clients — James Clark of Cincinnati and Dan Profit of Elsmere, Ky., who are cousins.

Clark and Profit are seeking \$20 billion in royalties from Amoco Productions, Mobil Oil Corp., Phillips Petroleum Corp. and Texaco Inc. In addition to the \$20 billion, Clark and Profit

want the oil companies to open their records and accounts for the past 70 years.

The cousins are basing their claims on a deed, which is dated 1911, which gave James Meadors one-eighth interest in the Spindletop mineral rights. Clark and Profit claim they are heirs of Meadors and therefore are entitled to the interest from the mineral rights.

Fisher said he dismissed the lawsuit because the cousins and other alleged Meadors heirs waited more than 70 years to stake their claim and allowed the oil companies to work the field without the heirs claiming part ownership.

Appeals judges Will Garwood, Jesse S. Williams and Edith H. Jones said they will decide on the appeal within one to three months.

If the panel reverses Fisher's ruling, the case returns to Beaumont for trial. "We're saying it's much too premature to dismiss this claim," Ferris told the judges. "We have the deed and we want to bring that to the court."

Attorneys for the defendant oil companies argue the Meadors family relinquished rights to royalties because they waited too long to make a claim.

Dallas attorney Morris Harrell, who represents all the companies except Texaco, also contends any previous landowners had conveyed all rights to the oil companies by failing to use the land, allowing the companies to work the field and then failing to file a claim regarding ownership.

"The reputation of that oil field is well-known," Harrell said. "I think the fact of this case is the plaintiffs had acquiesced by non-action of James Meadors during the early years of this century."
